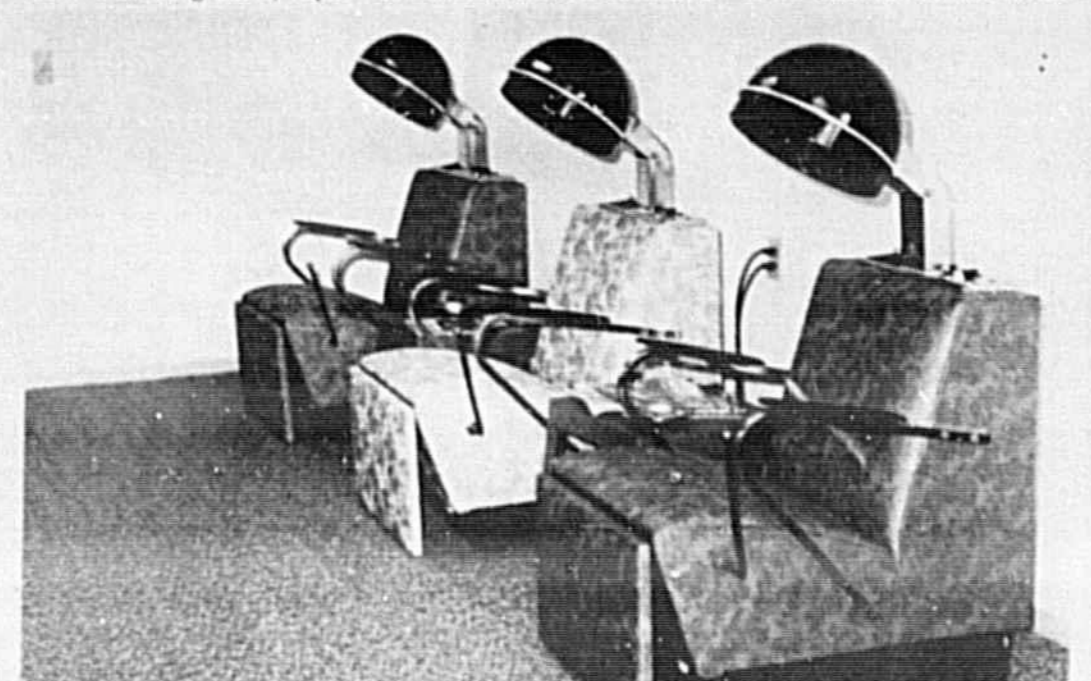

Brothers Blamed In Fatal Beating

OCALA, Fla. (AP) — Sheriff Willis V. McCall, on trial for second degree murder of a prisoner in his Lake County Jail, has depicted the dead man as "a tiger," while defense attorneys say he was severely beaten by other inmates.

In an opening statement for the defense, McCall's attorney, John Robertson, said two white trustys — brothers Jackie and Bobby Huffman — beat Vickers on the night of April 12 and left him bleeding. They "possibly" beat him again the following morning.

Jackie and Bobby Huffman testified for the prosecution that they saw McCall kick Vickers in the stomach. Jackie Huffman said he grabbed Vickers at McCall's instruction April 13 and held the prisoner by the arms while "the sheriff came in and kicked him in the stomach three or four times."

Four persons were charged with possession of cannabis sativa (marijuana) and possession of a narcotic paraphernalia with bond set at \$2,500 on each charge. Frederick Arnold Weaver, 25, and Roy Gary Brewer, 21, both gave the raided residence as their home address. The other two arrested on the dual possession charges were William Wyatt Shell, 39, of 868 Palm Drive, Orlando, and Dawn E. Elms, 18, of 2625 Trailwood Drive.

The effort was headed by sheriff's department vice squad leader Raymond Parker. Other vice agents in on the raid were Gary Swain, of the Sanford police; P. J. Higgins, of the Seminole County sheriff's department; Jim Plecozes, of the Longwood police, and an Orange County undercover agent.

Brothers Blamed In Fatal Beating (Continued) In addition to the 30 pounds of marijuana, agents found approximately two pounds of seeds and about 140 marijuana plants. Officers seized two vehicles and confiscated a large amount of stereo equipment.

Brothers Blamed In Fatal Beating (Continued) The fifth person arrested, Ralph Dale Bass, 20, of 1807 Michigan Avenue, Winter Park, was charged with frequenting a disorderly house when he drove up to the residence while the search warrant was being executed. The search warrant was issued by County Judge Wallace Hall.

