papers which may help to prove residence in the state for five years of the past nine and for the year immediately preceding the filing of application. If no such papers are available, the applicant should be prepared to furnish the welfare visitor with names of persons who can make affidavit relative to his length of residence.

The requirement in relation to aid to dependent children is one year's residence in the state prior to the filing of application on the part of children included in the application.

"Applicants," Mrs. Holler continued, "may help establish their need by bringing in property deeds, insurance papers, bank statements and other information which would enable the visitor to gain an accurate knowledge of their circumstances. In this connection, I feel that it is informative to state that United State and Federal laws assistance is given by the Welfare Board only to those who are in need, and then only in the amount which represents the difference between their income and their reasonable living expense. In determining grants, consideration, of course, must also be given to the amount of money available and the number of eligible."

MANHATTAN

NEW YORK, June 12, (WW)—The man was dead all right. As dead as anyone in this world will ever be. People who saw the thing say he fell against a mail box, which arrested his fall momentarily, and then his body slowly slid down to the pavement and straightened out.

Who was he? That isn't important. It has no bearing on this story. The important thing is to show you how, and in what way, war has come to at least one little suburban center on the fringe of the metropolitan district.

This little center is about ten or twelve miles from Manhattan, the name of the local undertaker, the name of the village has been named after the man who died. It is his chore to pick up bodies, if and when they fall.

So the townspeople who were on the street, which was not far from the railroad station, and saw the thing happen ran to a nearby telephone and telephoned this undertaker. "There's a man down here on the sidewalk," they said. "He's in front of the drug store." He's dead. Come and get him.

The undertaker thought that over for a moment. "Who is he?" he wanted to know.

"Nobody knows," was the answer. "He's nobody, a just drifting on the beach. He just fell dead. You'll have to come and get him."

The undertaker thought that over too. Then he said, "I'm sorry, but I can't do it. My tires are nearly worn through. They won't let me retreat. I can't take my ambulance on a call like that. If I had tires, I wouldn't mind."

"But what are we gonna do?" "Call the borough. They've got an ambulance go get him."

So they called the borough. No, goodness gracious, no; what do you think this is? Do you want us to wear out our tires?"

"The hell with your tires?" They were getting mad by this time. "You gonna let this man lie here all day?"

That got the borough to think. The borough put in a fast call for the reluctant undertaker. "Why don't you get that guy?"

"In your ambulance?" "Certainly not. Use your own."

"Listen," said the undertaker. "I've been begging for retreats for weeks. They won't even listen to me. You fix it or I can retreat my tires, and I'll be glad to get him."

So the borough went to the retreat guy and explained the situation, and the retreat permit was granted. Shortly after this an ambulance drove up to a point in front of the drugstore, hard by the railroad station, and picked up the last earthly remains of the guy whose name was probably Joe. Thus war has made itself felt in at least one hamlet along the eastern seaboard.

to a new eastern front in Europe to relieve German pressure on Russia as more troops and planes landed in Ireland and Britain today. The Chinese press asked for a Russian attack on Japan.

Identical government announcements in Washington and London yesterday, dealing with the military fact of the conversation, Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov to both capitals, said without any elaboration, "Full understanding was reached with regard to the urgent tasks of creating a second front in Europe in 1942."

Many seasoned observers, considering all the known angles of the situation, concluded this morning that the United States and Britain had promised to bend every energy toward smashing this year the ships, the planes, the guns and the men which they must have for continental invasion, but that there was as yet no positive assurance that this invasion would begin before Jan. 1, 1943.

The course of Russia's own summer battles may bear more heavily than anything else on the final decision.

Britain and Soviet Russia made a historic pledge to keep an armed peace against Germany after the Nazis are beaten in this war and have renounced territorial greed or meddling in the internal affairs of other nations. Russia's major concession, reportedly made at the suggestion of U. S. Ambassador John G. Winant, was said authoritative, to have been a backing down on her previous demands that she get back her post-war Baltic frontier, including Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

Florida Pilot With RAF Sinks 2 Nazi Ships Off Holland

Red Fleet Comes To Aid Of Sevastopol; Nazis Report Tri- umphs At Kharkov

LONDON, June 15, (AP)—An American volunteer with the RAF, Squadron Leader W. B. Cooper, St. Petersburg, Fla., today was credited with sinking two German supply ships off the Holland coast while piloting an American-made bomber. He missed only one ship.

