

Airport meets baggage deadline

Date says all luggage will be screened for explosive materials

SANFORD — Luggage will be screened at Sanford International Airport starting Dec. 31, 2001, in order to meet a deadline for screening all checked baggage for explosives.

OSIA approved in November 2001 for Aviation and Transportation Security Act, which created the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) to handle Federal security and imposed a deadline for airports to screen all checked baggage.

The country's major airports re-

working to meet the deadline because the Explosives Detection System (EDS) required for screening are large—about the size of a minivan—necessitating removal of baggage systems and facilities.

Some airports will have to get equipment "W" work," said Larry Dale, president and CEO of Sanford Airport Authority. "We are in a position to screen 100 percent of the checked luggage coming into Sanford International Airport."

Meeting the deadline was not easy. Dale said that the EDS units were not available until late in the year. The Federal Aviation Administration delayed the airport in having less than 250,000 passengers a year. Last year OSIA allowed nearly six times that many people.

"If I had any hair to pull out, I'd be as bald as I am now," Dale said. "It's a testament to our whole staff that we met the deadline, particularly Jack Grew. He's been working

more than 20 hours a day for the last several weeks."

Federal security guidelines require that from releasing what procedures or equipment is being used to meet the law. Screening standards in general, the TSA is using a combination of EDS and Explosives Trace Detection (ETD) devices to check all baggage for explosives.

Using technology similar to a CAT Scan, ETD uses picking radiation to take fundamental measurements of materials in bags to automatically recognize the characteristic signatures of threat explosives. EDS

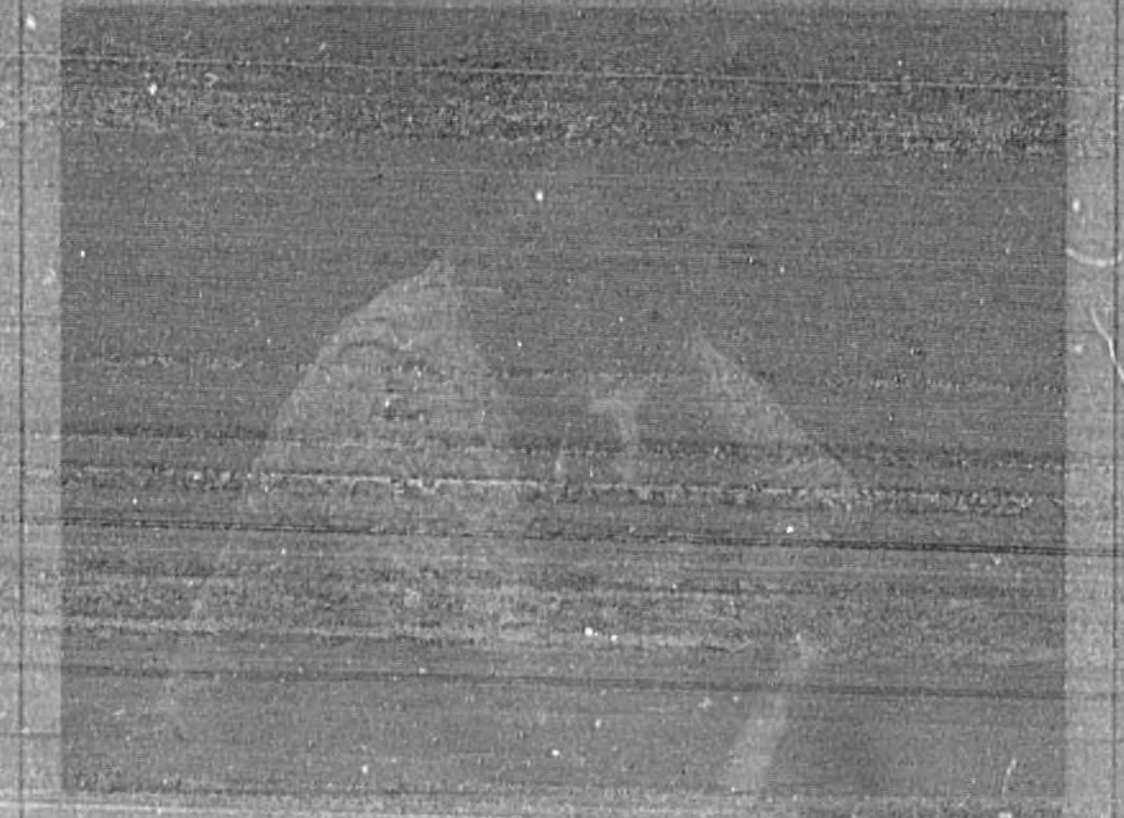

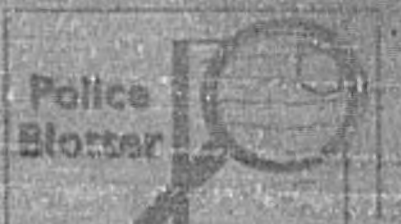

Thanksgiving safety belt enforcement nets 23,000 citations

The Thanksgiving safety belt enforcement effort netted 23,000 citations across the state for adults and children who were not buckled up.

