County Adopts Budget

Authorization by the Office of Economic Opportunity of a \$50,000 fund to establish a skilled training center in Florida is expected today with every indication that the Sanford Naval Air Base will be the preferred location. This was given a meeting of the Sanford Industrial Commission Board today by Don Rathel, director, who said that such an announcement might well come from Gov. Claude Kirk in Tallahassee this morning.

Forward moves in the operations of the Board covering talks with new industries, untangling of governmental red tape to speed such aid where needed, and the establishment of procedures to handle effectively inquiries also occupied the attention of board members. Lee Moore was and there were two following members and guests attending H. H. Hodges, C. H. McNulty, A. K. Shoemaker, J. W. Southward, H. L. Slama, W. E. Knowles, city manager, and John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Rathel, board executive, reported four good prospects as having looked over the Sanford area during the past month. These included the Orlando Helicopter Airways, whose interest centered on the use of two hangars at the Naval Air Base. A furniture re-finishing firm was another prospect, and the Wall Street Journal of the Sanford area as attractive for industries who would want Economic Development Agency help starting in September, the meeting also heard about the EDA feasibility study which has been delayed due to misrouting in Washington.

The application for this study which would receive \$25,000 in EDA funds as now back on the right course and it can reasonably be expected that approval will take place and the study started by Sept. 15, Knowles explained. He added that a more immediate request for \$2,500 to pay for a topographical survey of the Naval Air Base should be approved at once.

Rathel also announced procedures for handling effectively the increasing number of inquiries which the progress in Sanford and the vacating of the four standstill committees were appointed. These are: Financing-Haward, Labor Relations-Harold Hodges, and Lee Moore. Facilities and Kay Shoemaker. Already the board has drawn up a form to send interested parties, which provides information to assist both sides to come to agreement.

All commissioners were impressed with the land use layout which features a botanical garden, curator facility, 18 exhibits, concession facility, amphitheater and parking for 100 cars in the first phase.

Altamonte OKs District Fire Aid

Altamonte Springs officials agreed Monday night, subject to approval of the council when it meets at 8 p.m. Wednesday, to furnish fire protection to outlying areas included in the Suburban Fire Control District for a trial period of one year.

Mayor Lawrence Stafford said that he expects the council to endorse the proposal and will instruct Town Attorney S. J. Davis Jr. to work with County Attorney Harold Johnson in drawing up the contract.

Members of the district fire commission, Tally Hattaway, chairman; Arthur Hagaw, vice chairman; Vernon Dunn, secretary; O. J. Seila, and A. R. Ginn, met with Altamonte officials in a last ditch effort to secure protection for the area before today's deadline—the county commission's budget hearing.

If his efforts had failed it would have meant postponing the action for another year.

Included in the fire control district are all areas outside the municipalities of Altamonte, Casselberry and Longwood that are within the boundaries of Highway 17-92, the Orange County lines, I-4, and SR 434.

In accepting the figure of \$10,375 proposed by the district officials for the fire protection service, Altamonte took almost an \$8,000 cut off the amount they had asked.

Councilman Charles Robinson told the group that this would mean eliminating some of the smaller equipment, but he felt that the sum would still be enough to cover salaries for two and a half full-time firemen and an additional tank truck and pumper.

Robinson also pointed out the importance of a dependable alert system, either radio or telephone, for the volunteer firemen who will supplement the paid firemen.

The need for volunteers in the various precincts in the district was also pointed out.

The contract, if approved, will go into effect until Oct. 1, but until then the Altamonte Volunteer Fire Department has agreed to answer calls in the district.

Mayor Stafford stated, "In the past 90 percent of our calls have been outside the city limits."

"People in this district want fire protection, voted for it and are willing to pay for it," Stafford said. He added that he has received calls from 20 people in the last two weeks in the district, who were afraid that they would be left without fire protection.

Dunn went on record as agreeing with one reservation, "Because the area is divided up and isolated, if Altamonte Springs' discontinuance should prevent it from organizing its own volunteer fire department, the only logical plan would be to ask Casselberry to contract," he declared.

The amount proposed by the district was based on the assessed value of property in the district and in the town.

Other commission participants in the discussion were Keith Nelson and Charles Newell.

Schools Up 634 Pupils

Seminole County's 23 public schools opened Monday with total beginning enrollment of 16,242, an increase of 634 students over first month figures for 1966.