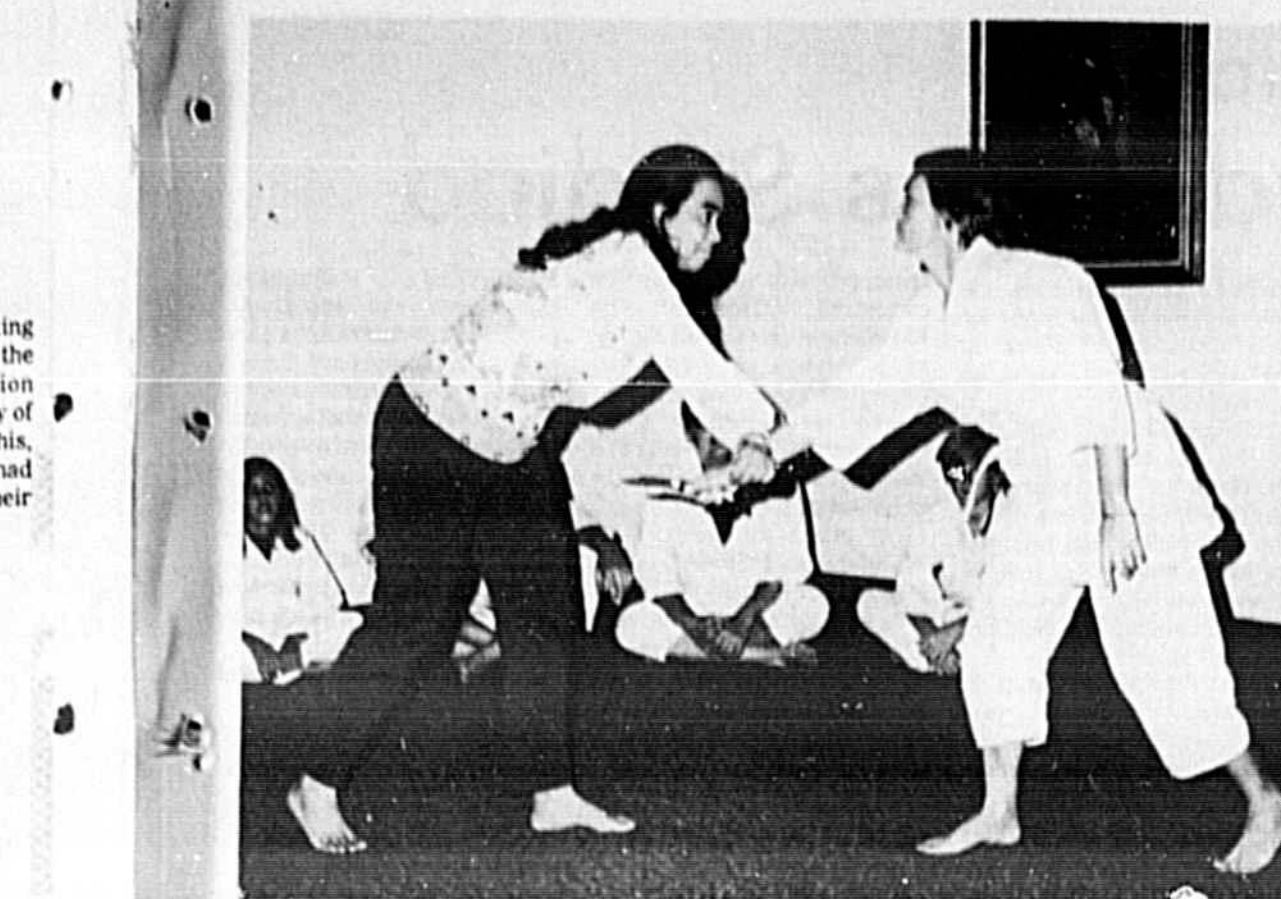

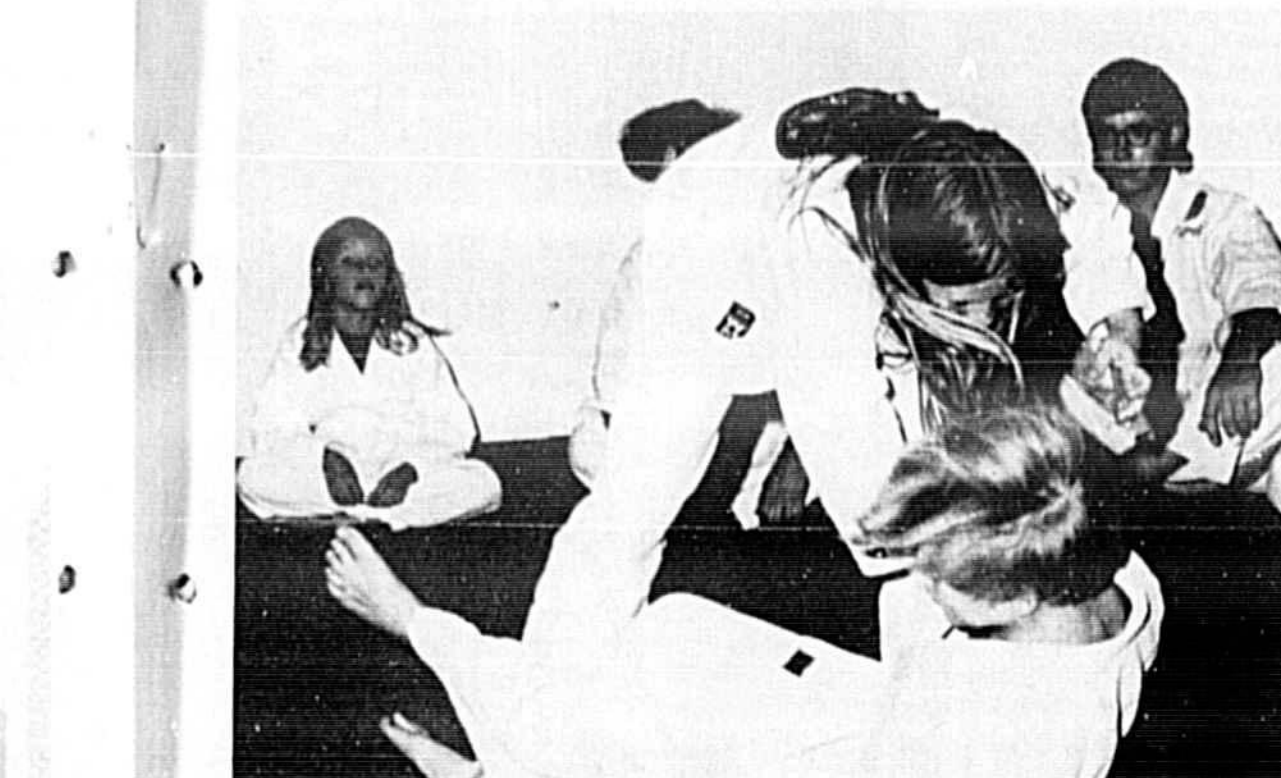

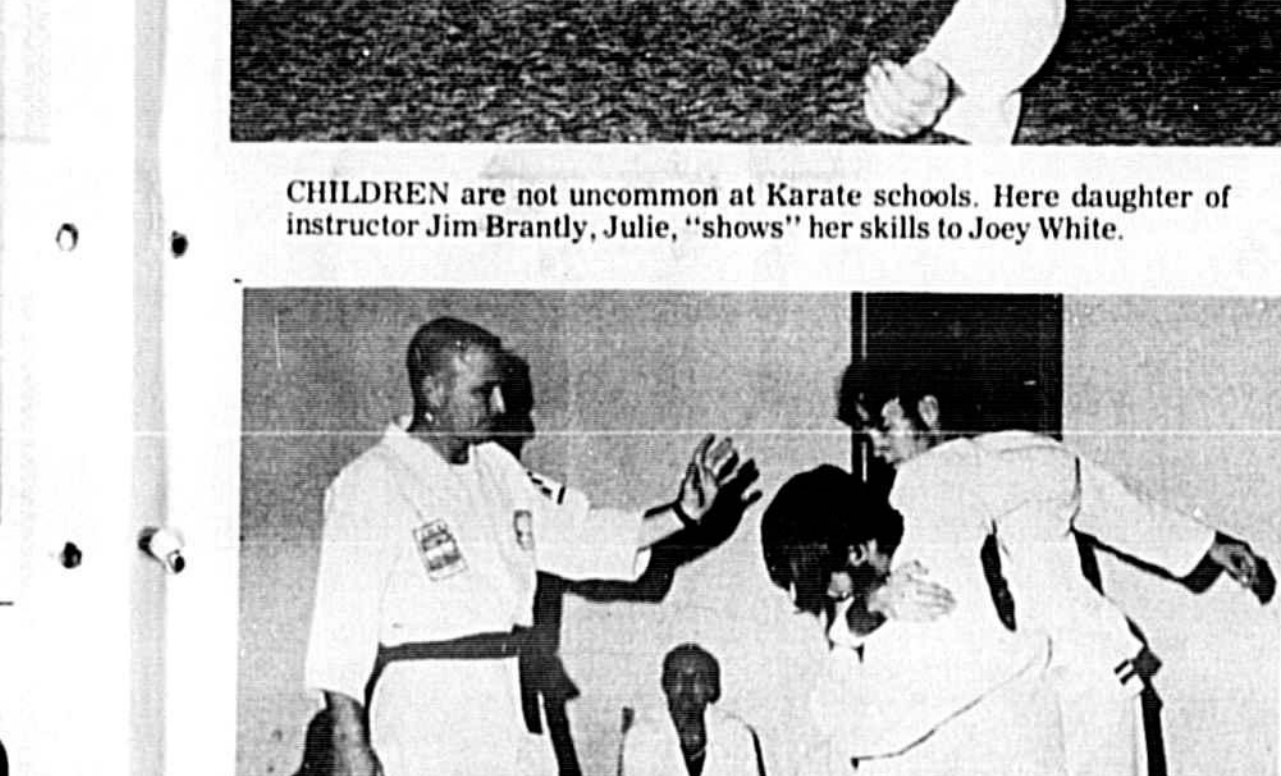

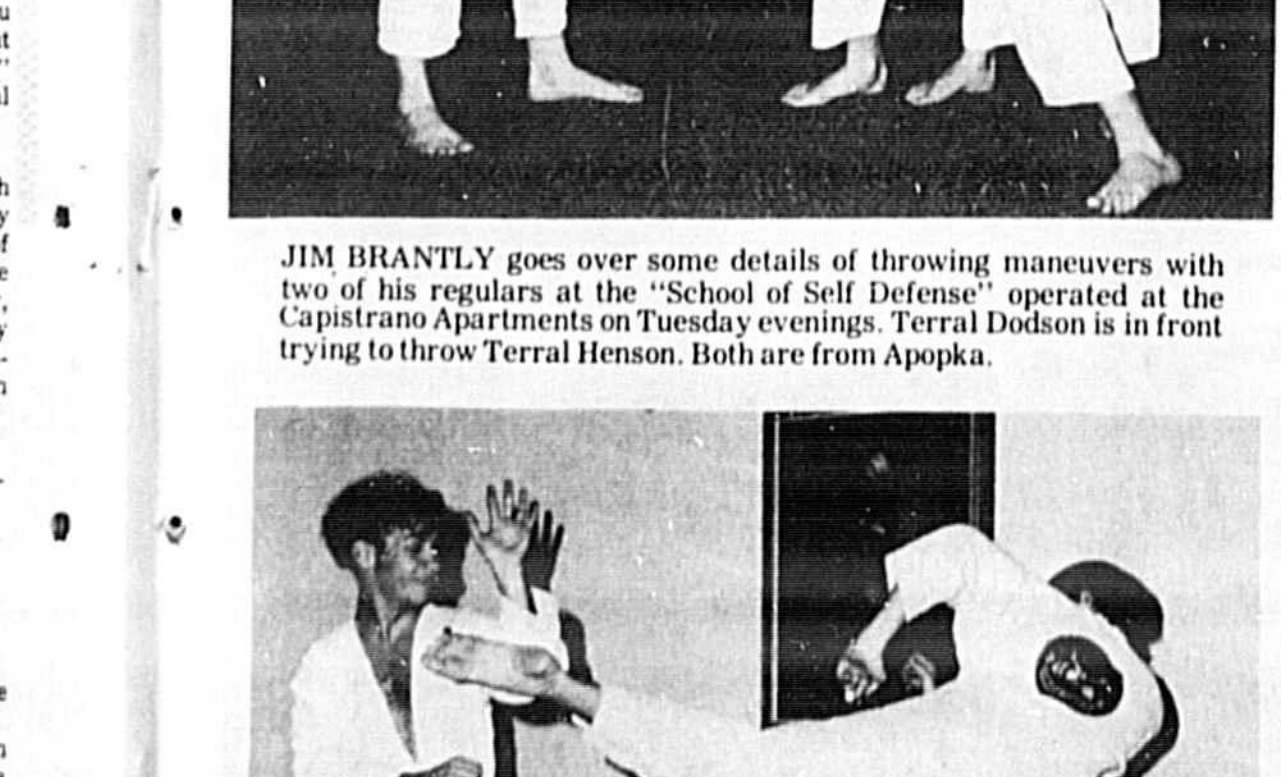

About two years ago, I was accused of not having any interest nor compassion for the Sanford Zoo. Actually, I was only trying to say what I thought was a valid opinion, and was misunderstood. Maybe I shouldn't try again; but, here goes anyhow: "I really don't believe the people of this area give two hoots in Hades about whether the monkeys and the gators and the rest of the menagerie gets humane treatment. And this can only be offered in the form of entirely new quarters."

