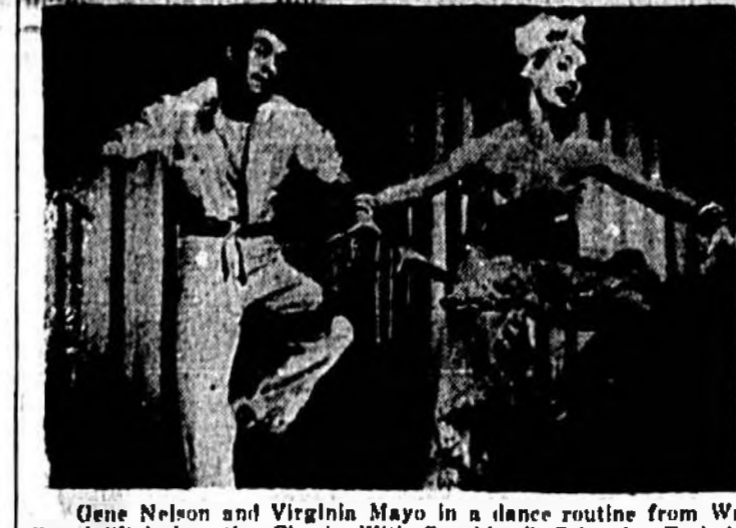

U.S. Observes Holiday Of Thanksgiving

Truman At Key West Is Host To Chief Justice Vinson And Stanley Woodward

Like the Pilgrim Fathers of 1621, Americans pause to savor the hardwon liberties of freedom in a troubled world on this Thanksgiving Day today.
Half at war, striving for peace, the nation plans to observe the holiday with the traditional brown-roasted turkey and all the trimmings. Sparkling cold, clear weather is forecast generally, with snow in some areas.
Even on the far-off Korean battle-front, many American combat troops could heap their mess kits with turkey-day fare calculated to make the eyes of their rice-fed Communist enemies pop out. At one military mess, the mess sergeant prepared a menu ranging from stuffed celery hearts, olives and shrimp cocktail to hot mince pie.
And there was hope, too, that the guns might soon fall silent as American officers expressed cautious optimism for a cease-fire in the bitter fighting that began almost 17 months ago.
At Key West, President Truman played Thanksgiving host to the man many believe he would like to have step into his shoes if he should die next to run again. Chief Justice Vinson, chief justice of the United States, and Mrs. Vinson, were guests of President and Mrs. Truman at the white cottages with the spacious lawn where the chief executive now regularly spends his winter vacations.
They planned a trip to the beach, a walk around the naval submarine station, and most of all, a shopping big turkey dinner at 2 P.M.
There has been no word from the President whether he will seek re-election in 1952. Nor has there been any indication whatsoever that Vinson plans to step down from the Supreme Court.
But there has been speculation that should Mr. Truman decide against running he would rather see Vinson succeed him than any Democrat he knows. Certainly there is no man in whose judgment on political matters the President has greater reliance.
He consults the Chief Justice frequently when major decisions are pending. And they are such close cronies that they get together on occasion for poker playing with friends.
The President has said he will not announce whether he will run again in 1952 until some time after he submits his three major messages to Congress in January.

Three Senators Oppose Further Aid For Europe

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(AP)—Three Democratic Senators reacted with no enthusiasm today to reports that the State Department may ask Congress early next year for more foreign aid funds for France, Britain and perhaps other countries.
"Congress will be pretty slow in responding to requests for more foreign aid," Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) told a reporter, turning to the language of a western cattleman, he added: "The weaning season is on and we expect to hear the calves do a lot of howling. It's a heart-breaking sound, but the time has now arrived."
The western Big Three proposals for disarmament by stages, Andraos declared, seem to have been carefully thought out but his country does not like their delaying control of atomic weapons until the last step.
Andraos spoke in advance of British Minister of State Selwyn Lloyd.
The Egyptian viewpoint today appeared to be a sharp change in the country's stand. As a member of the Security Council until two years ago, Egypt's representative on the council's Atomic Energy Commission had favored the Western majority position on atomic control.

