The Florida Ship Canal

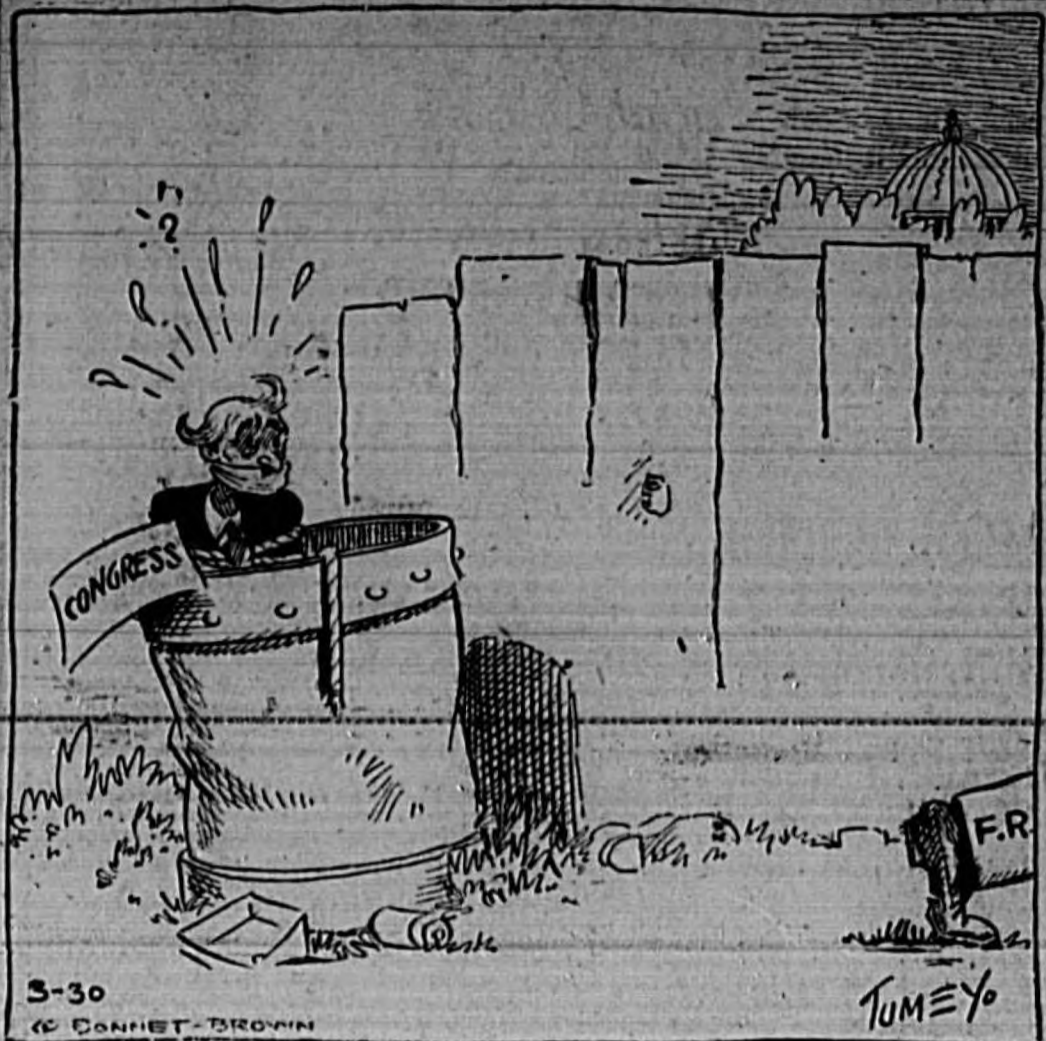

The Roosevelt farm relief measure which passed the House by a vote of 319 to 98 is being done over in the Senate. A completely reconstructed measure is expected to emerge which Roosevelt, Wallace, nor any of the House members will be able to recognize.

When Hitler came to power, the people and the government were in a state of chaos. He restored order and stability, but his policies led to the outbreak of World War II.

Altogether there are some half dozen routes suggested for the proposed canal, two of them touching Georgia and four entirely within northern Florida.

Route 2 would begin at Orange Park on the St. Johns river and end at Deadman's Bay on the Gulf.

Route 3, known as the Santa Fe route, would begin on the Atlantic side near Palatka on the St. Johns and end at Cedar Key.

Route 4 would be along the Ocklawaha and St. Johns rivers and run north of Ocala, ending south of Cedar Key.

Route 5 would be along the Ocklawaha and Withlacoochee rivers, ending south of Ocala.

According to reliable estimates, the project could be completed at a cost of around \$150,000,000. Some say the figure would be considerably under this.

