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## City May Shut Swim Pools

The City Commission tonight will consider closing at least one of the municipal swimming pools this summer, City Manager W. E. Knowles reported to the attendance has been down.

\$10,000 to operate both pools last year and revenue made from the pools totaled only \$2,900 last year.

Knowles said that both pools, one at Ft. Mellon Park and one at Goldsboro steadily have been losing money. It cost some

about \$6,000 in other business at the Commission meeting scheduled tonight, the board is expected to deny a request to connect city utilities to the Sunland Baptist Church outside the city limits.

The board also will adopt the minimum housing code and amend various other ordinances at first reading.

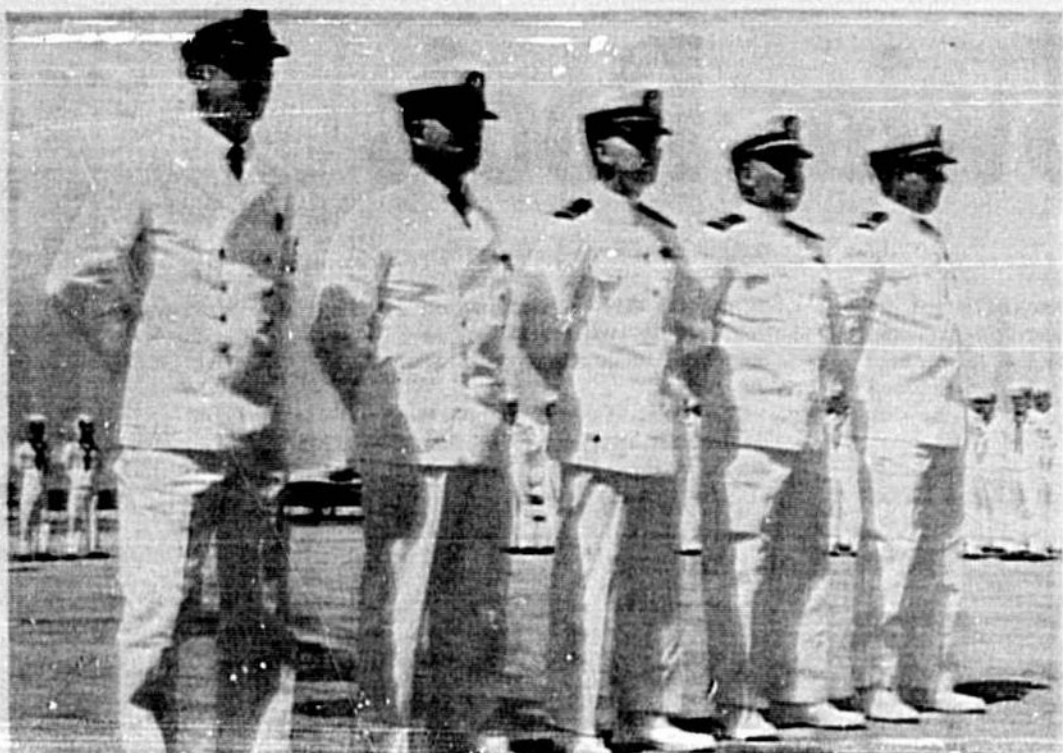

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate subcommittee today urged officials to lift bombing restrictions in the Vietnam war. But President Johnson gave his figurative embrace to a senator newly converted to administration war policy.

The critical survey came from the watching Senate Defense subcommittee headed by Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., which sent four investigators to North Vietnam last fall for a check with U.S. commanders and combat units.

The air raids over North Vietnam have made it more costly for the North Vietnamese to wage aggression, but it has been through the sacrifice of many American airmen and aircraft losses extending into billions of dollars.

