 that he did not show Wallace certain wartime reports on the A-bomb project.
 Meanwhile backers of a proposed constitutional amendment to give women "equal rights" pressed today for swift House action following the measure's easy victory in the Senate.
 "We want action during this session of Congress," said Rep. Katherine St. George (R-NY). "The fight has been half won with Senate approval. It is now up to

us in the House to remove the discriminations that still are found against women."

She referred to laws in some states banning women from jury duty and certain jobs, and making other distinctions in treatment between men and women.

A direct signal from John L. Lewis appeared to be the only possible move which would head off (1) the spread of strikes in key soft coal mines and (2) intervention by President Truman.

With more and more miners leaving their tools, director James Boyd of the Bureau of Mines told the Senate Labor Committee yesterday that "the national economy, health and welfare of the nation is now or soon will be imperiled" by the coal shortage.

Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) said Boyd's testimony had convinced him that the President ought to invoke the Taft-Hartley Law immediately to restore full production of coal for at least 90 days. The law provides for 90-day injunctions.

Mr. Truman was reported to be convinced that if the outbreak of strikes in western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio were ended, shortages would lessen or disappear. His advisers were said

to be cautioning him against any action before next week.

In republican circles, Secretary Acheson's suddenly famous statement that "I do not intend to turn my back on Alger Hiss" stirred up wrath. Hiss, an old friend and former State Department associate of Acheson, was convicted of perjury in a trial that linked him with Communists. Senator Mundt (R-SD) directed a three-hour attack on Hiss, Acheson and Administration foreign policies in the Senate.

"The important thing is not the manner in which Dean Acheson permits Hiss to influence the position of his back," Mundt said

Mr. Odum said that one-half of the funds derived in the annual drive now taking place remains with the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and is used to pay for the expense of medical and hospital care which a local patient's family cannot afford as well as to buy braces, crutches and similar equipment when needed for crippled children.

The other half is sent to national headquarters, Mr. Odum added. It is used for research to find a means of preventing or curing polio, for the education of highly-skilled and much-needed professional personnel, and for epidemic aid to chapters whose local treasuries are exhausted or not sufficient to meet emergencies, as Sanford was two years ago.

He said that there were more than 10,000 polio victims in 1949 with total expense for treatment for these patients amounting to \$100,000 a day during the height of the epidemic. Mr. Odum pointed out that because the expense of caring for these patients is so high it is very necessary for the public to make a special effort to donate in the March of Dimes drive and to support the dances.

Britain To Accept Indochina Regime; U.S. Okey To Follow

Acheson Tells Congress
Korean Aid Is
Responsibility Of
U. S. Government

LONDON, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Britain will announce recognition of Bao Dai's regime in Indochina in the next week or so, diplomatic officials said today.

Parallel action probably will be taken by the United States soon afterwards, these sources said.

British recognition of Bao Dai will be de facto—an acceptance of the fact that his regime exists. Full—or de jure—recognition will be given only when the British are satisfied that the newly formed regime can cope with the national revolutionary movement which has torn Indochina ever since the Japanese occupation.

This country pointed France last year that it would recognize Bao Dai's government after the French parliament formally ratified the March 1949 accord between the Indochinese leader and Vincent Auriol, President of the French Republic.

That accord was ratified by the national assembly yesterday after bitter debate.

It gives Viet-Nam, Laos and Cambodia the three states which make up Indochina full internal autonomy but reserves defense and foreign affairs matters to be decided by a joint Indochinese-French high council in Paris.

American recognition of the new stage was foreshadowed Friday by Dr. Philip C. Jessup, Ambassador at Large, who sent a goodwill message to Bao Dai.

In Washington Secretary of State Acheson told Congress today that to stop economic aid to Korea now would be "most unfortunate." He said it would affect not only that young postwar republic but all of southeast Asia.

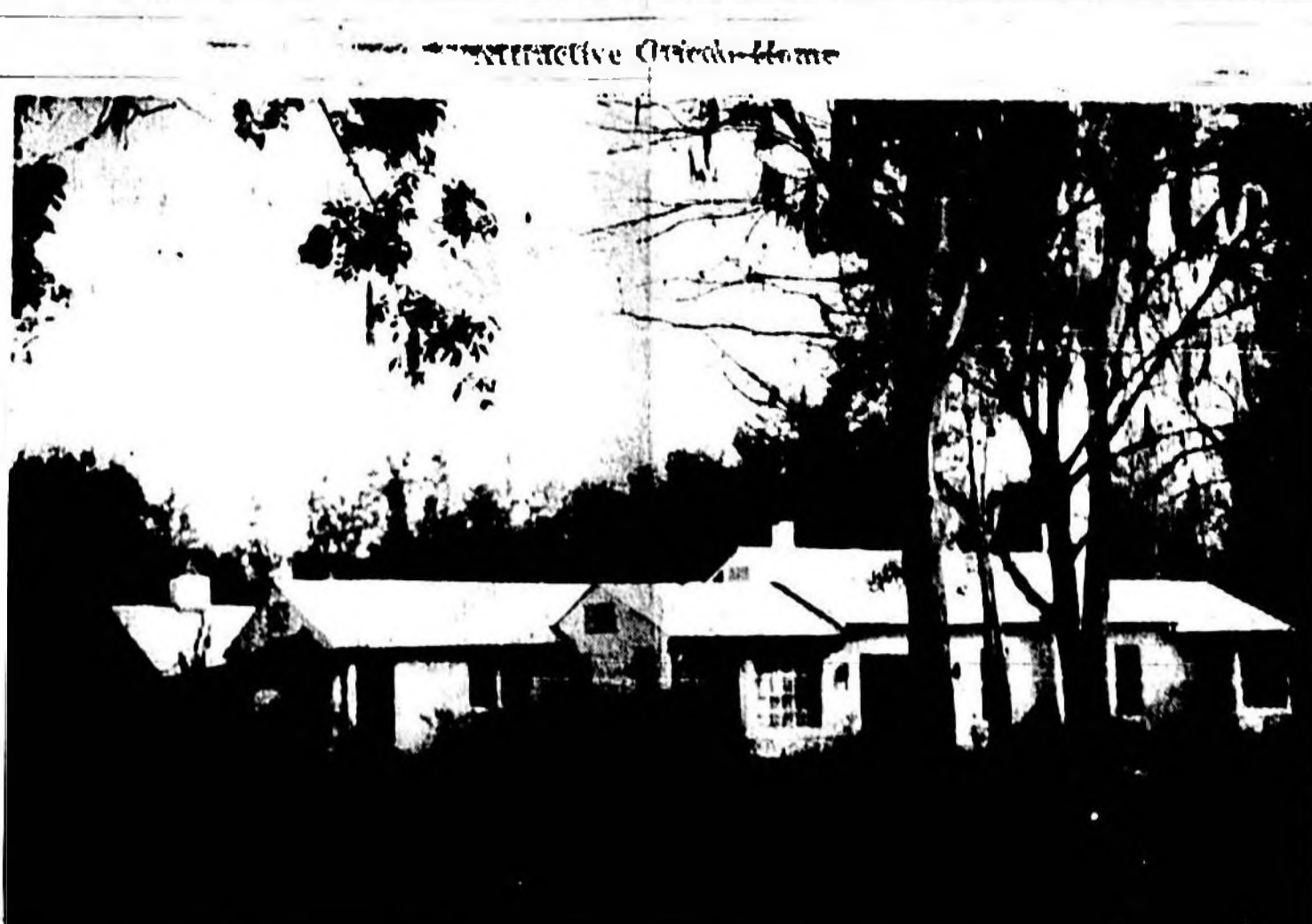
