SCHOOL BELLS NOW RING FOR DRY OFFICERS

Classes To Offer Instruction In Good Manners With Special Emphasis On Constitutional Sanctity Of Home

"Get The Higher-Ups" Ordered By Andrews

Thirty Students Are To Be Accommodated During Each Semester Of Three Weeks

(By Rodney Dutcher)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—Picked prohibition agents are going to school here with classroom teachers, desks, blackboards, ink wells and everything. They're being taught good manners, with special emphasis on the constitutional sanctity of the home. Through the home is a humble abode.

They're being taught, too, to get the "higher-ups" in big liquor-making and liquor-selling conspiracies.

General Lincoln C. Andrews and his aids started the school. Andrews wants his graduates to rate 100 per cent in both capability and gentlemanliness.

The students are being schooled particularly to avoid all high-handed and illegal tactics of which prohibition officers have been accused in the past.

Harsher Punishment Looking for more adequate punishment for the "big boys" behind liquor-selling plots, the school will endeavor to turn out experts at both legal and scientific inquiries having to do with such cases.

With its first semester just opened, the prohibition inspectors' school will have 30 students for each period of three weeks. During the next eight or nine months, 300 more probably will be trained.

The Chief of the Training Division, at this school is officially designated, is Webster Spates, a lawyer with seven years' experience in the attorney's general's office, six years' private practice in Miami, Fla., and now legal adviser to Colonel James C. Waddell, supervisor of alcohol and brewery control.

Idea May Spread Schooling will be confined for the present to Waddell's alcohol and brewery division, which handles perhaps the two most important phases of prohibition enforcement. Later the idea of educating prohibition agents probably will spread.

Inspectors will be brought here for schooling from all over the United States. They will be taught practically the intricacies of alcohol and brewery supervision, but will be tutored in all-round prohibition work, also.

They will be taught to conduct raids with police and posse. The faculty, selected by Spates and Waddell, comprises the best experts under General Andrews, who supervised the school after Colonel Waddell had accepted the prohibition agents probably will spread.

The "professors" will lecture and otherwise function as might a college instructor in mathematics or Greek drama.

Incidentally, there will be examinations. The schooling is in no way a selective process but new agents will be under close scrutiny, of course, and if any had eggs and their way in, they are likely to be eliminated.

The ideal of this school, said Waddell, is to raise the standard of the personnel so that we may command the respect of the public by the conduct of our officers.

What They'll Learn The course, he explained, is divided as follows:

- 1—Regulations governing alcohol plants and breweries.
- 2—Search and seizures: how to get warrants and how to execute them so the law will be enforced in a lawful manner.
- 3—Conspiracies: what makes conspiracies and how to investigate and get the evidence on them.
- 4—Elements of evidence: how to get evidence and how to submit it in proper form.
- 5—General investigation: how to meet circumstances and emergencies and how to conduct one's self on the witness stand.
- 6—Authority and general conduct of officers in the field.

Nothing like this has been attempted before. The students will spend six hours a day in the classroom and probably will have to do homework.

"We don't want to deprive any one of his constitutional rights," says Spates in speaking of the school part of the curriculum. "We want them to be a credit rather than a reflection on us."

Many people may be interested to hear that the prohibition officers will be taught they must have search warrants in every case before raiding a private home.

To get warrants, they will be instructed that "probable cause" search must be established by a federal judge or commissioner. In other words, presumption of a violation of law is advanced.

INDIANA WETS LOSE FIGHT TO MOISTEN STATE

Arid Condition Remains In Spite Of Efforts Of Organized Band To Make Dry Laws Easier To Violate

Anti-Saloon League Successful In Fight

Succeeds In Passing Measure Which Strengthens State Laws On Drunken Driving

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 8.—(INS)—Indiana, the "bone-dry" state famed far and wide for the stringency of its prohibition laws, reported out of committee, a bill, if not more so, despite legislative efforts to modify the statutes.

Three attempts have been made during the present session of the state legislature, to make the stringent provisions of the dry law a trifle easier to evade. But every effort has been blocked.

