### What's In A Name?

What's in a name?  
Plenty, if you happen to be a resident of Moscow and Moscow just happens to be located in the proud state of Texas.

The 200 residents of Moscow, Tex., are hopping mad at the Russians and, in this particular in-

stance, their wrath has nothing to do with the more pressing problems of the cold war.

The Texas Muscovites contend that the capital of the Soviet Union is a flagrant insult to their 100 per cent American town. Like most angry Texans, they want something done about it.

Postmaster W. C. Fancher said Wednesday that Moscow (Tex.) intends to submit a petition to the United Nations urging the Soviets to change the name of Moscow (U.S.S.R.).

The Texas community points out it has had its name since 1853, long before Moscow was the capital of the Soviet Union. In fact, long before there was any Soviet Union.

Moscow, Tex., claimed the slightly indignant postmaster, was named for "Moscow, Tennessee, of course."

This raises a question that will surely intrigue devotees of the chicken-or-the-egg riddle. Namely which Moscow came first?

Moscow, Tex., may very well

have been named for Moscow, Tenn., but what, if anything, was the Tennessee town named for?

Mrs. Cleotia G. Morton, the mayor of Moscow, Tenn., claims that her community's name stems "between two rivers" and "the Indians were here a lot longer than the Russians were over there."

There are no less than 11 Moscovs in the United States and nearly all of them are small, remote villages or hamlets with less than 1,000 inhabitants. Most of the American Moscovs are steeped in tradition and date back to frontier days.

Mayor Henry Cusard Jr. of Moscow, Ohio, contends that his village, founded around 1840, got its name when a young boy was sent out to look for his "ma's cow." Cusard said the two words ran together during the search until they became one and the same name.

So that takes care of that. Now what about Vladivostok?

### Rayburn Reported 'Satisfactory'

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—Hospital officials said today House Speaker Sam Rayburn was in "satisfactory" condition, but it would take more tests to decide what was causing his back pains and whether to operate.

Rayburn, 70, underwent X-ray and blood tests at Baylor University medical center Tuesday. It was part of a series of tests expected to be completed Thursday.

The surgeon in charge of conducting the tests denied a printed report that Rayburn has a liver ailment and that a decision must be made immediately whether to operate.

"There is nothing to point toward the liver," the doctor said. "It has not been decided whether an operation is necessary, but we should know within the next 48 hours. It will take that long to arrive at a diagnosis and then, of course, after that treatment will be instituted."

### Post Office Part Of JFK Program

The new local postal facility is part of an accelerated \$200 million postal construction and modernization program ordered by the President himself, Postmaster General J. Edward Day reveals.

President Kennedy has ordered speedups of new post office construction which will mean an estimated 2,600 new postal buildings all over the Nation will be placed under contract this year, Mr. Day reported.

"We don't know precisely where all of them will be, but your local building is one of the first which will be dedicated and put to use this year," Mr. Day told this newspaper.

The President's post office program is not only well justified by economic needs—but is urgently required to meet expanding mail needs.

Local increases in mail volumes are part of a nationwide trend which will require thousands of new post office buildings in the years immediately ahead.

The Postmaster General noted. "For example, in 1960, the average person would get about one piece of mail a month," Mr. Day said. "Today, he gets an average of about one piece a day."

Experts estimate that in the next generation this country's staggering mail volume of 85 billion pieces annually will double, Mr. Day added.

### Show To Feature Luke Paintings

"Obviously," he commented, "we cannot expect to meet these future mail volumes with the outmoded postal plant of the past. We must begin to prepare more for the mail volumes of the future with planning now."

Acceleration of the postal construction program by the President not only is a boon to the economy, the Postmaster General pointed out, but is an essential part of the new programs of mail service improvement.

The new office is a link, Mr. Day points out, in a system which places at the disposal of the American people some 35,000 post offices, the services of 560,000 postal employees, 32,000 rural carriers, tens of thousands of vehicles, and billions of dollars in facilities and equipment.

"A new post office is an essential part of this great system," Mr. Day explained. "Each new facility provides better means of moving the mails, better working conditions for our employees, and better service for a wide

community. It is easy to see how multiplying this new postal facility 2,000 times this year, all over the Nation—we are taking a great step in the revitalization of the postal service."

