Flag Day Speaker Is Widely Known In South Florida

New Patriotic Song Will Be Played By Orlando Army Band

Frank E. Brigham, who will deliver a patriotic address at the flag day program at the Sanford band shell Sunday at 4:00 P. M., at the band shell, is well known throughout south Florida and has made an enviable record in his activities in the American Legion, Dr. L. T. Doss, exalted ruler of the Elks, said today.

Mr. Brigham, superintendent of public instruction of Polk county, was the first secretary of the Florida Citizens Commission. He has held most of the offices of the Barlow Post of the American Legion and the Barlow Volunteer of the 40 and 8, its district commander of the 1-10 in 1934, and Grand Chief of the 40 and 8 in 1933.

Dr. Doss also announced that the song, "Wave That Flag, America," will be played by the first time in public Sunday at flag day programs throughout the nation. The Orlando Air Base Band will play this number.

Concerning this song, William F. Seal, director of the United States Flag Association, declared recently, "The power of this type of music to arouse the patriotic fervor of our people cannot be overestimated, and we believe that the presentation of this song by bands in connection with flag day exercises will serve an important purpose. We regard it as one of the most inspiring, stirring patriotic airs of this war."

Assisting the Elks in presenting the service will be the Campbell-Lossing Post of the American Legion, the Sons of the Boy Scouts, the Florida Defense Force, Company C, and the Orlando band.

U.S. Merchant Ship Rams And Sinks Sub

HAVANA, June 12, (AP)—A United States merchant ship rammed, shelled and apparently sank a submarine which had machine-gunned her as she was near a Cuban port about 10 days ago, press dispatches from a Cuban coastal city said Thursday.

The submarine surfaced a few miles offshore. Two men came up on deck and immediately began machine-gunning the U.S. ship.

Artillerymen aboard the American ship replied with one of their ships striking the submarine.

The captain then put his ship across the submarine and threatened to sink it with a gun.

Flying Tigers Shoot Down Enemy Planes

Japanese Take Nancheng And 2 Other Chinese Cities In Sweeping Advance

(By Associated Press) The Flying Tigers of the AVG today shot down seven and possibly eight of 18 Japanese planes in an air fight over Kweilin, the capital of the Kwangsi province. Kweilin is an important base for Chinese forces in the south.

It has been under almost daily air bombardment, and the AVG evidently has been assigned to meet this threat.

It was reported that the Japanese have taken Nancheng, and two western Chinese cities in sweeping through the Kwangsi province.

Menacing the Japanese advanced position in western Chekiang province, strong Chinese regular and guerrilla forces have begun attacks in the last few days behind the lines the Japanese pushed in the encirclement of Chusan, Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek's high command announced last night.

A communique declared that Chusan still held out despite the vital Chekiang-Kiangsi railway into the interior of China, and said the Chinese forces behind the Japanese lines were destroying bridges and even recapturing some small villages.

Two fierce fights were reported raging for control of the last 170 miles of the railway still denied to the Japanese despite their hold on both the Hangchow and Nanchang terminals.

One struggle was in the vicinity of Chongshan, 12 miles west of Chusan. The other was spread over a large triangle south of Nanchang.

The Chinese high command acknowledged the invaders had captured Taunglin, 40 miles south of Nanchang, but said they met stiff resistance, which developed into a bitter battle near the town.

Owners should provide the following information when submitting their names: make, length and capacity of vehicle, type of equipment, and whether equipped with a sleeping cab.

WPA Appropriation Gets House Approval

WASHINGTON, June 12, (AP)—A \$334,000,000 appropriation for the WPA was passed by the House last night as administration forces without a determined, two-day attempt to abolish the relief agency or reduce its funds.

As finally passed and sent to the Senate by a roll call vote of 377 to 53, the bill provided for only a fraction of the funds expected to be needed for the year of 1943, when WPA carried three million persons on its rolls and spent \$2,250,000,000.

Allied Agreement Is Seen As Prelude To Second Front Against Germany

(By Associated Press) Marshal Von Bock's Nazi armies are reported attacking in a great new battle around Kharkov today amid indications the zero hour may be near in the long heralded German summer offensive. The Soviet command acknowledged the drives making headway against bitter resistance.

Seventy-fourth Army repulsed Axis assaults in the Crimea. The Reds admitted the Nazis are pushing forward in the Ukraine.

Meantime weather grounded the RAF for the third successive night. The Germans have thrown strong tank and infantry forces against Soviet defense positions on the Kharkov front and fierce battles have developed the government announced.

Soviet fighting continued to rage in the Crimea where the Germans were smashing against the Soviet naval fortress of Sevastopol. The Red army was reported fighting heavy losses on the Crimean peninsula.

