Sanford racers stand tallest on soap boxes

SANFORD — There is merriment in the Sanford Recreation Department these days.

Not only did local Soap Box Derby winners become world champions at the 65th All-American Soap Box Derby in Akron, Ohio this past weekend, but the city of Sanford received the prestigious Rally Champs Choice Award for the Best Race City.

Norman Perry, who supervises

Sanford's event for the Recreation Department, also serves as Region VII Regional Director, overseeing 24 rallies in the Southeast.

"We're very proud of this award," Perry said. "The youngsters themselves vote on it, for their favorite rally city, based on where they were treated the

best, who has the best facility for racing, the friendliest people, and a number of other reasons."

He added that this is the second year in a row that Sanford has been selected for the Choice Award.

"As they only started giving it out last year," he commented, "I guess you could

say we're the only city to ever receive it." As for the winners, Evan Griffin, 15, of Winter Park won the Master Division World Championship, and T.J. Pond, 9, of Altamonte Springs, won the Stock Division Rally World Championship.

There were 50 boys and girls, ages nine through 16, competing in the Master's Division, which features the most sophisticated level of race car construction. In taking the top honors, Griffin received a \$5,000 college scholarship. Griffin was

Brothers in crime

Deputies believe Alan and Scott Walker are responsible for a string of daytime burglaries

The arrest of two brothers by the Seminole County Sheriff's deputies of District 5 last Friday may prove to resolve numerous residential burglaries in both Seminole and Orange Counties.

Alan R. Walker, 22, and Scott W. Walker, 28, may have been responsible for ten daytime, residential burglaries in the Casselberry area, including the subdivisions off Red Bug Lake Road and subdivisions off Tangerine Avenue. They have also been tied to at least one residential burglary in Orange County as well. The burglaries have been occurring since May.

They had been under suspicion as items began showing up at area pawnshops.

The break in the case came recently, when a sheriff's Field Service Officer (a civilian employee) noticed a suspicious vehicle in the Dike Road area. He took down the tag number, noted the vehicle description, and noticed two males inside. Later, a burglary was reported in a nearby neighborhood.

The information led to the suspects.

The Walker brothers will be charged with burglary to a dwelling, grand theft, dealing in stolen property, and making false representations to a pawn shop. It is likely more cases will be solved as the investigation continues and more property is recovered.

Schools release information on bus schedules

In an effort to ensure that your students receive bus service on the first day of school, the Seminole County Schools are mailing post cards to parents with pertinent information.

The post cards inform parents of where their child's bus stop is, what route number (both a.m. and p.m.) the stop is on, and the pick-up and drop-off times for each stop.

Parents who have not received this postcard information by Aug. 1, you can contact the Seminole County Public School Transportation web site at www.scps.k12.fl.us, or call 407-320-7550 or 407-320-7588.

School officials note that if you are looking for a stop location on the Transportation web page, some stop locations are marked with three asterisks (***). This indicates a temporary stop that may be removed. If the stop is removed, students utilizing the stop will be given a minimum notice of thirty (30) days.

Parents are encouraged to walk their child to the bus stop until they become familiar with the location.

Buses may be late for the first few days of school.

Museum publishes county history

At the beginning of the 20th Century, God told a group of men from South Carolina to travel to Florida. The men did as they were told, and the small community of Snow Hill was established in Seminole County just north of Econlockhatchee Creek.

The tale of Snow Hill, told by Sarah Detreville Bush, is one of many included in the latest edition of "Early Days of Seminole County History," a publication by the Seminole County Historical Commission. Although the book includes many well-known historical facts about the county, it also contains information about the more obscure towns and communities that have slowly faded off the maps.

"The book tells the stories of settlements that time passed by," Museum of Seminole County History Specialist Karen Jacobs said.

Grants help fund sheriff's office

During the course of a year, sheriff's receive various grants and obtain amounts of money from a number of sources, which generally are entered into the county's funds, but earmarked for use by the sheriff.

Such is the case with Seminole County Sheriff Donald Estlinger. Each year, the sheriff is required by statute to request county commission approval for transferring the funds into various sheriff's accounts. The Sheriff's Department undertook such requests during this past Tuesday's County Commission Meeting, and all of the items received unanimous commission approval.

