

OCALA, Fla. (AP) - Sheriff Willis V. McCall, on trial for second degree murder of a prisoner in his Lake County Jail, has depicted the dead man as "a tiger," while defense attorneys say he was severely beaten by other inmates. Defense lawyers say witnesses will prove "that Willis McCall is not guilty" in the beating death of Tommy Vickers, 37, in Tavares last April.

In an opening statement for the defense, McCall's attorney, John Robertson, said two white trustys brothers Jackie and Bobby Huffman - beat Vickers on the night of April 12 and left him bleeding. They 'possibly" beat him again the following morning, Robertson said, and witnesses will testify that Mc-Call at no time kicked Vickers. Jackie and Bobby Huffman testified for the

prosecution that they saw McCall kick Vickers in the stomach. Jackie Huffman said he grabbed Vickers at McCall's instruction April 13 and held the prisoner by the arms while "the sheriff came in and kicked him in the stomach three or four times.' The brothers denied that they had inflicted the

fatal blows on the prisoner. Defense attorney Robertson said he will bring out that prisoners at the jail joined in a conspiracy to pin

Vickers' death on the sheriff, and that McCall had political enemies who seized on the allegations that McCall kicked the prisoner.

He said Vickers was given a severe beating by the jail trustys and they then tried to cover it up by blaming the sheriff.



and who He is and what He does. In the long run we worship that which we consider to be the most important thing, person, or relation in the world and beyond. To "have" God, one must worship Him, sing His praises, offer Him sacrifices, amd pray to Him in meaningful dialogue. Anything less than this is inadequate. He must be both "He who calls into being" and yet sits outside of the finite world and He who is immediately available to us in prayer. He has to have all power and yet be infinitely

No matter how we define God or comment on what He "ought to be" in terms of our thinking, we actually define God in our own lives in another way. We make up our own minds as to what is the single most important thing, person, or relationship in our lives. That we label as God. You can see where this leads us. If God is the single most

important thing in my life and I happen to regard the accumulation of money as the most vital thing I am involved in, then I have elevated the search for money and the possession of it to the level of God. And having done this I am in trouble. We do this in other ways, too. Sometimes it is the sense of having power over people which we elevate to deity.

Sometimes we elevate ourselves. Probably this last one is the most common. We say to ourselves, "I'm the most important person around. It is my feelings that are important. It is what I want that we must have." The fact is that money makes a very poor god. Oh, it can be pleasant to have it. Not having any complicates life.

Money can buy nice things that give pleasure and a certain degree of satisfaction. Yet money is woefully inadequate as God because it cannot heal us when we are sick, talk to us when we are lonely, forgive us when we are in the need of forgiveness. It cannot love us.

We ourselves make poor gods. We know ourselves well enough to know that we make mistakes. We hurt. We manage to hurt others. We get into situations which we know require forgiveness, and we cannot forgive ourselves. We do not even make good objects of self-love, because we get to know ourselves only too well.

"I am the Lord thy God. . . Thou shalt have no other gods before me." This is the first thing God told Moses on Mount Sinai when He was handing out the rules for life we call the Ten Commandments. This is the demand, then, "Quit fooling around, worshipping money or power or what-have-you. Turn to the one True God."

The demand seems like a lot to ask, even though we are dissatisfied with the results of our worship of money or ourselves. In fact, the demand only becomes endurable when we meet God face to face, not just as Creator, but as Son and Saviour, God has revealed Himself to us as that demanding God of Mount Sinai, and He has shown Himself in Jesus Christ, our Lover.

When we come to know Jesus Christ through the Church, the Bible, prayer, and personal encounter, then we know the God who is full and joyous to know. We hear Jesus say, "Come unto me." We also hear Jesus say, "I am the resurrection and the life." As we read the Bible we see so often Jesus reaching out to heal and to forgive. This is the kind of God we need. This is the kind of God whom we can worship without hesitation. This is the One True God revealed as creator, lover, forgiver, healer, and He who calls us all to fullness in His presence.

