#### Winn to walk and talk

**OVIDO** — Seminole County Commissioner Winn Adams is doing some fact-finding about the proposed mall, asking Tusawilla area residents their opinion on the project.

Adams' informal survey of 46 people has yielded 26 individuals in favor of the project and 20 opposed. The county commission will consider the mall project Tuesday. The freshman commissioner hopes to talk to at least 100 people to get their views.

Many people who Adams talked to expressed surprise that a commissioner was seeking their opinion.

"One man who is 51 said it was the first time a politician actually asked for his opinion on an issue," Adams recalled. With his background as an industrial engineer, Adams said, he used to investigate projects and their impact.

"It is an emotional issue," Adams said. While some opponents list traffic as a concern, others cite convenience of a mall near them plus a medical facility proposed by Winter Park Hospital.

#### Homeowners won't be charged

**SANFORD** — The investigation is continuing into the triple shooting Wednesday night near Hidden Lakes that left two men dead and a third hospitalized.

Sanford police Cmdr. Dennis Whitmire said it appears the shootings were done in self-defense and homeowners Daniel Prindle and Richmond Travis Fraley will not be charged. However, evidence of drugs was found in townhouse. The state attorney's office will determine if any charges are filed.

Lincoln Anthony Hunsinger, 22, and Jeremy Michael Thomas, 21, both of Sanford died from shotgun wounds at 205 Arbor Circle off Hidden Lakes.

## Volunteers needed to help others with English skills

Do you have an hour or two a week to work one-on-one with a student trying to improve his/her skills in the English language? Daytime and nighttime volunteers are sorely needed in the ESOL (English For Speakers of Other Languages) program. All one needs is to bring some patience, some good cheer, and to be sensitive to the needs of a person struggling to speak English.

The Multilevel Program provides free classes to adults 18 years and older who are U.S. citizens, residents and refugees. To date, there are about 350 nighttime students and 300 daytime students attending classes at the main campus of SCC and outlying sites. There are approximately 17 ESOL and RSVP volunteers,

hardly enough for the adult students eager to obtain some extra help.

Volunteers do not teach English (they are already enrolled in classes which teach them grammar, reading and writing skills). Rather, a volunteer helps the student with conversational and life skills. Examples of life skills would be reading street and store signs, reading a newspaper, filling out a job application, writing down medical/dental appointments, etc. For the student, extra help gives them confidence to succeed in their new language. For both volunteer and student, it's a safe and comfortable environment to share ideas and knowledge.

Jane McCoy, instructional assistant and volunteer coordinator, said, "Many students need English to obtain work. Many students are

## Safety and health facilities found faulty

**SANFORD** — Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) inspectors have found fault with a the Sanford police station. OSHA, the Occupational Health and Safety Administration has found fault in Longwood.

Lake Mary, meanwhile, is looking at its own situations at public safety facilities on Rinehart Road.

Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons has reported the ADA found two points of comment at the Sanford police station, 815 S. French Avenue. A suitable wheelchair access ramp needs to be installed leading to the public

entrance. Also, the two bathrooms in the public lobby area of the building need to be modified for disabled person access.

Simmons has determined that the cost for these improvements is approximately \$24,000. He plans to recommend the work be done as soon as possible, during the work session and regular meeting of the Sanford City Commission on Monday.

Sanford police Chief Ralph Russell has recommended the city construct a ramp on the front entrance to the building, designate disabled parking space with a ramp on the sidewalk, and remodel both men and women restrooms in the lobby area.

The fire station in Longwood has not been

approached by the ADA, but Fire Chief Charles Chapman recently told the city commission that improvements are needed. "When you have a bathroom in the facility not set up for wheelchairs," he said, "you know that immediate improvements are needed."

The City Commission has already agreed to take action on the needed work, and suggested that firefighters might be able to do some of the work, but subcontracting electrical and plumbing.

OSHA meanwhile, has suggested the Longwood fire department building have a separate decontamination room, which it does not at the present. "This would be for decontamination of

## Entrepreneur Opening a business stems from accident

**SANFORD** — He loves tinkering with his car and was studying auto mechanics, planning to make it his career. But an icy road on Halloween night three years ago interrupted his dreams.

Coming home with a friend from class, his car spun around and crashed into a truck near Pittsburg. He suffered severe head injuries, was paralyzed on his left side and spent months in the hospital recuperating. His friend was not seriously hurt.

The accident left him physically challenged with impaired speech but did not dampen his desire to work and grow as an individual.

Sitting on an overstuffed sofa in the rented warehouse bay of his business, Dan Reese recalls snippets of his past but looks with determination to the future.

Reese has received unsolicited

praise from a number of *Sanford Herald* readers who have taken their cars to the 23-year old for washing or detailing.

Six days a week from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Dan Reese Polishing is open for business in the Security Warehouse and Office Complex, 2499 Old Lake Mary Road near the 25th Street intersection in Sanford.

"Sometimes Wednesdays are kinda slow," Reese says, in his slow measured speech, explaining why there were no customers waiting for a wash and polish. "Saturdays can get pretty hectic though."

Reese moved to his mother's Sanford area home about 2 1/2 years ago after recovering from the accident. His sister lives in Lake Mary. He started his one-man detailing business three months ago. It hasn't been all smooth sailing for the young entrepreneur.

Two men came in for a car

### College plans tourism program

ORLANDO — Tourism leaders want better-trained entry-level workers capable of moving into middle-management positions, and Valencia Community College is responding.

Beginning next year, Valencia plans to offer as many as nine specialized degree programs, which can be completed in less than a year.

"When we think of hospitality or tourism, we think hotel and motel industry, but that's too narrowly defined," said Sandra Todd Sarantos, Valencia's vice president for educational and economic development services.

All of the specialized degree programs will include an internship and strongly emphasize writing, problem-solving and teamwork, Ms. Sarantos said.

Area private and public schools offering tourism-related courses focus primarily on the culinary arts and hospitality and travel industries. The University of Central Florida offers a four-year bachelor's degree in hospitality management.

### Pastor indicted for killings of members

SEBRING — A Highlands County grand jury indicted a pastor on first-degree murder charges in the slayings of two elderly members of his flock.

The Rev. John Canning, who last January delivered the eulogy for Leo and Hazel Gleese, was arrested March 3 in their beating and strangling deaths.

Investigators said Canning had power of attorney over the couple's finances and killed them in their home after they discovered he was stealing their savings.

In addition to financial records that total mishandled funds in the tens of thousands of dollars, investigators say they found several items in a trash pile near the church that a lab analysis linked to the crime scene. One item was a piece of foam material from Gleese's easy chair.

Some members of the multidominational Fountain of Life Church are maintaining the innocence of their 58-year-old pastor. He is set to be arraigned on the charges next month.

### 'Doubtfire' bill headed for Senate

TALLAHASSEE — Legislation to improve visitation rights for noncustodial parents — the so-called "Mrs. Doubtfire bill" — is headed to the full Senate.

The bill (CS-SB 1038) applies to parents who are granted shared parental responsibility at the time of their divorce. In Florida, a child may reside primarily with one parent but the noncustodial parent retains full parental rights and responsibilities.

"Children are all too often used as a weapon, and noncustodial parents are deprived of seeing their children," said Sen. John McKay, R-Bradenton, sponsor of the bill.

The measure gives noncustodial parents the option of caring for their children, rather than having them sent to a day-care center, relatives or a baby-sitter when the custodial parent is at work or otherwise unable to care for them.

In addition, it requires custodial parents who move out of town to pay transportation costs to ensure visitations continue as scheduled.

### Charter bill clears House panel

TALLAHASSEE — Smaller class sizes, more parental choice and charter schools would result from bills a House panel approved.

The bills, which let private groups run public schools under "charter" or contract with the school board or state was unanimously approved by the Education Committee Thursday after several black lawmakers expressed opposition.

The smaller classes and choice bills were both priorities of House Speaker Peter Rudy Wallace, D-St. Petersburg.

