A sausage-apricot combination can be prepared in advance and kept hot in the chafing dish. Serve with rice and noodles and a salad. Cheese and fruit for dessert, plus coffee or hot chocolate, make this a perfect winter offering — whether you live in Alaska or Hawaii.

SAUSAGE-APRICOT SKILLET
2 packages (1 ounce each) sausage links
2 medium onions, cut in 1/4-inch wedges
2 green peppers, cut in small chunks
1 can (16 ounces) apricot halves, undrained
2-3rd cup water
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons cornstarch

Drain apricots, reserving syrup; add syrup and water to onions and green peppers in skillet. Combine vinegar and cornstarch; stir cornstarch mixture into liquid in skillet. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add browned sausages and drained apricots; simmer just until ingredients are heated. Transfer to chafing dish. Makes 6 servings.

The Christmas holidays this year come with unusual financial worries. The "Old Times" spirit of giving may still burn, but in too many cases, the money to spend is not there. There is something that can be done about it, particularly in the food line. Give your friends gourmet foods. Supermarket prices are so out of this world that many people have to pass up many things they used to enjoy. There is where you can come in — on Christmas Day special containers for that new, new, made-in-japan, plastic, or ac crocks, they add pensive to your special gift. Some of the homemade items are fruit cakes, cookie bars, etc.

Supermarkets carry special teas with orange rind or other flavors added. Flavored coffees, special seasonal salts for salad dressing or meats, fruit butters in crocks (they use less sugar than jellies), and jellies and marshmallows. The cost of each item gift can be kept within \$2 to \$5.

There are a few suggestions: Dandee marmalade in crockets; jars of English gooseberry or damson plum jams, glass jars of brandied peaches, papayas in syrup, oranges sliced in syrup, Kedis fig in syrup, mangoes in syrup and pickled watermelon rind. Fanne Charged With Indecent Exposure

Fanne Foxe, the stripper-protege of Arkansas Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, was jailed briefly early today at an incident after her arrest on an indecent exposure charge at a south Seminole County night club.

Jack Fulewider, chief investigator for Seminole-Brevard State Atty. Abbott Herring, said the Argentine born stripper was charged with indecent exposure of sexual organs by going naked in a public place and Club Juana operated by Michael Pinter was also arrested on a charge of promoting an indecent show by a live person before an audience.

Miss Foxe is receiving \$15,000 a week for a two-week engagement at the Anabella night club. The engagement began Monday night.

Fulewider said state attorney's investigators attended a Tuesday night performance and later warned Pinter 30, of 135 N. Spring Lake Dr., Altamonte Springs, that he would be arrested if the show went on. Fulewider said Herring's office received a tip Wednesday that the stripper bared all later Tuesday night.

Fulewider, investigator C. E. DePuy Jr., and Seminole sheriff's agents paid admission Wednesday night and viewed the hazy-eyed dancer's mid-night performance.

DePuy arrested Pinter and

Miss Foxe in Pinter's office about 2 a.m. following the show. They were booked into Seminole County Jail at Sanford and later released on \$500 bond each.

Authorities said that the 177-pound Miss Foxe stripped to a G-string with a black patch and left the stage early but then returned clothed only in a pink, translucent negligee which she opened in front as she bowed to the audience.

Miss Foxe's manager, Jerry Brandt, said he didn't see the end of the show but, "she was wearing a full-length robe on stage."

Fulewider said Miss Foxe and Pinter were arrested because a state law was violated. "We would have arrested Fanne Foxe, Gypsy Rose Lee or anyone else exposing themselves," Fulewider told reporters. "I think any citizen of Seminole County would expect to enforce the law no matter who she is."

Brandt was warned several times by Fulewider and DePuy about obstructing justice when he objected to officers searching Miss Foxe's purse when she was arrested. "I asked why (the search) they went into the heavy cop kit and Fulewider tossed me out of Pinter's office."

Brandt said he tried to gain entry to the club a second time, "so I could be with my client."

Herring said Fulewider told him by telephone Wednesday that the office had received "some complaints that Miss Foxe was going bottomless."

"I told him (Fulewider) to bust her if she's going bottomless. It's a violation of the law," Herring said.

"All we're doing is attempting to enforce the law. She can't come into the Eighteenth Judicial Circuit and appear bottomless. We're not going to put up with it, from Fanne Foxe or anyone else," he said today by telephone from his Titusville office.

Herring said if the state attorney's office receives more complaints of "bottomless" that there likely will be more arrests.

Casselberry Police Chief George Karcher said today that the Club Juana property was annexed "several years ago" by the City of Casselberry. He said he never any complaints of bottomless dancing, "I said, 'and had no prior knowledge of the raid.'"

Karcher said this morning that he still hadn't been contacted by the State Attorney's office or the Sheriff's Department.

He said Casselberry police make periodic but not regular checks at the night club.

Authorities said that Miss Foxe and Pinter are scheduled for arraignment on the misdemeanor charges at 9 a.m. Dec. 20 — the returnable date of the cash bonds posted.

When booked, Miss Foxe listed her home address as 1600 S. Eads St., Arlington, Va.

Pinter and Miss Foxe dodged photographers and tried to shield their faces as they were escorted by officers into the jail for booking but over an hour later after posting bond and being released, they smiled for newsmen, but made no comments, as they hurried to a waiting car with unidentified companions and left the courthouse parking lot.

Brandt later told newsmen by telephone that the stripper would hold a news conference just before noon at a Winter Park motel where she is staying.

A mother of four, Miss Foxe, 38, whose real name is Anabella Battistella, gained worldwide headlines two months ago when she jumped into the Washington tidal basin after police stopped a car in which she and Mills were riding.

Mills, a Democrat, was re-elected despite the notoriety that followed. But a furor erupted after Mills appeared on a Boston stage with Miss Foxe two weeks ago. He entered a hospital several days later, complaining of exhaustion.

On Tuesday, House Speaker Carl Albert said Mills, because of ill health, had decided not to seek a new term, as chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Stripper: 'I've Been Proposed To'

Before her fall from legal grace in Seminole County early this morning, stripper Fanne Foxe met with reporters in the office of Club Juana operator Mike Pinter and fielded questions.

Clad in street clothes — a grey floor length gown — that sparkled in front of camera floodlights, Miss Foxe talked about her meteoric rise to fame since becoming publicly associated with Rep. Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.) during the past several months. Her pre-Mills stripper's fees were \$1,500 a week. She gets \$15,000 at Pinter's Casselberry Club.

With cameras from state-wide newspapers, television and a national magazine clicking away, Miss Foxe admitted that she had "been proposed to."

"I've known him for some time now," she coyly explained, "but I'm not ready to tell you the name of the guy."

Her demure explanation was a counterpart to an earlier radio report. Mills, the story said, had called Fanne early Wednesday morning at the Juana and offered her hand in marriage. Neither Fanne nor aides from Mills' Capitol Hill office had reacted to the story until Fanne's explanation last night.

