Teachers get contract

SANFORD — Seminole UniServe, the union which represents the Seminole County teachers, has reached agreement with the Seminole County school district in their contract negotiations.

According to Gaye Parker, president of the union, the two sides have agreed to four percent more money for teachers overall.

Parker said that does not mean teachers are getting a four percent raise. Rather, the money is being used to help make some corrections to the salary schedule, which she said had to be "equalized" to ensure that teachers all get a similar raise each year.

The "biggie change", she said was that another step was added to the salary schedule and that another year will be added each year until it reaches the 30-year mark. Parker said that salaries have topped out after 15 years with the district. Now, she said, it will be 16 years and, "over the long term" it will go to 30 years.

"We're pleased," she said. "We achieved our major objective."

The members of the union are expected to ratify the agreement soon.

McDonough said a struggle ensued, during which Tossie broke free. One of the suspects See Briefs, Page 5A

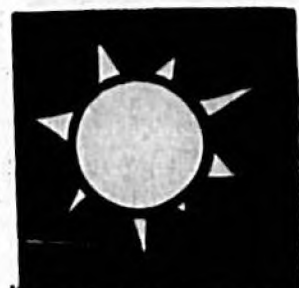

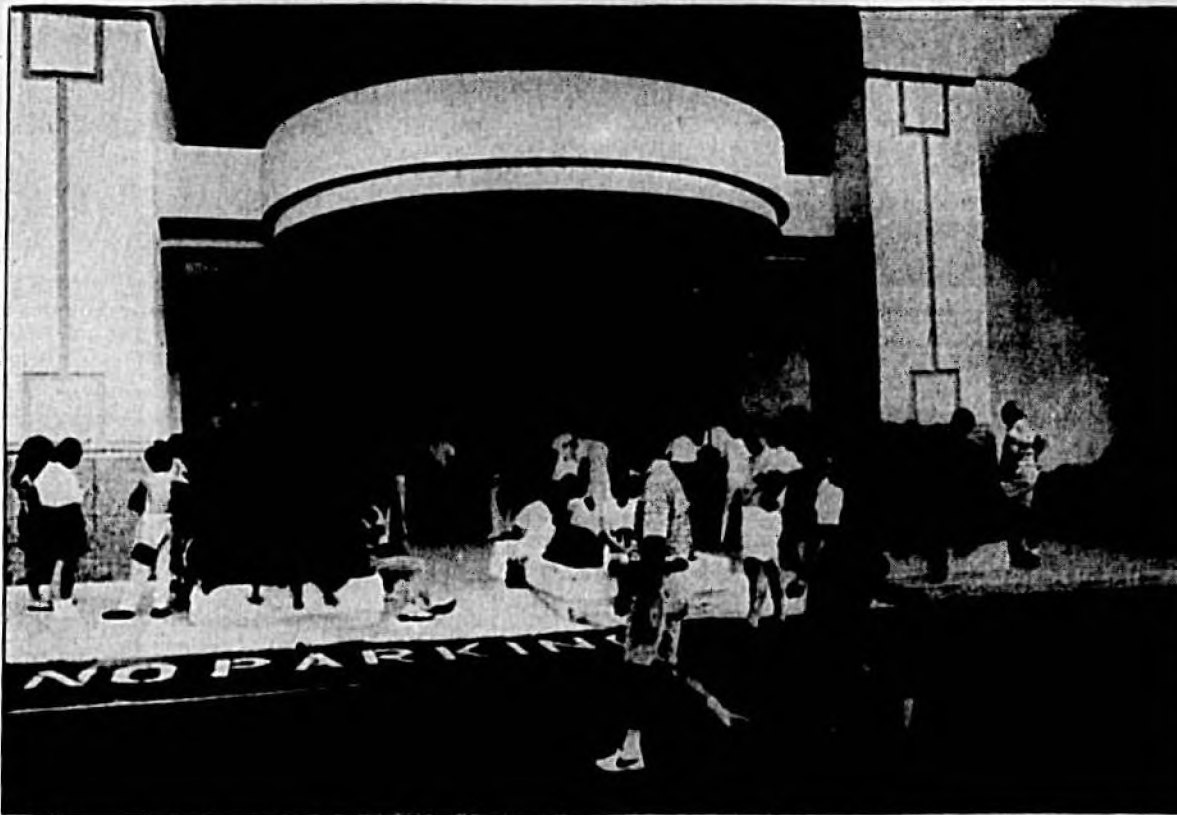

SANFORD — It was one of the grandest parties Central Florida has seen in many years.

Thousands of curious spectators and government officials flocked to Sanford's Seminole Towne Center to get their first look at the new mall and enjoy the entertainment and festivities.

SANFORD — Every time they drove past the three bedroom house on French Avenue, Brady and Lisa Lassard sighed just a little.

The quaint wood structure with gabled roof and a wrap-around porch was beautiful, they thought, though a little worn.

The Lassards live in the downtown residential historic district in a smaller house on two-and-a-half lots. They never seriously considered purchasing the house, but they liked to look at it.

"Then one day I was out-of-town doing a book signing," Brady, the author of several books, said. "Lisa called me and said there was a sign on the house that said the house was free to someone who would move it into the historic district. I said, 'I have to see this, there must be something wrong with it.'"

Roy Zimmer, who owned the house and offered it for free, said See House, Page 5A

Looking for a place to perform

SANFORD — There is a need for a regional performing arts center and theatre in Central Florida, but there is not much chance the facility will be placed in Seminole County, local business leaders said.

A forum hosted by the Seminole County Tourist Development Commission at the AAA headquarters in Heathrow this week brought local business leaders together with Orlando mayor Glenda Hood to discuss the need for such a center and the vision that Hood and United Arts had for it.

Hood told those in attendance the Bob Carr Performing Arts Center in Orlando is inadequate for the needs of the sophisticated cultural needs of the Central Florida community. All agreed the current facilities are not enough, but there was disagreement as to where a new facility should be built.

"I don't think there is a chance that it will be here," Jack Wert, director of the tourist development commission, said. "I don't see the mayor of Orlando letting it be built in Seminole County."

Wert said the Seminole County business community is neither See Perform, Page 5A

Housing authority residents say they were misled; no further probe

SANFORD — The Sanford Housing Authority will be seeking applications for a new executive director soon after board members accepted the resignation of Phyllis Richardson Thursday night.

The commissioners took no action on a call by some public housing residents to investigate other staff members for knowing about the irregularities and not reporting them sooner.

This morning, Bettye Chaney, president of SHARC,

the Sanford Housing Authority Residents Council, said the group will issue a statement supporting the commission's action and present leadership of SHA.

Finance director Tim Hudson was appointed acting executive director when Richardson was suspended with pay Sept. 5 until the investigation was completed.

Richardson resigned Tuesday, citing health problems. She did not appear at the board meeting. Terry Richardson claimed her mother's ouster was plotted by three housing authority employees.

New country singer performs at GatorFest this weekend

OVIDO — A wide variety of entertainment is planned for Florida GatorFest 95, being held this Saturday and Sunday at Lake Monroe Park, in Debary.

Among the dancers and folk singers, pickers and other musicians will be a local woman who has just released her first album.

Connie Blackwood will take the stage at GatorFest 4 on Saturday afternoon. She will sing selections from her country album "Too Hot to Handle," a compilation of original songs written and produced by Blackwood.

