deciding the outcome of elections. The voting-or non-voting-of only a small numher of persons frequently has widespread offects.

For example, in the 1954 Congressional election only 34,000 ovtes represented the difference, outside the south, between the Democratic and Republican total for House members. In this same election Senator Bender (R., Ohlo) was elected by a margin of 6,041 votes less than an average of one vote for each precinct in the state, Senators O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.) won by 3.442 votes; Case (R., N. J.) by 2,370; Neubeger (D. Ore.) by 2,462; and Murray (D., Mont.)

In 1952, Pesident Eisenhower carried Tenescee by 2,487 votes and Adlai Stevenson led in Kentucky by only 700. The late Senator Taft (R-,Ohio) was elected to the Senate in 1944 by fewer than 8,000 votes-

less than one per precinct.
In 1930, Michigan elected Governor Mennen Williams, a Democrat, by 1,154 votes less than an average one for each three precincts.

Recently Frank Church beat Glen Taylor by 20 votes for the Democratic Senatorial mination is Idaho. And Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the present Democratic leader, was elected to the Senate in 1948 by an 87-vote margin. This explains why his friends sometimes refer to him as "Landslide Lyndon." These figures are brought out to show




