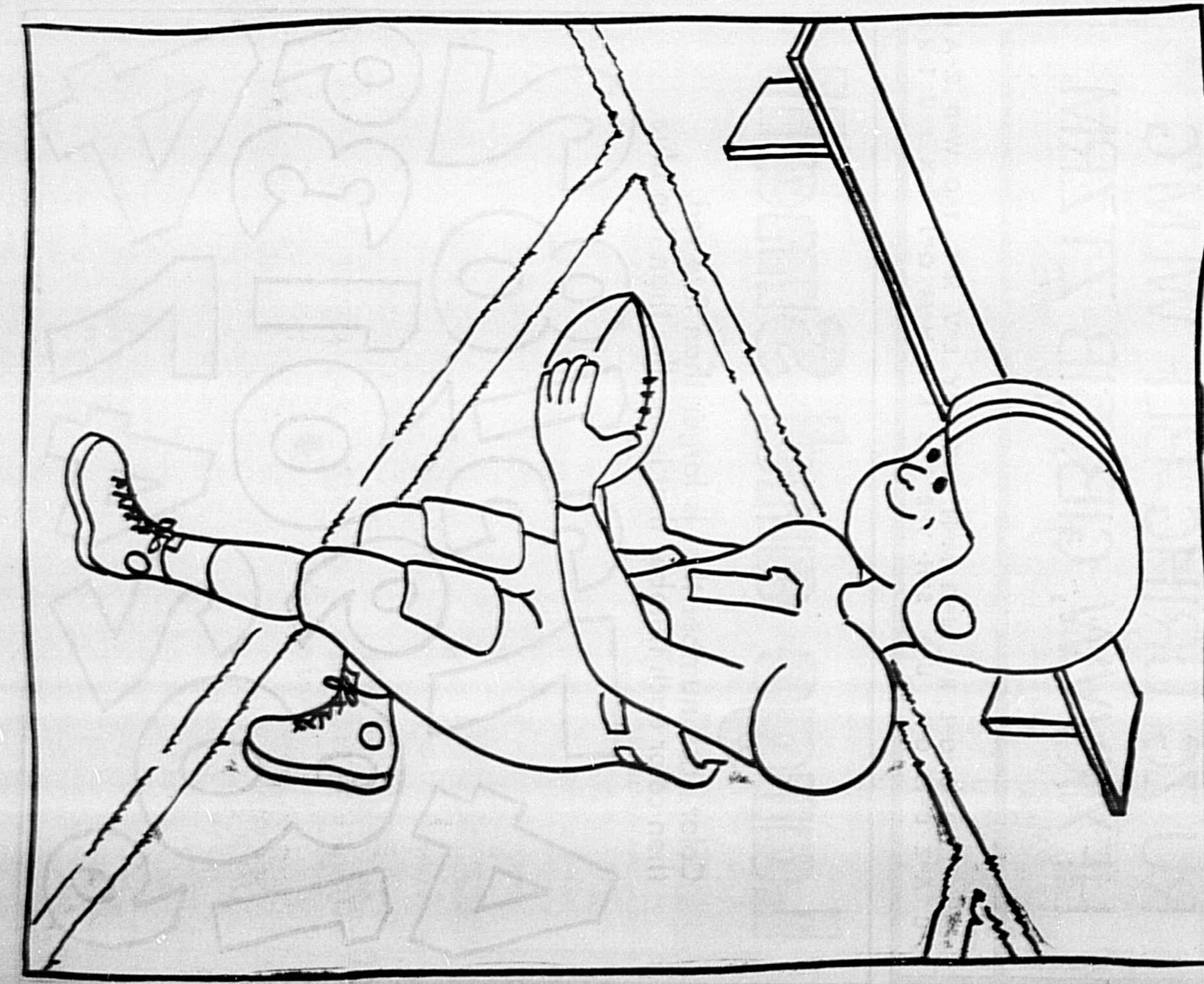

### Judiciary Change Seen In Seminole

Law enforcement and the courts figured prominently in a hearing by the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation. Creation of a separate office of juvenile judge received the unanimous approval of the delegation. Roger Berry, president-elect of the Seminole County Bar Association, told the delegation the creation of the separate office was recommended because the present judge wears "many hats."

Sen. John Ducker questioned the new constitutional amendment to be voted on next November, in which the new juvenile judge also would become a circuit judge.