All three bills go next to the Appropriations Committee. Similar measures in the Senate have not yet been heard in committee.

The Florida Conference of Black State Legislators asked for a delay on the charter school bill (CS-HB 1191) but then dropped its request because of a promise from Wallace that concerns of black lawmakers would be worked out.

The bill was unanimously approved. After the meeting, caucus leader Sen. Betty Holsendorf, D-Jacksonville, said black lawmakers hadn't had enough input into the bill and were concerned other public schools would lose funding to start charter schools.

A charter school is run by a business, a group of teachers, parents or an existing school. Taxes that would go to a public school are instead diverted to a charter school on a per-student basis.

Under the legislation, school districts with more than 50,000 students could have three charter schools. Smaller districts could each have one.

The parental choice bill would let parents of students entering kindergarten, middle school or high school list the top two public schools they would like their children to attend.

# Wingwalking on air

## Pilot extraordinaire to perform at airshow

SANFORD — If Gene Soucy asks if you'd like to go for a walk with him, be careful. He may be referring to a walk along the wing of his aircraft, thousands of feet above Sanford.

Soucy will be one of the featured performers at Airshow Orlando, to be held at Central Florida Regional Airport in Sanford, Saturday and Sunday, April 1 and 2.

Soucy is a three time National Aerobatic Champion, and is considered one of the most versatile pilots in the history of airshow flying.

Whether it's formation aerobatics, precision solo routines, wingwalking shows, airshow-openers, comedy, or novelty flying, Gene can do it all.

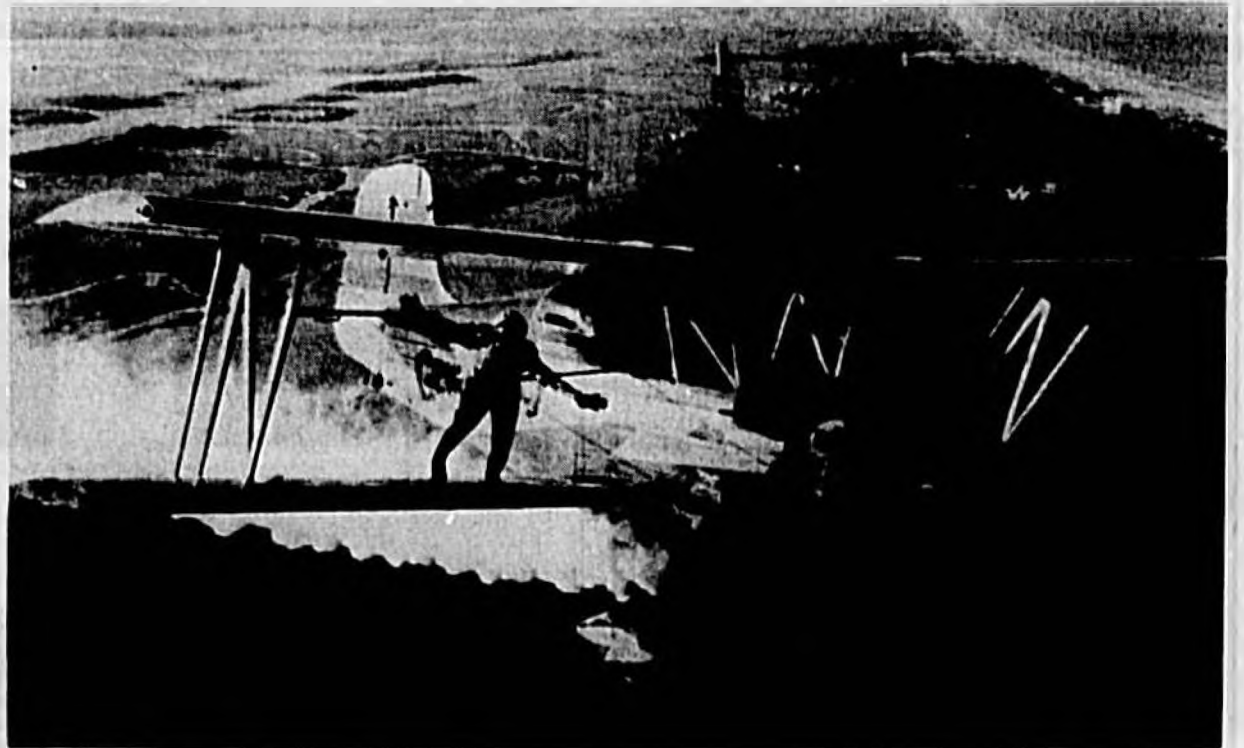
Last year, he taxied out for over 120 separate airshow acts at 22 major airshow sites across the nation.

At the age of 22, he earned a berth on the U.S. Aerobatic Team. At the world contest in England that year, he was the youngest competitor flying. He finished strongly in his Pitts Special, and placed sixth overall, helping the U.S. team win its first World Championship.

Since then, he has won many competitive events and gained many trophies and awards.

Presently living in Houston, Texas, he began professional airshow flying in 1968, and has logged more than 2000 performances since his first plane, the Pitts Special 5-15. He has also performed in Piper Cubs and the Cessna 150. He has also performed with the Red Devils, now called the Eagles Aerobatic Flight Team.

The Showcat plane used in the wingwalking demonstration, is a modified Grumman Ag Cat, a

biplane normally used for crop spraying.

It was first designed in 1958 and more than 1,800 are believed to still be in use across the nation. Several modifications have been made in this particular aircraft. It has a cross-country cruising speed of 90 to 130 miles per hour and is also capable of skywriting and banner towing.

In addition to the wingwalking exhibition, he also pilots the Extra 300S unlimited class aerobatic plane, built in Germany (by Mr. Extra, thus the name). It has a cruising speed in excess of 200 miles per hour, and a cross country range of 450 miles.

In cases where additional service is required of the Extra 300S, Soucy has installed an airshow smoke system and wing-tip mounts for pyrotechnics for thrilling night performances. Known as "Firelight," the show offers a spectacular display of airborne fireworks.

Wingwalker Teresa Stokes is not only internationally known in aviation circles, but is a Space Artist, who has been painting professionally since age 14.

She is also an aerobatic pilot and has a multi-engine rating. She lives on a houseboat on Clear Lake, near the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Although she occasionally does some of the performance

flying, Stokes has been with Soucy since the fall of 1988.

The airshow is sponsored by the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. Advance tickets are \$6 for adults, and \$5 for youngsters 7-12.

At the gate, admission will be \$12 for adults, and \$7 for youngsters. Children under 7 will be admitted free with a paid adult.

Parking is \$2. Gates at the Central Florida Regional Airport will open each day of the event at 8 a.m., with the show starting at 12 noon.

Many static displays of aircraft and other aviation related events are scheduled throughout both April 1 and 2.

# Judge declares mistrial in British tourist slaying trial

GAINESVILLE — Physical evidence apparently was again the stumbling block for jurors as a second mistrial was declared in the 1993 slaying of a British tourist at a North Florida rest stop.

But that wasn't the only similarity in John "Billy Joe" Crumitie's second trial on first-degree murder charges for the Sept. 14, 1993 shooting death of Gary Colley and the wounding of his companion.

Circuit Judge F.E. Steinmeyer, who presided over the first trial in Monticello last November, again declared a mistrial Thursday after the jury — again — hopelessly deadlocked.

He had ordered the second trial moved to Gainesville after attorneys argued it would be difficult to find impartial jurors among Jefferson County's 12,000 residents.

Assistant State Attorney Michael Schneider called many of the same witnesses but had the added advantage this time of the testimony of Aundra Akins, 16, identified as one of two men who fired guns into Colley's rental car in a botched robbery attempt.

Colley, 34, and Margaret Jagger, 36, had pulled over to the fog-shrouded rest area to take a nap.

The prosecutor claimed Crumitie was the other gunman but was unable to convince the jury since none of the physical evidence linked the 18-year-old defendant to the crime.

