Tighter gun control?

Local police chiefs, mayors have mixed opinions on proposal

Sobered by yet another shootup of innocent Americans, President Clinton says gun violence has gotten so serious the nation must consider strong 'new means to combat it.

Speaking one day after a gunman opened fire inside a Long Island railroad train in New York killing five commuters, Clinton said, "I hope that this will give some more impetus to the need to act urgently to deal with the unnecessary problems of gun violence in this country.

Today, Clinton is welcoming police chiefs and mayors to the White House to discuss crimefighting strategies.

"I won't be at the meeting," said Lake Mary Police Chief Richard Beary, "but if I was, I'd probably tell them that they are going about this the wrong way."

"Let's face it," Beary said, "guns aren't the problem; it's the people who have them. We're going to be spending all kinds of money on gun restrictions and in the end, the problem still won't be resolved. We have to start first with the people."

One of Clinton's suggestions involves a training program, but the

• Make gun ownership illegal for children, a provision that has passed the

Senate.

A national program along the lines of local efforts to collect illegal weapons.

Registration and training programs to ensure gun owners know how to safely

handle a weapon.
Clinton said a 15-round weapon clip of the sort used by the Long Island gunman would have been illegal under a Senate amend-ment. But he hastened to add that "there may be nothing which could have pre-vented" the shooting.

president said he wants to ask the attorney general for an opinion before discussing any details.

Regarding the suggestion to ban devices able to feed 10 or more rounds of ammunition into a weapon, Beary commented, "It doesn't matter whether you can shoot five or fifteen bullets, they can still kill.

Sanford Police Chief Ralph Russell agreed. "With the rapid re-load capabilities of some guns, this restriction would have little effect," he said. "What we need to limit is assault weapons. I don't see where they have any practical use in the private sector.

Sanford woman's creation helps people in need of a little magic

SANFORD - As a girl growing up in Sanford her friends and classmates thought she was wacky and fun, maybe a little strange. A music teacher at Seminole High School questioned what would become of her.

Today, Sanford native Rosalind Ratliff is known as Roz White and she criss- crosses the county promoting her creation, "Santa Dollars." They are real one dollar bills with the image of Santa Claus smiling from the oval where George Washington's solemn face is usually seen. White's partner is June Watts.

This is the ninth year of the Santa Dollar and White, 50, was in Sanford last week to sign the collectable stocking stuffers that have raised millions for charity.

Although her creation got off to a bumpy start, when federal agents with counterfeiting on their minds decended upon her in St. Petersburg, the Santa Dollars are now sold in outlets nationwide.

The feds acknowledged the Santa stickers attached to real dollar bills did not violate currency regulations. Each year, the Santa Dollars are



Homicide detective convicted of murder

MIAMI - A homicide detective who claimed his wife shot herself to death while playing with a gun was convicted Wednesday of killing her for insurance money and a younger

Ted MacArthur, who was suspended as a Metro-Dade police officer after he was charged, faces automatic firing under the

first-degree murder conviction ending his seven-week trial. Circuit Judge W. Thomas Spencer immediately sentenced MacArthur, 42, to life in prison without the possibility of parole

MacArthur's lawyer, Ed O'Donnell, said he would appeal. Two medical examiners testified Pilar MacArthur's wound indicated she could not have shot herself, and fellow officers questioned his honesty. A detective said one of MacArthur's favorite sayings was: "A lie is as good as the truth if someone believes it."

Mrs. MacArthur, 37, a Dade County correctional officer, was shot to death in the bedroom of the couple's North Miami home. with a .357-caliber Magnum while their two sons were visiting relatives in Boston.

MacArthur was having an affair around the time of the slaying Aug. 1, 1989, but testified in his own defense that he had remaciled with his wife.

"It was like we were newlyweds again," he said. MacArthur charged the prosecutor had a vendetta against him over professional run-ins and questioned the competence

Employer health care bills up 2%

TALLAHASSEE - The cost for insuring an employee rose, on average, just 2 percent for some 300 Florida companies that responded to an annual survey. It was the smallest increase in the last five years.