The President's postal program calls for telescoping more than 2,000 post offices, which had been scheduled for the next 18 months into the approximate 10 months between February 15 and December 31, 1961.

# 3 Sanford Fliers Die In Lake George Crash

## Grand Jury Asked To Probe County Offices

### Bulletin

The pilot killed in the plane crash was identified as Lt. D. B. F. Brown.

A Sanford Naval Air Station based multi-jet attack bomber crashed this morning in Lake George killing all three crew members.

The dead were identified as Lt. (jg) Tom Behrman, bomber navigator of Woodland Dr., Sanford, and Richard Hennessey, AQ8, of 1718 W. First St.

The name of the pilot is being held pending notification of the next of kin.

The Naval Air Station in Jacksonville reported that the jet was on a routine training mission from the Sanford Naval Air Station where it was attached to Heavy Attack Squadron 11.

A Navy spokesman said the plane crashed about 8:30 a. m.

He added that the cause of the crash was not immediately known.

Russell Switzer of Switzer's Fish Camp on Lake George said he heard the plane come in low and drop a bomb on the naval bombing range in the Ocala National Forest.

"Then I heard an explosion which sounded like a plane breaking the sound barrier," he said. "I looked across the water and saw flames about 50 feet high and about 200 feet across. There was a lot of smoke. The plane burned for about five minutes and sank."

Switzer said he saw no sign of life after the crash.

### Show Of Strength Asked Of West

BERLIN (UPI) — West Berlin officials today called for a show of strength by the Western Allies in this divided city where a series of shooting and grenade incidents has heightened tension on the border.

U. S. troops were on the alert for any new Communist moves and an Army spokesman said American troops were ready for anything. But he refused to say exactly what the orders are because of security regulations.

Circles close to West German police said the feeling was growing that the Allies should put on a greater show of strength along the Berlin sector borders.

Allied border patrols recently have been largely on foot. At the height of the crisis following the Aug. 13 sealing off of East Berlin, U. S. tanks crouched with their treads virtually touching the border line and blast-muzzled gun snouts aimed straight at East Berlin soldiers.

But since the tanks have left the border area, the Communists have been getting more aggressive. Three gunfire and six Communist gas and smoke grenade incidents flared on the East-West sector border Wednesday.

### 13-Year-Old Admits Slaying

ELMHURST, Ill. (UPI) — A freckle-faced 13-year-old boy tearfully admitted Thursday night he raped and killed little Yvonne Elliott, 7, in a swamp near this Chicago suburb.

Steven Schlenger, a blond, 115-pound seventh grader, confessed to Du Page County sheriff's deputies after two hours of questioning. The boy repeated his admissions in front of his mother, Mrs. Helen June Pivonka, and stepfather, Edward Pivonka, but declined to sign the 20-page statement.

## Funds For Canal Survey Asked

An appropriation for an engineering study of the proposed Sanford-Canaveral Canal, to determine the most practical alignment, will be sought from the Florida State Cabinet, a group meeting at Orlando decided Thursday.

Attending the meeting were members of the Florida State Canal Authority, consulting engineers and officials of the St. Johns-Indian River Improvement Association. John Krieger, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, represented the Seminole and Sanford interests.

In their discussion of ways and means of insuring early construction of the canal the groups decided that an appropriation for the study would be the first step. Then the proposal could be presented to the State Board of Conservation for approval, Krieger said.

Following the Board's approval the way would then be open to obtain rights of way and the raising of money for actual construction.

Thursday's meeting is the second in as many months. An earlier meeting in Orlando last month formulated plans to go before the Conservation Board with the proposal. The Board, meeting later in Jacksonville, heard a request from W. A. McCree, chairman of the Florida Canal Authority, for a feasibility study of the project.

When completed the Sanford-Canaveral Canal would become an integral part of the Florida Canal system. Krieger said. This includes the proposed Cross-Florida Barge Canal which would start at Jacksonville, utilizing the St. Johns River, and extend across the State to the Gulf of Mexico at a point near Yankeetown.