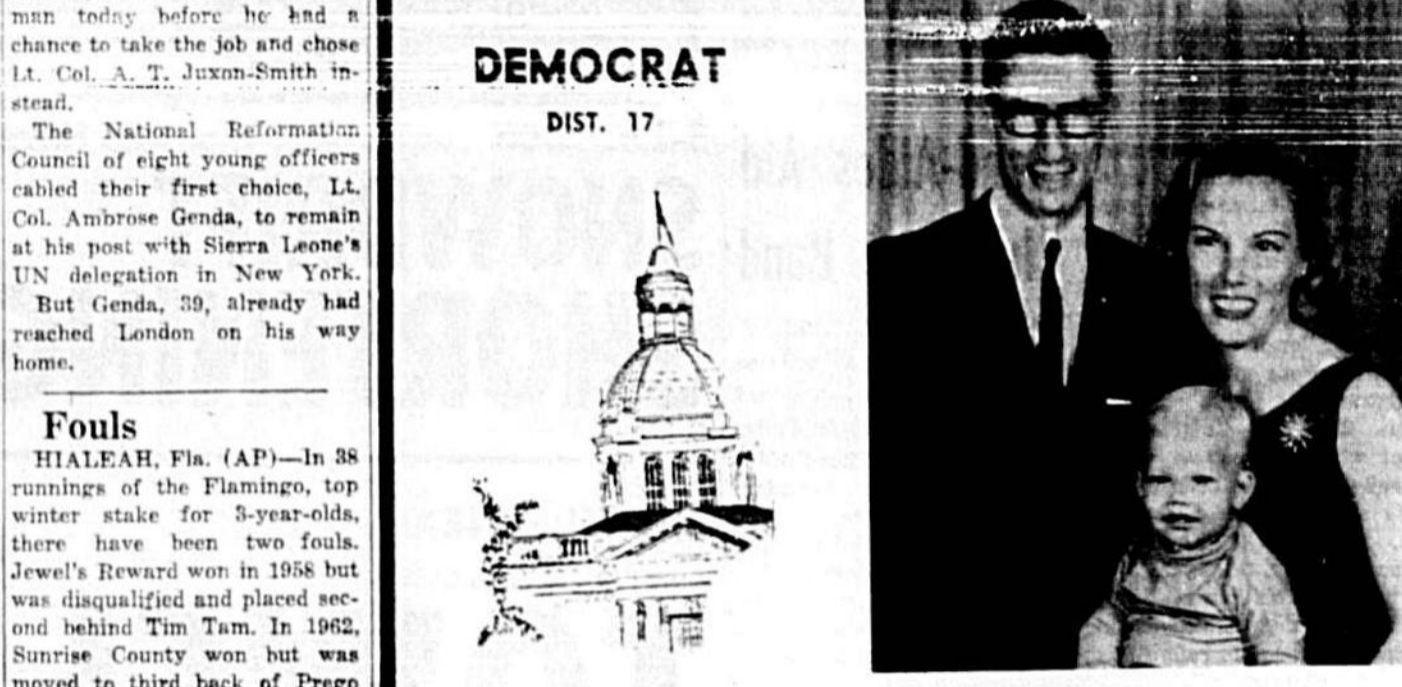

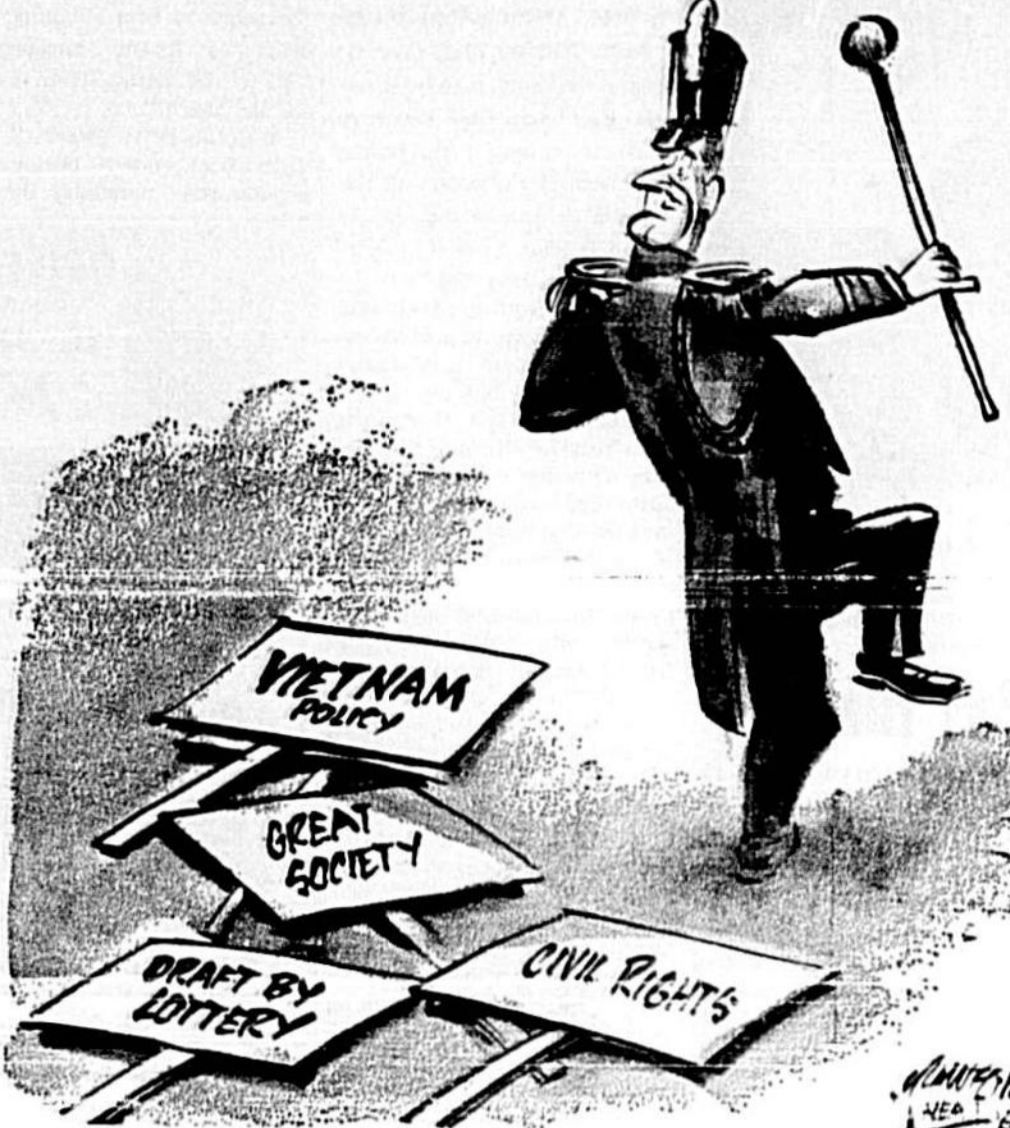

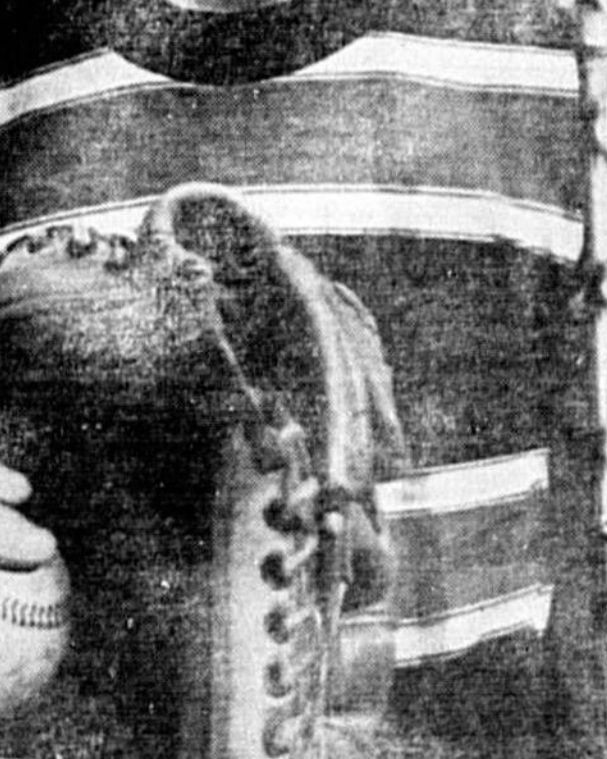

# Bird-dogging Reporter Helps Free GI Jailed For Killing

(Editor's Note — Here's a happy ending to the story of the young paratrooper who was sent to Leavenworth for 20 years because he shot a prowler while on sentry duty in the Dominican Republic. The Army has set Gene Barboza free.