While the Atlantic to the Gulf ship canal project is one that has been agitated much in recent years, the record shows that proposals for such a development extend as far back as George Washington's time.

In addition to saving some 800 miles on a round trip from the Gulf to the Atlantic the canal is expected to permit navigation of the distance in about 22 hours less time.

SANFORD, TWENTY YEARS AGO

A jolly party of young people enjoyed a pleasant car ride to Cameron City Friday evening and a delicious chicken pilau which an expert chef went out in the afternoon had prepared.

His work with the party led President Roosevelt to select him for the Governor-Generalship of the Philippine Islands.

His long hours in the library had awakened his interest in current affairs and he became a public worker soon after graduation.

The present Attorney-General earned part of his way through Yale from which he was graduated in 1901.

Mr. Cummings had a warm spot in his heart for the Yale Debating Society. He went at debating seriously and it was with real pleasure that he took part in the first Yale-Harvard debate.

Mr. Cummings' career came to a close in San Francisco. His oration was an elaborate exposition of the war-time record of the Democratic party, a panygeric

of Woodrow Wilson and a stanch defense of the League of Nations. Mr. Cummings was mentioned as a possible nominee for president that year but the convention finally nominated James M. Cox.

Steadily, Mr. Cummings has risen in the legal profession. From corporation counsel of Stamford and legal representative of Fairfield county, he became a prominent member of the New York bar and was recently chairman of the State Bar Association.

Mr. Cummings has a reputation among his friends as an "able citizen" and a "straight shooter." He has always been in sympathy with the liberal ideals which he supported along with Woodrow Wilson.

WANT AND FEAR HANG HEAVY ON SOVIET CITIZENS

New Passport Regulations Are Working Hardship On People

MOSCOW—Apprehension and want hang like a shadow over many homes, in city and village alike, throughout the Soviet Union recently.

With the new passport regulations, something akin to the pale that was established for Jews under the Tsarist regime is being enforced on the entire population of large cities, preventing free movement from place to place. This passport decree requires every adult town dweller over the age of 18 to register and receive a passport. The registration is to be carried out under the G. P. U. state police organization.

Speakers, former kulaks and their immediate relatives, remnants of aristocratic families, or any persons who are undesirable in the eyes of the authorities, will be required to leave the city and go somewhere else. The meager stocks of food will not be shared with them. Peasants who fled from the villages to neighboring towns will probably also be forced to go back.

Then there are thousands of persons who in the last year or two have run away from the provinces where conditions are much harder and food scarcer and have come to Moscow. Most of these, who live at present in uncertainty and apprehension of the future, will have to leave.

Then there are the office employees who are being discharged in large numbers and are now actually without employment. Under the new regulations they are deprived of their food cards (since the latter are issued only in the place of employment) and have to buy their bread on the open market where prices are prohibitive.

Nor do many housewives and dependents to whom food cards were formerly granted, now receive any. While no figures are available, some think that about 500,000 persons will be required to leave Moscow and that in the months of greater Moscow residents of Greater Moscow received food cards while 700,000 could not obtain them.

So much for the cities. In the villages, government measures have been of a more tragic character. There, kulaks and their followers who, according to Joseph Stalin, "are no longer peasants, saintly people... working as bookkeepers, storekeepers, assistants of all sorts in collective farms," have been accused of having organized among the peasants sabotage on a large scale. Grain fields have been neglected; they were neither plowed nor planted on time; they have become choked with weeds and animal parasites of every description.

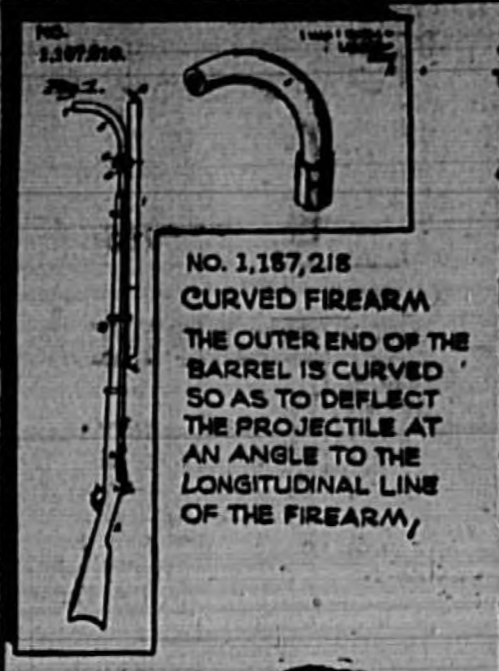
Traffic of grain, though in some cases punishable by the extreme penalty, have assumed a mass character. State grain collections have proceeded most unsatisfactorily. Some Communists in charge of village work have either deserted and fled from their posts or, worse still, sided with the peasants and against the government.

