## Thanksgiving safety belt enforcement nets 23,000 citations

The Thanksgiving safety belt enforcement effort netted 23,000 citations across the state for adults and children who were not buckled up.

However, the state's safety belt law results that may not be repeated during a safety belt crackdown.

More than 300 stolen vehicles were recovered, nearly 300 fugitives were apprehended and about 1,600 impaired drivers were arrested during the safety belt crackdown.

The necessary effect of catching criminals during a safety belt enforcement wave is a welcome outcome, according to Al Roop, program director for Buckle Up Florida.

"The focus of our program is to save lives by getting more people buckled up," Roop said. "Of course, we know that 'dineary' traffic stops can lead to trouble, which is why we focus on the road. We are patting the officers who take the time to conduct secondary and tertiary checks in the process."

A total of 319 agencies and law enforcement agencies participated in the safety belt enforcement effort, which was held from Nov. 23 to Dec. 1.

The Florida Department of Transportation reminds us that there were 24 alcohol-related traffic deaths in Florida during the Christmas and New Year's holiday period last year. Another 500 persons were injured in the course of alcohol-related crashes.

## Tenants capitalizing on soft real estate market

With commercial vacancy rates in Central Florida high and showing no signs of improving any time soon, now is a great time to lease a tenant.

Paul A. Whiting of Creative Office Environments in Altamonte Springs, Fla., says the last three years "created opportunities across the board for commercial real estate leasing."

"Today's commercial real estate tenants have more leverage than at any time in the last five to 10 years and they are using that leverage to their advantage," says Whiting, whose 13-year-old company specializes in the moving and installation of office furniture and workstations for companies throughout the state.

Whiting says office occupants are aggressively renegotiating their lease renewals—even beyond their lease expiration dates—in order to get the best deals from their landlords like new paint, carpeting and shorter lease periods.

"Face it, this is now a tenant's market," Whiting adds. "They hold the cards in a game of commercial poker and they know it. In today's lease market, tenants will only enter into a lease if it's sweet to the pot." Whiting adds, "It's not a bluff. It's good business."

The higher vacancy rates coupled with recent low mortgage interest rates also have fueled a buying blitz by tenants, according to Whiting who says it's cheaper to own than it is to rent.

"Interest rates are so low right now that commercial property is a great buy," Whiting notes. "It makes for better business sense to take your rental dollars and have it build equity in building ownership."

He cites his own situation as a perfect illustration. Whiting is leasing a little more than 10,000 square feet in the Jostene Industrial Park off C.R. 427 in Altamonte Springs. His \$5,400 monthly rent would

easily support a comparable facility and a \$400,000 mortgage.

"And, yes, we are looking," he admits. "And while there is an upside to the current market climate, there is also a downside that is having an impact on Whiting's company. Demand for new office furniture is way down, and, as a result, Creative Office and other high volume furniture stores have scaled back production."

"The market is flooded with used high quality furniture and work stations," he says. "Values are about 10 cents on the dollar. Until that used inventory is absorbed (12-24 months), demand for new furniture will continue to be low."



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

NO. 14 MISSISSIPPI STATE DROWNS UCF

Doceide Warren scored 15 points, including a perfect 3-for-3 from three-point range, as the No. 14 ranked Mississippi State women's basketball team steamrolled UCF, 81-30, in the final game of the UCF Holiday Classic on Friday evening at UCF Arena. Both squads got off to a slow start as the score- board read a 4-4 tie at 16:18 of the first half. A basket by MSU's Seneca Anderson at 15:07 jump- started a 16-4 run that included the three treys by Warren. Taking advantage of their 66.7% accuracy from outside the arc (6-for-9) and a seven-minute scoring drought by the Golden Knights (4-5), the Lady Bulldogs (8-1) took a 39-17 advantage at the half.

Freshman guard Shayla Smith hit the first shot of the second half before Mississippi State went on a 26-0 run. Freshman Shelby Weber was the first Golden Knight to hit a basket in over 12 minutes when she sank the second of two foul shots at 7:38. At 2:33, freshman guard LaShay King sank UCF's second field goal of the game - the first in 17 minutes - followed by a three-point- er by freshman forward Celeste Hudson to cut the lead to 72-28.

LaToya Thomas added 13 points for MSU, while fan White and Seneca Anderson each had 12 points.