All of the requests were to transfer money into the sheriff's operating account, as well as increase one part-time position to a full time position. The separate requests included:

Transfer of \$160,000 budgeted in the Sheriff's Office contingency account to the operating expense account.

The sheriff's department had been awarded a grant in the amount of \$17,813 from the Florida Department of Health. An advance payment has already been received. The funds provide basic first response equipment essential for the safe response to a biological or chemical hazard. Specialized equipment purchased from this money will allow deputies to respond effectively and safely in this type of incident.

The sheriff's office has accrued \$19,372 in unclaimed evidence funds. With commission approval, these funds will now be utilized within the sheriff's budget for operating needs within the agency.

Through a two-year agreement with Justice Benefits Inc., a nationwide consulting firm rec-

Memory of attack still vivid despite passage of decades

DEAR ABBY: I have been bothered by something that happened a long time ago. In 1943, during World War II, I was a pretty 15-year-old living in Georgia. One evening, I

went on a date with a very nice soldier named Elmer. I liked him a lot and he liked me. I wore a beautiful green suit.

We were walking toward the movie theater when I stopped to use a ladies restroom. Elmer waited outside for me. When I came out, two policemen drove past and looked at me. They stopped and ordered me to get into their patrol car.

Elmer asked why. The heavy-set policeman said, "Soldier boy, get lost or we'll call the MPs and have you arrested." Then the policemen grabbed me and threw me into the patrol car.

They drove me to a dark church parking lot and raped me. First the heavy-set one, then the other one. Afterward, they drove me home. I felt dirty and violated. I was afraid to leave my home for fear they would return.

I never saw either policeman again and I never saw Elmer again, either. He never knew what happened to me.

In those days, a woman (or in my case, a child) would never dare to tell the authorities because the female was presumed to be automatically at fault. I had no one to talk to. No action was taken.

I am nearly 75 years old now. This happened a lifetime ago, but I remember it vividly — even the name of one of the officers.

Abby, I hope you print this. In case Elmer is still living, I want him to know what happened to me. We were both nice kids, not bothering anyone. I did nothing wrong, so help me God.

DEAR E.M.: I'm printing your letter because I am sure you are not the only rape victim from that era who has been afraid to speak out about her assault. I believe you when you say you did nothing wrong. The men who harmed you violated their position of trust and authority.

Although it has been nearly six decades since your rape occurred, there is still help available for you in the form of post-traumatic stress counseling. Please pick up the phone and call RAINN (the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network) at (800) 656-HOPE (4673). RAINN will connect you with the nearest rape crisis center in your area. Please heed this advice. You'll be glad you did.

DEAR ABBY: My parents, who live in Europe, are finalizing their divorce. So far, I have remained neutral. However, I recently learned some very upsetting news about my dad — that he's had multiple extramarital affairs. He also bad-mouths my mother to everyone who will listen.

Dad plans to retire next year and wants to visit me and my husband after that. This man is an alcoholic who has never sought treatment. I am not looking forward to his visit, but realize now is not the time to break off my connection with him.

As a compromise, I would like to propose that my dad visit my husband and me for one week — but with the requirement that no alcohol be brought into our home. Does this sound reasonable, Abby?



Docent training course begins Aug. 28

If you love animals and enjoy being surrounded by acres of lush foliage and fresh air, the Central Florida Zoo is looking for you. The zoo is seeking dedicated people to participate in the Docent Training Program. Volunteer teachers, referred to as docents, are an integral part of the zoo staff. Providing exceptional education for children and adults about conservation of animals and the environment, docents participate in an array of activities. Engineered Homes tops \$41 million in homes sales at 6-month mark

Bolstered by the arrival of two new residential communities – including Buckingham Estates in Lake Mary – and a record-setting June, Engineered Homes eclipsed the \$41 million mark in home sales for the year's first six months.

Thanks to a sizzling June in which it topped the \$10 million plateau for the first time and the early success of its Buckingham Estates and Mission Park developments, Engineered Homes rang up 204 homes sales for \$41.8 million at eight Central Florida communities at the year's halfway point – an average of approximately \$213,853 per sale, reports Engineered Homes' Sales and Marketing Director Marilyn Anderson.