On the other hand, the Indiana Anti-Saloon League has passed a bill providing for the strengthening of the drunken driver section of the state road law making it conform with the same section in the renowned "Wright law" passed two years ago.

An effort was made to make the search and seizure section of the Wright act conform with the same section in the national prohibitory law. It was just an attempt, however, for after the measure was reported out of committee, a roll call of the House screeled all Representative's into recommending the measure's indefinite postponement, which was tantamount to killing it.

Another ambitious son of a gunner, however, introduced a bill making it difficult for attorneys to secure fee fines for prosecuting liquor cases. He also tried to eliminate provisions in the Wright law that make empty bottles prima facie evidence of violation of liquor laws.

This effort was not as successful as its predecessor. It died in committee when the head of the Indiana Anti-Saloon League brought in his re-enforcement, consisting chiefly of some fifty add members of the W. C. T. U.

The third attempt—an outright repeal of the Wright act—died at its inception. A member of the lower branch of the legislature, after drawing up the bill, decided to keep it as an heirloom in his room at home, for he never handed it in for first reading.

But the only attempt of the Indiana Anti-Saloon League to put a measure through the legislature was successful.

Rep. Frank E. Wright, Rep. of Marion, and author of the famous "Wright" law sponsored the amendment to the drunken driver

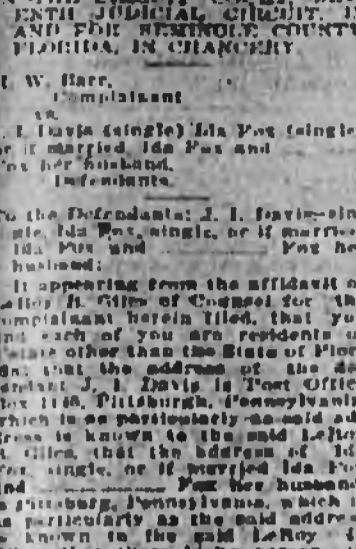
The law provides that if taxes upon real estate shall not be paid before the first day of April of any year, the Tax Collector shall advertise and sell.

Florida Has More Tourists Than Ever Before In Its History, Declares Carter

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 9.—(INS)—There are now 35 per cent more tourists in Florida than ever before, State Hotel Commissioner Jerry W. Carter declared today upon his return to the State Capital after a tour of inspection of the hotel and housing situation throughout the entire state.

"By this I mean those who are sight seeing, pleasure seeking and snow dodging," Carter said. "This does not include the opportunity and the binder boys of a year ago."

"St. Petersburg hotels and apartment houses have no vacant spaces on their registers. It is difficult to find a room or apartment in Miami Beach, although in Miami proper the hotels are well-filled but apartments are plentiful. Fort Myers is enjoying the best season it has ever had."

Hotel Commissioner Carter said that while the appearance of the number of apartments occupied does not show any crowded conditions, this is due to the fact that there are this year 35 per cent more hotel rooms and apartments than last year in the entire state and over 200 per cent more houses, hotels and apartments in Miami.

"This," said Carter, "impresses some people that because they can

more easily obtain a place in which to live than was possible last year that there are less people. This is not true because there are more houses and just as many tourists as before.

"As evidence of the larger number of tourists in Florida this year than ever before, I find that business men throughout the state are pleased with the number of sales made this season as compared to last and also, there were 8,000 more paid admissions to the South Florida Fair at Tampa than there ever has been in the history of the state.

"I look for next season to be even greater than this, housing facilities will be ample and more people will be in Florida because of the larger number of good roads and railroads into the state.

"People are not building now as they have been during the past year and in two years there will again be a great scarcity in housing facilities in Florida—especially in Miami. Next year will see just enough hotels and apartments to take care of Florida tourists."

Commissioner Carter said that there is a noted improvement in sanitary conditions throughout the state and the condition of the hotels, apartments and restaurants of Florida is excellent.

JAPAN NEVER TO WAR ON SUBJECT OF IMMIGRATION

Viscount Ishii Expresses His Belief That No Conflict With United States Will Arise Over That Problem

PARIS, Mar. 9.—(INS)—Japan will never go to war with the United States over the question of immigration, declared Viscount Ishii, Japanese Ambassador to France, in a farewell interview with the International News Service.

