Howling Anna Hits Honduras

MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Anna sent its 85-mile-an-hour winds howling into Southern British Honduras today and began to weaken over the Central American country's rough terrain, the Miami Weather Bureau reported.

In an advisory issued at 11 a. m., the bureau said Anna moved into the mainland in the Mango Creek area about 10 miles south of the capital city of Belize.

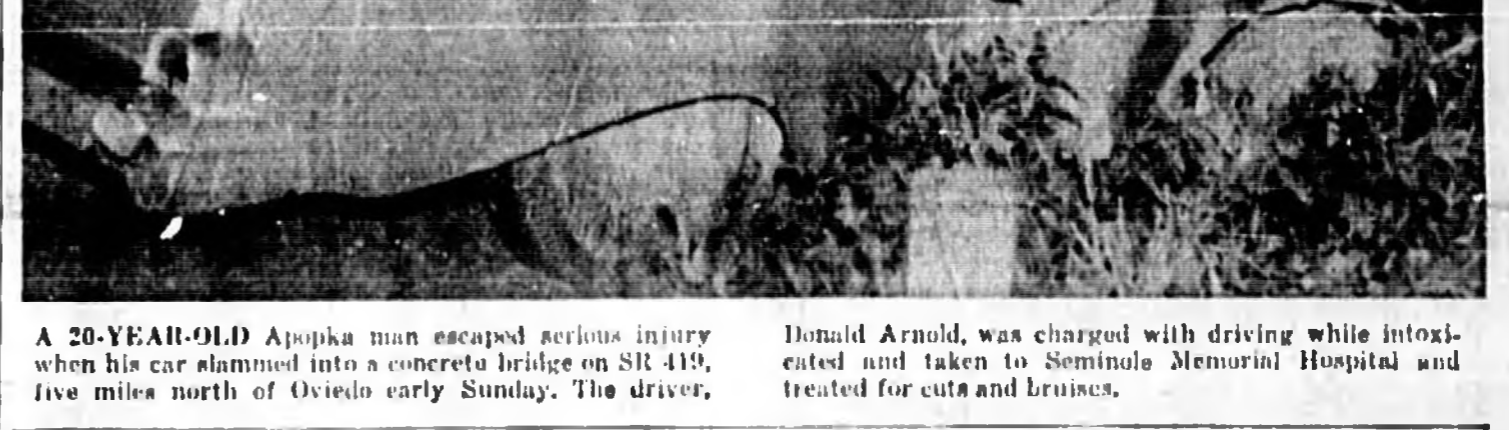
The advisory pinpointed the storm's center near latitude 16.5 north, longitude 89.0 west. It said the season's first hurricane started to slacken in intensity shortly after moving over land. Winds dropped to

75 m.p.h. but squalls extended outward between 80 and 100 miles.

The bureau said the 11 a. m. advisory would be the last to be issued.

"Heavy rains will continue in the storm area today and tonight," the bureau said, "with flash floods likely in hilly and mountainous areas of British Honduras along the coast today but small craft should remain in safe harbor until seas subside."

Anna blew up from an area of low pressure in the Caribbean on Thursday. Its center had not touched any of the Central American mainland until today, although it wallowed just off the coast of Honduras Saturday and Sunday.

6 Die On Roads; 1 In Seminole

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A head-on collision on U.S. Highway 1 in Brevard County Sunday killed three persons for the worst accident of a weekend that saw at least 12 accidental deaths.

Six were killed in traffic accidents, four persons drowned, a youth was electrocuted and another boy died from a snake bite.

The Highway Patrol identified the victims of the collision near Sharpes, 2.6 miles north of Cocoa, as Roland John Galinas, 22, Patrick Air Force Base, a companion, Jane Mary Spangier, 36, of Cocoa Beach, and Mrs. Doris Meyers, 51, of Wyoming.

Other traffic victims were Charles Bloodworth, 14, killed Sunday when an automobile struck the bicycle he was riding on State Road 501, four miles north of Orlando in Seminole County.

