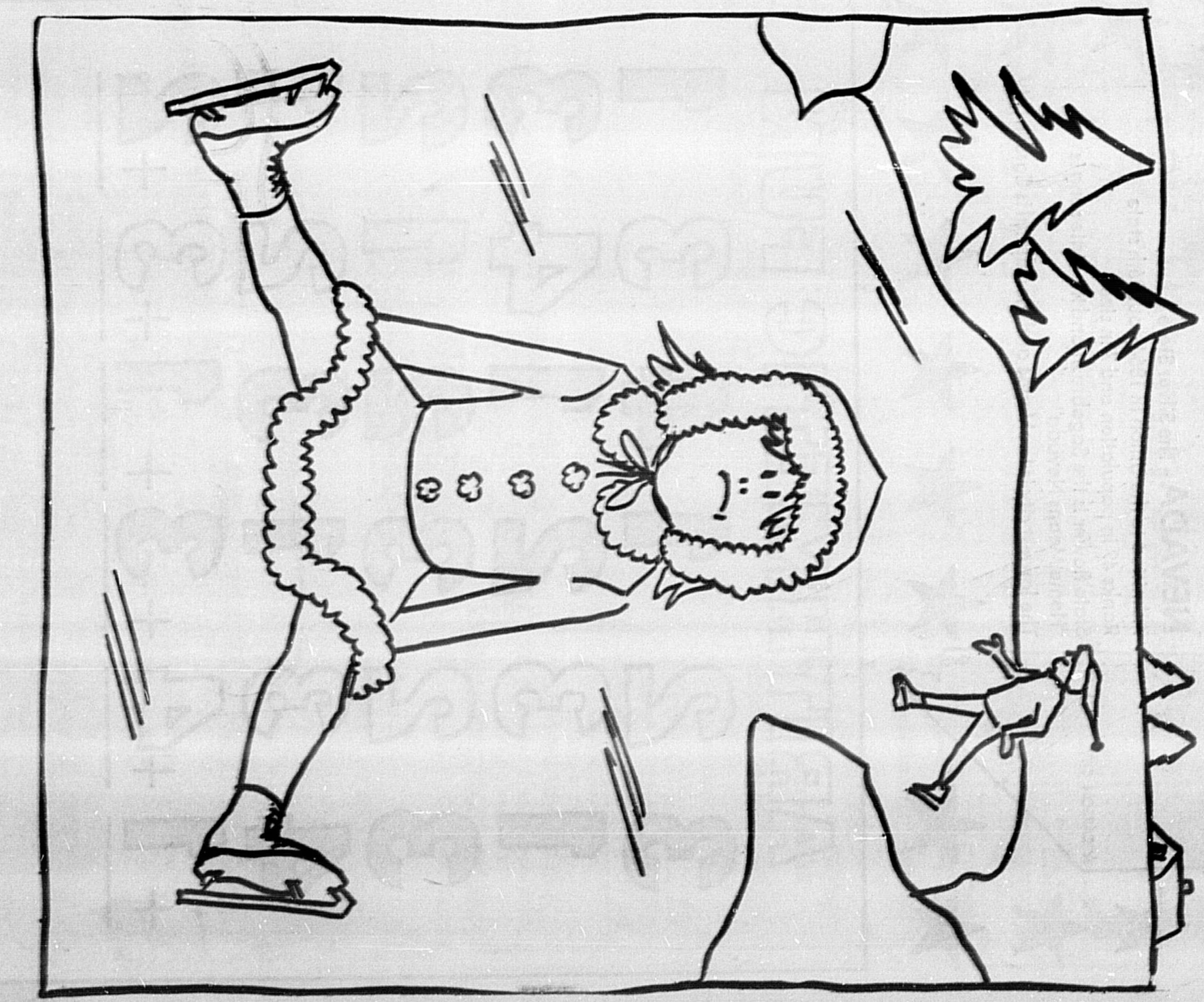

## 2 Sanford Theaters Included In Merger

ATLANTA (UPI) — Fuqua Industries, Inc., an Atlanta-based diversified-services firm, announced today an agreement in principle whereby Martin Theatre Company, a subsidiary, will acquire a Florida chain of motion picture theaters, including the Sanford Plaza Rocking Chair Theater and the Movieland Drive-In Theatre of Sanford.

Under terms of the proposal, Martin, which operates theaters and two television stations in the southeast, would merge with Floyd Enterprises, Inc., Haines City, Fla. Floyd operates 42 theaters in central Florida, including the two Sanford houses.

The merger would be carried out through the exchange of two shares of Floyd common stock for one of Fuqua. Fuqua was quoted at 30 3/4 on closing last Friday on the New York Stock Exchange while Floyd was 13 1/4 on over the counter trading.

Fuqua said Carl Floyd would remain as chairman of the board of Floyd and Harold Spears would remain as president.

## City, SIC, CofC To Discuss Action Airport Future Decision Due

The future of Sanford Airport and the future industrial development of the city of Sanford will hinge on what actions are taken as the result of three scheduled meetings this week.

