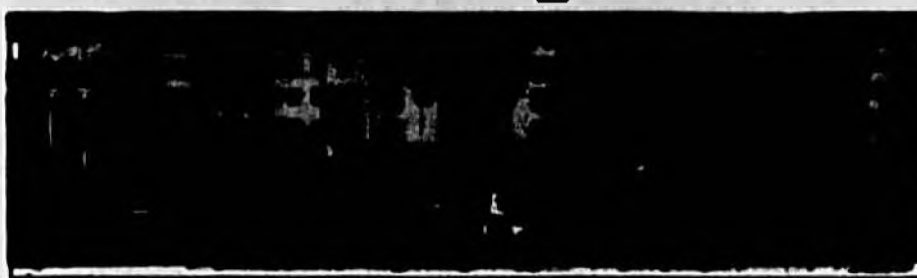

\$15 million development approved

SANFORD — As construction crews continue to install seawall panels for Sanford's Riverwalk, city planners approved site plans for what is expected to be the next major development along Lake Monroe.

Members of the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission unanimously approved site plans for Gateway at Riverwalk, a \$12- to \$15-million mixed use development condominiums priced as



High as \$1 million.

The development, to be located immediately west of Sanford City abutting

Seminole Boulevard, will feature two six-story buildings connected by an archway over North Myrtle Street. The first floor of

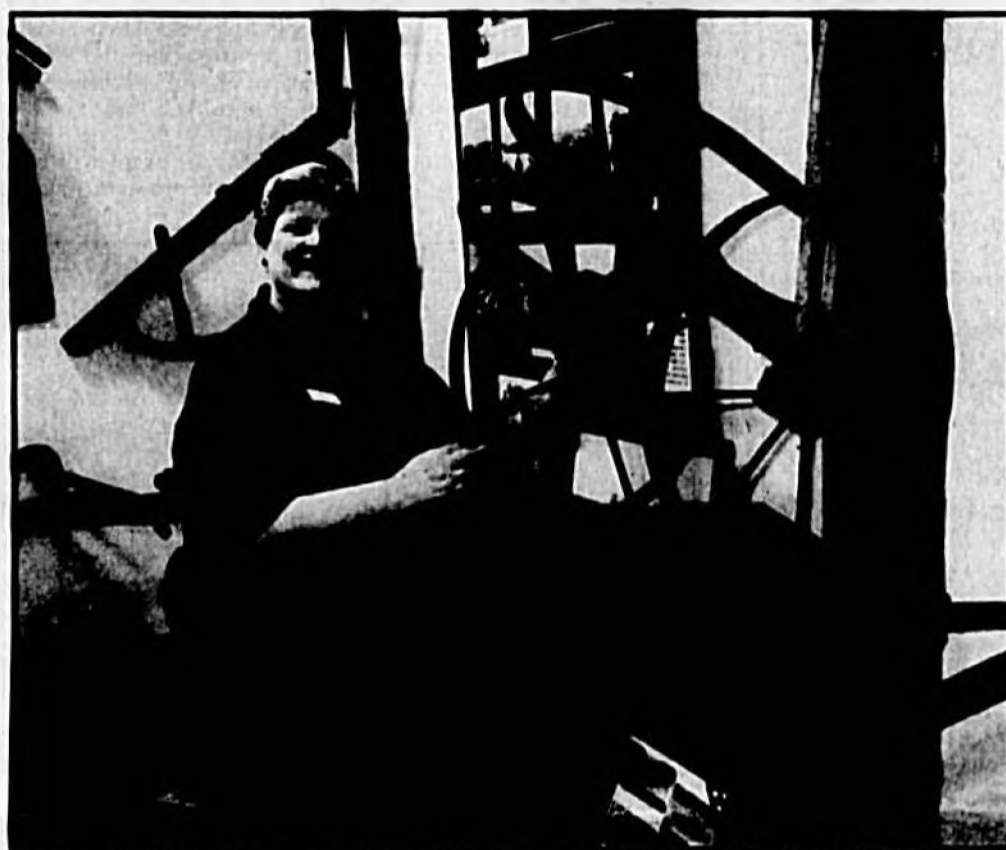
both buildings will house retail facilities for shops and restaurants. A combined total of 36 residential units, priced from \$249,000 to \$1 million, will occupy the second through sixth floors of the two buildings.

Work on the project could begin as soon as July and could be ready for occupancy about six months after the Riverwalk is completed in February 2004.

"We hope to be in the ground by July or August," said Bob Horian, president of

Next Saturday marks opening of museum's new building

Next Saturday marks the grand opening of the Museum of Seminole County History's new building.

A ribbon cutting ceremony will be held in front of the Agricultural Exhibit Building, which is located behind the museum's original building on Bush Boulevard. The event marks a pinnacle in a major renovation and construction process that began in 1998 when the county was celebrating its 85th birthday.

"It started with the fixing of the front porch, and from there it just started to multiply," said Karen Jacobs, museum specialist. "A lot of people have worked together to make this possible, and the building is just wonderful."

The entire project, which cost around \$450,000, consisted of the renovation of the museum's original building, the construction of the new agricultural exhibit and massive landscaping addi-

tions to the site. Funding was acquired through a \$250,000 state grant, which was matched by the county, an additional \$250,000 from the county, and in-kind and donated services from numerous businesses, private organizations and citizens.