## For Lake Mary: Industry Or Homes?

Lake Mary residents attending the Chamber of Commerce meeting Thursday night were told that the area's future depends entirely upon its people. Frank Evans, principal developer of the community, pointing out the importance of growth in the area during the past few years, said, "We must decide whether we want a manufacturing section in Lake Mary or whether we want to keep it primarily a residential area."

"A corporation already has applied for a franchise to furnish Lake Mary with water and sewerage which brings a great opportunity to the community for which it will come lower insurance rates and higher property value," he added.

"We need organization here now more than ever," he stressed, "for this is only a beginning." He urged that every member assume the responsibility of bringing another resident with him to the next meeting.

The Rev. William Trainor of the Church of the Nativity pointed out that Lake Mary also should keep in mind the fact that any community needs industry to support its economy. Also, adding to the progress report, he advised that his church expects to break ground for its new building by the first of November.

### Syrian Premier Blasts Nasser

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) — Syrian Premier Jamouh Al-Kuzbari today repeated charges that President Gamel Abdel Nasser had suppressed freedom and drained the economy during the 3½-year union with Egypt.

Al-Kuzbari's remarks were made in a broadcast titled as an official response to Nasser's speech from Cairo Thursday night in which he said he would not oppose Syria's admission to the United Nations or the Arab League.

Al-Kuzbari said that Nasser had abandoned his diplomatic blockade of Syria because of "adverse consequences" to the United Arab Republic. The UAR "could not keep breaking off relations with every country that recognized the Syrian republic," he said.

### 3 Laos Prices Fail To Agree

BAN HIN HEUP, Laos (UPI) — The three rival prices of Laos met for 4½ hours today but failed to agree how to pick a premier for a proposed coalition government, reviving dangers of a resumption of the civil war.

Prince Boun Oun, present government, "neutralist" Prince Souvanna Phouma and "Red" Prince Souphanouvong, leader of the Communist-backed Pathet Lao agreed to try again Saturday to resolve their differences.

Following considerable discussion on available methods to enforce some form of dog control, the board decided to meet in a special discussion session in order to consider all angles of the problem before authorizing the attorney to draft an ordinance resolution.

GENEVA (UPI) — The International Red Cross has issued a "reminder" to the United Nations command in the Congo that UN troops in Katanga must respect the Geneva conventions on the treatment of prisoners, a Red Cross spokesman said today.

### Rayburn Dying Of Cancer

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — House Speaker Sam Rayburn, 79, is dying of cancer and hospital sources said today the only thing left is to try to make his last days "as comfortable as possible."

President Kennedy urged the nation to offer its prayers with him for the veteran speaker, known as "Mr. Democrat" to millions, who dedicated his life to serving and guiding the federal government.

Surgeons at Baylor University Medical Center removed a lymph gland from Rayburn's groin Thursday and discovered the malignancy.

Officially, the hospital declined to state that death is imminent. But the hopelessness of the case was indicated in the final five words of the latest medical bulletin.

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## Longwood Garbage Franchise Raises A Stink

Requests for some form of control over stray dogs and protests over a garbage collection franchise agreement were the main issues brought before the Longwood City Council meeting Thursday night.

Owners of Logue Garbage Service appeared to protect the agreement giving ABC Garbage Service of Sanford a two-year franchise in the city. Joining in protest was Councilman E. E. Williamson, who sat with the board at its September meeting when the agreement was discussed and agreed upon without opposition.

Logue told the board he felt he wasn't given a "fair chance in the deal and that by granting such a franchise you are forgetting all about free enterprise on a competitive basis."

Major Al Lormann reminded Logue that he had been contacted, as was L and W Service, also operating in the town, and all three companies were given equal opportunity to seek the franchise which was granted on basis of replies received at that time by the council.

"This agreement with ABC was discussed at an open meeting last month and was agreed upon by the board. All it needed for approval at the last meeting was ABC's signature and we decided that we would approve it at this meeting. I see no reason to change now."

A roll-call vote approved the agreement, with the exception of Williamson, and Logue was given until the first of November to notify his customers of the change in service.

