sent her the orchids she's wearing. There were plenty of brunettes and plenty of orchids. But after trotting up and down the aisles, I decided one brunette had brighter eyes than the rest. I sidled up and said, "Mrs. Vandenberg, it was you who was here?" I whispered. She whispered back, "Piloting four constituents around. O-o. How I wish I were in the press box with you."

That's the way they both started; behind typewriters. He was an editor in Grand Rapids at 22. She was a reporter in Chicago. His father a harness-maker. They are both of English-Dutch extraction. She is from Fort Wayne, Ind. Her mother hoped she'd be a pianist. He is from a small Michigan town where the depression of the 90's put his harness-maker father on the skids.

When the father died he made the son promise he'd always be a Republican. Now the Republicans (some of them) have him labeled the party's white hope for 1940. Both Vandenberg went to Ann Arbor. They met at a J-hop. "Look out," said her escort. "Arthur's engaged." However, he did take her dancing. They were graduated and forgot each other. She taught in Saginaw. Then went to work for the Chicago charity. He went to Grand Rapids and entered newspapers. She was "Sally Joy Brown" after two years of charity work, she landed on the Chicago Tribune as "Sally Joy Brown."

There are just two things to which Vandenberg will devote time outside his work—his notebooks containing newspaper clippings about his speeches, and to Washington dinner parties for celebrities. He has to party. He's on the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee where much business is done over caviar. She buys his clothes. She does the rest. She buys his clothes by dint of taking old ones down and having them duplicated. He never grumbles, just as they're blue. He's worn black shoes, same last, for 20 years.

She keeps the check book balanced and reminds him to get haircuts, keeps tabs on the three children. There are grandchildren. Vandenberg's son is his secretary. In recent years they've both started to count calories. But that rather hurts the kitchen-artist in Mrs. Vandenberg. She is famous in Washington for her snails and dinners, and her corn beef hash, spaghetti and Spanish rice. Now he's cut out the spaghetti and rice. Fattening.

They're both straight and middle-aged slim. He's taller, with a round, smooth face, glasses, amused brown eyes. His hair is leaving him. She's compact, with an oval face framed in wavy brown hair and a jolly mid-western simplicity that has never rubbed off in the Washington glitter.

They're surrounded with plenty of glitter because he's on the Foreign Relations Committee and that means dining with diplomats. They had two of those prize invitations to the British party for the King and the Queen. She looked stunning in a big red picture hat. He likes her in blue. He passed up his tails for that party. Put on a lounge suit to show how American he is.

They Play Croquet at their summer home on Lake Michigan where they play croquet, swim, read. She gets tired of "hey-ed up-ness" of Washington. She likes to remember their early married days when they got so serious reading about Alexander Hamilton. He felt a book about Hamilton coming on, cleared a desk in the living room. She kept the three children quiet. Weeks passed. He went to New York with the manuscript, which he "sold it. They want another." She read the book and she chases Maggie out and browns some corn beef hash for the Lord of the Manor.

4 Die In Auto, Train Accidents In January TAMPA, Feb. 8—During the month of January four people were killed, thirty-two injured and eighty-four involved in train and motor vehicle accidents in Florida, A. J. Frank, director of the Florida Safety Council, reported today.

In reading over the reports of such accidents furnished by the Florida Clipping Service, it is regrettable to note, Frank said, that accidents caused by motorists running into trains are not limited to any one section of the state. Miami, Tampa, Jacksonville and other parts of the state are represented in the reports. The most regrettable part is that in each accident the cars were loaded with passengers, and the majority of the accidents occurred during the daylight hours.

Frank stated that in his opinion many of these accidents were caused by drivers keeping their car windows closed during the cold weather and were unable to hear the train's warning whistles, and he urged all motorists to observe the law which requires all commercial vehicles, trucks, buses and private cars to come to a full stop before crossing railroad tracks. If this law is observed, he said, this type of accident will be eliminated as trains can not leave the tracks to hit the automobiles.

