

# Rift Between Brandt And Erhard Worries Allies

BERLIN (UPI) — Western Allied officials today were reported worried about a growing rift between West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt and Chancellor Ludwig Erhard's West German government over the passes issue.

The officials fear differences concerning permits for West Berliners to get through the Communist anti-refugee wall might crack the city's anti-Communist front, sap morale, and encourage the Reds to believe West Berliners finally are tiring of their

front-line position in the cold war.

Any of these possibilities could be disastrous for West Berlin, a vital Western outpost surrounded by Communist territory.

The rift between the city and federal governments deepened abruptly Friday night when Brandt, in a radio-television address, defended his Christmas pass arrangements and virtually accused Erhard of playing party politics.

Erhard, reportedly enraged, summoned Brandt to Bonn at the end of this week to discuss the matter.

Erhard is a member of the ruling Christian Democrats and Brandt heads the opposition Social Democrats.

Western officials think the quarrel already has gone too far and has caused uneasiness in the city, a feeling of insecurity among West Berliners, and a vague distrust of political leaders.

The Western Allies are wary of getting involved in what threatens to become a Socialist-Christian Democratic quarrel and an issue in

next year's West German parliamentary elections.

But privately they question the role played by Brandt and his associates in the dispute that began with the issuance by the East Germans of passes so West Berliners could visit their East Berlin relations over Christmas.

Despite West German and Western Allied reservations, Brandt had his way over

Christmas and East German postal workers were allowed to enter West Berlin to issue passes.

The East Germans and Brandt wanted to renew this agreement for Easter. But the West German government, strongly backed by the Western Allies, said the agreement could not be repeated because it tended to accept the Communist doctrine that West Berlin is a separate en-

ity, a third German state in which the Western Allies and the West German government have no legal rights.

The city government first opposed this West German stand, then accepted it, then opposed it, then accepted it again and broke off the talks with the East Germans until after Easter.

Then came Brandt's statement Friday and Erhard's summons to the mayor.