City Manager W. E. Knowles, Mayor Lee Moore, City Attorney W. C. Hutchison and Sanford Industrial Commission Chairman A. K. Shoemaker Jr. are expected to meet this afternoon at city hall to discuss whether to implement an airport authority to operate Sanford Airport and its industrial recruitment, or place the activity under a city department.

This session was arranged after a breakfast meeting of the SIC and City Commission a week ago to discuss the problems coming with the resignation of Don Rathel as SIC director and finding some group or person to operate the industrial part of the city.

Methods discussed were having the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce operate the industrial aspects in conjunction with the SIC under a department of aviation concept with J. S. (Red) Cleveland, airport manager in charge of the airport's leasing and maintenance.

There was opposition to this idea and it was ultimately decided to name four men to a committee to make a decision that would be brought before both city and SIC commissions for approval.

Another meeting at 4:30 p.m. today will involve the SIC board with Rathel expected to bring at least three industrial leases for board approval.

The airport industrial operation is also expected to be discussed in some manner as this could be the last session in which Rathel is scheduled to participate.

In announcing his decision not to seek another six-month employment of his consultant firm, Rathel indicated he would leave the post by Jan. 15.

Today's meeting is expected to be the final session for Rathel unless something unexpected crops up, a source close to the SIC said.

It is expected that some discussion may be forthcoming today over future leasing practices.

A third meeting, involving the city's industrial recruitment, among other business items is expected to be brought before the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce during that body's special executive meeting scheduled for 8 p.m. tomorrow.

Chamber has expressed interest in operating the city's industrial recruitment with SIC participation, but it is believed that some opposition to this is expected to appear before City Commission to seek that body's approval for operating the city's industrial involvement.

Tuesday's meeting may decide the general course the chamber may follow.

W. E. Knowles, city manager, said he believes the running of an air port should be left to the city rather than involved with any industry seeking group.

## McDonald Gets Sanford Seat

A former Sanford mayor and city commissioner is expected to be named the fifth member of the City Commission at that group's 8 p.m. Tuesday organizational meeting.

Thomas S. (Tommy) McDonald received three of four votes cast by city commissioners Saturday afternoon as that body met to appoint a replacement to Mayor Lee P. Moore's unexpired one-year term on the city board.

McDonald's appointment was approved by newly elected Gordon Meyer, who is also to be sworn into a three-year city commission term in the same organizational meeting.

Meyer gave as his reasoning a campaign promise he would not vote for anyone who had previously served on the commission. "I have nothing against Tommy but I made a promise and must stand by it," said Meyer.

Meyer indicated a desire to have only new faces on the board and pushed for the appointment of political unknowns for the opening created when Mayor Moore ran for a three-year mayor seat and was victorious.

Higginbotham along with defeated commissioner A. L. Wilson was considered in a list of approximately 20 persons for the commission's post but was struck out as those under consideration narrowed down to three names late Friday.

These included David Smith, Seaboard Coast Line employee; Bert Hollingworth, an accountant, and McDonald.

The four commissioners received after three hours of Friday deliberations and returned Saturday noon to approve McDonald.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, who had said previously he could not support a defeated candidate, said he voted for McDonald in the best interests of the city and would have to prepare a statement explaining how he could "talk out of both sides of his mouth" in view of his change of mind in supporting McDonald, who was defeated by Higginbotham in a previous election.

McDonald served as commissioner from 1961 through 1963 and was mayor in 1963.

The man is believed to have escaped in a car parked nearby.