Her name is not on the charts yet but her tapes and compact discs are available at the three local Peaches Music and Video. This accomplishment is due wholly to an all out effort by Blackwood to break into the music business, an achievement she has aspired to since she wrote her first song in 1976.

Describing her music as not exactly country, but more a combination of country, pop, folk and rock, she said she likes to write and sing love songs. "My writing is very strong," said Blackwood.

A talent for writing is a real plus in the music business, said Blackwood. "Writing is a way to get your foot in the door." A lot of country singers do not write their own music, so writers are in high demand in Nashville. Prospective hits are sent out to the top singers for consideration. 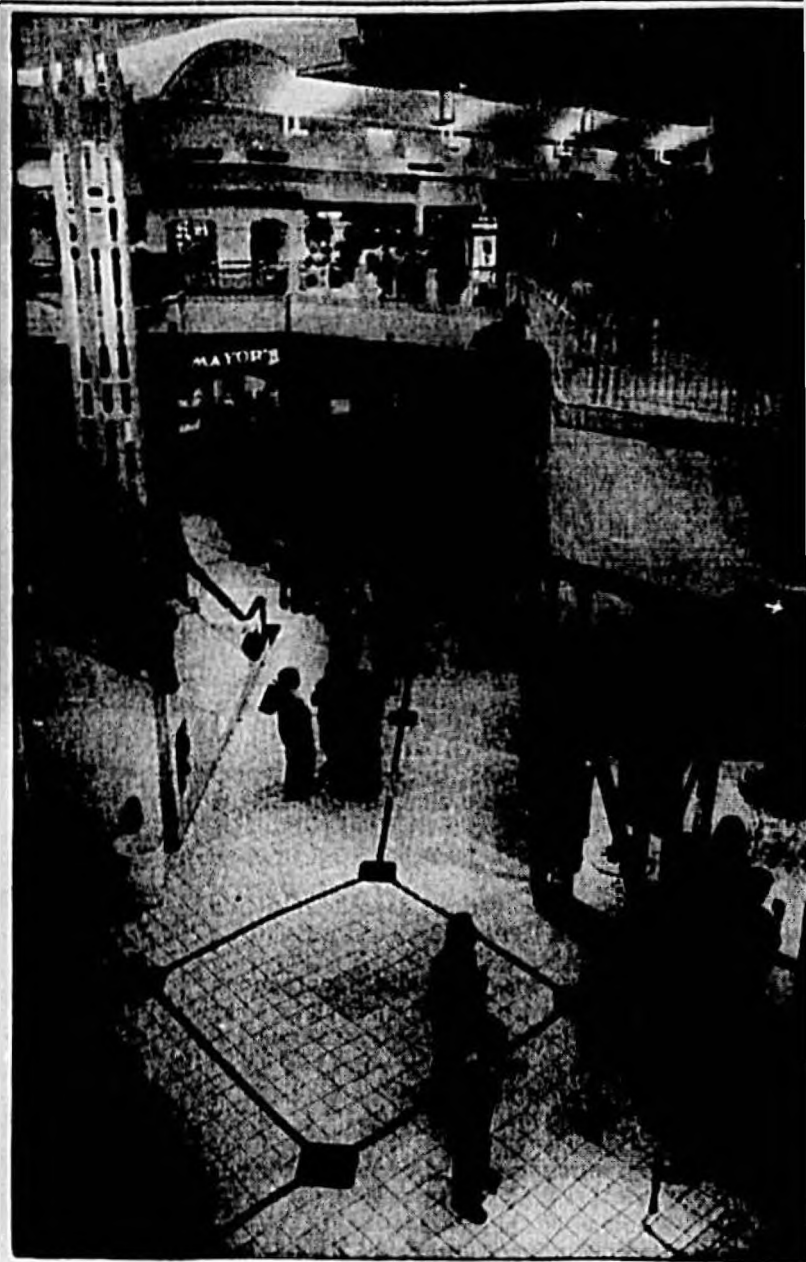

Speed limits not apt to change much

TALLAHASSEE — Regardless of what happens in Washington, nearly a third of Florida's residents probably aren't going to be able to legally drive any faster.

If the federal speed limit gets lifted, Floridians on roads in much of the state may find themselves able to lead-foot it a little bit — unless they are in Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties.

State officials say they aren't going to rush to change limits no matter what happens to the federal limits of 65 mph on rural interstates and 55 mph for most other roads.

"We're not ready to spring a higher speed limit on the motorists of Florida," Dick Kane, a spokesman for the state Department of Transportation, said Thursday. "We don't have signs saying 70 mph sitting in the warehouse."

Kane nor other officials can envision any increase in the speed limit in South Florida.

"The roads are jammed," said Florida Highway Patrol Capt. Ken Howes, an FHP spokesman.

The U.S. House voted

Wednesday to let states set their own speed limits, following a similar vote by the Senate in June. Unlike the House bill, the Senate legislation drops the speed limit for cars but keeps it for large trucks and buses.

Congress must now reach a compromise on the details and the bill will go to President Clinton. U.S. Transportation Secretary Federico Pena opposes lifting the national limit.

If Clinton goes along with Congress, regional transportation officials in Florida will get together to review state roads, Kane said. They may have sufficient data in some cases to make a decision about whether or not to change a road's limit; in other cases, studies will be done.

The question of speed limits "all boils down to the road," Howes said, citing design, accident history and traffic volume as factors that will be taken into account.

The limits for isolated interstates, especially in North Florida, could possibly increase 5 miles per hour, Howes said.

Howes said he thought it was possible the Florida Turnpike, which runs from Dade County to the Central Florida town of Wildwood, would see an increase

as it crosses the less populated areas north of Lake Okeechobee.

Another candidate for a higher speed limit may be I-75 south of Tampa going into southwest Florida, said Kevin W. Bakewell, an official with the American Automobile Association.

Yet, elsewhere in Florida the

limits are probably already as high as they should be, Bakewell said from his Tampa office.

"I don't think we're going to see a lot of higher speed limit signs go up (in Florida) if Congress does approve this thing," he said.

Joe Hinson, executive director of the Tampa Area Safety Council, said he fears an increase in the limits will probably result in an increase in the number and severity of accidents.

He cited the bumper-to-bumper traffic on Interstate 4 in Hillsborough County as an example of a highway that's already inadequate under current conditions.

"You can increase the speed limit to 70 mph and those people are still going to run 10 to 15 mph over," he said.

At a glance

- Interstate 16, from just west of Jacksonville to just east of Pensacola
- Interstate 75, from I-10 south except around Ocala
- Interstate 4, except around Orlando and Tampa

Engineer killed when train hits truck; 5 injured

ZANA — The truck driver thought he could beat the on-rushing train to the rural crossing near Lake Okeechobee. He was wrong, and his error cost an engineer's life.

"He just wasn't paying attention," Florida Highway Patrol Cpl. Paul Bramlett said of the trucker. "He said he saw the train but thought it was further down the tracks."

Amtrak's Silver Star slammed into the tractor-trailer at midday Thursday. In addition to the death of assistant engineer Randall Moses, two crew members and three passengers were slightly hurt. The truck driver was uninjured.

The train, carrying 187 passengers and 11 crew members, was en route from New York City to Miami, an Amtrak spokesman said.

