However, Rep. William Gorman contended the matter "probably will go to the House judiciary committee and even if the issue passes would take one to three years to implement."

# 'Mr. Florida' Funeral Today

BARTOW (AP) - Dignitaries arrived in this quiet Central Florida community today for the funeral of its most famous native son - retired Sen. Spessard Lindsey Holland who died Saturday at the age of 79.

Holland's body lay in state from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the First Methodist Church his father helped found, Among those expected at the 4 p.m. funeral service were Gov. Reubin Askew, who postponed a trip to a Southern Governor's Conference in Atlanta, and Sen. Lawton Chiles, the youthful Democratie friend and protege who replaced Holland in Washington,

Hundreds more were expected at Wildwood Cemetery where Holland is to be buried, near his mother and father under spreading oaks in the town where he began his political climb 50

"Mr. Florida" to many, Holand died of a heart attack at his home a few blocks from the spot where he started his public career as a Polk County pro-

He won a county judgeship the fol lowing year, served two decades as a state senator in the 1930s and 40s, won a term as governor from 1941-45 and was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1946 -a job that was his personal fiefdom until failing health prompted him to

step down last January. In the Senate, Holland usually sat slumped over in his seat and appeared to have dozed off. But he startled more than one Senate-floor speaker by sud-







If history has value as a guide there is somening to be learned by all nations on this anniversary date of the great stock market crash of 1929 and the subsequent Great Depression of the In all probability enough safe-guards have

been built into the economic structure of the United States of America to prevent another economic cataclysm of such jarring proportions,

The period deserving study, we believe, is the post Oct. 29, 1929, years. The simple lesson of those years is that no major nation of the world is an economic island.

When the United States experienced its economic earthquake, so did every other nation of the world. By the same token, when the United States experiences an economic setback today, the shock also is felt around the world.

In 1929 we thought the answer would be simple. By building a tariff wall against imports, we reasoned, we would provide the shelter behind which we could recover. The result was passage of the Hawley-Smoot Act of 1930. Together with the protectionist Ford-McCumber Act of 1922 it effectively shut out foreign competition. Hindsight shows us that such short-sighted

protectionism raised prices for consumers, encouraged marginal industries to survive and set off a trade war that crippled all nations. Not until three decades later, when serious

tariff reductions began, did we experience the

Today we have learned that the answer to recovery is not artificial barriers but an increase in productivity, competition and free trade - or have we?

V. Garay, pathologist, was distributed to trustees. He alleged in his letter to Drs. William Rape, Thomas Largen and Arthur Nesmith, grievance committee members, that Dr. Fred Ionata, former hos-

> pital pathologist, who was displaced by Dr. Garay, had come to his office "talking in an unethical, insulting and disrespectful way." The pathologist wrote Dr. Ionata argued over his rights to get his tissue work out the same time as he

Dr. Ionata, although not the official hospital pathologist, is on the hospital's medical staff and, as such, is entitled to the same hospital privileges as other hospital staff members.

Dr. Garay said this was the second time this has appened since he has been working at the hospital. I think it is necessary to take some measure in order avoid future repetition of this improper and unpleasant situation," the letter stated.

NORTH ORLANDO - Request for someration of a 75acre tract of land by Blayton Realty was rejected by the Village Council Monday night on recommendation of the municipality's Planning and Zoning Commission,

The land is located east of the Bond Sterling Purk property and 600 to 700 feet west of Tuskawilla and Red Bug Roads. It was said to be situated between the Winter Springs development and the planned unit development of Sterling Park,

Councilman Charles Kelley said objections included the location of the property and the planned layout of the land. (Clayton's had asked for commercial designation on Red Bug and Tuskawilla Roads.)

Mayor Granville Brown said, in addition, the plan for use of septic tanks on the tract and for subdividing the land into 90 by 130-foot lots for construction of \$35,000 to \$60,000 homes in an area which will have \$80,000 to \$150,000 dwellings Knowles had disclosed the was objectionable.

Brown said County Planner David Farr informed the city the county wishes to keep Red Bug Road residential and to discourage commercial development. James Palmer, building inspector, said Farr informed some of the most beautiful land in the county is in that area and commercial zoning "would ruin it within five years."

Palmer said Clayton also applied to Casseiberry for annexation of the site.