For two years, we have heard of all the different kinds of plans on raising money (and no one can fault the City of Sanford — they've been most tolerant and benevolent). We had people who had good intentions, but the results just weren't there! We had some, I might add, who were always around when the camera was shown, but were invisible in making themselves invisible for the actual chores.

What we did NOT have previously was a dedicated and talented individual to handle the multitude of problems confronting the Zoological Society. That isn't the case presently. Clifford Nelson is the right man for the right job... there just isn't anyone that I can think of better qualified for this responsibility. And he doesn't get one red penny for his efforts... all for free!

With all of the good which would come to each of us... IF we go ahead and put up a first class zoological garden, well, there just isn't any logical reason for us to stop now.

There are 500 members. We have \$31,000 in pledges and only \$18,000 in a construction fund trust account. And we're trying to raise \$221,000... all of which will transform those 104 acres near the 14 Sanford interchange, (along Lake Monroe), to one of the most attractive tourist locations in the south. None would be like... even the incomparable Disney World.

The stage is set, neighbors. Unless this money is raised by Sept. 30... OF THIS YEAR... there just won't be a zoo.

Prove me wrong. I don't think you're going to put your money where your mouth is!

## Jury Acquits Sheriff Of Murder

TAVARES, Fla. (AP) — Acquitted of second degree murder, but still under suspension, Willis V. McCall returned to political campaigning today confidently predicting he would be elected to an eighth consecutive term as Lake County sheriff.

Asked if he thought he could beat three opponents in the Sept. 12 Democratic primary and a Republican foe in the November general election, the 63-year-old McCall replied: "You want to lay odds on it. The folks up here tell me they're going to vote for me." He branded the charges that brought him to trial as a "politically motivated frame-up."

## Budget Battle Settled By City Council

Sanford city commissioners finally settled their three-day "battle of the budget" with a compromise two per cent pay raise for the three positions which caused the stalemate.

The vote, however, was not unanimous. Commissioner Gordon Meyer held to his conviction that the jobs of city manager, finance director and assistant finance director should be capped at the present salaries.

Commissioner A. A. McClanahan proposed the two per cent increase in lieu of figures presented by the city manager.

At the Thursday budget work session, Commissioner Julian Senstrom was aligned with Meyer on the point of no increase for these top positions but Friday agreed to the compromise in order to get on to other matters of prime importance in the budget hearings.

City Manager W. E. Knowles, whose present salary is \$21,000, will receive a \$420 increase instead of \$2,887 as requested. Finance Director Henry Tamun will get a \$360 raise in place of \$2,000. His salary is now \$13,928 per year.

In line with the minimum raises being awarded to other city employees, Rosa Rotundo, assistant finance director, gets a \$340 raise as the two per cent would only come to \$294. Her current salary is \$19,240.

Other upcoming raises will be handled at an early date, according to Mayor Lee Moore. Department heads will come to the commission with recommendations and this body will consider the merits of each along with the city manager.

## Florida GOP In Rules Fight

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Florida Republican delegates have vowed to fight for a proposed rules change that would give some delegates at the 1976 convention to states carried this year by President Nixon a plan said to enhance a possible presidential bid by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

The state's 40 delegates left a Sunday caucus at their Barceon Hotel headquarters agreeing to support a Republican National Committee recommendation.

E. "Tommy" Thomas of Panama City, delegation chairman, told delegates a vote for the proposed rule change would be a vote of confidence for Agnew. "It comes right down to a contest right now between Agnew and Sen. Charles Percy of Illinois," he said.

Florida delegates, many clad in bright orange "Hot State" blazers, boomed loudly when Thomas mentioned Percy's name and called the Illinois senator as "a Northern liberal."

Florida's delegation would increase by 26 members to 66 under the plan if Nixon carries the state as he did in 1968. The changes were recommended late last week by the Rules Committee, chaired by former Congressman William C. Cramer of Fort Lauderdale. However, a substitute plan that would not automatically penalize states which Nixon does not carry is being pushed.