"I was sleeping," P.J. Dykas of West Palm Beach told The Palm Beach Post for today's edition. "Then I heard a big boom and saw a lot of dirt and rocks flying and then we stopped. It was pretty scary. People were shaken up badly."

The accident occurred about 15 miles southeast of Okeechobee and about 50 miles northwest of West Palm Beach, the train's next stop.

There was a similar accident in 1990 involving Amtrak's Silver Meteor and a sewage truck. There were injuries, but no deaths, in that accident.

The Amtrak Silver Star was traveling at 79 mph, a routine speed for such long, straight stretches of track, when it hit the open trailer, Martin County sheriff's Detective Sanford "Grady" Shirk said.

The force of the impact peeled the metal frame of the train engine open "like a tin can," Shirk said. "It wrapped the trailer around both sides and dragged it a half-mile."

Moses, 43, of Wildwood was killed when the locomotive caved in, Amtrak spokesman Ray Lang said. He was a nine-year Amtrak employee.

Engineer Steve Wilkerson, who was also in the locomotive, was dazed and taken to a hospital, where X-rays found no injuries. Another crew member and three passengers were treated at the scene for minor injuries, Lang said.

Riding in the number 13 room on the train's sole sleeper car, Fort Lauderdale resident Franz Pfeiffer thought the number had proved unlucky.

"Things started flying and then my door slammed shut," she said. "Then lots of smoke came by (the window)."

Jeffrey Wallace Newcomb, 33, of Boca Raton, drove onto the unmarked crossing directly into the path of the train, according to a report by FHP, which investigated the crash.

The report noted that charges were pending but did not elaborate. No one was available for comment late Thursday, an FHP duty officer said.

The contents of the trailer, a solid sludge from Boca Raton, spewed through the interior of the engine and along the track, Shirk said.

The truck, owned by the City of Boca Raton, was to dump the sewage in a pit on a ranch where it would be used as fertilizer.

Amtrak officials brought in another locomotive to tow the nine-car train back to Okeechobee. The cars were linked to another Miami-bound train, the Silver Meteor, which resumed the southbound journey, Lang said.

The FHP report estimated damage to the train at \$100,000, while damage to the truck's trailer was \$25,000.

As the mall becomes reality

The Seminole Towne Center mall is now open. It took many years of hard work, and involvement by many individuals to bring this about.

Last night, the gala grand opening wowed many. It was an enjoyable evening and while various people were in attendance for various reasons, a good time was had by all.

Now perhaps, it's time to recap some of the names of people who brought this mall to fruition. Of course kudos must start at the beginning, with Melvin, Herbert and David Simon, of Simon and Associates, who selected Sanford as the site for this mall. Melvin Simon is the chairman.

Who actually first suggested the site to them is not known, but this person should be recognized.

Major thanks must go to the mayor, members of the city commission, the city manager, city attorney, and the entire city staff. During almost five years of debates, discussions, work sessions and formal meetings, they were faced with many decisions. Some may have appeared to be risky undertakings. Others seemed like logical moves for the betterment of the city. They did an excellent job. Naturally, in referring to the commission, former city Commissioner A.A. McClanahan must be included as involved in the driving force.

At times, it was like Walt Disney's announcement that he wanted to build a theme park in Central Florida. Many people thought it was a great idea, but it would never happen.

The same holds true with the Seminole Towne Center. There were some who complained at every give-and-take decision made by the city commission. They were always doubting whether or not the city of Sanford would actually be the home of this major mall.

Now, all worries are behind us. The mall is here, and it's open to the public. Time to think about aging America

Having just turned 62, eligible now for senior discounts, I stand before you as a leading indicator. What is happening now to us Depression babies will be happening soon to the baby boomers. It is time to think about aging in America, governmentally and psychologically, separately and together.

The Republican Congress is wrestling with Medicare, trying to "decrease the rate of increase" in spending. President Clinton is pledged to the same goal, but would do it more slowly. All the players are driven by the same facts: People are living longer. There are 80 million boomers coming to seniorhood and they haven't had enough children to keep the social benefits pyramid game going at quite the same rate. Medical costs are rising. There is a federal deficit.

So we will end up with somewhat higher premiums, somewhat lesser benefits or somewhat more efficient health care -- probably all three. It won't be a disaster. In a few years, there will also have to be an adjustment in Social Security benefits. That won't be a cataclysm either. Other social benefit programs will be curtailed. Again, no tragedy. America is still a very rich country.

The psychological situation is not nearly so

predictable. Northwestern University Professor David Gutmann, a developmental psychologist and a 70-year-old who still jogs regularly, is the author of an acclaimed book about aging, "Reclaimed Powers" (Basic Books). Gutmann's cross-cultural research leads him to believe that aging can be, and often is, a process of healthy and intrinsic growth.

In most traditional non-modern societies, Gutmann says, the elderly gain a new psychological freedom, compensating for the physical erosion that comes with age. Unhindered from the daily sense of emergency that goes along with rearing children, the aged often find new

fulfillment. Older women tend to become more authoritative and powerful, often presiding over a family matriarchy. Older men tend to become softer, wiser and more understanding. They are the shamans, high priests and tenders of the culture, often revered for their wisdom.

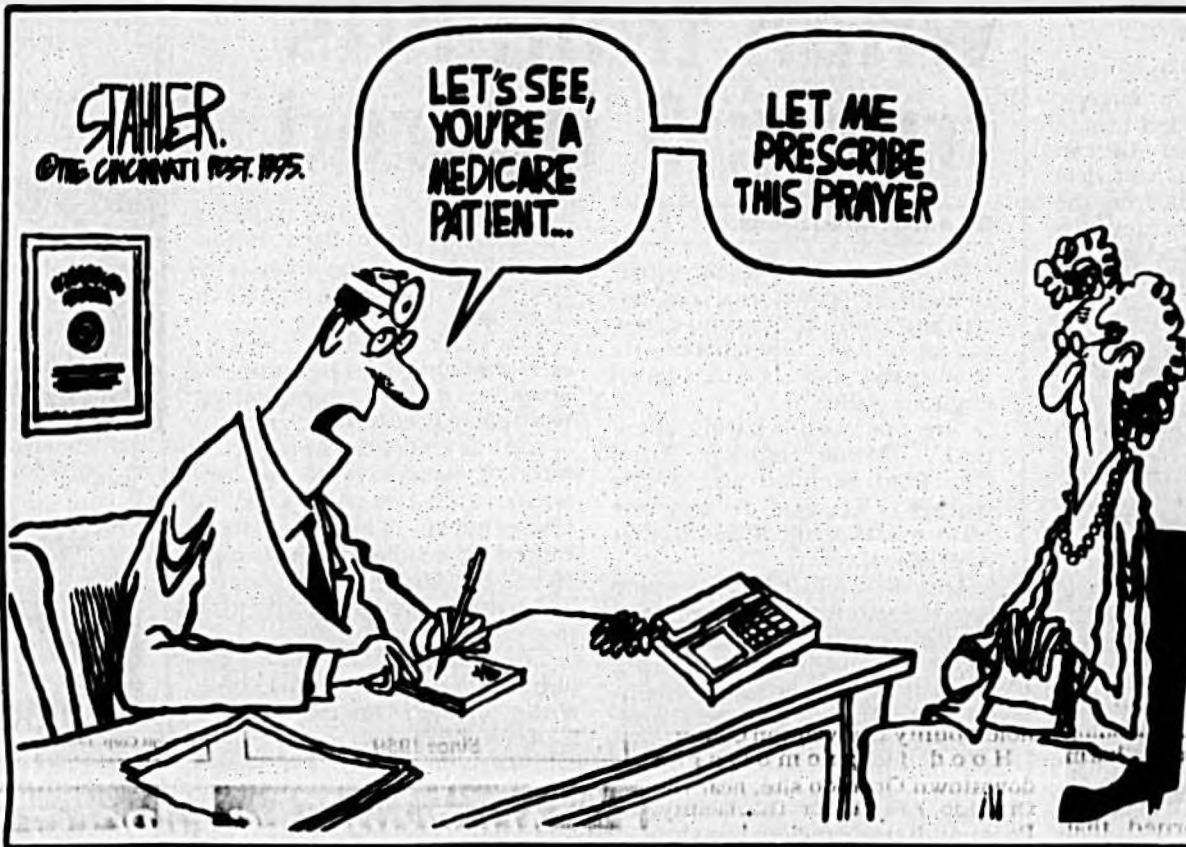
Moreover, Gutmann points out, the elderly -- by definition -- are survivors. Dependent types die off early. Somehow the aged have managed to keep body and mind working.