Eddie Green, 55, Wauchula Negro, killed in a two-car accident Sunday four miles south of Wauchula at the intersection of U.S. Highway 17 and State Road 64.

Bryant, Cramer Quarrel Renewed. WASHINGTON (UPI) — The quarrel between Gov. Farris Bryant and Rep. William Cramer over extension of the Sunshine State Parkway flared anew over the weekend with another salvo from Cramer.

The Republican congressman challenged Bryant to get a written commitment from the Bureau of Public Roads that an intercity highway from Daytona Beach to Fort Pierce would be built even if the turnpike is extended from Fort Pierce to Orlando.

The Cabinet Budget Commission must okay all the building budget. None of the board's money requests have gone before the Cabinet yet.

The mammoth building budget includes \$3.3 million which the Legislature provided to start on the new state university at Boca Raton. Topping the list is \$95,000 for working drawings of the buildings.

The board voted last week to seek that money, along with \$1,850,000 for a classroom — office-laboratory building at the University of South Florida, and \$200,000 for extension of utilities of the same school.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Ways & Means Committee today began two weeks of hearings on President Kennedy's controversial plan to provide hospitalization and nursing benefits for about 14 million persons 65 or older.

Abraham A. Ribicoff, secretary of health, education and welfare, was the lead-off witness as the administration opened its drive for a congressional showdown next year on the medical care legislation.

The program faces a tough fight next year and the outlook is uncertain.

On a 16-9 vote last year, the House Ways & Means Committee rejected a sharply limited version of the President's proposal program. Kennedy, then a senator and presidential nominee, failed on a 31-45 vote to get the Senate to approve a plan somewhat more restricted than his present one.

Supporters of the legislation feel the President's proposal would do better in the Senate now but that the outlook in the House remains bleak.

Although there will be no committee action this year, about 300 witnesses, including spokesmen from dozens of organizations, have asked to testify.

The American Medical Association leads the opposition to the medical care plan while the AFL-CIO is its most powerful lobbyist. Kennedy's proposal would cover persons who are eligible for cash benefits under the Social Security program of the Railroad Retirement Act and who are 65 or older.

The benefits would include up to 90 days of hospitalization and 150 days of nursing home care for each illness. The program would not pay for surgeon's or physician's fees. To finance the plan, Social Security taxes would be applied to the first \$5,000 in annual earnings instead of the first \$4,800

and the tax rate for employers and employees would go up one-fourth of one per cent.

Other congressional news: Foreign Aid: The Senate Foreign Relations Committee scheduled a "mopping up" session today on its \$1,326,500,000 version of President Kennedy's foreign aid request. Barring last-minute hitches the group was expected to approve the bill at a closed session and send it to the Senate floor where debate may begin this week.

Major College For Sarasota Set

NEW YORK (UPI) — A major new private college is slated to open its doors in Sarasota in September 1964. It is being organized by a board of trustees and the board of home missions of the Congregational Christian churches.

The \$15 million school will be known as New College, named after the famed college at Oxford University in England. Its beginning enrollment of 1,200 is expected to grow to about 2,400.

Mars Study

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congressional space experts today said that despite delays there still is a chance the United States may learn the truth about those canals on Mars before Russia.

They said the National Space Agency has launched a study which could advance by two years an exploratory flight near Mars now scheduled for 1964. The trip would take 232 days.

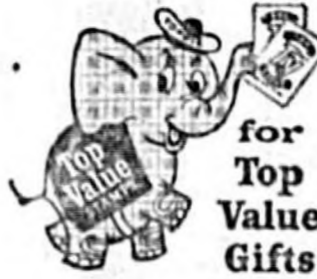
Scientists hope the shot will provide an electronic close-up look at the planet's unexplained canals, polar white caps, and possible vegetation. It originally had been planned for 1963, along with two

similar space probes of Venus. The Mars target one later was delayed for 25 months — the next feasible period for such a shot — on grounds that space exploration techniques were not far enough along to accomplish the project on schedule.