After 60 years in the diplomatic service, chiefly in Paris and Washington, Viscount Ishii will now return to Japan to retire to the comparative quiet of a seat in the Senate.

"Japan has no idea of attacking anyone in the world," said Viscount Ishii. "And we are working loyally and resolutely for World Peace. We hope that in time we will be able to gain our personal desires peacefully."

"We hope soon day the irritating question of immigration will be settled by a better comprehension of our needs. This question affects our relations with both America and Great Britain, since Britain has taken restrictive measures in her colonies and dominions, chiefly in Australia and Canada.

"But there is no danger of conflict with either country over this question for the moral reason that we do not want war and for the practical reason that we would have little to gain.

"Naturally our over-population and the rapid increase of population in Japan (800,000 annually) constitute a difficult problem, but unrestricted emigration would not begin to fill our needs. At most only two or three thousand Japanese could enter each country annually and compared with our annual population increase these figures are unimportant."

Viscount Ishii believes the real solution of the problem is development of Japan's foreign commerce. "For Japan a question of life or death."

Japan's program of decreasing armaments is dictated by the necessity for economy, Viscount Ishii said.

"Japan is not pacifist, but she is Pacific," he declared. "It is not a blind system nor pressure from the socialists which pushes us into disarmament. Our budget will not permit us to enter a race for armaments.

"That is why we are ready to support any real effort to reduce armaments and why we receive President Coolidge's recent note favorably. Nevertheless I find

France's attitude toward the note absolutely logical, just as realistic. We had to make certain observations to guarantee our defensive strength."

Viscount Ishii pointed to the proximity of China and the confused state of that country as a reason why Japan cannot disarm to too great an extent.

"In case of necessity we would be the only country able to intervene immediately and effectively," he said.

"Military danger from China is negligible. Both the Northern and Southern Factories are fairly weak. The chief danger from China is the boycott. When the millions of Chinese are given the right to cease buying products from a certain country, it means the end of all that country's business in China. Against the boycott foreign powers are impotent. We have already suffered much. Now it is England's turn."