In modern societies, new medicines and treatments keep people alive longer and in better health. Alas, says Gutmann, these modern societies typically don't use the potential resources of the elderly as productively as do the more traditional societies. Mobility erodes matriarchy. It's even tougher on elderly men: there is not much of a market for shamans or culture-tenders these days. Self-esteem is peddled to teenagers, but ignored for seniors, who may need it most.

The last time I had been carded was as a teen-ager seeking a drink in a college town. It feels better to look too young at 62 than it did at 18. It bathed me in self-esteem, a warm glow that lasted until I came home to read a letter from the Social Security Administration informing me that I was now eligible for retirement.

GOP wants Powell in the party

Retired Gen. Colin Powell says that he isn't interested in the vice presidency, but some Republicans seem intent on dragging him into the role -- or, at least, into the GOP.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., and GOP editor-cum-strategist Bill Kristol have both publicly encouraged Powell to run for president as a Republican, claiming he'd immediately leap into the top tier of contenders. Kristol, in the inaugural issue of the new Weekly Standard magazine, even said he'd bet on Powell as the 1996 Republican nominee.

That's ridiculous, and Kristol surely knows it. Powell is pro-choice, believes in gun control, supports affirmative action, and might even raise taxes (or at least reduce tax breaks) to get the federal budget into balance.

Those positions surely would scotch Powell's chances of winning Republican primaries, where GOP consultant Eddie Mahe estimates 65 percent of voters are hard-line conservatives.

In presidential preference surveys, such as the September Harris Poll, Powell comes in a distant second to front-running Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., with 14 percent to Dole's 38 percent.

What's more, time and money are against Powell's winning the nomination. Powell would start running in November miles behind Dole and other Republicans.

In 1952, Gen. Dwight Eisenhower required the old Tom Dewey organization to beat conservative regular Sen. Robert Taft, R-Ohio, and Powell -- his estimable character notwithstanding -- isn't as revered as Eisenhower was after leading the nation to victory in World War II.

My guess is that Gingrich, Kristol and other Republicans boosting Powell's chances as a Republican presidential prospect actually have as a motive pulling Powell into the GOP and, possibly, into the No. 2 slot on the ticket.

Why? As a veep candidate, he'd help the GOP ticket. And as a Republican, he'd be unable to run as an Independent, where he conceivably could complicate the picture enough to throw the election into the House of Representatives.

What's more, Powell as a Republican could pull middle-class blacks and moderate Democrats into the party, shriveling the Democrats to a left-wing base.

Polls indicate that a Dole-Powell ticket would beat Clinton-Gore pretty handily -- 51 percent to 44 percent, according to Princeton Survey Research Associates.

It's widely assumed that hard-line conservatives would go berserk if Dole picked Powell as No. 2, creating a raucous spectacle at the San Diego convention and perhaps causing many to stay home from the polls in November.

Maybe, but it's interesting that the Christian Coalition has been practically silent amid all

the Powell talk during the past few weeks, issuing no veto threats as it has done when pro-choice Govs. Christine Todd Whitman (N.J.) and Pete Wilson (Calif.) have been discussed.

Being vice president isn't the worst thing that could happen to Powell, who says he lacks the "passion" to run for president. Conceivably, he would be able to do great good as a healer of racial tensions, would get on-the-job training in domestic and economic issues, could be a moderating voice in high GOP counsels -- perhaps even re-creating a "Rockefeller wing" of the party -- and might be in line to become president after four or eight years.

However, Powell repeatedly says he does not want to be vice president, and one can imagine why: Having served his purpose on Election Day, he might be sent off to state funerals and otherwise ignored.

But if he ran for president in GOP primaries and did respectably well, there would be practically irresistible pressure on him to run as No. 2.

If Powell refused the veep slot, or for some reason wasn't picked, he'd still be stuck in the GOP, which Kristol, Gingrich and others would like because he'd enlarge the party and temper its rightist image.

He'd also be unable to run for president as an Independent, where he'd be a wild card, inflicting damage on both Dole and President Clinton.

Previous polls have indicated that in a three-way race against Clinton and Dole, Powell would finish third, but it's possible that he'd do better, pulling moderate suburban Republicans, Perot supporters, and foreign policy conservatives away from Dole, and blacks and moderate Democrats away from Clinton.

Mounting an Independent candidacy would be even more difficult technically than running as a Republican, but if Powell were to win the endorsement of Perot's United We Stand America organization, he'd be helped enormously and might even be eligible for federal campaign funds.

An investigation conducted by housing authority attorney Clay Simmons found there was probable cause to find Richardson had not followed housing authority policies in obtaining and disposing of vehicles and had placed friends and relatives at the head of the line for housing assistance without following the waiting list procedures or

criteria.
In addition, the investigation found Richardson's family members and others were paid for work they did not do and she had housing authority employees do work at her home during working hours. Richardson denied employees did work for her but admitted preparing false payroll time sheets

for her daughter-in-law claiming the pay was for assisting in a covert investigation of an alleged theft. The work was done away from the housing authority office in the evenings. The attorney found there was no way to verify the work was done. Richardson said she paid what she thought the services were worth, not by the hour.

The report will be sent to the State Attorney and U.S. Attorney offices. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) turned over complaints it received to the Office of Inspector General which is also investigating.

Supporters of Richardson called for the board to investigate why public housing employees did not report the problems more promptly and whether the staff is liable as well. However, with SHARC announcing support of the new leadership this morning, no further probe will be requested.

Linda Williams, public housing marketing director, said after meeting with Chaney this morning, residents felt they had been misled about the matter by an individual they would not name.

Greenspan optimistic about U.S. economy

WASHINGTON - Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, delivering an upbeat assessment of the U.S. economy, said today the nation appears to have avoided recession and is headed for faster growth.

Testifying before the Senate Banking Committee and just days before the central bank is to consider action on interest rates, Greenspan said inflation is under control and the latest evidence is "consistent with a firmer pace of economic growth."

He cited a pickup in factory production, modest improvement in the labor market and solid consumer spending as signs the economy is in good shape.

