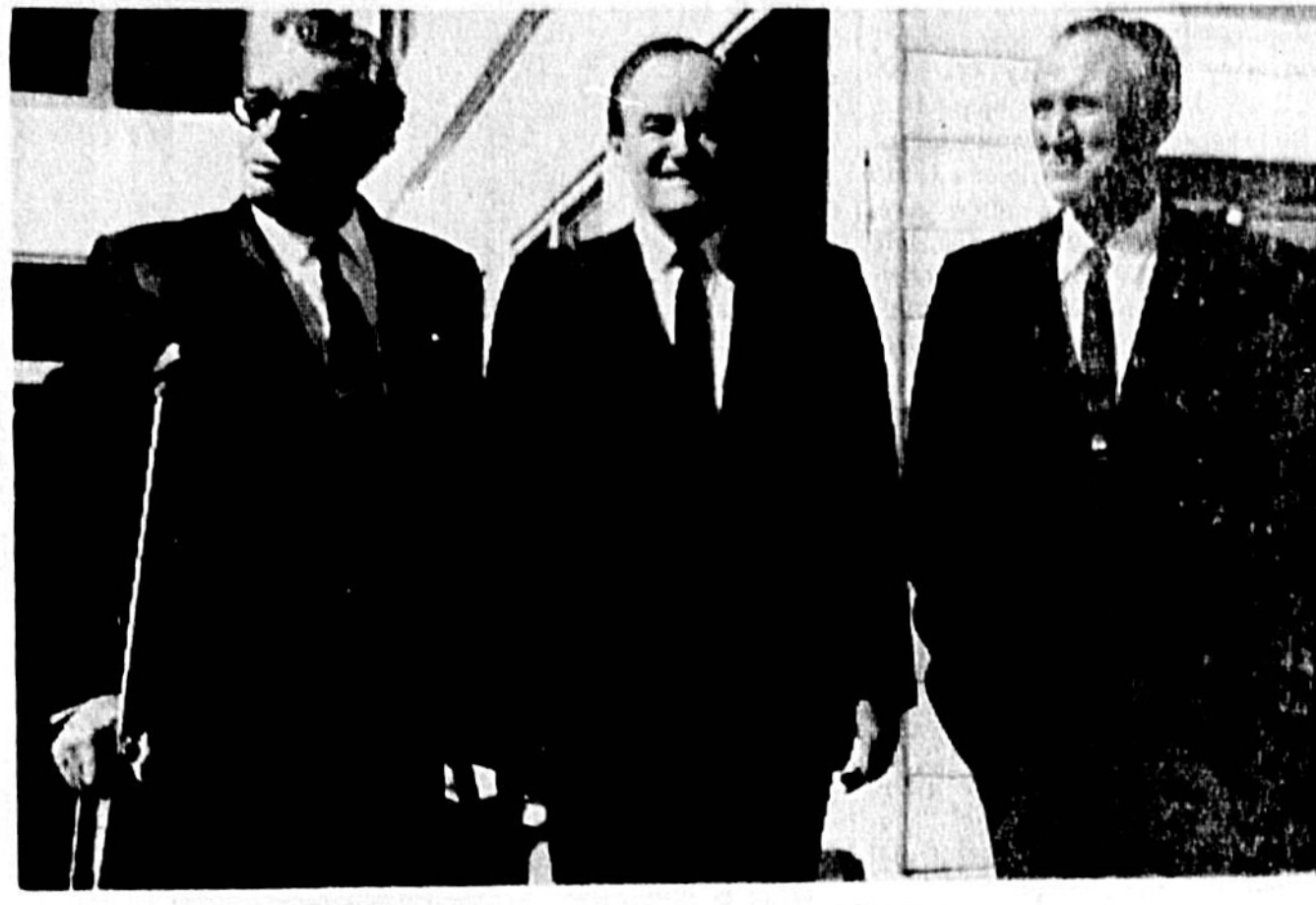


Veep Says 'Hello' To County

Vice President Hubert Humphrey and Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Montana) arrived in the vice president's plane, Air Force II, to pick up Sen. Everett Dirksen, (R-Illinois) senate minority leader.

The three were on their way to The Little White House in Johnson City, Tex., reportedly to talk with President Lyndon B. Johnson concerning budget matters.

Sen. Dirksen, walking with crutches since his hip injury, has been spending a few days at his DelRay home. He was accompanied to the NAS airstrip by Mrs. Dirksen who did not plan to go to Texas.

However, Mrs. Humphrey and Mrs. Mansfield were aboard the plane with their husbands and will visit with Mrs. Johnson in Texas. The three ladies chatted together as they waited for Vice President Humphrey to place a long distance call.

Both Humphrey and Mansfield said this was their first visit to Sanford, but "this is beautiful country down here."