(By Associated Press)

The Russian Black Sea fleet was reported today to have brought aid to the hard-pressed defenders of Sevastopol, laying down a barrage and taking a heavy toll of the Axis assault forces. The Germans reported the capture of several positions south of Sevastopol and said the remnants of the beaten army were destroyed near Kharkov with 25,000 Soviet prisoners.

Meantime, it was reported that American-made bombers sank two of a three-ship Axis convoy today off the coast of Holland. The RAF raided Holland and France.

Norwegian uprisings were reported against Quisling followers. The Soviet high command said that on the Khar'kov front, German troops were being repulsed.

German planes tried five times to raid Marseilles Saturday, the high command said, but only a few reached the town through which flew Allied supplies moving in by the southern rail.

Eight raiders were shot down in six battles and by anti-aircraft gunners, while military objectives were smashed. Some casualties among civilians were acknowledged.

The high command said 137 German planes were destroyed over the Russian front last week, against 185 lost by the Red air force.

Fighting of more or less local nature raged in many sectors of the front, the communique said. It reported 20 German transport lorries, 15,000 tons sunk by Soviet warships in the Baranto Sea of the Far North.

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21 U. S. Pilots Land In Turkey And Are Interned

ANKARA, June 15 (AP)—Twenty-one United States airmen whose bombers made forced landings in Turkey after reported German attacks on Black Sea bases (and possibly Rumanian oil fields) gave an account of their sensational flight yesterday to U. S. Ambassador Laurence A. Steinhardt.

The ambassador interviewed the airmen, who have been interned since they landed in Turkey, and supplied them with money, drinks and cigarettes.

Both American and British authorities declined any statement concerning the flight by the Americans (who were reported to have raided Bessaa and Nikolayev, German occupied Russian ports on the Black sea, and perhaps the nearby Rumanian oil fields).

The airmen expressed appreciation at the Turkish government, and receiving from the Turkish government. It was understood they probably would be allowed out of internment on parole soon.

The Americans were in four bombers, each carrying a crew of seven. Some were reported slightly wounded.

The planes were forced down last Friday, a week after the United States declared war on Rumania.

Officially, all information regarding the flight was to be kept secret.

They were flying over Turkish territory, where they came from or where they were going.

Mr. Goode said declaring that training in the use of firearms provides confidence which is very desirable in case of emergency which are liable to arise at any time.

Mrs. Sidney Vihlen, Mr. Miller's sister, received this communication from her brother a few days ago. "Safe and well. Don't worry." Since then she has received two telegrams confirming the note and mentioning his part in the battle.

A pharmacist wrote first class, Mr. Miller has been in the Navy for five years. When he left for his tour of duty in December, starting the war he was on his way to Honolulu, aboard an oil

tanker, to meet the Lexington. At present he is at San Diego, Calif.

The note that Mrs. Vihlen received crumpled and torn, was written May 14, about 10 days after the Lexington went down. Details of his escape were not revealed. The Navy released the information on the sinking of the big aircraft carrier last Friday and announced that the loss of life was relatively small. It was reported that 15 jagged ships were sunk and 20 damaged. Nothing but sea rubber in 10,000-ton carriers, were the destroyer Sims and the Neerabe, a tanker.

Mr. Miller graduated from Semnole High School in 1935. His mother, Mrs. Jessie Miller, and another sister, Mrs. Harold Powers, are at present residing in Sanford.

Braves Of Boston Are Shooting For Home Run Crown

NEW YORK, June 15. (Special)—The Boston Braves entered June with a bright chance for a record never reached by Braves, Doves, Bees, or any Boston National League entrant of this century—the home run championship.

George Stallings' Braves of 1914—the greatest Braves to date—surged from last place as of July 19 to the pennant and the world championship in 4 straight games. Casey Stengel's Braves' chances to beat that are slim. But the homer crown? It's right there for them. And even the '14 Braves couldn't win that.

Old Casey's Braves headed West for their June trip with 35 home runs racked up, leading their nearest rivals in the round-trip department by exactly a half-dozen. The Giants had 29, Reds 28.

A home run championship for Boston will set a 20th century record. Maybe an all-time Boston National League record, but that's hard to establish, because home runs didn't figure important enough to be listed in league records in the 90's, when Hugh Duffy hit 438 and Frank Seale's Boston as a team won five pennants in eight years. Not back in 1877 and 1878, when Harry Wright of the original Cincinnati Red Stockings of 1869, was manager of two Boston pennant teams and his brother George, the superstar of ancient baseball, was his shortstop.