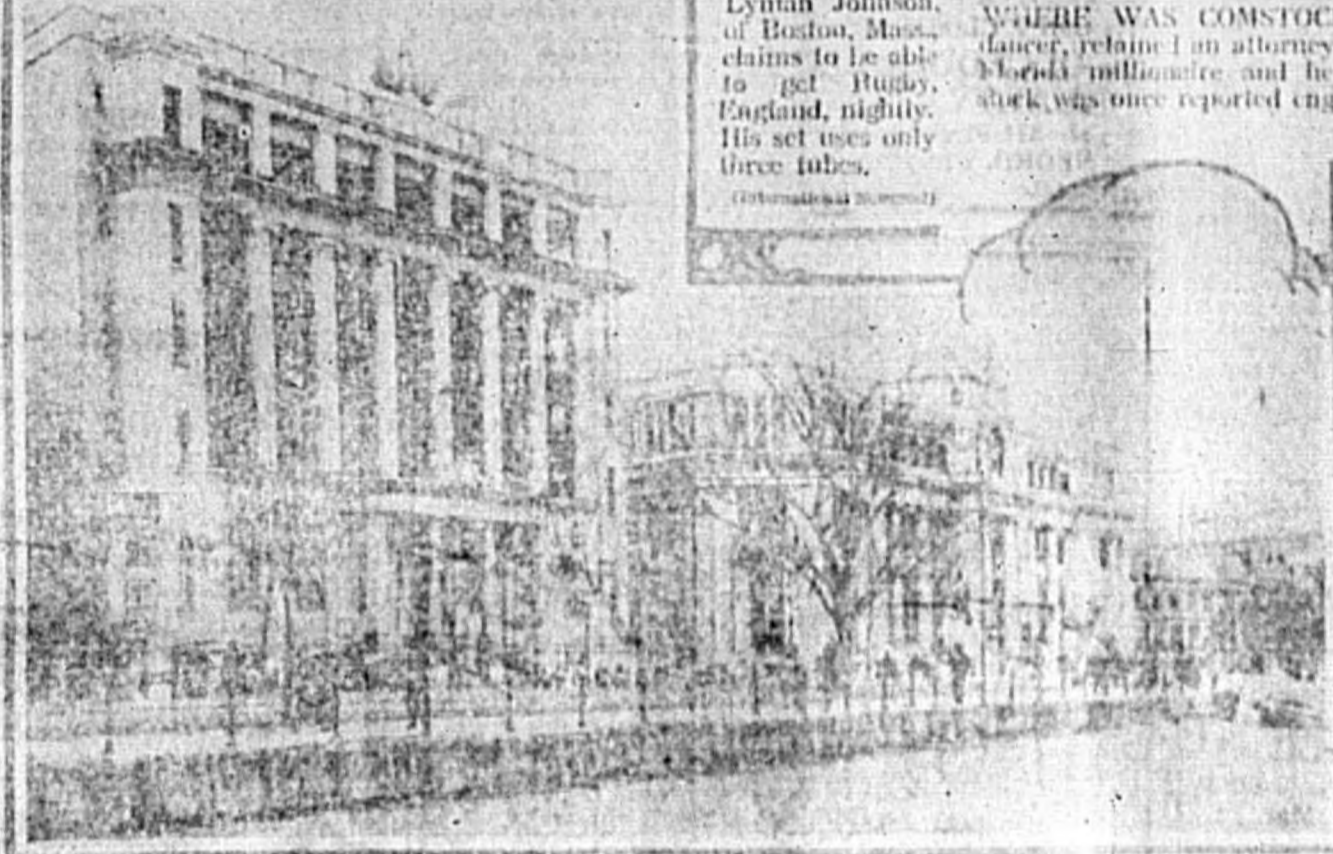

The Miami Herald comments upon the organization of a "Do Without" club in Chicago, not as might be supposed for the suppression of gun toting or petting parties but for the restriction of slang. "Do Without Slang" is the motto of the club, an outgrowth of "Better Speech Week," conducted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

In other words don't say: "Do you get me?", "the fraulein's whiskers," "you got the sugar-coated bathtub," "So's your old grandpa," "flat tire," "neck," "petting," and other colorful niceties of American colloquialisms. That is, if you want to be an ethical member of the "Do Without" club.

And she said they did and I asked her if they had 'Valencia', see? And she said they did, so I bought one, see?" Let's do without that anyway.

Of course we see; we're not blind, or dumb either.

New Football Rules

This is not exactly the right time of year to expect to arouse any very enthusiastic interest in football. The season is yet six months away and baseball with all its home-runs, shut-out games, double plays and pop bottle throwing is upon us. Babe Ruth has signed a contract to play for the Yankees for the next three years for two hundred and ten thousand dollars, and all the little boys and most of the men in the country don't care what else happens.

Unfortunately, however, the Football Rules Committee saw fit to meet late last week and make some very drastic changes in the playing code for the 1927 season. And if we don't comment on it now, we are afraid we will have forgotten about it before the next referee's whistle sends twenty-two men into a resounding scramble over a pigskin.

The new rules are as follows:

- 1. The goal posts have been placed back ten yards to the back line of the end zone.
2. A time limit of thirty seconds has been placed on putting the ball into play.
3. A limit of fifteen seconds has been put on the huddle.
4. A pause of approximately one second must be made in the shift play before the ball is passed.
5. A fumble punt will be regarded hereafter as a dead ball and not a loose ball.
6. A missed backward pass, other than from the snapperback, will be a dead ball and not a loose ball.

The biggest mistake the committee made was in setting the goal post back ten yards. What they should have done was to shorten the field by ten yards or at least five at each end. How many football games have been lost in those last few yards? "Held on the one yard line." Thousands of them. Many a team has been able to make tremendous drives in the center of the field that couldn't make a foot when in the shadow of the goal posts.

But with the field remaining as long as ever and the goal posts set back another ten yards, we don't expect ever to see a team win a game again.