Although Fanne wouldn't go into detail about her relationship with Mills, calling him only "a very, very, good friend," it was admitted that the Arkansas congressman had called her several times since she began performing at the Juana on Monday.

"He asked how I was and wanted to wish me good luck," she said.

Will Fanne accept help from Mills in launching her movie career, as the congressman had promised during her last performance at a Boston Strip club?

"I don't need help," Miss Foxe replied. "The offers are coming to me every day without having to go after them."

Wilbur, she says, has been very tired for some time now, and on the brink of exhaustion.

The two daughters of the 38-year-old "erotic dancer" are also basking in the limelight of their mother's success. Both college-age girls appeared on the Juana stage earlier in the week to introduce their up-and-coming mom. One of the girls, "a journalism major in college," has been offered a part in a movie, Fanne says.

Fanne says she doesn't mind all the attention she's been getting lately. "I'm used to it," she says.

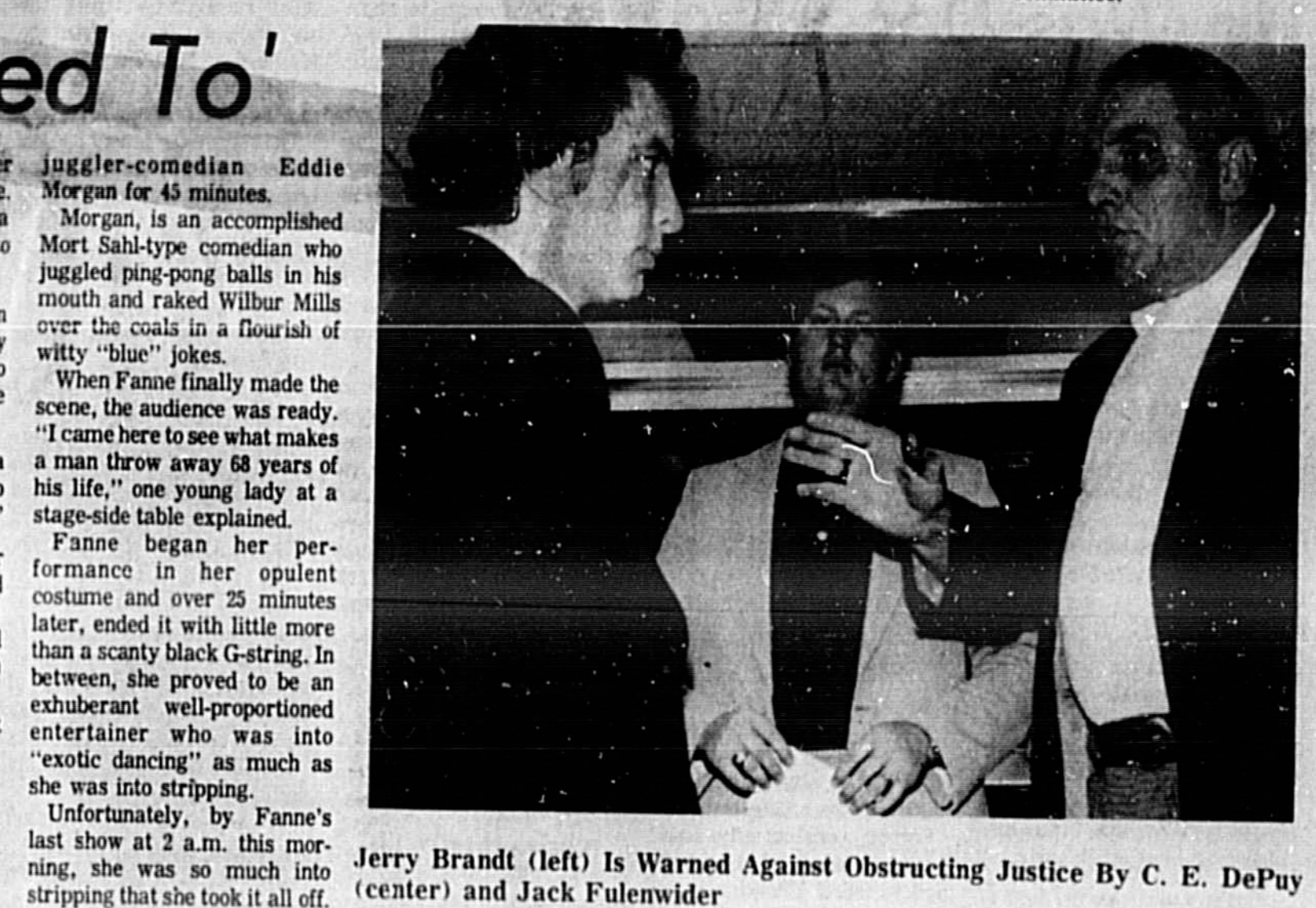
"I've been a dancer and strip-teaser for a while. Before that, I was a professional model in Puerto Rico."

Fanne also said she had been approached by "a major toy company" who wanted to manufacture a Fanne Foxe doll.

"I bet I know what it does," a reporter said, "you wind it up and it falls in the Tidal Basin."

Fanne, who, with her manager Jerry Brandt, arrived late for her 9 p.m. show, kept almost 400 patrons waiting until 11 p.m. for her appearance on stage.

Before she strolled out bedecked in a high ostrich feather plume headdress and "tail dress" and surrounded by the topless Club Juana "Playmates," the well-dressed middle-class audience heard

Legislators Elect Vogt

The Seminole County legislative delegation elected Sen. John Vogt of Brevard County as chairman Wednesday night, over objections of the county's only resident legislator, newly-elected Rep. Robert (Bobby) Hattaway of Altamonte Springs.

Hattaway said he believed he should have been given the office, rather than a man who lives out of the county and may not be as readily available to Seminole County residents.

Noting he has an office in the south end of the county, Hattaway indicated the Brevard County contingent, Sens. Vogt and Lori Wilson, and the Lake County legislator, Rep. Vince Fichtel, may not be as interested and concerned with Seminole as he is.

Sen. Wilson, taking office as legislator, said all members of the delegation are working hard to be as close to the people of Seminole as to other counties in their districts. When Hattaway mentioned that Seminole Counties would have to telephone long distance to contact Vogt, Sen. Wilson said that long distance calls are necessary for her to reach the other end of Merritt Island from her home.

Hattaway was successful in limiting Vogt's term of office as chairman to one year, rather than the normal two year. Vogt said the limitation was not unusual and most delegations already practice the rule.

Fichtel pointed out no regulations says that Sen. Vogt cannot succeed himself if that is the delegation's wish.

The four-member delegation agreed to hold its second and third Seminole County hearings on proposed legislation Jan. 30 at Casselberry city hall and Feb. 27 at the Seminole County courthouse at Sanford.

Cut-off date for submission of local legislation was set for Feb. 15, but Sen. Wilson urged that those wishing to submit legislation cooperate by submitting it earlier.

