Tighter gun control?

Local police chiefs, mayors have mixed opinions on proposal

Sobered by yet another shootup of innocent Americans, President Clinton says gun violence has gotten so serious the nation must consider strong new means to combat it.

Speaking one day after a gunman opened fire inside a Long Island railroad train in New York killing five commuters, Clinton said, "I hope that this will give some more impetus to the need to act urgently to deal with the unnecessary problems of gun violence in this country."

Today, Clinton is welcoming police chiefs and mayors to the White House to discuss crime-fighting strategies.

"I won't be at the meeting," said Lake Mary Police Chief Richard Beary. "But if I was, I'd probably tell them that they are going about this the wrong way."

"Let's face it," Beary said, "guns aren't the problem; it's the people who have them. We're going to be spending all kinds of money on gun restrictions and in the end, the problem still won't be resolved. We have to start first with the people."

One of Clinton's suggestions involves a training program, but the

Clinton's proposal

- Banning devices that would feed more than 10 rounds of ammunition into a weapon, a provision contained in Senate-passed anti-crime legislation.
 - Make gun ownership illegal for children, a provision that has passed the Senate.
 - A national program along the lines of local efforts to collect illegal weapons.
 - Registration and training programs to ensure gun owners know how to safely handle a weapon.
- Clinton said a 15-round weapon clip of the sort used by the Long Island gunman would have been illegal under a Senate amendment. But he hastened to add that "there may be nothing which could have prevented" the shooting.

president said he wants to ask the attorney general for an opinion before discussing any details.

Regarding the suggestion to ban devices able to feed 10 or more rounds of ammunition into a weapon, Beary commented, "It doesn't matter whether you can shoot five or fifteen bullets, they can still kill."

Sanford Police Chief Ralph Russell agreed. "With the rapid re-load capabilities of some guns, this restriction would have little effect," he said. "What we need to limit is assault weapons. I don't see where they have any practical use in the private sector."

Help identify murder victim

GOLDENROD — Seminole County sheriff's investigators have released a reconstructive drawing in hopes someone can help them identify a murder victim found Aug. 26, 1990 in a weeded field near the intersection of State Road 426 and Groom Road. The woman remains the only unidentified victim on file with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. The drawing was made using the victim's skull by Altamonte Springs police Lt. Mike Deal.



The victim is described as a white female, 35 to 45 years old, with medium length blond hair. She stood five feet, six in-

ches to five feet, eight inches tall. Breast implants were found near the remains. She had been dead four to six months at the time she was found.

Sanford woman's creation helps people in need of a little magic

SANFORD — As a girl growing up in Sanford her friends and classmates thought she was wacky and fun, maybe a little strange. A music teacher at Seminole High School questioned what would become of her.

Today, Sanford native Rosalind Ratliff is known as Roz White and she criss-crosses the county promoting her creation, "Santa Dollars." They are real one dollar bills with the image of Santa Claus smiling from the oval where George Washington's solemn face is usually seen. White's partner is June Watts.

This is the ninth year of the Santa Dollar and White, 50, was in Sanford last week to sign the collectable stocking stuffers that have raised millions for charity.

Although her creation got off to a bumpy start, when federal agents with counterfeiting on their minds descended upon her in St. Petersburg, the Santa Dollars are now sold in outlets nationwide.

The feds acknowledged the Santa stickers attached to real dollar bills did not violate currency regulations. Each year, the Santa Dollars are sold in cards designed by famous

"I made the phone calls and I paid them back, so what's the big deal?" said Morse Wednesday. "I paid for the calls on an annualized basis rather than pay 90 cents one month or 50 cents another. I've always done it that way."

The commission, in their ruling made public Tuesday, ordered Morse be issued a letter of admonishment, but no other action be taken.

Joseph Zajcek, the former clerk's employee who filed the complaint, said he was disappointed more action was not taken against Morse.

"I am a concerned citizen and I did what I could to save the taxpayer's money," Zajcek said. "I gave it my best shot and that's the end of it."

Morse called the complaint political. Zajcek was a supporter of her re-election opponent, Mona McGarr.

The letter, from ethics chairman Joel Gustafson, says in part, "Public officials are agents of the people and hold their positions for the benefit of the public. The people's confidence in their government is eroded when they perceive that official decisions may be based upon private goals rather than public welfare. You are hereby admonished and urged to make the respect of the people in their government your foremost concern in any future public service you make undertake."