However, to clarify the issue, Chairman R. C. Carlson made it clear that there would be no change in the trash pick-up service by the city and that by approving operation under a franchise, the city sought only to give its people more protection and to bring a little income in through

the 10 percent rebate from ABC. The dog question came from Mrs. Roy Burke of North Orlando and Mrs. Kapul Pfloum of Longwood, representing the Longwood Elementary P-T-O, who asked that something be done about the large numbers of stray dogs roaming around the school grounds and through that area.

From Rome

If I were asked what I missed most when living in Europe I believe I'd answer American doctors. Not that I'm ailing. Chicken pox was the last major disease I had, and that was back when a telephone call was a nickel, a shoe shine the same, and a fellow got his exercise by climbing in and out of rumble seats.

In my ten months in Europe I had occasion to call a doctor only once, but that one time was sufficient to make me realize that it's awfully tough for an American to trust a doctor who doesn't speak English, look his training in some book, and blumps checks in an entirely different manner than an American is accustomed to.

This doctor I called in (an Italian) looked like a doctor. Almost too much so. I suspected right off that he was an actor playing a doctor in his time off. He had a goatee, wore a sort of morning coat, and carried a handsome black valise or satchel.

My ailment was a heavy, heavy cold that kept getting worse, but he acted as if a cold was the last thing I had. He examined me in places where a cold never reaches, sang little snatches of arias as he looked and peered, and then wrote out a prescription that I didn't trust.

Why didn't I trust it, largely because I am an American, and most Americans trust only what is made in America, and this drug turned out to have been made in a little town in northern Italy that I had never heard of. I didn't take it. Actually, I didn't even buy it. One look at the label and I said,

"Thank you, no" to the pharmacist (a lady, by the way), and decided to let the cold cure itself.

I wish I wasn't this way about America and felt that other countries had just as good men as we do, and just as good machines and products. But I don't. I like to fly on airplanes that were built in the U. S., are flown by American men, and serviced by Americans.

I distrust beans canned in Europe, look down on the tuna fish (canned), and am suspicious even of foreign shoes, shirts, shorts, and gasoline.

I sort of hope that I get to feeling a little bit ill, now that I am back home. It will be good to see an American doctor, and talk baseball and football before he looks at me, and draw reassurance from his diploma on the wall, and the familiar fittings of his office, including back numbers of magazines I can read.

I feel the same way about foreign dentists, too. What do they know about filling a tooth, or pulling one? My last visit to one was in Paris and, before I go to him again, I'll jump off the Eiffel Tower to ease the pain. You won't believe it, but he didn't have a syringe handy to give me a shot of Novocain, so he asked me to run down to the corner drugget apd get one.

I was glad to oblige—only I kept right on past the drugstore and kept running. I hope he isn't still standing by the chair waiting on me.

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — Any way it is figured, the Kennedy administration cannot claim the overwhelming successes it expected in the session of Congress just ended. And the outlook for the second session of the 87th Congress in 1962, which is an election year, is considered no better.

What the administration is up against is the combination of Republicans and conservative Democrats who have the real majority in both Senate and House. They made the record. And these same majorities will still be in control next year.

Arguments on the why and wherefore of this record—good or bad, as you choose—will now be carried on in home districts as congressmen mend political fences before returning to Washington.

But it wasn't just politics that killed so many of the administration's New Frontiers programs. Congressmen are always turned in on home. The right-wing coalition still senses that there is strong opposition to turning the country

over whole-hog to ultra liberal reforms. Kennedy still has a big selling job to do, to convince a larger majority of the American people on the rightness of his policies before he can expect better results from Congress in the last two years of his administration. This is what the 1962 Congressional election campaign will be all about.

For the session just closed, the administration claims 90-odd major accomplishments. Some of them weren't so major and many didn't provide all the administration asked for.

Congress was not generally hostile to giving the administration money for its new programs. While the requests were cut about \$2 billion, the total appropriated is over \$46 billion, or \$12 billion more than last year.

Some of this is for future expenditures. The amount to be spent in the fiscal year ending next June 30 is estimated at \$28 billion, which will mean a \$6 billion deficit.

National defense was rated by Congress \$800 million over the \$6 billion increase asked by Kennedy, to make a \$47.8 billion total. The larger cuts: \$307 million less for foreign aid, \$150 million less for Labor Department programs and \$120 million less for agriculture.