Such conditions are to a certain degree characteristic of most grain regions, but they are especially prevalent in the North Caucasus, formerly one of the most fertile districts of Russia, inhabited chiefly by Cossacks.

Because the land here is so rich and fertile, collectivization was pushed by the government at a faster pace than in other parts of the country. With the result that about 90 percent of the peasant households were collectivized through the union is 60 percent. In the process some excesses were inevitable, and many peasants were debilitated.

The Peoples' Commissariat of Dagestan Province, a republic in the Caucasus, printed a speech by Mr. Shebel, secretary of the Communist Party in the North Caucasus. Mr. Shebel, discussing government officials, said that some villages were punished by being completely deserted, as it were, by the population (such as Sar-

QUAKE ATTENDED BY MANY ACTS OF HUMAN KINDNESS

Countless Incidents Of Self Sacrifice Have Been Revealed

LOS ANGELES—It may require an earthquake to start it, but the gold that can be mined from human character pours forth with added bounty during an emergency.

This was shown by countless incidents here recently when the common disaster of an earthquake made thousands of residents forget self and personal security in order to help others less fortunate than themselves. By concrete examples, they proved that the so-called "first law of nature," that of self-preservation, is not necessarily operative in human experience.

For instance, there were the telephone operators who continued at work in buildings shaken threatenly by tremor after tremor during the night that followed the major shock Mar. 10.

One young woman's devotion to duty was so great, and her fear so small, that she stayed on the job continuously for 24 hours by moving from place to place as she was dismissed at the end of a shift.

Then there was the telegraph operator who was receiving press messages from a newspaper correspondent when a strong shock rocked the tall buildings in which they worked. "Let's hurry and get this on the wire before something happens," he begged, resisting the impulse to run from his seat.

Acts of kindness that followed the earthquake almost overwhelmed the suffering communities. They ranged from the messages of sympathy and offer of aid sent by President Roosevelt to the earnest efforts of an elevator operator in an office building who spent his holiday searching for some homeless family to share his modest dwelling.

Hundred of citizens left their staid and personal comforts that evening to search among the twisted wreckage and tottering

walls for the injured, submitting themselves to possible dangers without hesitation. Thousands more, members of the American Legion, reported at their posts and went immediately to help preserve order and security.

Workers agreed to make repairs upon houses so that the owners could enter them as early as possible, and were known to have commenced their work without assurance that the owner could pay their wages. "We'll do the job now and talk about pay later," they said.

Hundreds of families threw their homes open to victims of the disaster without reservation, and asked that they be given an opportunity to assist in such a manner. Owners of undamaged apartments and hotels made their vacant quarters available without cost to sufferers.

Structural engineers in the community, through their trade association, offered to aid by estimating the damage to homes and recommending plans for rehabilitation. An exhibit of building materials also offered free advice.

Requests for money to support the immense relief program that became an immediate necessity followed upon donations that arrived voluntarily.

The Salvation Army and the American Red Cross waded into a tremendous relief program without delay, and their appeals for aid have met with response.

Assistance given to Tokyo after the earthquake of 1923 was not forgotten.

Anticipated state and federal funds for the task of rehabilitation have brought cheer to those who have lost little or much, and who look forward to rebuilding their homes and possessions. But cheeriest of all is observed to be the person who had adopted a policy of helping others to the limit of ability while disregarding thoughts of personal gain or loss.