Wholesale Prices Rise 1.2 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices last month rose 1.2 per cent, less than half the October increase, the government reported today. There were indications the pace of inflation was subsiding.

Although the November increase was high by normal standards, the Labor department said price increases over the month were less widespread than in preceding months.

And, while agriculture prices continued to increase sharply at the wholesale level, prices of industrial commodities — regarded by economists as a truer measure of inflation — rose at the slowest rate in 13 months.

Wholesale prices of industrial goods rose nine-tenths of a per cent last month, slightly less than in September and October and the smallest rise since October 1973 when they rose eight-tenths of a per cent.

Over-all wholesale prices have risen 23.5 per cent in the past 12 months, the biggest year-to-year increase since 1947. But the rate of increase has slowed in recent months.

indicating that the nation's inflation rate may soon begin to subside.

President Ford in his economic speech Wednesday night said price pressures were beginning to ease and predicted that inflation will move steadily down from the intolerable double-digit level.

The 1.2 per cent rise in wholesale prices last month, on a seasonally adjusted basis, compared with October's increase of 2.5 per cent and a rise of one-tenth of one per cent in September. Unadjusted, prices rose one per cent last month.

Trends in wholesale prices usually show up at the consumer level eventually, of fering hope that the rise in retail prices may soon tail off.

Detailing its wholesale price report, the Labor Department said prices for farm products rose 1.3 per cent in November, while processed foods and feeds increased 3.5 per cent. In October farm products climbed 4.8 per cent and processed foods and feeds 5.5 per cent.

Sugar and confectionary goods accounted for most of the 3.5 per cent increase in prices of consumer foods, those goods ready for sale on supermarket shelves. Sugar and confectionary prices jumped 33.1 per cent last month and were 191.9 per cent higher than a year ago.

Higher prices for processed poultry, milk, fresh and dried fruits and vegetables, miscellaneous processed foods and some meats also increased last month.

The government said that of the 13 major commodity groups in the industrial index, five declined in November. Lumber and wood product prices declined as did fuels, textiles, chemicals and hides and skins.

November's wholesale price increase pushed the government's over-all Wholesale Price Index up to 171.9, meaning that it cost \$171.90 to buy a variety of goods that cost \$100 in the 1967 base period.

Industrial commodity prices have risen 27.4 per cent over the past year while prices for farm products advanced 21 per cent.

William Saxbe Pegged As India's Ambassador

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford plans to nominate Atty. Gen. William B. Saxbe as ambassador to India and is looking for a new attorney general, reliable sources say. "I'll soon be leaving," Saxbe told friends in Ohio Wednesday night. But he told reporters any announcement must come from the White House. Administration sources and associates of Saxbe in his native Ohio said Saxbe has agreed to accept the ambassadorship.

Arabs Buying More Jets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wealthy oil-producing Arab countries have doubled the number of French Mirage fighter-bombers they are buying for Egypt's air force, U.S. intelligence sources say. They say Kuwait and Abu Dhabi are paying for a new order of 36 Mirages for Egypt. France has started delivery on a previous Saudi Arabian purchase of 36 of the fighter-bombers for the Egyptian air force.

'Skitch' Faces Jail Term

NEW YORK (AP) — Conductor Skitch Henderson faces up to three years in prison and a \$5,000 fine after a federal jury found him guilty of filing a false income tax return. He had been charged with evading more than \$40,000 in federal income taxes.

Ehrlichman Says He Was Deceived

WASHINGTON (AP) — John D. Ehrlichman, once among the staunchest Nixon loyalists, says he now realizes Richard M. Nixon deceived him at least four times about Watergate. "In at least four major instances, the impressions given me by the former president were false," Ehrlichman told the Watergate cover-up trial on Wednesday. "I think there is an ample showing in this record I was deceived."

It was the sharpest public break Ehrlichman has made with the man he served for five years in the White House.

It came late in a day of intense cross-examination by chief prosecutor James F. Neal, who repeatedly pressed the former Nixon aide to explain why he didn't tell investigators what he knew about Watergate, it, as he says, he consistently advocated full disclosure.

Ehrlichman was the last of three top-level Nixon advisers to present his defense in the cover-up case. Former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and ex-

New Economic Aids Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Faced with a deepening recession and rising unemployment, President Ford has directed his economic advisers to prepare new programs to combat the nation's economic problems. Ford said in a speech Wednesday night he expects to have the programs ready for the new Congress when it convenes Jan. 14. His advisers will be working through the Christmas holidays to prepare it, he said. Treasury Department sources said the options the President will consider include tax cuts, mandatory job allocations, financial aid to troubled industries and additional help for the nation's unemployed.

Carter Announces Presidential Platform

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gov. Jimmy Carter of Georgia set forth a platform for his presidential candidacy today and called for "a new leadership and new ideas" to bridge the gap between the American people and their government. Carter outlined a broad agenda of governmental reforms in a speech at the National Press Club here. He planned to announce his candidacy formally later today at a rally in Atlanta.

"To begin with, the confidence of people in our own government must be restored," Carter said. "But too many officials do not deserve that confidence."

U.S. Taxpayers Pay To Be Plucked

WASHINGTON—We have counted at least 600 government lobbyists whose duty it is to squeeze more money out of the taxpayers. To the best of our estimate, they draw \$15 million in salaries each year from the taxpayers who, thereby, pay to be plucked.

Every federal agency, which hopes to get a share of the government gravy, has its own lobbyists on Capitol Hill buttering up congressmen. The Environmental Protection Agency, a new bureaucratic offshoot scrambling for its place in the appropriations draw, has hastily recruited 41 people to impress its needs upon Congress. The annual lobbying budget has now reached \$94,000.

RAY CROMLEY Agreement To Reach Agreement

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The Ford-Kissinger-Brezhnev "breakthrough" in the control of nuclear weapons is a facade of words — an illusion. More generously, it is a hope, nothing more.

According to men close to the National Security Council and the Pentagon, there is no agreement. There is only an agreement to try to reach an agreement. It is as though a man says to a local real estate agent that he desires to buy a house and the agent says he will attempt to find one he thinks is suitable, according to his own concept of suitability, not necessarily to the concept of suitability as seen by our man who wants to buy.

There is no agreement on the weight of missiles, individually or collectively. There is no limit on the number of MIRV warheads to be allowed on each missile, an omission which could make a catastrophic difference in relative defense strength.

There is no statement on whether larger missiles can be put in existing silos. Nothing is said about the number or the size of silos. Yet regulation of silo size is essential in controlling the power of missiles.

Spot inspections, a must when dealing with MIRVs or with missiles hidden in mountain caverns, is not provided for.

The numbers mentioned in the briefings are so large as to be meaningless. They impose no restrictions on either the USSR or the United States. Both countries under this understanding will be permitted to spend or, arm or upgrade their forces as thoroughly as they could possibly desire.

RALPH NOVAK Classing World's Powers

The Pentagon has been complaining a lot lately that it doesn't hurry up and start spending more money on weapons and equipment, we are going to become a "second-class power."