In the Crimea, fighting there during the night, Soviet command announced, nearly 10,000 German officers and men were killed.

The communique stated there were no significant changes in the situation, although earlier bulletins had reported a breakthrough which combined with the great battle of the Crimea and the Ukraine brought the war in the Russian front to the highest pitch of the year.

There was much aerial combat in the Black sea and again far to the north of the Arctic. Soviet fighters shot down a number of German bombers on the night of June 11.

In contrast to the pace of the German summer offensive, Russian bulletins indicated the German army was moving only at a snail's pace through the most heavily defended Soviet positions in the Ukraine sector.

The agreement between the United States, Britain and Russia, covering the war and peace, was signed in Moscow.

Applicants For Welfare Aid Are To Present Data

Ration Restrictions Stop Staff From Making Home Calls

Hampered by gasoline and ration restrictions, which prevent the staff from making as many home visits as in the past, the District 12 Welfare Board is asking local applicants for public assistance for their cooperation in securing necessary information to support their applications.

Effective at 12:01 A. M. June 15, the basic unit value of "A-1" and "B-1" cards now in use will be increased from 3 to 6 gallons to provide card holders with sufficient motor fuel to tide them over the two-week extension period.

The temporary plan originally was set to expire June 10. The extension was ordered to permit the training of registrars and ration boards in the new and more stringent system.

Card holders who have exhausted all the units of their ration cards by June 15 must apply to their local ration board for an extra allotment.

OFA said, however, that such an extra ration should be no gasoline needed between July 1 and July 15, since the ration to be allocated by the present card was intended to fill all morning needs to the end of this month.

The new plan which replaces the present temporary plan will apply motor fuel and more gasoline control over the flow of gasoline throughout the Eastern shore area. From June 15, card holders are required to use gasoline for their own use only. A new plan will be put into effect by July 15.

We are making every effort to eliminate all confusion in using the new ration books, and make it as convenient as possible for card holders to obtain their ration.

Gas Ration Is Extended To July 15, Unit Value Doubles

Pipeline Will Move 300,000 Barrels Day

WASHINGTON, June 12, (AP)—The 550-mile pipeline approved by the War Production Board will be government owned, WPA officials said yesterday, and its capacity may be stepped up ultimately from 300,000 to 450,000 barrels a day.

Cost of the line from Longview, Texas, to the vicinity of Salem, Ill., is expected to be \$25,000,000 or \$40,000,000, it was stated, but that estimate may be a "little high."

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The Russian Treaty

Great Britain and Russia have signed a treaty not only for the full prosecution of the war against Germany but also for the establishment and maintenance of peace after the war is over. Although the United States is not a party to this treaty, there is no doubt that its interests are in strict accord with it and that it would also be a signatory were it not for the fact the President is not empowered by the Constitution to make treaties.

Even so, the establishment and maintenance of a working agreement with Russia, the terms of which are not clear, but which involves lend-lease aid for the present and post-war economic co-operation. This seems to be about as far as the President can go toward active participation in the Russo-British treaty without the consent of the Senate.

There is no longer any question that the present war resulted very largely from a failure among the non-aggressive nations of the world to co-operate in each other's behalf and particularly from the suspicions existing between Soviet Russia and the democratic nations. Russia is the largest and strongest land power in the world and no agreement of any value could be consummated which did not take her into consideration.

Because, now, under the stress of war, we have reached such an agreement, it is not surprising that all the non-aggressive nations of the world are looking to the Russian practices, or that they are going to adopt our form of government. It simply means that we recognize our need of each other and the right of each of us to manage our affairs in our own way.

There may be some objection among arch-conservatives to our lending Russia billions of dollars' worth of supplies and equipment on the grounds that the loan will never be repaid. But it seems to us as long as the planes and tanks are being used against the Germans by Russian soldiers who are sacrificing their lives to stop the Nazis dead in their tracks, no further repayment is necessary.

If, in addition, the Russians renounce territorial ambitions against Finland and other Baltic states, provide for religious freedom among their own people and give them a fair degree of political freedom, it seems to us as long as the war is being fought against the Nazis, no further repayment is necessary.

St. Pete's Old Folk

Kidding St. Petersburg is a pastime editors in Florida and other states like to engage in once in a while. Some how or other they have got the impression that this is an old folks' town.

Well, we don't mind the kidding. It's good publicity, and we hope never to see the day when they stop talking about St. Petersburg. Let's look for a moment at the fact which has more to do with the case than will at first appear.

The number of St. Petersburg men already in the nation's armed forces, though not officially available, has been estimated at around 2,000. In view of this city's record in the last war, they may be pretty sure that isn't a substantial over-estimate.