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Fine Books, Beautiful Antiques Mark Library Of General Sanford

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an account of the life and treasures of General Henry S. Sanford, founder of Sanford and former U. S. minister to Belgium, whose efforts in behalf of this community will be memorialized by a museum to house his magnificent library if plans of the Sanford Women's Club and the Sallie Harrison Chapter of the D. A. R. are fulfilled:
DERBY (CONN.) BENTINEL
One of Derby's landmarks is "The Homestead," a rambling, frame structure of 18 rooms, with spacious and well kept garden attached, located at the corner of Caroline and Fourth Streets and since 1830, the year which it was built, the home of the Sanford family.
The wing of the house was added in 1871 as a library which has become a museum in itself, with strikingly large floor lamp of ebony, carved from a single piece with a curiously fashioned figure, extending almost from floor to ceiling and a monument to the artistic skill of its maker and obtained from a collection in Venice.
Handsome furnishings of the colonial period interspersed with odd pieces of other periods abound in the halls and rooms while paintings, adorning the walls, enrich the entire interior of the house.
Under the direction of the Marchesa, Mrs. Helene Carole Nancy Sanford, widow of Abbot Low Dow and daughter of the Hon. and Mrs. Henry Shelton Sanford, who now occupies "The Homestead," the modern motif is somewhat in evidence but the house, almost in its entirety, reflects those periods of by-gone years, rich in memories and exquisite taste and denoting a close touch with the old world besides emphasizing the affluence of the Sanford family.
The long, high-ceilinged library is filled with a rare assortment of paintings, books, objects d'art, furniture, vases, candelabra and a variety of other articles, some of them of the 17th century, nearly unaltered in Europe, and extending from floor half-way to the ceiling, are filled with valuable, highly bound books. 19 Rescued From Sinking Haitian Ship Near Miami

MIAMI, Nov. 22—(AP)—The captain and 18 crewmen of the Haitian cutter Toussaint L'Ouverture were brought here early today by the Coast Guard which rescued them from their battered and leaking craft about 15 miles off the Florida coast.
Three members of the Haitian ship's crew were missing but the captain said it was believed they had made shore, probably on some lonely beach south of Miami.
The Haitian vessel, a Coast Guard cutter 111 feet long, was on its way from Port Au Prince to Miami when it began leaking in rough, heavy seas.
Its captain, Jack Salgado of Port Au Prince, said one of the three missing men was Nicolas Bonussjour, the ship's executive officer. Salgado said the Toussaint L'Ouverture carried no radio and that the executive officer set out with two crewmen for the Florida shore to seek aid. Flares meanwhile led the Coast Guard to the stricken vessel.
A strong tide was running, and the men, in a stout dingy, were believed to have made land without much trouble.
Salgado said the Toussaint L'Ouverture left Port Au Prince Monday and that for 48 hours it was in rough, heavy seas. When the boat began shipping water faster than the pumps could take it out, he said, the men tried halting in heavy seas. Salgado said the ship was off Fowey Light House.

Acheson Denies Soviet Charges Of Subversion

Only One Point Is Holding Up Accord; Comms Overrun Advance Position

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(AP)—The State Department, rejecting a Russian assertion that the U. S. is promoting subversive activities behind the Iron Curtain, says that charge comes with "complete ill-grace" from Moscow.
The Soviet regime, the department said in a statement made public last night, has consistently supported "subversive activity against the U. S. and other nations of the free world."
The Russian protest, made in a note handed to the U. S. embassy on Tuesday, said the U. S. was guilty of "new aggression" against the Soviet Union.
"Group's propaganda," the State Department replied.
Russia said the Mutual Security Act, which authorized the execution of the Mutual Security Act to which Moscow referred as "designed to provide assistance to victims of Soviet Communist oppression when such assistance is determined to contribute to the defense of the North Atlantic area."
It said the act is in conformity with the charter of the United Nations, and is designed for defense only.
Russia's note, the department statement continued, is "another of many attempts to distort particular aspects of the defense effort of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization for propaganda purposes."