The company's newest two developments factored significantly that success. manded a lion's share of activity for the six-month period. The community, which features four separate product lines, chalked up 69 sales for \$16.9 million – an average of \$244,928.

- Lake Gloria Preserve – 29 for \$5.4 million, \$186,207;
- Lake Griffin Estates (Casselberry) – 27 for \$4.9 million, \$181,481;
- Egret's Landing (Lake Mary) – 28 for \$4.4 million, \$157,143;
- Weston Hills (Clermont) – 25 for \$3.7 million, \$148,000;
- Buckingham Estates (Heathrow) – 10 for \$3.3 million, \$330,000;
- The Retreat at Wekiva – 11 for \$2.5 million, 227,273;
- Mission Park (Clermont) – 5 for \$809,501, \$161,900.

The company, now in its seventh year of operations, posted a record \$78.4 million in home sales last year.



The Way We Were: Items of interest from the society's newsletter

The following two items were in the July-August issue of the Sanford Historical Society newsletter of which I am editor.

The first article refers to the Second Seminole War and was found by researcher Jim Cara.

The second article on Sanford schools was contributed by Virgie Himan Cone of Greenville, S.C., age 93, who lived in Sanford 1913-22 while her father, Rev. George Hyman was pastor of First Baptist Church. It was during his pastorate that the brick sanctuary was built.

Forces Move South from Fort Mellon

The following is a direct quote from the December 29, 1837 edition of Niles' National Register which was published in Washington City every Saturday.

"FROM FLORIDA. We have more than once resolved not to publish any accounts from Florida unless of an official character - for in three cases out of four, statements which seem authentic are not to be relied on, and thus perplex both readers and editors.

"It now seems that there is no prospect of a speedy termination of the war, unless hostilities are

actively prosecuted by the American commanding general, for Sam Jones, instead of being willing to surrender, is concentrating troops at his town. Gen. Jesup is also making great preparations for the campaign, and was moving upon Sam Jones' town with a large and well appointed force.

"Major McLean, one of Gen. Jesup's staff, who has been reported to procure steamboats of a very light draft, so as to establish depots on Indian River, which is expected to be the seat of war, arrived at Savannah, on the 22d inst. from Gary's Ferry, and has communicated the following to the editor of the 'Georgian.'"

"The regular forces under Gen. Jesup composed of about 1,500 men, (all regulars) have moved from Fort Mellon under the immediate command of Gen. Eustis.

"The depot at Fort Mellon is secured inside of a large picket, garrisoned by 140 men under the command of Major Stanton.

"Gen. Hernandez, with the Tennessee volunteers, moved at the same time along the St. John, on the eastern side toward the south, while General Eustis marched on the western side.

"All of the Florida volunteers had been discharged, with the exception of one or two companies. Previous thereto they had scoured the whole country from St. Augustine to Mosquito, and thence down the St. Johns to opposite Fort Mellon on Lake Monroe.

"A depot is to be established under the command of Major Dearborn, in or above Lake Harney, which is about 30 or 35 miles southeast of Fort Mellon."

Further information on the War After the above was published in the newsletter, I received a note from Michelle Mena with information on the Second Seminole War during 1837 taken from "A History of the United States in Chronological Order - 432 AD - 1886". I then checked "The Encyclopedia of American Facts and Dates" and have used both sources for the following brief infiruation on this war.

The federal government was committed to a policy of removing all eastern Indians to reservations west of the Mississippi River and a treaty had been signed in 1832 with the Seminole Indians of Florida. When the time came in 1835 to begin the move, many Seminoles refused to go; the resistance was led by Indian Chief Osceola. In November the Second Seminole War erupted. Federal troops were sent to Florida but had little success against the Indians whose raid-

ing parties struck quickly then vanished.

In 1837, a number of chiefs called on General Jesup at Fort Dale (March 6) and signed a treaty which guaranteed a speedy peace and prompt transport of the Indians during the summer. However, Osceola reappeared and urged the violation of the treaty and renewed the war. On Oct. 2, 1837, Osceola, with several chiefs and warriors, a gain appeared at Jesup's camp under a flag of truce. Exasperated by his former treachery, Jesup captured all the Indians and placed them in confinement. Osceola was sent to Fort Moultrie, S.C., where he died of a fever in 1838.