The armed forces aren't recruiting any old folks. We suggest, therefore, that those who laugh at St. Petersburg as an "old folks' town" check up on their own rate of service men to population. If it is larger than ours, they have a right to call us that.

But if Miami or Jacksonville or Tallahassee (for example) cannot match that ratio, then St. Petersburg has a right to call Miami or Jacksonville or Tallahassee for example an "old folks' town."

A city is as young as it acts—St. Petersburg Independent.

For some time now, as one government department announced we would have to submit to gasoline rationing and another said we wouldn't, as one federal bureau insisted there is an acute rubber shortage and another said there wasn't, as one government agency said we would get three gallons a week and another insisted we would get five, it has been perfectly evident to the average citizen that what was needed in Washington was a coordinator of information.

One hesitated to make this suggestion, though, in the face of the government's elaborate new Office of Government Reports and its equally new \$500,000 office building. Such a suggestion might have been interpreted as an interference with the Office of Government Reports, there is the Office of Emergency Management, and the Foreign Information Service of the Office of Coordinator of Information, not to mention the various publicity departments of each and every department of government service.

What was needed obviously was not just a coordinator, but a coordinator of coordinators. And this, it seems, is just what Elmer Davis of radio fame has been appointed to do. He will have charge of all the information given out by all branches of the United States government having to do with the conduct of the war. When a ship sinking off the East Coast is announced by the Navy department, he will see to it that it is not contradicted by the War Department. And when a blackout is held in Los Angeles he will make sure that it is not given out as a "test" and "real thing" at one and the same time by two different government agencies.

Mr. Davis is well qualified for the job. He is a veteran New York Times man where truth and accuracy are not only a matter of conscience but also a matter of business. After the somewhat stilted and flamboyant broadcasts of some of his competitors, his frank, almost nasal twang has come to be a most welcome relief to a public which wanted to know the facts but didn't have time to learn them. Mr. Davis has given the public more information in his five minute broadcast than most folks get out of a half hour of wordy broadcasts.

We don't know what Mr. Davis will be paid on his new job, probably \$7,500 or \$10,000 a year. But he gives up a \$50,000 a year job to do it.

One Extreme to Another

It never rains but it pours. While we were up to our eyes in war production and rationing to stop Hitler in Europe and Hirohito in the Far East, nature opened her eyes in spring offensive on the home front. Hurricanes, droughts, ice jams, floods and forest fires, plus a disastrous mine explosion, brought death and suffering in 18 states from coast to coast. Japanese Make 25 Mile Gain In China Province

Chinese Urge Major Attack By United Nations On Japan; Allies Spike Raid

(By Associated Press) The Japanese penetrated Kiangsi province in China 25 miles today as the Chinese urged a major Pacific attack on Japan.

Allied airmen today spiked the third attempt in 3 days by the Japs to raid Darwin, Australia.

Two powerful Japanese columns, applying a nut-cracker movement, the ill-equipped Chinese troops in Chekiang and Kiangsi Provinces, had driven last night to within 25 or 100 miles of a junction on the vital Nanchang-Hankow Railway.

One column of perhaps 60,000 men, which overran Northern Chekiang Province south of Shanghai last month, has made steady progress into bordering Kiangsi Province, a Chinese communiqué acknowledged.

Heavy fighting is in progress on the Chekiang-Kiangsi border in the area south of Kiangsi, southwest of Yushan, and at the outskirts of Kwangtung.

Communications said, fighting in which both sides suffered heavy casualties, was said to be raging between Nanchang, which the Japanese entered Saturday night.

Another column believed to be about equal strength had driven southeast from Nanchang, Japan's Kiangsi base, at least as far as Tengpo, 100 miles from Nanchang, and about the same distance from Kwangtung.

The Greek government today charged the Nazis with the slaying of hundreds of Greeks in an attempt to control sabotage.