Major measures defeated include federal aid for education, health insurance for the aged, omnibus farm legislation, tax reform, postal rate increases, manpower retraining, revision of conflict of interest laws for federal employees.

Creation of a new Department of Urban Affairs and a Youth Conservation Corps were turned down. Reorganization of Securities and Exchange Commission, Federal Communications Commission and National Labor Relations Board was disapproved by Congress.

Next year, the President is expected to repeat most of the requests which Congress did not act on.

There will also be renewal of the reciprocal trade agreements and tariff policy to consider. Another hot subject is likely to be formulation of broad new transportation policies. General tax reform, postponed this year, will probably be the most controversial item on the calendar.

Everything that may happen in Congress is of course dependent on developments abroad. A shooting war in Germany, Southeast Asia, the Near East, Africa or even Latin American could bring Congress back into special session. That could knock out all programs for development of the American economy and result in tight controls.

## Fatalistic Attitude Among Some West Germans Over Berlin Noted

BERLIN—Among the West German people one finds an occasional curious and disturbing reaction to today's world crisis.

It is a reaction of lassitude amounting almost to disinterest, or a fatalism which is just as bad, not only toward world problems but toward the problems as it affects their own country as well.

This is not to say that such an attitude represents majority German viewpoint or even a large percentage. But on a trip ranging from Bonn in the Rhineland, through the busy port and industrial city of Hamburg and finally to Berlin it occurs frequently enough to be worthy of note.

The German who takes the fatalistic attitude does so on two counts.

First, if there is a war, he will be the first to be hit.

Second, if there is a compromise it will be at his expense and the whole of Germany will be opened up to Russian conquest.

In any event, there is nothing he can do about either. The lassitude also comes in two counts.

In the younger people it finds its expression in doubts about Germany's future despite its present great prosperity.

"Perhaps," said one young man in Bonn, "We made too much money too fast. I think we have lost our spiritual values."

These were values which he found hard to define but the mere expression was a symbol of his disquiet.

The feeling also comes from the fact that, after losing two world wars, the German no longer feels master of his own destiny.

The decision about his defense will be made not by him but by a combination of the NATO powers. Therefore, he might as well sit back and wait.

Along with this is a certain amount of continuous soul-searching.

Said a prominent Socialist politician:

"The German people know that after Hitler they must cleanse their souls."

A housewife in Hamburg put it more simply in a question:

"What do the Americans think of us Germans? Not much, I guess."

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## Fay Henle's Your Pocketbook

Q—What is the tax advantage of leaving money in trust as opposed to leaving an outright bequest?—A. C.

A—Dear A. C.: The tax advantages in a trust occur when the funds are paid to a second or third generation. The tax to the estate of the testator will be the same but there will be no tax at the termination of the trust when the funds are paid out. If on the other hand, the funds are left outright, there will not only be the tax in the testator's estate but there will also be a tax in the estate of the one who receives the original bequest. However, before you worry about estate taxes, you might check to see whether your estate will be taxable under the federal inheritance tax laws and explore alternate methods of

reducing the tax load should there be any.

Q—The policy dividends I receive on my life insurance are now running to almost \$300 a year. Is this taxable income or tax-free?—B. M.

A—Dear B. M.: These policy dividends are tax-free. Lucky you! Actually what you are getting is a return of part of the premiums you have pledged to pay but which the insurance company doesn't need. They're not dividends in the usual sense.

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# Sanford Library Plans New Service Nov. 1

An automatic charging machine will be installed in the Sanford Public Library beginning Nov. 1, Mrs. Sara M. King, Librarian, said.

Cards will be issued to children from first through eighth grades and are to be kept in library books.

Wallet sized cards will be given to high school students and adults.

Anyone who wishes to take out books must have his or her card. These cards will have raised numbers, like a credit card, and will be placed in the charging machine with the book card. Your number will be automatically stamped on the card. Therefore you must have your card with you in order to check a book out of the library.

Beginning Nov. 1, the library will re-register every one. If you have recently made out an application and have not changed your address, name, or line of work, you need not make out a new application. Your new library card with a new number will be given to you at that time.

