# Lake Mary storm water fee stopped

LAKE MARY — The city's proposed Stormwater Utility Ordinance was stopped last night. The Lake Mary City Commission defeated the proposal on first

reading with a 3 to 2 vote.

Mayor Randy Morris and Commissioners Paul Tremel and David Mealor voted against it.

The Ordinance would have charged each home owner 83 per month, with a higher amount for commercial buildings, based on the amount of stormwater runoff. The money would be used to finance major stormwater drainage programs throughout the city.

"The ordinance that would have charged \$3 a month is a dead issue now," Morris said today. "The majority of the Commission agreed that we cannot enact a charge like that without first establishing a policy and defining our priorities."

During last night's meeting, Commissioner Mealor commented, "Why collect the \$3 per household when eventually it won't be adequate for what we need to do." He added, "I have a hard time asking \*\*See something that won't get us snywhere."

Mealor complained, "As I see this, only 5 percent

The park area, between Rantoul

Lane and the the Timacuan Subdivision, is planned to have four softball and baseball fields as well as volleyball courts, soccer fields, and numerous other sports activity

The next step will require the City to apply to the State for an official permit to relocate the tortoises. "Depending on how long all of this takes." Holland explained, "It could delay the start of construction on the sports complex."

The actual start of construction at the park has not been determined, with construction bids have already been opened by the City.

"We've determined there are 113 active burrows and 16 inactive burrows on the property." explained. "We don't know exactly how many of the Gopher turtles may be there, but we have counted 70 to 80 so far."

#### Jury acquits man of rape

TAMPA - A Jury acquitted a man of sexually assaulting a woman in a rape Irial that included testimony from the sons of prominent Tampa families who had struck plea deals in the

Carl Allison, 26, was accused of picking up the 22-year-old Clearwater woman at a bar last April, slipping her LSD and assaulting her with his hand, a shoehorn and a miniature liquor bottle as she lay unconscious.

The jury, which deliberated eight hours, acquitted Allison late Thursday on all three counts of sexual battery.

But the panel found him guilty of felony delivery of LSD. petty theft of the woman's driver's license and of tampering with evidence for destroying photos taken that night.

"I think it's an absolute, 100 percent victory," said Allison's attorney Norman Cannella.

Circuit Judge Barbara Fleischer ordered Allison held until his sentencing on April 27 - exactly one year after the alleged

nttack. He faces up to 10 years in prison.

Prosecutor Hardy Pickard said he did not want to comment before Allison's sentencing. He said he hasn't considered what sentence he will ask the judge to impose.

#### Suspended attorney on trial

FORT LAUDERDALE - A suspended attorney is on trial for grand theft, alleged by a woman who says he charged her

\$28,000 for a divorce she never obtained.

Judith Burtis said that four years after she hired Frederick E. Graves, she still is seeking a divorce, but can't afford one.

"I've got to get money back from him before I can pay new lawyers for my divorce," said Burtis, who now lives on Long Island, N.Y. "The word 'dishonest' is too polite a word for this man, He's a liar and a skilled thief."

Graves went on trial in Broward Circuit Court on Wednesday.

Graves, 45, who has been suspended from practicing law for the next two decades, says he committed no crime.

#### Man unfit for trial

WEST PALM BEACH - A man's fear of leaving the house from which he allegedly ran a prosiliution ring has left him mentally unfit for trial, a judge ruled.

John H. Kelly, 56, suffers from acute agoraphobia, a fear of open spaces, and cannot come to court to face charges that he ran an escort service.

Kelly will not be involuntarily committed to a state mental hospital, the fate of most incompetent defendants, because he is not a danger to himself or society. Circuit Judge Hubert

Lindsey ruled Wednesday.

The future of the case, which could cost taxpayers \$1 million, is now unknown, according to court-appointed attorneys representing five others charged, including Kelly's wife. Maxine, and her stepdaughter.

Kelly allegedly was the kingpin. Attorneys said it would be ridiculous to continue the case against the others, considering the cost to taxpayers and the potential punishment.