"On the whole, the near-term prospects for the U.S. economy have improved in recent months," he said.

Greenspan's comments were closely watched by financial markets in anticipation of next Tuesday's meeting of the Federal Reserve's Open Market Committee.

The panel, which cut a key short-term interest rate on July 6 and has remained on the sidelines since, is not expected to cut rates at next week's meeting.

Greenspan said nothing in his prepared testimony to dispel the widely held view that the economy has rebounded sufficiently without any further stimulus from lower interest rates.

"Inflation risks have receded, and, as a consequence, the threat of severe recession has declined," Greenspan said.

Inflation actually has improved since earlier this year, he continued, and there are no warning signs on the horizon.

The Federal Reserve, seeking to squelch inflation, engineered a series of seven interest-rate increases over a one-year period that ended in February.

Those rate increases slowed

growth dramatically this year, raising concerns that the central bank had overcome the credit tightening and might have pushed the economy into recession.

Greenspan himself in June had raised the possibility of recession in remarks just prior to the Fed's rate cut in July. Since then, a variety of business statistics have pointed toward stronger growth, and Greenspan took note of those today.

Greenspan also urged Congress to cut the deficit, saying reducing federal spending will be good for the economy in the long run.

"I have no doubt that the net result of moving the budget into balance will be a more efficient, more productive U.S. economy," he said, addressing concerns that Congress's zeal for slashing federal spending could harm growth.

But Greenspan warned that forecasting is a risky business and there could be some clouds on the horizon.

"The outlook is not without concern," he said. "Firms' desired inventory levels are extremely difficult to gauge and the remaining adjustment process could play out more negatively than we anticipate."

Businesses have reduced inventory growth this year as consumer spending has eased from the booming pace of last year. Analysts said the reduction in stockpiles likely will be completed soon and expect moderate gains in production ahead.

"One could not expect the transition to a more sustainable growth path to be entirely smooth," Greenspan said. "Attempts to control inventories triggered cutbacks in orders and output that, in turn, depressed employment and income in the spring."

The Fed is seeking a growth rate of about 2.5 percent. In the second quarter this year, the economy expanded at less than half that pace - growing at a 1.1 percent annual rate.

disappointed nor angry about that potential. Their interest in the performing arts center discussions is to help organize the plans for the proposed Seminole County Convention Center.

Hood is promoting a downtown Orlando site, near the Orlando Arena, for the facility. Because it is a regional center, she told local leaders, it will have to be financed by the whole region at a cost estimated between \$13 million and \$140 million.

If it is built, Seminole County officials say there will not be a need for a performing arts center here. If it does not come to pass, the Seminole County Convention Center will have to include some performing arts facilities.

"It would not make any sense to have a facility there and a facility here," Wert said. "We're still keeping in touch so we know what's going on."

Wert believes the people of Seminole County will support the performing arts center regardless of where it is placed.

"This is where the ticket base is," he said. "But it needs to be a regional center."

Hood told the gathering yesterday a United Arts steering committee will meet in the fall with community groups and others interested in the center.

Meanwhile the tourist development commission is looking over the eight suggested sites for the Seminole County Convention Center and hopes to have a better handle, by mid-October, on where they propose to build it.

"But the inside has been kept up beautifully," Brady said.

The house will leave the spot at 211 S. French Avenue where it has been for nearly three-quarters of a century on Sept. 29 or 30 and make the slow trek to its new home. Representatives of the company which will be moving the house were not available for comment this morning to discuss the route it will take.

The Lassards said the cost of moving the house was "not too bad." Zimmer estimates that it will cost between \$12,000 and \$20,000 to move it.

"It's a whole lot less than buying a house," Lisa said.

Zimmer is glad the house has found a good home.

"I'm glad they're getting it," he said. "They are good kids. I'm glad someone is getting it who will take care of it and bring it up to the way it should be."

He said he had started to renovate the house to use as a rental property, but decided that he did not want to have a low-income house in Sanford and would rather the house be someone's home.

The Lassards are not sure if they will live in their present home or if they will move into their new house. Lisa said they will "definitely" live in their present digs. Brady said he'd "kinda like to live in the new house."

That decision will be made later, they agreed.

Jay Marder, director of planning and development for the city of Sanford, is "very pleased" that the house is being moved into the historic district.

"It will keep the historic fabric of the neighborhood intact," he said. "It is a good, historic house

and I'm very pleased to see it move into the historic district."

Zimmer said he has just purchased the other two houses on the block from which the Lassard's house is being moved. One, he said, will probably be demolished. He believes the other, a two-story structure, has some historic significance and he may make the same give-away offer with that one at a later date.

"But I'm not sure how they'd

move that one," he said. "It may be too tall to get into the historic district."

Right now, he said, there are no plans for the property where the Lassard's house currently stands.

"Burger King is looking at it, but they are looking at a lot of other properties as well. They take a long time to make that kind of decision," he said. "We'll just have to see."

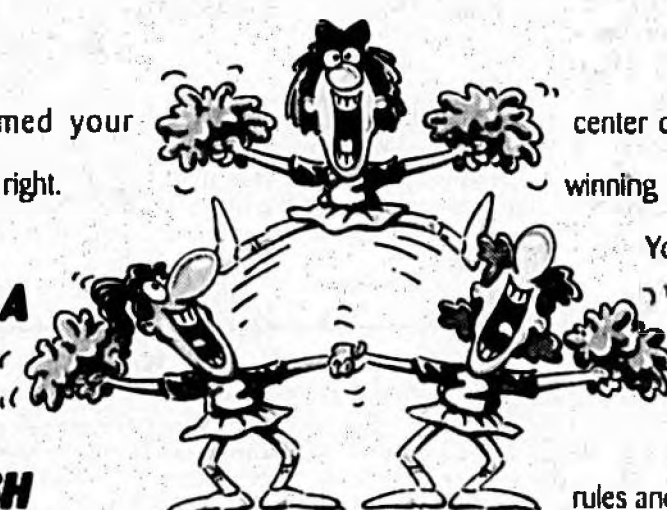

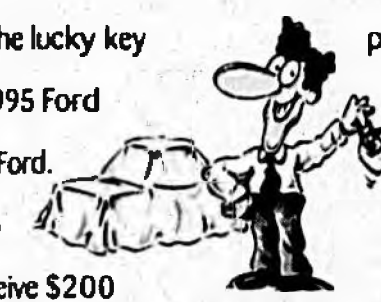

Grandparents face obstacles when raising grandchildren

WASHINGTON — Rose Queen spent five years and all her savings to be appointed legal guardian of her grandson, now 6, because his mother cannot raise him.

Without that legal standing, Queen said she could not carry him on her health insurance or even have him treated at the hospital.

Queen's complaints were echoed by other grandparents who are acting as parents to their grandchildren, and several child welfare experts who spoke at a forum on Capitol Hill, sponsored by the House Older Americans Caucus.

The 1990 census found 3.2 million U.S. households where grandparents were present, said Sylvie de Toledo, author of the book "Grandparents as Parents: A Survival Guide for Raising a Second Family."

Mary K. Bissell, director of the Kinship Care Project of the Legal Aid Society of the District of Columbia, estimated that one in 20 American children is growing up in a household headed by grandparents, other relatives, friends or neighbors — a phenomenon that has been dubbed "kinship care."