Biggest increase in high school students is at Lyman school, with 1,126, up 104 from last year. Seminole High School, with 1,118, has 312 over last year while Crooms shows a decrease of 55 with this year's total of 1,091. Enrollment for all grades at Oviedo is at 835, increase of 115 over last year's figures.

Sanford Junior High School, with 1,064, has 98 more than last year. South Seminole Junior High has 1,060, up 205.

In the elementary schools enrollment this year and increases over last year, as listed, are: Altamonte, 912, up 102; Pinecrest, 1,165, up 102; Kingfish Estates, 621, up 103; Hopper, 258, up 35; Longwood, 562, up 41; Geneva, 161, up 11; Deuces were at Midway, 232, down 108; Jackson Heights, 245, down 108; Hootswald, 239, down 81; South Seminole, 809, down 37; Monroe Wilson, 212, down 21; Lake Mary, 780, down 11; Bear Lake, 594, down 11; Goldboro, 834, down seven, and

Bookertown, 56, down five.

Southside Primary School, with 326, is up five while Westside Grammar, with 412, is down 38.

Enrollment statistics reported at opening of the school term are expected to be increased within at least a two-month period with influx of seasonal labor and winter residents. Walter Teague, administrative assistant to Seminole County School Board, advised.

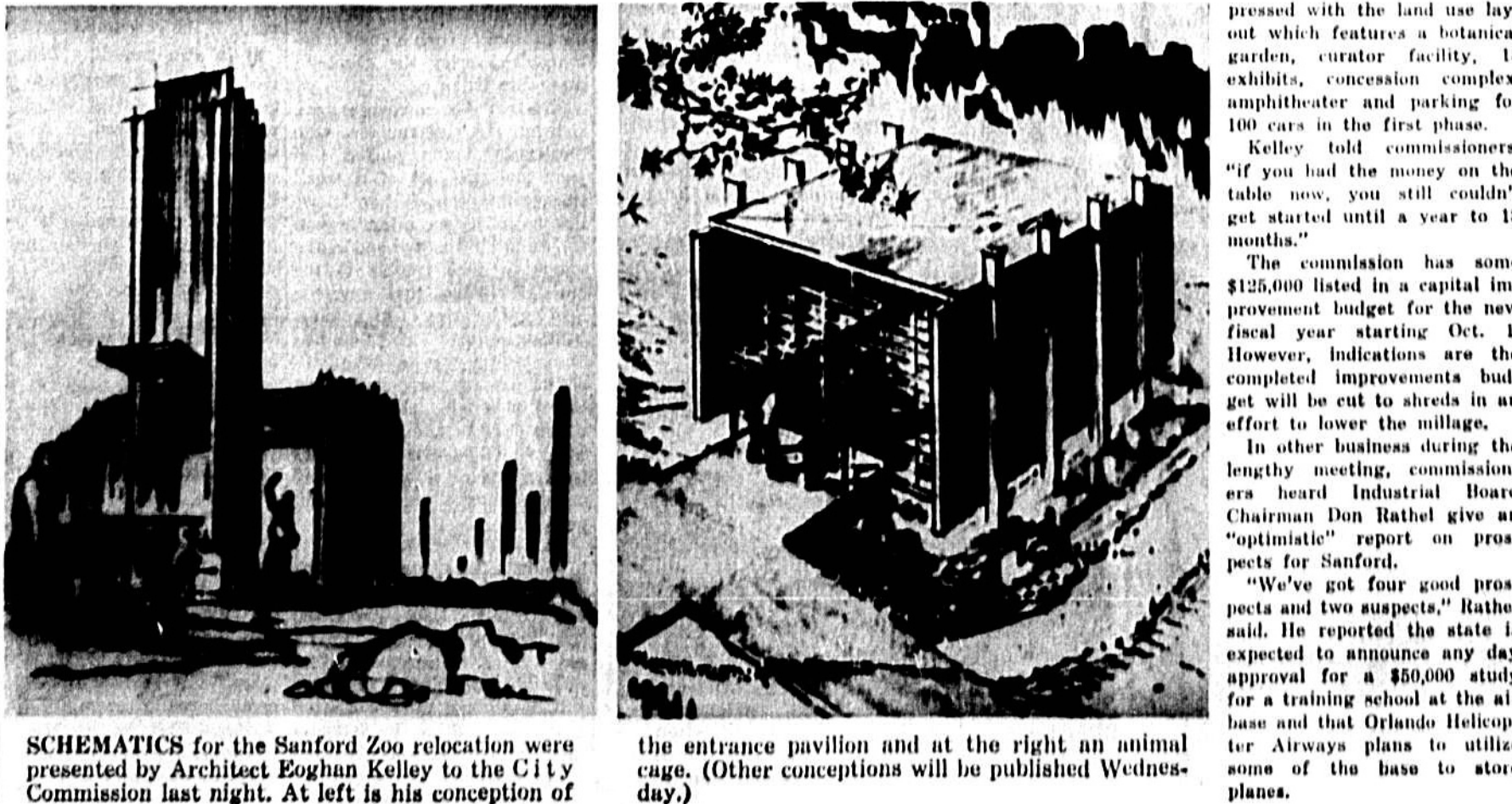

Kirk, who pressed the idea with legislators Monday, said he would hope such a constitutional amendment would be approved in the present constitutional revision session on the ballot in November.

Asked about the one-cent gas tax, Kirk said during his weekly news conference, Kirk replied: "Anything authorized by the people I would support and I would advocate it to the people."

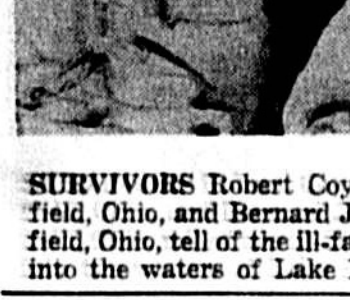
Kirk hedged when asked if such a stand would be against his no new taxes campaign pledge, stating: "I would only support it if the people voted for it... but then it's up to the people."

No Painless Approach

There is little argument across the state on the need for a massive road building program.

Indeed, the consensus is that the need is critical and long overdue.

As in the past years, the hangup is in how to build \$400 million worth of roads on a \$200 million income.

The handicap is you can't raise taxes. We have let too many years go by trying to squeak around that insurmountable handicap.

So it is that in 1967, \$400 million worth of roads is going to cost \$450 million and we still don't have the money.

A refreshing change of tact is noted in a plan offered by Jay Brown, Florida's new road commissioner, who at the Lake Mary Interchange dedication last week realized there is not going to be any completely painless way to raise the needed road money.

He suggests a five-year, \$450 million road bond program that would be financed by a penny a gallon gas tax hike.

This, combined with regular yearly funds, would give the state enough money to four-lane 1400 miles of existing roads and build more than 800 miles of new roads.