The new building houses all of the museum's agricultural exhibits highlighting

the industries that helped build Seminole County, including celery, citrus, turpentine, cattle, ferns and commercial fishing. It also has a climate-controlled room, which contains old photographs and documents. "We've also thrown in an exhibit of early sewing machines for good measure."

Oviedo residences showered with stray bullets from AK-47

OVIDO — Seminole County sheriff's deputies continue to sort through the details of a shooting incident involving two men with AK-47 assault rifles in Oviedo.

The shootings occurred at approximately 1:30 p.m. Thursday in the Winn-Dixie parking lot near the intersection of Dean Road and Aloma Avenue and continued briefly as the vehicles headed out the back parking lot toward Dean Road.

According to witnesses, the driver of a white, Cadillac Escalade shot at the driver of a red, Chevy Camaro.

Less than an hour after the shooting, the Escalade, driven by 20-year-old Sierra Francesca Holland, passed the crime scene.

Deputies initiated a traffic stop and discovered two bullet casings, similar to those found in the Winn-Dixie parking lot, in the vehicle.

According to police reports, Holland informed deputies that the driver of the Escalade at the time of the shootings was 19-year-old Demetric Jobathan King.

King's testimony differs from that of the witnesses. According to him, the driver of the Camaro, known as D Boy, was fighting with him over Holland, his girlfriend. King alleges that D Boy stole his AK-47 from his apartment and when he attempted to chase D Boy in his vehicle, D Boy shot at him with the stolen AK-47.

Stray bullets from the incident caused damage to two homes,

E-mail makes it easier for parents to cope while son stationed in Middle East

LAKE MARY — Navy pilot Lt. Cmdr. Mark Weisgerber, a 1987 graduate of Lake Brantley High School, is currently stationed aboard the USS Nimitz in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

His parents, Bill and Judy Weisgerber of Lake Mary, say it has been difficult with their son at war, but that they are extremely proud of his achievements.

"Although it's been hard, it's a lot easier than it used to be for a parent of someone in battle," Judy said. "I think that's because we have e-mail. Regular mail still takes about six weeks, but he's able to e-mail me from the ship."

Weisgerber, whose hometown is at Lemoore Naval Air Station in Lemoore, Calif., was deployed on March 1, and is current in the Persian Gulf. He joined the military in 1991 after attending Duke University on a naval scholarship.

Weisgerber, a member of the Black Ace Squadron, trained for three years to receive his wings and now flies a F/A-18F Super Hornet.

This carrier-based plane is a

supersonic, twin-engine fighter and bomber. It's designed to provide the Navy with an all-weather strike capability. Although he is unable to discuss his specific missions, Judy feels her son was instrumental in the bombings of Iraq.

"The hardest thing for me is to watch it [the war] on TV and know that he is out there doing that," Judy said. "When a Hornet was shot down during the first week of battle it was very scary for me because I knew he flew a Hornet."

When he was deployed, 33-year-old Weisgerber also left behind his wife, Lesley, and their two sons, Nick and Sam. The family resides in Hanford, Calif.

"It was extremely difficult for him to leave his family," Judy said. "His youngest son, Sam, is only 8 months old."

According to Judy, Weisgerber will be reassigned in September.

"He is very proud of his job choice," Judy said. "He really enjoys it and really works hard. He loves the adrenaline rush and is proud of what he is capable of doing. He feels it is an honor to serve his country."

Police sting hooks church lady

SANFORD — A local woman was charged Friday with several second-degree misdemeanors after selling fish to an undercover officer.

Wanda Jean Gramlin, 49, of Country Club Circle, was charged with the unlawful sale of freshwater game, as well as selling fresh and salt water game without a retailer's license following an investigation by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Division of Law

Enforcement and assisted by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, said Lt. Jeff Gier. The charges were made after Gramlin sold three sheephead, 17 blue gill and eight speckled perch to an undercover officer.

"It turns out, she was with an organization trying to raise money for a church fund-raiser," Gier said. "I guess they were trying to get original with their fund-raising."

According to Gier, Gramlin was trying to raise money for Sanford's

National Safe Boating Week begins Saturday

In celebration of the nearly 1 million boaters in Florida, Seminole County will participate in National Safe Boating Week, which begins Saturday.

The event was established by the National Safe Boating Council as a way to decrease boating accidents and fatalities throughout North American waters.

The national observance is a collaboration effort between several organizations within the National Safe Boating Council,

including the National Power Squadron, the Coast Guard Auxiliary, the Army Corps of Engineers, the American Red Cross and the State Boating Administrators.

In Seminole County, members of the Seminole Power Squadron will man the boat ramps located on U.S. Highway 17-92 at the Seminole and Volusia county line on Saturday and Sunday. The Coast Guard Auxiliary will also be on hand Saturday and Sunday at Lake

Monroe Harbor in downtown Sanford. Both groups will pass out literature on safe boating and conduct free vessel checks.

"There are resources available through us and other organizations," said Bob Flint, District 23 Commander of U.S. Power Squads. "An educated boater is a safe boater."

This year's theme, "Boat Smart. Boat Safe. Wear It," is designed to inform boaters of the

Suncor Properties Inc., the Lake Mary-based company building the project. "It will take about a year to build the tall building."