Nearly 9,000 troops remained in the state, engaging with the Indians until the end of the year. The American forces did not overcome the Seminoles until 1842, but by 1840, many Seminoles were among those Indians from the five Civilized Nations in the east who had resettled in Indian Territory in the West.

This war's cost to the United States was 1,500 lives lost and \$20 million spent.

Memories of Sanford Schools - by Virgie Hyman Cone My memories of Sanford are vivid and pleasant. In 1914, I started school in the elementary school on Palmetto Avenue

(Southside). Mrs. Arrington was principal and Miss Lily Farnsworth was my first grade teacher. She later married S.O. Shinholser after his first wife died. His daughter Clifford was in my class.

Miss Edith Stewart was my second grade teacher. I remember that she went on a diet of butter-milk and toast and lost a number of pounds. She later went to Philadelphia to study to become a nurse. When I had diphtheria and my mother had an emergency operation in the hospital in Orlando, Miss Stewart stayed with my brother and me while our father went to the hospital with our mother.

My third grade teacher was Miss Rene Murrell. Ruth Henry and I were good friends and Miss Rene was friends with Ruth's older sisters Florence and Ethel. Miss Rene's family also went to First Baptist Church and we were accustomed to hearing her called Rene by our families. One day at lunch, Ruth and I were sitting on our bicycles parked under the windows of the classroom. We stuck our heads up and said, "Hello, Miss Rene". She was working at her desk and thought it was cute at first until we got to "Hello, Rene". That did it and into the cloakroom we went. Ruth held that over my head until we learned that Miss Rene had reported it to our families.

At the end of the third grade, we graduated to Sanford Grammar School. Our fourth grade teacher was Miss Georgia Pattishall. One day I refused to memorize a poem, and when I reached home that afternoon, my mother had her hat on with "Come, we're going to the school". Miss Georgia had gotten the message home. After the conference, I started memorizing. During that year my father joined the army as a chaplain and we left Sanford.

After the war, we returned to Sanford and by then I was in the sixth grade. My sixth grade teacher was Mrs. Brown. Mrs. Dickinson was the seventh grade teacher and Mrs. Barber, eighth grade.

Mrs. Barber had a son, Walter, who was in our class. He went to the University of Florida and made quite a name for himself as the sports announcer for the Red Sox of Cincinnati. (This would be Red Barber).

We moved to Tampa in 1922 where my father was Director of Expansion for the First Baptist Church. I graduated from Hillsboro High School and went to Florida State College for Women in Tallahassee, where I found friends I had in Sanford. I am presently writing "Memories of My Life in the Twentieth Century" and am not in this that the years I spent in Sanford had much influence in my life.

Perry said as Griffin was the overall winner, he is considered a "World Champion" and his car will be kept in the Soap Box Derby Museum in Akron.

Pond obtained the right to go to Akron through compiling points in various races. "You get so many points for winning and other achievements at each race," Perry explained. "Then the top point-getters become eligible for the race in Akron - but in Akron, they have to win the races. That's what Pond did."

There were 93 others in the rally competition, ranging in age from eight through 17. In winning, Pond received a \$3,000 college scholarship. Both Pond and Griffin also won watches, T-shirts and other items. In all, there were 413 youngsters participating in the various class races, including drivers from Japan, Germany, Europe and the Philippines.

One of the previous local winners in the All-American Derby was also in this year's races. Justin Pillow, now 15 years of age, took the Stock Championship in 1999.

Continued from Page 1A omends funds for various sheriff's departments who house individuals who are not U.S. citizens, in local jails. Based on their survey, the U.S. Justice Department has awarded \$33,608. The Sheriff's Department requested these funds, which had already been electronically deposited with the county, to be utilized for match-

ing funds for several other Sheriff's Office Grants.

Finally, the sheriff's office has been approved for \$31,250 from the Department of Juvenile Justice which allows one new full-time position and a full year of grant revenue and expenditures that have already been included in the sheriff's budget. No additional matching funds are required.

The program will provide funds for the STAY program provided through the School Board and also provides a six week follow-up program for youth that complete the Operation Right Track Program.

The total request was in the amount of \$31,250, and will provide the sheriff's budget with the necessary program funds to operate through Sept. 30, 2002.