Defense attorneys Dwight Wells and Mina Morgan used the same strategy as in the first trial, calling Crumitie as their only witness. He denied being at the rest stop.

"Two juries have not reached a verdict. There comes a time when enough hung juries raises a reasonable doubt," Ms. Morgan

said. "I think it's indicative of the weakness of the state's case," said Wells. "The state has spent a million dollars trying to convict John Crumitie."

Jurors said the panel was split 9-3 in favor of conviction. Juror Gloria Rozier said the determining factor was that prosecutors failed to place Crumitie at the scene.

"I needed more physical evidence — a hair, a fiber, something," she said. "Nobody put him there for me."

In Crumitie's first trial in November, the jury deadlocked 11-1, with the foreman claiming she couldn't find Crumitie guilty because of the lack of physical evidence.

The jury in the second trial deliberated seven hours before telling Steinmeyer it couldn't convict Crumitie on charges of first-degree murder, attempted murder and attempted armed robbery.

## Chronology

The key dates in the 1993-1994 murder case:

Sept. 14, 1993: British tourist Gary Colley, 34, fatally shot and his longtime companion, Margaret Jagger, 36, wounded during a botched holdup at a rest area near Monticello on Interstate 10.

Nov. 14, 1994: First-degree murder trial of John "Billy Joe" Crumitie begins in Monticello.

Nov. 17, 1994: Mistrial declared when jury deadlocks 11-1 in favor of conviction.

March 20, 1995: Retrial begins in first-degree murder trial of Crumitie. He was also on trial on charges of first-degree murder, attempted first-degree murder, two counts of attempted armed robbery and shooting into an occupied car.

March 23, 1995: Judge declares mistrial when the jury deadlocks after seven hours of deliberations. Crumitie had earlier taken the witness stand to say he was innocent.

# Abortion shooting

## Protesters challenge clinic buffer zones

PENSACOLA — Mike and Vicky Conroy claim the 8-foot buffers around a pair of Pensacola abortion clinics where two doctors and a volunteer escort have been killed violate their First Amendment rights.

They challenged the law enforcement zones Thursday, claiming their rights to speak with clinic patients and hand out anti-abortion literature were being violated.

The Conroys voiced their complaints at a hearing before Circuit Judge Edward P. Nickinson, who will decide whether to temporarily block enforcement of the buffers until a trial can be held. Assistant Police Chief Jerry Potts also spoke at the hearing.

The zones were created by the city council to increase security at the clinics. Only police officers are allowed within the zones, except for public sidewalks at one clinic. Civilians may use a paved driveway through the zone at the other clinic to enter or exit the facility.

The Pensacola hearing came a day after a judge freed three protesters accused of violating a court-ordered buffer zone at a Melbourne clinic because a prosecutor had neglected to file the charges. The trio had been arrested Jan. 29.

Nickinson gave lawyers, including an attorney representing the clinics, a week to submit written arguments. He barred the clinics from direct participation, but allowed them to present a friend-of-the-court brief.

Assistant City Attorney Rusty Wells had already written his argument and immediately submitted it.

"The stated purpose of the ordinance and its obvious practical effect is to provide for the public safety while at the same time permitting unfettered

expressive activity," Wells wrote.

Pensacola officials contend their ordinance meets standards set by the U.S. Supreme Court saying it is content-neutral, applying equally to people on both sides of the abortion issue.

Conroy said he felt intimidated by the zones and large numbers of police at the clinics. He

admitted, however, that he could still hand out literature and talk to patients walking to the clinics from nearby parking lots.

Former minister Paul Hill used a shotgun to kill Dr. John Bayard Britton and retired Air Force Lt. James Barrett and wound Barrett's wife, June, last July 29 outside Pensacola's Ladies Clinic. Hill has been

sentenced to die in the electric chair for the two slayings.

Protester Michael Griffin shot Dr. David Gunn at Pensacola Medical Services on March 10, 1994. He is serving a life sentence for the murder.

The Conroys are co-directors of Legal Action for Women, which helps women injured during abortions file malpractice suits.

#### Multiple charges

Stephen Lamar Haney, 39, 2473 Palmetto Ave., was arrested Wednesday by Sanford police for assault on a law enforcement officer, driving with a suspended license, resisting without violence and possession of drug paraphernalia. A police officer called to investigate a domestic violence complaint stopped to question Haney sitting in his car at 2481 Palmetto. A computer check was done and showed the defendant had six suspensions. Haney did not give the police officer his full name. His record came up on the computer after the wife gave police his middle name.

He also was sitting behind the wheel of the car with a half empty bottle of beer between his legs, according to the arrest report. There were three unopened beers nearby. After he was arrested and taken to jail, he struggled with officers in the rally port at the John E. Poik Correctional Facility. A pipe was found in the backseat of the patrol car after Haney was removed, leading to the drug paraphernalia charge.

#### Firearm leads to arrest

Sanford police arrested Graham Niel Ratliff, 24, 2000 Washington, Sanford, for having a concealed firearm, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of stolen property and possession of a controlled substance Tuesday. He was also arrested on two separate cases of armed burglary and theft for a March 20 break-in of a house on San Marcos when a .32 caliber gun and three knives were taken.

Police stopped Ratliff at 110 N. French Ave. Wednesday.

#### Suspended license arrest

## 2 officers shot; 2 in custody

TAMPA — Swarms of police and sheriff's deputies scoured in on a wooded area in east Tampa today, looking for the remaining suspect in the shootings of two police officers.

One of the officers, Michael Virgil, 28, a six-year veteran, was in extremely critical condition early today at Tampa General Hospital with bullet wounds to the right thigh and chest, said Tampa Police spokeswoman Dianne Coles.

"It's touch and go," she said. The second officer, Kevin Howell, 30, was shot in the left leg and was in stable condition, Coles said. He has been with the department since January 1994.

Two suspects were caught early today. Police had been trailing them after they allegedly robbed a fast-food restaurant Thursday night.

About 100 officers, including Tampa Police, Pinellas County Sheriff's deputies, and Florida Highway Patrol officers swarmed a 25-block area today, aided by a canine unit and helicopter looking for the lone suspect.

"We've got him contained within a perimeter area," Coles said. "We know who he is, we just haven't gotten him."

"We're definitely going to get this guy," she added. Police spokesman Steve Cole said the officers were shot with an AK-47 assault weapon.

The shooting occurred about 10 p.m. EST Thursday as the officers chased three suspects believed to be involved in a Hardee's restaurant robbery. Cole said.

An off-duty emergency medical technician said he was driving near the scene when he saw the flashing lights of police cars and stopped.

"They said, 'Cop down, cop down,'" Michael Meyer said. "I said, 'I'm an off-duty EMT, do you need some help?' They said, 'Yes, grab your bag.'"

Meyer and a friend ran about 100 yards to the scene, where they saw two officers lying in the yard of a house, being tended by about six officers.

"Both of them were conscious. One was speaking," he said.

Meyer said the officers lost a lot of blood. He said he applied pressure while talking to the officers to try to keep them conscious.

## Murder, she said

"Me and him didn't see nothing." This may or may not be a witness responding to police questions. It is however, a murder of the English language.

Certainly not everyone is perfect. People make grammatical mistakes every day. (Yes, even some in print or on the airwaves). But what impression does it leave?

There is an old saying, "If you can look important and act important successfully, you will eventually BE important." How true. And part of acting with importance is to have a good command of the language.

The "me and him" phrase immediately gives many people the impression that the person saying it is not well educated. As a result, many people immediately get a lower impression of that person.

It's unfortunate. Most of us know high school graduates and even college educated people who use bad grammar. To many people, it upsets them to even listen to these people.

Street slang is the same. Calling everyone "dude" or using some other terminology, is also in bad taste, and except for others who talk similarly, it leaves the impression that the person speaking is not well educated.

Ask any business person or employer. They will be quick to tell you that one of the first things they look for on a job application is the ability to write and speak properly.