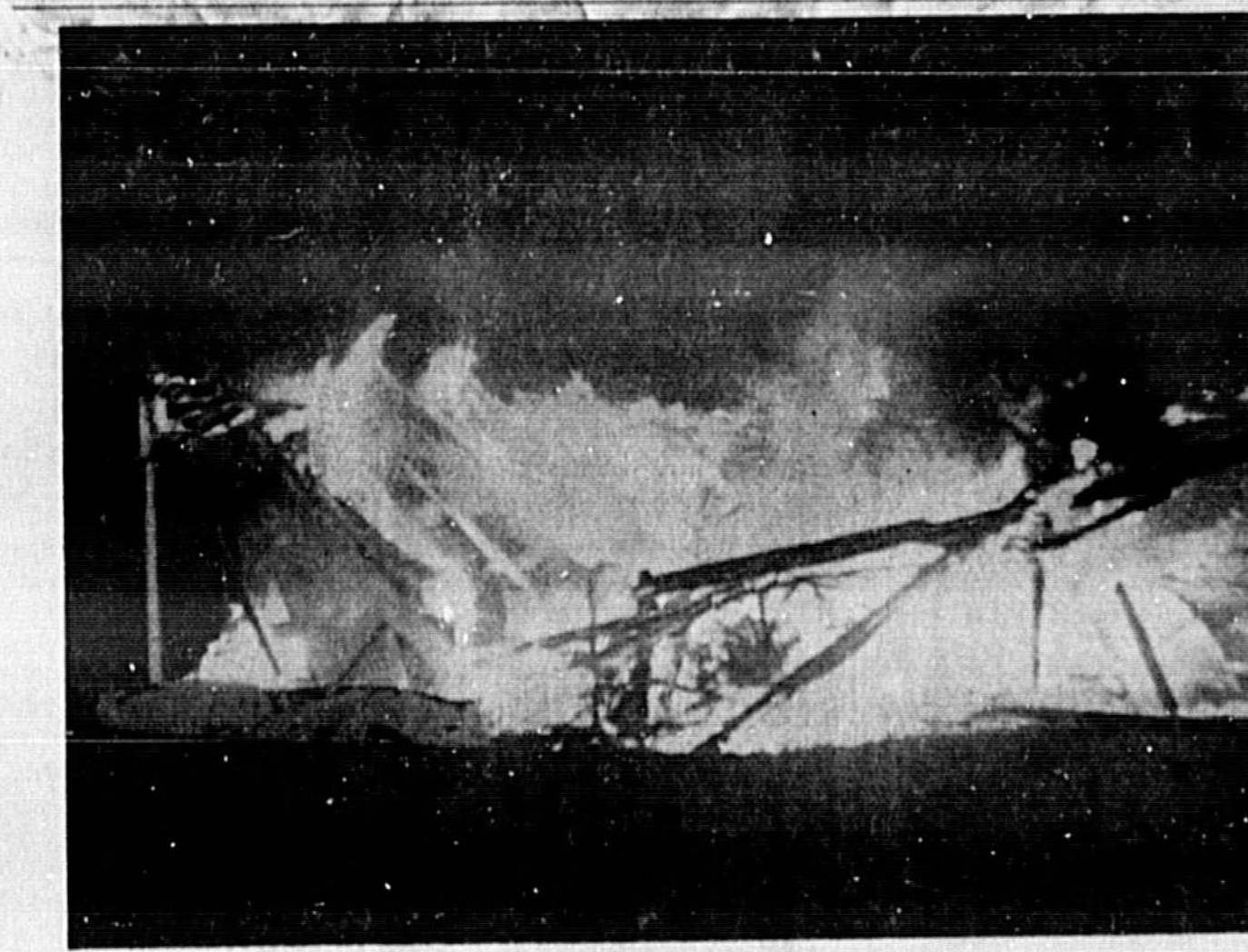
He is described as a male about 5 feet 7 inches tall and weighing between 130 to 140 pounds.

## County Growth Visioned

There will be a lot of construction in Seminole County as the result of recent efforts by the County Commissioners. The year 1970 will see the start of construction of a county court house, an addition to the county jail, a juvenile detention center, a new county agriculture center, and county branch office building in South Seminole. Also a program will be implemented for the temporary retention of mental incompetents.

Bonds for the construction of the county courthouse and the addition of two floors to the county jail already have been validated, said Commissioner Ed Yarborough. Construction should be well underway within the year, he said. Commissioner Greg Drummond is not so optimistic. He foresees hogging down over the bonding. "I doubt if we'll see ground broken this year."

Before construction of the other projects can begin there are several steps to cover: Bonds were validated, plans must be drawn, contracts must be sold. And finally construction may begin.

Retention of mental incompetents may be accomplished in two ways, said Yarborough. The county could provide the hospital with money to add six rooms, or the county and the hospital could buy a nursing home and convert it to a hospital annex for "intermediate care" patients with space for a mental retention facility. "There could be no psychiatric treatment," he emphasized. This facility would merely hold patients temporarily.

The commission is also considering a park-lands acquisition program. They are considering the purchase of large tracts of lands for county parks. The minimum facility would be approximately 1,000 acres.

This program would require a bond issue and the approval of the people at a referendum. It should get on a referendum during 1970.

Roads are an item of primary interest for the commissioners, as they reflect the interest of the county's citizens.

John Alexander, chairman of the commission, explained: "The County has a Comprehensive (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 1)