Continued from Page 1A "These are the places many people have never heard of."

While researching information for the publication, Jacobs said she was surprised by various historical tidbits in Seminole's past. For example, the museum specialist didn't realize Deacon Henry Delreuve called his homestead Snow Hill after discovering a sand spot that was so white, it looked like snow.

Originally written by Art Franke, "Early Days of Seminole County History" has been in circulation for more than 20 years, Jacobs said. Many people have the older editions, with the familiar blue or brown covers, in their home libraries.

Every two years, the book is updated to keep it current and to add information that may have been left out of the previous edition, Jacobs said. The 2002 publication, for example, includes features about Seminole's early black communities.

"We felt it was very important to tell the story of the black communities," Jacobs said. "They were very important to the early days of this county, especially for the agriculture industry. If it

wasn't for them, where would we be?"

The latest reprint of the book also includes new postcard images provided by Jim Cara. Along with the additional historical information, this year's "Early Days" has a new look. Gone is the simple brown or blue cover. The newest edition includes a detailed cover that highlights Seminole's agricultural past - a large celery stalk is pictured in front of an old map of the county.

"We wanted an updated cover to go along with the expanded information," Jacobs said. "There is always room for improvement, but the Commission is very proud of the latest reprint of the book. I think, so far, it's the best one we've done."

Printing costs for the publication was provided through funds from a historic preservation grant. One thousand books were printed, and they are available at the Museum of Seminole County History, located at 300 Bush Blvd., in Sanford. The books are free to museum visitors.

"The book is a wonderful historical tool for any new person to the community or for students

gathering information for school reports," Jacobs said. "They can come tour the museum and then pick up a copy of the book."

"People wanting a copy of the book after Aug. 1, however, will have to wait until the museum reopens Sept. 9, when restoration to the front porch, office, entrance and several other rooms is finished. When the facility reopens in September, Phase 3 of a massive renovation project will be complete.

"All roads in the museum lead to the area that will be renovated in August, so we decided we had to close the building to the public," Jacobs said. "Since August is usually the time when the museum receives the least amount of visitors, we decided it was the best time to close."

"We want to thank everyone for being so patient during our renovation process," she added. "People have been very supportive, and by Oct. 15, we should be completely done with the renovations."

Sanford sailor participates in military partnership

Promoting America's maritime cooperation with its South American neighbors has been a U.S. Navy priority for more than four decades. Each year, U.S. Navy and Coast Guard vessels head south to join ships from other nations of the Americas in Unitas, an exercise designed to enhance military interoperability and strengthen the ties among the participating nations.

The guided missile cruiser USS Yorktown (CG-48) was the flagship of the U.S. Task force for the Caribbean phase of Unitas. As a member of the Yorktown's crew, Navy Fireman Dean J. Cichanski, son of Ramona Cichanski of Sanford, made an important contribution to the success of the Caribbean phase of Unitas.

"I work in the auxiliary division on board my ship. We provide the crew with water, air conditioning and heat. We also maintain the galley equipment so the food service personnel

are able to feed us," said the engineman.

Named after the Latin word for unity, Unitas has been vital in promoting hemispheric defense and friendship for more than 42 years. In those years Unitas has been transformed from a series of bilateral exercises into a series of cooperative multinational training operations involving Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard forces from eleven countries in the Americas and from four European countries.

Unitas is conducted in four different phases. The Caribbean phase is typically conducted in early spring, followed by a bilateral amphibious phase and the Pacific Phase. The Atlantic phase concludes the yearly exercise cycle in November.

In addition to Yorktown, the Caribbean phase also included the guided missile frigate USS Doyle, the attack submarine USS Pittsburgh, the Coast Guard Cutter Thetis, and the

auxiliary ship USNS Prevail. U.S. Navy P-3C Orion patrol aircraft from patrol Squadron Eleven (VP-11) and Seahawk helicopters provided air support for the exercise. The American task force was joined by Naval forces from Columbia, Panama, Venezuela, and for the first time ever, Mexico and the Dominican Republic.

The multinational coalition fostered by Unitas provides key support to American efforts in homeland defense and counter drug operations.

"I feel the Navy itself is vital to homeland defense because we are capable of going wherever a military force is needed," explained the 21-year old sailor.

