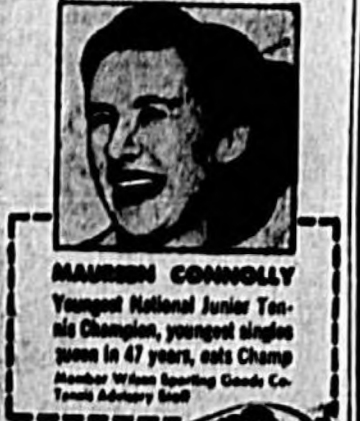

New Facts About Inside Of Atomic Nucleus Reported

SEATTLE (AP)—Some new findings about the inside of an atomic nucleus, which will take scientists another step forward in their efforts to understand the nature of matter, were reported Tuesday to the International Congress on Theoretical Physics.
The new details relate to what has been determined about the behavior of protons and neutrons, the basic particles of nuclei, while they are still within the atomic core.
Heretofore research has centered mainly on what these particles do when they come out of the nucleus. By themselves, they act as atom-smashing bullets if they are traveling at high speed and if they hit an atomic nucleus head

One report on their sharply different behavior while they are still inside the nucleus was made by Dr. E. P. Mottelson of the European Nuclear Research Center at Geneva, Switzerland. This center was set up with a reactor supplied by the United States after the "atoms for peace" conference there last year.

Dr. Mottelson's report, along with another by Dr. Victor P. Weisskopf of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, throws light on what holds the nucleus together. This has been a long-standing scientific mystery.
Reason for the mystery is that protons carry a positive electrical charge, and because of this they repel each other strongly when outside the nucleus. But they do not repel each other while inside the nucleus; otherwise the nucleus would fly into many pieces. Instead, it is a tightly knit particle of matter.
Inside the atomic core, said Dr. Mottelson and Dr. Weisskopf, protons and neutrons apparently are held together by clouds of other

particles called mesons. Mesons are highly energetic particles of matter and energy which are served outside the nucleus during atomic explosions.
The meson cloud inside a nucleus apparently is something like the dust cloudlet that fills space between stars in a galaxy or Milky way. Protons and neutrons within the nucleus not only rotate on their own little axes like stars but also move through the nucleus in circular or elliptical paths, another phase of stellar motion. This movement produces a nuclear field, a form of energy that is neither magnetic nor electrical but something which controls the behavior of the particles.

Good Breakfast Helps Keep Students Alert

WITH the kids back in school again, maybe you should pay a little more attention to their breakfasts. Furthermore, since this is National Better Breakfast Month, I can't think of a better time to discuss the subject.

Adequate Breakfast

It's important for everyone to have an adequate breakfast to start the day right. But it is especially important for schoolchildren. A hungry child can't learn as well as he should. He is at a definite disadvantage in his relationship with other youngsters.

Scientific tests conducted by the University of Iowa have shown that good breakfast habits are essential for maximum efficiency, both physical and mental, during the late morning hours.

Better Attitudes

The studies demonstrated that boys aged 12 to 14 had better attitudes and better grades following the consumption of an adequate breakfast. Also, students who had a good breakfast turned out more work, did not tire as easily and were quicker in their reactions than youngsters who went to school without breakfast.

While many doctors believe that breakfast is the most important meal of the day, it usually is actually the most neglected meal in many homes.

The Iowa studies demonstrated that the content of the breakfast is relatively unimportant as long as it contains adequate proteins and calories.

Generally, I advise a basic breakfast providing about one-fourth of the total daily caloric and protein requirements. A heavy morning meal, one representing about 40 per cent or so of the day's total food intake, doesn't increase efficiency during the late morning hours.

Basic Breakfast

A good basic breakfast should include fruit, milk, cereal including oatmeal, whole wheat or enriched bread and butter or fortified margarine. You can add an egg three to five times a week.

A breakfast such as this doesn't take much preparation. So, really, you don't have any excuse, do you?

Underdog Seminoles Not Ready For Cocoa

"We're not ready for Cocoa," the Sanford Seminoles mentor staff moaned today after an extensive scrimmage designed to sharpen up a dull-looking offense enough to give the underdog Seminoles a chance to rack up a season opener victory at the expense of the Cocoa Tiger powerhouse Friday night in Memorial Stadium. Jimmy Lepper, Melbourne's last season sparkplug for a successful try at the Orange Belt Conference Championship, has transferred to Cocoa. The speedy halfback will be running with the Tiger pack when they invade Memorial Stadium, thus helping the odds stack rapidly against the Seminoles as the coaching staff fights against bad weather and a climbing injury list.

Six top-notchers were laid up on the shelf today as the Seminoles got down to earnest first time in six long days. The injuries and dullness of the team, physically and mentally, is the direct result of lack of proper physical condition. Last week the team was making real progress in all departments, and the culmination of Friday's practice showed them ready for Cocoa. Sunday afternoon the Warriors met for a short session of contact and speed practice. Then the rain came; it stayed. The coaching staff made the best of the situation by holding short contact scrimmages and devoting a lot of time to the individual players, but the edge still dulled.