The happy ending is the result in large measure of the faith and persistence of one of Gene's school teachers, who wouldn't believe him a headless killer, and of a bird-dogging reporter for Newspaper Enterprise Association, who wouldn't give up on the story despite official attempts to cover it up.)

By ROBERT COCHNAR, NEW YORK (NEA) — After serving 15 months of a 20-year sentence for murder, Pfc. Gene Barboza is a free man. He will return to duty as if nothing had happened.

The 20-year-old paratrooper is, of course, acutely aware of the interrogations, court-martial, conviction and the 15-month military barracks at Leavenworth, Kan., to which he was subjected for an important part of his young life. So are his family and friends. But to the Army, his record is now clean and his rank and pay have been restored. Barboza now awaits reassignment and a 30-day leave.

"It's very nice to be in the outside world again," he told this reporter in a long-distance telephone conversation. "At times I had my doubts about ever getting out."

Gene was reached at the First Guard Company's barracks outside the Leavenworth stockade. He had just returned from his first trip to the PX since confinement.

"No," he said slowly, "I guess I don't have anything against the Army for what they did. But, hell, that's a long time to be in there."

Pfc. Gene A. Barboza was convicted by a military court in December 1965 of fatally shooting a Dominican civilian in October of that year. Barboza, standing guard duty, saw him prowling around a Santo Domingo hospital used by the U.S. Army. This was during the American intervention in the Dominican Republic.

Barboza was sentenced to 20 years at hard labor at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., in June 1966; the case went to an Army Board of Review. The board, after six months of deliberation — an indication of the importance of the case — reached a 42-page decision in January which set aside the conviction and ordered a re-hearing.

NEA News Editor Robert Cochmar has covered the Barboza case since the court-martial.

"In jail. My enlistment is up on November 15. I don't think I'm going to re-enlist."

Gene says he found enough to do during his time in prison. "If I didn't find anything to do," he admits, "I would have gone batty."

So he secured the equivalent

of a high school education (Gene dropped out of school to join the Army) and won trophies in horseback riding, volleyball, football and tennis. And since the sentence was "20 years at hard labor," the Army, too, kept him occupied.

"And I want to thank you for writing those articles about me," he said this reporter. "For a while I began to think nobody cared."

A lot of people cared about Gene Barboza. His former teacher, Earle Sackstein of Providence, R. I., is one who did. When he first learned of Gene's conviction, he began to search for more information. "I just couldn't believe Gene could do what the Army said he did," he recalls today. "So I decided to organize a Providence Teachers Barboza Defense Committee. We started to raise money."

Carlsten was able to turn over more than \$2,000 to Gene's attorney (including \$500 from his own pocket). Most of the money was given to Mrs. Celia Barboza, Gene's mother, who works in a Providence mill and has been long separated from her husband.

Edward Gallogly, Gene's attorney, also cared. He traveled to Santo Domingo to secure evidence, to Fort Bragg, N. C., for the court-martial and Washington for the hearings. Mrs. Barboza and Gene did not receive a bill for his services. Gallogly, a former lieutenant governor of Rhode

Island, was recently named U.S. attorney for his state. Young Barboza's release was formally announced to Gallogly. The message read: "Gen. Laurie has decided to dismiss the charges against Private Barboza in view of the fact that a hearing is impracticable at this time; therefore, by order No. 7 of the 82nd Airborne Division dated March 17, 1967, the charges will be dismissed."

Gen. Joe Laurie is commander general of the 82nd Airborne, the unit to which Barboza was attached in Santo Domingo. The court-martial was held on the same day as the board of review. It was possible, however, that Gen. Laurie based his dismissal ruling, at least partially, on the decision rendered by the Army Board of Review two months ago.

The board found that the law

officer in the December 1965 court-martial failed to instruct the court properly on the voluntariness of Barboza's confession. After the shooting in Santo Domingo, Barboza was placed in custody and asked by an Army investigator to sign a statement which purportedly described the incident. The soldier reluctantly signed. The board's opinion said: "The law officer made no mention of the need for court members to consider that the accused (Barboza) initially refused to make a statement, that following such refusal he was investigated, that the interrogation was resumed before the accused had an opportunity to talk with anyone and that the accused was a youthful first-of-his-kind experiencing his first confrontation with law enforcement officials."