"Now if somebody becomes a second-class power, that means they aren't allowed to fight with the first-class powers anymore. And if they try, they get 11 points added to their aggressiveness rating but they lose 177 points from their discretion-it's the better-part-of-valour record."

"Also, second-class powers are not allowed to invade anything bigger than a 190-class power, and your second-classers are not allowed to join in disputes—just whether or not it is a good time for the end of the world, although they are allowed to send observers."

Overkill said that the criteria for deciding who is a second-class power are very strict. "The most important thing, of course, is how much money you spend for bullets and tanks and stuff," he said. "That's why it's always better to buy a new fighter plane that costs \$4 million apiece than it is to buy one that costs only \$1 million. You want to keep your spending average high and your arms high."

"Another important criterion is the number of admirals and generals you have. As everyone knows, if you have a lot of admirals and generals — and they have fancy cars and private golf courses — you must be a pretty tough country."

"And last thing of what I might hazard is: though you Americans have been up there with the firsts for such a long time," he said. "After all, it took a real first-class power to fight the Vietnam war, didn't it? It takes a real first-class power to be able to afford the F-14, doesn't it?"

Delicate Balance

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Even the general objectives stated are weakened. Secretary Brezhnev allowed the United States to insert a phrase which to us means equality. Mr. Ford allowed Brezhnev to insert a phrase which to the Russians means they have the right to superiority in missiles and other arms because of their need to deal with the China threat as well.

This dual phrasing, in traditional Kissinger fashion, allows the Russians to interpret the understanding in one fashion and the United States to interpret it in another.

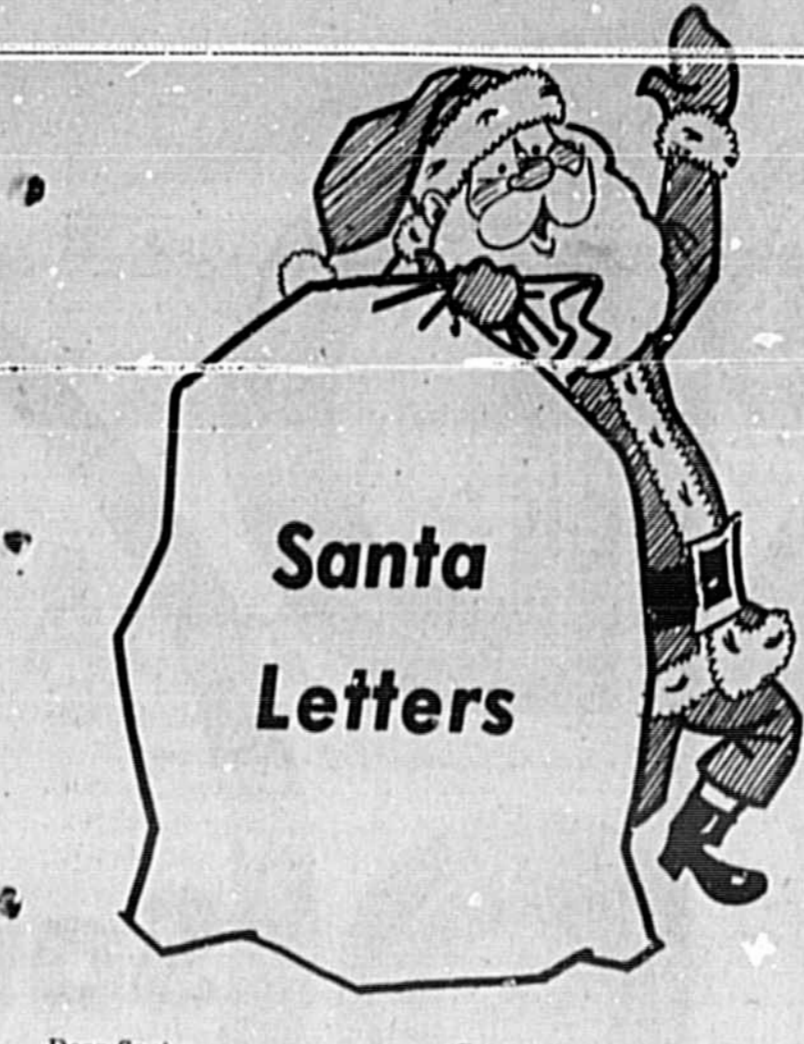

Vitamin 'Ignorance'



DEAR DR. LAMB—I'm sure you won't put this letter in your column, because you know nothing about vitamins to speak of, let alone write about. Tell the woman who asked about turning hair dark and what vitamin she should use, to try a B vitamin called para amino benzoic acid. It has been proven to work many times if given a fair chance (at least six months to a year) along with a multivitamin and mineral preparation a day. Try it, you'll like it. Until then, don't knock it.

DEAR READER—I found your letter rather amusing, and I enjoy a good laugh once in a while.

If you had any scientific background, I would tell you to read Goodman and Gilman's text, "The Pharmacological Basis of Therapeutics." Other good reliable texts would do as well. It explains that para-aminobenzoic acid (PABA) is not really a B vitamin. It is used by certain bacteria to enable them to manufacture folic acid. The folic acid is essential to the growth of bacteria.

Interestingly, that is how the sulfa drugs work. They interfere with the bacteria's ability to form folic acid in the bacteria and, through this method, prevent them from dividing and growing. Without reproduction, they soon die off.

Mammals do not have the ability to convert PABA to folic acid. We have to get our folic acid from other sources. We don't stop cell reproduction and die off when we get sulfa.

Now, about that gray hair. Gray hair can be produced in some animals by giving them a diet deficient in PABA. Good-

man and Gilman and other reliable texts, will tell you there is NO EVIDENCE THAT GRAYING IN HUMANS IS IN ANY WAY RELATED TO PABA.

So, my dear, unless you are a microorganism being attacked by sulfa drugs, I'm afraid you won't benefit from PABA. In other words, you are all wet.

I might add that if and when someone finds a way to prevent graying of the hair, without using hair coloring of some form, we will all know about it. It won't be much of a secret.

Another reader wrote to tell me I was wrong and stupid. That hair was made up of vitamins and minerals. I found this remarkable statement also very educational. Hair is a specialized form of skin. It is mostly keratin protein, not vitamins or minerals. Vitamins are essential to health, but they are not used as building blocks for body structures or secretions. Such comments aren't just amusing, they are dangerous and point out the great need for public education about vitamins.

Vitamins are very useful and good when used properly, or as a food supplement for those who need them. However, they have none of the magical qualities often ascribed to them by enthusiasts in the vitamin trade. They don't cure cancer or arthritis, and they don't change gray hair back to its original color.

I recognize that it is futile to try to provide factual information to those who don't want to be confused by the facts. Hopefully, presentation of facts will be useful to those who want to learn and profit from factual information.

CASE C-412: Dr. Crane, aged 40, is a very effective clergyman.

Twice I have occupied his pulpit to give my usual Sunday address, entitled:

"Jesus - The World's Greatest Applied Psychologist."