The House Space Committee has been advised that the shot actually was postponed because budget restrictions then in effect would not allow all three shots in one year. Those budget curbs now have been lifted and space agency experts are determining now whether it is too late to reschedule the Mars probe for late 1962.

Most of the time, however, the entire matter is expressed in terms of folk who are in or nearing their 60s. That's the age of retirement, enforced or voluntary, for many. It signals numerous difficult transitions.

How startling to realize, then that the age 85 is now becoming a prominent factor in U. S. population calculations.

The 1960 census shows the number of Americans 85 and over is 920 per cent greater than in 1920. Then there were 91,000 today 929,000. The gain from 1950 to 1960 is 61 per cent, and these super-oldersters now represent 5.6 per cent of all the aged (over 65).

Prepare them to meet the problems of life. And life makes no allowance for anybody.

Whether you parents are wealthy, average or poor, therefore, start assigning definite pay jobs to your youngsters. Start when they are of kindergarten age.

They can make their own beds or shine Daddy's shoes or do the dishes, iron the flat work, mow the lawn, wash the family car, etc.

Always try to see that plenty of pay chores are available. Then there will be "ceiling unlimited" regarding a child's spending money.

"Easy come, easy go," is the rule with people who live on gift money, nowadays called the child's weekly "allowance."

In adulthood, such youngsters thus gamble or throw away money on foolish purchases, because they have never yet learned pro-

per respect for the hard work that every dollar should represent.

"Yes, Dr. Crane," some society mothers protest, "but shouldn't children have a chance to learn how to budget their money? And the 'allowance' plan does that, doesn't it?"

Yes, it may, but so does the "pay for work" plan, and the latter adds many other virtues that the allowance method omits.

When the money has been EARNED by your own hard work, then your budgeting really grows meaningful.

FIUGGI, Italy—No visitor to Italy should leave without making at least one trip by train.

Not on one of the crack, fast, extra-fare jobs, which are as sumptuous as any in the world, but on an ordinary, garden variety one that wanders, winds, and whistles its way through the countryside.

These trains, usually of four or five coaches that date back (in appearance, anyway) to Garibaldi's time, leave Rome by the score every day, heading north, south, east, west and, I wouldn't be surprised, straight up.

They look completely out of place standing in Rome's vast and super-modern station, especially when waiting alongside the gleaming plush express trains that zoom to Florence, Naples, Bologna, and Milan. They resemble strays from a movie lot.

Those trains leave on time, and they arrive on time, but they take their own sweet time getting from town to village, village to hamlet, and hamlet to wherever there is a road crossing and a gate. The schedule is ample, and no one seems to be in a hurry.

They are always jammed. There is only one way to assure oneself of a seat and that is to be a full hour or more ahead of time, and even that doesn't always work. There is no limit to the number of tickets sold. Seating capacity has nothing to do with it. Neither does the standing capacity, for that matter.

The trains always depart with every seat taken, aisles jammed, and the windows a mass of heads, shoulders, and waving arms and hands. No one travels light. No matter if it is going only for a day, to a town barely beyond the city limits, the Italian carries a minimum of two suitcases, a strong bag, one or more cardboard parcels, a "fiasco" of wine or water, and a bulky lunch.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Politics as well as science are mixed with the salt in the Kennedy administration's proposed saline water conversion program which the House Interior Committee is now considering. Congress has been waiting for it all year, but the White House and Interior Department didn't get it figured out till the end of June.

There isn't much organized opposition to it. But there's no push for it, either, because it covers a subject few people understand. President Kennedy and Vice Pre-

sident Johnson have gone way out on the end of a limb on this one for what is called "open end" legislation.

It proposes annual appropriations for research and a 13-year program for developing demonstration plants. Otherwise, there are no limits on the amount of money that could be authorized and no time limits in which to spend it.