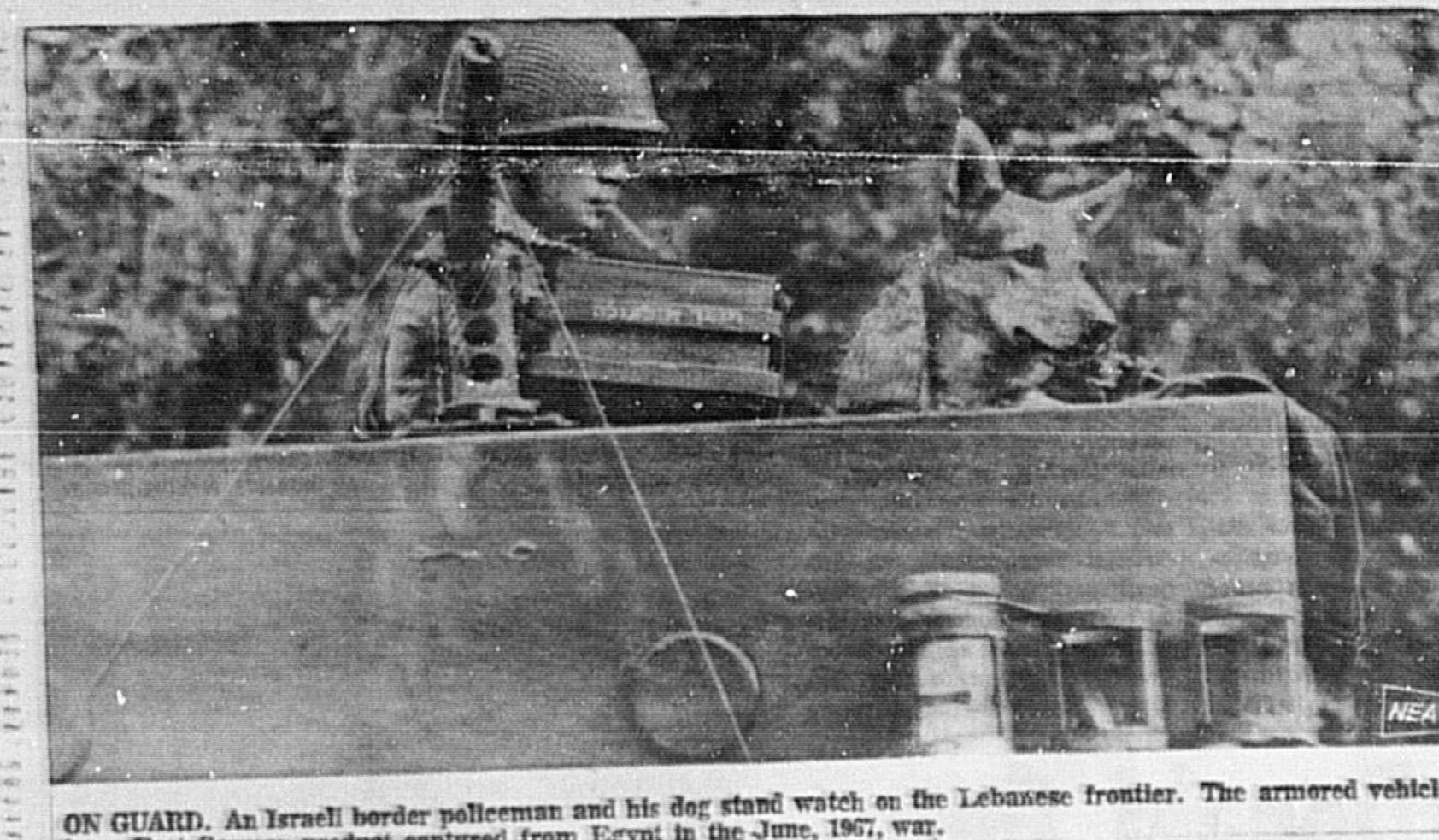

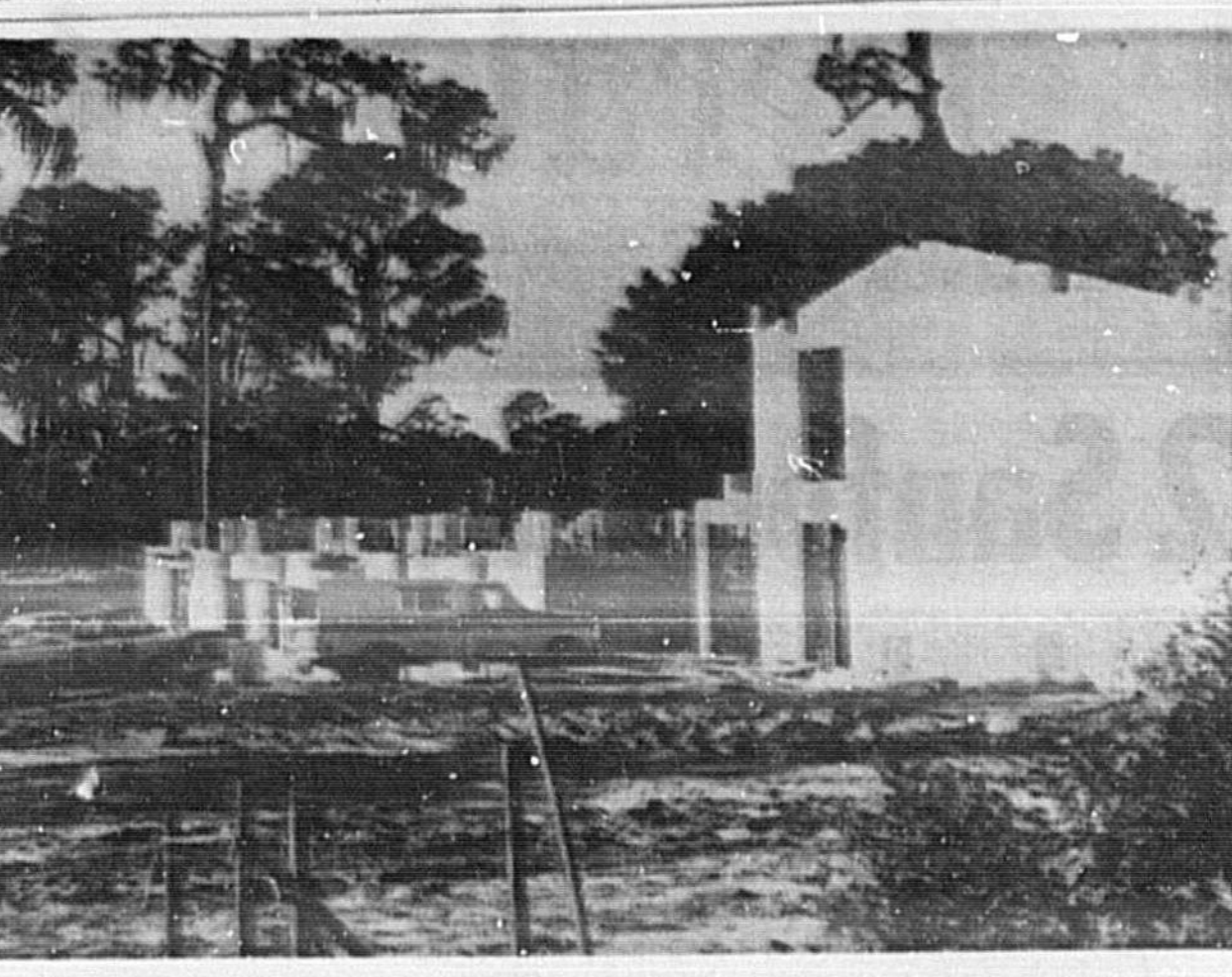

# 'Significant Increase In Fighting' Allies, Foe Clash 3 Times

SAIGON (AP) — Government soldiers and U.S. Marines operating in South Vietnam's northern provinces clashed with enemy troops twice Sunday following a flurry of enemy attacks in the area Saturday night. South Vietnamese troops fought a third battle in the Mekong Delta.  
The U.S. Command reported that Marines and enemy troops exchanged rifle and machine-gun fire 2 1/2 miles south of Da Nang. The Marines were killed and five wounded in the brief fight, and enemy losses were unknown.  
South Vietnamese communications claimed 17 North Vietnamese soldiers were killed in a battle about five miles below the demilitarized zone. Eighteen Viet Cong were reported killed by government troops in scattered fighting along the banks of the Mekong River 80 miles southwest of Saigon.  
Field reports said two government soldiers were killed and 41 wounded in the two battles.  
The U.S. Command reported 10 enemy soldiers were killed and another 100 wounded during the night, but said only four of them caused casualties or damage.  
Three South Vietnamese civilians were killed and seven wounded when three mortar shells fell into the market place of Ben Cat, about 25 miles north of Saigon.  
Military spokesmen said 20 allied troops and civilians were killed and another 100 wounded in more than a score of rocket, mortar and ground attacks Saturday night along the border with Israel.  
The U.S. Command reported "a significant increase in enemy activity" in the northern province of Quang Nam, where half the attacks took place. U.S. troops dead and 25 wounded. Eighteen South Vietnamese civilians and one government soldier were killed and 78 civilians wounded. Almost all the civilian victims lived in two refugee camps shelled by the enemy, spokesmen said.

# Moon Theories Will Be Aired

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Theories may tumble and mysteries dissolve today as 142 scientists start revealing results of the first detailed analysis of rock and soil from the moon.  
The rocks crystallized about four billion years ago, as early as any rocks dated on earth and about the time many believe the universe was formed.  
There was no sign that life had existed on the moon.  