Sen. Dirksen declared he was going to get them both "back down for some fishing." Dirksen said he hoped to get back to DelRay around Dec. 12 to stay until the first of the year.

The ninth candidate for the three open seats on the Casselberry City Council qualified this morning. Deadline for filing qualifying petitions for the Dec. 5 municipal elections is 5 p.m. today.

Candidates are Arthur Leggo, Edward Lunn and Dr. Eugene Ellis, the incumbents, and Homer (Bud) Scott, Robert Underwood and Jack Bushor, former police chief.

Running for the office of mayor in Longwood are A. R. Lomman, and H. H. Haynie. Unopposed so far for the office of clerk is Mrs. Omie R. Stomate, incumbent, and Roy Stomate, incumbent, tax collector.

Deadline for qualifying and voter registration is Saturday at noon. However, registration books will be open during extended hours of 7 to 9 p.m. today. Election is Dec. 6.

Five candidates have qualified and are expected to make a lively race for the three open seats on the Oviedo Council.

In addition to the incumbents, W. H. Martin, Kirby Bucklewe and Rex Clonts, Robert Cameron, who had run in the primaries in May for the County Commission seat of Oviedo Mayor M. L. Gary, and C. D. Thompson have thrown their hats into the ring.

Thanksgiving 'Slaughter' At 200

Florida accidents claimed at least 11 persons, including four members of a Miami family during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

The three-car Miami wreck also left two members of the family in critical condition. Killed were Arthur La Hay, 38, his two children, 6-month-old Allen and 8-year-old Kevin, and the man's brother, William La Hay, 52, all of Miami.

Critically injured were Arthur La Hay's wife, 33-year-old Joan, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Lena Frederick, 78, of Jacksonville.

The nation's death toll in traffic accidents edged toward the 200 mark today in the early part of the extended Thanksgiving weekend. But the total appeared near the normal figure for a non holiday week.

The count of highway fatalities, which started at 6 p.m. last night Wednesday, was 194, including 38 youths under the age of 18.

The tabulation ends at midnight Sunday, covering a period of 102 hours.

During a recent non holiday four-day period, an Associated Press survey, made for comparative purposes, showed a total of 546 traffic deaths.

However, the National Safety Council did not make an advance estimate of highway deaths for the long weekend.

The council said it considers the Thanksgiving period as basically a home holiday which does not involve as much driving as other major holidays.

Traffic deaths hit a record high of 615 during the Thanksgiving weekend last year. Since the AP started tabulating highway deaths for the holiday eight years ago the lowest total was 442 in 1960.

Deaths in traffic accidents in the first nine months this year totaled 38,106, a 10 per cent increase over the corresponding period in 1965. The National Safety Council has said that last year's record toll of 49,000 deaths may be surpassed this year.

Military Cemeteries Filling Up

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 40 million persons—more than one-fifth of the U. S. population—are eligible for burial in a national cemetery.

These are military personnel, veterans, their wives and minor children; and their number has been rising steadily each year.

Yet, there are only about one million gravesites available in the Army's national cemeteries.

A controversy has arisen about them on what to do—whether to do anything at all, or whether to do anything at all, or whether to do anything at all.

The question arose recently when the families of certain young men killed in Viet Nam wanted to bury them in national cemeteries near their homes. But there were no available gravesites in these cemeteries.

In Congress, some members urged an extension of the present system or enlargement of a specific cemetery. Various veterans organizations campaigned to get an enlarged system.

The estimated cost of expanding the present system so there would be at least one national cemetery in each state would exceed \$2 billion for development, exclusive of the cost of land, the Army said.

Student Tells Of Red Prison Life

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — In the stark, stone prison cell behind the Iron Curtain, a light bulb was the enemy. Van Altena was armed with an automatic pistol. He was sentenced to eight years.

In prison, he said, survival hinged on mental discipline. "You have time to do a lot of thinking," he said. "You learn to control your thoughts. I spent days mentally pursuing a single subject."

Van Altena, a sophomore at the University of Wisconsin, spent 17 months in prison in East Germany for trying to smuggle a mother and child through the Berlin wall.

Van Altena, 23, a dairy farm's son from Milton Junction, Wis., was arrested with an automatic pistol. He was sentenced to eight years.

An Indonesian, beaten during questioning, slipped Van Altena cigarette papers covered with handwriting. Van Altena said he smuggled them out of prison on his body and turned them over to the State Department, but the Indonesian's fate is not known.

The State Department negotiated Van Altena's release last month. Guards were everywhere. Signal lights prevented the transfer of more than one prisoner at a time in the hallways.

"I knew I was free but it didn't soak in right away," he said. He left prison 4 pounds lighter and nervous. Seventeen months of bread and soup left him with a bad leg.