However, Rep. William Gorman contended the matter "probably will go to the House judiciary committee and even if the issue passes would take one to three years to implement."

Juvenile Judge Wallace Hall told the delegation there has been a substantial increase in the case load of this office; that in 1968 there was an average of 50 cases per month, whereas there has been 150 cases per month in the past six months. Judge Hall said there were 1,500 juvenile court case referrals during the past year, and there was not enough individual attention accorded to these due to the "physical lack of time."

Berry also made a presentation relative to removing the county prosecutor from the fee system and placing the office on a budget system and salary. Berry said the office is becoming a full time job.

Also presented at the next hearing is a bill for creation of magistrate judges drafted by Mack Cleveland Jr. The bill will increase the trial jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace over the present limit which is a misdemeanor carrying a maximum fine of \$100.

## 'Mr. Florida' Funeral Today

**BARTOW (AP)** — Dignitaries arrived in this quiet Central Florida community today for the funeral of its most famous native son — retired Sen. Spessard Lindsey Holland who died Saturday at the age of 79.

Holland's body lay in state from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the First Methodist Church his father helped found. Among those expected at the 4 p.m. funeral service were Gov. Reubin Askew, who postponed a trip to a Southern Governor's Conference in Atlanta, and Sen. Lawton Chiles, the youthful Democratic friend and protégé who replaced Holland in Washington.

Hundreds more were expected at Wildwood Cemetery where Holland is to be buried, near his mother and father under spreading oaks in the town where he began his political climb 50 years ago.

"Mr. Florida" to many, Holland died of a heart attack at his home a few blocks from the spot where he started his public career as a Polk County prosecuting attorney in 1919.

He won a county judgeship the following year, served two decades as a state senator in the 1930s and 40s, won a term as governor from 1941-45 and was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1946 — a job that was his personal fiefdom until failing health prompted him to step down last January.

In the Senate, Holland usually sat slumped over in his seat and appeared to have dozed off. But he startled more than one Senate-floor speaker by suddenly sitting up.

## Swofford Advocates: Ax County Government

**ALTAMONTE SPRINGS** — Lawrence Swofford has won reelection without opposition to his sixth consecutive term as mayor of this city.

Incumbent Councilmen Keith Nixon and Mrs. Helen Keyser also are unopposed as the qualifying period ended Sunday evening, according to City Clerk Jane Richards.

The Dec. 7 municipal election will be only a formality to confirm the win.

Swofford, active in politics in Seminole County for the past 23 years, has contested in a total of 24 elections for county and municipal governments. This is his 20th victory, but the first time he has been an unopposed candidate.

The mayor entered politics first in 1948, when he ran unsuccessfully for a council seat in the city. In the summer of 1951 during a special election he won a council seat for a split term and was successful in December of that year winning a full term.

Swofford became mayor in December of 1953 and served in the position for six years before suffering defeat in 1959. He returned to the mayor's office in 1961 and has served continuously since that time. In addition, he won terms on the Board of County Commissioners in 1956 and in 1964.

Nixon will be beginning his sixth consecutive term in office also in January. Winning an election unopposed is not a new thing for Nixon, however. This is the fourth time he has been elected without contest in the city.

Mrs. Keyser first entered politics in 1970 and was elected unopposed that year. Councilmen Dan Dorfman and Thomas Radloff won their seats unopposed last year.

He said citizens are disenchanted with county government and unable to receive services. He pointed to the large number of annexations being requested of the six cities in the county as an indication of this dissatisfaction.

Speaking of CALNO (Council of Local Governments), Swofford said he is strongly opposed to the inclusion of the county government in the organization.

Swofford credited his victory to citizen satisfaction with the job being done by the city government.

Preexisting things to come in Seminole County politics Swofford said petitions will be circulated by citizens, within the next few weeks, to require the County Commission to place on the ballot in 1972 the question of abolition of county government in favor of city government throughout Seminole.

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## Commission To Study Redistricting Plan

Redistricting of the Seminole County Commission will be one of the main topics at tomorrow's County Commission meeting, scheduled for its usual 4 p.m. starting time.

Camilla Bruce has been working in an effort to come up with a redistricting plan which would be presented to all commissioners. A decision on whether the plan will be accepted is expected to come tomorrow.

Also on the agenda is a report from the county engineer on the inspection of the Seminole Industrial Park drainage.

Chairman Greg Drummond has reports due on the federal wage and price freeze effect on county services as well as one on Topless Go-Go entertainment operations.