The reason given for this is that nobody knows what the cost is going to be. And the job has to be done.

Money Proposal Not Dead—Yet

WASHINGTON (UPI)—U. S. Treasurer Elizabeth Rudel Smith said today her proposal for printing money on colored paper "is not dead," but "deferred."

Mrs. Smith said in an interview that Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon has taken no formal position on the idea and has not yet brought it to President Kennedy's attention.

Dillon and other key Treasury officials are known to be cool to Mrs. Smith's idea for printing bills of each denomination above \$1 in a different color. Their chief concern is that the transition from the present black-and-green currency would be marked by confusion and public skepticism about the value of both new and old money.

In answer, Mrs. Smith said she has found "impressive public acceptance" for colored money. She said some 200 letters to her ran three or four to one in favor of the proposal.

She also reported considerable editorial support in the nation's newspapers.

But another treasury official, who strongly opposes colored money, said a tally he made for Dillon showed most editorials disapproved.

As for the chances that the plan will be adopted, Mrs. Smith said: "I'm not pessimistic. I'm not optimistic, either."

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A proposed voluntary accreditation program for Florida nursing homes was approved Thursday by the Florida Joint Council to improve health care for the aged.

Council Chairman Dr. Louis I. Amato described the move by the nursing homes as a "courageous step." The program is supported by the American Nursing Home Association.

It is doubtful if Congress will be as open-ended as all this, even though the program's importance is recognized. Some dollar ceiling are apt to be put on authorizations and more curbs on spending. Such restrictions were included in the original draft legislation. But they were taken out on orders of Kennedy and Johnson.

Recognition of the value of this program and want to get it moving. It has been a slow-motion research at the rate of only a million dollars a year for the last 10 years.

There is another political catch in this saline water conversion legislation, however. House Interior Committee Chairman Wayne N. Aspinall (D-Colo.) and his colleagues are accustomed to dealing with water for power and irrigation. This is "making the desert bloom" stuff. They would therefore like to see desalted water made available for all uses—not just for drinking, washing and manufacturing.

There has of course been plenty of federal subsidy money put into providing the West with irrigation water at a fraction of its cost. But desalinated water will still be too costly for agriculture for many years to come, unless we find new ways. So there must be some readjustment of political thinking.

If the legislation can be got through the House this year, the Senate may offer no problem. For the Senate last year passed a bill for a stepped-up saline water conversion program, only to have it die in House Interior Committee.

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y. (UPI) — This picturesque New York state village welcomed many familiar baseball dignitaries today for the enshrining of Max Carey and the late Billy Hamilton, two stars of a bygone era, into the baseball Hall of Fame.

A crowd of more than 10,000 was expected for the morning installation services at the museum in downtown Cooperstown (pop. approximately 2,500) and the annual Hall of Fame game at nearby Doubleday Field in the afternoon. This year, the Baltimore Orioles play the Los Angeles Dodgers for the Hall of Fame cup.

Ford Frick, baseball commissioner and one of many famed dignitaries of the sport, will preside at the installation services in which plaques of Carey, 71, and Hamilton will be unveiled. Carey was on hand for the ceremonies, along with his wife and son, while Hamilton, who died in 1910, was represented by his daughter, Mrs. Howard Prior of Belmont, Mass.

Carey and Hamilton were elected to the Hall of Fame last January by the 12 members comprising the committee of veterans, which considers only men who have been in active as players for 30 years. Their election increased the members in the Hall of Fame to 60 players, 25 of whom are living.

West opened the king of hearts and continued the suit. East won the second lead with the ace and led the queen of clubs. South let the queen hold and won the second lead with the ace.

This was an example of bridge made easy. All he had to do after that was to lead a diamond to dummy's ace and claim the last eight tricks on a cross ruff. If West had opened a trump, South could have made the hand also, but he would have had to set up dummy's fifth diamond. I leave the exact method for you to work out.

