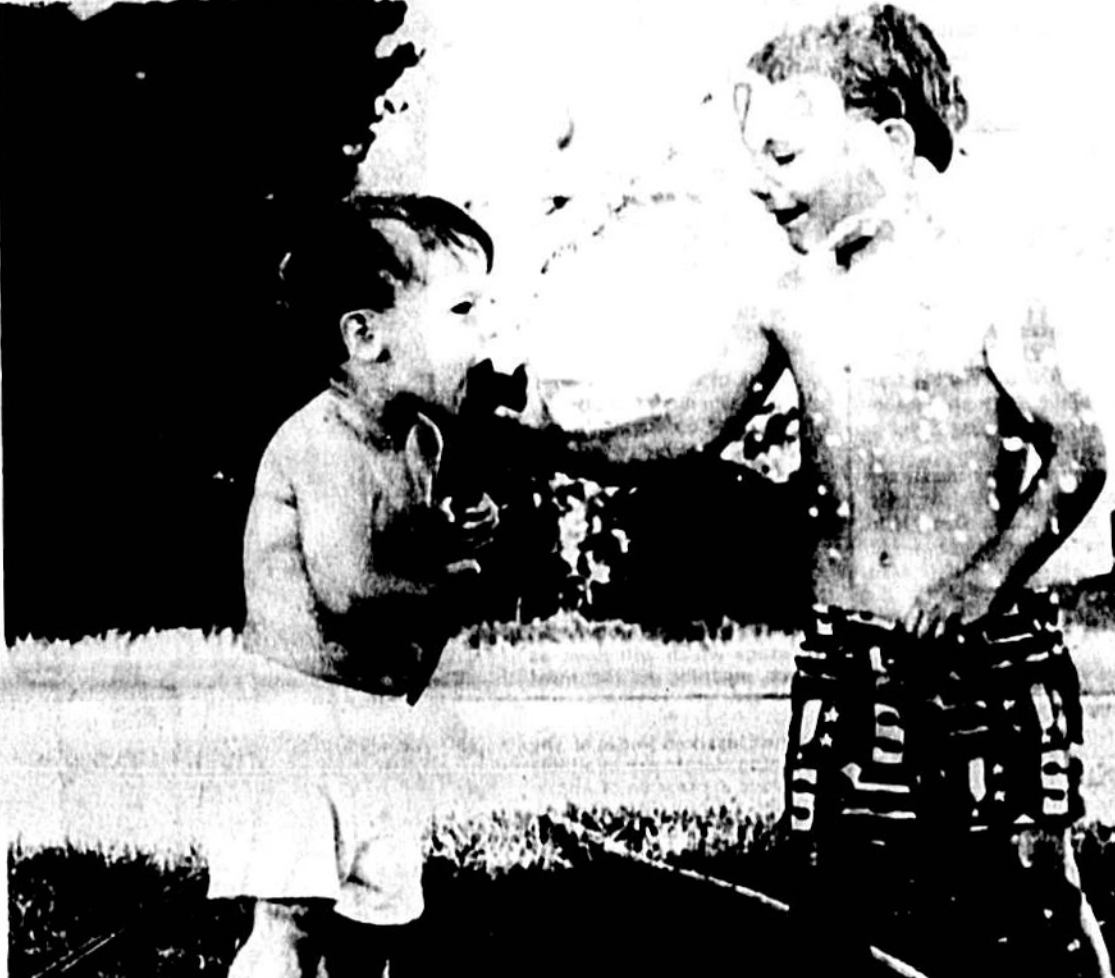

No Tears From Onions In Seminole's Dry Spell

It's good weather for onions. Multi-county Agricultural Extension Agent Haginold Brown said the dry weather we have been experiencing is ideal for digging and drying onions, but rough on most other crops. The rain gauge at the Seminole County Agricultural Center at the center of the county recorded only .17 inches of rain during April, but Brown said other areas of the county might have experienced more. While Seminole farmers and home gardeners have been busy irrigating, growers in adjacent Southwest Volusia County had weather problems of a different sort a few days ago when five inches of rain fell in a few hours and half again cabbage heads and destroyed the pickle crop. Brown reported, "The February rainfall of 8.5 inches was above the 3.9 inch average for that month. Brown pointed out, and rainfall in March was 3.2 inches or about average. "We need a good slow drizzle to soak in and do any good, we haven't had much rain for six weeks," Brown said. "It is causing crop delay and poor growth," Brown said. "We are at the tail end of the cabbage crop and starting the pickle crop." "These windy days you can see how badly we need rain as there are huge clouds of dust over the farm lands especially where the farmers are cultivating," said the agent. Extension agent in charge of horticulture Tom Davis, warned that the dry weather causes the insects and nematodes to be more active, giving gardeners something else to worry about.