"Grandparents and other kinship care-givers have been called the 'silent saviors' because they have taken up where parents, the community and the government left off," Bissell said.

Because many grandparents do not have legal custody of the grandchildren they are raising, they can't enroll them in school or qualify for welfare or foster care funding.

And to top it off, these grandparents forgo their dreams of a comfortable retirement.

"I never go anywhere. I never do anything except take care of my grandchildren," said Phyllis Mewa, who is raising her three grandchildren, ages 12, 2 and 8 months.

When Mewa became ill, she sought help with the children from local social service agencies and discovered she wasn't eligible for assistance.

"Foster care parents receive a great deal more support from the government than we grandparents do," she said.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., co-chair of the caucus, has introduced a bill that would allow states to use federal foster care money to provide assistance to relatives other than parents who are raising children.

Senator bashes GOP over Medicare

WASHINGTON — House Democrats, angry over Republican Medicare proposals, arranged unorthodox, unofficial hearings on the Capitol lawn to attack the newly released GOP plan for revamping health insurance for the elderly.

"They're not saving Medicare. Medicare doesn't need saving," Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla., said Thursday about Republicans with whom he serves on the Ways and Means Committee, which scheduled an official Medicare hearing today inside a House office building.

The simultaneous, dueling hearings dramatized what House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., promised would be "one of the biggest fights and controversies that we've seen in maybe congressional history."

Among the speakers scheduled for the outdoor hearing was Labor Secretary Robert Reich, who issued a report Thursday showing senior citizens may become even more dependent on Medicare because a declining number are getting health benefits from former employers.

Judge gives jurors options

LOS ANGELES — Stripping O.J. Simpson of his all-or-nothing verdict strategy, the judge added an option that allows jurors to convict him in the slayings even if they find he didn't plan them.

In a major setback for the defense, Judge Lance Ito decided Thursday that jurors can convict Simpson of second-degree murder, a lesser charge that requires less evidence and carries a penalty with less prison time than the more serious first-degree murder charge.

The ruling means jurors can find Simpson guilty of murder without finding that the killings of ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman were premeditated. It said jurors can consider the lesser charge because Goldman showed up at Ms. Simpson's condo "by sheer chance."

"It's a big deal," said Loyola University law Professor Stan Goldman. "I think the defense obviously loses a very clever weapon — the argument that you have to prove that (Simpson) planned it ... and jurors would have to acquit him because they couldn't prove he planned it."

Drug sought to help cigarette addiction

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chemicals from one cigarette stimulate a rapid flow of signals in the brain that unleashes a craving for another in an unending circle of addiction, new research shows.

In a study published today in the journal Science, researchers at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, who have traced the molecular effects of nicotine on the brain, say they have found that nicotine does its addictive work by speeding up and intensifying the flow of glutamate, a neurotransmitter that is a key signal carrier within the brain.

Lorna W. Role, an author of the study, said the effect of this faster flow "is like turning up the volume on a radio. It increases the signal. This study gives a better molecular understanding as to why nicotine is such a stimulant."

Daniel S. McGehee, another author, said the discovery is the initial step toward finding a drug that will block the addictive effects of nicotine and help smokers kick the habit.

Study: Overweight can be blinding

CHICAGO — Being overweight may not only hurt your heart, set you up for diabetes and send you to an early grave, it could also blind you, a study of men suggests.

The most overweight men in the study were about twice as likely to develop cataracts as the leanest, researchers said after tracking more than 17,700 doctors ages 40 to 84 for just over five years.

"We found a continuing increase in risk with heavier weight," said Robert J. Glynn, an associate professor of medicine and biostatistics at Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

The men were all enrolled in the long-term Physicians' Health Study. Between 1982 and 1988, 370 of them developed cataracts, a clouding of the eye's lens that can cause blindness.

Forbes announces candidacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Publisher Steve Forbes, denouncing the "narrow, cramped" vision of Republican presidential hopefuls, is offering himself as the candidate to "remove the dead weight of Washington and let the American economy run free."

The heir to the Forbes Inc. publishing empire said he is entering the race because he wants to bring the nation an optimistic vision, based on the idea that an economic boom can be triggered by a flat tax and tying the dollar's value to gold.

"I see an American economy that is the most innovative and productive and technologically advanced in the world — hamstrung by high taxes and counter-productive regulations," he said in his announcement speech slated for delivery today at the National Press Club.

"It's a time to remove the dead weight of Washington and let the American economy run free."

FBI accused of withholding evidence

WASHINGTON — Declaring he wants to lift "the cloud that's been placed over me" because of Ruby Ridge, the FBI's former deputy director says the Justice Department is withholding evidence that would exonerate him.

Larry Potts testified to a Senate panel Thursday that he gave FBI snipers permission to shoot at armed adults but never told them that they "should" do so.

Contradicting another key witness, Potts said the head of the FBI's Hostage Rescue Team, Richard Rogers, approved the unique shoot-on-sight rule at the Idaho homestead of white separatist Randy Weaver.

The FBI's field commander at Ruby Ridge, Eugene Glenn, testified Wednesday that it was Potts who gave the approval — which was followed hours later by the shooting death of Weaver's wife, Vicki. Rogers refused to testify.

Troops back off

BANJA LUKA, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Government and Croatian troops have backed off from attacking Serb-held Banja Luka, where 100,000 refugees are crowded into makeshift shelters.

Instead, the forces on Thursday appeared to be trying to isolate the city, the stronghold of the Serbs in northwestern Bosnia, by attacking Doboj, a key rail and road junction 40 miles to the east.

France announced, meanwhile, that French and NATO commandos failed in three attempts to rescue two French fliers shot down by Bosnian Serbs. NBC reported that two American soldiers were wounded in the third raid Sept. 7.

Front lines were holding at about 14 to 19 miles from Banja Luka, said Lt. Col. Chris Vernon, a U.N. spokesman in Sarajevo. The Bosnian government, under intense international pressure to negotiate a peace accord, has promised not to enter the city.

Court battle planned over desegregation

JACKSONVILLE — An NAACP official wants continued monitoring of Duval County's school desegregation plan, while a citizens' group is considering filing a lawsuit alleging the 35-year-old battle is hurting education.

The federal courts should maintain oversight over the desegregation plan, even after it is resolved, said Earl Shinhoester, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

"If the School Board is left to its own devices, there's too much of a chance the school system could become re-segregated," said Shinhoester, who spoke Wednesday at Edward Waters College.

The Duval County School Board and the NAACP reached a voluntary desegregation agreement in 1990, but the school system hasn't met all of its goals. A committee is working on a new desegregation plan.

School Superintendent Larry Zenke said he would have no problem with the court maintaining oversight.

"Whether or not the courts retain a supervisory role, they're going to expect some pretty strong assurances from the school district that we are not going to undo the progress that has been made in meeting the request of the court order," Zenke said.

Meanwhile, members of Liberty and Justice For All will try to gather parents who have been negatively affected by the three decades of acrimony over desegregation plans to see if they want to mount a court challenge.

The group was formed in 1992 to support a white judge under fire for making racial remarks.

The group has a stated purpose of assuring equal rights for all U.S. citizens and supports such issues as "American cultural pride," neighborhood schools and prayer in school. It opposes affirmative action, gay rights and welfare dependency.