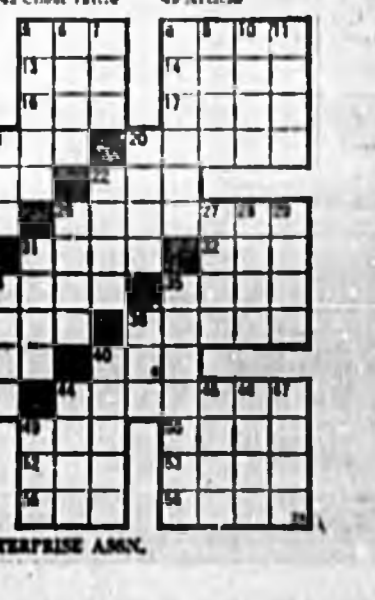

U. S. Crime Hits All-Time High

WASHINGTON (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today that United States crime reached an all-time high last year. He urged communities to hire more policemen. Hoover said that while the national crime rate continued to climb faster than the population, the nation's police force remained at virtually the same strength. The 1960 uniform crime report, made public by Hoover today, showed that 1,891,399 serious crimes—or one every 15 seconds—were committed last year. This was an increase of 14 per cent over 1959.

Cuban Red Carpet Expected For Yuri

GANDER, Nfld. (UPI)—Soviet cosmonaut Maj. Yuri Gagarin, making his first visit to the "New World," leaves today for Cuba and a red carpet welcome usually reserved for heads of state. Gagarin and his party of 15 were scheduled to fly from Gander aboard a Soviet Ilyushin-18. They arrived Sunday night from Moscow for a 14-hour stopover en route to Cuba. The full state reception awaiting the young spaceman at Havana's International Airport has been given only two other men—President Sekou Toure of Guinea and President Sukarno of Indonesia. Gagarin's trip to Cuba is in honor of the 8th anniversary of the start of Premier Fidel Castro's 25th of July revolutionary movement. As one of the featured guests, the Soviet space man is expected to join Castro in addressing a huge rally the night of

Third Astronaut Trip Slated Late August?

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—Scientists studied astronaut Gus Grissom today to decide whether to send another man on a sub-orbital rocket ride.

If they decide "yes," the next American spaceman will be John H. Glenn Jr., a 40-year-old marine. The flight probably would come in late August or September.

If they decide "no," the nation's \$400 million "Project Mercury" will shift its attention fulltime to send one of its seven astronauts on a rocket flight into orbit early in 1962.

If the emphasis is shifted 100 per cent to an orbital flight, Grissom, No. 1 U. S. spaceman Alan

B. Shepard Jr., and their five fellow astronauts will all be eligible to make the flight.

Federal Space Agency Chief James E. Webb said in Washington Sunday that no decision has been made about another sub-orbital flight. But he said that if there is one, the pilot will be Glenn, the man who stood by twice as "back-up" pilot to Shepard and Grissom.

Grissom, who flew 118 miles into space and 303 miles over the Atlantic Ocean Friday before an audience that included a Russian trawler about 20 miles from where he landed, turned himself over to engineers, doctors and psychologists Sunday for a full report.

It would be more of the same today, space agency spokesman said. "This is a report for the engineers," said one. "Shepard underwent the same thing, only most of his was done at Grand Bahama Island."

The stocky Air Force captain is expected to return to Langley Field, Va., "home base" for the astronauts, late Tuesday or Wednesday.

The problem of the escape hatch which Grissom said blew off accidentally after his "Liberty Bell 7" capsule had hit the water continued to plague experts today. There were further theories as to what might have happened, including one that contended vibrations from ocean waves pounding the spacecraft might have triggered the plunger.

Regardless, said Webb, the project would continue using the new hatch because it allows the astronaut a quick way to get out if anything goes wrong. It also reduces the capsule weight by about 50 pounds.

Overall, space agency authorities said, the flight was a "whopping success"—so much so that further trips of this type may not be needed.