The statistic was down from 8 percent in costs," according to the survey. 1992, 13 percent in 1991, 20 percent in 1990 and 24 percent in 1989.

Behind the unusually modest increase this year is a rise in the use of managed care programs and a shifting of more costs to workers, according to William M. Mercer Inc., an employee-benefits firm that does the

More than 300 employers with over the respondents employed lewer than 99

The average cost of insuring an employee rose from \$3,710 in 1992 to \$3,784 this year, according to the data reported by the companies

"The trend toward managed care represents the favored approach to counter rising

But while that approach has been effective, it comes at a price.

There are cost savings, yes," said Jan-Chorvat, who directs the Tampa office of William Mercer, "But it comes at the expense of employees' choice of doctors and choice of hospitals at some point.

Traditional indemnity plans pay patients' bills and the patient decides where to get care. In managed care programs, patients 900,000 employees in 10 major industries—who go to the chosen network of doctors and responded to the survey. Only 6 percent of hospitals have to pay less and providers get pald a flat fee per person.

The number of companies offering health care exclusively through a managed-ear program. like a preferred-provider organization or a health maintenance organization jumped from 48 percent of 1992 respon dents to 59 percent in 1993.

. Employers have also tried to cut costs by shifting some of the burden to workers through higher deductibles and co payments.

The average deductible rose 11 percent to \$335 in 1993 and the average out-of-pocket limit increased 2 percent to \$1,794.

The sizable shift to managed care makes comparisons to previous years difficult according to Chorvat, who cautioned that employers' savings may be a one-time event. If companies don't continue moving to managed care. Chorvat forecasts that costs will rise about 8 percent in 1994 similar to 1992's rate.

Governor to run for 2nd term

TALLAHASSEE - Saying he was having the time of his life. Gov. Lawton Chiles announced Wednesday he and Lt. Gov. Buddy MacKay would seek reelection next year

"I think I've been a pretty darned good governor," Chilessaid. "I've enjoyed the last three years more than any job Eveever had.'

Chiles turned aside questions about his health, an issue in the 1990 race. The governor also said he never considered serving just one term.

"It looks like Emight make it through this term without any erutches," joked Chiles, who sald he would not again make his medical records public.

The governor was treated for depression with Prozac during the 1990 campaign and early during his first term. He no longer takes the drug-

Chiles, 63, said he and MacKay want to follow up on some of the changes they feel are important to Florida. "We see a state beginning to

seek its own destiny," said Chiles, "We feel the direction is right, but know much remains to be done," As for unfinished business, the

governor said he plans to continue his oush for tax reform in a second term, but conceded he wouldn't try in the 1994 legislative session. Lawmakers have prevented

Chiles from passing any tax reform in his first term. The governor said Wednesday his administration was also slowed by a sluggish economy. Hurricane Andrew and special interest groups opposed to change. MacKay, a former con-

gressman and state legislator. said he was not interested in any Cabinet appointment amid speculation Chiles might appoint him Education Commissioner. The present commissioner. Betty Castor, is a finalist for president at the University of South Florida - a vacancy scheduled to be filled Friday.

MacKay spent four months earlier this year at the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services helping reorganize the agency after a computer scandal.

Traveling over the holidays? Expect plenty of company

ORLANDO - Roads, trains, planes and cruise ships will be jammed with 35.2 million people celebrating the Christmas-New Year's holiday away from home, travel officials say.

Seventy-six percent, or 28.1 million of the total. will be traveling the nation's highways, according to the American Automobile Association.

Both projected figures are records. Helping encourage the year-end travel rush are 'increased consumer confidence, lower gas prices and settlement of the American Airlines' strike,"

said Graeme Clark, vice president of AAA Travel, Marketing & Financial Services. Adding to the favorable travel picture are reduced atrline and cruise line prices and hotel

and rental car rates in some areas, notably

Hawait, which is suffering a slump in tourism. sald AAA spokesman Jerry Cheske on Wednes-The total number of travelers is up from the 34.7 million in 1992, the previous record. In 1985, when the motoring federation began keeping such records, holiday travelers totaled

'More than I of every 10 Americans will be hitting the roads," said Cheske, The 28.1 million projected motor vehicle travelers (at least 100 miles from home) compare

with 27.8 million a year ago. Traveling by air, train or bus will be 7.1 million people, up from 6.9 million in 1992. This is the strongest holiday showing for that category since 1989, when 8.9 million left their cars at home.