The blocking was slow and pitiful. The offense didn't jell and the boys were easily tired. Terry Goemble was the outstanding player in yesterday's action. It was apparent that he was as tired as the rest of the team members, but when they began to drag their feet, he continued pounding by sheer drive, desire, and determination.

Injuries are knocking hard at the door. Brantley Shirard and Murray Nance both dressed out for yesterday's workout, but were sent to showers before half the session was over. Official word is that the injuries have not completely healed. Shirard was benched by pulled cartilage in four ribs. Nance joined him with pulled ligaments in his back. The new outcropping of bangs and bruises sidelined Billy Tyne, 185 pound tackle, with a pulled shoulder muscle; Claude Hittell, 190 pound end, with a strained back; and Al Stanley, calm cool 170 pound quarterback, with back injury. Stanley's injuries are very slight and he should be at top speed Friday night.

Ten members of the Sanford Seminoles squad have shown their drive and determination enough for the mentor staff to single them out for backfield action against Cocoa. These best running backs have earned their chance to show their stuff the hard way. Stanley will see action in the quarterback slot as will Bobby Johnson. The left halfback

performers will be Phil Byrd and Eddie Barbour. Right halfbacks slated to see action are; Joe Russi, Ronnie Russi, Johnny Yeackle, and Al Collins. The fullback slot will be manned by Terry Goemble and Ronnie Gilles.

Stanley has been calling an outstanding game thus far, and the south-paw has been gaining in precision with his passing. Bobby Johnson is a smooth hand-off man and suppli' the Seminoles with right-handed aerials. Phil Byrd is the speedster of the team. He has shown a lot of potential in break away acceleration and broken field running. Eddie Barbour has shown well in the line plunges. He has a lot of drive and little fear, and can squeeze through small line holes and slip into the secondary. Joe Russi can lower his head and drive. His punting is shaping up well, and he has a lot of razzle-dazzle. His younger brother, Ronnie, has the necessary speed for the all-important end sweep blocking back. Yeackle shares this attribute with young Russi. Al Collins is up-and-coming by virtue of his speed and shiftness. Goemble is the Seminole plowboy. He carries his 190 pounds like a lightweight; in fact, he's the third fittest man on the team. Ronnie Gilles is a good alternate, and will supply the talented foe for the Seminoles' extra point attempts.

Co-captains for the opening tilt Friday night against Cocoa will be Byrd and Shirard.

Defensively two new members are the sound and looking good. Teddy Walker, 170 pound fullback converted to guard, has been pushing hard for top billing as a defensive guard, and David Stanley, 190 pound sophomore, is pushing his way into the line.

About Friday night's chances Fleming said, "If we can overcome our minor injuries and get our edge back that we had last week we will go into the game at full speed. But we're making too many mental errors. We will not be able to make today's mistakes on the playing field Friday night and expect to win."

Friday night is an important night in Sanford, Sept. 21, at 8 p. m. in Memorial Stadium the Sanford Seminoles kickoff their season opener in the Orange Belt Conference against powerful Cocoa. Seminole fans will see or be aware of many new things.

First, the Celery-Feds are now the Sanford Seminoles. Secondly, they have joined the fast and scrappy Orange Belt Conference. Third, the Seminole fans will be seated in the west stands for the first time. Fourth, a new electronic scoreboard has been installed that will please the fans. Fifth, Seminole High School's new Principal, Andrew J. Bracken will see his squad in action. Sixth, a powerful new organization is backing SHS athletics, the Seminole Chiefs Club. Seventh, new additions to the coaching staff have been made in

Nobody Knows Why Tunnels Built Beneath Office

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Nobody knows today why the mysterious dungeon-like tunnels were built beneath the old patent office 130 years ago.

Age-old records in the National Archives give no clue. Nor does any survive in the tunnels themselves. Empty, dripping stagnant, they echo in ghostly refrains the voices of rare explorers.

One legend is that the brick-walled passages were constructed as a means of escape in the event a foreign enemy ever captured the nation's capital again—as the British did in 1814.

Another version is that the low-roofed catacombs were dug as a prison for Confederate soldiers during the Civil War.

If so, the unfortunate captives huddling in the gloom may have heard the thump of musket over-head as the war-weary elite of Washington society danced the minuet at President Lincoln's second inaugural ball on March 6, 1865.

Lincoln himself attended the ball in the patent office's ornate model hall, where one of his own inventions was displayed in miniature. As a young congressman from Illinois, he had received patent No. 6469 in 1849 for a "device for buoying vessels over shoals."

Renewed interest has centered on the strange tunnels below the patent office because the structure, one of the oldest landmarks in Washington, has once more apparently escaped destruction.