Did Its Part

A despatch from Washington states that a bronze tablet has been placed in the government Printing Office to commemorate the service of a linotype machine during the World War. This machine was transported to France and served in the front line trenches. There it did its bit setting type from General Pershing's orders so that his commands could be conveyed to his troops.

No doubt the operator of this machine has long since been awarded the croix de guerre and other medals. And he should have been. To sit beneath bursting shells, possibly in full view of bombing planes, or the target of some machine gun nest, and fight a linotype is no small job. A linotype at best is terrible, but under those conditions, it must be practically impossible.

We are glad to see the old machine get some recognition too. Men, who do things are usually loaded with awards, while the horse, gun, boat or machine is quickly forgotten. We were glad to learn of this particular tablet which reads as follows:

In honor of a linotype That served its country on the battlefields of France There upon a throbbing motor truck, 'mid shot and shell, This machine typed General Pershing's commands to America's victorious army.

The Billion Dollar Age. Dollars Lost, Dollars Cheap. Reed and Smith? No. Copyright 1927, by Star Co.

GENERAL MOTORS sends its common stockholders a pleasing circular, proving that we have reached the billion-dollar age. The company sold \$1,038,000,000 worth of automobiles in 1926, an increase of \$22,000,000, and paid its common stockholders in dividends \$107,530,593. That breaks all records for common stock dividends anywhere in the world. It's more than 5 per cent on two billions.

IN THAT ONE YEAR General Motors sold more of every car it makes than it ever sold before. Total sales for the year being \$1,215,226, an increase of 47 per cent. That "saturation point" in automobile buying seems to be positioned.

MORE BAD NEWS from China. The Chinese might call it good news, since it means driving out foreigners. Women and children have been hurried from Nanking to Shanghai, where European nations have strong forces.

THE CHINESE NEWS is bad for many financiers and investors. Americans, British and German—British especially—will lose enormous sums if the Chinese wipe out "concessions" that have made Europeans rich.

Whether China also will suffer for lack of European capital and European direction, it is to be seen. The Chinese think not.

THERE IS SOME COMFORT, not much, for those that lose dollars in China or elsewhere. A dollar is worth today 60 cents, compared with its value before the war, "worth" meaning purchasing power.

WAGES ARE UP 116 per cent, which is most desirable, even for big men, although they don't all know it. The more the little man earns, the more the big man can get.

It would enlighten some "best financial minds" if they could learn about Java, whence Earl J. Babst, president of the American Sugar Refining Company, has just returned. He will tell them that the Javanese, who they are well paid, get four cents an hour.

You couldn't become a millionaire in Java, because the forty million Javanese don't earn enough to make anybody rich.

DEMOCRATS SUGGEST for 1928 Senator Reed of Missouri for President, and Governor Smith, of New York, for Vice-President. It would be a strong combination, but wouldn't call Governor Smith. He wants to know whether a man's religion can prevent his being nominated for President.

ANOTHER earthquake in central Japan, with loss of life and property in Tokio, Kobe and Osaka. The Japanese will be sorry at this disaster, as they have done on other occasions and will have the sympathy of every country. The only thing really dangerous to a nation is lack of courage.

RELIGIOUS influence, through absorbed in childhood, never leaves the mind. Aloysius Joseph, taxicab driver, shot his wife yesterday morning in a jealous rage. He immediately ran for a priest to administer the last sacrament to his wife. Then, saying to the priest, "Father forgive, he shot and killed himself," the priest told him his wife was dead and he could do nothing for her.

OF THE FIVE United States airplanes shown in the air around South America, and created "good will" three remain in the air. One fell into the sea yesterday as it was leaving Montevideo. Nobody hurt. It may be able to return to the States. The other two in a collision and two of the aviators were killed.

IT IS EXTRAORDINARY that German, Russian and Italian flying machines could be covering their long regular passenger routes day after day, month after month, without accident, while this country that invented the flying machine seems to specialize in flying accidents. We have the pilots.

TYPHOID AND diphtheria soon will be wiped out entirely, and yellow fever, malaria, typhus, cholera and smallpox have vanished. But some diseases are on the increase. Cancer holds fourth place, killing 91.9 out of 1,000 that die, quacks advertising cures that increase the death rate. There is no known cure for cancer, except the surgeon's knife and radium under favorable conditions. Better health, stronger blood, supply and cheerfulness help and sometimes cure.