However, the state's safety belt law results that may not be repeated during a safety belt crackdown.

More than 300 stolen vehicles were recovered, nearly 300 fugitives were apprehended and about 1,600 impaired drivers were arrested during the safety belt crackdown.

The necessary effect of catching criminals during a safety belt enforcement wave is a welcome outcome, according to Al Roop, program director for Buckle Up Florida.

"The focus of our program is to save lives by getting more people buckled up," Roop said. "Of course, we know that 'dineary' traffic stops can lead to tragedy, which is not just the original intent. We are putting out the officers who take the time to conduct secondary and tertiary checks in the process."

A total of 319 agencies and law enforcement agencies participated in the safety belt enforcement effort, which was held from Nov. 23 to Dec. 1.

ticket total, were fined heavily last year. 215 citations were issued for 32,713 speeding citations, 1,200 reckless driving citations, 1,610 DUI arrests, 790 fugitives apprehended and 342 stolen vehicles recovered.

As the Christmas and New Year's holiday period approaches, Florida's law enforcement agencies will turn their attention largely to impaired drivers. The number of fatalities in the state attributed to drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol has continually increased in recent years, climbing from 506 in 1999 to 1,100 fatal hits in 2001.

In a brief effort, officers from across the state will conduct roadblocks, sobriety checkpoints and other special enforcement activities to apprehend impaired drivers. The campaign is called "You Drink and Drive, You Lose."

All law enforcement agencies are planning DUI drinking under the influence checkpoints and sobriety checkpoints and are scheduling more officers to work evening shifts as part of the effort to identify and arrest impaired drivers.

Individual police departments will also be involved in the crackdown.

"Many people choose to celebrate the holidays with alcohol," said Orlando Police Chief Dennis Peterson, "but when they decide to drive after drinking they are likely to kill or injure others."

AAA headquarters in Tampa is estimating 3.7 million Floridians are expected to be traveling at some time during the Christmas/New Year's holiday. Of this number, 2.5 million will be traveling by car, the remainder by plane.

Kevin Bekewell, AAA Auto Club South president, said the number of errors is down one percent from last year, attributing the decline to the fact that the holidays fall in the middle of the week.

The Florida Department of Transportation reminds us that there were 24 alcohol-related traffic deaths in Florida during the Christmas and New Year's holiday period last year. Another 500 persons were injured in the course of alcohol-related crashes.

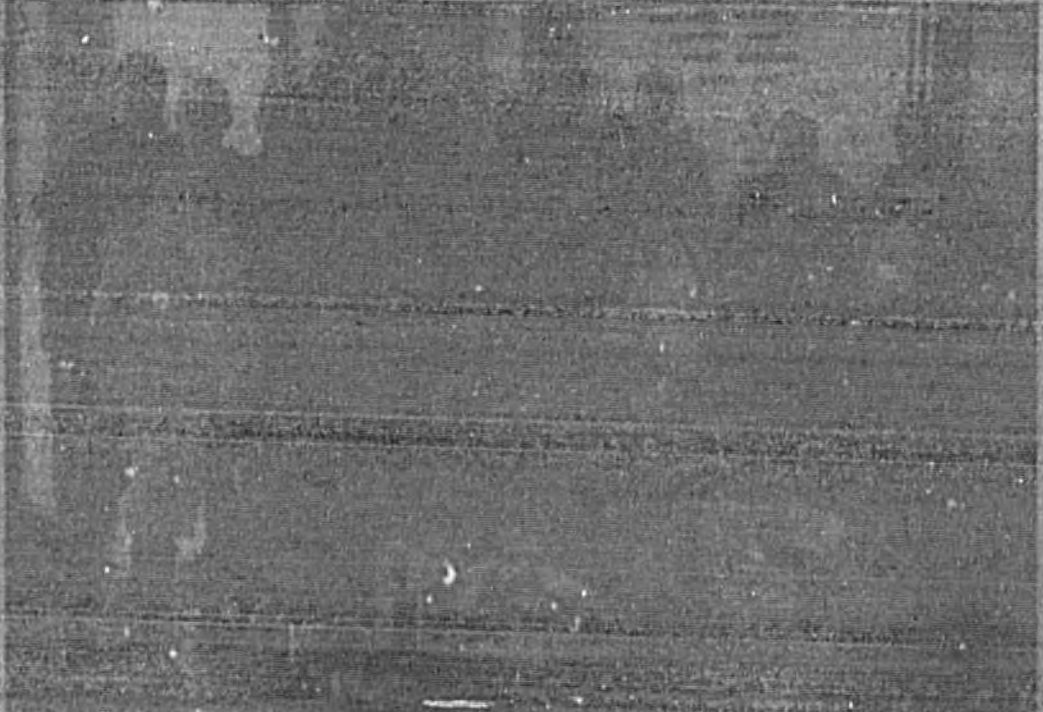

Tenants capitalizing on soft real estate market

With commercial vacancy rates in Central Florida high and showing no signs of improving any time soon, now is a great time to lease a tenant.