In addition to the six-story buildings, Gateway at Riverwalk would feature 64 townhome type residential structures ranging from three to five bedrooms, each with a one- or two-car garage. Preliminary pricing for the townhomes is expected to be between \$149,000 and \$249,000.

About 30 of the townhomes would be housed in four separate three-story buildings. The buildings would be arranged in "brownstone" type layout along Myrtle Street with retail space on the first floor.

"Because of the retail space, you can't really call this type of housing a townhome," Horian said. "This is a different type of residential construction than anything in Sanford."

The remaining townhomes would be built in six-unit

buildings on the 6.8 acre site. The site plan also calls for office space along Fulton Street and a 4,700-foot retail facility along Seminole Boulevard in front of City Hall.

"This will be a nice development not only for the residents who live there, but everyone in Sanford," Horian said.

While the six-story condominium structure will be built all at one time, Horian said the townhomes would be built six units at a time as Suncor receives commitments from buyers.

"This is a tried and true type of construction that has worked well in other areas," Horian said. "We think it will work in Sanford."

Statistics provided by the city indicated the development will generate 48 additional students in the local school system: 25 elementary school students, 11 middle school students and 12 high school students.

Additionally, the project will

provide \$1 million worth of improvements for stormwater drainage along Lake Monroe. Currently, a 36-inch drainage pipe is located under Myrtle Street.

"The problem is that pipe is plugged, you're not getting that amount of flow from that pipe," Horian told planning commission members.

Suncor will install 25 underground tanks to hold and filter stormwater before it is released into Lake Monroe.

The site plan won praise from planning board members and city staff for its design and Suncor's cooperation from city staff.

"Without the vision and courage of Mr. Horian, this project wouldn't be accomplished," said Rusa Gibson, the city's land development coordinator. Gibson noted that major components of the development had changed several times as Suncor and city staff developed the site plan.

Victory Deliverance Center. The organization had set up a tarp along Celery Avenue, and members were making and selling fish dinners for the public.

Although the saltwater fish were originally purchased from a legal vendor, Gramlin did not have a retailer's license to resell the fish, Gier said. Other church members donated the freshwater fish to the fund-raiser.

"They didn't research every-

thing they needed to do before holding the fund-raiser," Gier said. "They didn't have a license to resell the fish."

Gramlin was issued citations at the scene and was not taken into custody. She faces a maximum fine of \$500 for each charge, as well as up to six months in jail. It was her first offense, however, and she will probably not face the maximum penalties, Gier said.

Selling less than 30 fresh and

salt water fish may not seem like a major concern for some people, but left unchecked, it could take a serious toll on the state's fish populations, Gier said. Fresh water game is especially susceptible to illegal fishing and commercialization.

"The freshwater game fish population in the state won't tolerate commercialization," Gier said. "If the laws were not in place, there would be a heavy toll to our fish population."

"It's been in storage forever," Jacobs said. "I'm just glad we can finally take it out and put it in the museum."

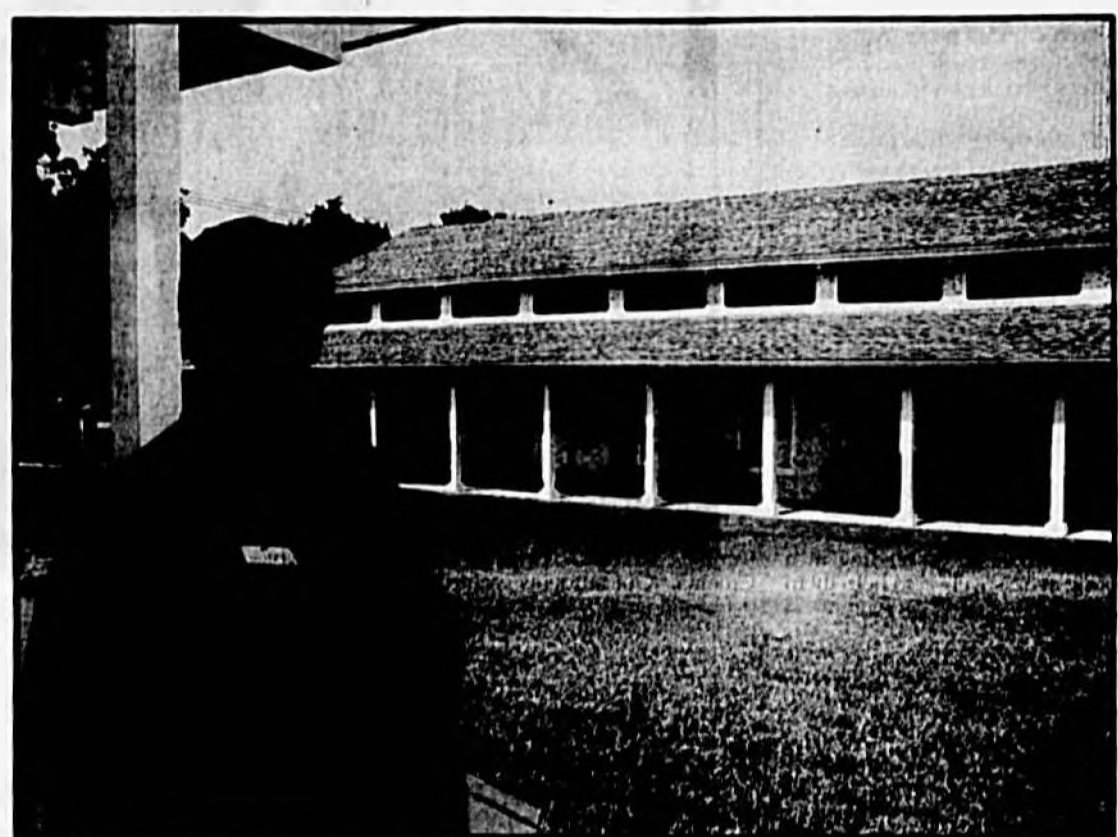
Along with the permanent exhibits, the new building gives

by the ribbon cutting at 10:30 a.m. The museum will be open following the ceremony so visitors may browse the various exhibits.