If non-resident members, (those who live outside the city limits) want their children to have cards in addition to the family card, they may pay an extra 25 cents per child per card. This will allow each

child to borrow the books on his or her card.

With the installation of the new system, the dating will be changed from date of issue to date due, with the exception of the rental books.

Library circulation has grown

from 42,000 to 64,000 in the last 10 years, and Mrs. King feels this will make book charging faster and more efficient, as there is no danger of wrong numbers being put on book cards. Your number will be automatically stamped on each book card.

## New Directive Keeps Military Out Of Politics

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department has issued a new directive aimed at keeping military representatives out of politically controversial meetings. Under the directive, representatives of the armed services attending privately-sponsored meetings are limited to expressing views that are "non-partisan and in accordance with established national policy."

Furthermore, it says that the participation must not "lead an air of sponsorship to the statements of others which may be either partisan or contrary to established national policy."

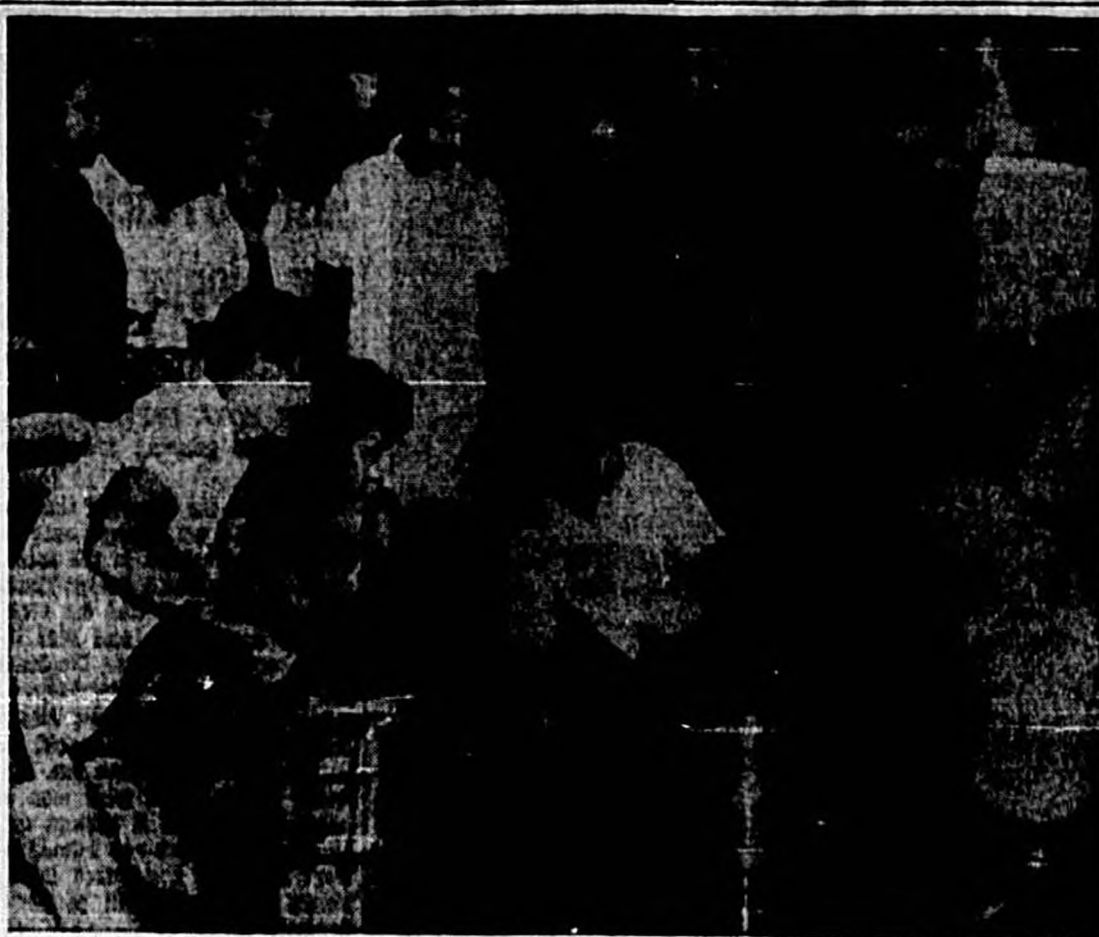
Less than two weeks ago 4th Army headquarters at San Antonio, Tex., supported a seminar at which retired Gen. A. C. Wedemeyer lambasted the Kennedy administration for "appeasing" Russia.