Cichanski joined the Navy in January, 2001 after graduating from Seminole Community College in 2000. "I joined the Navy because I enjoy traveling and doing things I never thought I'd get a chance to," said Cichanski.

Home ported in Pascagoula,

Miss., USS Yorktown is primarily responsible for supporting carrier battle groups and amphibious forces, but it can also operate independently. These guided missile cruisers are equipped with anti-aircraft missiles, Tomahawk anti-ship missiles for long-range strikes, six torpedo tubes, two 5-inch 54-caliber guns and two Phalanx Close-in weapons systems.

Being stationed aboard Yorktown has provided Cichanski with unique opportunities. "So far, Curacao has been my favorite port of call. The beaches are beautiful, and the tropical environment is excellent for relaxation," he said.

Dean J. Cichanski is one of thousands of sailors stationed all over the world who support national defense every day. Through coalition-building exercises and partnerships like Unitas, the U.S. Navy works steadily in developing a more secure world for Americans and their neighbors.



time to prepare to enjoy those mild hunting afternoons in the dove field.

"Grain crops for doves must be planted by mid to late July to mature before the opening of dove season in October," said Mark Asleson, technical services biologist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) in Ocala.

Although federal law prohibits dove hunting over baited fields, it is legal to hunt doves over standing crops, including those that have been mowed or disked. Brown-top millet is a prime food for mourning doves. However, you can also plant sunflowers, grain sorghum and other grain-type crops.

"Millet matures quickly, is easy to grow, and is well-suited for Florida," Asleson said. "It does a good job of attracting doves if you plant a minimum of about 10-15 acres and mow or lightly disk it in alternating rows after it matures to provide seed and bare ground for the doves. Bigger fields seem to be even better."

By planting part of the field around mid-July and another section a few weeks later, dove hunters can extend a field's attractiveness to the birds, because the second planting matures later in the season.

"It's best if you time at least part of the field to mature two weeks before the opening day

of dove season in early October," Asleson said. "Millet matures in about 65 days."

Seeding rates vary with the type of cultivation, but a guideline is 30 lbs. of brown top millet per acre for broadcast and 10 lbs. per acre drilled in rows. Sunflowers are typically sown at 30 lbs., per acre broadcast and 15 lbs. per acre drilled and maturity is reached in approximately 100-110 days. Grain sorghum matures in approximately 110 days and is planted at 20 lbs. per acre broadcast or 10 lbs. per acre in rows to give best results.

Fertilizer rates can vary by site location, and conducting a soil test is a good idea, but as a general rule 300 lbs., of 10-10-10 per acre for row crops and 500 lbs., per acre for broadcast crops works fine. County agricultural extension offices or the Commission's regional offices can also further advise landowners about which crop is best for specific areas.

For those hunters without access to private fields, the FWC offers dove hunting annual permits for a number of wildlife management areas (WMAs) throughout the state. They include: Allapattah Small Game Hunting Area in Martin County, Caravelle Ranch WMA in Putnam County, Hilochee WMA in south Lake County, Frog Pond WMA in Dade County, Lake George WMA in Volusia

County, Park Road Small Game Hunting Area in Alachua County, Purvis Farm Small Game Hunting Area in Jefferson County, Tenoroc Small Game Hunting Area in Polk County, and Walnut Hill Small Game Hunting Area in Escambia County.

The cost of an annual dove-hunting permit is \$150. Applications are available from FWC offices or on the FWC Web site at <http://wld.fwc.state.fl.us/special/Default.htm>.

Premiums force surgeons out of hospital

SANFORD — Unable to pay soaring malpractice insurance rates, four emergency room surgeons suspended their practices.

The surgeons, all associated with Central Florida Regional Hospital, were informed by their carriers that premiums, to be paid up front and in cash, would quadruple to about \$600,000 for the year.

"Occasionally carriers will let you split the premium into two installments, but usu-

ally they want most if not all of the money before they issue any coverage," said Dr. Larry Alexander, the hospital's emergency department medical director.

The situation has created two problems for the hospital: one, Central Florida Regional Hospital (CFRH) has lost the services of four of its five general emergency

room surgeons; and two, news of the doctors' decision has generated fear in the community about a potential loss of medical service. Those fears have translated into a drop in the number of people going to CFRH. Emergency room doctors routinely see 90 patients per day. Since the story broke, the hospital is averaging 74 patients.

