It has been estimated it would be cheaper to build a causeway across Lake Monroe than to four-lane Highway 17-92 around the lake . . . and it would reduce the distance by 31/2 miles. The improvement of Sanford Avenue and a causeway across Lake Jessup would place Sanford only 13 miles from Florida Tech.

Right now a dredge is operating in Lake Monroe in the construction of the site for the multi-million dollakefront project. Dredge officials have said that should the causeway projects be ready for commencement on completion of the present job it would mean a savings of \$50 .-000. 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Surveyor On Course To Moon Unions Enjoined U. S. Planes Blast Reds

America's Surveyor spaceeraft - a three-legged robot equipped to send back television pictures of the lunar saded today on an apparently accurate course to-ward a soft landing on the

Scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory signalled the space probe late Monday night to correct its trajectory and assure it of a near-pinpoint landing in a preselected area in the moon's Sea of Storms

JPL took control of the craft after its Monday morning launch from Cape Kennedy. Officials termed the mid-

course maneuver an "apparent success." But they said Surveyor would have to be tracked about 10 hours before they could be certain. When telemetry data indi-

eated the robot had responded to the order, scientists successfully ordered its sun sensor to re-lock on the sun and the star sensor to re-lock on Canopus.

The sensors control two c Surveyor's three axes and prevent the spacecraft from rolling, yawing or pitching. The initial trajectory of the probe, considered unusually accurate, would have landed Surveyor about 250 miles southwest of its target area. If the correction was successful, however, the spacecraft will make its impact some 20 miles north and east of the originally selected target point.

The only possible flaw in the flight, which scientists hope will close the "lunar gap" with the Soviet Union, is that one of Surveyor's two farreaching radio antennas may not have extended as planned. Early today, however, JPL Director William Pickering said he was "very happy about the flight so far and I consider this problem to be very minor."

Pickering said the antenna was still usable and seemed to be operating as well as its mate. "There is no reason to believe this is going to cause any difficulty." he said. By 11:53 p.m. (EDT)