"Now," Barboza explains,

"I've got a little sorting out to do. For one thing, I think the Army should give me the rank I'd be entitled to if I hadn't been sent here." He figures he should be at least a corporal by now. He is also entitled to 15 months of back pay.

"I've asked to be assigned to a post somewhere in the Northeast," he says. "I want to be near my family again."

Slobe had recommended that Barboza be refused access to a reporter on the ground that to permit this would cause "many other prisoners" to request interviews "in an attempt to secure amelioration of their sentences."

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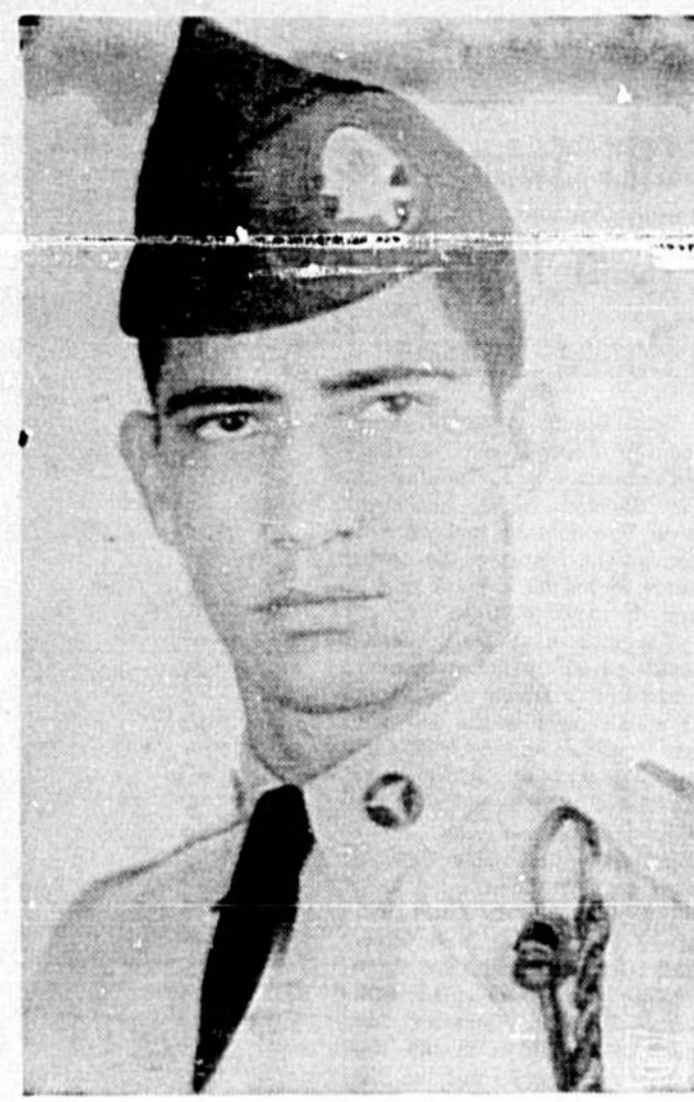

# Easter Pilgrims Shiver In Snowy Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector (AP)—As Easter pilgrims shivered in snowy Jerusalem, Italians favoring birth control and divorce demonstrated in St. Peter's Square and Pope Paul VI urged the world Sunday to hope despite "mounting and gigantic problems."

Jerusalem's Easter weather as the worst in memory, and it kept all but about 500 of the thousands of pilgrims in the Holy City away from prayers at the marble tomb of Christ. The first snow on the holiday in decades led some pilgrims to exchange "Merry Christmas" instead of "Happy Easter."

The annual Easter procession moved through slushy streets, and sunrise services were moved indoors.

Before nearly 250,000 people jammed into St. Peter's Square in Rome, Pope Paul said that his own joy on the festive day of Christ's resurrection was dimmed by the world's troubles. But he urged men not to let their minds be saddened "at the futility of efforts towards good."

At the growing power of "darkness," the Pope said he believed it was his duty to bring the message to the throng in the square.