Show any strange growth in a forest, tell him of any deep seated ailment, and he will cure it. CHINESE authorities intend to keep Christianity "because after all they say, it is an Asiatic religion starting in Asia." But Christianity is no longer to be driven into our foreign country by foreign money and organizations controlled by foreign guns, so the Chinese boast that "as a matter of fact, Christ was originally Asiatic" were all founders of religion.

That is interesting although not strictly true. The greatest of the world's religions, Buddhism, Mahomedanism, Christianity, came from Asia.

The One That Got Away



JACKSONVILLE CONTINUES TO BUILD FLORIDA TIMES-UNION

Reports from ten cities of Florida for the short month of February show that Jacksonville is leading the state in the matter of new construction undertaken during the four-week period. It was a fairly good job. Something like \$150,000 over the next few months. Miami more than twice the total shown in Tampa and ahead of the other seven cities reporting by over a million. The Jacksonville figures for February are \$1,000,000. This is an excellent showing, and is appreciated practically as well as it is very few for the month of the year. March will probably pass the February figures as there are a number of big projects in view.

A feature of the February plans for construction was the number of dwelling houses undertaken, and some completed during the period. Florida is sometimes remarked as rather well built up; but this does not apply to Jacksonville. With all the construction reported during the month, there are very few for rent signs anywhere. New hotels, apartments and residences have been added by the hundred, and there is no actual over-supply. The people just move about, somewhat, and it happens, occasionally, that an apartment house will have something to offer for a week or two after the paint is dry; but not often.

HOW TO CATCH FISH CLEARMONT PRESS

There have been many indications in various localities that certain fishermen have not been able to content themselves with rod and reel or the old fashioned cane and pole and live minnow, and have resorted to explosives, netting or trot lines to make big catches. These indications have aroused the curiosity of game wardens, who have spent considerable time in section and it would prove exceedingly unbecoming for those who have taken these means of fishing to be caught in the act or with the materials necessary for that brand of "sportsmanship."

Penalties imposed in instances where arrests and convictions are secured are not usually tempered with mercy, for there is an instinctive dislike for a man that will take advantage of this sort over brutes that do not go well, with him when apprehended. Attention is also called to the fact that while the state game laws permit the setting of trot lines, a special law inserted for Lake county prohibits the multiple hook style of fishing, and care should be taken to avoid infringement.

THE PURGING OF AIKEN COLUMBIA RECORD

The friends of law and righteousness in Aiken county are no doubt bubbling over with wannanas today. For, be it known of all men, four non-voting, non-official, non-political members of the winter tourist colony who committed the unpardonable sin of playing golf there on Sunday, were duly arrested on Monday, and we assume they were tried this morning about the hour this editorial is being set up by the so-called intelligent composition. They were arrested on warrants sworn out by Sheriff Nullie Robinson, who, we recall, shot two window panes out of the kitchen jail in Aiken in protest against the removal of the Lowmans last October.

We understand, likewise, so fervent now is the zeal for law enforcement in Aiken, that nowdays were not permitted to sell newspapers on the Streets on Sunday.

The dispatches do not indicate that Sheriff Robinson saw the iniquitous golfer who desecrated the Sabbath of Aiken county. He probably swore out the warrants on "information and belief," and in so doing he proved that he was alive and responsive to the call of duty. In the meantime, twenty-nine red-handed lynchers (whose names are reputed to be well known) are still at large, and no warrants have been sworn out for them, though their wholesale crime was committed five months ago. But there is this distinction, which should be remembered by any who may be disposed to cavil. They did not lynch the Lowmans on Sunday, and therefore the law against bear-baiting, bull-baiting, interludes, and other sports and pastimes, including the lynching "Niggers," were not violated.