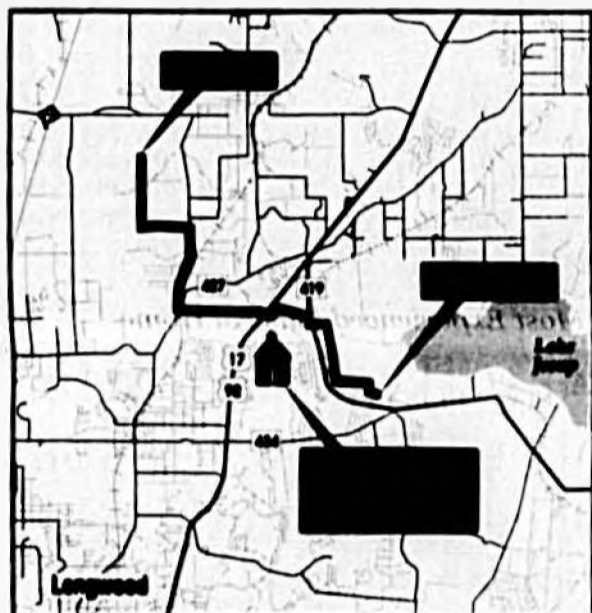

importance of wearing life jackets. It's recommended that all boaters wear life jackets at all times.

"Primarily the safest thing to do is wear your life jacket no matter if you're just sitting on the boat or running down the river at 50 mph on a bass boat," said Flint. "It's necessary because you never know when you will be thrown in the water."

Children 12 years old and younger are required by law to wear a life jacket. Canoeists, kayakers, hunters and fishermen are at a higher risk of falling overboard and therefore it's recommended, but not required, that they wear a vest.

"There are life jackets now that are comfortable, not like the old pieces of foam you wrapped around your body," said Commander Jim Chamberlin of the Seminole Power Squadron.

According to the National Safe Boating Council, in 2001, 681 fatalities were reported in the United States. Of those, 532 of the victims were not wearing life jackets.

"Think of how many people we

could save," said Chamberlin. "Boaters need to wear their life jackets. It is not good enough just to have them on the boat. If they are down below, there is no way to get to them if an accident occurs."

Safe Boating Week also stresses the importance of a well-equipped and properly maintained boat, and points out the dangerous effects of carbon monoxide poisoning and drinking alcohol while operating a boat.

According to Chamberlin, another aspect of the national event is to encourage enrollment in safe boating courses.

"Once people take the course, they have more of an idea of what type of boat they want and the safety items they need to purchase to place on the boat."

The next seven-week basic boating class will begin at 7:30 p.m. July 23. Online classes are also available.

The class teaches future boaters seamanship, how to tie knots and dock boats, and how to read charted markers and charts. For more information on the class, contact Bill Vinson at 407-365-2932.

Great job, guys! And if you'll allow me to do a little in-house horn tooting, our sports editor Dean Smith deserves some kudos. Dean's a one-man gang when it comes to covering

sports for The Herald. As our Tuesday deadline neared for Wednesday's paper, Dean worked the phones like an old-time operator to get the details. The result was a lengthy article about the game complete with quotes and pictures. I'm still waiting for a story from the big daily to the south of us. With a sports staff at least 15 to 20 times larger than ours, The Orlando Sentinel has managed only a one-line final score and no game stats. They must be busy watching former Alabama football coach Mike Price receive lap dances.

**Election 2005:** It's still early, but already there are murmurings about who the candidates will be in the March 2005 city election.

Mayor **Benny Lassard**, still in his first term, will be up for re-election. So far, there's no word that Sanford's youngest mayor will run for re-election. Lassard was the driving force behind the strong mayor referendum that lost overwhelmingly in March. Whether that translates into votes against him if he runs for re-election is unclear, though I think residents have generally viewed Lassard's leadership favorably.

**Bill Kirchhoff's** name has been mentioned as a possible candidate for mayor. Kirchhoff is a long-time Sanford resident who served on the Seminole County Commission in the late 1970s. He's got plenty of name recognition and support from "Old Sanford," but his presidency of Sanford Main Street has been a bumpy ride to say the least.

Speaking of Old Sanford, **Art Woodruff**, currently the District 1 city commissioner, may throw his hat into the ring. Woodruff is a sixth-generation Sanford native. Early on in the strong mayor discussions, he was ambiguous when I asked him if that form of government would prevent him from running for mayor. That may mean something, and it may mean nothing. Chances are good that whatever his decision, it will be more logical than that ridiculous season finale of *West Wing* (Woodruff and I are fans).