Blonde Fails To Halt Marriage Of Ludwig Lewisohn

BALTIMORE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The tearful plea of a comely blonde who dramatically entered a temple to proclaim herself the "wife, muse and soul" of Ludwig Lewisohn and demand that "this wedding must stop" failed Tuesday to halt the marriage of the Jewish author to tall, dark-eyed Edna Manley.

Lewisohn and Miss Manley stood before Rabbi Israel, ready to take their nuptial vows, when Miss Thelma Spear rushed into Har Sinai temple, accompanied by her attorney, Bernard Sanders, and a blue-eyed, six-year-old boy, whom she said she bore to Lewisohn.

With artistry attesting her years as a concert soprano, she asserted: "This wedding must not take place. I have been his wife, his muse, his soul!"

The gray-haired, 55-year-old writer and his 31-year-old fiancée, former Rochester, N. Y. newspaperman, slipped out of the room to avoid the unexpected commotion caused by the "other" woman.

Attorneys went into a lengthy tussle with Rabbi Israel, heard 26-year-old Miss Spear's tearful assertion she had been Lewisohn's common-law wife for 16 years and listened to the reading of an inscription from one of his books recognizing her as "my wife and mother of my son."

But this caused only a temporary halt in the ceremony. Miss Spear made her plea and departed to a hotel with her son, Jimmy Lewisohn and his fiancée stood before Rabbi Israel again, and took the wedding vows and caught a train to New York.

Conversations Relate To Sound Economic System, Reduction Of Arms, Hall Says

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull announced today that diplomatic conversations of an "informal character" have been commenced with neutral governments in view of the "urgent desire of all neutral nations" for a general restoration of world peace.

"We developed the conversations to involve as plan or plan not are in the nature of preliminary inquiries relating to a general international economic system and world-wide reduction of armaments."

"He said the conversations were conducted in a friendly and confidential manner," Secretary Hull announced.

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Battle Of Withlacoochee Described By Speaker At Founders Day Lunch

Appropriate Ceremony Marks Planting Of Magnolia Tree In Fort Mellon Park In Honor Of James L. Moughton

An outstanding episode in the Seminole Indian War, "The Battle of Withlacoochee," and one in which Capt. Charles Mellon, founder of Melbourne which later became Sanford, was cited for valor in action, was described by Samuel E. Cobb, of Washington, D. C., director of National Archives, at the Founders Day luncheon held in the Mayfair Hotel yesterday afternoon.

The occasion commemorating the 100th anniversary of the establishment of Fort Mellon on the shores of Lake Mellon which is generally regarded as the beginning of Sanford, was under the auspices of the Florida Historical Society and the Florida College faculty members.

Prior to the beginning of the luncheon, a tree was planted in Fort Mellon Park in honor of Superintendent of Parks James L. Moughton with appropriate ceremonies.

Mr. Cobb was introduced by Prof. A. J. Hanna of Winter Park, president of the Florida Historical Society and Rollins College faculty member.

"The planting of the Magnolia tree in Fort Mellon Park in honor of Mr. Moughton was also part of the anniversary celebration and in presenting the tree to the City Parks Superintendent, Mrs. E. J. Johnson, regent for the D. A. R. chapter, commended him for the valuable services he has rendered in the beautification of the city and in closing said: "May this tree grow and thrive as a token of the esteem with which we hold you."

City Commissioner Edward Higgins who spoke briefly at the ceremony declared: "It gives me great pleasure to publicly praise the work of such a valuable employee of the City of Sanford. He paid tribute to the "fine" work Mr. Moughton has done in the beautification of Sanford and asserted that his retiring efforts are worthy of the praise of every citizen."

The planting of the Magnolia tree was preceded by a presentation of a check for \$100.00 to the City of Sanford by the Florida Historical Society and Rollins College faculty members.

Mr. Cobb also introduced Mr. John L. Galloway, tax collector of Seminole County, who spoke of the importance of the tree and the honor it brings to the city.