If the applicant has written in the "previous occupation" column, something resembling "I aint had none," chances are slim he or she is about to get the job.

With this in mind, we urge, as strongly as we can, that school students dive into grammar and the English language as deeply as they can. In addition to schools, ask others to give a reminder whenever improper word usage appears to have become a habit.

Ask teachers to stress better grammar. Make it a hobby or a life goal to speak properly. It will be one of the biggest helps a person can find in the world of employment.

For persons already beyond school, books on grammar are available in libraries, for sale, or might be borrowed from someone in school at the present time.

There should be no shame attached to trying to make oneself improve.

Shakespeare once asked, "What's in a word?" We suggest there is much in a word, but a great deal more in the way the word is used.

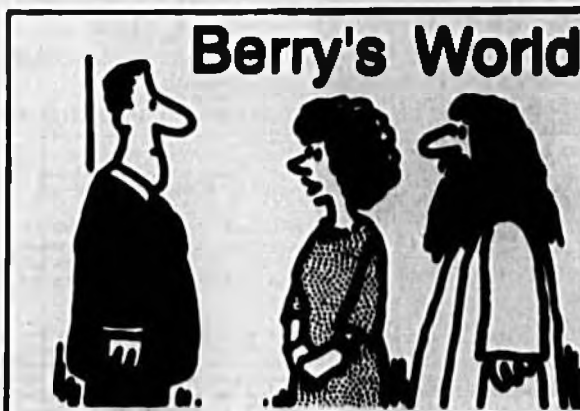
## It's not over yet

## Fight looms on 'work first' welfare

A fierce partisan dustup is likely to occur in the House over welfare policy, but there's a chance that the Senate could produce a truly innovative -- and bipartisan -- reform package down the road.

Sens. John Breaux, D-La., Hank Brown, R-Colo., and Joe Lieberman, D-Conn., are collaborating on a reform proposal designed to begin placing welfare recipients in paying jobs immediately after they apply for assistance, rather than waiting for the two years envisioned in other plans.

Under the so-called "Work First" proposal developed by the Progressive Policy Institute, think tank of the Democratic Leadership Council, both Aid to Families with Dependent Children and federal job-training programs for the poor would be replaced by a grant to the states to be used for "job placement" vouchers.

Recipients would use the vouchers to get help finding and keeping a private-sector job.

Able-bodied welfare applicants who refuse to look for work would have no cash assistance available to them, but those who take low-paying jobs would receive medical assistance and a child-care subsidy to help "make work pay."

"Work First" is designed to create a nationwide industry of placement services like America Works, a for-profit company operating

in New York and elsewhere, and Project Match, a non-profit in Chicago, which have successfully found jobs for thousands of welfare recipients.

The PPI plan differs radically from current welfare policy, which liberal House Democrats are fighting to keep intact, and also from the House Republican "Contract With America" proposal due for floor action, which converts AFDC and other welfare programs into block grants, allowing the states to create their own welfare systems.

The GOP plan withdraws "entitlement" status from welfare, limits cash assistance to any individual to five years during his or her lifetime, and forbids states to give cash aid to any girl under 18 who has a child out of wedlock.

Under pressure from the Clinton administration, which charged that the Republicans were "cruel to kids, weak on work," the GOP added a work mandate to its proposal that requires states to have 50 percent of recipients working after two years on welfare.

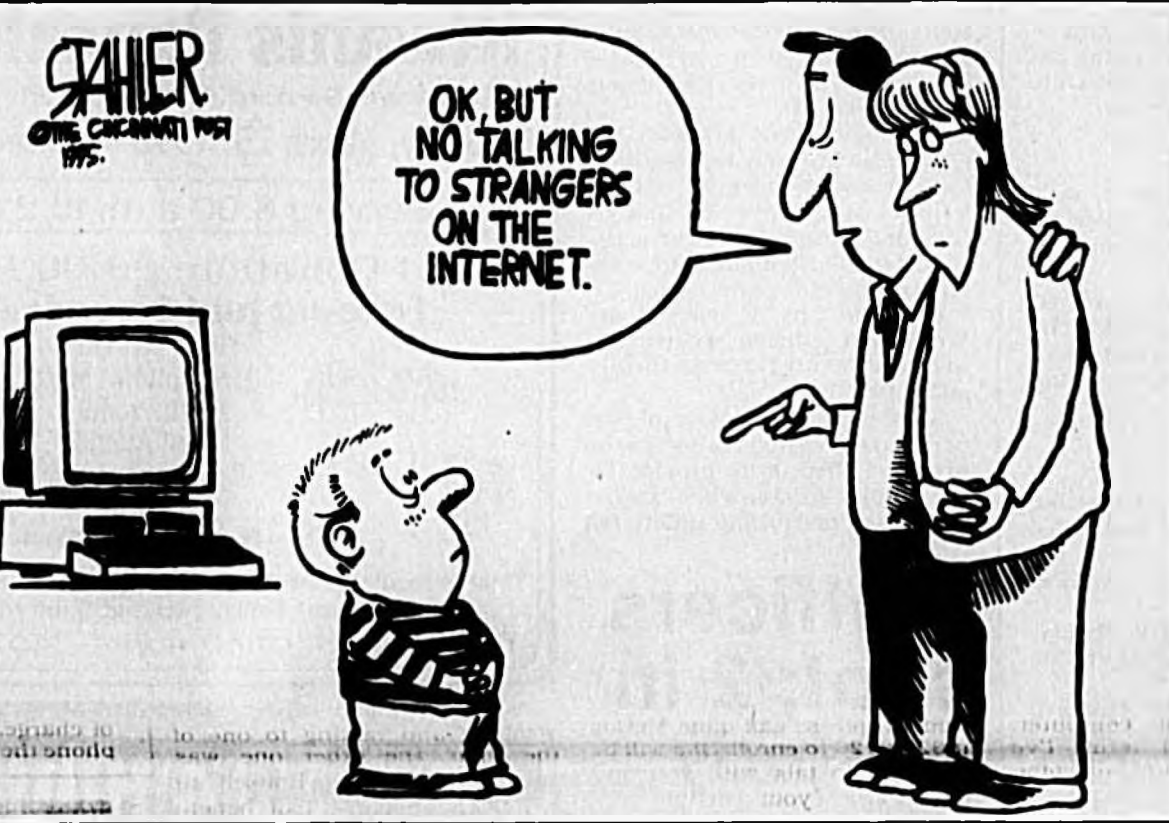
Last year, the administration introduced legislation providing for increased education, training and child care to welfare recipients for a two-year period, after which they'd be expected to find work or take jobs given to them by government agencies.

President Clinton did not resubmit his bill this year, apparently fearing that it would be ignored by congressional Republicans.

Instead, the measure has been introduced by House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, in order to embarrass Clinton when it gets very few votes on the floor, even from Democrats.

The PPI opposes Clinton-Army because it perpetuates two aspects of current welfare policy -- the financial "dole" and federal job training -- for two years and subsidizes public-sector jobs instead of emphasizing private employment.

Hope for creative but sensible reform lies in the Senate, especially if the Finance Committee rallies around the PPI proposal, which offers the poor "tough love" in the form of an immediate job requirement, but also helps in finding work and keeping it.

## Love: not related to skin color

WASHINGTON — Recently, I watched two dramas in which seemingly powerless infants cast unbreakable spells, and in which love more or less conquered all.

The better-known: "Losing Isaiah," the much hyped movie about interracial adoption that opens today. Calculated to spark discussion and wring hearts, "Isaiah" boasts appealing stars Jessica Lange, Halle Berry and Samuel L. Jackson.

It left me cold. But a real-life adoption drama — unscripted, unexpected and entirely unrehearsed — brought down the house.

It all began with a co-worker's blurted question: "Did you hear?"

I steeled myself, but the news about Helen, a mutual friend, was good. "She adopted a baby girl!" she continued. "She just found out, and has almost nothing for her. ... Avis is throwing a last-minute shower."

Nothing could have been more satisfying. Or discomfounding.