Woodruff's commission seat is also on the ballot for that election. Two people, **Gary Lowell** and **Mike Skat**, have been mentioned as possible candidates for Woodruff's seat if he runs for mayor — and maybe if he doesn't. Both serve on the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission, and both live in Vela.

That leaves **Velma Williams' District 2** seat. Williams, the city's first black vice mayor, hasn't indicated whether she will run, but I suspect she will. Word *Around The Clock* is she will have a challenger. Some in the "No Boss Mayor" gang were upset with her support of the strong mayor form of government and have vowed to run her out of office.

Like I said, it's early still. You'd be advised to hold all bets until the post time is a little closer.

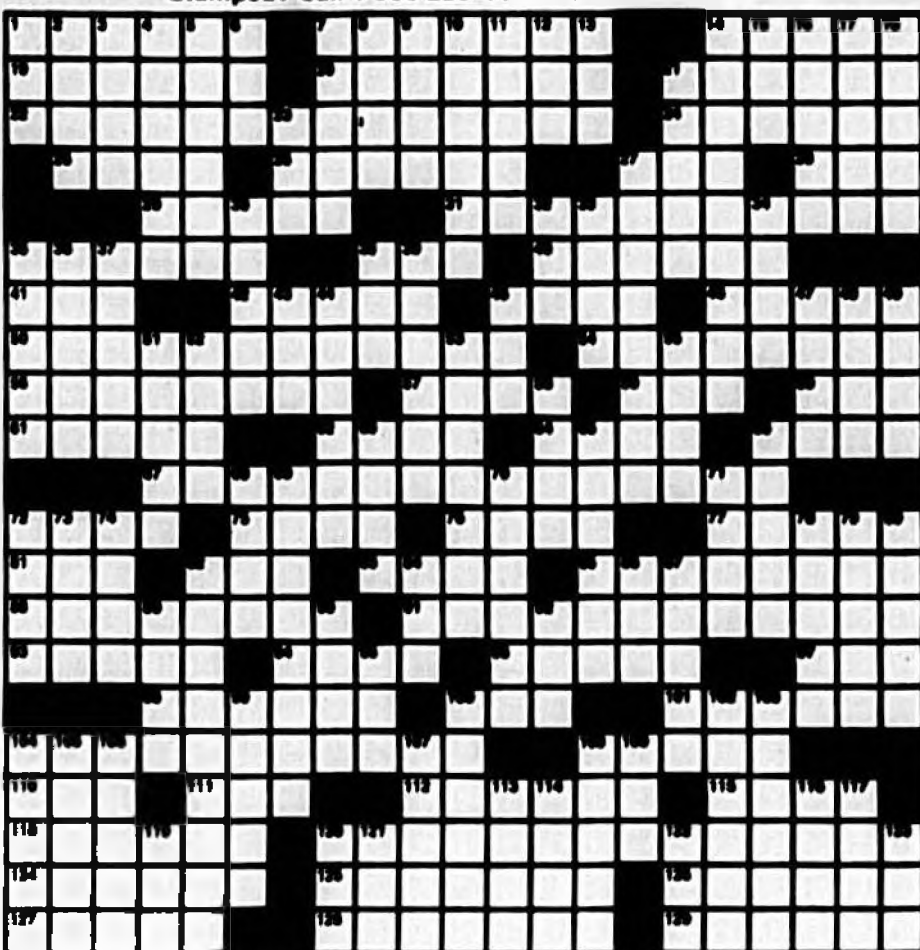

## The Way We Were: Memories from Seminole's Class of 1934

These are more items found in the box given to me by Lorraine Yarborough Whiting. Again, they pertain to Seminole High School and the class of 1934.

### "Oh, Professor"

The Class of 1934 presented as their senior play "Oh, Professor" on Friday, April 20, 1934, in the SHS auditorium. It was a farce in three acts taking place in the study hall during summer school at Brixton Academy for young ladies.

Dr. Aristotle, the dean, was portrayed by George Stovall, while his assistant, Miss Frederica, was played by Carolyn Cogburn. The school janitor was played by Randall Slaughter.

Martha Bishop, Rebecca Wilson, Betty Wheelless and Dorothy Marshall portrayed students.

David Butler portrayed Professor Percival Courtwright, who was in need of fun, while James Dyson, played Jimmy Anderson, was in need of a friend.

Returning from Paris were characters played by Kathleen Laney and Charles Palmer. Mille Fife, who belonged to Poree, was portrayed by Elise Winn.

Directing the play was Mrs. J.M. Stinecipher, and business managers were Richard Deas and Thebma Benson. Elizabeth Methvyn, Russell Odham, and James Arrant were stage and property managers; prompters were Virginia Lawton, Nlanche Cunningham, Laura Mae Bron and Katherine Johnson.

Ushers were Carl Vause, Gladys Garner, Sam Bradford, Lorraine Yarborough, Sadye Garner, Melvyn Taylor, Jenevieve Wells, Stinson Kinlaw, Virginia Gilton, Betty Colbert and Quillian Jordan.

"Happy Landings" The junior class that year (Class of 1935) presented "Happy Landings" on Friday,

May 11, 1934, in the SHS auditorium.

It was directed by Miss Elizabeth Shoemaker and Miss Helen Vernay and took place in the living room of the Stackpole home during two summer days.

Mr and Mrs Stackpole were played by Charles Betts and Adelaide Higgins, while Eleanor Hickson portrayed their daughter, Barbara.