The projections are based on a national telephone survey of 1,500 adults conducted by the U.S. Travel Data Center.

In efforts to verify the projections from year-to-year, the same people are asked whether they actually took the trips they anticipated the

previous year. Cheske said. "We try to make it as accurate as possible, but nobody keeps highway statistics like the airlines and cruise lines do for their customers," he said. "Intentions are generally higher than actual travel, so it's hard to say what the actual

numbers will be." Roads will be busiest in the Southeast, with 7.4

million travelers anticipated, and in the West, with 7.3 million.



Rating violent video games

Almost 15 years ago, the video game Pac Man enpured our imagination. His sunshine volice. happy face gobbled opponents like so many fast food hamburgers.

The video games that capture us today certainly have changed.

Two senators and children's advocates, including TV's Captain Kangaroo, Bob Keeshan, recently protested the sale and use of violent video games to children. They want explicit labeling to warn parents about these games, which cannot be banned because they are constitutionally pro-

Although parents locally expressed confusion over what is fast becoming this year's Pac Man rage of the Christmas selling season, one video rental store owner asked what the big deal is all about. Kids are already exposed to all sorts of violence at home and at school, he said.

Maybe so, but it doesn't make it right. The number one cause of death for teenagers is gunshot wounds. Assaults on school grounds are reported daily. And violent acts flow from television like blood gushes from a fatal knife wound. And juvenile crime statistics have been linked to what kids choose as entertainment.

Now high tech hawkers would embroil your children in Mortal Kombat, the most popular of the new genre of violent games. In it, two martial-arts warriors pummel each other amid much spattering of blood. The game instructs your child to "finish" a downed opponent. Your child can murder his opponent by ripping out the still-throbbing heart or by decapitating him, victoriouly raising the bloody head with the spinal cord trailing snakelike

Janangthorrgame, Night Trap, women barely clothed are murdered, some left hanging from mest hooks as blood delps down the computer

Children are bombarded by desensitizing acts of torture, murder and mayhem every day on television, but the nature of these current video games is even more insidious. Television audiences are passive, watching, not participating in the violence. But video games are interactive. Your child becomes part of the fantasy.

Video game manufacturers will continue to make large profits from their products without glorifying barbarianism proferred to young children. These games must be regulated, kept out of the hands of children. And parents should boycott stores, manufacturers and areades that would indiscriminately expose young kids to this dehumanizing

Mortal Kombat is expected to generate \$100 million in business this Christmas season. At an average cost of just under \$50, over two million consumers will be ripping opponents' heads from their brutalized bodies. How many of these consumers will be children? Will one of them be yours?

One manufacturer, Sega America, has instituted a rating system for videos, similar to movies. All manufacturers must follow sutt.

...and why ratings should be voluntary

Some video game manufacturers fear a labeling system warning parents about the extent of violence in video games could cost them money in sales. But without the rating system, it could cost

In the end, it could cost basic first amendment

Two senators have asked manufacturers to label games such as Mortal Kombat. They have said they would prefer a ban on violent videos, but that is unconstitutional. So far, Sega America is the only manufacturer to voluntarily label its games. If others don't comply, legislation is being prepared that would force a rating system much like the one used for movies.

For years, the entertainment industry has whined that censorship is anti-American. For years, violence serving no purpose except to incite the viewer has been woven into films and television. For years, the crime rate among youth who crave barbaric action has been rising. Youth crime statistics and violent entertainment have been linked recently.

Now, movies carry warning labels. And an entertainment division brainwashing children so they can not empathize with others' feelings is being asked to take some responsibility for the trash they push at youngsters.

They must. Censorship IS un-American. Taking responsibility is not. If these companies flagrantly igore that responsibility, legislation will ensue. Then, logically, as parents and child advocates become more fed up, lawsuits and court decisions will lead to rules governing many more areas of our

The Mortal Kombat we are engaged in could very well be the bloody death of freedom.