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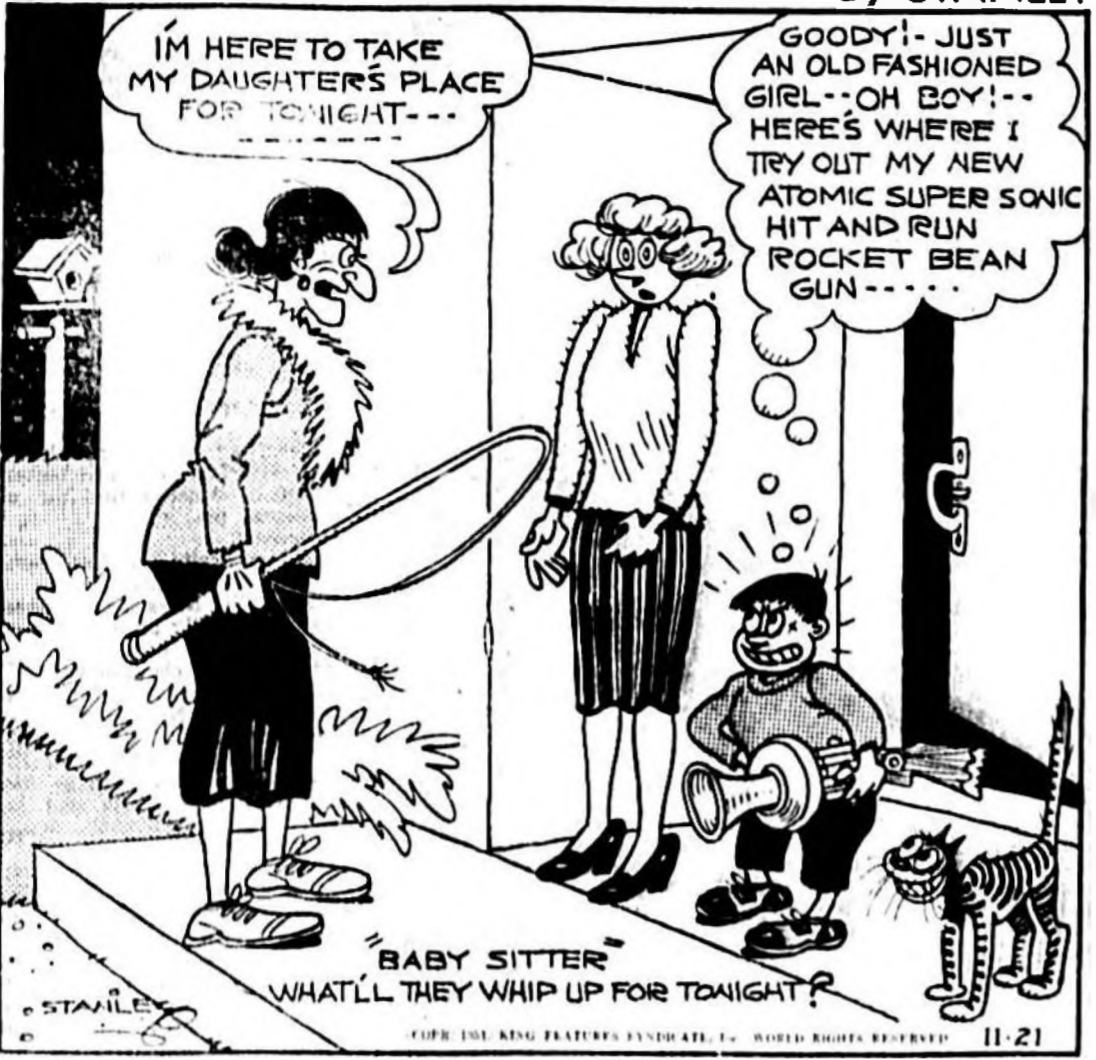

Gunshot Wound Fatal To Whooping Crane

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 22.—(AP)—Howard the Whooping Crane died yesterday of a gunshot wound.