The preliminary tests however, did little to settle the most holy contested debate among scientists: where the moon came from and how it got its distinctive surface features.

# 'Bridge At Chappaquiddick Island' Book Relates A Different Story

BOSTON (AP) — A book published today contends that Mary Jo Kennedy was alone, driving Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's car when it carried her to her death off a bridge on Chappaquiddick Island last summer.  
The book, "The Bridge at Chappaquiddick Island" by Jack Olson, a senior editor of Time, Inc., is being issued by Little Brown & Co. three days before the opening of an inquest into her death.  
Olson, who made investigation on Chappaquiddick and Martha's Vineyard after Miss Kennedy's death, contended Sen. Kennedy alighted from the car after a deputy sheriff approached.  
The writer said Kennedy wanted to avoid embarrassment and misinterpretation of his presence with Miss Koepche, a Washington secretary who had worked for his brother, the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D.N.Y.  
Sen. Kennedy was on a bolt day skiing trip to Vail, Colo., to day and was not immediately available for comment on the Olson book, accounts of which were published in Boston newspapers.  
"It would have been a very logical step," Olson wrote, "for Kennedy to stop the car between the high walls of underbrush, jump out and tell Mary Jo to circle back and pick him up in a few minutes if the policeman did not give chase."  
"It does not take the imagination of a dime novelist to see Mary Jo Koepche at the wheel of the car, struggling to control two tons of equipment on a strange road while her own adrenaline flowed at high pressure."  
Olson theorized that the girl, barely able to see over the dashboard, would have been unable to see that the hump-backed bridge veered to the left as she approached and would have continued on a straight line off into the water.  
Miss Koepche was found dead in the car last July 10, at about the same time Sen. Kennedy was reporting the mishap to Edgartown police and about 10 hours after he said it occurred.  
The senator said in a televised statement that he had been taking Miss Koepche to catch a ferry and had lost his way. He said he struggled free from the auto but was unable to rescue the girl.