Sophomore center Takira Allen was the Golden Knights leading scorer with eight points.

Mississippi State outplayed UCF in every aspect of the game. The Lady Bulldogs shot 54% from the field, while the Golden Knights hit only 23.5%. Rebounds were 45-27 in favor of MSU. In the early game, Nicole Aneajonu and Sara Crum each recorded double-doubles as the University of Detroit Mercy (2-6) defeated Bethune-Cookman, 76-61. The Wildcats (4-5) went on 16-8 run to earn a 30-22 advantage at the 7:08 mark. Despite Detroit's attempts at a comeback, the Wildcats owned a 40-36 lead at the intermission.

After a quick basket by the Titans to start the second half, the two teams went without a field goal for over two minutes. At the 13:44 mark, Detroit's Melissa Harakas sparked an 18-4 run

and UDM never allowed BCC to come within more than six during the stretch.

In the second half, UCF continued its offensive attack, hitting more than half its shots to go up by 13 (47-34) at 11:48. Less than three minutes later, the Titans (1-5) capped off an 8-0 run with two treys to cut the Golden Knights lead back to five.

With 2:39 remaining to play and the score 55-48, UCF capitalized on its opportunities from the foul line. The team went 6-for-6 from the charity stripe down the stretch and hit a perfect 10-for-10 in the second half.

Allen had a career-high 20 points and added 10 boards for the first double-double of her career and Paige notched the sixth double-double of her career with 10 points and 10 rebounds.

Lindsey Pasquinzo, Lori Wild and Nicole Aneajonu each had a team-high eight points for Detroit.

In the first game of the evening, LaToya Thomas scored 22 points as No. 14 Mississippi State defeated Bethune-Cookman, 66-61.

After taking an 11-point advantage (20-9), MSU allowed BCC to earn its first lead of the contest with 31 seconds remaining in the first half on a layup by Latonya Reed before MSU's Ian White hit a three-pointer for a 32-30 Lady Bulldogs' advantage at the intermission.

Bethune-Cookman and Mississippi State played tight in the second half, keeping within four points of one another as the lead changed hands five times. With the score knotted at 52, MSU made a final bit to pull away on a 12-6 run and Thomas sank two-of-two shots from the foul line to insure the victory.

Continued from page 10 fish bag limit for panfish species (bluegill and redear sunfish), and a 25-fish bag limit for black crappie.

"The reason we have included only largemouth bass in this temporary restriction is that historically anglers have targeted them more heavily during drawdowns than they have panfish, whose numbers generally remain abundant," said FWC fisheries biologist Marty Mann.

The goal of the drawdown and enhancement project is to improve fish and wildlife habitat by removing muck and undesirable plant communities - mainly cattail, pickerelweed and tussocks - and returning to the lake a hard, silt bottom. This type of bottom is what fish need to spawn and what desirable plants need to take root, which provide cover and food for fish.

Unfortunately, when lake levels are stabilized for flood control and not allowed to fluctuate, the lake bottom never gets a

chance to dry out. As a result, plant and other organic materials decompose and create a thick layer of muck that prevents spawning and allows poor plant communities to become established.

To help reverse this, the FWC does periodic drawdowns, which are extended periods during which the lake levels are lowered to expose the area near the shoreline, and allow it to dry out. At the same time, contractors remove the muck using heavy equipment, and then plant the beneficial vegetation the fish and wildlife need.

"This lake will be a phenomenal place to fish this spring. But, we want to protect our wonderful largemouth bass fishery and ensure its presence for years to come," said Mann. "So, grab your fishing tackle and get to Lake Tohopekaliga this spring, but remember to recycle your largemouth bass."

LOTHIAN AGER WINS FWC ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

A 34-year veteran Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) biologist has received the Louise Ireland Humphrey Award. Lothian Ager, 61, of Orlando, was recognized for a distinguished career dedicated to managing the living resources that earned Florida's distinction as the Fishing Capital of the World.

Ager joined the FWC in 1967, working as project leader for the Lake Okeechobee Project. His work on the 500,000-acre lake launched his career and became the basis for a variety of fisheries management activities commonly used today.

Earlier this month, the Florida chapter of the Sierra Club recognized Ager's accomplishments by giving him their Osprey award.