Marian Haynes was Juliet, their maid, and George McClelland was Washington Jones, her gentleman friend.

## Avoid disaster Caution and intelligence may save property and lives

We haven't seen it yet (as far as I know), but any day now, we're going to pick up *The Seminole Herald* and find there has been or is a forest fire destroying our property and possibly our homes, vehicles, possessions and businesses.



This isn't the first time I've written about this, and if I'm still writing for the *Herald* a year from now, it won't be the last.

Forest fires are dangerous. Make no doubt about it, we're talking about hundreds, thousands, or even millions of dollars in damage — not to mention the possibility of one of those fires taking someone's (or some entire family's) lives.

Fire officials will tell you the dangers and how forest or brush fires are often started. Most of the fires alongside a roadway are started by a carelessly tossed cigarette. You can easily identify these because the first areas where the grass is black is right next to the road. You'll know — someone was careless. Have you been one of those persons?

Another way they start is someone building a camp fire and letting it get out of control or leaving it to smolder without being on hand to extinguish it. Have you done that?

Of course there are those who like to burn their yard waste on their property. They may have picked out an area relatively free from trees or shrubs, but sparks from yard fires can extend hundreds of feet away onto someone else's property, thus causing a burn. And being next door, you may not even know a new fire has started, and ignore it until it becomes a major blast.

The worst of them all are people who we could call firebugs or those seeking revenge on a neighbor or someone else. They purposely set fire to woods or shrubs, and either run so as not to be caught, or stand nearby to watch the blaze.

As far as this last type is concerned, all of us should demand they be arrested, charged with arson, and be given a severe punishment and/or fine.

Right now, we have entered the "rainy season" although from what we've seen in the past few weeks, the sky has forgotten about it. Rains, naturally, will diminish the threat of setting fires, accidentally and on purpose.

But let's now wait until the last minute. Let's not wait until the news stories tell of the disaster, loss of property, loss of life. Let's ALWAYS be cautious.

## Oxford College's small campus nurtures diverse student body

Though the morning started with dark clouds and a few errant raindrops, the sun broke through just in time. When the graduates stepped forward under a leafy canopy to get their diplomas, the sun was bright and the grads were radiant.

Their names were Wood and Patel, Borgmark and Al-Khalil, Chu, Chung and Camshaw. The class of 2003 from tiny Oxford College, in Oxford, Ga., was among the most diverse I'd ever seen. Nearly 40 percent of the graduates, who were receiving associate degrees, represented ethnic minority groups.

Oxford is a marvel. It is the birthplace of the larger and more prestigious Emory University, which later moved to Atlanta. It is now a residential two-year college of about 600 students that serves as a feeder school for Emory. Though its students often start

with slightly lower SATs than Emory's freshman class, when they transfer to Emory, they do well.

Not that Oxford's students are slouches. The average SAT score for last year's entering class was 1222, a respectable score for any college. It happens to be slightly below the average for Emory, where entering students tend to score between 1300 and 1400.

College administrators know the limits of an SAT score; yet popular culture has assigned the SAT a divine ability to discern "merit" — whether a given student deserves a seat at a prestigious college. In fact, SAT scores were never designed to be used as the exclusive standard for college admissions.

That's especially true if the student comes from an ethnic minority group that has historically suffered discrimination.

No matter their SAT scores, it is difficult to look at Oxford's graduating class and see anything but achievement — and the potential for more to come. About 85 to 90 percent of Oxford's grads usually go on to Emory — listed among the top 20 national universities in the last survey by U.S. News and World Report — and only about 1 percent drop out for academic reasons, according to Dean Dana Greene, Oxford's top administrator.

"The students at Oxford do every bit as well as those who start at Emory," said Emory President Bill Chace. "They tend to be quite well-represented in all forms of governance here. I think that's because they have been very well-supported and nurtured at a much smaller campus."

Oxford has managed to achieve its enviable level of diversity without considering race in admissions. That's because it

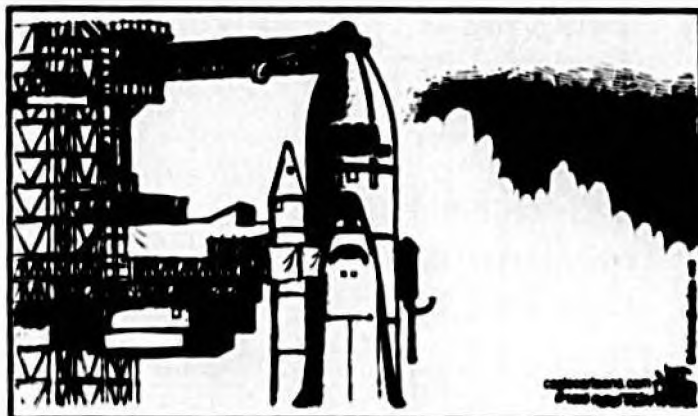
admits nearly 80 percent of all applicants. (Affirmative action is only practiced at a small number of elite institutions that have more applicants than spaces.) Still, it has high-achieving students.

The college's secret seems to be just that — it isn't well-known. Nestled in a small town 45 minutes east of Atlanta, it has little in the way of collegiate sports, no fraternities or sororities, few occasions for drunken revelries. That makes it attractive to students serious about scholarship.

