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\$15 million development approved

SANFORD — As construction crews continue to install seswall panels for Sanford's Riverwalk, city planners approved site plans for what is expected to be the next major development along Lake Monroe.

Members of the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission unanimously approved site plans for Gateway at Riverwalk, a \$12- to \$15-million mixed use development condominiums priced as



The development, to be located immedietely west of Sanford City abutting

Seminole Boulevard, will feature two sixstory buildings connected by an archway over North Myrtle Street. The first floor of


both buildings will house retail facilities for shops and restaurants. A combined total of 36 residential units, priced from \$249,000 to \$1 million, will occupy the second through sixth floors of the two build-

Work on the project could begin as soon as July and could be ready for occupancy about six months after the Riverwalk is completed in February 2004.

"We hope to be in the ground by July or August," said Bob Horian, president of

Next Saturday marks opening of museum's new building

ext Saturday marks the grand opening of the Museum of Seminole County History's new building.

A ribbon cutting ceremony will be held in front of the **Agricultural Exhibit** Building, which is located behind the museum's original building on Bush Boulevard. The event marks a pinnacle in a major renovation and construction process that began in 1998 when the county was celebrating its 85th birthday.

"It started with the fixing of the front porch, and from there it just started to multiply," said Karen Jacobs, museum specialist. "A lot of people have worked together to make this possible, and the building is just wonder-

The entire project, which cost around \$850,000, consisted of the renovation of the museum's original building, the construction of the new agricultural exhibit and massive landscaping addi-

tions to the site. Funding was acquired through a \$250,000 state grant, which was matched by the county, an additional \$250,000 from the county, and in-kind and donated services from numerous businesses, private organizations and citi-

The new building houses all of the museum's agricultural exhibits highlighting

the industries that helped build Seminole County, including celery, citrus, turpentine, cattle, ferns and commercial fishing. It also has a climate-controlled room, which contains old photographs and documents. "We've also thrown in an

exhibit of early sewing machines for good measure,"

Oviedo residences showered with stray bullets from AK-47

OVIEDO - Seminole County sheriff's deputies continue to sort through the details of a shooting incident involving two men with AK-47 assault rifles in Oviedo.

The shootings occurred at pproximately 1:30 p.m. approximately 1:30 p.m. Thursday in the Winn-Dixle parking lot near the intersection of Dean Road and Aloma Avenue and continued briefly as the vehicles headed out the back parking lot toward Dran Road.

According to witnesses, the driver of a white, Cadillac Escalade shot at the driver of a red, Chevy Camaro.

Less than an hour after the shooting, the Escalade, driven by 20-year-old Sierra Francesca Holland, passed the crime scene.

Deputies initiated a traffic stop and discovered two bullet casings, similar to those found in the Winn-Dixie parking lot, in the

According to police reports, Holland informed deputies that the driver of the Escalade at the time of the shootings was 19-year-old Demetric Johannan King.

King's testimony differs from that of the witnesses. According to him, the driver of the Camaro, known as D Boy, was fighting with him over Holland, his girlfriend. King alleges that D Boy stole his AK-47 from his apartment and when he attempted to chase D Boy in his vehicle, D Boy shot at him with the stolen AK-47,



National Safe Boating Week begins Saturday

In celebration of the nearly 1 million boaters in Florida, Seminole County will participate in National Safe Boating Week, which begins Saturday.

The event was established by the National Safe Boating Council as a way to decrease boating accidents and fatalities throughout North American waters.

The national observance is a collaboration effort between several organizations within the National Safe Boating Council, including the National Power Monroe Harbor in downtown Squadron, the Coast Guard Auxiliary, the Army Corps of Engineers, the American Red Cross

and the State Boating Administrators. In Seminole County, members of the Seminole Power Squadron will man the boat

ramps located on U.S. Highway 17-92 at the Seminole and Volusia county line on Saturday and Sunday. The Coast Guard Auxiliary will also be on hand Saturday and Sunday at Lake

Sanford. Both groups will pass out literature on safe boating and conduct free vessel checks.

"There are resources available through us and other organizations," said Bob Flint. District 23 Commander of U.S. Power Squadrons, "An

Suncor Properties Inc., the Lake Mary-based company building the project. "It will take about a year to build the tall building."

In addition to the six-story buildings, Gateway Riverwalk would feature 64 townhome type residential structures ranging from three to five bedrooms, each with a one- or two-car garage. Preliminary pricing for the townhomes is expected to be between \$149,000 and \$249,000.

About 30 of the townhomes would be housed in four separate three-story buildings. The buildings would be arranged in "brownstone" type layout along Myrtle Street with retail

space on the first floor.
"Because of the retail space, you can't really call this type of housing a townhome," Horian said. "This is a different type of residential construction than anything in Senford."