Paul A. Whiting of Creative Office Environments in Altamonte Springs, Fla., says the last three years "created opportunities across the board for commercial real estate leasing."

"Today's commercial real estate tenants have more leverage than at any time in the last five to 10 years and they are using that leverage to their advantage," says Whiting, whose 13-year-old company specializes in the moving and installation of office furniture and workstations for companies throughout the state.

Whiting says office occupants are aggressively renegotiating their lease renewals — even key and their lease expiration dates — in order to get the best deal from their landlords like new paint, carpeting and shorter lease periods.

"Face it, this is now a tenant's market," Whiting adds. "They hold the cards in a game of commercial poker and they know it. In today's lease market, tenants will only enter into a lease if it's sweet for the pot." Whiting adds, "It's not a bluff. It's good business."

The higher vacancy rates coupled with record low mortgage interest rates also have fueled a buying blitz by tenants, according to Whiting who says it's cheaper to own than it is to rent.

"Interest rates are so low right now that commercial property is a great buy," Whiting notes. "It makes for better business sense to take your rental dollars and have it build equity in building ownership."

He cites his own situation as a perfect illustration. Whiting is leasing a little more than 10,000 square feet in the Jostine Industrial Park off C.R. 427 in Altamonte Springs. His \$5,400 monthly rent would

easily support a comparable facility and a \$400,000 mortgage.

"And, yes, we are looking," he admits. "And while there is an uptick to the current market climate, there is also a deterrent that is keeping an impact on Whiting's company. Demand for new office furniture is way down, and, as a result, Creative Office and other high volume furniture stores have scaled back production."

"The market is flooded with used high quality furniture and work stations," he says. "Values are about 10 cents on the dollar. Until that used inventory is absorbed (12-24 months), demand for new furniture will continue to be low."

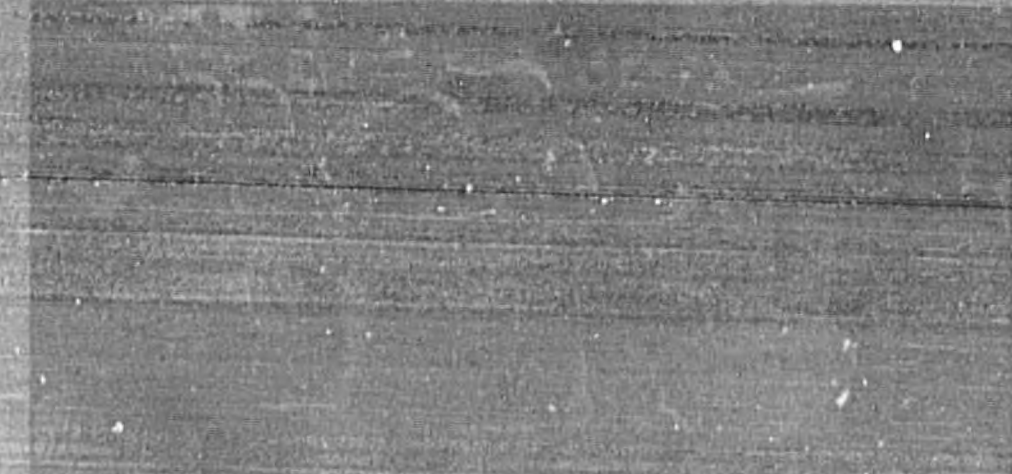

Catch and release in effect for Lake Toho

OCELA — If you catch a largemouth bass in Ocala County's Lake Toho, you're going to have to let it go.

The reason: The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wants to keep the price of largemouth bass fishing in Ocala County's Lake Toho at a reasonable level.

The FWC's largemouth bass fishing program was established in 1992 and has been successful in restoring the lake's fish population.

Beginning Jan. 6 and extending through Aug. 31, 2005, anyone catching a largemouth bass in Lake Toho is required by FWC executive order to release it immediately back into the lake. In addition, during that time period anglers will not be allowed to possess or transport largemouth bass in Lake Toho.