Wedemeyer also had high praise for the controversial John Birch Society, although he said he is not a member of the organization and has agreed only to serve as one of its advisors. The department pointed out that the San Antonio decision was

made by the local command without support from Washington, and said such decisions will continue to be made locally.

The new directive, signed last Thursday by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara is to be used as "criteria to assist local commanders in making such determinations." One of the criteria limits military support to programs "known to be non-partisan in character" and to situations where "there is no reason to believe the views expressed by the participants will be contrary to established national policy."

The directive left unchanged a previous ruling which permits military leaders to express personal opinions freely before committees of Congress.

## New Income Tax Look

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government today introduced a "new look" to the income tax return normally used by about two-thirds of the nation's 61 million taxpayers.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Mortimer Caplin scheduled a news conference today to unveil the new version of Form 1040—the so-called "long form"—and answer questions about it.

The most striking change is in size. The four-page 1040 form in use previously has been reduced

to two pages, as a convenience to the taxpayers.

Internal Revenue officials said many users of the form didn't need pages three and four, which provided space for reporting income other than wages, salaries and capital gains.

Lesser changes have been made in the format of the 1040 return and its instructions. The revenue service said the changes were intended to simplify the taxpayer's task.

Unchanged is Form 1040A—the "short" form used by about 20 million taxpayers. This return, slightly larger than a bank check, still may be used by persons with less than \$10,000 of income including no more than \$200 in dividends, interest, and wages on which taxes were not withheld.

Jay doled out only four hits to the Yankees and struck out six batters—including home run king Roger Maris twice with men on bases. He missed a shutout only because of a two-run homer by Yogi Berra in the fourth inning, Yogi's 12th home run in Series competition.

But even Jay's brilliant hurling will be overshadowed when historians look back on this game by the spectacle of sloppy fielding by the usually flawless Yankees.

Glove artist Clete Boyer muffed a grounder at third; Berra, playing left field, committed a three-base error; relief ace Luis Arroyo made a two-base wild throw; and worst of all, catcher Elston Howard looked elsewhere as Cincinnati's Elio Chacon scored on a passed ball.

With a day off for travel, both teams were scheduled to take light workouts in Crosley Field today. It will mark the first time there for virtually all the Yankees and they have been looking forward to it because they feel their faded power is certain to give them the edge.

The foul lines at Crosley Field measure 366 and 328 feet in right and left, respectively, but dead center is only 387 feet. This means that the "power zones"—right center and left center—are relatively easy home run targets.

To combat the Yankee long ball power—which may or may not be augmented by the return of Mickey Mantle—Manager Fred Hutchinson will send sinker-and-knuckle-ball pitcher Bob Purkey to the mound.

# Campbell Indicted In Knife Slaying Of Wife

## Grand Jury Reconvenes Thursday

The Seminole County grand jury late Friday indicted James M. Campbell for second degree murder in the death of his wife on Aug. 2, State's Attorney Arthur Steed reported today.

Steed reported also that the eight member jury will reconvene Thursday afternoon at 1:30 p. m. Steed declined to comment on what the grand jury would consider when it reconvenes.

Friday, Circuit Judge Volle Williams charged the jury with investigating all county officials, institutions and offices.

In addressing the jury, Judge Williams asked it to look into "charges and counter-charges of public officials and to investigate them if it is warranted."

Williams also said that the jury has the right to recommend the suspension of any public official or employe found incompetent or "lax" in his job.

Jury members were conducted on a tour of the new jail facility and, according to deputies, were "pleased in what they saw."

The indictment against Campbell came after jurors pondered his fate for close to seven hours. He is expected to come up for trial during the fall session of Circuit Court early next month.