Another report due tomorrow will come from County Planner David Farr on parks application submission.

Six public hearings also are on the agenda:

A request for rezoning from A1 agriculture to R-3, multiple family, of a parcel of land located on the west side of Wekiva Road, north of SH 434.

John R. Smith is asking that property at 284 Grapeville Avenue and 22nd Street be rezoned from R-1 residential to C-1 commercial.

Olaf Carlson requests a rezoning from A1 agriculture to R-1 residential on a parcel of land in the Goldenrod section on the north side of Citrus Avenue.

A rezoning request of A1 agriculture to C-2 commercial for property on the southeast corner of U.S. 17-92 and Onora Road has been made by Kim-zay Realty Corporation.

Howard Judkins has made an appeal against the Board of Adjustment section for variance in an A1 agriculture zone for utility structure from 7 1/2 feet to rear and side street property line between Fourth and Fifth Streets in Sylvan Lakes.

The public hearings will start at 7 p.m.

### Trucker Held For Perjury

Gary Allen Schappold, 34, of 236 South Dixie Highway, Casselberry was jailed Saturday on a perjury charge involving a narcotics trial held last week in Circuit Court. Bond for Schappold is set at \$1,000 and the unemployed truck driver still remains in jail.

The charge was filed following Schappold's testimony as a defense witness in the trial of Jimmy Penny. Penny was convicted by a six-man Circuit Court jury on two counts of sale and possession of narcotics. Penny was remanded to custody pending presentence investigation.

Schappold is accused of giving false testimony that Penny did not sell marijuana to undercover agents at Ka-La Apartments, Post Track Road, Longwood, on May 21.

In other court action, the state noble pressed (dropped) charges against Darren Durrant, who was charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit petty larceny and in the case of Carolyn Touchton, who was charged with a worthless check.

Circuit Judge Dominick Salti returned a directed judgment of acquittal in the case of Edward Kallinoski, who was charged with buying, receiving or aiding in the concealment of stolen property.

At the conclusion of the trials last week, Judge Salti noted there were 14 defendants in 30 cases, and that all were completed. "This is a pretty good week," he remarked in anybody's book." Judge Salti contended.