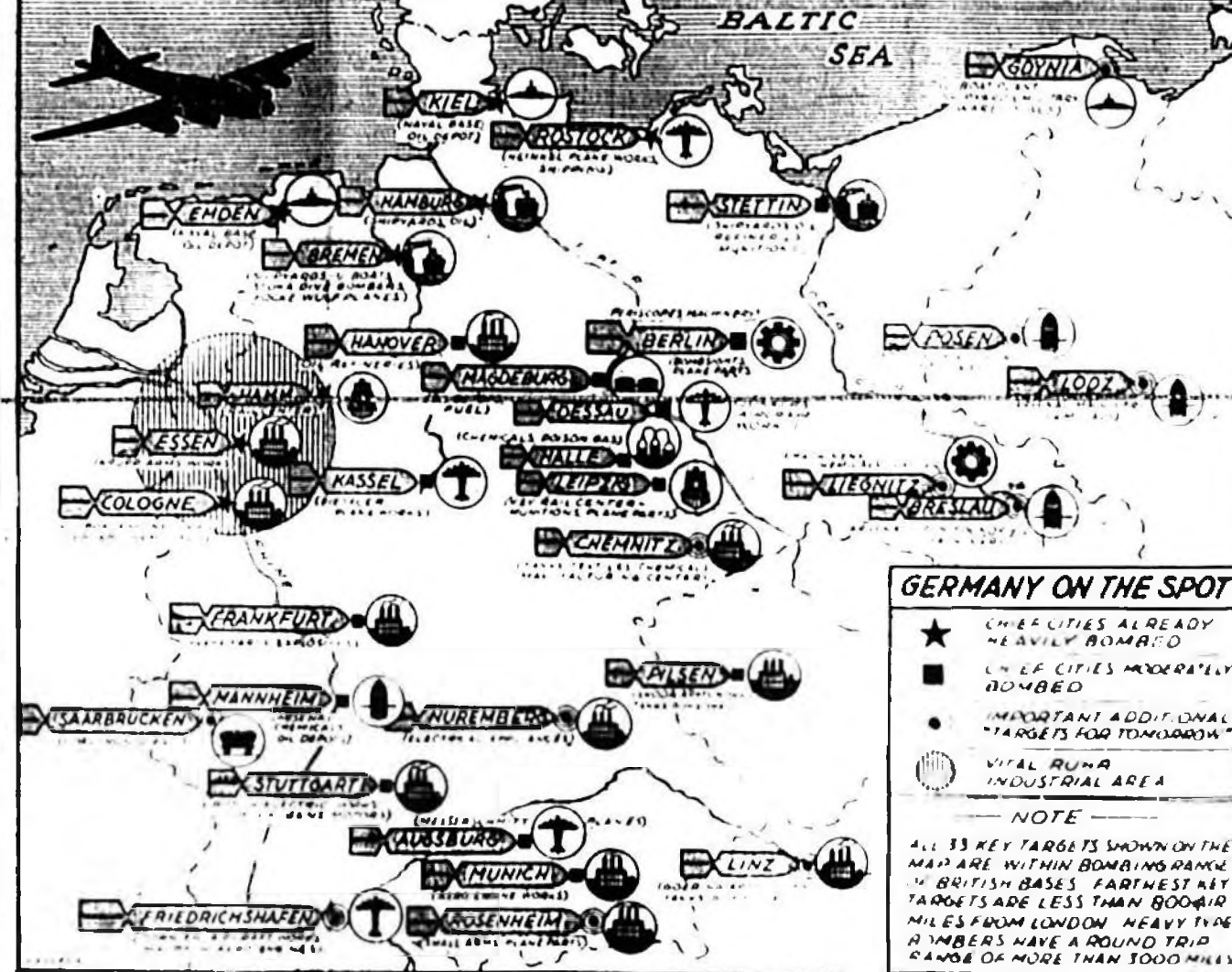

Suggestion Is Made To Flash Lights As Signals For Blackout

A seemingly pertinent suggestion concerning a method of signaling in regard to blackouts has been received by the editor of The Herald from Irving Feinberg.

Feinberg suggested that the flashing of lights by the power plant should be used in conjunction with sirens to help inform the public of blackouts. Mr. Feinberg submitted the following:

"I have no criticism to make regarding the present air-raid warning and blackout set-up as it is operated here in Sanford, but I do feel I have a suggestion which would clear up a lot of difficulties encountered at the present time with inhabitants on the outskirts of town being unable to hear the warning sirens when their radio, fan, or other electrical noise-makers are in operation."

"I feel that if, incident with the alert, blackout and all-clear signals, the power plant controlling Sanford's electricity would blink all lights a definite number of times, it would aid greatly in making Sanford's future blackouts 100 percent perfect."

"Lights could be blinked three times for the alert, five for the blackout and two for the all-clear. The current should be off from two to five seconds on each break so that it is definite and noticeable."

"In this way individuals listening to radios and those in rooms with fans or other electrical disturbances in operation would easily be able to detect the signals even if their lights were not on at that time turning off the noise-makers would very probably allow the sirens to be heard. Persons here of hearing would have to trust in the messages conveyed them by the blinks."

"The method of signaling, in conjunction with the sirens, would in most cases clear up the individual's doubts as to the particular warning the sirens were heralding—that is, alert or blackout."

"I am submitting this suggestion to you to see with what approval it meets from the people of Sanford."