At a meeting Wednesday, the group asked local attorney Rod Sullivan whether parents could sue the NAACP to end the desegregation case.

Sullivan told the group's 30 members that parents technically could sue the civil rights group since it joined the School Board in the 1990 desegregation agreement.

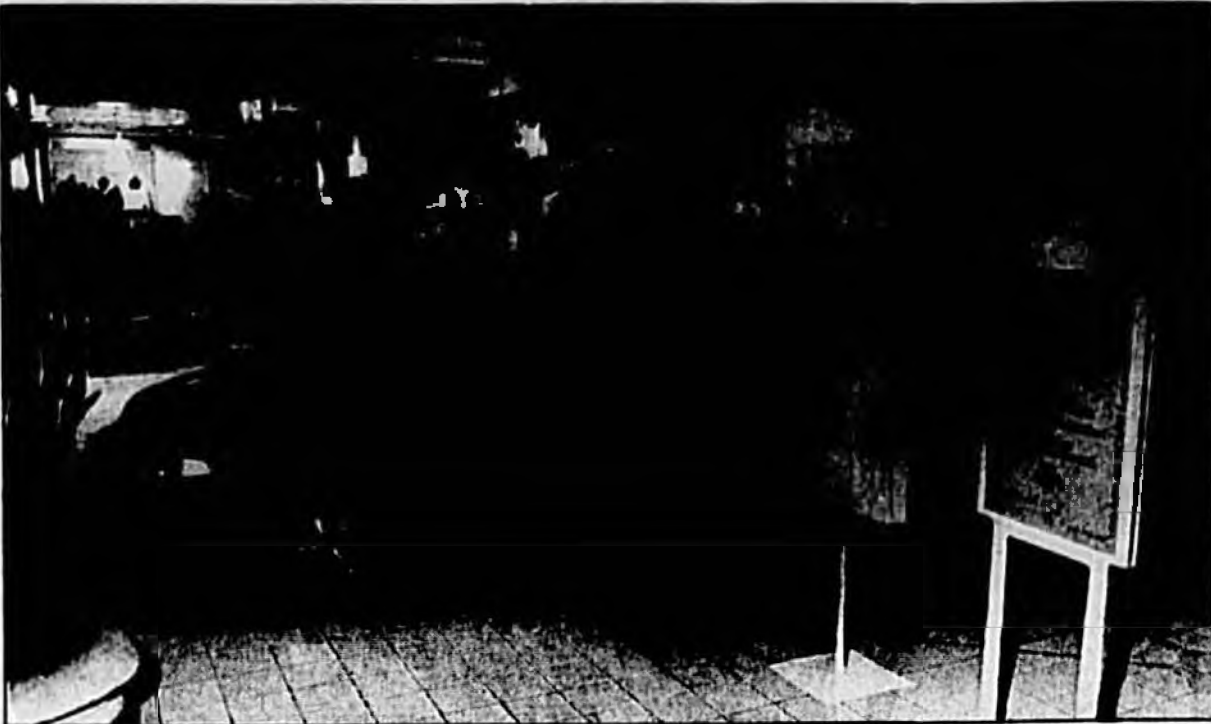
"But is that an advisable course of action? Probably not," Sullivan said.

Another course of action, which would also be difficult, would be to have parents ask the court to end the desegregation case, claiming it has detracted from their children's education, Sullivan said.

Susan Lamb, vice president of the group, said it will supply Sullivan with a list of parents who would be willing to sue.

Liberty and Justice For All will not be part of the suit, she said.

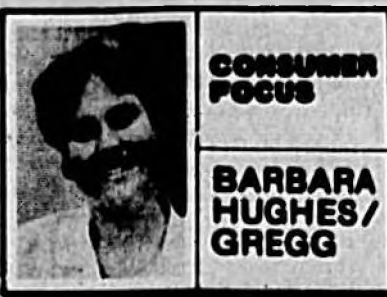
Repair Act protects motorists Get written estimate for vehicle repairs

Cars and trucks last longer and give better performance if cared for properly. Repairs and maintenance will prove beneficial — but only if performed by a reputable, qualified mechanic.

Most repair shops in Florida are required by the Motor Vehicle Repair Act to register annually with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. All print ads or listings relating to vehicle repair must include the shop's registration number. Shops performing only minor repair work — such as oil changes and lubrication, or replacement of belts, lamps, etc. — are exempt from the registration requirement.

Under the law, registered shops must:

- Post a sign advising consumers of their rights under the Motor Vehicle Repair Act and giving the Department's toll-free telephone number for assistance or information.

• Include in the sign a statement advising consumers they are entitled to the return or inspection of replaced parts. If requested at the time the service order is placed.

• Requesting a written estimate

Consumers also have legal rights regarding repair estimates. If the repair work will cost more than \$50, the shop must give a customer the option of:

- Being notified by the shop if the repair exceeds an amount specified by the customer.
- Not requiring a written estimate.

Shops cannot force consumers to waive their rights to an estimate. Consumers should always ask for a written estimate and advise the shop not to make repairs that will cost more without specific authorization. Though not required on the written estimate, consumers should ask that it clearly state

whether the parts quoted are for new, used or remanufactured parts. That information is required on the final invoice.

The repairs can be canceled if the cost exceeds the estimate, and the repair shop must reassemble the vehicle, unless it is unsafe to drive. The consumer may waive reassembly. The shop may charge for teardown and reassembly — but only if the consumer was given notice of that charge on the estimate.

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services can seek an injunction against shops that violate the Motor Vehicle Repair Act and impose penalties of up to \$1,000 per violation.

Abused wife told to 'Get out' now

DEAR MARY: I got married in July 1994 to what I thought was the man of my dreams. He's eight years older than I am (I'm 22 now), and had all the manners and charm missing in the guys I'd dated before. Well, it was love at first sight and we were married three months after our first date.

It seemed like he started changing the day we got married. He criticized everything I did, started putting me down in front of other people and told me to grow up or go back home when I wanted to visit with my family. I have really tried to please him and change the things he doesn't like, but it's never enough.

Last Saturday I tried to stand up to him when he started telling me how stupid I am and that I'm not the woman he married. He pushed me into a wall and slapped me so hard that I have a bruise on my face and a black eye. I packed up some things and went to my parents' house as soon as I could get away so he could cool off.

They're trying to convince me to leave him for good, but he's saying if I come back, it will never happen again. I don't know what to do. Part of me still loves him, but I'm afraid of him now. HELP!