This year the remarkable Braves are shooting the works. Their battery of Jim Tobin and Ernie Lombardi, all by themselves, personally accounted for 11 of the 35 accrued by the Hub Tribe up to June. Last year the Braves all season tallied 68 and ranked last in the league.

There's part of the answer to the way the wild Braves are playing. Watch them swinging for the ramparts instead of bunting their runs around the bases.

Over the Memorial Day week and four homers sprouted from the bat of Max West, siege-gun No. 1 of the Braves, old-time National League hero of the 1940 All-Star Game with his homer that beat the American League in St. Louis. The "Big M" had a dozen for his entire 1941 season. His holiday splurge hints that in the Braves drive for high-percentage rating in the entire loop, West will be a prime factor.

In picking up power, percentage and prestige this Spring, the Braves also picked up a pestilence. Namely, a Brooklyn jinx. The champion Dodgers went west holding an edge over every rival club except the St. Louis Cardinals. The edge was wafer thin over the Giants but over Boston—eight to 0! Eight times Dodgers and Braves have met. Eight times Dodgers have won the game. And, stepping on the turf for their first western game, the Braves were exactly eight games behind Brooklyn in the standing of clubs!

What are the wild Braves saying? "Come on, gang, let's get those homers in Brooklyn!"

Large Gallery For Golf Tourney Seen

CHICAGO, June 15. (AP)—The largest galleries in golf history are expected to stream over the Ridgemoor course this week during the Hale America Tournament.

Howard Davis, Ridgemoor's pro, Sunday estimated a turnout of 50,000 spectators for the four-day meet which starts Thursday. With admission tickets being grabbed for \$4 apiece, the wartime national open may produce almost \$200,000 for navy relief and United Service Organizations. The field consists of 102 professionals and amateurs, 25 of whom were exempt from qualifying. If the winner comes from the non-exempt group, he will have played 162 holes—the toughest golfing grind in history. The total includes five rounds of qualifying trials plus the tournament's 72 holes of medal play.

(By Associated Press) The Japanese penetrated Kiangsi province in China 25 miles today as the Chinese urged a major Pacific attack on Japan.

Allied airmen today spiked the third attempt in 3 days by the Japs to raid Darwin, Australia.

Two powerful Japanese columns, applying a nut-cracker movement, the ill-equipped Chinese troops in Chekiang and Kiangsi Provinces, had driven last night to within 75 or 100 miles of a junction on the vital Nanchang-Hankow Railway.

One column of perhaps 60,000 men, which overran Northern Chekiang Province south of Shanghai last month, has made steady progress into bordering Kiangsi Province, a Chinese communique acknowledged.

Heavy fighting is in progress on the Chekiang-Kiangsi border in the area south of Kiangshian southwest of Yushan, and at the outskirts of Kwangtung.

Communications and street fighting, in which both sides suffered heavy casualties, was said to be raging within Kwangtung, which the Japanese entered Saturday night.

Another column believed to be about equal strength had driven southeast from Nanchang, Japan's Kiangsi base, at least as far as Tengpo, 100 miles from Nanchang, and about the same distance from Kwangtung.

U. S. Fliers Are Active In Middle East

600 Nazis On Bryansk Front Are Killed; Germans Slay Hundreds Of Greeks

(By Associated Press) The British today announced the United States flying forces are supporting the Allied operation in the central and eastern Mediterranean theaters in the past few days. This apparently is linked to reports of American bombers landing in Turkey, presumably after raids against the Axis in Roumania and elsewhere in the middle east.

A Red sunrise offensive on the Bryansk front today slaughtered 600 Nazis and captured more. Russia also claimed the Nazis were repulsed in the Kharkov and Sevastopol sectors.

The Greek exile government today charged the Nazis with the slaying of hundreds of Greeks in an attempt to control sabotage.

Meanwhile, Rome announced the loss of a heavy cruiser, but worse hit in the Mediterranean. Russian defenders smashed 100 German tanks and thwarted enemy assaults in a great and continuing battle on the Kharkov front yesterday, while Sevastopol's stalwart defense stiffened against the Russians reported today.

The massive clash of men and machines in the Kharkov area was reported in the midnight Soviet communique after earlier reports had indicated a momentary lull in the furious German offensive there.

The communique credited the Soviet air force with destroying or damaging 100 German tanks in various sectors on Sunday, along with destruction of 220 trucks, loads of Nazi troops and supplies, and an enemy transport and a number of motorboats, presumably around Sevastopol.


