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## Challenge Of The Normandie Is Taken Up By Nations

England, Germany Both Will Seek To Lower Speed Record Set By Majestic Liner

**N**EW YORK, June 14.—When the French liner's new flagship Normandie beat her 1,429-foot length and 32,200 tonnage in a Hudson River race, she challenged again as great as those that followed. Rudolf Habsburg's good ship *Half Moon*, the first transatlantic liner to enter the Hudson.

Habsburg and his crew of 16 were inspired by Ingolds and the challenge. The Normandie must prove an even more relentless competitor.

Hardly had the Normandie and her crew accustomed themselves to New York's overwhelming welcome than they were reminded that they were here to recruit trade to their flag.

The Italian liner Rex, which

yielded her own record when the Normandie crossed in 4 days, 11 hours and 42 minutes, hoped that she would try to recapture her laurels. She showed all reserve power, had a bid for trade.

From Berlin, too, came word that Germany did not intend to surrender. The North German Lloyd Line's Bremen and Europa, both acknowledged speed records, made it plain that they would do what they could to lower the record.

England is building a new ship for it. The Cunard-White Star Line's Queen Mary will take to the commercial sea later next year, prepared to solicit the customers the Normandie has acquired in a year's head start.

"I am not speculative," said Sir Percy Sauer, chairman of the British liner line, when asked about the Queen Mary's speed, but shipping men expect the British liner to be the Normandie's chief rival.

The United States' pioneer marine in speedy ocean commerce, is out of the race, for the moment. Her one giant ship, the Leviathan, rests at a Hoboken pier, permanently withdrawn from service.

The Normandie, upon her arrival, moved grandly past the Leviathan, the new ship's 70,200 tons almost doubling the 18,842 of the American ship, and by her size mocking the very name Leviathan.

Yet it was an American ship that started the ocean trade ships on their fight against time. The first item of the romantic history was written by Robert Fulton. His 60-foot Clermont, which could have floated in the Normandie's 112-foot swimming pool, steamed from New York to Albany in 22 hours, the first journey by steam.

America again astounded the world in 1819 when her steamship Savannah crossed the Atlantic in 26 days. The record stood until 1858 when the Sirius negotiated the crossing in 18 days. That same year the Great Western cut the time to 15 days, nourishing a speed mania which saw the same vessel, in 1841, lower the time to 10 days, 10 hours, 15 minutes.

## Psychologist Says Society Should Aid Youths' Marriage

### Go Ahead Even If You Have No Money, Is His Suggestion

By MARY MCNAUL

**N**EW YORK, June 14.—Young people who want to get married yet, because of the depression, have neither job nor money to set up housekeeping, should go right ahead, anyway, and let the state and their families take care of the cost of establishing home and having babies.

That is the opinion of Dr. Arthur Frank Payne, psychologist, personnel director, of City College and educational director of the Institute of Applied Psychology, who has come to the forefront among students of present-day marriage problems. Hundreds of young people have taken him advice and it has worked, he declares.

"Since nature makes young people capable of becoming fathers and mothers at about 14, society is doing them a grave injustice by not helping them to get married as early as possible," Dr. Payne asserts.

"The state should subsidize child bearing. That is, young couples should be able to have babies at the expense of the state without cost to themselves. And if they have no money to

The important thing, Dr. Payne believes, is that young people should marry as the right thing. When they do not, all sorts of delicate and dangerous problems develop. In fact, Dr. Payne believes that a bachelor of 35 is worthless for marriage.

In spite of his feeling that everybody should marry early, Dr. Payne realizes that marriages in a prosperous state, like his, have increased and analyzed exactly 2000 cases of variations of conditions that produce unhappiness. The first of these differences in religious belief, causing conflict over the religious training of children.

Nursing, lack of romantic love, trying to keep up with the Joneses, interference by in-laws, quarrels over money, failure of husband to be a good provider and of wife to be a good housekeeper, bad talk between husband, pray quarrels of wife with the neighbors and embarrassing behavior of either husband and wife in front of friends are some of the causes which may wreck happy-married pairs, the psychologist says.

See difficulties account for fifteen of Dr. Payne's fifty-seven varieties of marital discord. A feeling of inferiority due to one mate being better educated than the other, failure of the wife to be a psychological mother to her husband, as well as the failure of either to live up to ideals of the other.

If, however, you follow Dr. Payne's twenty rules when choosing a marriage partner, you will be less likely to run up against snag, he asserts. Here they are:

1. If you are the quiet type who likes to stay home evenings and study, don't marry the type who likes noise and talk and is unhappy if left alone for a single minute.

2. A man should always pick a woman who is more intelligent and stronger than she is.

3. Be careful about marrying an only son who is unusually devoted to his mother or his older sister.

4. If you are a man, don't marry the woman who unconsciously wishes she were a man and tries to do men's work. Let her marry the feminine type of man—she marry not a tall.

5. If you are the feeling, emotional type, keep away from the analyst and scientist.

6. Choose your marriage partner and organize your marriage on a psychological basis.

7. Try to marry somebody who will develop no slower and no faster than yourself as far as personality goes.

8. Never marry your opposite, even though there was an old saying about it.

9. Never marry anybody with the expectation of reforming him or her.

10. Discuss love and life before marriage and choose a man or woman with whom you will be compatible.

11. It is best to marry a person with the same religious belief as yourself.

12. Be sure that your marriage partner is not so irrevocably bound by old ties, friendships and habits.

13. Finally Dr. Payne declares himself in favor of marital moratoriums for thinking things over when you reach crisis and warn the prospective wife always to be a hundred percent energizer to her husband, building up his self-confidence and never letting him feel inferior. The husband is advised to give to his wife not only economic security, but social security so that she need never be ashamed of him nor of their home.

14. Avoid the neurotic type—anybody who is a fanatic, whether it is about positive religion or fond fads, anybody who does eccentric things, the person who is too concerned about his (or her) physical condition.

15. Do not pay too much attention to what any relatives say about your choice.

16. Don't marry anybody with an inferiority complex.

17. If you are a woman, don't marry a man who is over-devoted to his mother or his older sister.

18. If you are a man, don't marry the woman who unconsciously wishes she were a man and tries to do men's work. Let her marry the feminine type of man—she marry not a tall.

19. If you are the feeling, emotional type, keep away from the analyst and scientist.

## Coal Miner, Near Death, Is Cured Of Angina Pectoris

### Cleveland Surgeon Performs Operation Successfully

CLEVELAND, June 14.—Four months ago Joseph Krishna to Lakewood Hospital here, sick with angina pectoris, dead heart disease, which had taken his life, when he was 40 years old. Every time he would walk slowly—every movement was slow, for he feared it might be his last.

The coronary arteries leading to his heart had become hardened and constricted. Gradually, the disease had become worse, until it was fatal. Even so often as he would cease almost entirely, bringing on sharp attacks.

Doctors have given him no hope to die, but they have given him a slight ray of hope, Dr. J. T. Denton on May 7.