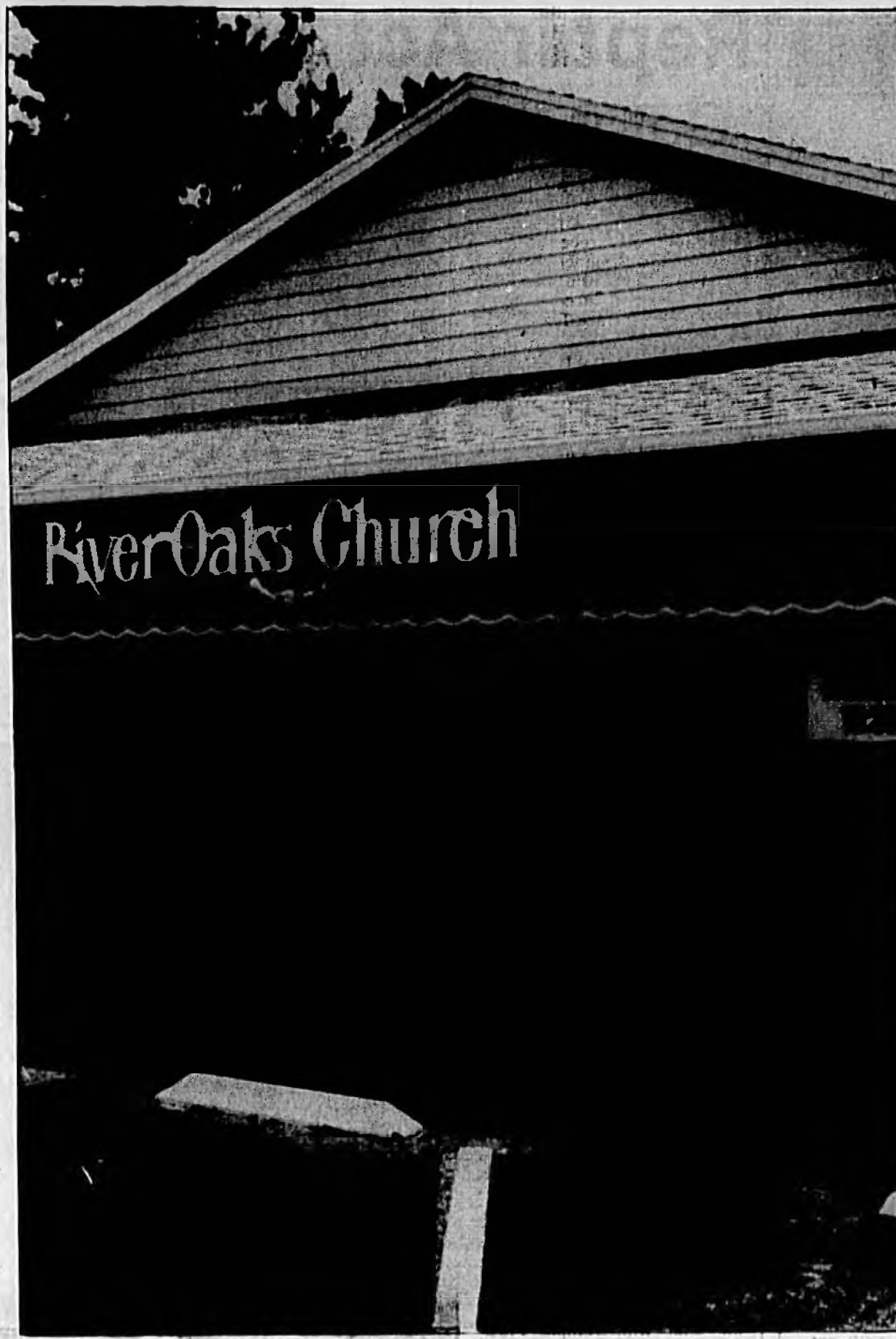

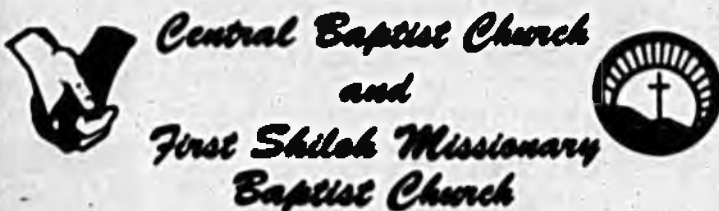

Keep it simple with thrush therapy

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the link between mouth ulcers and smoking? An ENT specialist diagnosed me with thrush. So far, two internists and one ENT specialist cannot explain why this happened. It was extremely hard for me to quit smoking, but it was my choice because of being sick and coughing my brains out most of the time. Does acidophilus help with curing the thrush?

DEAR READER: Most people who smoke do not suffer from mouth ulcers. Tobacco is far more likely to cause bronchitis, emphysema, heart disease, and cancer of the throat and lungs.

Thrush is a fungus infection (caused by candida) of the mouth. It is more common in infants but may be a problem for adult diabetics or those individuals with deficient immune systems.

You are to be congratulated on giving up cigarettes.

At this point, it seems less important to discover why you have thrush than to treat the disorder. I've heard that acidophilus may help some people with this painful affliction, but I've had more success with the relatively inexpensive, prescription drug called Mycostatin Swish-and-Swallow. Ask your doctor about this.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've insisted that my 16-year-old daughter take a high-potency daily multiple vitamin and mineral and, in addition, a 1,000 mg vitamin C capsule. Her diet consists largely of salads, dairy products and meats but NO, and I mean NO, vegetables. She is in good physical condition and is very active. Is it necessary to have her take the vitamins, when considering her diet?

DEAR READER: Probably not. Despite her aversion to veggies, she's most likely obtaining most of her dietary requirements from meat, dairy products -- and salads (which are, after all, merely raw vegetables. Right?) However, the vitamin supplements won't harm her. If

she's willing to take the vitamins, Dr. K. however, your insistence is creating family chaos, back off; at 16, she's probably going to do what she wants anyway.

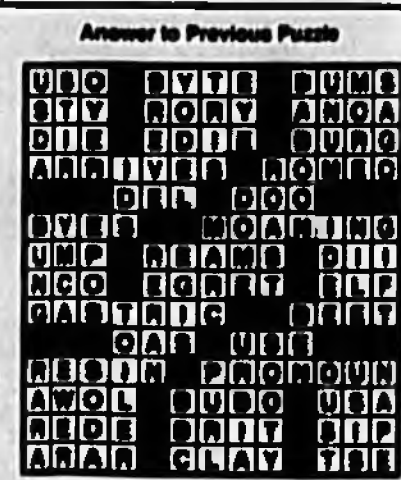

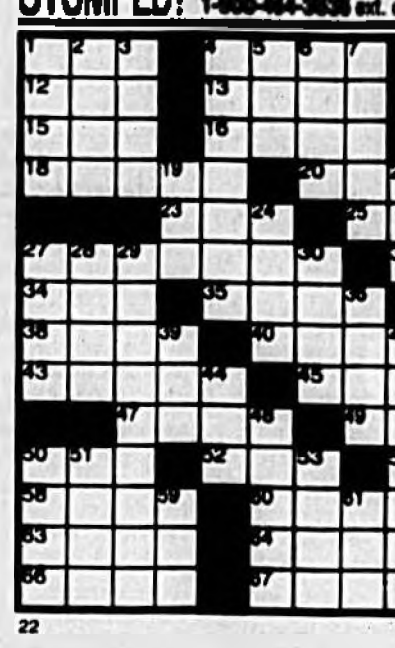

WIN AT BRIDGE

South had seven top tricks: three hearts, two diamonds and two clubs. So, he had to bring in four club tricks. After winning trick five with dummy's diamond king, declarer played a club to his jack and cashed the club king.

East was awake: Smoothly he dropped the club queen, the card he was known to hold. Now, when South led his last club toward dummy's ace-nine, he had a guess. If East had started with only two clubs, declarer had to finesse dummy's nine. Whereas if East had made a clever play, South had to call for dummy's ace. Most declarers would finesse dummy's nine.

Watch for examples of playing the card you are known to hold. It makes life tougher for your opponents.