The remaining townhomes would be built in six-unit

buildings on the 6.8 acre site. The site plan also calls for office space along Fulton Street and a 4.700-foot retail facility along Seminole Boulevard in front of City Hall.

This will be a nice development not only for the residents who live there, but everyone in Sanford," Horian said.

While the six-story condominium structure will be built all at one time, Horian said the townhomes would be built six units at a time as Suncor receives commitments from

This is a tried and true type of construction that has worked well in other areas," Horian said. "We think it will work in Sanford."

Statistics provided by the city indicated the development will generate 48 additional students in the local school system: 25 elementary school students, 11 middle school student and 12 high school students.

provide \$1 million worth of improvements for stormwater drainage along Lake Monroe. Currently, a 36-inch drainage pipe is located under Myrtle Street.

Victory Deliverance Center. The organization had set up a tarp along Celery Avenue, and members were making and selling fish dinners for the public.

Although the saltwater fish were originally purchased from a legal vendor, Gramlin did not have a retailer's license to resell the fish, Gier said. Other church members donated the freshwater fish to the fund-raiser.

They didn't research every-

thing they needed to do before holding the fund-raiser," Gler said. "They didn't have a license to resell the fish."

Gramlin was issued citations at the scene and was not taken into custody. She faces a maximum fine of \$500 for each charge, as well as up to six months in jail. It was her first offense, however, and she will probably not face the maximum penalties, Gier said.

Selling less than 30 fresh and

salt water fish may not seem like a major concern for some people, but left unchecked, it could take a serious toll on the state's fish populations, Gier said. Fresh water game is especially susceptible to illegal fishing and commercialization.

"The freshwater game fish population in the state won't tolerate commercialization." Gier said. "If the laws were not in place, there would be a heavy tell to our fish population."

Museum visitors will also have the opportunity to see an old buggy that belonged to the Longwood Hotel. It's the first time in decades the antique vehicle has been on public display.


"It's been in storage forever," Jacobs said. "I'm just glad we can finally take it out and put it in the museum."

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

Continued from Page 1 importance of wearing life jackets. It's recommended that all boaters wear life jackets at all times.

"Primarily the safest thing to do is wear your life jacket no matter if you're just sitting on the boat or running down the river at 50 mph on a bass boat," said Flint. "It's necessary because you never know when you will be thrown in the water."

Children 12 years old and younger are required by law to wear a life jacket. Canoers, kayakers, hunters and fisherman are at a higher risk of falling overboard and therefore it's recommended, but not required, that they wear a vest.

"There are life jackets now that are comfortable, not like the old pieces of foam you wrapped around your body," said Commander Jim Chamberlin of the Seminole Power Squadron.

According to the National Safe Boating Council, in 2001, 681 fatalities were reported in the United States. Of those, 532 of the victims were not wearing life jackets.

"Think of how many people we

could save," said Chamberlin. "Boaters need to wear their life jackets. It is not good enough just to have them on the boat. If they are down below, these is no way to get to them if an accident occurs."

Safe Boating Week also stresses the importance of a well-equipped and properly maintained boat, and points out the dangerous effects of carbon monoxide poisoning and drinking alcohol while operating a

According to Chamberlin, another aspect of the national event is to encourage enrollment in safe boating courses.

"Once people take the course, they have more of an idea of what type of boat they want and the safety items they need to purchase to place on the boat."

The next seven-week basic boating class will begin at 7:30 p.m. July 23. Online classes are also available. The class teaches future boaters seamanship, how to tie knots and dock boats, and how to read channel markers and charts. For more information on the class, contact Bill Vinson at 407-365-2932.

Election 2005: It's still early, but already there are musings about who the candidates will be in the March 2005 city election.

Mayor Bondy Lossard, still in his first term, will be up for re-election. So far, there's no word that Sanford's youngest mayor will run for reelection. Lessard was the driving force behind the strong mayor referendum that lost overinto votes against him if he runs for re-election is unclear, though I think residents have generally viewed Lessard's leadership favorably.

Bill Kirchhoff's name has been mention as a possible candidate for mayor. Kirchhoff is a longtime Sanford resident who served on the Seminole County Commission in the late 1970s. He's got plenty of name recognition and support from "Old Sanford," but his presidency of Sanford Main Street has been a bumpy ride to say the least.

Speaking of Old Sanford, Art Woodruff, curpently the District 1 city commissioner, may throw his hat into the ring. Woodruff is a sixthgeneration Sanford native. Early on in the strong mayor discussions, he was ambiguous when I asked him if that form of government would prevent him from running for mayor. That may mean something, and it may mean nothing. Chances are good that whatever his decision, it will be more logical than that ridiculous season finale of West Wing (Woodruff and I are fans).