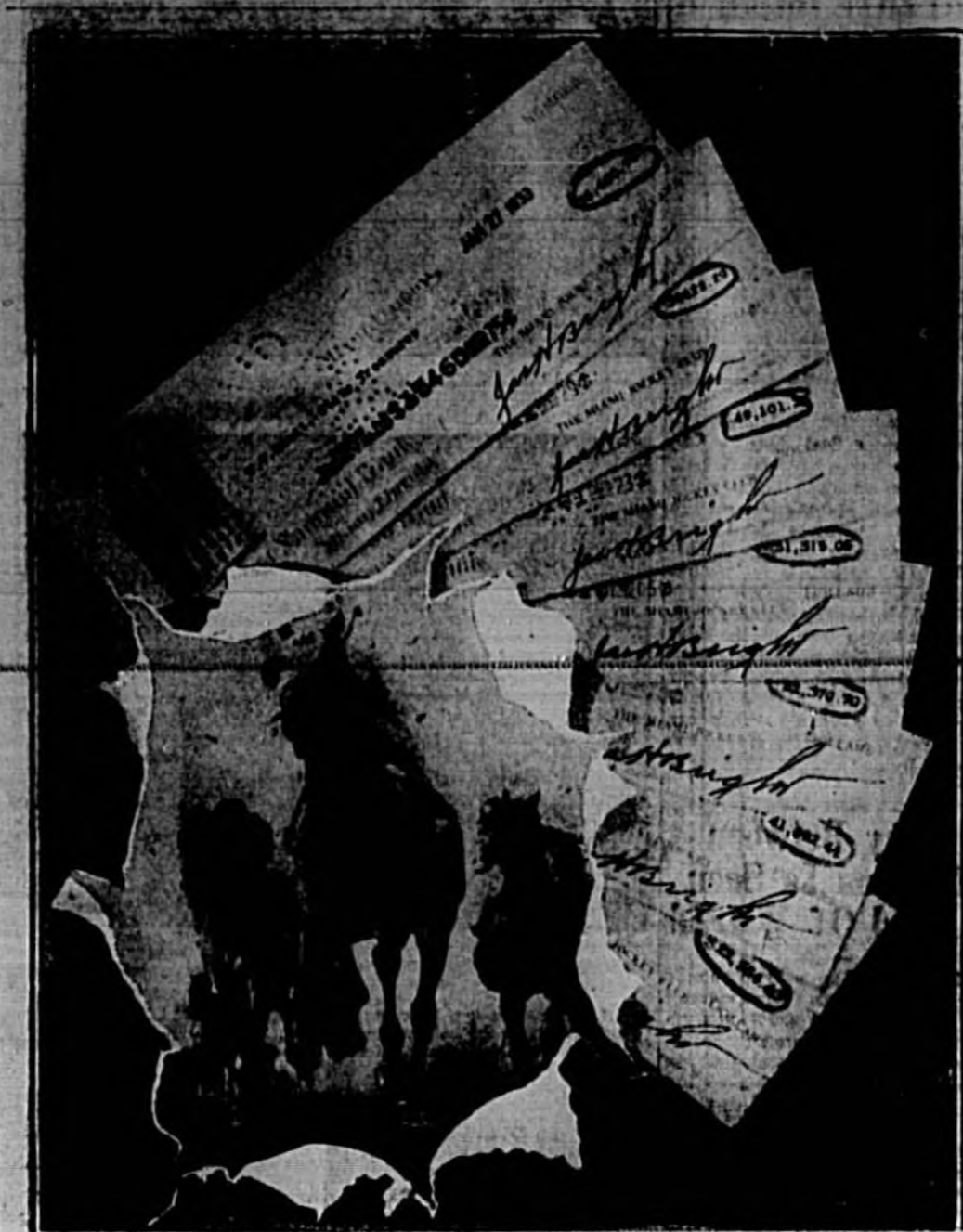

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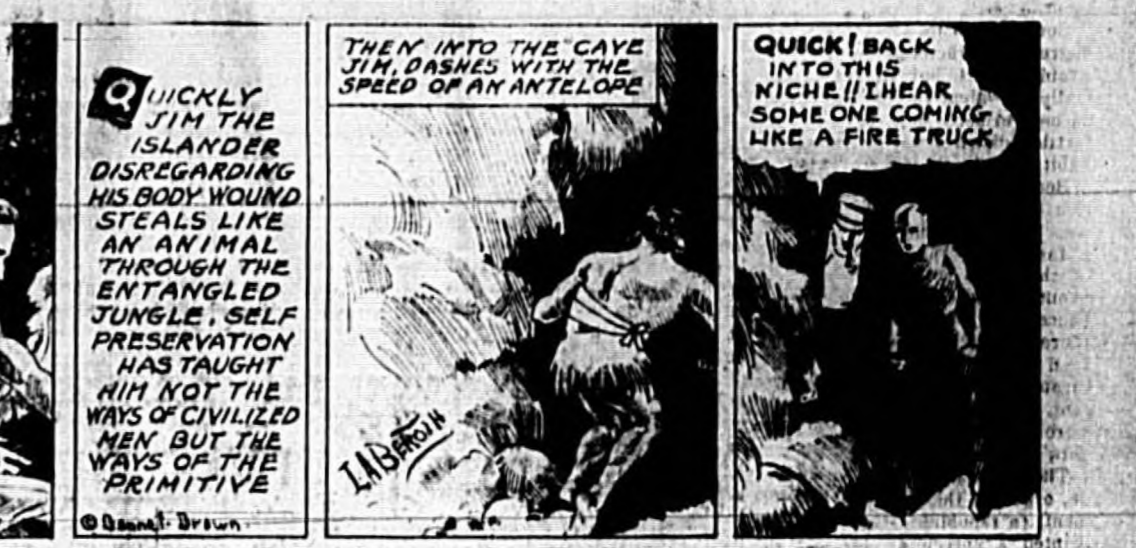