His death takes another gap in the vanishing flock of 32 counted last year, the only known Whooping Cranes in the world. Howard came from the far north to open the winter on a sun-bathed island in the Gulf of Mexico near Corpus Christi, Tex.

It was then that the refuge manager Julian Howard noticed he dragged a leg in flight but seemed to be taking care of himself. Later manager Howard found Howard the Crane on the ground, unable to stand.

Last Saturday Howard the Crane was put to bed in a crate of hay and taken to the San Antonio zoo for treatment. The wound was infected and Howard failed to respond to sulfa treatment.

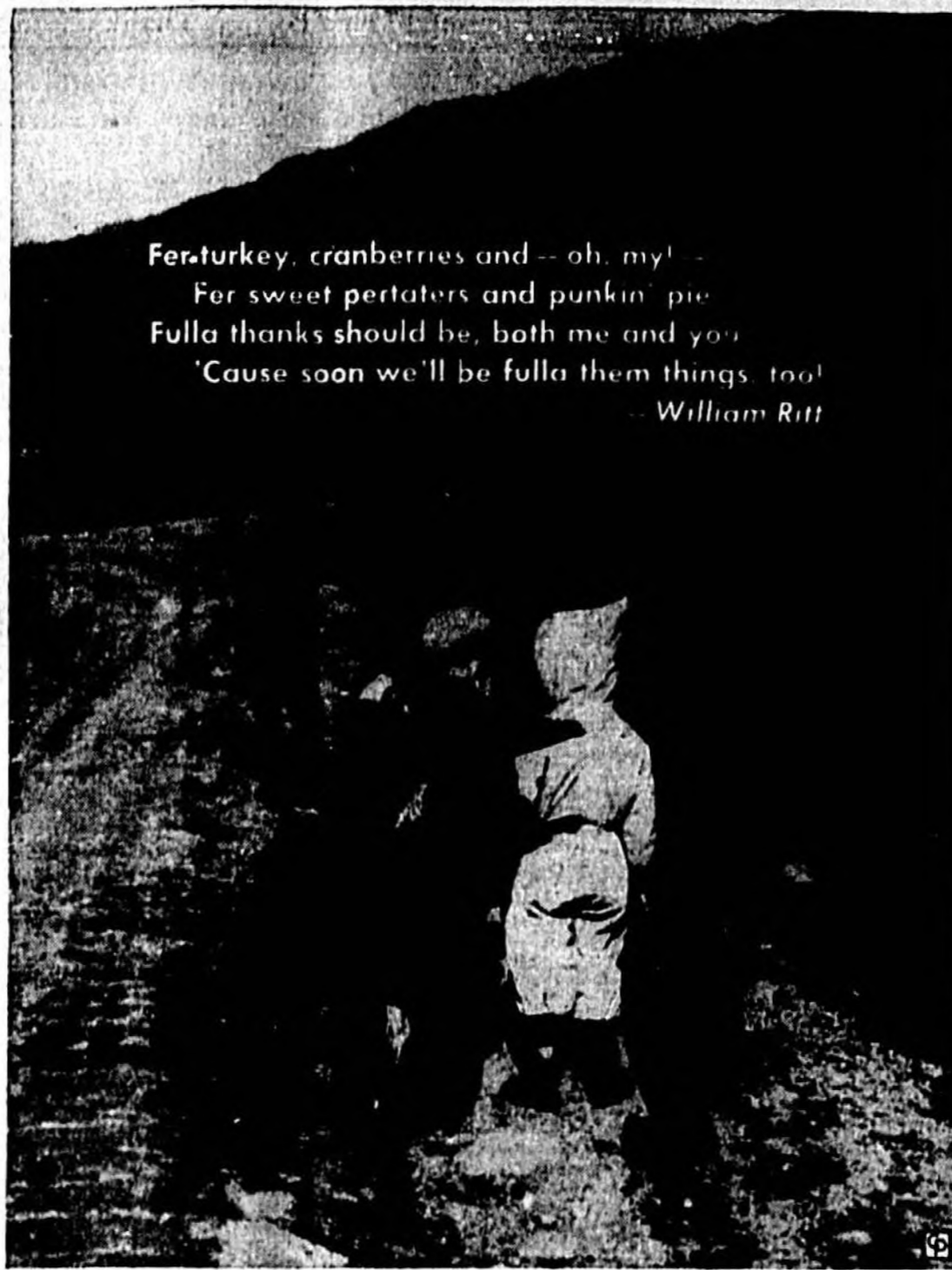

Comic Books "Not So Bad", Says Professor

EAST LANSING, Mich., Nov. 22.—(AP)—A Michigan State college professor who spent six months reading comic books concludes, "they're not so bad."

Dr. Morton Maltz, Assistant Professor of Education, read through 10,410 pages of 183 comic books as part of a research project.

His report: "General attacks on comic magazines are unwarranted. It is not true that they are dominated by crime, sex and violence and 90 percent of them would be acceptable for publication in newspapers."

The professor said that by percentages, adventure, animal antics and western stories outnumber love, detective and superman stories. Advertising had the greatest single percentage—16.7 with westerns second with 11.7.

Pigs Hastened To Market With Help Of Synthetic Milk

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 22.—(AP)—America's little pigs may be hastened to market with a new synthetic milk and summoned to meals with phonograph records of sow's grunts.

Herbert G. Luther, research scientist with Chas. Pfizer & Co., Brooklyn, N. Y., said that piglets fed the new concoction weighed 10 to 25 pounds more than normally-suckled ones in an eight-week period. He spoke at the animal nutrition symposium at the University of Minnesota farm last night.

Trade named Terralac, the synthetic contains terramycin, an antibiotic that stimulates growth, dry skim milk, lard to supply fats, fish oils and tiny amounts of vitamins and minerals. Except for the fish oils, it tastes like heavy milk, Luther reported. It looks like pie crust mix.