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Blasts Are Felt Twenty Miles Away

Fireworks Plant Explodes In California, Houses Damaged, None Injured

REDONDO BEACH, Calif., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Explosions so violent that people 20 miles away thought they felt the earthquake today shattered a fireworks plant but by some curious chance apparently none were killed.

The blast damaged a house in which people lay sleeping, and debris from one shanty roof partially buried two people.

Police said it was almost incredible there was no loss of life. Twenty-nine small airplanes in the factory lot, all leveled by the blast, were unoccupied.

Three persons were cut by shrapnel, glass, and flying debris, and one man slipped in a tank of gas 100 feet from the blast, was unscathed.

It was said he first thought it was an earthquake. "Then I saw a blinding sheet of flame and saw the whole side of the house had been blown in. I saw different shells exploding, stars and pinwheels flying and the roar was deafening."

Damages was estimated at \$200,000. The cause was not determined.

Senate Hearing Said Assured On Med-Fly Losses

Andrews Says Full Debate To Be Given Reimbursement Bill

MIAMI, Feb. 9.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was asked by the American Federation of Labor yesterday to reveal what both the AFL and its CIO rival had told him they would do toward settlement of their bitter feud.

The federation's executive council directly named CIO Chairman John L. Lewis for criticizing a continuation of peace efforts which the President had requested, while declaring the AFL always has been willing to work for a harmonious settlement of the feud.

William Green, federation president, declared that he and Lewis, both separately and together, had told the President how far each was willing to go toward adjusting the controversy and that he saw through the White House should make the proposals public.

Green also blamed Lewis for "sweeping out the radiance" of the Med-Fly in Florida.

Senator Andrews has carried on a consistent fight to gain a full hearing for the bill since its introduction last year.

In part the bill provides that "any person who, directly or indirectly, suffered a loss or sustained any damage through the destruction of citrus fruits or vegetables, field crops, trees or other property (including damages from poison bait, spray, special pruning, and price losses), as a result of such campaign, may file a claim for indemnity with the Comptroller General within one year after the date of enactment of this joint resolution."

"Any such claim shall set forth the full amount of all losses or damages claimed to have been suffered or sustained and shall be supported by such affidavits, documents, or other information as the Comptroller General shall require."

He has taken an active interest in civic affairs and is president of the Lions Club and a member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Fruit Shipping Resumed After Week Embargo

Citrus Men Say Big Scale Traffic To Be Delayed Somewhat

LAKELAND, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The week-long embargo on citrus ended at 6:00 o'clock last night, but fruit men said it would be some time before large-scale shipments could be resumed because of restrictions set up by the growers and shippers' control committee.

State citrus inspectors returned to their posts last night, nevertheless, and will resume certification of fruit for shipment out of the state.

The effectiveness of the embargo was shown in statistics on shipments compiled by the federal-state markets news service here. On Friday, the last day of certification and inspection before the embargo, 589 cars of oranges, tangerines and grapefruit left the state. On Saturday 115 cars were moved and by Sunday shipments dropped to 49 cars. Totals for other days were 21 cars Monday, seven Tuesday, six Wednesday and two yesterday. All this fruit had been inspected and certified before the embargo, but held back by shippers to await favorable market conditions.

Truck shipments, the bureau reported, were at a complete standstill because there were no inspectors at packing houses to certify fruit for sale to truckers. Inspectors were moved to canning plants during the embargo to see that fruit used there was palatable and not injurious to health. Canning plants were permitted to continue to operate, the embargo applying only to fresh fruit.

Some quarters viewed the control committee restrictions as virtually continuing the embargo. Shipment of fruit of grades U. S. no. 3 and lower is prohibited and any fruit having as many as six damaged pieces per 100 is graded No. 3. Thus the industry's aim of preventing fruit deteriorated from cold damage from reaching the market is to be carried out.

The control committee restrictions apply only to interstate shipments, however, while the embargo proclaimed by the citrus commission applied to all shipments and sales.

Because of a large supply of fruit picked and shipped before the effective date of the embargo, the consumer was able to buy citrus during the time the ban was in effect.