Babies can do that — uplift your spirits as they upend your life. "Helen" a single, African American professional who asked to be identified by her middle name, knew she was a candidate to adopt a newborn girl whose unmarried, college-student mother had interviewed her and several other potential adoptive parents.

Helen had been warned: Don't get your hopes up. The mother, whom she'd found bright and thoughtful, had kept her baby for a few weeks — it would be tough, giving her up. So Helen tried not to hope.

But the call came. The woman, who'd said she always felt she'd been a burden to her own teen-age mother, was giving up her daughter — to Helen. She had one stipulation.

"She wanted to put the baby into my arms herself," said Helen. "It was — I felt this overwhelming joy, realizing she had given me this baby to love and that it was an act of love for her, too."

Nothing that warm, that real, happens in "Isaiah," despite its cast's efforts and the up-to-the-minute plot — Kailah, a black crack addict, loses her baby to a white adoptive family and fights for its return.

Small things don't wash. What black pediatrician whose patient is a black toddler with white parents wouldn't advise those parents to give the child some sense of African American culture? Why would a woman as sensitive as Kailah neglect to ask whether the people raising her son are good parents?

Nothing's more irritating than the film's simple-minded depiction of white life as bliss and black life as aqualor. At its core, "Isaiah" — and most Hollywood productions concerning African Americans — reflects not black people's truth, but what whites believe our truth to be. Too often, those who write, film and frame our stories have no idea who we are.

Which is human.

David Mills, a former Washington Post writer who left journalism to write for TV, worked with "Losing Isaiah" director Stephen Gyllenhaal to make the film's dialogue more "authentically black."

"At the point I was brought in (by Gyllenhaal), I was told that the white head of Paramount Pictures liked the script as is," says Mills. "That meant (it). ... A top studio was content to have it made without any creative input from any black person — even though the movie's essence is grounded in ghetto characters and ... life."

Why, he says, is a mystery. "Stephen said his wife ('Isaiah' scriptwriter Naomi Foner) is a liberal, so is (Paramount chief) Sherry Lansing. Maybe they think their good intentions are enough."

They seldom are. Ironically, the movie's simplistic mind-set, says Mills, "is an insult to white characters, too — everybody's life has struggle."

And more than a little grace. Maybe screenwriters should have been at Avis' house, seen the response to Helen's new daughter, Maya.

But would they have believed what they saw: Helen sitting in the midst of friends, her face indescribably soft? Would they believe 25 successful African American women — businesswomen, journalists, managers, lawyers — would gather to pour love on a new mother and baby?

Does Hollywood even believe that black women untouched by drugs, poverty and ignorance exist? Or in the uncinematic notion of a smart, single black mother offering her baby to one such as herself?

But love has nothing to do with skin color. After the red beans and rice had been eaten; after Helen dutifully modeled the traditionally hideous paper plate shower hat; after all had exclaimed over the new stroller and sterling silver cross, we gathered in a circle, holding hands.

Yvonne, a personnel manager enlisted as temporary prayer-leader, asked for divine protection for Helen and Maya. "God, help us," she prayed, "be supportive friends for (Helen), role models for Maya and forever yours."

professionals who need English skills in their chosen profession. Some students plan to go on to college. They come from many walks of life and their stories are fascinating. It's a two-way street; the volunteer learns about the customs and culture of the student. It's a real sharing experience between student and volunteer." McCoy and instructor Lyn Mattingly work in the ESOL program during the day. Their supervisor is Matt San-Andres, coordinator of the ESOL program.

Upon entering the ESOL Lab located on the second floor of the Continuing Education building on the SCC campus, one's eye travels to the wall behind the receptionist's desk. A beautiful wreath of pink and yellow silk flowers interspersed with ivy and eucalyptus greets the visitor. To the left of the wreath is a world map pinpointing countries from where ESOL students come. There's a bulletin board tacked up with all sorts of helpful information: class schedules, employment opportunities, counseling services. It is a very attractive meeting place for volunteers and students to interact. One of the Adult Education teachers, Carole Pegram, was busy helping her students at their study centers. Listening to and speaking English is practiced at the computer.

In the lab during evening hours, one will usually find Bernice Ruiz-Quiros pleasantly smiling and fielding myriad questions from teachers, students and volunteers. Ruiz is another Multilevel Instructional assistant. She is also the coordinator of RSVP (Retired & Senior Volunteer Program) ESOL Women's Project. She commented, "Students are eager for help. Some of the county operations would remain at facilities in their present locations, but the judicial operations would be relocated.

The county has forwarded to the city commission's attention, what it has determined to be a cost ratio between the suggested move, versus retaining the existing facilities, which they say would be in need of major renovations.

In the final figures, the county says the cost of retaining the facility would be approximately \$62.1 million, while a proposed building program at Five Points would total \$52.6 million.

Included in suggestions for retaining the facility in the downtown area are: Proposed construction of a new judicial facility, renovations to the existing courthouse, eventual construction of an administration complex (beyond the year 2000), and major renovations to the county services building (also beyond the year 2000).

Listed under the proposed relocation would be construction of a new judicial facility, renovations of the existing courthouse, relocation of road operations, and renovations to the county services building.

In a memo submitted to members of the Sanford City Commission, City Manager Bill Simmons acknowledges that the information supplied by the county is preliminary at this time and remain to be refined by the county's consultant.

County figures indicate that the number of county employees is expected to increase significantly during the next ten to fifteen years. Simmons observed however that the increase would not be as great as if the judicial functions remain in downtown Sanford.

"Of equal or greater concern," he commented in the memo, "we believe to be the potential migration of non-county employees away from downtown if the judicial function moves."

"Of great concern is the future relocation of law firms, court recorders, mortgage title companies, and possibly banking institutions," Simmons wrote.

Simmons has suggested, with the commission's concurrence, that the city staff work to ensure these concerns are fully addressed in the county consultant's study.

Several concerns have been voiced by members of the general public regarding the relocation. Some have questioned whether the Five Points area site is within the city limits of Sanford, designated as the official county seat.

Sanford records however, indicate the property being investigated at Five Points is within city limits.

The location question however, has been handled by Florida statutes. They say a county commissions may expand the

county seat outside of the county-seat city.

Statute 136.12 says, "The board of county commissioners of any county may expand the geographical area of the county seat of its county beyond the corporate limits of the municipality named as the county seat, by adopting a resolution to that effect at any regular or special meeting of the board."

The relocation subject has been scheduled for discussion during Monday afternoon's work session of the Sanford City Commission, scheduled to begin at 4:30 p.m., in the City Manager's Conference Room.

Sanford City Hall is located at 300 N. Park Avenue.

