## Thousands In Chicago Greet Smith On Tour

**Democratic Candidate Turns Smile On Big Throngs Which Jam Streets In Vicinity**

**Great Ovation Is Given Governor**

**Practical Politicians In Windy City Differ On Ballot Prediction**

**CHICAGO** Oct. 19.—(INS)—Governor Alfred E. Smith today turned the full candle-power of the famous "smile," the grin that brought him the title of "the happy warrior," upon 250,000 Chicagoans who lined the curbs and jammed street intersections where his automobile stopped for brief moments upon his two-hour tour of the city.

That smile took Chicago by storm. A constant cheering cheer sounded as the Governor drove north through the Loopland to Evanston along the north shore of Lake Michigan and south of the park.

Officially that triumphal march was for an inspection trip by the Democratic presidential nominee, but reduced to practical politics it was the challenge of the Democracy of Illinois to the Republicans of the state. It was nothing Governor Smith directly to the voters for their approval.

It was one great ovation all through the downtown business section. Men cheered and women screamed.

Before the start of the processional Governor Smith ate his hearty breakfast, but varied the usual fried eggs for scrambled eggs and increased the ham there to four eggs.

Practical politicians of the two opposing parties here in Chicago are as far apart as the poles regarding the outcome of the presidential election in Illinois.

Such Democratic leaders as Tom Donavan, successor to the late George Bremer as Democratic national committeeman from Illinois and state chairman as well as told Governor Smith that he will come up to the Cook County line on even terms with Herbert Hoover and that he will carry Cook County by between 100,000 and 200,000. This would give him the state by a wide margin.

While Democratic leaders have been pointing now like this into Governor Smith's attorney car, former representatives James W. Good of Iowa, Hoover manager of the Western headquarters, with equal confidence asserts that Illinois will return a normal Republican majority for Hoover, which he estimates at not less than 50,000. Coolidge's majority over Davis four years ago was 576,000.

Apparently there was no reconciliation of these widely conflicting claims today. The Democratic leaders who surround Governor Smith on his three-day visit to the state are confident. The Republican leaders who are domiciled half dozen blocks away are no less optimistic. Some of the practical politicians in both parties are going to wake up on the morning after election with a headache.

**Field Museum Gets Fine Collection Of Fossil Specimens**

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—(INS)—Shantz K. Roy, a member of the Expedition of Field Museum just returned to Chicago with a collection of fossils believed to be the oldest and most complete ever brought from the Arctic regions. It has been announced by Stephen C. Shantz, director of Field Museum of Natural History.

Roy is assistant curator of vertebrate paleontology at the museum, and was the geologist of the Dawson expedition. The ex-

pedition's schooner "Bowdoin" penetrated into the upper reaches of Franklin Bay in Baffin Land, with the result of the members of the bay picking its way through uncharted shoals, reefs and islands. No other ship has ever penetrated so far in these treacherous waters. After the vessel was anchored, Roy set out in a motor boat off farther on the coast and landed near Sallman's Fjord, where he did more of his collecting of specimens. The collection includes a number of marine invertebrates as well as coral, sponge, brachiopods, bivalves and other organisms which are more than 600,000 years old. The nature of this life indicates that in these

early days the Arctic regions probably had a tropical climate, like animals of the Cambrian age, more than 500,000,000 years ago. Modern trilobites, and also the insects of the present day, are believed to be distant relatives of those trilobites.
