PARIS, Aug. 24.—(AP)—For the first time in the history of French agriculture the peasant is spending money lavishly.

Watching the franc tumble on the exchange, and seeing that he had two years ago with his half its purchasing power, the French farmer has decided money isn't so much any more.

Anyone who knows the character of this class of agriculturist will realize this is nothing but revolutionary.

While the salons have been going in the Chamber and Senate, the peasant has been going along the road, trading by his own and grand-father's, paying attention to politics, but buying early and late in the fields.

The same methods he did his fathers and placing his profits in the traditional woolen sock.

**A Deliberate Thinker**

He is rather a logical person, the son of the French soil with wooden shoes clumping along the country road—it may take him long time to change his mind and to adopt a new method or arrive at a new conclusion, but when he does he is the most "set" individual in the world.

He has now become "set" in the grain game, it is better than money hidden away which may be worth nothing tomorrow, and he is buying light trucks, and even touring cars. He also is buying in harvest and mowing machines at the end of July when his crops for the year are in and he will have no use for them for another twelve months.

**Engine Of Civil War Fame Is Contrasted With Those That Are In Use Nowadays**

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The evolution of the American locomotive from its towering smokestack, wooden cab and strange appearance to the present day ponderous mass of bright colored steel is strikingly presented here today by "Topsy," one of the few remaining locomotives and one of the engines that participated in the chase of the famous Andrews raiders during the Civil War has survived the advent of successors not only two or three times its size and speed but also of different hue.

Little Interest In Intellectuals

Monday newspapers told of the deaths of two outstanding Americans. Dr. Charles W. Eliot, ninety-two-year-old president-emeritus of Harvard University, and Rudolph Valentino, film-drum premier-shock, within a few hours of each other, closed their eyes in lasting, peaceful slumber.