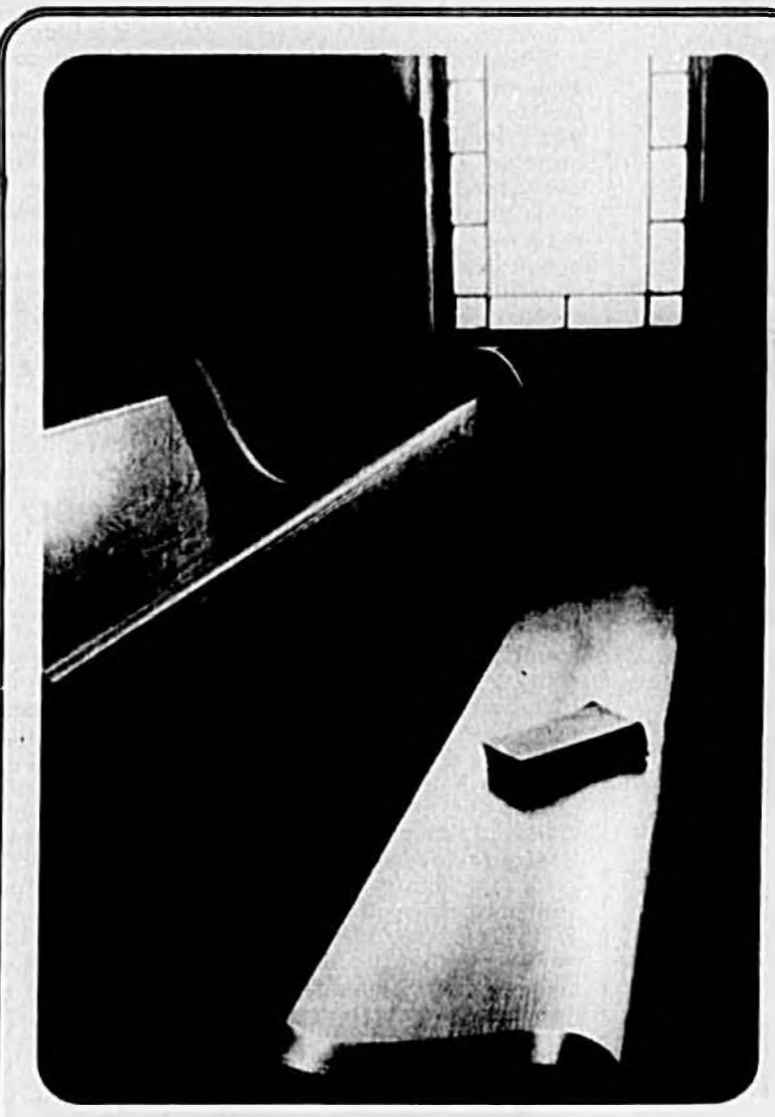

# God exalted by praise dance

CASSELBERRY — Praise or Worship Dance, as some call it, began to blossom in the 1980's. Although this graceful art has been around since Biblical times many refer to it as a forgotten art.

One of the largest churches in Seminole County, Northland Community Church, organized its worship dance several years ago. Under the direction of Debbie Yero, the group meets weekly on Thursday evenings from approximately 7 to 9 p.m. for a time of prayer and praise and movement to inspirational music.

Outlined in its Worship Ministry the group feels that "the primary reason people danced, as outlined in the Scriptures, was the overwhelming desire to celebrate unto the Lord. Today, this is still our purpose: to celebrate unto the Lord for the mercy He has shown us by sending His Son, Jesus, to die for our sins. Other reasons to dance are to praise, to worship, to perform, to illustrate, to minister, to spread the Gospel, for merriment and to rejoice."

The class begins with a corporate prayer time and requests are made. Following this time of meeting the needs of each member, stretching exercises are encouraged and

the group then proceeds to ballet technique, work on dance combinations and rehearsal for a dance or choreograph to Scripture.

Yero emphasized, "The time of dancing in Scripture was usually after a time of either mourning, suffering, trial, lamenting, slavery or bondage. It signified deliverance, victory and a time for joyous celebration. Usually women would dance and would use tambourines. Dancing can be idolatrous as when the

Israelites worshipped the golden calf. When Miriam and David danced unto the Lord it was a time for high exaltation of the most High God and the recognition of His attributes, acts and His being. We are to praise God with singing, music and dance. However, esthetic dancing, which is dancing with beauty, with motions which are appealing to the eye, was slowly developed in the ancient nations; whereas the dancing in the scriptures rooted back to swirling, circling motions, leaping or

jumping in spontaneous fashion." Sharing their perspective on the issue dancer, Jessica Siefert, said, "I started because I'd been praise dancing for several years. I wanted to continue here." Heather Smith said, "We are accountable to each other and we are a group that likes to dance together." Marcheta Kern said, "Accountability is an important expression. It's relational as well. It's one of the gifts I've been given to dance for Him instead of the world."

# Gym shares Jesus when opportunity knocks

LAKE MARY — Being a Christian in the workplace, as most realize, is sometimes not an easy task. At moments Paul's admonition in Romans 12:2, "Be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye might prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God," leaves us drowning.

Sharing the Gospel of Christ presents its own set of problems. Some accuse a Christian of harassment at just the sight of a Bible on the desk. While others feel a cross or fish hung on a necklace as a violation of their rights.

Rick Friend, vice-president of Gold's Gym in Lake Mary, shared his views on being a Christian in the exercise industry. Many of the employees at the gym are also Christians.

He will soon approach his seventh year in business. His wife, a highway patrol, also substitutes in teaching an aerobic class as needed. Manager, Julie Knowles, now very pregnant, and Larry Romanok share their faith as the Lord leads them.

"I coordinate everything in the workout area here," said Friend. "I see to it that the trainers are certified and properly trained. I'm an overseer."

He confirmed the high percentage of Christian employees. "Some have a strong walk with the Lord while others are still growing. I try to keep everybody in prayer. I love being in this industry. I get a chance to witness. There's some hurting

people that just need someone to listen and care."

Much of his work caters to people looking to tone up their bodies and lose weight. Friend acknowledged the need to tell people about the scripture in I Corinthians 6:19, "...know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own?"

"I share as much as I'm led," he said. "I try to be smart about it. People need to know that by becoming more fit they live longer and are able to do what God has called us to do. Christians haven't been as fit as they should be."

Friend also discussed a scripture in III John 2, "Beloved, I

wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in good health, even as they soul prospereth." God desires us to be in good health to serve him, Friend agreed.

Concerning Christian exercise video tapes on the market, Friend said, "I think it's great to have Christian music to exercise to."

In regard to his actual work with training and strengthening members, whether spiritually or physically, Friend said, "I feel that if I make someone uncomfortable in sharing Jesus I back off. I want to make them feel good and share my testimony of where I was. You really have to have a love for people in this job. It can turn into mega hours. If it's something you really feel,

you'll want to help others lose weight, relieve stress and change their lives. Sometimes the idea of helping people can be short-lived. It must be a priority."

The rules of the gym tend to lean toward a moral environment. "No profanity, no rude or obnoxious comments, no slamming, screaming or misuse of equipment are some of our rules," said Friend. "We try to keep a close eye on the floor. We want it to be a family center not a hustler or pick-up joint."

With that in mind the gym offers free babysitting as well as free aerobic and karate classes to children whose parents are members. There is a full line of cardiovascular equipment and 32 aerobic classes each week.

**Gov. didn't harass aide**

OLYMPIA, Wash. — Gov. Mike Lowry probably touched a former aide in a way that she found offensive, but a jury probably wouldn't convict him of sexual harassment, an investigator says.  
 Susanne Albright, Lowry's former deputy press secretary, says the governor once greeted her at his mansion in nothing more than a towel and later joked that she was lucky he hadn't dropped it.  
 Albright also says Lowry groped her, made lewd remarks about women wearing swimsuits in cold weather, invited her into his hotel room and said he wanted to move in with her.  
 But in a report released Thursday, attorney Mary Alice Theiler said she found no clear evidence of sexual harassment. Theiler called Albright a "credible person," but added that "with the facts as I know them, I do not believe a jury would find in her favor."

to keep their minds on their work. They are more interested in an afternoon at the beach than an afternoon in the college and career room trying to finalize the plans for the next steps in their lives.

All the while, parents are making plans at each school for the annual Project Graduation celebrations.


Project Graduation is a drug and alcohol-free party for graduating seniors. Parents at each school plan a program that is designed to attract students to the parties on the night of the graduations. They offer celebrations, food, (non-alcoholic) drinks, music and prizes.  
 Each parents' group must do everything from planning the party to raising the money to pay for the event.  
 While an admission fee is charged for almost all the events, there is still a great deal that must be paid for from other sources.  
 Often, parents donate their own money. Some local businesses give to the program.  
 Recently, the Seminole County sheriff's office gave \$1,000 to each of the Project Graduation programs. The money was taken

from the Law Enforcement Trust Fund, which is money seized from drug dealers when they are arrested.

"The Seminole County sheriff's office strongly supports the expenditure of these funds as an alternative to irresponsible and reckless behavior on graduation night," the sheriff's office said in its request for the release of the funds from the Board of County Commissioners.