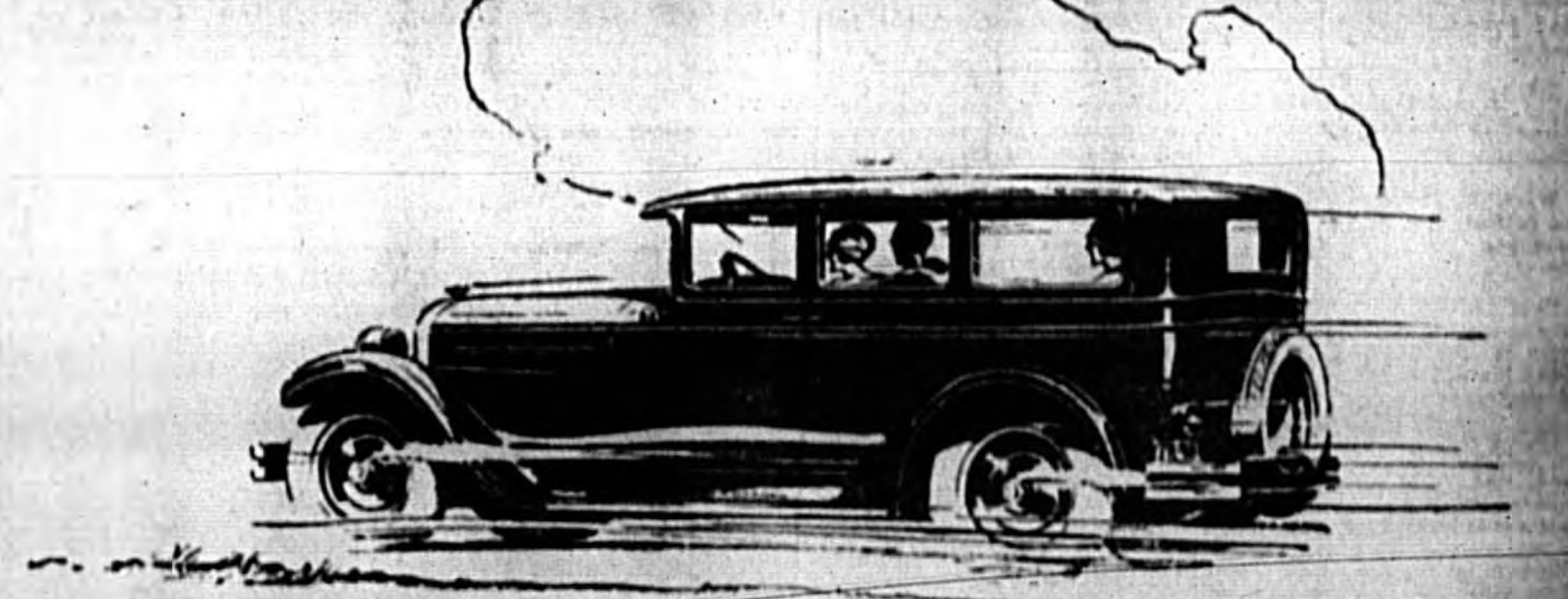

EXCAVATION FOR GLADES DISTRICT SHOWN IN REPORT

Nearly 600,000 Cubic Yards Of Dirt And Rock Removed During January, Elliott Says In Monthly Survey

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 9.—(INS)—Excavation of canals in the Everglades drainage district during January amounted to 594,756 cubic yards of dirt and rock, according to a canal statement just completed by chief drainage engineer Fred C. Elliot.

During December of last year, excavation in canals in the drainage district amounted to 602,620 cubic yards, indicating the great decrease in work on drainage of the Everglades due to the lack of funds, it was announced.

Most of the work during the month of January was for dredging in the St. Lucie Canal, where three large dredges are trimming the banks and removing sand, loose dirt and debris deposited in the canal's bottom as a result of the hurricane of September 18 of last year. There were 236,339 cubic yards of dirt excavated from this canal.

From the Hillsborough Canal was excavated a total of 65,565 cubic yards during January; north New River Canal, 9,368 cubic yards; West Palm Beach Canal, 56,586 cubic yards; Moore Haven to Sand Point Levee, 143,843 cubic yards; Miami Canal to north New River Levee, 22,777 cubic yards.