After such a church service, Mrs. Crane and I usually stay to have Sunday dinner with many of the parishioners.

And in a recent discussion of this sort, I was asked why children of apparently fine families go wrong.

Patricia Heast was a classical example, as was the young man who was sentenced to a life term in Turkey for smuggling dope.

Even in the Bible, the Prodigal Son likewise fast-walked his father into awarding the boy his expected inheritance in advance.

Then that Prodigal Son headed for the night clubs in a neighboring country, where he attracted a lot of sycophantic friends, till his pocketbook was empty.

"Dr. Crane," I am queried, "why do such children of good homes defy the very rules by which their parents attained business success and social prestige?"

Well, here are the common reasons for this anti-establishment stance:

(1) Often these rebellious children have been "middle" youngsters, in-between older and younger siblings.

Thus, they missed the extra attention that went to the first born plus the similar extra limelight given the baby of the family.

Patricia Heast was thus the middle girl of 5 daughters.

That Biblical Prodigal Son was not the firstborn, either, and may have had a younger sister, for girls were not mentioned very often in the Bible.

Sometimes the younger of

Seminole County government officials in their bid to keep Seminole out of an Orange County emergency telephone system. Oriedo was the only city not participating.

The main topic of discussion at Tuesday's meeting was to avoid having the state "push something down our throats we don't want."

But State Communications Engineer and 911 Program Manager Ronald Quiggins told the committee in Orlando Wednesday that he would go

along with whatever the majority of the committee decided. Quiggins said that the state 911 law requires no division to come up with a workable statewide emergency number plan within six months to a year. After that, the individual districts have six months to develop their own specifics and the telephone companies have another two years to put the program into working order. He estimates that a state-wide 911 emergency dial system will

probably be in effect by 1977. Although there may be many individual centers throughout the state, the dialing of 911 would not be a matter of contact area with police, fire, and ambulance services.

Also, under the state law, an emergency call may be transferred no more than twice, between the caller and his ultimate destination. Before plans on the 911 system go any further, all the delegates agree that they would

have to have more information on the frequency and the peak hours of their emergency calls. In an effort to compile that information, fire and police departments in Seminole have been talking their calls and expect to have the results by next week. Orange representatives, meanwhile, haven't even begun to compile their figures.

Quiggins said he felt that the Orange-Seminole delegates were "somewhat remiss in not

asking for assistance from the state in planning your programs. Our office stands ready to assist you," he said. The most glaring irrecconciliation yesterday wasn't between Orange and Seminole County and the state, but between various factions within Orange.

With the Seminole County delegation abstaining from the vote, the committee decided to have a one-county central communications and dispatch

WORLD IN BRIEF

Black, White Leaders Step Toward Detente

SALLSBURY, Rhodesia (AP) — Black and white leaders in southern Africa have taken their first major step toward detente by agreeing to a ceasefire in Rhodesia and a conference to write a new constitution for the former British territory. Prime Minister Ian Smith, the head of Rhodesia's white-minority regime, announced Wednesday night that the war between his army and black guerrillas would halt immediately, he would release all black political prisoners and a constitutional conference with black nationalist leaders would be held soon "without preconditions."

Kissinger Addresses NATO

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and the other 14 foreign ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization met today to discuss President Ford's Vladivostok agreement on nuclear arms and the grave economic situation facing them. Opening the NATO foreign ministers' annual two-day winter meeting, Kissinger was expected to underline points made Tuesday by Defense Secretary James H. Schlesinger at the meeting of NATO defense ministers. Schlesinger said although the Vladivostok accord between Ford and Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev could open the way to ceilings on conventional arms and tactical nuclear weapons as well as strategic nuclear missiles and bombers, the Western allies and particularly the Europeans must not reduce their defenses.

Another Oil Increase?

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The oil-exporting countries are not expected to raise prices at their two-day meeting that opened in Vienna today. But Iran's oil minister says there will have to be an increase eventually to keep pace with inflation. "We must uphold the purchasing power of the 'our oil,'" Jamshid Amuzegar of Iran told newsmen Wednesday night as oil ministers gathered for the session of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

Grenades Kill 3 Persons

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The Palestine guerrillas say one of their men made a grenade attack in a crowded Tel Aviv movie theater Wednesday night in retaliation for the rocket attack on three PLO offices in Beirut two days before. "We have struck back," said PLO chief Yasser Arafat. "Next time it will be within six hours if Israel dares to stage another terror operation against us." Tel Aviv police said the grenades killed three persons, including the terrorist who threw them, and that 58 persons were injured. The police said the terrorist carried a British passport issued to Alexander Adam Hopper, born in Accra, Ghana, in 1948.

Rangoon Reported Quiet, Martial Law Is Enforced

Rangoon was reported quiet today as troops enforced martial law, but an American embassy official said casualties in street fighting Wednesday were heavy and thousands were jailed.

Protests by students, workers and Buddhist monks in the Burmese capital erupted after the army's seizure early Wednesday of the body of former United Nations Secretary-General U Thant.

It was one of the strongest challenges to President Ne Win since he seized power in 1962. But Edward D. Franco, the information officer at the U.S. embassy, said in a telephone interview that the opposition to the government was not ideological, it was due to rising prices and widespread economic hardship.

Martial law was declared Wednesday afternoon after students and workers ransacked the streets of Rangoon setting fire to police stations and other public buildings. The government radio said one person was killed and three were injured. But Franco said this count was "way too low."

"We get reports many more were killed. Hospitals are filling up rapidly with wounded," he said. He said there had been thousands of arrests, and "the military has been very heavy handed."

"Massive numbers of troops are in the city, surrounding all government buildings and patrolling the streets in convoys of trucks. They continue to surround the university and the new U Thant tomb by the Shwedagon Pagoda in the center of the city.

"The people have no arms." News censorship was in effect, and the government was restricting the entry of foreign newsmen to the country. U Thant, a political foe of Ne Win, died in New York on Nov. 25. A huge crowd of students and Buddhist monks seized his

coffin from the funeral procession last Thursday, charging that the government was not paying him suitable homage, and interred it Sunday in a brick tomb on the Rangoon University campus.

Ne Win sent the army into the campus to recover the body after crowds flocked to the campus to pay homage at the tomb.

While Thant's body was hurriedly placed in a new tomb near the Shwedagon, the country's holiest shrine, "troops made repeated sweeps through the campus, arresting students who were trying to hide in the university buildings," Franco reported.

"Crowds of people started appearing, ransacking the city of Rangoon, burning public build-

ings. "Contrary to official reports, I saw no private looting."

Executive Suite Is Subjected To Increased Pressures

NEW YORK (AP) — Seldom has the executive suite been subjected to such pressure as it is now enduring, and whether it can solve all its problems remains to be seen.

Eugene Jennings, management professor at Michigan State University, is very concerned that many of the men who head the nation's largest companies are ill-equipped to deal with the multifaceted challenges before them.