'Scorching' Weather Grips East

By United Press International Thunderstorms in the offing from Texas to New England offered little relief today for Eastern states gripped in a sultry mid-summer heat spell.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at week's beginning said the East was "in for another scorcher."

New York City's Jones Beach, one of the nation's largest, closed its gates at mid-afternoon Sunday with a capacity crowd. Other New Yorkers swarmed by the thousands to beaches on Long Island and New Jersey.

Metropolitan New York chalked up a high of 93 degrees Sunday

following Saturday's high of 97, a four-year top for the day. The weather picture was the same in Washington as capital forecasters announced "above normal" temperatures since July 13. The capital's lowest high temperature since July 13 was a humid 87.

About 75 persons were treated for heat exhaustion in a crowd of 40,000 at a Civil War battle reenactment at nearby Manassas, Va. Unofficial reports put the temperature at 102.

Washington's temperature dipped to 79 degrees, around midnight. By contrast, the Great Plains

experienced record-breaking chill over the weekend. Thunderstorms and heavy winds raked Missouri and Indiana.

The mercury dipped to 49 degrees, 15 degrees below normal Sunday at Valentine, Neb. Kansas City's high of 73 Saturday was a record for the date.

Severe rains and lightning hit the Kansas City area about midnight. Storms severed utility lines and felled trees north of St. Joseph, Mo., and more than an inch of rain fell in brief periods at Concordia, Kan., and Waterloo, Iowa.

Passenger Return Okayed

MIAMI (UPI) — Pan American World Airways said today the Cuban government has given permission for the airline to send a special flight to Havana today to pick up the 38 persons who were aboard a hijacked Eastern Air Lines plane.

A Pan American spokesman said the special flight would depart from Miami International Airport at 2 p. m. EST. He said he did not know if any Cuban refugees would be allowed to board the plane in Havana.

Pan American is the only U. S. passenger line operating between Miami and Havana.

The special flight will be the third plane Pan American will fly between Miami and Havana today. The other two flights had already been scheduled.

Meanwhile, special security measures were established today for commercial planes serving Florida to block a reported plot by pro-Castro agents to hijack additional U. S. airliners.

Informed sources said Monday's hijacking of an Eastern Air Lines Electra was part of a plot possibly to "avenge" seizure of a number of Cuban airliners for unpaid bills in the United States.

Eastern announced from its New York headquarters today "All possible precautions have been taken to prevent another incident."

Secret Service Chief Resigns
WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. E. Baughman, chief of the U. S. Secret Service since 1948, submitted his resignation today effective Aug. 31.

Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon accepted "with genuine regret" Baughman's decision to retire after 33 years' service.

Dillon wrote the 56-year-old Baughman. "The president joins me in wishing you success and happiness in the years ahead."

District 6 Commissioner John Fitzpatrick quipped "I'm sure we can open the jail without a desk or filing cabinet."

London Sweeney of Sweeney's Office Supplies, in a letter to the board said that in preparing the bids, "we were confronted with difficulties which stem from restrictive, discriminatory and extravagant specifications of items."

Sweeney said that some of the items were "odd balls," and that it would be "impossible for any dealer in Sanford to bid on them."

Sunny Powell of Powell's Office Supply said that the bidding committee "made up the specifications as they went along, but they weren't prepared to make a change of anything on all the items specified."

The board questioned Singletary on whether local dealers were asked to submit bids and the chief deputy said they were invited to do so.

However, the board agreed to call in some of the local dealers to discuss specifications and to re-advertise.

Kennedy Previews 'Toughen-Up' Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy called in Democratic congressional leaders today to preview the military and economic toughen-up program he will unveil to the American people tonight.

Kennedy scheduled a breakfast meeting with House and Senate leaders. The weekly legislative session gave him an opportunity to discuss with his Capitol Hill lieutenants the radio-television address he will deliver to the nation at 10 p. m. EDT.

