Interest in the Florida State League All-Star classic, which many persons are predicting will flop, is mounting. As the time comes for Sanford or Daytona Beach to face the pick of the league, fans who are picking All-Star teams may or may not find the following hints helpful, but we offer them for what they are worth.

We have felt and we still believe that Sanford will be on top of the heap on Aug. 15, but anything can happen in baseball, as Sanford's spectacular season to date attests, so we advise all fans who are going after that season's post, which is to be given away to the fan who most closely guesses the All-Star lineup, to assume that Daytona Beach might be the home team and pick two teams. Any fan can send in as many entries as he feels like, so it is worth a little extra figuring to be on the safe side no matter who tops the league on Aug. 15.

In picking your hurlers, be sure that you have two left handers and two right handers. Peter Schmal, secretary of the Florida State league, and able statistician, who is handling the All-Star ballots, reports that many selections have been received with three left handers and only one right hander and vice-versa. If you sent in your selection early, you'd better check up on this and send in a safe side no matter who tops the league on Aug. 15.

If you're sure after that prize place yourself in the position of "the average fan, who will generally vote for the more publicized players and vote according to what you believe the fans will vote, as it is their selection that decides the make-up of the All-Star aggregation. If your conscience bothers you, pick two teams again. One team that represents your own individual preference and another that you believe will be the choice of fans.

LAKELAND, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Florida Citrus Commission yesterday voted down, 9 to 2, a proposal that the headquarters be transferred to Winter Haven and accepted with a dissenting vote an offer from Lakeland for new quarters in a building nearby.

Orlando and Haines City also submitted offers, but only those from Lakeland and Winter Haven were voted on.

Chairman Luther L. Chandler reported that Arthur Kudner, local citrus advertising agency, will have its seasonal campaign in shape shortly and that the commission probably will hold a special meeting within two weeks to give final consideration to the setup.

The commission already has adopted the campaign in principle, including a proposal that the winter part of funds be spent for radio promotion.

Secretary Charles F. Chaibain reported information was being received on a national procedure for citrus which is contemplated in a congressional bill, and said this information will be distributed to commission members when available.

200 Fishermen Ask Aid From Senate Group

Holland States He Is Willing To Help If Group Will Map Out Feasible Plans

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—More than 200 East and West Coast commercial fishermen and dealers left this city yesterday afternoon with the definite assurance of additional recognition of their industry by the next session of the Florida Legislature, provided they would first iron out their problems and present a constructive and helpful program for forthcoming years.

The Democratic nominee for Governor, Spessard L. Holland, spoke to the commercial salt water fishermen, assembled here in the first state-wide conference of this type and assured them they and their problems will get the amount of consideration due only when they display the desire to organize and map a progressive, constructive and workable program for one of the State's most important industries.

Senator Holland and Dan McCarty, speaker-designate of the 1941 House of Representatives, declared to the group of men that they pledged support to members of the fishing industry if they present to them a feasible program passed on by leaders from the industry.

Two resolutions were adopted at a public hearing on Monday morning session by Leroy M. Carpenter, member of the City Council and manager of the Sea-Board Fish Company, were adopted, the first of which was a discussion and revision of Carpenter's resolution contending that the conservation of black mullet could be secured by enforcing certain laws to provide a stretch-of-mesh net of 3 inches during open season and asked for its passage at the next session of the Legislature on August 1, 1941.

The other resolution asked the lawmakers to enact a law that three cents on each gallon of gasoline used by boats in the salt water fishing industry be placed in the State Conservation Fund and expended under the direction of the State Board of Conservation for the purpose of conservation of fish, water, wetlands and for the marketing thereof. A third resolution of the Carpenter resolution yesterday afternoon, was designed to bring about the enactment of legislation.

Near Hurricane Wind Hits Texas, Louisiana Coast