BERLIN (UPI)—The United States today exchanged a Soviet spy for an American release. 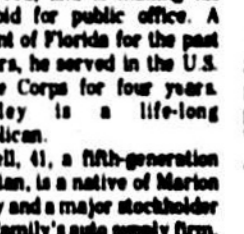

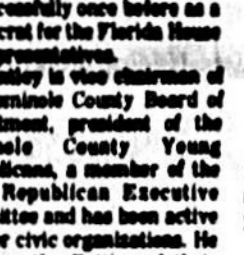

Proper Diet Is The Secret Here

DEAR DR. LAMB—Do British food eaters and all natural raw bran do any damage? Would they give you cancer even? Is it better to take a laxative once or twice a week? It seems everyone you talk to has trouble. There are times when fruits and vegetables don't do any good and too much roughage is hard on the stomach. If you will answer, we will all thank you.

DEAR READER—Before I started writing this column I knew many people had trouble with their bowels but I had no idea that it was such a common concern.

No, adult eaters and bran do not cause cancer. Nervous tension can contribute to bowel disorders and cancer. Some think that may be why you get the idea.

I don't think chemical laxatives that induce colonic contractions to empty the colon are ever useful. They can be, and often are, harmful. The first problem most people have is getting over the idea that you have to have a bowel movement every day. The frequency of bowel movements depends a lot on what you eat. If you don't eat foods that contain much bulk you cannot expect to have much independent residue and the result is not enough bulk to stimulate daily satisfactory bowel movements.

The British food eaters do not contain any chemicals to induce colonic contractions and are useful only to soften the stool for people who are ill or who need to avoid harder stools for various reasons. I can assure you a recent hemorrhoidectomy patient would be grateful for soft stools. The secret to good bowel function for most people is a proper diet. I am assuming you are a Health Letter member. Casselberry Coveting Annexation Of County Parcel

The latest confrontation between a Seminole County city and the county commission over an annexation may be in the offing in Casselberry.

The Casselberry City Council, already in court with the county over the annexation more than a year ago of the Deer Run planned unit development, tentatively agreed Monday night to move forward to take into the city's limits a 1.6-acre parcel at the southwest corner of U.S. 17-88 and Seminole Boulevard (Dog Track Road), despite continuing words from County Attorney Harry Stewart.

The council agreed to place the proposed annexation, at the site of a 1,800-square-foot, 130-seat restaurant, on next Monday night's meeting agenda for formal action.

City Planner Dale MacMahon reported to the council that Stewart and County Planner Woody Pryor appeared before the city's planning and zoning commission last week to criticize the proposed annexation.

MacMahon said that Stewart, answering an inquiry from Commissioner Harry Kvitlatowski concerning the annexation, said in a memo that the annexation "could arguably create an enclave."

Although the word "enclave" has not been defined in the courts, the cities of Seminole County consider it to be a county area completely surrounded by city territory. The county commission considers it a county area, wholly or partially surrounded by city territory.

The county in lawsuits with Casselberry, Longwood and Lake Mary has used its definition of the word enclave as the basis of challenging the legality of annexations.

MacMahon told the council that Stewart retraced his contention concerning the enclave at the planning and zoning commission meeting after he was shown city maps. The planner said the annexation will actually reduce an existing enclave.

He said that Stewart, however, did not concede that the annexation will be lawful and gave no assurance that a lawsuit will not be filed against the city. MacMahon said Stewart viewed the annexation with "trepidation."

The planner said Stewart criticized the traffic which would be generated in the busy intersection by construction of a restaurant at the site. But, MacMahon said traffic has nothing to do with the question of annexation and that problem will be solved when the plan for the development is filed for the development.

MacMahon said city water and sewer service is nearby by the proposed restaurant and can easily be extended to the planned new facility.

The planning and zoning commission unanimously recommended the annexation. The planner said it will take approximately two months for the ordinance to be adopted for the tract to be annexed to the city and about another month for site plan review before construction can begin.

Zoning will also be changed, said MacMahon, to a more restrictive commercial type.