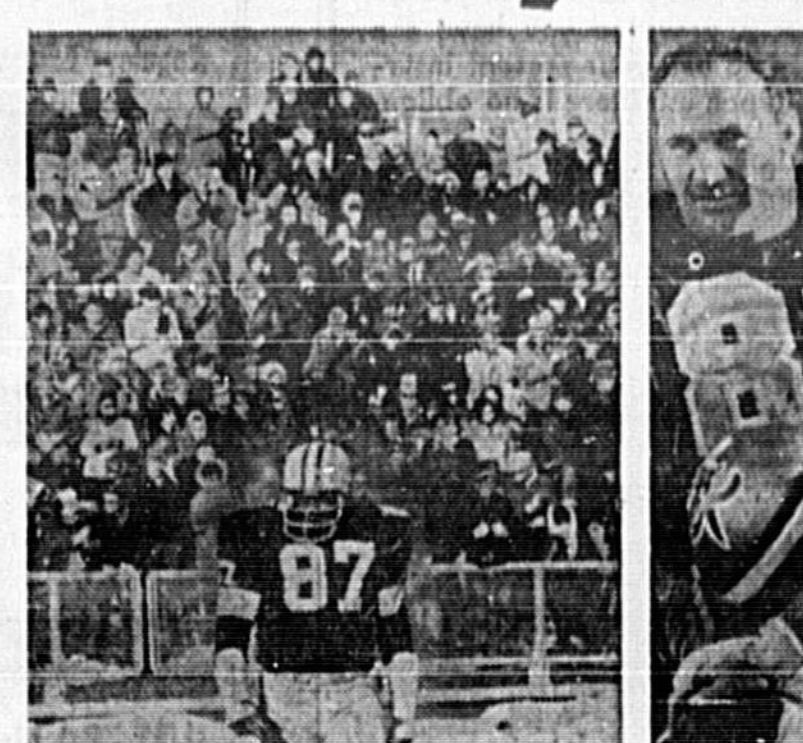

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# Secret Koepchne Inquest Opened

EDGARTOWN, Mass. (AP)—Events surrounding the death of 26-year-old one-time Robert F. Kennedy campaign worker and cast a cloud over the promising political future of the last of the Kennedy brothers.

More than 100 newsmen came to the wintry fastness of this island, picture book village on the island of Martha's Vineyard. But it probably will be some time before the world is told of the story unfolding in the austere courtroom of District Court Judge James A. Boyle.

After a light snowfall had turned Edgartown into a Christmas card scene Sunday, five young women and five men arrived on the island and were quietly driven to private homes to await their appearances in court.

It was a far cry from their joyous arrival on the weekend of July 18. Then they were here to watch Kennedy race in the Edgartown Regatta and to attend a steak cookout in a little rented cottage on Chappaquiddick Island.

The party ended in tragedy when Kennedy who said he and Miss Koepchne were driving to catch the last ferry back to Edgartown, made a wrong turn which led to the accident at treacherous Dike Bridge.

# State Units Ask Budgetary Hikes

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—In a year thick with new laws, state agencies are requesting \$5 for every \$4 they are spending in the current fiscal year.

By percentage, the man reviewing these requests at budget hearings later this week—Gov. Claude Kirk—has submitted one of the biggest proposed increases.

The governor's office is asking a 125 per cent hike, from \$1.49 million to \$3.34 million for the 1970-71 fiscal year beginning July 1.

Presumably, he will approve the request. But then it and other recommendations of the

governor must go to the 1970 Legislature.

State agencies are requesting a total of \$1.35 billion in general revenue fund appropriations for next fiscal year, compared with estimated spending this fiscal year of \$1.01 billion.

Both House Speaker Fred Schultz and Senate President John Mathews, Jacksonville, Democrats and candidates for higher office, have said they do not believe Florida voters will accept new taxes this year.