Parents at all the schools are working hard on the project for this year's parties, which will take place the second week in June.

## SCC women slug to sweep of Pats

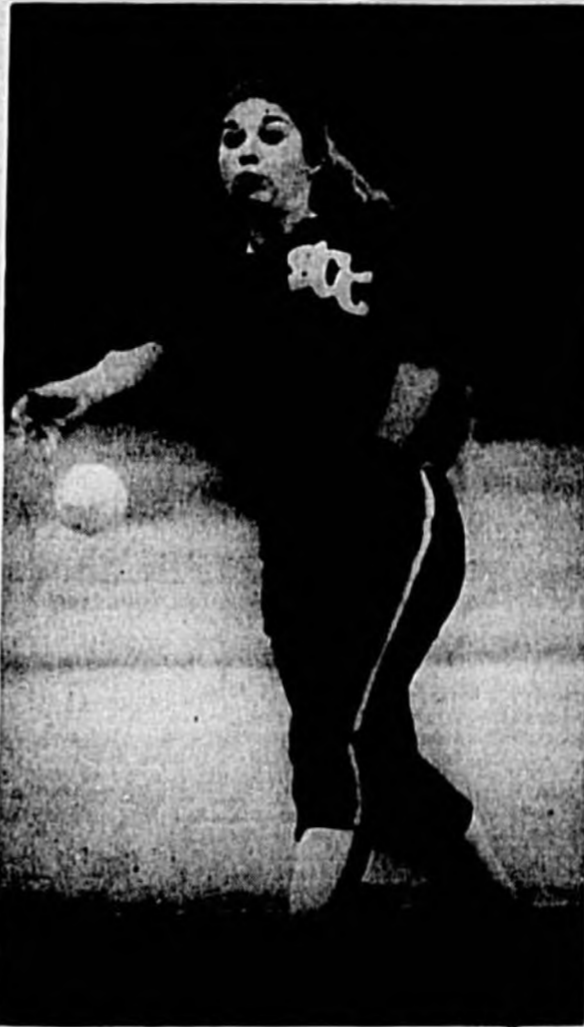

# About those home mixtures

## Beware of kitchen chemistry hazards

Everywhere consumers look these days — in magazines, brochures, classroom projects — there is plenty of advice on how to clean and maintain our home using mixtures prepared right in the kitchen or garage. The purpose of this activity, we are told, is to "go natural" in home cleaning and avoid commercially formulated household products for a healthier home environment.

If this bid to run your household in ways promised to help the environment appeals to you, be aware that making your own cleaning solutions does little, if anything, to foster a healthy indoor environment. In fact, there are a number of hidden hazards associated with kitchen chemistry.

Commercially formulated consumer products must meet the strict standards for safety established by government agencies. By contrast, homemade formulations, many containing untested properties, do not have a manufacturer to answer to the same strenuous requirements.

Consumer products include carefully prepared precautionary labeling (to inform consumers of any potential hazards from the use or foreseeable misuse of the product) and directions for proper use (to avoid hazards).

Alternative products, which are not professionally labeled, do not provide this important information on the product, its ingredients, and use.

Consumer products have first aid and medical treatment information. In case of accidental overexposure, their ingredients and recommended treatment are known by

poison control centers. For unlabeled alternative products, however, proper treatment cannot be administered in an emergency and cannot be referenced in the centers' product information system.

Packaging for consumer products is carefully tested for compatibility with the product. Child-resistant closures are placed on products that pose an accidental ingestion hazard to children. Containers for homemade mixtures, chosen at random, may be incompatible with contents and, without child-resistant closures, could lead to unnecessary exposures.

Consumer products undergo rigorous tests to assure that ingredients are compatible and will remain stable throughout the products' shelf-life. Homemade mixtures may not be stable for storage and could grow toxic microorganisms.

Consumer products are carefully evaluated for effectiveness in all their recommended uses. Products that address human health concerns (medicines, disin-

fectants, insecticides) are required to pass strict government-imposed efficacy testing requirements. Alternative products are not evaluated for efficacy and seldom are as effective as commercial products. Such lack of efficacy can lead to increased usage ("more might be better") and unsafe conditions.

Consumer products are tested to assure compatibility with materials on which they are used (wood surfaces, fabrics) and with the environment during their use and disposal. Untested home brews may damage materials on which they are applied, and their effect on the environment is unknown.

Consumer products are manufactured with quality control procedures needed to assure that they have the proper ingredients in correct proportions and are packaged in the intended container. Homemade products are only as correct as the skills of the individual allow.

Consumer products do not contain most of the "toxic ingredients" imputed to them. In fact, commercial products may contain many of the same ingredients as those proposed for alternative products. When they do, they are optimized in the proper strength and proportion with other ingredients to achieve the desired effects at the lowest cost, and can be used safely.

was "Family Management, Economics and Fraud." Topical points to ponder were:

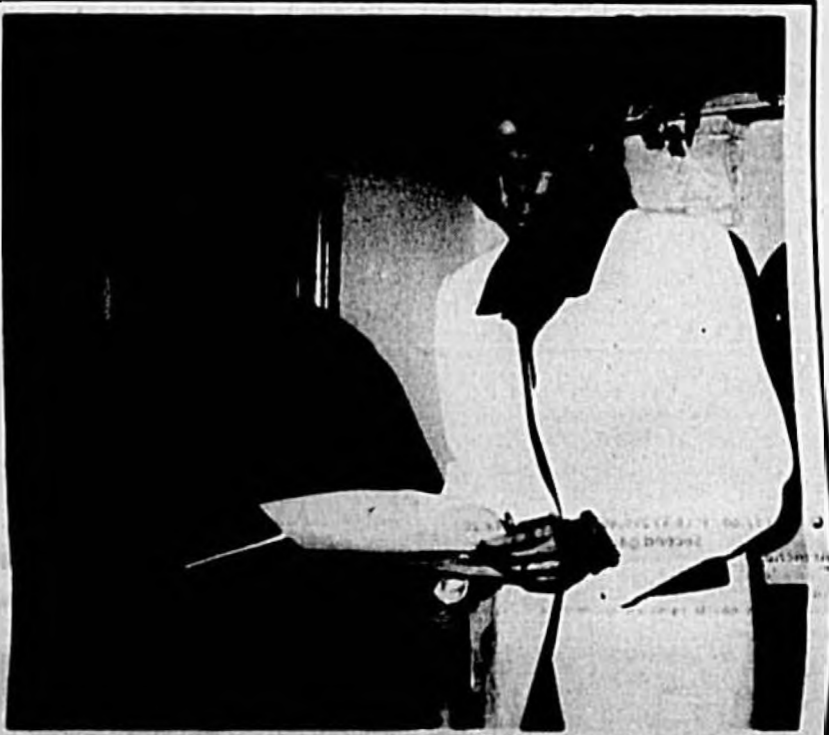
• \$1 per person per year of the county taxes goes to help fund Seminole County Cooperative Services.

# Manic depression may be cause of sister's actions

DEAR MARY: My sister is nine years younger than me and I've always been more like her mother than her sister. When she was a kid she was always really happy and playful, but when she became a teen-ager all of that changed. She actually made a half-hearted suicide attempt when she was 13 by taking too many aspirin and that's the way her teen years went.

She got involved with drugs and alcohol, barely made it through high school, although she's categorized as a "gifted" student, had an abortion when she was 19 and is still in college at 25. Now I'm noticing that she swings between these black moods where I'm afraid she's going to try to hurt herself, to being ridiculously upbeat and high-spirited.

When she's "up" she drives me crazy — she takes chances and does things with no thought about consequences, she seems to need very little rest, and she's sure she's finally got a hold on her life and she's going to feel great forever.

Then, for seemingly no reason, it all falls apart and she's depressed and sleeping all the time again. I'm worried about her, but I don't know what to do or how to help her. Maybe she needs to see a shrink. Can you help me help her?