# Area truckers wait for licenses

### Division sets up special lines, list

SANFORD - While state driver's license officials say customers are waiting up to five hours as truckers crowd centers to get their new commercial licenses, the Division of Driver Licences in Sanford has set up separate lines for the truckers.

"We're averaging about 25 or 30 a day for the written test." Examiner Leona Chard of

the Sanford office said this morning. "We have a waiting list of about 14 for this morning and are starting another one for this afternoon."

Officials have some ideas to speed regular license renewals, but an April I deadline for the commercial licenses is causing some severe temporary congestion. Drivers with routine applications or renewals can save time by calling ahead to check on the crowds, Ed Birk, spokesman for the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, said Thursday.

The agency estimates 200,000 to 250,000 truck drivers need the commercial licenses. More than 171,000 have been issued so far.

taken at the regular drivers license office, commercial drivers must take a skills test. Locally, that test is administered by five to seven examiners based out of the interstate 4 rest stop on the westbound side near Lake Mary.

According to Helen Howard, regional administrator of the Division of Driver Licences, the examiners are each averaging about five tests per 10 hour day.

"We just now opened testing on Saturdays to try to accomodate all those who put this off to the last minute," she said.

### Millions recovered under Lemon Law

TALLAHASSEE - Florida's Lemon Law helped 726 consumers with complaints about new cars in 1989 and 1990 recover over \$14 million, an

audit released Thursday said.

However, only half of the new car buyers during that period received bookleta explaining their rights under the Lemon Laws a report by the office of Auditor General Charles Lester said.

Manufacturers are required under a 1983 law, which was strengthened five years later, to provide consumers with a booklet prepared by the state explaining the law. The state has fined manufacturers almost \$2.5 million for failing to distribute the booklet.

The New Motor Vehicle Arbitration Board consists of 10 panels that hear cases throughout

From January 1989 through December 1990,

1,071 consumers filed for arbitration. Thirteen percent were rejected because the customer had not given the manufacturer an opportunity to fix

The state board heard 484 cases and decided two-thirds of them — 319 — in favor of the consumer, resulting in \$6.0 million in vehicle refunds and replacements. Another 409 cases agree settled before arbitration began for \$7.1

In addition to the board, eight manufacturers have "informal dispute settlement procedures." If those programs are certified by the state, a customer must use them first.

According to the audit report, a third of the 1.103 complaints processed through the manufacturers resulted in the company getting another chance to fix the car or truck. In 27 percent of the cases, the customer was awarded a refund or

#### **Toxins found** in St. Johns River fish

SANFORD - The extent of pollution in the Seminole County portions of the St. Johns remain unknown after surprising levels of mercury, dioxin and other toxic chemicals were found in fish and sediment in the St. Johna River near Jacksonville.

"What we did was uncover for the first time how bad the situation might be. It appears to be worse than we thought." John Schell, a toxicologist with the St. Johns River Water Management District, told The Flor-Ida Times-Union.

Schell said this morning the study focused only on the Lower St. Johns River in the Jacksonville River. Elevated levels of mercury have been discovered in the St. Johns River upatream from Lake Monroe by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

State health officials warn largemouth bass caught in the river south of State Road 415 should not be eaten more than once a week by healthy adults and once a month by pregnant women and young children because of the mercury content.

The study by the St. Johns River Water Management District found problems in the river from Jacksonville to Palatka. Schell said the study is not complete, but no verification of the tost results will be needed. The study was a "thumbnail sketch' of the river's problems, and more research is needed to determine the environmental and human risk from the pollutants, Schell said.

Previous studies found pollution in the river's tributaries, but this is the first that extensively examined the pollutants and unalyzed fish tissue, Schell said.





McLain, 43, is making his second bid for elected office. In 1990, McLain lost by a 47-53 margin to Jeanne Morris for the

McLain had become involved with school issues through his public opposition in 1990 to the proposed \$520 million school bond.

