The trouble is not lack of books—as you know well—why, just look at the perfect make-up pamphlet we distribute free! No, the trouble is that so very few women will take the time to practice what the little books preach.

There are countless women, for example, who makes a daily habit of hardening and aging their faces with too much rouge and making their mouths look big and vulgar with too much lipstick, and giving themselves a doubtful atmosphere with too much eye make-up.

The good book on the subject tells them to make up under a clear, bright light and with the aid of a good mirror, and it reminds them over and over that too little is far, far to be preferred to too much when it comes to face decoration.

We know a famous beauty specialist who makes it a point to send her clients away with the faintest hint of "shine" on their faces. More a lovely gleam, it is something suggesting the waxy finish of a gardenia petal. It is very beautiful and very, very youthful, and it is elegance personified.

The "secret" is in the use of a finishing cream or lotion, and then on top of it just a glow of rouge and then the powder which is sparingly but evenly blended into the skin. The enchanting result could never be achieved by slapping or packing on powder and rubbing or dabbing on rouge.

An improvised altar, backed with large quantities of asparagus plumes, ferns interspersed with lilies and orange blossoms, was fashioned over the mantelpiece and book shelves of the living room of the Berkebile home. Other features of the decorations were two large candlesticks holding all-white tapers. These candles were surrounded by palms ferns and several baskets filled with white rose dragons, after roses and stocks, emphasis upon a color scheme of green and white.

During the ceremony Miss Pearl Robison played on the piano "I Love You Truly" and "Oh, Promise Me" and as the bridal party entered the living room she recited Lohengrin's Wedding March.

The show will open Wednesday afternoon, Apr. 9 and will continue through the next day.


TAMPA—Construction program for this city and vicinity for this year involves total expenditure of \$5,600,000.