Woodruff's commission seat is also on the ballot for that election. Two people, Gary Lowell and Milte Skat, have been mentioned as possible candidates for Woodruff's seat if he runs for mayor -- and maybe if he doesn't. Both serve on the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission, and both live in Mayfair.

That leaves Velma Williams' District 2 seat. Williams, the city's first black vice mayor, hasn't indicated whether she will run, but I suspect she will. Word Around The Clock is she will have a challenger. Some in the "No Boss Mayor" gang were upset with her support of the strong mayor form of government and have vowed to run her out of office.

Like I said, it's early still. You'd be advised to hold all bets until the post time is a little closer.

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

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

Caution and intelligence may save property and lives

We haven't seen it yet (as far as I know), but any day now, we're going to pick up The Seminole Herald and find there has been or is a forest fire destroying our property and possibly our homes, vehicles, possessions and busi-····· nesses.

This isn't the first time I've written about this, and if I'm still writing for the Herald a year from now, it won't be the last.

Forest fires are dangerous. Make no doubt about it, we're talking about hundreds, thousands, or even millions of dollars in damage not to mention the possibility •••• of one of those fires taking some-

one's (or some entire family's) lives. Fire officials will tell you the dangers and how forest or brush fires are often started. Most of the fires alongside a roadway are started by a carelessly tossed cigarette. You can easily identify these because the first areas where the grass is black is right next to the road. Another way they start is someone building a camp fire and letting it get out of control or leaving it to smolder without being on hand to extinguish it. Have you done that?



Oxford College's small campus nurtures diverse student body

Though the morning started with dark clouds and a few errant mindrops, the sun broke through just in time. When the

graduates stepped forward under a leafy canopy to get their diploman, the sun was bright and the grads were radi-

Their names were Wood and Patel. Bergmark and Al-Khalil, Chu, Chung and Cremhaw. The class of 2003 from tiny Oxford College, in Oxford, Ga., was among the most diverse I'd ever seen. Nearly 40 percent of the graduates, who were receiving associate degrees, represented ethnic minority

groups. Oxford is a marvel. It is the birthplace of the larger and more prestigious Emory University, which later moved to Atlanta. It is now a residential two-year college of about 600 students that serves as a feeder school for Emory. Though its students often start

with slightly lower SATs than Emory's freshman class, when they transfer to Emory, they do well

Not that Oxford's students are slouches. The average SAT score for last year's entering class was 1222, a respectable score for any college. It happens to be slightly below the average for Emory, where entering students tend to score between 1300 and

College administrators know the limits of an SAT score; yet popular culture has assigned the SAT a divine

ability to discern "merit" whether a given student deserves a seat at a prestigious college. In fact, SAT scores were never designed to be used as the exclusive standard for college admis-

Most college admissions officers believe that there is room to judge an applicant on leadership, volunteer activities, athletic ability, musical talent and, yes, race.

That's especially true if the student comes from an ethnic minority group that has historically suffered discrimination.

No matter their SAT accres, it is difficult to look at Oxford's graduating class and see anything but achievement - and the potential for more to come. About 85 to 90 percent of Oxford's grads usually go on to Emory - listed among the top 20 national universities in the last survey by U.S. News and World Report - and only about 1 percent drop out for academic reasons, according to Dean Dana Greene, Oxford's top administra-

The students at Oxford do every bit as well as those who start at Emory," said Emory President Bill Chace. "They tend to be quite well-represented in all forms of governance here. I think that's because they have been very well-supported and nur-

tured at a much smaller campus." Oxford has managed to achieve its enviable level of diversity without considering race in admissions. That's because it

admits nearly 80 percent of all applicants. (Affirmative action is only practiced at a small number of elife institutions that have more applicants then spaces.) Still, it has high-achieving students.

The college's secret seems to be just that — it isn't well-known. Nestled in a small town 45 minutes east of Atlanta, it has little in the way of collegiate sports, no fraternation or sororities, few occasions for drunken revelries. That makes it attractive to students serious about scholarship.

With such a small student body, young adults from diverse backgrounds are also likely to get to know each other well. The school is too small to shelter factions of blond valley girls or black-clad Goths or rap-star wannabes. Individuality is: encouraged, but cliques - black. white or Pakistani - are not.

For young adults who will like ly become civic leaders in a multicultural America, Oxford provides an ideal education.

"Getting your dog or cat groomed keeps them clean, healthy and happy," King added.


Grooming helps keep animals healthy, but the women of Pet Spa also make sure their customer's best friends are happy by making them look their best.