With such a small student body, young adults from diverse backgrounds are also likely to get to know each other well. The school is too small to shelter factions of blond valley girls or black-clad Goths or rap-star wannabes. Individuality is encouraged, but cliques — black, white or Pakistani — are not.

For young adults who will likely become civic leaders in a multicultural America, Oxford provides an ideal education.

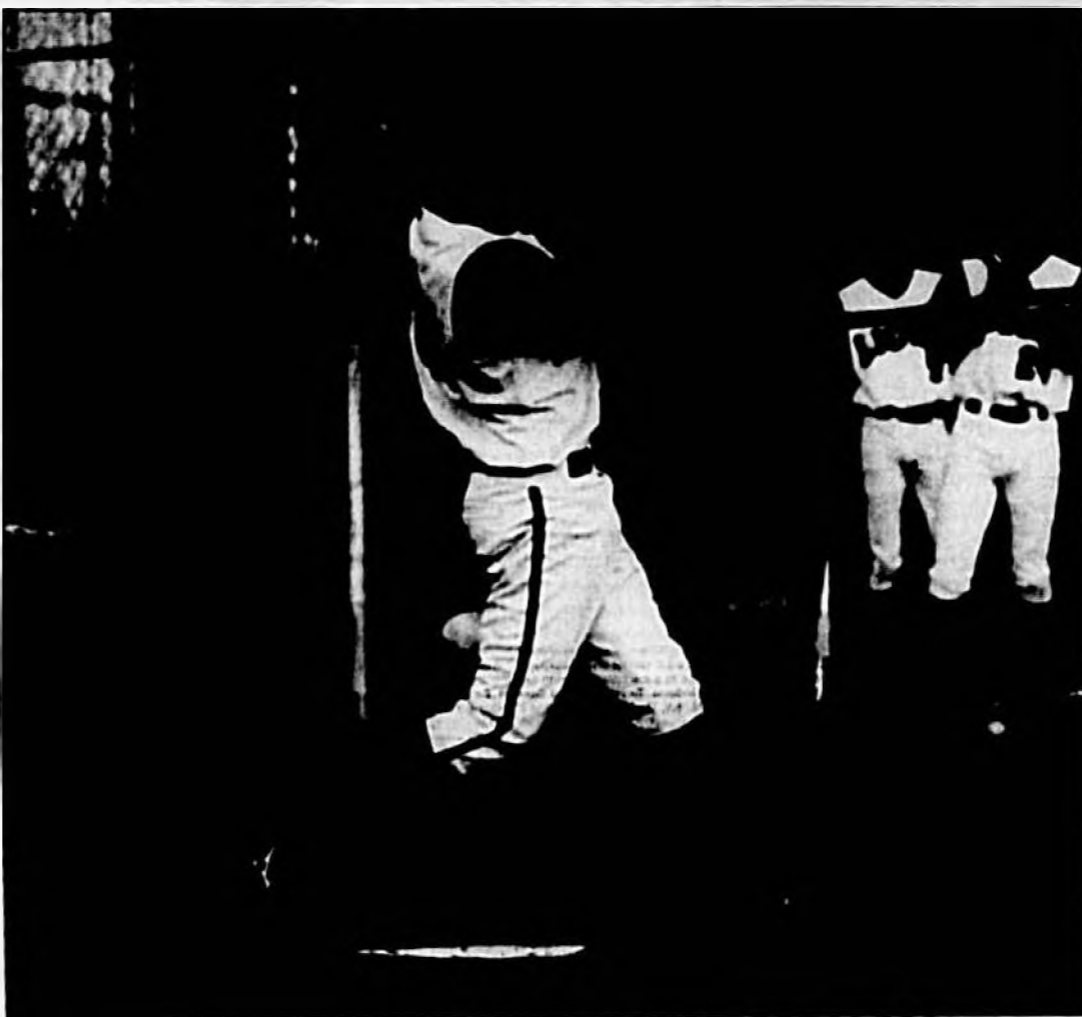

*2003 Torch Run helps raise awareness for Special Olympics*

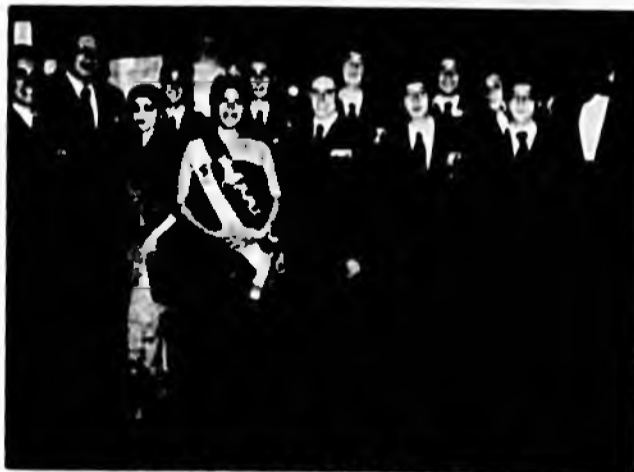

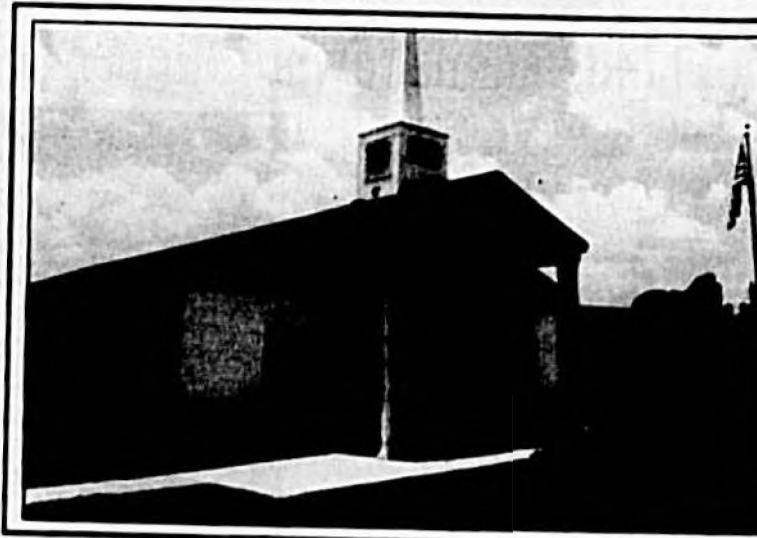

# Large family inheritance can be threat to responsible living

**QUESTION:** My wife and I are approaching our retirement years and we have been very blessed financially. We own several large businesses and will have a sizable estate to pass on to our three children. How do you feel about leaving large amounts of money to the next generation, and is there a right and wrong way to do it?

on that subject may not be what you want to hear, but I can only tell you what I've observed and what I firmly believe. In a word, I'm convinced that it is very dangerous to give large

amounts of money to kids who haven't earned it. A sociological study published some time ago, called "Rich Kids," validated the concerns I have observed. The authors of that study concluded that large trust funds are usually destructive to those who inherit them. The case studies they cited were convincing. Human history also confirms the dangerous influence of money. Men and

women have lusted for it, killed for it, died for it and gone to hell for it. Money has come between the best of friends and brought down the proud and mighty. And, alas, it has torn millions of marriages limb from limb! It's also been my observation that nothing will divide siblings more quickly than money. Giving them a large inheritance increases the probability of tension and

disharmony within a family. Your sons and daughters will fight over control of your businesses and will resent those who are designated as decision makers. Some of them will lose their motivation to be responsible and will experiment with various addictive behaviors — from gambling to alcoholism. There are exceptions to these negative consequences, of course, and

some people do handle wealth

# Three species of Curcuma named plants of the year

Curcuma is a genus of about 70 species of plants in the ginger family, mostly from Tropical Asia. Many display very attractive foliage and flowers; others are economically important as source of spices, dyes, starch or used in traditional medicines.

The large, tropical-looking bright green leaves, sometimes with an attractive red or purple midrib area and the exotic flower spikes are the main ornamental features of this plant. The popularity of Curcuma is evident when the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association named three species of Curcuma, plants of the year for 2002.