The new tax burden would be relatively light. Brown figured it at \$10 a mile and got 14 miles to the gallon.

A referendum would be required provided the Legislature went along with Brown's idea.

We feel, as does Brown, that the state has been hiding its head in the sand instead of facing its road needs.

As could be expected, the problem, far from going away, has been compounded.

Seminole is still in the early phase of a catch-up road building program and still is many miles of highway short of what it needs.

We hope that Mr. Brown's plan will be given an immediately and thorough study by the Legislature.

Anything less than that would indicate we are going to be content to leave our heads in the sand.

Chamber 'Harvest Days'

These are harvest days for the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. The calendar may depict this, but facts are stubborn things and they support this happy conclusion. As the slow but persistent upward trend of the economic tide in this city becomes more evident, we should not forget the foresight, persistence and courage of those who started this many years ago. Among these must be listed the men of the chamber.

When you pick up the telephone and dial Winter Park without toll charges, thank the motor telephone system which was so urged by the chamber. Drive along the lakefront and see the amazing and delightful Holiday Inn, House of Beef, Monroe Harbour marina taking shape. Wasn't this the neglected shoreline which attracted the vision of bankers, planners, publishers and municipal leaders and was brought about only by advocates who would not be discouraged? The chamber deserves a top spot in this list.

And now with the Port of Sanford's last legal barrier swept away, the chamber's drive for this facility — dating back for several years — gains important laurels. But a bumper crop in this harvest lies in the field of education.

Those members of the chamber who took up the fight for location of the Florida Technological University in the county, won an important victory when the bill was selected on the Seminole-Orange border. And what resident of Seminole does not take pride in the operation of Seminole Junior College with Dr. Earl Weldon at the helm as it promises safe passage over the stormy waters of Florida's educational rapids.

Thus we pay tribute to the groups of accomplishment which are now evident from the seeding, cultivating and spade work of the chamber. This is not to say that any member of the chamber is excused. Far from it. Witness the Wind-Dixie \$500,000 complex just breaking ground on First Street. Nor is it to imply that the chamber is not deeply concerned and working intently to remedy the almost unbelievable lack of roads to the FTU, or that the conversion of the Navy Air Base to an economic asset for the county is being overlooked.