The Pope touched on the Vietnam war and religious restrictions in Communist nations and elsewhere.

As the pontiff appeared to speak, about 30 persons near the front of the crowd unveiled banners reading, "Fewer children, less famine," "Yes to the pill," and "Five million Italians want a family without hypocrisy and cruelty."

Others tried to tear down the banners and police hurried the demonstrators out of the crowd.

The Roman Catholic Church forbids divorce and artificial methods of birth control.

In Vietnam, many American troops attended services in the field during a quiet Easter.

About 1,500 ban the bomb marchers turned out in West Berlin, the first time the Easter disarmament demonstrations that take place elsewhere in West Germany were held in the city. Some marchers carried signs against the "U.S. war" in Vietnam.

In the United States, hundreds of thousands attended sunrise services in generally good weather. New York City's traditional Easter parade along Fifth Avenue was marked by many fur coats and relatively few frilly hats.

New York's temperatures were in the 50's but many among the 20,000 holiday strollers remembered the heavy snow and cold of last week. The parade included a few miniskirts, one on a bearded man, and a white poodle who wore a red jacket and white helmet and sat on a motorcycle.

Mexico City police arrested more than 3,000 pranksters who observed the Easter custom of drenching strollers and motorists with water. Thousands of government agencies, banks, stores and industries were closed at least three days during the week, and beach resorts reported record crowds.

# Legislative Candidate Shot To Death

## Could Bring About Three More Elections Here

## John Baker, Orlando Attorney, Murdered

John A. Baker, Democratic candidate for Orange and Seminole Counties in today's election for the Legislature, and his wife were shot to death in their home at their Orlando home. Police termed the slaying a murder and suicide.

Baker, city attorney for Orlando, was a candidate for district 45 seat in the House of Representatives, for Seminole and Orange Counties.

Deputy Police Chief J. W. Pritchard said officers believed Mrs. Baker shot her husband during an argument in the bedroom of their plush home. Pritchard turned the gun on herself.

Two of the Bakers' children, Jonelle, 11, and Allen, 8, found the bodies. Police said the children told them they were awakened by arguing voices. Then they heard what sounded like a shot.

When they ran into the master bedroom, Pritchard said, they found their parents on the floor, blood pouring from single bullet wounds.

Police were called by neighbors to whom the children ran. Two other children, Jacqueline, 5, and Clay, 3, also were in the house.

Baker, 37, a graduate of the University of Florida law school, was making his first political race in bidding for the District 45 House seat for Orange and Seminole counties. He was a Democrat.

## Heavy Vote Reported

There was moderately heavy voting in today's legislative election until the rains came in the late morning hour, precinct polling officials reported in a spot survey by The Herald just before noon. Polls close at 7 p.m.

It also was an expensive election. Secretary of State Tom Adams reported this morning that reports filed showed Sen. Bob Johnson, Democratic incumbent in district 16, received campaign contributions of \$11,555 and spent \$11,541, while his Republican opponent, Kenneth Plante, reported contributions of \$15,370 and expenditures of \$13,171.66.

Heaviest voting in the one-man one-vote election, ordered by federal court, was reported between 10:30 and 11 a.m. The spot survey at 11 a.m. showed 119 votes cast at Altamonte town hall; 121 votes at Oviedo town hall, and 109 each at the agricultural center and Lyman High School. Other precincts reported similarly heavy voting until the rains dampened things.

Democrats have claimed heavy voting would be in their favor while Republicans were hoping for a light vote.

Democratic candidate John Baker's death at Orlando early this morning may bring about three more elections, two special Democratic party primaries and a general election, in the opinion of election officials.

Mrs. Dorothy W. Gilson, director of elections division, secretary of state's office at Tallahassee, informed The Sanford Herald by telephone that should Republican candidate William G. Gilson, Baker's opponent for House seat 45 from Orange and Seminole Counties, win in today's election, "it should settle the matter unless the Democratic party protests."

In this event, she added, the Democratic party would have to bring suit "and the court would advise us what action we must follow."

Mrs. Gilson continued that a precedent was established last year in Duval County when the dead candidate won the election and the governor had to order a special election.

Mrs. Barber also reported she was instructing her poll officials not to discuss Baker's death with anyone.