On Aug. 2, Campbell waived preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty on charges of stabbing his wife, Betty Anne, to death in Sunland Estates.

Eyewitnesses said that Campbell plunged an eight inch knife into the heart of his wife.

In indicting Campbell, the jury found that the slaying was "without premeditation."

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## Vopos Set Trap For Youths

BERLIN (UPI)—Witnesses told police today that Communist East German border guards penetrated 25 yards into West Berlin Sunday night, seized two West German teenagers and dragged them across the border into East Berlin. The two may have been wounded.

The kidnaping was reported by two companions of the teen-agers. Police said the four were lured to the border by a mock escape

by East German police (vopos). Two vopos told the four youths Saturday they wanted to take refuge in the West and then made an appointment to meet the youths Sunday night at the Rudow area of the border.

When the four arrived, police were told, at least 15 vopos started firing with machine pistols. The two who escaped said their companions cried out as if they had been shot and the vopos

crossed the border and dragged them into East Berlin.

Four other West Berliners, who had crossed the border Saturday night, were seized by the Communists trying to claw their way back through the barbed wire barrier Sunday night with their four East Berlin girl friends.

Again the Communists opened fire, but it was not known whether any were hit.

The incidents drew an angry

warning from West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt today that he will take action to "stop West Berliners being shot."

Brandt, just returned from a two-day trip to the United States, said, "We are not going to be intimidated by Communist threats along the border."

Communist troops were reported on the move in East Germany, apparently in connection with Warsaw Pact maneuvers linked to the Berlin crisis.

## Reds Plan World Rule, Smathers Says

Senator George A. Smathers, Democratic senator from Florida, speaking at the state convention of the Federation of Democratic Women's Clubs of Florida in Clearwater, sounded grim warnings on the world situation and on affairs at home and in the state. He spoke before 500 persons at a banquet Friday in the Jack Tar Harrison Hotel.

"Khrushchev is cocky and overconfident," said Smathers. "Up until now he had been able to move anywhere with little opposition. At the end of World War II the Communists controlled one country and seven per cent of the world's population. Now they control 14 countries and 44 per cent of the world's population."

"We have to stop them. We must show them power, for that is all they understand. We have to have power to negotiate. In the free world, unless confidence in us, we will have to stand alone . . . fortify America . . . and we could not long endure."

"Out of these decisions came the Nova project. It has become clear that who ever controls out-

er space controls the world.

"Florida is proud that it has been chosen for the site of the Nova project. The \$885 million that will be spent in this area in the next ten years will bring tremendous problems along with tremendous economic boom."

Senator Smathers assured his audience that the executive branch of the government is in strong, capable, competent hands.

"In my 16 years in Congress, I have personally known four presidents," said Smathers. "And if there ever was a great president it is John F. Kennedy."

"Never has there been one man come into office who had such terrible problems on his shoulders."

Smathers defended the budget increases recommended by the

Administration as being essential to meet Soviet threats in outer space and in the necessity "to be prepared to fight less-than-nuclear war in Berlin, Cuba, Europe, Asia or anywhere we have to fight."

"We will be called a war party," Smathers stated, "but we are going to stop the Soviets right where they are. Berlin is a symbol . . . an island of freedom in a world of communism."

Smathers deplored the bipartisan attacks coming at this time on the Administration and asserted, "we must have united support of the President during this critical period in world affairs."

Turning to state affairs, Smathers warned the Democratic women that Republican strength

is growing in the state, and that Democratic office-seekers and office-holders can expect to find themselves faced with Republican opposition at every turn.

"You have a tremendous challenge to get to work and get Democrats registered and get them out to vote."

"We men depend on the women to do most of the work. Without your help, we could not get elected. There are 56 million women registered to vote today as against 31 million men. You have the power, it's up to you to use it to see that good men are put in office."

Smathers was introduced by the State Treasurer Edwin Larsen, and Larsen had been introduced by Secretary of State Tom Adams.

Larsen said that Mrs. Christine Maxwell, state president of the Democratic Women is known in Tallahassee as "Mrs. Democrat" and commented that the State Treasurer's office is very proud of her loyalty and effort. Mrs. Maxwell is Larsen's secretary.