But it is to say that the "proof of the pudding is in the eating," and that the menu of results now visible gives every indication that the chamber, with its hundreds of skilled, dedicated, persistent members can be counted on to keep such crops of accomplishment maturing.

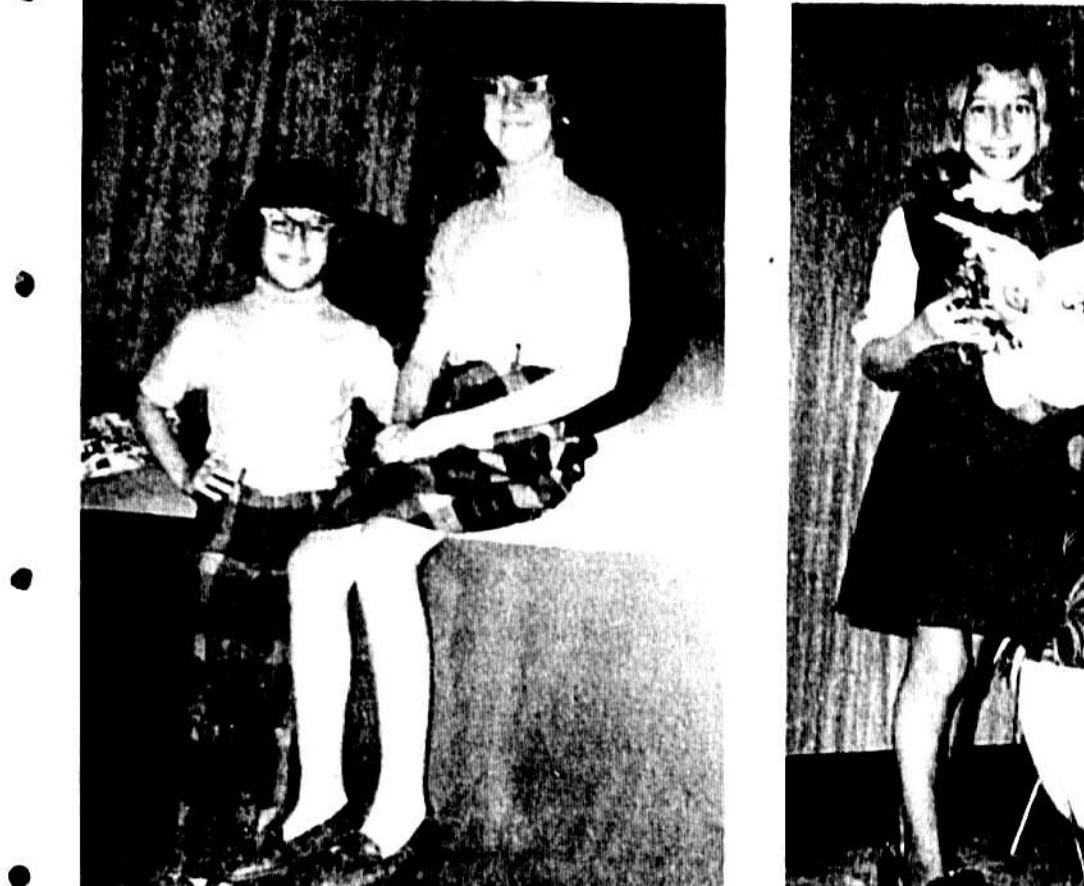

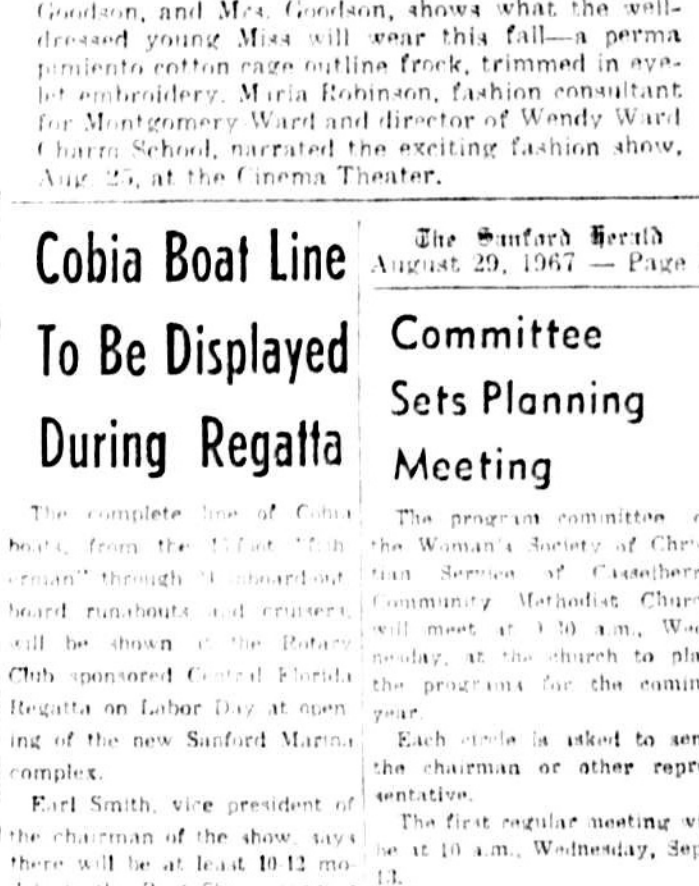

Motorcycle registrations in Florida rose from 21,442 in 1965 to 46,722 in 1966 for a gain of 47 per cent, while fatalities from two-wheel vehicles increased almost 100 per cent — 30 deaths in 1965 and 56 in 1966, said Leone.

In 1966, an estimated 2,000 persons across the country died in motorcycle accidents. Motorcycle accidents in relation to the number of motorcycles in the country is twice as high as the comparable rate for autos. Approximately two million motorcycles are registered in the United States.

Courthouse Suit Set Tomorrow

The long-awaited courthouse injunction suit will come to trial tomorrow morning starting at 9:30 before Judge Roger Dykes with a host of witnesses expected to be called.

Attorney for the plaintiffs, Harlan Tuck, reported today he plans to call Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beckwith Jr. as well as County Commission Chairman John Alexander. County Attorney Harold Johnson said he doesn't plan to call "any special" witnesses. However, there is a possibility he may call Architect John Burton IV. Most of the county's testimony already has been presented in the form of minutes for County Commission meetings.

City of Sanford entered the case to show it is the permanent county seat. City Attorney William Hutchison reported he will call appraiser A. R. Peterson Jr. and Sanford City Manager W. F. Knowles.

On Aug. 18 Judge Dykes denied a motion by the attorney for the two Sanford residents who filed the suit for summary judgment on account of the complaint which alleges no notice of the county's intent to consider building a courthouse was published.

Allegation that the county has been illegally leaving a specific tax over the past several years was made by Tuck. He pointed out the county has been leaving a tax for construction of a jail and repairs on the courthouse in 1960 and have continued leaving the tax after the repairs and jail construction were completed.