More piglets can be produced with it, Luther said, promising more and maybe cheaper pork chops and bacon.

He said successful tests have been run on 500 pigs in a Brooklyn laboratory and 3,000 more on large farms. The cost is set at 35 to 40 cents a pound, with the animals using 12 rounds apiece before weaning.

Normally sleepy critters, pigs are usually awakened by the sow's grunting. Luther put the grunts on records which were played every hour on the hour at feeding time.

HOSTON, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Turkey will be the Thanksgiving day piece de resistance for United States armed forces, ashore or afloat, at home or abroad.

The standard menu for the Navy everywhere follows: Shrimp or fruit cocktail. Relish tray. French onion soup. Roast young tom turkey with giblet gravy. Oyster or cornbread dressing. Cranberry orange relish. Snow-faked or glazed sweet potatoes. Cauliflower or battered green peas.

Waleorf or perfection salad. Hot cloverleaf rolls and butter. Pumpkin, sweet potato pie or mince meat pie. Ice cream. Assorted fruits, candies, nuts, Coffee, tea or milk.

Because the Navy now is operating in virtually all time zones, there will be a wide divergence in the hour for chow down.

Marines serving on Navy vessels will share Navy fare. Elsewhere the Marine Corps menu, even in the lines, will differ little, although turkey will be fortified with baked ham and lee cream will supplement desert wherever possible.

A master menu for the Army and Air Force in continental United States will closely resemble that of the Navy.

Abroad, however, menus will be prepared by each command, conforming as far as possible to the master menu as local conditions and the exigencies of the services will permit. All menus will be shaped around the traditional turkey.

More than a half million pounds of turkey were shipped in advance to the Far East. As entertainment, football games will be broadcast throughout the services.

2 Corps Formed Of U. S. Troops Inside Germany

FRANKFURT, Germany, Nov. 22.—(AP)—American combat in Germany—six divisions strong—are being grouped under two corps commands in the U. S. Seventh Army, officers disclosed yesterday.