Remaining work on the present canals will amount to 7,748,063 cubic yards, which will complete six major canals, Elliott's report indicates. Total excavation in the Everglades drainage district to date amounts to 73,987,786 cubic yards.

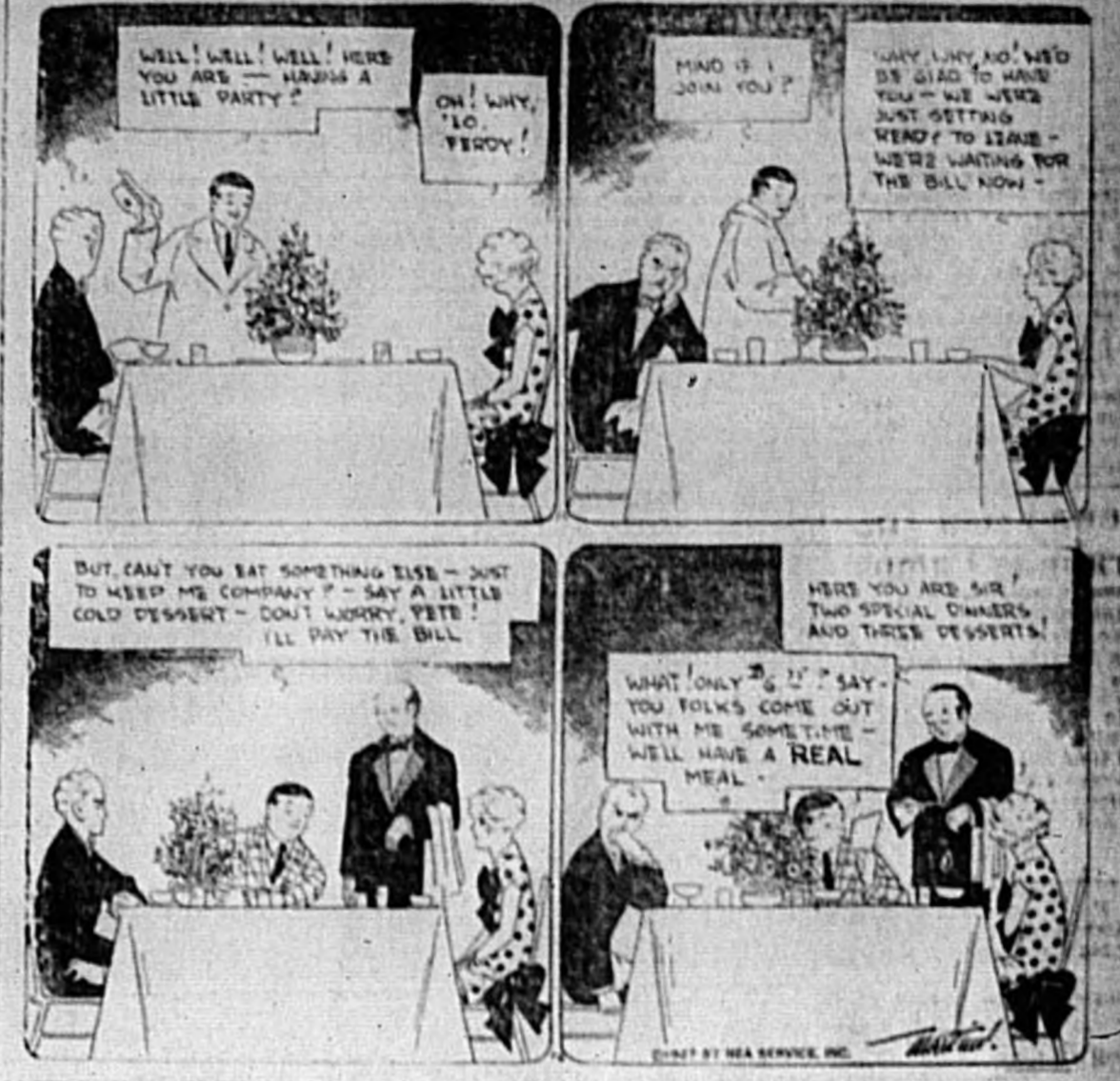