Do not let this happen. Self-imposed discipline must prevail to protect the minds of our youth.

march on the rest of us in the commentary game. In an article in the Wall Street Journal for Nov. 30, he begins crisply: "Forget Ross Perot. Think Pat Buchanan."

Dismissing Perot as a rich amateur who will shortly either "fade away or self-destruct," Kristol urges us to contemplate instead Pat Buchanan, who appeals to much the same constituency. Noting that there are an awful lot of voters these days who favor "America first" in matters both political and economic, and who have had it up to here with crime, welfare and excessive immigration. Kristol warns that Buchanan may very well run as the candidate of a third party in 1996 and thereby so enfecble the GOP that Clinton will win a second term.

To liberals, of course, the Reagan years were just a ghastly aberration in which the ship of state yawed sharply to the right, and American holitics are now in the process of regaining their allegedly traditional centrist balance. But if Kristol is right (and I believe he is), the current modesi upsurge in liberal prospects, even including a second Clinton term if there is one, is simply the calm before a storm around the turn of the century in which the Western democracles, or at least the United States, put an end to liberalism and its ghastly consequences once and for all

Buchanan comes in. He may first appear as a candidate for the 1996 Republican presidential nomination. As such he is almost surely doomed to lose (as he did in 1992), partly because of the institutional timidity of the party and its primary voters and partly because, as c natural-born polar-izer, he lacks what Walter Lippman called "a certain generosity of apirit" that Americans like

He belleves heart that the constituency to which he appeals represents a healthy majority of all voting Americans. to see in their lead-

But I don't think Buchanan has the silghtest intention of throwing in the sponge next time just because the Republican Party denies him its nomination. Logic, or what certafuly looks to him like logic, will impel him to leave the party altogether and take his followers with him. It won't be just the love of the limelight -- the

motorcycle escorts, the limousine cavalcade, the Secret Service protection. Pat is not a small man, and anyway he had a sufficient dose of that in

No. he will believe -- believes today -- deep in his heart that the constituency to which he appeals represents a healthy majority of all voting Americans. Concede to the Democrats that 40 percent of the electorate that is so addicted to government handouts of one kind or another that reasoned arguments just can't reach them, and that still leaves 60 percent ready to vote for somebody who really means

But it is there, I think, that Buchanan is overly optimistic, I share many of his temperamental and philosophical inclinations, and I had to learn the hard way that the American people, even if the great majority of them agree with me, prefer to vest the awesome powers of the presidency in individuals with innately sweet, or at any rate low-keyed, dispusitions. I think it is likely. therefore, that Pat Buchanan will wind up playing Barry Goldwater to some smoother, softer-spoken conservative populist a few miles down the road.

Well, there are worse fates than that,

All-American war on crime

It was closing fast on high noon, Jan. 21. 1981 — day one of the Reagan Presidency when The Chicago Kid (aka: Miami Marty or the Long Island Scribbler) dashed into a Washington shoe store, squeezed into his first pair of genuine cowboy boots, and moseyed over to Jim Brady's new office at the White House.

Next this urban but hardly urbane slicker (who'd covered four presidents for Newsday and The Washington Post, and written a book about the last of them, fella named Jimmy Carter) pulled up a chair and plopped his black-booted feet atop the new press secretary's desk. And having done that, I asked

"Well, Jimbo, can I pass with your crowd

Turns out I had it backward. Because the real question for the decade that followed has been: "Well, Jimbo, can you pass with your crowd now?''

The answer, sadly, was always "No!" The Brady Bill could not pass muster with Brady's own fellow Republicans. For years, Brady's Grand Old Party fought this modest proposal. It bears his name as a small bow to the massive injury he suffered in the attempted assassination of President Reagan. Recently, filibustering Senate Republicans were happy to have the Brady Bill and its modest five-day walting period for gun purchases declared dead - which is what Americans were first told was Brady's own fate just 69 days after I'd propped my feet on his desk. Thankfully, Jim Brady himself can tell us that the report of the Brady Bill's death was every bit as erroneous

as that numbing news flash about his own. Republicans, who once deservedly were called the party of law and order, have been fighting law enforcement groups. America's cops pleaded for this simple five-day waiting period for prospective gun buyers in order to check the records and make sure purchasers did not have felony convictions.