"The rumors have been outrageous," Alexander said. "We've had people call and say they heard we shut the ER down, that we closed the hospital, that we were turning people away, that the doors were chained up. None of that has happened."

"We are open for business," he emphasized. "We're still taking care of people and we will continue to take care of people. We will not let our community down."

While the surgeons' predicament and the

Winter Park firm chosen to design new station

LAKE MARY — A Winter Park firm Thursday was chosen to oversee the design and construction of City Hall's expansion and the new Rinehart Road fire station.

Following presentations by three area design firms, Architects Design Group (ADG) Inc., was ranked No. 1 by City Commission to provide design professional services for the two projects. The city will now enter into negotiations with the firm for design, cost and other construction elements for the new facilities.

Of the three design groups, which also included Spillis Candela and The Scott Partnership Architecture, commissioners were most impressed with Architects Design Group's commitment to public and employee input while working on a project. Other elements, which tipped the scales in favor of the Winter Park firm, included its pledge to help the city find alternative funding sources and raise public awareness for the projects.

"I want to see our employees involved in this process," Commissioner Gary Brender said. "I want them to take ownership of this project."

Earlier this year, Commission opted to use the design/build method, rather than the traditional bid method, for the two proposed facilities. Since the state legislature now allows for more flexibility when it comes to constructing large capital projects, cities have an alternative to the traditional low bid, one contractor choice.

In the design/build method, cities select a team of professionals, including architects, builders and cost-control specialists. In May, Lake Mary sent out a request for qualifications (RFQ) in order to obtain a list of possible design firms to work on the City Hall expansion and fire station.

Eight companies responded to the request, and a selection committee comprised of City Manager John Litton, Finance Director Jackie Sova, Fire Chief

Man arrested after trying to steal bike from deputy

mountain bike from the rack at the rear of his vehicle.

After the man ran from the area, the deputy gave chase and eventually apprehended him in the woods alongside Howell Creek. Pliers, wire cutters, a cable lock and dish towel were found and taken into evidence. The towel was assumed to have been used to hide fingerprints.

At the Seminole County Jail, the man refused to provide officers with his address, work, next of kin, or other information. He, at one point, told an officer his name was John Serra, 38 years of age.

Later, after checking the state of Florida's live scan system and checking Serra's fingerprints, information was received that his true name is Bruce Palmer Johnson, 37.

Initially, charges were, burglary of an unoccupied conveyance, larceny of more than \$300, possession of burglary tools, and resisting an officer without violence. Now, because of giving the false information, he has been charged with resisting/obstructing an officer by a disguised person.

In a court appearance, the judge determined he is to be held without bond.

Authorities say he is also wanted on an outstanding warrant issued in Orange County for violation of probation on a conviction of petit theft, and has an unspecified case pending in Seminole County.

Sheriff's office aviation team receives national award for infrared operation

SANFORD — In December, two suspects wanted on stolen vehicle and drug charges tried to outrun officers from the Sanford Police Department after bailing out of a stolen car. They managed to elude capture — at least for a short time — by hiding in some underbrush. The pair, however, didn't realize their nighttime escape attempt would be thwarted by two men from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office hovering hundreds of feet above them in the air.

Last month, Pilot Steve Farris and Flight Officer Patrick Rice received national recognition for their efforts in apprehending the two fleeing criminals. The aviation team's video of the event surpassed hundreds of other entries in this year's FLIR Vision Award Contest to win second place.

"Our unit submitted several entries, and we hoped to win something," Rice said. "But, we knew there was a lot of tough competition. You just never know."

FLIR Systems Inc., sponsors the annual contest. It honors law enforcement personnel who use the Forward Looking Infra Red

(FLIR) System — a device that focuses on body heat — in their operations.

Last December, Farris and Rice were on Delta shift when they received a Signal 10 bailout call from the Sanford Police Department. After the helicopter arrived at the scene, it didn't take long for the aviation team and the FLIR System — attached to the bottom of the helicopter — to locate a heat source. They immediately contacted the ground unit, who went into the wooded area at the corner of Persimmon Avenue