The president's preparatory program to meet the mounting Soviet threat on Berlin was reported to call for a sharp military buildup, but no new taxes at this time. However, administration sources did not rule out a tax increase later if inflation should threaten.

New School Policy Set

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall today announced a new policy which he said will be of major aid in reducing school construction costs in 18 states.

Alabama, Florida, Louisiana and Arkansas are among the 18 but are not likely to use the policy widely because schools built under it must be completely integrated.

Under the new policy, states, local governments, and non-profit private organizations may obtain public land for school construction for \$2.50 an acre, with a limit of 60 acres within any single year.

Formerly, those seeking school sites were required to pay up to 50 per cent of normal market price for the public land.

Sunshine Parkway To Be Extended

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Turnpike Authority hopes to announce plans for extending the Sunshine State Parkway to Wildwood within a week or 10 days, Chairman John Hammer said Monday.

Hammer said the authority was determined to extend the toll road to Wildwood even if the federal government refused to shift the proposed route of Interstate Highway 75 to meet it there.

The Presbyterian Men of the Church will hold a 7 p. m. dinner meeting today in the church's Educational Hall.

City Commission Okay's Pay Hike For Employes

The City Commission Monday night agreed to give 117 "low pay bracket" employes a two percent cost of living increase during the next fiscal year and said it would consider the higher paid employes' increases when it starts work on the budget.

The salary hike would be for all employes making less than \$4,200 a year.

The total number of employes is 149 and the salary total, according to City Manager W. E. Knowles, is \$561,995.

At the same time, the commission authorized Knowles to set up a meeting between the city and employes to study the possibility of establishing a pension system with the city participating in the pension plan by matching three percent of the funds.

The police and fire departments now have their own pension system and the proposed one would only cover some 105 persons.

The proposal is to set up an actuarially sound system with the employes paying their share.

According to Knowles, the plan would include all present employes who so desire, but would not be compulsory. The program would be keyed to social security benefits and age, maximum benefits after 30 years service and eligibility for benefits after 10 years

UN Orders Troops To Elisabethville

LEOPOLDBURG, The Congo (UPI) — The United Nations ordered a company of tough Indian Gurkha troops into Elisabethville today in reaction to announcement that Katanga Province was seeking help from the Communist bloc.

The action was considered more a token show of force than any real military maneuver. Many officials doubted the province was seriously seeking Communist aid as announced Monday by Provincial Interior Minister Godefroid Munongo.

Less Prisoners

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida's prison population decreased by two to 7,334 last month, the first such decline this year. Rialford State Prison holds 3,120 of the convicts. Road camps hold 1,887. Fifty-two are in the State Mental Hospital, classified as criminally insane.

Mass Testing

FT. MONMOUTH, N. J. (UPI) — The Army has put into operation a \$1.25 million gadget that can test 17,290 batteries at the same time. It will be used to test a random sampling of 20 million batteries purchased annually at a cost of \$13.5 million for the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines.

Soviet Takes Ship

SIHOOGAMA, Japan (UPI) — A Soviet patrol ship captured the Japanese survey ship No. 19 (Gjoei Maru) and its crew of 20. It was reported today. The Japanese Maritime Safety Agency said the 83-ton ship was conducting a survey of fish resources Sunday off the northern Kuriles, which Russia occupies.

KEY WEST (UPI) — A total of 52 Cuban exiles arrived here by boat from their homeland Monday and sought political asylum. One boat carried 49 persons, the other boat contained three. All were turned over to U. S. Immigration authorities, who declined to release any of their names.

The new arrivals brought to 83 the number of refugees that have landed here since last Friday.

Citizens Group Set To Probe Courthouse

The County Commission today named an eight man committee to determine the needs for a new courthouse and heard District 4 Commissioner Vernon Dunn say he couldn't find anyone from his district to serve with the group because "everyone I asked pointed out to me that the board is attempting to pass the buck."