Products of the 1960s, when the focus of their efforts was mainly on profits, these men are being challenged now by capital shortages, consumerism, ecological concerns, nationalism, controls, product safety, equality, etc.

The men needed today must have imagination, vision and a broad understanding, said Jennings, who is also a confidential adviser to corporate chief executives and a recognized authority on executive mobility.

But the men who worked their way to the top during the 1960s lack lateral vision and foresight, he believes. They do not have a sense of the grand plan. Many of them are confused.

Here are some of strains on the executive suite that Jennings believes constitutes a crisis of the management system:

Manufacturing executive: He knows production hasn't kept pace with the increase in labor costs. But he can't obtain funds from the financial officer to obtain labor-saving tools and machinery.

On top of this he is faced with demands to humanize the assembly line, to enrich jobs, to make them more rewarding. He is thus faced with at least one dilemma and probably many more.

Marketing executive: His fundamental problem is that the Santa Claus who on last year's cards flashed the peace sign to order two beers has been replaced by Jolly St. Nick, arms laden with toys, dolls and gaily wrapped presents.

Some of the time and glitter which were once used to help production costs, manufacturers say — but the sentiment is a bit more intimate, a touch more folksy, a touch more traditional and old-fashioned, keeping pace with the current nostalgic trend.

And this, say Christmas card-makers and sellers, is what Americans want during this gray period of recession and energy shortages.

"People are buying cards that reflect their feelings," said David Cohen, vice president, Fifth Avenue Card Shop, a chain of 37 stores east of the Mississippi River. "These are serious times. Nostalgia is a reflection of this seriousness."

In keeping with the nostalgic look, the Drawing Board features its "Christmas Past" collection, showing wistful little urchins in holiday scenes.

Designs have moved away from the hot, loud and splashy colors of the 1960s, said creative director Peter Vatsures, and the message has become "simple and heartfelt." But there are some contemporary designs, such as the striking Santa and Santa riding a bicycle and playing tennis.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art and other museums across the country offer cards reproducing their own collections, from Sandro Botticelli's "The Annunciation" to Currier and Ives prints to more contemporary line drawings and graphics.

There are over 1,300 designs in this year's Hallmark Christmas card line, but the biggest sellers are traditional: the snow scenes, holiday table settings and little children of every description.

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Bureaucrats Ignore Big Energy Source

WASHINGTON (AP)—With rich oil reserves of the Atlantic Coast as the prize, state and federal governments are ignoring an abundant, nonpolluting source of energy—methanol, according to the director of Scripps Institution of Oceanography here.

Dr. William A. Nierenberg of Scripps believes methanol (wood alcohol) is an alternative to petroleum.

"We can use up to 15 per cent methanol with gasoline without an alteration of automobile engines," Nierenberg says. "It improves mileage and cuts pollution."

Nierenberg says development of methanol as an energy source is conspicuously absent in federal plans to make the country energy independent.

"After careful investigation, I have concluded that it is simply the result of bureaucratic pig cutting," he points out. "No research and development is needed. Therefore, no one is doing research and the bureaucrats are not interested."

Other authorities on energy are equally enthusiastic about the use of wood alcohol for solving the country's energy deficit.

"It is one of the most promising things to surface," says San Diego State University President Bruce Golding, a chemical engineer.

Golding thinks methanol can be made from a large number of things, including coal, natural gas, wood, farm and municipal wastes. Recent tests indicate that when mixed with gasoline, it improves mileage and reduced pollution in automobiles.

"If the government would encourage investment in big plants to synthesize methanol from coal, it could solve our energy problems," says Golding. "You know we have the greatest supply of coal in the world."

Chemical companies already are manufacturing about a billion gallons of methanol a year, but it is used for resins

and plastics rather than as an additive to gasoline.

"I think there are a couple of reasons why we haven't developed it as a source of energy," says Golding. "First, because petroleum has been so plentiful and so cheap there was no need to look for an alternative. Now it has become feasible from an economic point of view."

Golding believes some of the people advising the government on energy haven't much of a background in chemistry and engineering.

"Also, this is not part of the petroleum industry at the present time and they are not enthusiastic," he adds.

Dr. Chalmers G. Kirkbride, a specialist at the Federal Energy Administration office of energy research and development, concedes little consideration is being given to methanol in the Project Independence blueprint.

"Methanol as a fuel is not particularly good," says Kirkbride.

Kirkbride questioned the results of studies claiming that when used as an additive it would improve gasoline mileage.

"You are going to reduce the heating value of gasoline when you add methanol," said Kirkbride. "You are just going to get poorer mileage."

Project Independence officials, according to Kirkbride, are more interested in such things as nuclear development and coal gasification.

Two scientists from the Lincoln Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have documented the results of a number of tests where concentrations of methanol ranging from 5 to 30 per cent were added to gasoline and burned as fuel in automobiles.

The scientists, T. B. Reed and R. M. Lerner, published the results in Science magazine last December in an article entitled "Methanol: A Versatile Fuel for Immediate Use."

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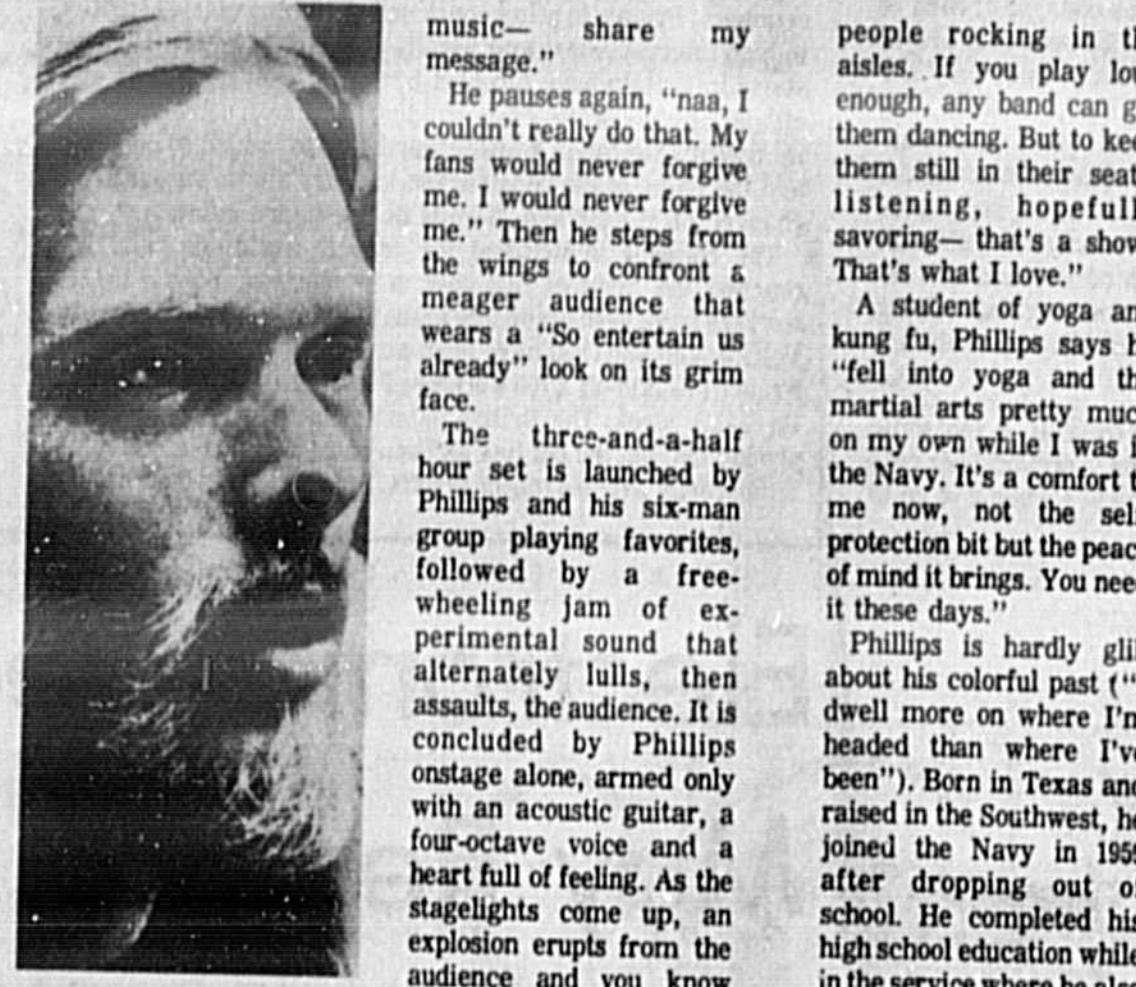
A Diogenes With A Guitar