### HELPLESS SISTER

DEAR SISTER: I'm no physician (or "shrink" for that matter), but I'd be worried about your sister, too. The National Institute of Mental Health

(NIMH) has estimated that as many as 2 million Americans suffer from manic depression, which is characterized by many of the behavioral patterns you describe in your sister. These people often go untreated because neither they, nor their families, realize that they can be helped through mood-stabilizing drugs and therapy.

Manic depressives experience periods of abnormal euphoria followed by periods of deep depression. Some manic depressives develop grandiose attitudes toward their talents and abilities during their manic periods.

Manic depressives are often considered "moody" or temperamental. If left untreated, they often have difficulty maintaining relationships and holding jobs. Since you obviously love and care about your sister, it might be one of the kindest things you've ever done to encourage her to seek a medical opinion.

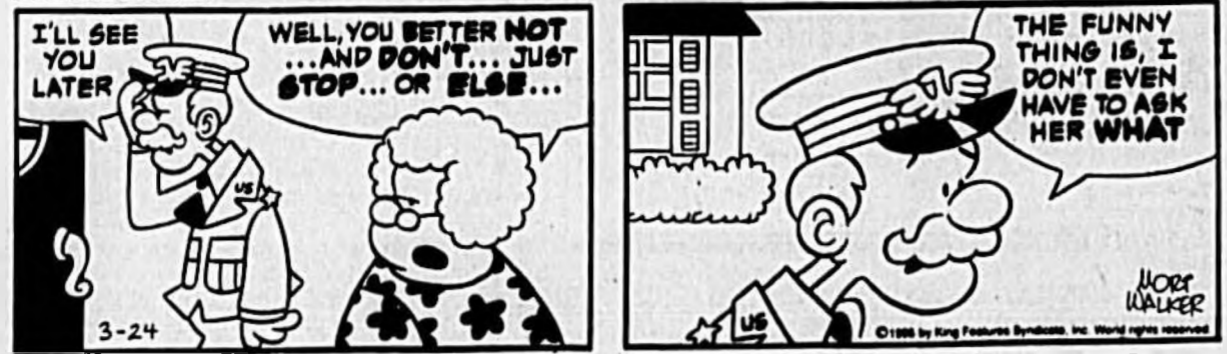

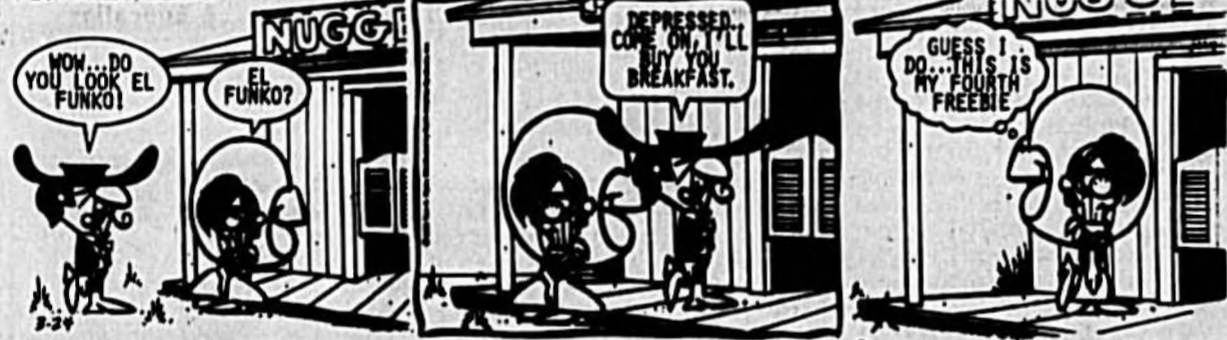

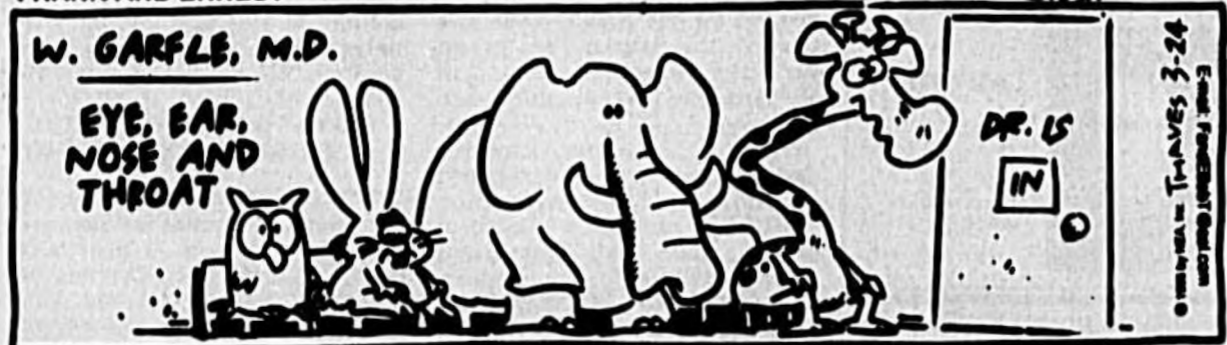

**How to understand heart-valve problem**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My husband has been diagnosed with a heart-valve problem, but his cardiologist says his heart is too weak to stand the risk of surgery at this time. Will his heart strengthen while he's on Lotensin?

**DEAR READER:** No, this is not so. The small amounts of chlorine and other disinfectants that are added to swimming pool water do not affect the immune system.

**DEAR READER:** The function of heart valves - as with any other valves - is to keep blood flowing in one direction. If a valve is stenotic (narrowed), the heart must work harder to pump blood through it. If the valve is insufficient (leaky), the heart is also over-stressed by having to pump an excess quantity of blood (the normal volume plus whatever leaks back through the bad valve). Thus, the end result is the same: a weakened, stretched, flabby heart that becomes less able to do its job.

True, chlorine can be poisonous if inhaled or swallowed in large concentrations. However, the tiny amount in sea water and swimming pools is harmless because it

doesn't enter the body in sufficient concentration to be toxic. Need proof? Swimmers are exceedingly healthy, and swimming is great for cardiovascular conditioning.

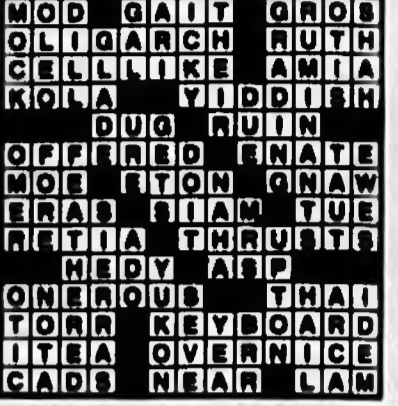
Obviously, the most direct way to correct a malfunctioning heart valve is to replace it surgically with a prosthetic device - or to repair it. However, this is major surgery for which not everyone is a candidate. Specifically, if the heart has been irreparably damaged by years of over-work, a cardiac operation may simply be too risky.

In such cases, doctors often attempt to reduce the work of the beating heart by prescribing drugs to lower blood pressure. If the heart doesn't have to expel blood into the circulation against a normal head of pressure, the organ won't wear out as quickly. Lotensin is such a drug. It reduces what physicians term "afterload."

Your husband's doctor is playing for time. Although the medicine will not affect the damaged cardiac valve or repair the heart muscle, it may reduce his symptoms of breathlessness and exhaustion, allowing him to remain relatively independent for months or years.

If you have a singleton king and the dummy has a moment later, South was one down. The second declarer realized that if West had switched from the doubleton spade king, there was no benefit in taking the finesse. Taking the slight risk that West had all three trumps, South put up dummy's ace. When the king tumbled down -- and after East had said his chair back a few feet -- South drew the last trump and tried the diamond finesse for an overtrick. However, suppose East had followed with a low spade. South would have unblocked his heart honors, played a diamond to dummy's king and cashed the heart queen, discarding a diamond from hand. Finally, South would have exited with a trump. If West had to win the trick, he would have been endplayed, forced either to lead