The commission authorized two additional members to name District 4 representatives.

On the board will be J. H. Van Hoy and John Britt from District 2; Andrew Carraway and J. R. Pope from District 1; Ford Cavanaugh and Dick Hanks, District 3 and Col. J. O. Gregory and John H. Williams, District 4.

The first meeting of the group is scheduled for next Tuesday at 8 p. m.

Dunn, citing reasons why he couldn't find anyone from his district to serve on the board, asked "did studies, findings and recommendations solve any past county problems? We need decisions and action instead of committees," he said.

Dunn said that a previous committee was appointed to solve county problems in 1958 and the board at that time said "This is a 'don't-thing' report and it was thrown right back in our laps."

Last week the commission agreed to appoint a committee made up of men from each district to determine courthouse needs.

In other business, the commission heard Mrs. Donna Estee of Longdale with two petitions—one for the county to assist in paving Orange Ave., bearing 161 names and one requesting the fencing of all junk yards bearing the names of 111 persons.

No action was taken by the board although District 3 Commissioner James P. Avery said he doubted if there was enough money in this year's budget to assist in paving the Longwood Road.

The board also turned over to Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. the request from J. Braley Odham to give the county a park in Sunland Estates if the county maintains it.

Last week the board tabled action on the matter because a reverter clause was in the deed and Odham's attorney, S. J. Davis, explained today that it was for protection and to insure that the county maintain the area as a park.

Senate To Oppose Red China In UN

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee went into closed session today to work on a resolution strongly opposing UN membership for Red China.

The resolution was urged primarily by Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen to discourage any administration shift in the issue, particularly to a "two Chinas" solution.

Administration officials said there was no difference of opinion between the State Department and Congress on the basic determination to keep Red China from pushing Nationalist China out of the United Nations.

A similar resolution has been suggested in the House.

Lavender Tells Board: 650 Roads In County

County Road Superintendent J. C. Lavender today presented the County Commission with a list of all the paved and unpaved roads in the county.

District 4 Commissioner Vernon Dunn said "this is something I have been requesting for many years" while District 3 Commissioner James P. Avery complimented Lavender and County Engineer Carlton Bliss for a job well done in compiling the data.

The board adopted the road survey pending a check of deeds for all the roads involved.

According to Lavender, there are 343 paved roads in the county running to 184.19 miles and 307 unpaved roads totaling 153.28 miles.

The total number of roads in the county is 650 adding up to 338.47 miles.

African Workers Defy Strike Call

SAISHURRY, Southern Rhodesia (UPI) — Armored cars and heavily armed troops scattered thousands of Africans streaming to work today in defiance of a strike call.

Government sources said the strike, now in its second day, appeared to be a failure.

Prime Minister Sir Edgar Whitehead of Southern Rhodesia warned in a pre-dawn broadcast that his government would put down any attempts to intimidate Africans.

Whitehead also hinted legal action against the National Democratic party leaders if it can be proved they were behind attempts to enforce the strike which erupted into violence Monday night.

Two Africans were killed and four were wounded when police opened fire on gangs attacking workers in the African townships of Harare and Highfields as they returned to their jobs.

Angry' Commission Raps Health Board

An angry City Commission Monday night authorized City Manager W. E. Knowles to tell the State Board of Health that Sanford is ready to go to court if necessary regarding a sewage treatment plant here.

The commission expressed its anger over a news release from the Health department board asking the health officer to write Sanford a letter threatening legal action if the city did not provide a sewage treatment plant.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said "apparently the State Board of Health has not kept pace with happenings regarding our plant. Since steps already are underway for a plant here such threats of legal action only cause hard feelings, confusion, and disruption of cooperative efforts."

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham, calling the State Board a "bunch of cunts" told the commission "we ought to make them apologize."

However, the board asked Knowles to call Jacksonville to set the matter straight and "so that there would be no doubts, tell them if they want to press their case we are ready," Higginbotham said.

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