### The Plant

Large oval, long stemmed leaves are borne from underground stems or rhizomes, like

ginger. The inflorescences are club-shaped structures with spirally arranged bracts. The lower two thirds of the bracts are green, often tinged with red or purple, are fertile and bear the flowers.

The upper third of the bracts are sterile and brightly colored in shades of white to pink and purple. The flowers, barely visible, are borne in the axils of the enclosing bracts.

### Culture

Plant rhizomes 2 to 3 inches deep in a well-drained soil in early spring. Enrich soil with organic materials such as compost, manure or peat. Locate plant in a partially shaded area, preferably on the east side of the garden. Plant should be watered frequently to keep soil moisture high. Fertilize in the

spring and fall with a balanced garden fertilizer. The plant dies back and goes dormant in winter. When the plant is dormant water sparingly until new growth resumes in spring. When grown in containers it must be potted in well-drained soil of peat and loam mixed with small pieces of sandstone, charcoal or soft broken brick and coarse sand. The atmosphere must be humid. Division of rhizome is the easiest means of propagation. Some of the cultured species are:

**Giant Flame Ginger:** Grows 7 to 8 feet tall, with a bright pink inflorescence in the spring as the foliage emerges to form large clumps. Bloom is long lasting as cut flower.

**Hidden Ginger:** Grows 4 to 5 feet tall, with maroon colored inflorescence with yellow flowers in the spring appearing before the foliage. Leaves have a purple midrib. Bloom can be

used as a long lasting cut flower.

**Jewel of Thailand Ginger:** Grows 3 feet tall, with one foot tall pink inflorescence with yellow flowers in the fall. Leaves are pleated.

**Pride of Burma:** Grows 2 to 3 feet high in 30-50% shade, with pure orange inflorescence changing to light orange-yellow inside. Delicate small flowers located between bracts are white with yellow throat. Leaves are bright green and broad, extending above the inflorescence. Good cut flower in tropical areas. Plant goes dormant in winter.

### Use

This plant is excellent as a ground cover for shaded areas. It adds a tropical look at your garden and can be used as a cut flower plant. The dried rhizome of some species is a source of turmeric, used as a

spice and dye. This spice is also called 'Indian saffron' thanks to its brilliant yellow color. Turmeric is the key spice in curry.

Indian turmeric is used as food flavoring, an effective ingredient in medicines and cosmetics, and a natural yellow colorant.

Turmeric contains an oil that consists in part of curcumin, which on oxidation is changed into vanillin, the active principle in vanilla. Curcumin is the yellow pigment of turmeric. Curcumin has been used in both the traditional Indian and Chinese Medicine.