Most recently, filibustering Senate Republicans apparently couldn't hear the 90 percent of America's gun owners telling pollsters that they favored the bill. Finally, one argument pierced the GOP's elephantine hide: November election results indicated that America's voters were determined to crack down on violent crime. End of Alibuster. Nothing like a threat of extinction to get an elephant's attention.

But don't be fulled into thinking that the Republicans got the larger message. For in the war on crime, they are still prisoners of the thinking that helped make George Bush what he is today. Remember Bush's response to the clamor to do something about assault weapons after a lunatic with a Chinese-made AK-47 massacred a playgroundful of children in Stockton, Calif. Bush's bizarre policy on assault weapons that can be used only for combat-style massacres of people: Buy Ameri-

After a prolonged study, Bush's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms banned the import of a number of foreign-made weapons. declaring: "These semiautomatic assault rifles were designed and intended to be particularly suitable for combat

But then Bush refused to ban the identical guns that were made in the U.S.A. So America's gun industry began mass producing domestic versions of the AK-47s, etc. Now the Senate has approved a 1993 Crime Bill amendment, sponsored by Sen. Dianne Feins tein. D.Calif., to ban the manufacture, sale and possession of 19 specific semiautomatic assault weapons — regard-less of where they

And the other day, Sarah Brady, whose political skills and personal courage have proven a fitting match for her husband's, savored the victory of the Brady Bill by declaring that their work had just begun. Their next fight in the war on crime: securing House passage of the ban on domestic assault

The Old Quard of the Grand Old Party -Barry Goldwater and Ronald Reagan - have spoken out for banning these assault weapons. But the GOP's new vanguard cannot yet muster the courage to just say no to their gun lobby benefactors and join the new national order. We need to wage an all- out, all-American war on crime.



Rushdie has his day at the White House

It's nice to be heeded in high places.

Last March, your correspondent petitioned President Bill Clinton to replace the bulb in the beacon of freedom that once burned so brightly on these shores by meeting with Salman Rushdie. He is the British author who was condemned to death in 1989 by Iranian holy man Ayatoliah Ruhollah Khomeini for writing a novel that allegedly blasphemed the Islamic religion.

What Joe actually asked of the president was this: "The next time Rushdie is in the neighborhood, meet with him. Shake his hand and tell him you .. believe in his right to speak and write what he will, and he is therefore welcome to visit the United States anytime he wishes.



Lake. "The president and others reaffirmed to Rushdie our support for the principle of freedom of expression and said we stand firmly with him in the face of the forces of intolerance," an official said afterward.

What really struck me was the degree of personal warmth and friendship that came from the president," Rushdie himself told reporters. Everyone he met with seemed "to have a genuine passion for this case," he

OK, so it is possible that Clinton does not know Joe from a Joshua tree, that he did not see Joe's column, that he got the idea to meet with Rushdie on his own or from his staff. But it makes no difference. I am one proud citizen anyway - which is not what I felt nearly five years ago, when George Bush pronounced Khomeint's barbaric death decree "deeply offensive" -- as if the mad mullah had just burped in public. And I feel a heliuva lot better today than in March 1992, when Bush's prolocutor dismissed Rushdie as a

tacky book peddler. Said Marlin Fitzwater, in what has got to go down in history as one of the most craven statements ever uttered by a public official: "There's no reason for any special relationship with Rushdie. I mean, he's an author, he's here, he's doing interviews and book tours and things that authors do. But there's no reason for us to have any special interest in him."

Here we were, the United States of America, champion of free speech, asylum for the suppressed, defler of despots and our president and his spokesman were snottily dismissing a man fleeing for his life from a crazed tyrant. I was ashamed.