Insurance Loans Becoming Popular

Policy loans—borrowing on life insurance—has become one of the relatively new plays in money management.

Loans on life insurance policies, usually available at 6 per cent, are being negotiated to get cash to go into the money market and collect interest at 12 per cent.

This bit of arbitrage is one way to take advantage of the spread between the policy loan rate and current high interest available to those with cash.

Some insurance men see this as a load on the industry.

But a veteran insurance analyst, Theodore J. Newton Jr., first vice president of Fifth Eastman Dillon, and the senior insurance analyst in this firm's New York office, says there is no way life insurance companies are going to suffer, even in today's market.

"This is not as bad as people say it is," says Newton's comment on the inroads being made by demand for policy loans. "Even though it's up about 50 per cent from last year in dollar amounts, last year it was negligible."

According to the Institute of Life Insurance, in the first six months of this year, the industry had a total of \$21.5 billion out on policy loans. This is 8.3 per cent of the assets of the industry, which totals \$259 billion.

"To the industry this is just an annoyance," Newton said. "The money they are lending out at 6 and 8 per cent, they could be lending at 10 and 12 per cent."

DAMASCUS — LENS — Among the most popular items on sale in the Damascus souk are child-size replicas of Syrian army uniforms. 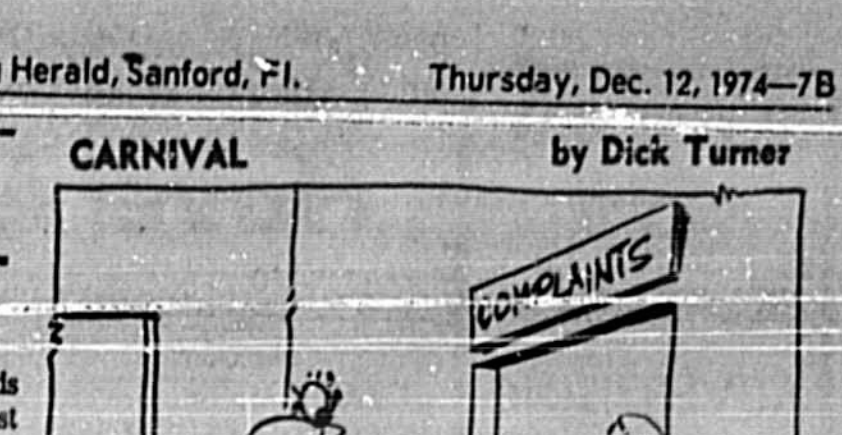

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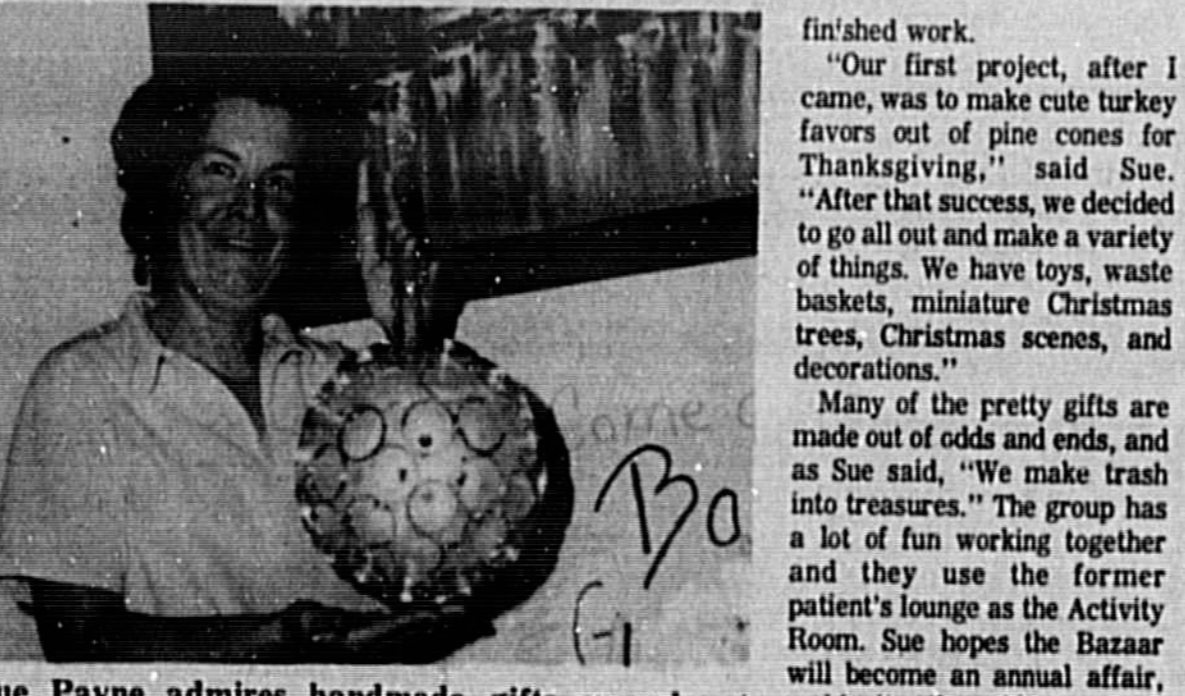

Stripper Denies 'Wrecking' Mills' Career

"Mr. Mills did what he did because he wanted to. I don't feel personally responsible for wrecking his career."