British Are Attacked By Air Raiders

English Engage Sky Marauders In Series Of Combats, Down- ing One Enemy Ship

Capture Of Forts Claimed By Reds

Allies Reported To Have Half Million Men In Near East

British fighting planes, rising to meet German bombers along Britain's coast in a new wave of attacks against merchant shipping, engaged the raiders in a series of combats, and shot down one near the Firth of Forth. Raids were the first since last week.

Elsewhere enigmatic Russia, and embattled Finland presented contrary pictures of their conflict, in which the Finns reported smashing renewed Red army attacks on the Mannerheim line with heavy Russian losses, while in restless southeastern Europe there were significant activities.

Unusually informative Leningrad headquarters in a communique claimed the Reds captured 13 steel concrete "artillery forts" on the Mannerheim Line, and inflicted "great losses" on the Finns. The Finns insisted the Mannerheim Line was intact.

Turkey followed yesterday's seizure of the German-occupied Krupp shipyards by dispatching 100 German technicians employed by the war and naval ministries, giving them 48 hours to leave the country. Authorities searching for the dispatch and the shipyard occupying was due to discovery of a far-ranging German sabotage plot in the Near East.

Beyrout, Turkey, British-French concentrations were reported to number a half million men standing ready for use in the war spread.

In Paris the Chamber of Deputies discussed behind closed doors the government's conduct of the war. Daladier announced that raids on German police offices in France had disclosed searching questions on French public opinion.

British Are Attacked By Air Raiders

Initiative and get up steam what may be a renewed attempt to attack Finland in half at the 185-mile-wide "wasp" waist between the Russian border and the Gulf of Bothnia.

There were reports that Vilho, Finland's second largest city, about 50 miles north of the Karelian battlefield, had been set on fire by Russian long-range guns but no official confirmation was available.

It was pointed out, however, that Vilho had been an almost daily target of the Russian big guns since Christmas, resulting in numerous fires.

A Finnish spokesman denied last night, in commenting on foreign reports of Finnish "reverses," that the Russians had broken through the Mannerheim line at any point.

The Russian assaults against the line at Summa, preceded by mortar and artillery fire and led by more than 200 tanks and armored "Trojan horse" sledges, were said to have been shattered by the sure fire of Finnish artillery and machine-guns.

With each fresh onslaught, it was stated, the Finns moved back among the frozen bodies of several thousand of their comrades killed in previous attacks. Russian planes attempted to come to the aid of the attackers but were driven off by Finnish planes, military reports said.

Beneluxian dispatches told of heavy losses on both sides in heavy fighting southeast of Kuhnjo where the Red army's 54th division was said to be thrusting toward Nurmes vital terminus of railroad lines running south to Helsinki and Karalis and westward to the Gulf of Bothnia.

During the Christmas holidays the Finnish command announced the defeat of an enemy battalion—about 1000 men—which tried to cross the border south of where the 44th division met.

About 250 Russians were killed in the Suomussalmi battle and great quantities of war materials were taken by the Finns, it was stated.

In the direction of Kuhnjo our troops improved their positions," said night's communique said.

Chickens, Eggs Aid Farm Living, Income

In good times and bad, eggs in the basket and chickens in the market coop are cash for farmers. That's what the Agricultural Marketing Service says in pointing out that the chicken-and-egg industry has a significant influence on the living standards of farm families.

According to the Service, chickens and eggs have long been a principal source of cash income for meeting current household expenses. Just how important is indicated by the fact that approximately 86 percent of all farms in the United States produce eggs and chickens. In each of the past 4 years families living on these farms received close to a billion dollars of cash from the sale of eggs and chickens.

The farm poultry industry has a reputation as a relatively stable industry. The depression years emphasized its importance in the farm economy, for they were years in which poultry and eggs did more than their full share in supplying cash income to farm folk.

In 1937 and 1938 poultry products ranked fourth as a source of farm income. In those years they were exceeded only by milk, cattle and calves, and hogs in their returns to farmers. They ranked not only above every other major agricultural commodity but above the combined income from large groups such as all grains, all vegetables and all fruits.