By percentage, the biggest budget increases are asked by the Transportation Department, 400 per cent; General Services Department, 178 per cent; Air and Water Pollution Control Commission, 138; governor's office,

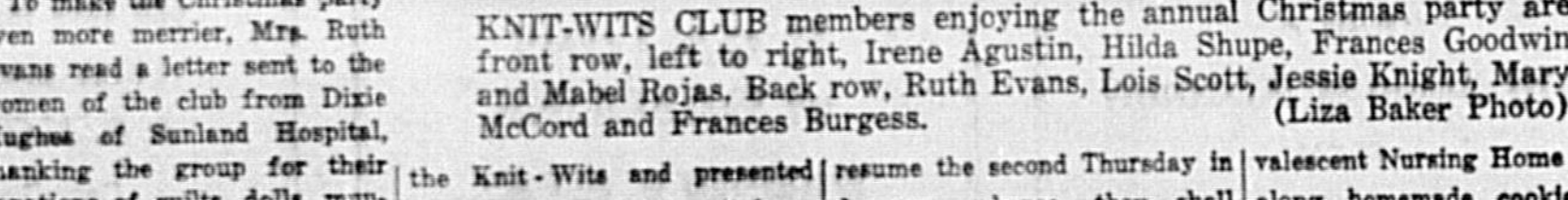

The paper said Eckerd has consulted Florida's top Republican leaders and was expected to make his final decision by the end of this month.

"I'm 99.9 per cent sure I'll run," the paper quoted the 56-year-old millionaire drug store baron as telling close friends and public officials in recent days.

Eckerd is on a skiing vacation in Canada and could not be reached for comment. He lives in Clearwater. Kirk is considered a certain candidate for re-election, although he has not formally announced. The only announced GOP gubernatorial candidate is State Sen. L. A. Bafalis, of Palm Beach.

The Tribune said Eckerd had discussed the possibility of opposing Kirk with Sen. Ed Gurney, GOP Chairman Duke Crittenden, Congressman William C. Eckerd, whose drug store chain now has 166 outlets in four states, including Sanford, has never sought a public office in Florida. He was a strong backer and contributor to President Nixon's successful campaign. Besides the drug store chain, Eckerd heads a corporation that includes a candy making firm, the 18-store Jackson-Byron department store chain, a security firm and a film processing laboratory.

## Cleveland Acting Director 3 Airport Leases Approved

 Sanford Industrial Commission at Monday's meeting approved three leases of airport property and named Airport Manager J. S. (Red) Cleveland as

temporary industrial director until the SIC can decide on a replacement for Don Rathel resigning director.

A St. Louis lease manufacturer proposes to move to the airport subject to approval by the federal government of leasing building 209 at \$1 a square foot and three underground bunkers at \$1,200 a year and land on which to construct a 5,000 square foot building.

Rathel said the firm plans to employ approximately 100 persons in the making of fusing devices.

In approving the conditional lease, W. E. Knowles was the only member voting "nay" and Rathel was instructed to go to St. Louis on Thursday to complete the transaction.

A Fort Lauderdale computer firm was approved for leasing building 207 for \$1,500 a year for three years and \$3,500 each year thereafter. Rathel said this firm, known as Computime, will employ 40 persons in a computer-type operation.

Approximately \$20,000 will be required to renovate the structure, Rathel advised, and indicated the firm would fund the costs.

A third lease to a wood fabrication company from Orlando was delayed until a local offer on former Navy mess hall can be received.

Rathel declined to reveal the name of the firm, but said it would employ 30 persons, and bring \$8,000 a year into airport operation.

Knowles revealed a local firm employing 40 persons was also interested in the building at a rate of 40 cents per square foot as offered the Orange County firm.

Board finally approved having Rathel contact the local man first before considering the Orlando proposal.

Chairman A. K. Shoemaker Jr. said a resolution of the airport and industrial recruitment problems caused by Rathel's departure needed attention. On a motion by Knowles, the group voted Cleveland temporary status to operate the airport after Jan. 15, date of Rathel's departure, until a permanent solution to the problem can be effected.

A meeting was set for Jan. 13 at 7:30 p.m. to discuss what type of industrial recruitment operation would be best for the SIC.

Among those methods to be discussed are employing another director similar in status to Rathel, combining with Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce in an overall county industrial operation, or making the operation a city department.