Lare approaching our retirement years and we have been very blessed financially. We own several large businesses and will have a sizable estate to pass on to our three children. How do you feel about leaving large amounts of money to the next generation, and is there a right and wrong way to do it?

on that subject may not be what you want to hear, but I can only tell you what I've observed and what I firmly believe. In a word, I'm convinced that it is very dangerous to give large

amounts of money to kids who haven't earned it. A sociological study published some time ago, called "Rich-Kids," validated the concerns I have observed. The authors of that study concluded that large trust funds are usually destructive to those who inherit them. The case studies they cited were convincing.

Human history also confirms the dangerous influence of money. Men and

women have lusted for it, killed for it, died for it and gone to hell for it. Money has come between the best of friends and brought down the proud and mighty. And, alas, it has torn millions of marriages limb from limb!

It's also been my observation that nothing will divide siblings more quickly than money. Giving them a large inheritance increases the probability of tension and

disharmony within a family Your sons and daughters will fight over control of your businesses and will resent those who are designated as decision makers. Some of them will lose their motivation to be responsible and will experiment with various addictive behaviors from gambling to alconotism.

There are exceptions to these negative consequences, of course, and

some people do handle wealth and power gracefully. But it is a difficult assignment at best and one that requires the greatest

ing that need for discipline and industry with a ready-made empire that can be mishandled or squandered?



for any parent.

I can't make that decision for others, of course. My obligation is simply to present the issue as I see it. And in my experience, the inheritance of wealth is threatening to family relationships, self-discipline, spiritual commitment and responsible living. It should be done only with great care, years of preparation and much prayer.

Three species of Curcuma named plants of the year

Curcuma is a genus of about 70 species of plants in the ginger family, mostly from Tropical

Asia. Many display very attractive foliage and flowers; others are economically important as source of spices, dyes, starch or used in traditional medicines.

The large, tropicallooking bright green leaves, sometimes with an attractive red or purple midrib area and the exotic flower spikes are the main ornamental features of this plant. The popularity of Curcuma is evident when the Florida Nurserymen and **Growers Association named** three species of Curcuma, plants of the year for 2002.

The Plant

Large oval, long stemmed leaves are borne from underground stems or rhizomes, like

ginger. The inflorescences are club-shaped structures with spirally arranged bracts. The

> lower two thirds of the bracts are green, often tinged with red or purple, are fertile and bear the flowers.

The upper third of the bracts are sterile and brightly colored in shades of white to pink and purple. The flowers, barely visible, are borne in the axils of the enclosing bracts.

Culbur

Plant rhizomes 2 to 3 inches deep in a well-drained soil in early spring. Enrich soil with organic materials such as compost, manure or peat. Locate plant in a partially shaded area, preferably on the east side of the garden. Plant should be watered frequently to keep soil moisture high. Fertilize in the

spring and fall with a balanced garden fertilizer. The plant dies back and goes dormant in winter. When the plant is dormant water sparingly until new growth resumes in spring. When grown in containers it must be potted in well-drained soil of peat and loam mixed with small pieces of sandstone, charcoal or soft broken brick and coarse sand. The atmosphere must be humid. Division of rhizome is the easiest means of propagation. Some of the

cultured species are:
Glast Flume Ginger: Grows
7 to 8 feet tall, with a bright pink inflorescence in the spring as the foliage emerges to form large clumps. Bloom is long

lasting as cut flower. Hidden Ginger: Grows 4 to 5 feet tall, with maroon colored inflorescence with yellow flowers in the spring appearing before the foliage. Leaves have a purple midrib. Bloom can be

used as a long lasting cut flower.

Jewel of Thailand Ginger: Grows 3 feet tall, with one foot tall pink inflorescence with yellow flowers in the fall. Leaves are pleated.

Fride of Burma: Grows 2 to 3 feet high in 30-50% shade, with pure orange inflorescence changing to light orange-yellow inside. Delicate small flowers located between bracts are white with yellow throat. Leaves are bright green and broad, extending above the inflorescence. Good cut flower in tropical areas. Plant goes dormant in winter.

This plant is excellent as a ground cover for shaded areas. It adds a tropical look at your garden and can be used as a cut flower plant. The dried rhizome of some species is a source of turmeric, used as a

spice and dye. This spice is also called 'Indian saffron' thanks to its brilliant yellow color. Turmeric is the key spice in

Indian turmeric is used as food flavoring, an effective ingredient in medicines and cosmetics, and a natural yellow colorant.

Turmeric contains an oil that consists in part of curcumin, which on oxidation is changed into vanillin, the active principle in vanilla. Curcumin is the yellow pigment of turmeric. Curcumin has been used in both the traditional Indian and Chinese Medicine.