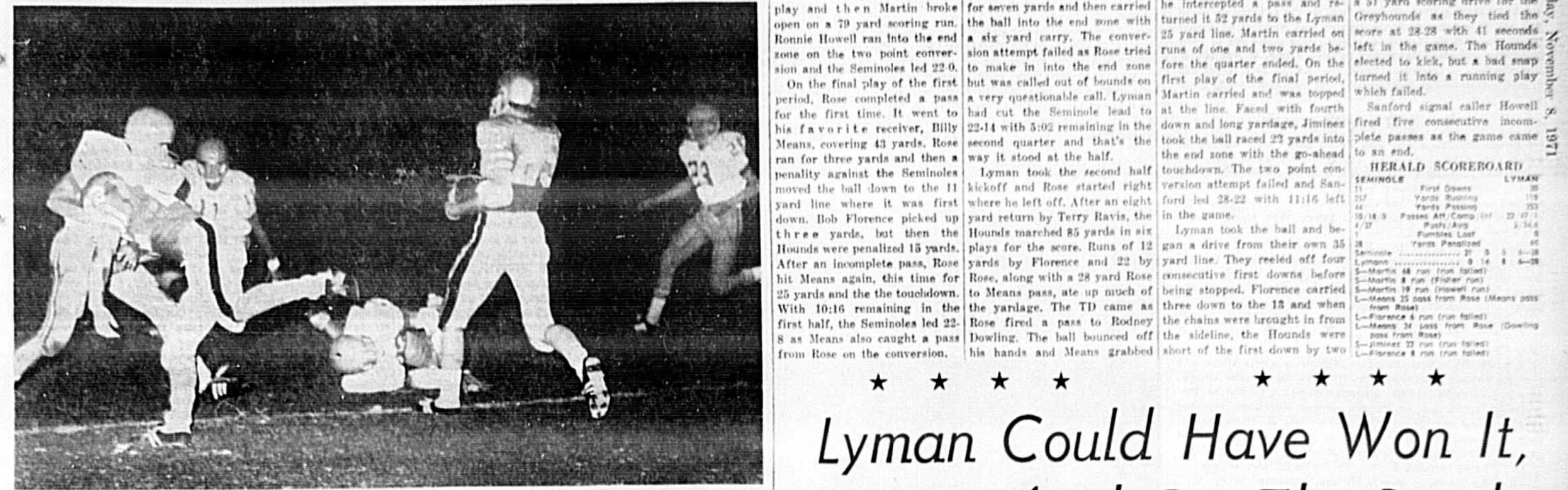

# The Game Will Never Be The Same Taylor Shoots 150 In Golf Tournament

I don't know how I ever got talked into it. Playing golf that I was one of the 33 that took off Sunday morning at Walt Disney World, participating in "Walt Disney World's Last Annual Sports Reporters 18 Mouse-Hole Yak and Hak Golf Fiasco." I was also one of the very few that accepted the invitation without knowing how to play golf.

I must admit I got in a little practice last week. I spent Thursday afternoon at the driving range, receiving instruction from Herald Sports Writer Herky Kueh. Then I received some more instructions as I toured nine holes of the Mayfair Country Club, compliments of the management.

It appears that coach Tom Perrin didn't care whether or not he got a write up about Friday night's game since the writer was hired by the school. He was assisted by Dallas Brown and Ronnie Howell of Sanford, who came out of their huddle to assist him in getting to the sideline. It was one of the rare acts of kindness seen on the football field, especially in such a bitterly contested game as the Seminole-Lyman rivalry.

It would like to bring to public attention a sports article and a sports column both written by Gary Taylor for the Herald, Monday, November 1, 1971, appearing on pages 18 and 20, respectively. In the text of the more-or-less objectively reported article on Seminole High School's upset loss to Bishop Moore, there were reported many key turnovers and mistakes in the game. Summarily, they are as follows:

- (1) Fumble by Don Reynolds, approached this writer before the game, informing me I would have to be on the Lyman side. When questioned why, he replied, "Coach Perrin doesn't want you on the Sanford side. After all, he runs the place." I'm beginning to wonder who runs the school.
- (2) Fumble by Cliff Martin, blocked by the Hornets.
- (3) Fumble by Cliff Martin on the Hornet one yard line, recovered by the Hornets.
- (4) Bishop Moore's first down resulting from Seminole having twelve men on the field.
- (5) A Ronnie Howell pass intercepted.
- (6) Fumble by Mark Carli on the Bishop Moore eleven, recovered by the Hornets.

It appears that Gary Taylor didn't read his own write-up of the game. On the next page in his sports column, he intimated in very ominous tones that had Brent Carli quit, he would have won the game. I pose this question to you, Mr. Taylor: "Do you have a crystal ball or did you just try to second-guess Coach Perrin?" Of the six points you list above, I only see one turnover by Howell. How is it that you single him out as the player that should have been replaced? Do I notice a hint of unprofessionalism?

You pointed out the fact that this game was a "low point in quarterbacking for the Seminoles." Somehow you failed to notice the low point for Seminole punting (average of only 26.8 yards) and ball handling (three fumbles, lost all in crucial yards). Howell's punting, while it certainly wasn't his situation, was more than once right on the money, only to slip through the hands of the receiver.

The loss to Bishop Moore was not Howell's loss as you infer, it was the team's loss. If you are going to blame Howell for the loss, perhaps you would like to give him credit for the five spectacular plays the team has chalked up. Could it be that you are judging Ronnie Howell on something besides his ability on the football field? If Ronnie, as you say, leaves something to be desired as a quarterback, I think you leave much more to be desired as a sports writer - namely, OBJECTIVITY!!!

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# Bald Eagle's Nest Undisturbed Audubon Society Lauds Developer

CASSELLBERRY — Harold Scott, executive director of the Florida Audubon Society is pleased to sing the praises of land developer, Richard Bond.

Bond, several months ago, while walking through his 1,100-acre tract on which the planned development, Sterling Park, is to be built, discovered an inhabited bald eagle nest. He contacted the Audubon Society for assistance in saving the eagle while continuing the development.

"We are delighted with the way he has responded," Scott said of Bond. "He has been a pleasure to work with. We are willing to work at any time with a responsible developer."

Although the law requires only that he not cut down the tree which houses the nest, Bond has set aside the 650 feet radius asked by the Audubon Society. The land set aside is some 22 acres and an additional buffer zone made up of the golf course. Through this measure the eagle's food sources should not be disturbed.

According to a study done by National Geographic, the eagle will travel 80 miles for food, most of which will come from the ocean. The eagle migrates in the winter but will return to raise a family in the spring. His wing spread is a span of six-to-eight feet.

