Open Door In China

Today the relationship between the United States and China is one of the most controversial of world topics. The Published in the China is one of the most controversial of world topics. The Communist government of China regards this country as its most dangerous enemy and no propaganda is too bitter to direct at our offorts in Asia. But if it were not for policies advocated and carried out by the Uunted States, China might not have made the progress it has in the last half century.

In 1900 the nations of the Western world were oulte willing to exploit China for their own profit. Efforts were made to create spheres of influence in China, to partition that country to the extent that it might soon have lost its national identity, On January 2, 1900, Secretary of State John Hay announced to his fellow cabinet members that he had completed negotiations for the Open Door Policy in Chinn, It guaranteed all countries wishing to trade with China equal opportunities to do so, with special favors for none.

Hay's pronouncement was the culmination of one of the most successful diplomatic ventures in our history. It would be hypocritical to say that the United States did not profit from the policy. But the statesmanlike conception of the policy, as it was shaped by Hay, brought free contact with the outside world to China and speeded up the process of modernization.

In these days when the efforts of our diplomats are so frequently frustrated, it is pleasant to recall a diplomatic triumph which brought good to the world as well as to ourselves. The day may come when the door to China will be re-opened.

Exit The Socialists

An old political landmark will be lost if the Socialists stick to the seven to three vote of their National Executive Committee, and put up no more presidential tickets. This is a confession that they are simply getting nowhere. For years they have polled fewer than 100,000 votes, an insignificant record in a country where 63,000,000 turned out to the polls in November. This vote to give up the national fight had the support of Norman Thomas, for many years their presidential nominee, and Darlington Hoopes, who this