Morse was elected in 1988 in part due to a scandal involving her predecessor, David Berrien and his two top aides, Bill Jacobs and Brad Lang. The three were investigated for using credit cards issued to the Clerk of Courts office for charging more than \$65,000 in personal expenses. The balances were repaid in full after their existence was revealed. Two criminal investigations were conducted, but found no wrongdoing.

Morse said there was no similarity between the two incidents because she was repaying the telephone call debts annually. She also noted the dollar amount of her calls were minor compared to the tens of thousands of dollars charged by Berrien and his aides. Zajcek's complaint alleged Morse made personal long-distance telephone calls in 1992

and 1993 at taxpayer expense. According to the ethics investigation, a total of \$44.30 in personal long-distance calls were made using the state SUNCOM service. Personal calls are prohibited on the state-wide service.

The investigation found Morse paid the county \$9.90 as a partial reimbursement Aug. 25, 1992, after Zajcek filed a complaint with the State Attorney's Office on Aug. 13, 1992. The State Attorney's Office found no laws were violated in November. On Aug. 19, 1993, Morse repaid the balance of the money owed to the county.

A review of the September 1992 SUNCOM call record for Morse's extension showed 14 calls were placed from Morse's office and none were received. Of that number, 10 were found to be personal calls. The daytime calls were charged at 10 cents per minute.

The calls included calls to the Republican National Committee offices in Washington, D.C., the national party chairman's office in Washington, the Republican Party of Florida offices in Tallahassee, Fla., former state party chairman Bill Taylor in Jacksonville, the Martin County Republican Executive Committee and other largely politically-related calls.

Morse is the state's national committeewoman.

Ethics investigators could not locate all of Morse's call reports prior to July 1992 and for the month of October 1992. Although ethics investigators tried to determine whether Morse deliberately destroyed records in an effort to conceal the personal calls, they could find little evidence.

Investigators did receive a statement from former county records clerk Billie Rozanski who stated she told Morse of a Feb. 1,

1991 county memo which stated the monthly report provided by the county Telecommunications Division was the only record of long-distance calls made on county telephones. Morse denied knowing of the memo or having the conversation with Rozanski.

Morse said Wednesday she believed a master call record was available, so she wasn't concerned with tossing the monthly reports away after she jotted down the amounts for reimbursement. Morse said the county has since installed a telephone line to her office which she uses to make long-distance calls billed to her household account.

Ethics advocate Virindia Doss recommended the commission find probable cause Morse had misused her office by destroying the records, but take no action against her. The commission disagreed, and decided there was insufficient evidence she had misused her office.

Zajcek also filed a complaint against Morse for providing free coffee service for employees. Between March 20, 1989 and Aug. 12, 1993, Morse spent almost \$32,000 in Clerk's Office funds to provide coffee and tea service to employees. Formerly, employees bought their own, or set up coffee makers in their work areas and chipped in for the supplies.

Morse said she offered the service because she often found employees were making runs to the grocery store to buy supplies or going to the courthouse snack bar. Morse said the coffee service was also provided to the public, and jurors. Formerly, judges provided coffee to jurors, Morse said.

Doss and the ethics commission found there was no proof Morse violated any laws by providing the coffee service to employees.