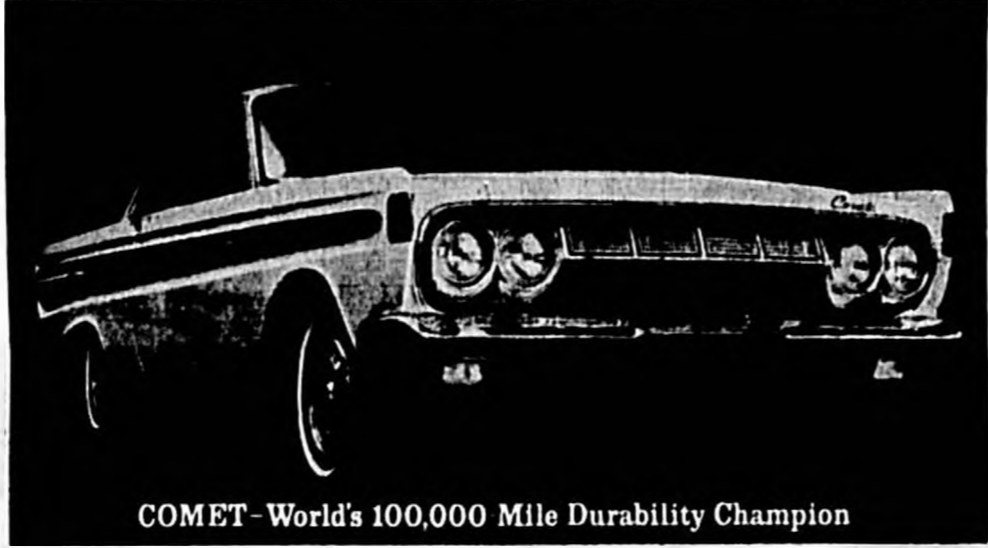

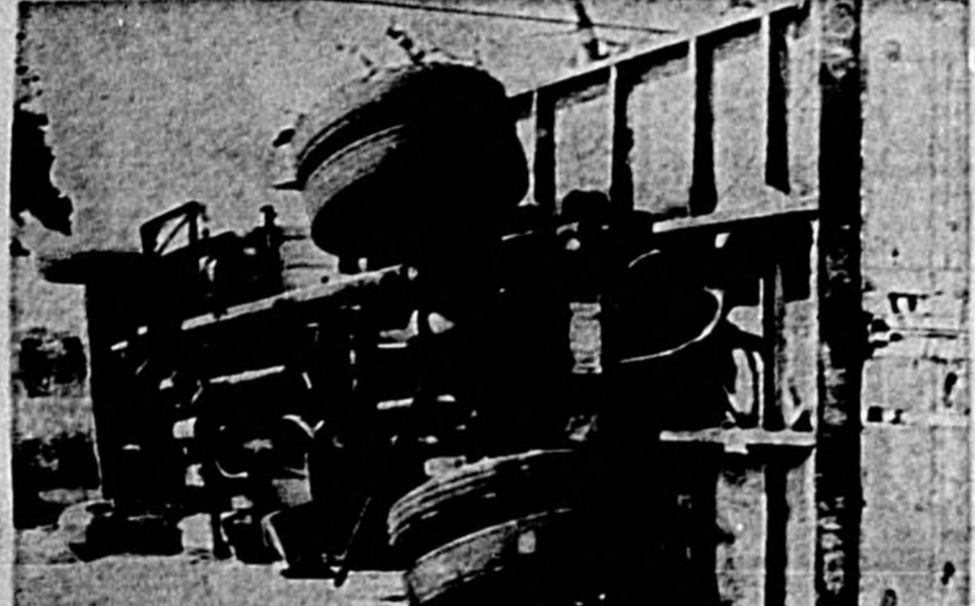

## Tamale Pie Becomes Easy To Prepare

Through the years, the origin of many recipes have been forgotten. Tamale Pie, spicy and flavorful, is a simplified version of the tamale, long a favorite food in the southwest. Tamales originated in ancient Mexico. Early Spanish settlers moving into the southwest brought this tasty dish with them.

One of the main ingredients of the tamale is corn. Originally almost the entire ear of corn was put to use when tamales were prepared. The corn was ground into a meal, then mixed with water to form a mush. The mush was spooned onto a corn husk, topped by a highly seasoned meat mixture wrapped tightly in the corn husk, and then steamed until done.

The settlers soon simplified this ancient recipe by baking the corn meal mush and meat mixture in a deep dish, calling it Tamale Pie. To complete the menu, serve crisp, hot rolls, green salad, fruit dessert and hot chocolate.

While your family samples this tasty dish, tell them the story. They won't soon forget your dinner or the tale.

**TAMALE PIE**

**Meat Filling**  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
1 1/2 pounds lean ground beef  
1 tbs. shortening  
1 1-pound can tomato paste  
1 tbs. chili powder  
1 tbs. salt  
1/2 tps. pepper

**Mush**  
1 cup cold water  
1 cup corn meal  
1 tps. salt  
1 tps. chili powder  
3 cups boiling water

Lightly brown garlic, onion, pepper and beef in shortening. Add remaining ingredients for meat filling and simmer about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. While filling is cooking, prepare mush. Combine cold water, corn meal, salt and chili powder; slowly pour into boiling water, stirring constantly. Bring to boiling point; cover and continue cooking over low heat 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour about two-thirds of the mush into a two quart baking dish. Spoon meat filling over mush in baking dish; then spoon remaining mush around the edge. Bake in 350-degree oven, about 20 minutes. Serves 6. Many people like it without this mush.

## Income Tax Primer - 7

### Travel, Entertainment Rules

You've undoubtedly read or heard about the controversy over the new travel and entertainment rules applicable to 1963 taxes. They apply to independent businessmen, employees who are reimbursed for their business travel and entertainment, and so-called "outside salesmen."

The new rules are in addition to the requirements of the old law which provided that all business deductions

for travel, entertainment and gifts must be "ordinary and necessary."

While the regulations were technically in effect as of Jan. 1, 1963, the Internal Revenue Service announced that taxpayers who made a good-faith effort to comply with the new rules for the period before July 31, 1963, would have all reasonable doubts resolved in their favor.

The 1963 "T and E" rules are in two parts: First, the stricter rules as to what is deductible; and second, the more detailed rules as to how you keep records.

Focusing on the deduction-for-entertainment rules, a taxpayer must be able to show the IRS that the amount of the expense was either:

—"Directly related" to the active conduct of his business

—"Associated with" the active conduct of his business and took place either directly before or directly after a substantial and bona fide business discussion.

Covered by one of the special exceptions to these rules, such as the so-called "business meal" under circumstances generally conducive to business discussion.

Even though your expenditure qualifies under one of these categories, it is now necessary that your expenditure be substantiated with adequate records of time, place, amount of the expense, and the name, title, or other designation of the person you entertained. A diary kept regularly is satisfactory for this purpose.

An employee who does not claim a deduction in excess of the amount of his reimbursement after transcribing his diary to the expense account form, generally need not keep his records to show the IRS. However, in the case where

the employee is related to his employer (by either family ties, corporate stock ownership or other similar relationship) the employee should keep his record to show an IRS agent if he should ask to see them.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — AFL-CIO President George Meany says that the new federal tax cut amounts to a 7.5-cent hourly wage increase for the average American worker.

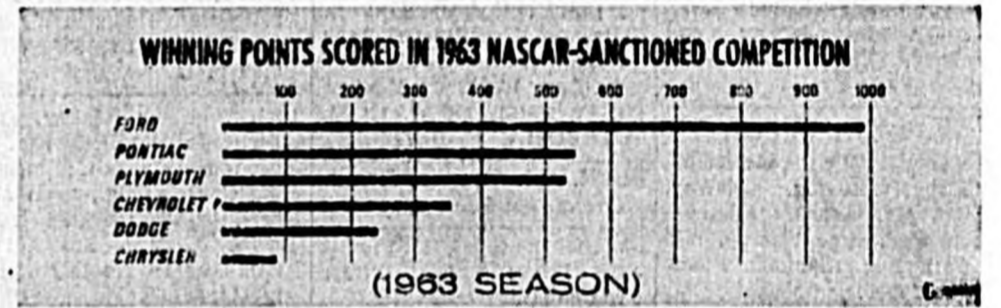