Argentine-born stripper Fanne Foxe, dabbling touches of scarlet polish on her nails in her Club Juana dressing room Thursday night, defended her part in the nationally-publicized Tidal Basin incident linking her name with that of Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, (D-Ark.)

"I'm sorry if I hurt him," Miss Foxe continued, "but I didn't ask him to do what he did. I just happened to be the girl around at the time."

Mills entered a hospital several days ago, complaining of exhaustion, and on Tuesday House Speaker Carl Albert said Mills had decided not to seek a new term as chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Granting an interview on condition no questions be asked about her arrest late Wednesday night on indecent

exposure charges and brief sojourn in Seminole County Jail, Miss Foxe said she has no hard feelings about the publicity given her relationship with Mills, nor has it embarrassed her.

About that relationship, she has nothing to say. "We're just good friends," is her stock response at the mention of Mills' name. She says it as automatically as a wink-up doll.

She is also "good friends" with Mills' wife, although she admits they haven't seen much of one another "since all this happened."

Her association with the congressman and headline-making leap into the Washington Tidal Basin after the automobile in which they were travelling was stopped by police several weeks ago, may not have embarrassed Miss Foxe personally. However, she is upset by the embarrassment it has caused her family. "The reports have become distorted," claimed Miss Foxe, "and this has hurt my children and my family in Argentina." The 38-year-

old stripper has a son, and two daughters, neither of whom show any interest in following their mother's career. One daughter is at present at Miss Foxe's home in Virginia, the other visiting relatives in Argentina. She also has a foster daughter.

"I felt alright in the beginning," she said, "but as I become more famous and the offers become higher priced, I don't feel like a person any more. To the agencies, the club owners, I'm just a machine, a money-making machine."

Nevertheless, her brush with the police apparently sparked the fuse of the "Argentine Firecracker," for her performance Thursday night was by far the most explosive since she arrived in Seminole County at the beginning of the week, according to all reports.

"She's come alive," commented one young woman in the near-capacity club crowded round the nightclub stage. "She's much better tonight than last night."

Nor was the rest of the crowd disappointed, including

Zoning Panel Moves To Protect Sanford's Water Supply Area

The Sanford Zoning and Planning Commission has recommended that city commissioners rezone agriculture land in the prime recharge area for the city's water supply for commercial and multi-family use.

Millionaire Jeno F. Paulucci is seeking the zoning changes for development of a 23.7 acre tract at the southwest corner of Bantoul Lane and SR-46A west of the Mayfair Golf and Country Club where the city's main water plant and 1,200-foot-deep supply wells are located.

Z-P members voted Thursday night to recommend restricted commercial zoning for 4.98 acres and multi-family with an eight unit per acre limit on 18.72 acres. Paulucci, through his representative, Leonard J. Urban, had requested higher density multi-family zoning for the 18.72 acres.

The Z-P recommendation

was made with the stipulation that all surface water runoff is to be retained on the site and with the understanding that when the project comes up for site development plan approval, the board will consider the recharge characteristics of the individual property and make specific development requirements part of the site plan approval.

City Planner David Farr and City Engineer Mack LaZebny are scheduled to recommend a policy and guidelines for development in recharge areas at next Thursday's zoning and planning commission meeting.

LaZebny said the Paulucci property is in a "prime" recharge area that feeds the Sanford water system. He told Z-P members that the entire recharge area within the western portion of the city limits and just beyond must be carefully protected to insure future recharge capabilities.

LaZebny recommended that

policy be established that will reduce land coverage of permeable soils within that recharge area; that will encourage development designs that will retain surface water run-off from an area isn't increased with development.

He also recommended the board "look toward clustering homesites or multi-story construction, which will provide an economically acceptable density, yet reduce land coverage and protect recharge."

He also suggested the board require "sufficient engineering" in relation to soils analysis to justify proposed locations of building sites and the adequacy of open areas for positive recharge.

Much of the potential water supply source from the aquifer that runs from the southwest to the northeast through central Florida is intercepted by the

Wekiva River and isn't available to the city as a water supply, LaZebny reported.

"Consequently, the recharge areas north and east of the Wekiva River are of extreme importance to the city of Sanford, because they more immediately effect the potential of the city's water supply," LaZebny said.

He said a combination of density control, land coverage control and proper engineering can best insure protection of the recharge area in the western portion of the city.

"The key to development in the recharge area isn't density, but retaining water on site," LaZebny noted.

In other actions the Z-P board:

—Approved a conditional use permit for the sale of beer and wine for on-premises consumption with food only for Buck's Catering, 1220 S. Sanford Ave.

—Recommended city commissioners rezone to medium industrial property owned by Hunt Oil Co. south of Cornwell Road, east of Sanford Avenue and north of Pine Oak Drive.

—Justified earlier approval by members and City Manager Warren Knowles of landscaping required at Zayre Plaza shopping center, Airport Boulevard and U. S. 17-92, in site plan for additions including the Pantry Pride supermarket that opened this week.

—Tabled, until the planner and engineer submit their recommendations, a city commission request for recommendations on paving requirements where existing commercial buildings are enlarged or additions made abutting unimproved streets.

—Recommended city commissioners amend the zoning ordinance on off-street parking requirements to require review of parking requirements when buildings are enlarged or their use changed.

Drug Agents Smash \$7 Million Operation

Federal, state and county agents were searching the Orlando area this afternoon for a Longwood man they say is the head of an international drug smuggling ring that has imported \$7 million worth of cocaine into the U.S. in the last 18 months.

Federal Drug Enforcement Administration agents said Jose Manuel Coton, 39, of 200 Post And Rail Road, The Woodlands, is named in federal warrants charging importation of cocaine and conspiracy to import.

Coton's 35-year-old wife, Leonora Morales Coton, was arrested Thursday night at a Lake Brantley area convenience store after agents seized 3½ ounces of pure cocaine with a street value of \$7000.

She was being held in Seminole County Jail, without bond, today on state charges of conspiracy to import over 10 grams of cocaine into Florida.

Sheriff's Vice Squad Lt. Ray Parker said the arrest of Coton will break up "the biggest drug smuggling ring in Florida." He said the investigation originated with the sheriff's department 18 months ago and spread over the world and involved numerous federal agents plus officers from the Sanford police, Orlando police and Orange County Sheriff's Department.

Federal agents said Coton is believed to be in the Orlando area and "is now being

will be jailed on federal charges." Sources said more arrests are expected and the case is scheduled to go to a United States Grand Jury.

Parker said Coton was arrested Nov. 18 in Detroit by federal agents and three pounds of pure cocaine was seized. Coton is free on \$5,000 bond on charges of drug importation.

Agents said the massive smuggling ring funneled the illegal drugs through Seminole County for nationwide distribution via a business owned by Coton — FredCo Enterprises, Inc., SR 436 Altamonte Springs. They said state records show the corporation was chartered for importing and exporting cattle.