## Skop Sues Rathel

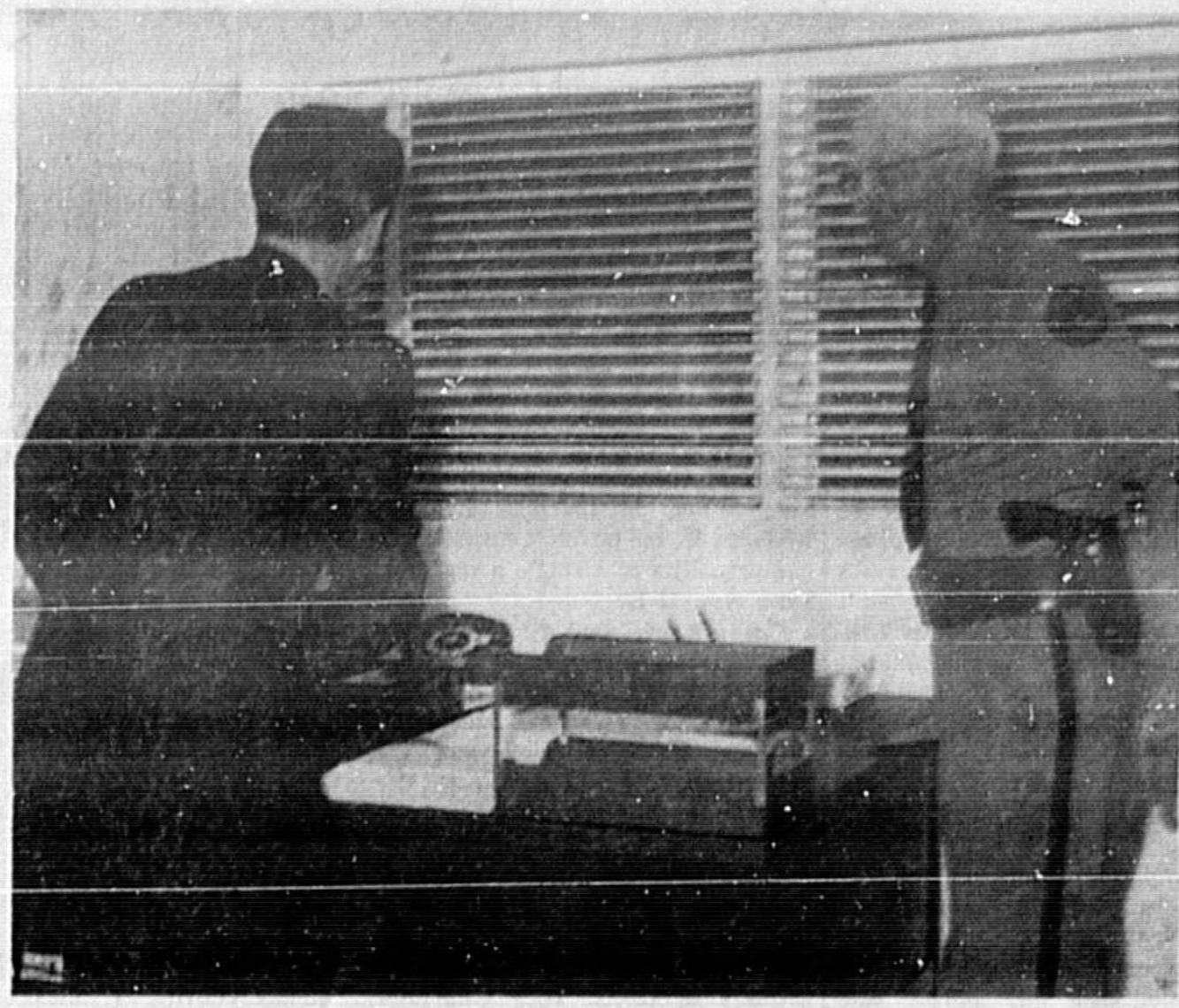
A candidate for mayor in the Dec. 2 Sanford election has filed suit against the director of the Sanford Industrial Commission after an incident in a city night club.

Harry Skop, who lost out in the first round of a three-way battle for mayor to Lee P. Moore and Earl Higginbotham, Monday filed a suit in Circuit Court in excess of \$50,000 damages from Don E. Rathel for an alleged libel, inflicted by Rathel on the plaintiff (Skop).

Skop claims in the document that "on or about Nov. 29, 1969 the Trophy Lounge, Rathel first made an uncomplimentary remark to a companion at the bar then knocked him (Skop) off his chair and beat him until restrained by other patrons of the establishment."

The suit was delivered to Rathel during yesterday's Sanford Industrial Commission board meeting by Constable Fred Galloway.

Rathel took service in his office and attempted to stop a Herald reporter from taking a picture of the procedure by grabbing at the camera and then finally slamming the door in the reporter's face.

## Alexander Renamed Head Of Commission

 John Alexander was re-elected chairman of the Board of Seminole County Commissioners for his sixth consecutive term in the meeting held today with Commissioner Robert Parker casting the only dissenting vote.

Parker explained prior to the vote that he felt Alexander had done an exemplary job but that he was of the opinion that it was time for a change. Parker nominated Commissioner Edward Varborough, who declined due to family misfortune and, in turn, nominated Alexander.

The meeting was primarily devoted to naming of appointments to official boards and committees. Commissioners appointed to custodians of county property included Road Department, Agricultural Center, Drummond; courthouse and jail, Dan Peckham; branch office and inspection stations Parker, and health department, Varborough. Varborough was also named custodian of Big Tree Park.

Drummond was elected representative to the Tri-County Planning Commission and Peckham was elected representative of the commission to the Seminole County Port Authority.

Sanford Airport Manager J. S. (Red) Cleveland yesterday informed a Sanford Industrial Commission meeting that Seminole Junior College athletes now housed at the airport in a former Navy barracks still owe the industrial board \$15,000 of work in return for rent on the base building.

Cleveland said he requested not receiving a reply to a letter sent to the college and he had talked with Coach Joe Sterling about the situation.

Sterling indicated, Cleveland said, the college should receive special consideration from the airport in living at the 4,200 square foot structure.

Cleveland said the property could be rented for 50 cents a square foot and said it would cost the college \$450 to pay off the athletes' accrued work owed the airport.