The lake boundary is considered to run from west of the Old Toho Highway bridge over Spindle Creek to the north Florida Water Management District.

FWC's water control structures on Lake Toho (at 20) are on the boundary of Lake Toho. Anglers are to use the water control structures (2-11) and boat dock at Spindle.

Only largemouth bass are allowed by this temporary regulation. Other species are not allowed. This includes hybrid sunfish, bluegill, and other species. The current regulation is a 25-Size Outdoors, Page 11.

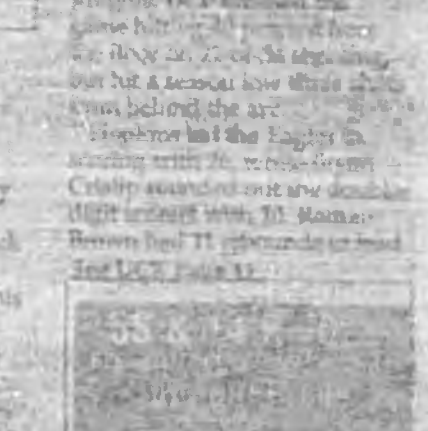

Deceide Warren scored 15 points, including a perfect 3-for-3 from three-point range, as the No. 14 ranked Mississippi State women's basketball team steamrolled UCF, 81-30, in the final game of the UCF Holiday Classic on Friday evening at UCF Arena.
Both squads got off to a slow start as the score-board read a 4-4 tie at 16:18 of the first half. A basket by MSU's Seneca Anderson at 15:07 jump-started a 16-4 run that included the three treys by Warren. Taking advantage of their 66.7% accuracy from outside the arc (6-for-9) and a seven-minute scoring drought by the Golden Knights (4-5), the Lady Bulldogs (8-1) took a 39-17 advantage at the half.
Freshman guard Shayla Smith hit the first shot of the second half before Mississippi State went on a 26-0 run. Freshman Shelby Weber was the first Golden Knight to hit a basket in over 12 minutes when she sank the second of two foul shots at 27:38. At 2:33, freshman guard LaShay King sank UCF's second field goal of the game - the first in 17 minutes - followed by a three-pointer by freshman forward Celeste Hudson to cut the lead to 72-28.

Allen had a career-high 20 points and added 10 boards for the first double-double of her career and Paige notched the sixth double-double of her career with 10 points and 10 rebounds.
Lindsey Pasquinzo, Lori Wild and Nicole Anaejionu each had a team-high eight points for Detroit.
In the first game of the evening, LaToya Thomas scored 22 points as No. 14 Mississippi State defeated Bethune-Cookman, 66-61.
After taking an 11-point advantage (20-9), MSU allowed BCC to earn its first lead of the contest with 31 seconds remaining in the first half on a layup by Latonya Reed before MSU's Tan White hit a three-pointer for a 32-30 Lady Bulldogs' advantage at the intermission.
Bethune-Cookman and Mississippi State played tight in the second half, keeping within four points of one another as the lead changed hands five times. With the score knotted at 52, MSU made a final bit to pull away on a 12-0 run and Thomas sank two-of-two shots from the foul line to insure the victory.
Four BCC players finished in double figures with Katie Clark pouring in a team-high 10 points. Lauren Foisthoit had a game high nine rebounds.
UCF resumes play on Tuesday, Dec. 31 when it hosts Lipscomb at UCF Arena. Tipoff is set for 3 p.m.

fish bag limit for panfish species (bluegill and redear sunfish), and a 25-fish bag limit for black crappie.

The reason we have included only largemouth bass in this temporary restriction is that historically anglers have targeted them more heavily during drawdowns than they have panfish, whose numbers generally remain abundant," said FWC fisheries biologist Marty Mann.

The goal of the drawdown and enhancement project is to improve fish and wildlife habitat by removing muck and undesirable plant communities - mainly cattail, pickerelweed and tussocks - and returning to the lake a hard, silt bottom. This type of bottom is what fish need to spawn and what desirable plants need to take root, which provide cover and food for fish.

Unfortunately, when lake levels are stabilized for flood control and not allowed to fluctuate, the lake bottom never gets a chance to dry out. As a result, plant and other organic materials decompose and create a thick layer of muck that prevents spawning and allows poor plant communities to become established.

To help reverse this, the FWC does periodic drawdowns, which are extended periods during which the lake levels are lowered to expose the area near the shoreline, and allow it to dry out. At the same time, contractors remove the muck using heavy equipment, and then plant the beneficial vegetation the fish and wildlife need.
"This lake will be a phenomenal place to fish this spring. But, we want to protect our wonderful largemouth bass fishery and ensure its presence for years to come," said Mann. "So, grab your fishing tackle and get to Lake Tohopekaliga this spring, but remember to recycle your largemouth bass."