The county "may not have any present authority to proceed" with the courthouse, the judge said. He listed questions of fact that are disputed including the amount of funds accumulated through the special tax levy and if it is proposed to use the funds for the proposed facility.

"The old special levy may not be used," he said. "Financing of the courthouse would make the levy illegal if it is improper."

Hunt On For Three New School Sites

School officials will start hunting for three possible elementary school sites south of the Piercefield School, Weathersfield and Lake Howell areas immediately to handle overcrowded conditions in the county.

At an informal meeting Wednesday night Supt. of Schools William Phillips urged the board to start checking sites "now" and not wait until it is too late and property owners way out of proportion.

The most critical areas will be in the Sunland Estates area, Lake Howell including Tanglewood, Eastbrook and Weathersfield.

At the present time Pine Crest Elementary School enrollment is over 1,000.

In 1965, the state survey team listed needed proposed schools on the south side of Paola Road school sites 1.5 miles south of the Monroe School and two sites east of the Wilson School to handle 280 pupils.

Mandamas Petition Filed

The city's Civil Service Board and Police Chief Ben Butler today were subpoenaed to "show cause" why Ex-Police Lt. Joe Hickson was discharged from the department two months ago. A petition of mandamus was filed by an attorney for Hickson. A Circuit Court requesting that Hickson be reinstated to the department and entitled to all benefits.

The case will come before Judge William Ackridge Sept. 27 at 11 a.m.

Two months ago, the Civil Service Board upheld the firing of Hickson by Police Chief Butler after a lengthy today session.

Hickson had been accused of conduct unbecoming a police officer and other charges.

Hickson's attorney had 60 days to file an appeal in Circuit Court which he did not do. Indications are he is taking this route in an attempt to show the Civil Service Board acted illegally in ruling on Hickson.

Speculation is that it will be difficult for Hickson's attorney to prove the Civil Service Board acted illegally when one of its members is one of Sanford's most prominent attorneys — Mack Cleveland Jr.