She further stated, "If Baker's opponent wins, the election will be valid. However, if Baker is elected, it's conceivable that as many as two primaries and a special election will be required to fill the seat. According to state statute, the governor cannot fill a vacancy in the Legislature by appointment."

## Mayor Tells Commission

### Cut Water Service To Aid Annexation

Mayor Joe Baker Monday night urged the City Commission to consider cutting off water to all users outside the city limits until they agree to annexation.

Baker made the comment as the board voted to allow the Sunland Baptist Church to tie into city lines despite the fact the area heavily objects to annexation.

"It would be one way to get more people into the city," Baker suggested. Commissioner W. V. Roberts said, "I'm with you" but no concrete action was taken on the request.

City Manager W. E. Knowles reported that about 1,000 persons including some 400 in Sunland could be affected by the move.

"I don't think the commission could stand the pressure," said Knowles.

"Maybe the City Manager can't," Baker added.

In other action, the board urged Knowles to look into hiring M. L. Raborn.

## OK Pools To Reopen In Sanford

The two Sanford swimming pools will open on schedule this summer despite warning from the city manager the city is losing some \$9,000 every year.

City Commissioners said they would allow the Ft. Mellon Pool and the one at Goldboro to start the season on schedule in July.

Knowles in a strongly worded memo to the board, said there was a high drop in use of both pools since they were integrated.

"Two pools cost \$11,206.73 to operate for the summer," Knowles said, adding that revenue last year was \$2,891.

The city manager said that prior to integration, daily use of the two pools would vary from 100 to 200. He then cited figures that last year daily attendance was less than 50 for the two pools.

Knowles urged that at least one pool be closed but Commissioners said no.

## 'A No. 1 Zoo A Must'--Raborn

An "A No. 1" zoo, even if it has to be built in stages, was proposed by City Commissioner M. L. Raborn at the board meeting last night.

Raborn made the statement as Commissioners heard proposals to move the facility by Sanford architects Herbert Burston and Eoghan Kelley.

Kelley offered to come up with an overall design plan for \$900.

Indications are that some \$75,000 will be earmarked for zoo relocation and redesign of cages over a two year period.

In other business, the commission, agreed to appropriate \$730 to the General Sanford Memorial Library.

Voted to give the County Humane Society \$208.33 for their February appropriation. Earl Higginbotham vehemently protested the payment because of the adverse publicity of the group and urged fellow commissioners to put the city back in the Humane Society's pocket. However, the rest of the board agreed to continue Society operations but would check the number of calls the group handled.

Agreed to allow the merchants to use the sidewalks downtown for a sales period in April pending liability safeguards.

Approved the following ordinance:

Vacating an alley north of the Pico Building; allowing minors in poolrooms; revision of the building code with some minor changes; revision of the fire prevention electrical and plumbing code and adoption of the gas code. The board tabled action on a trailer ordinance amendment pending further study.

Approved a street light at 1800 W. 13th St. Signed the plat on the lakefront project and a contract with the Shoemaker Construction Company on building the community facility Bldg. at the Lakefront and agreed to waive the bond.

Both Mayor Joe Baker and Raborn voted "no" on bond waiver saying it was "bad business."

## Unveil Plans For Massive 436 Complex

Plans were in the final stages today on acquisition of property by Kinray of Florida Inc. as the site of a multimillion dollar shopping complex on the southeast corner of SR 436 and U.S. 17-92 in Casselberry.

Property at the 13 acre site has already been purchased from Mr. and Mrs. James Keyser in a sale said to total \$60,000 while the option on another parcel has already been picked up by the corporation from Walker Bondar at a price of \$465,000.

Kinray is a corporation formed by the Kinco Corporation and Zayres Inc., owners of large discount houses throughout the country.

Comments on plans for the property, other than construction of the discount houses, were not available from Kinray at press time.

## Cable Stolen From Burnup Lot

Some \$5,880 worth of wire cable was stolen from the Burnup and Sims Storage lot on Maple Ave., over the weekend, Police Chief Ben Butler reported today.

Chief Butler said his department is hunting down leads in the case. He added that apparently someone went under the fence at the lot, cut the cable and belonging to the phone company.