What made it worse was that so few people of import were speaking up for Rushdie. Where were our religious leaders when Khomeini promised martyrdom for any Muslim who tracked down in the writer and killed him? Where were the ecclesiastics who preach charity and compassion when the ransom for Rushdle's scalp topped \$3 million and the radical Shille group Hezboilah vowed to carry out the imam's "great honorable

The Quakers, the Southern Baptists, the Presbyterians said nothing. The National Council of Churches urged all Christians to appreciate the feelings of "our Islamic brothers and sisters." Cardinal John J. O'Connor of New York tut-tutted the decree then urged all Catholics to shun the novel which has been viewed by Muslims as highly sacrilegious and offensive."

Around the world, government leaders stepped forward to defend Rushdie's right to write what he wished. British Prime Minister John Major and Czech President Vaclav Havel met with Rushdie personally, as did high officials in other countries.



"I made the phone calls and I paid them back, so what's the big deal?" said Morse Wednesday. "I paid for the calls on an unnualized basts rather than pay 90 cents one month or 50 cents another. I've always done it that way."

The commission, in their ruling made public Tuesday, ordered Morse be issued a letter of admonishment, but no other action be taken.

Joseph Zallcek, the former clerk's employee who filed the complaint, said he was disappointed more action was not taken against Morse.

"I am a concerned citizen and I did what I could to save the taxpayer's money," Zajicek said. "I gave it my best shot and that's the end of it.

Morse called the complaint political. Zajicek was a supporter of her re-election opponent, Mona

McGreiber. The letter, from ethics chairman Joel Gustnison, says in part, "Public officials are agents of the people and hold their positions for the benefit of the public. The people's confidence in their government is croded when they perceive that official decisions may be based upon private goals rather than public welfare. You are hearby admontshed and urged to make the respect of the people in their government your foremost concern in any future public service you make un-

dertake." Morse was elected in 1988 in part due to a scandal involving her predecessor, David Berrien and his two top aides. Bill Jacobs and Brad Lang. The three were investigated for using credit cards issued to the Clerk of Courts office for charging more than \$65,000 in personal expenses. The balances were repaid in full after their existence was revealed. Two criminal investigations were conducted, but found no wrongdoing.

Morse said there was no similarity between the two incidents because she was repaying the telephone call debts annually. She also noted the dollar amount of her calls were minor compared to the tens of thousands of dollars charged by Berrien and his aides.

Zajicek's complaint alleged Morse made personal longdistance telephone calls in 1992

According to the ethics investigation, a total of \$44.30 in personal long-distance calls were made using the state SUNCOM service. Personal calls are prohibited on the state-wide service.

The investigation found Morse pald the county \$9.90 as a partial reimbursement Aug. 25, 1992, after Zajicek filed a complaint on Aug. 13, 1992. The State Attorney's Office found no laws balance of the money owed to the

1992 SUNCOM call record for account. Morse's extension showed 14 calls were placed from Morse's that number, 10 were found to be were charged at 10 cents per

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


















Is tingling related to recent surgery?

DEAR DR. GOTT: A few months ago I had emergency surgery for an abdominal aortic aneurysm. Since then, I've noticed a slight tingling in my hands. My doctor doesn't know what causes this problem. Do you?

DEAR READER: Not really. But I'll take a stab at it.

Most aortic ancurysms (swelling of the artery) occur below the area of circulation to the arms and hands. Thus, your symptoms are probably not related to the surgery.

However, aneurysms often coexist with arteriosclerotic narrowing in arteries: Such partial blockage could deprive your upper extremities of adequate blood supply, leading to tingling.

Ask your doctor about special tests - such as a Doppler ultrasound study or an anglogram (special X-ray of your circulation) -- that could diagnose circulatory impairment. Let me know the outcome.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've used saccharin tablets for years in my coffee and tea. It's been hard to find recently, because of some concerns about its safety. Would you advise that I switch to something like Sweet'N Low?

DEAR READER: Saccharin is safe for human consumption, despite the fact that rats developed bladder cancer when fed astronomical quantities. This has led some scientists to wisecrack that rats shouldn't drink a lot of diet soda. Most authorities agree that saccharin is safe for humans, when consumed in ordinary and reasonable quantities.

I don't know why you've had trouble finding saccharin tablets.