GOP Bows To Indians: Red, That Is

MIAMI BEACH - The "first Americans" are playing a more active role in American politics this year. The 1972 Republican National Convention starting Aug. 21 at Miami Beach will have at least six American Indians delegates and two alternates.

Three of the delegates are tribal leaders and all eight are working to meet Indian needs.

The three modern-day Indian cheifs are Peter Mac-Donald of Window Rock, Ariz., chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council; Rev. Walter L. Moffett of Kamiah, Idaho, secretary and past chairman of the Nex Perce Tribal Executive Committee, and Webster A. Two Hawk of Rosebud, S.D., chairman of the Rosebud Reservation Sioux

The other Indian delegates include Ann Coleman, 22year-old law student from Talihina, Okla; John Robert Jones of Pembroke, N.C., and Mrs. Evyon Mendenhall, Republican committeewoman of Webster Groves, Mo. The two delegates are Mrs. Ralph Rhodes of Tulsa, Okla., and Jim Carpenter of Seneca, S.C.

MacDonald, born on the Teec Nos Pos Navajo Reservation in Arizona, reportedly adopted his English name as a

boy attending a Bureau of Indian Affairs School after hearing the popular song, "Old MacDonald Had a Farm." He served in the Marine Corps during World War II as

a special communicator speaking his native Navajo to bewilder the Japanese. After his stint with the Marines, MacDonald finished high school and earned a bachelor of science degree in engineering from the University of Oklahoma. He then joined Hughes Aircraft in California as junior engineer, and later

project engineer on Polaris missiles Anxious to serve his fellow Navajos, MacDonald returned to the reservation and served as executive director. Office of Navajo Economic Opportunity. In 1970, he was elected chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council with the largest margin in history, becoming the first college-

educated American Indian chief. Rev. Moffett, pastor of Kooski-Kamiah United Presbyterian Church, has long been active in American Indian politics. A former U.S. Public Health sanitarian, he now devotes most of his time ministering to the needs of the Nex Perce Tribe in Kamiah, Idaho

Sioux Chairman Two Hawk has served 12 years as an Episcopal missionary on South Dekota Indian reservations. Prior to his election as tribal chairman, he was associate director of the Rosebud Community Action Program.

Almost as bad as man's record of upsetting the "balance of nature" are some of his efforts to preserve it. One example is the attempted stabilization of beaches which have been eroding away and building up and eroding away for millions of years. Another is contained in Smokey the Bear's admonition that "Only you can prevent forest fires," a commandment taken to heart by both the public and professional foresters.

Firefighters in the nation's western forests have not get reached the goal of total exclusion of fire, but over per cent of wildfires are extinguished while small The three to five per cent that get out of control cause almost all the timber, life and property losses. But this small percentage does tremendous damage, says Marvin Dodge, a forest ranger with the California

Department of Conservation. The 1967 fire season in the Pacific Northwest and northern Rockies was a blow to the national economy as well as to the local timber and recreation industries, he writes

A School Is A School

Appearing before the Board of County Commissioners, to seek an interpretation of zoning regulations involving property near Barney's Academy, Paul Lovelace told the Board that he has a 50 per cent interest in the property and that at present, the only development planned concerns a dancing school. The property is currently zoned Agricultural

The dance school would be operated by Marty and Joann Stebbins, to be used predominately for children, but with exercise classes for adults upon request. A monthly tuition charge would be made. Mrs. Stebbins said that she is an accredited dance instructor. She is certified by Dancemasters of America, Inc.

While A-1 zoning does permit construction of schools, the zoning director said that the regulations say public, private or parochial schools and "we usually expect a certification from the state for the school." Chairman Drummond asked the county attorney how is this dancing school different from another school - "there

are regularly scheduled classes, certified instructors, tuition – don't the other schools have the same factors?" Howard Marsee, county attorney, said that this is open to debate, that he has no legal answer. "Legally, there is no way to interpret. A school is a school." In response to a

query by Commissioner Al Davis as to the difference between a dance studio and a dance school, Marsee said it was a matter of terminology. Mrs. Stebbins assured the Board that this operation will definitely be a school-with definite cultural orientation