The planned development of Sterling Park is bounded on the northeast by Camelot subdivision, on the west and south by Summeret, reaches to Red Bug and Tuskwilla Roads. Some 432 of the 1,100 acres will be devoted to single family houses in the \$30,000 to \$50,000 price range; 104 to patio homes, 57 to apartments, 21 to commercial and 56 acres to be set aside for two elementary and one junior high school.

### Pathologist Battle Breaks Out Anew

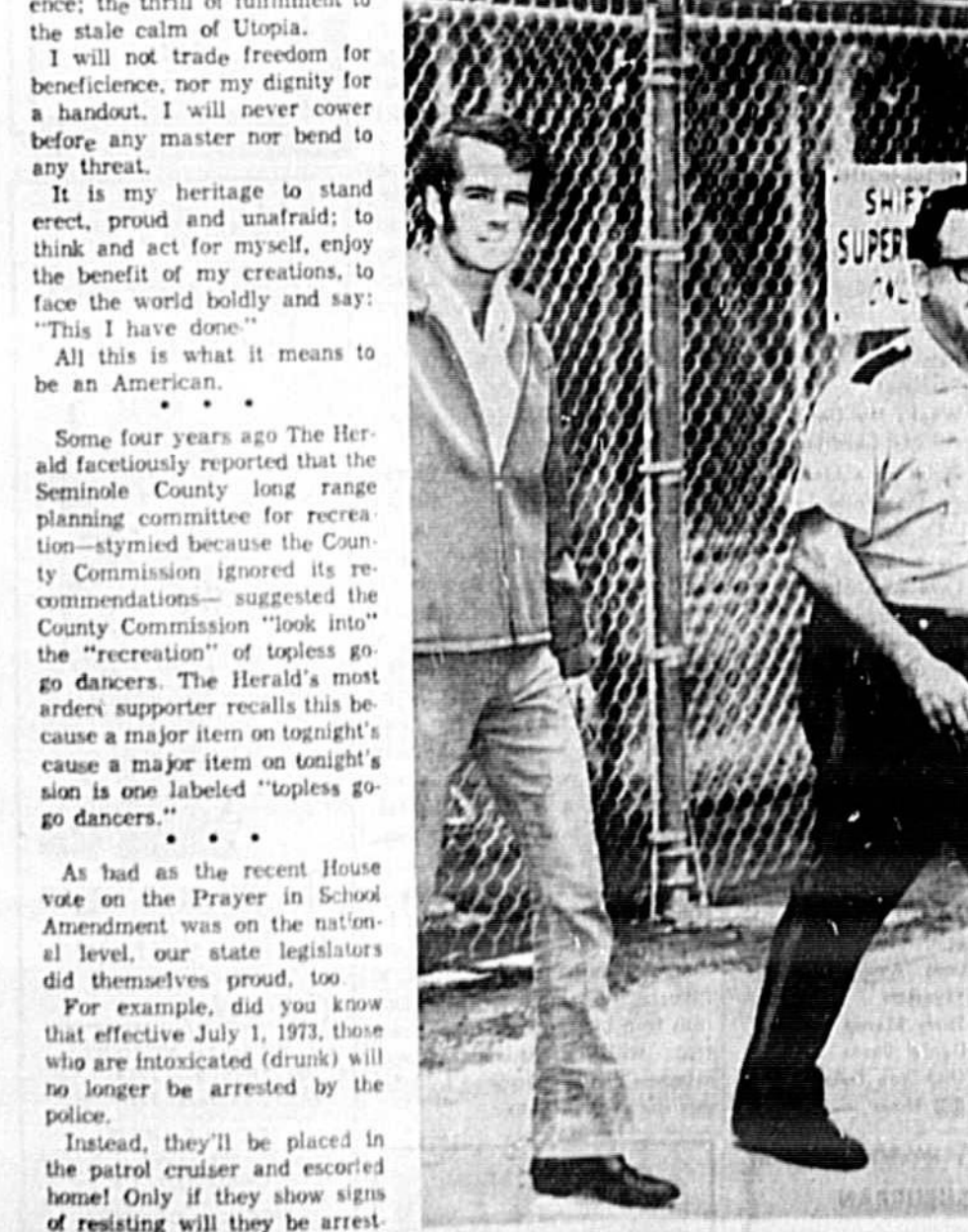