The Seventh Corps—which earned the nickname "Lightning Joe" for its last wartime leader, General J. Lawton Collins—is now established at Stuttgart.

Earlier this year, Fifth Corps was set up at Bad Nauheim, near Frankfurt. Official identification of Seventh Corps came as the vanguard of the 28th Infantry Division, Pennsylvania's National Guard, approached Bremerhaven by troopship.

Seventh Corps commanded the 28th Division in maneuvers last spring during "Exercise South-ern Pine" in North Carolina. It also commanded the 43rd Division, New England National Guard, which arrived in Germany last month.

Both divisions are expected to be placed again under the Seventh Corps Command, Major General Withers A. Burress. Burress, 57-year-old native of Richmond, Va., formerly commanded the U. S. Constabulary in Germany, an outfit equivalent to an armored division.

The buildup to six divisions has made American Forces on the Rhine defense line stronger than at any time since their disintegration in late 1945 through hurried demobilization.

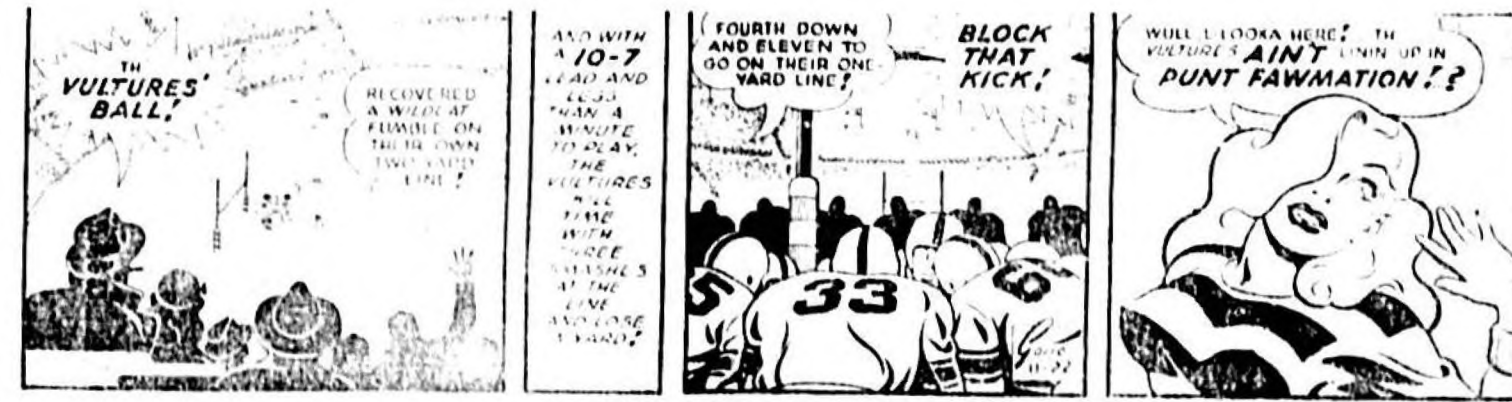

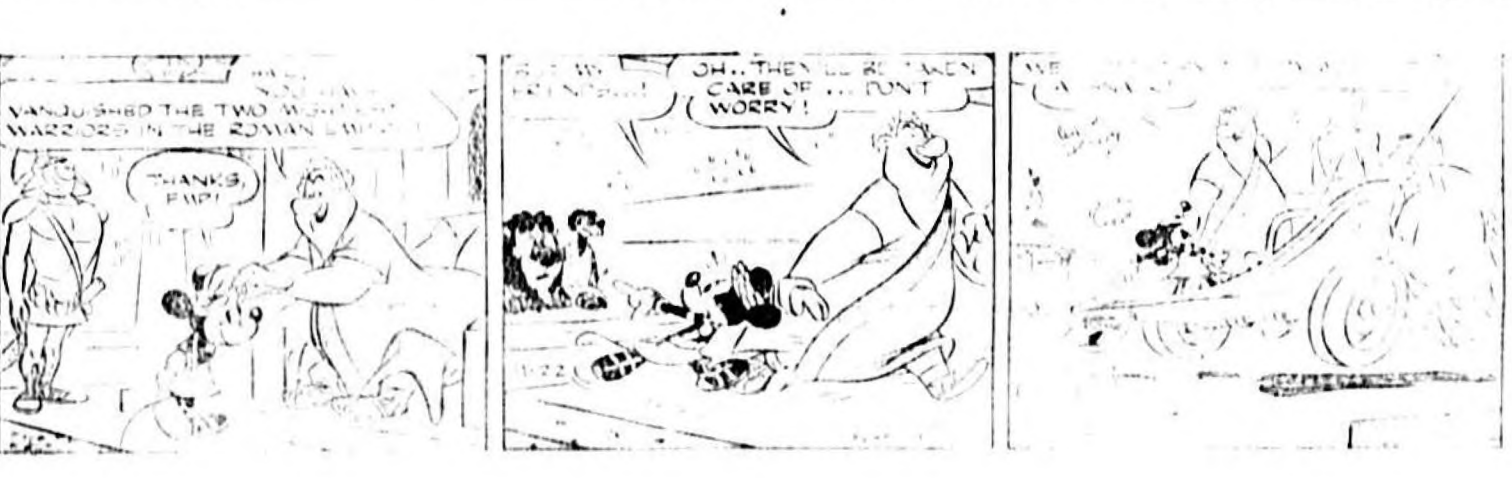

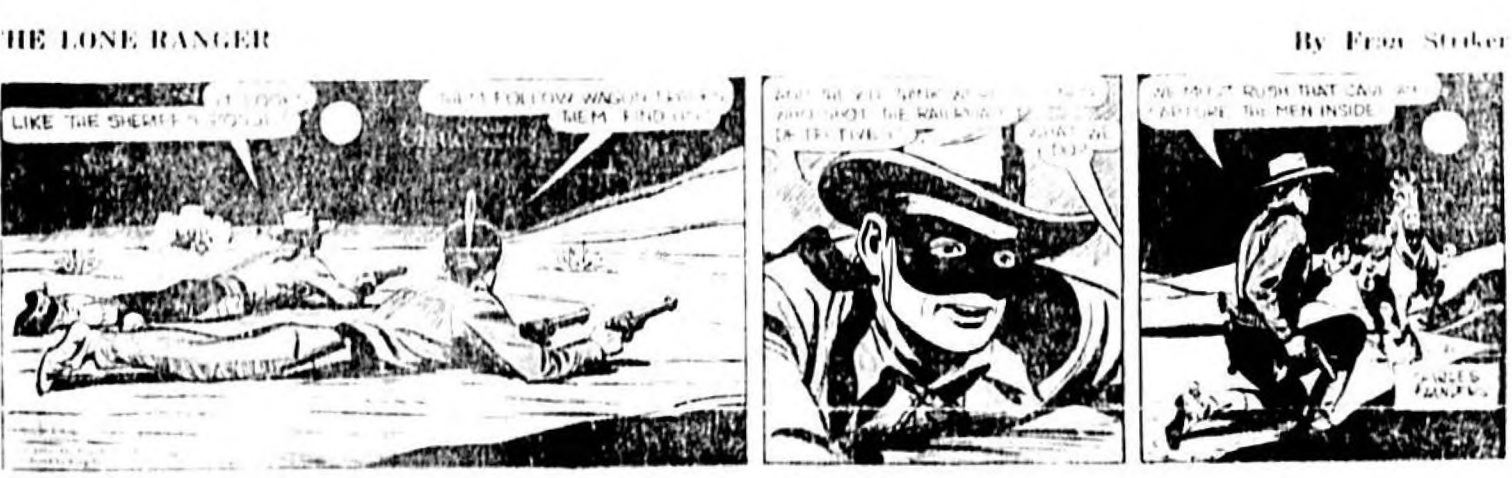