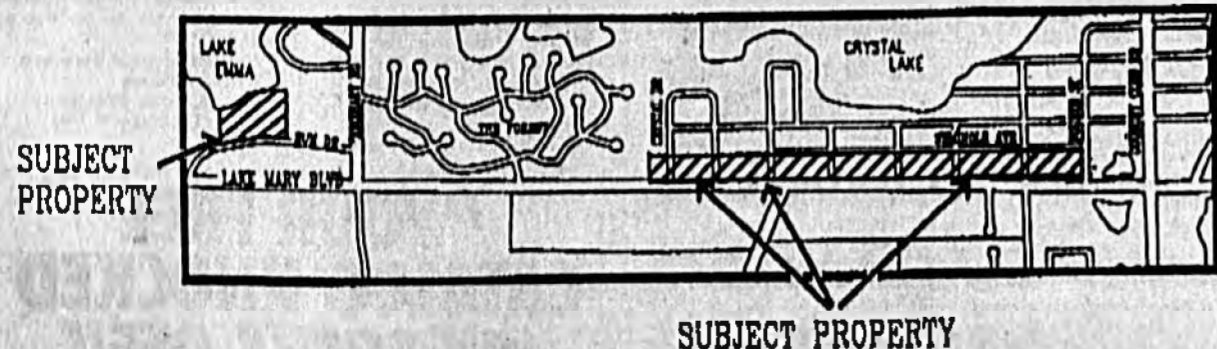

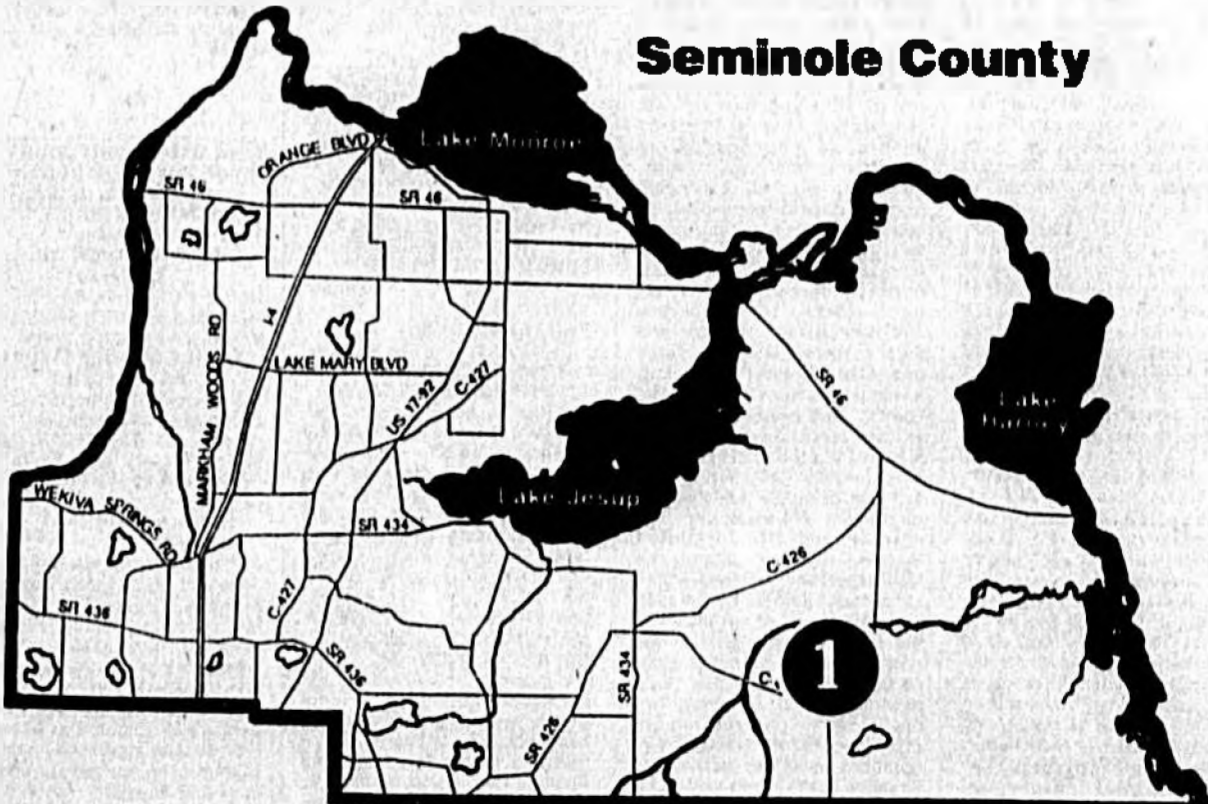

Patience rewarded

After 10-month wait, 'Hounds gain some revenge

 WINTER PARK — It seems that Greyhounds, like elephants, don't forget.
 Even though it happened over 10 months ago, the memory of their overtime loss to the Lake Howell Silver Hawks in the semifinals of the 4A District 9 girls' soccer tournament is still fresh in the minds of the Lyman Greyhounds.
 And it wasn't just the loss, but the circumstances surrounding it. At the time, Lyman was the No. 1-ranked team in the state and was aiming for its third consecutive state title. The Greyhounds were leading 2-0 the game with less than 15 minutes to play before Lake Howell rallied for the victory.