He serves on the Republican Executive Committee and attended the 1968 Republican National Convention as a delegate of the Young Republicans. McLain has also served on the Seminole County Solid Waste Committee.

McLain has owned a Sanford insurance business for 12 years. Previously, he ran a construction company and worked as a counnelor for troubled youth.

McLain is nearly a life-long resident of Seminole County. McLain is married to Barbara McLain. They have two children.

# Knowing better

"model minority" who have largely overcome discrimination seems as misleading as most other stereotypes. Many Asians have achieved great success in this country. But increasingly, Asian-Americans, both those who have been in this country many generations as well as new immigrants, are lacing higher levels of racial violence and prejudice.

According to a two-year study by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, anti-Asian bias exists at all social and economic levels and in virtually all walks of life.

Well-educated Asian-American engineers complained to commissioners about finding themselves pigeonholed as good technocrats only, lacking the "communication skills" necessary for top management positions. New immigrants say English-only work rules are used to deny them jobs or promotions. And Asians from all socioeconomic levels express concern abut the growing tendency to blame Japan for all of America's economic problems

Japan for all of America's economic problems and by the hostility growing from that.

The evidence of bigotry cited by the commission is widespread and alarming: the murder of Southeast Asian immigrant children in a Stockton, Calif., schoolyard; the boycott of Korean grocery stores by blacks in New York: discriminatory admission policies New York; discriminatory admission policies at some of the nation's most prestigious

universities, among many other incidents.

The report focused particular attention on politicians, calling on them to refrain from Japan-bashing and other forms of race-baiting in upcoming election campaigns. But only a few days after the report was issued. Sen. Ernest Hollings told South Carolina factory workers to "draw a mushroom cloud and put underneath it" 'Made in America by lazy, illiterate Americans and tested in Japan." Hollings later said it was only a joke. Japan." Hollings later said it was only a joke, but added: "I'm glad I said it." That's disgraceful.

As the commission report reminds us, the tensions are not new. Anti-Asian sentiment in this country has a long and shameful history. But by now we should know better. Do we?

#### A revolting predicament

Remember when a man was considered a hero if he captured some dirt-bag who attacked a woman? Those were the days when actor John Wayne portrayed a guy with a tough-as-leather exterior but a deep, noble sense of justice and the guts to rescue a lady in distress

Later, his film roles came under attack for being simpliatic and, what's worse, lacking sensitivity to the socioeconomic-environmental reasons that "force" people "force" people into criminal acis.

A recent site of such thinking is San Francisco. A jury there awarded \$24,595 to a mugger injured by a cab-driver who saw him attacking a female Japanese tourist, then chased and pinned the mugger against awall with his taxi.

Now serving a 10-year sentence for the robbery, the convict sued, claiming he deserved damages for injury to his leg because the cabble used "excessive force"

during the capture. The jurors agreed.
Irate over this transparent "the criminal is
the victim" case, citizens raised \$25,000 within six days after a radio station called for donations to pay the taxi driver's fine. But his cab company employer said it would pay that, so the citizens' donations will to to a victima' rights fund.

Now John Wayne would have liked that.



### JACK ANDERSON **United Way tiff** is still not over

WASHINGTON - Knee-deep in a scandal over the way it does business. United Way of America has moved fast to do damage control. But not nearly as fast as United Way officials would have you think. The emphasis throughout the scandal has been less on cleaning up the mess and more on prolecting outgoing United Way President William Aramony. Now the agency is sitting on a report that sources describe as damning to Aramony's operation.

In early February, we reported on the high living and insider arrangements for Aramony and top officials of United Way of Amer.:a, the "headquarters" of the nationwide charity organization. Since then, the local United Way affiliates who raise the money and spread it around among the needy have worked hard to distance themselves from the headquarters. Some are even withholding the dues they pay to United Way of America.

Aramony resigned under pressure on Feb. 25. But sources told our associate Alicia Mundy that high-ranking United Way officials had information about Aramony nearly a month earlier that was "anything but positive." On Feb. 3, after learning that reporters from Regardie's magazine and The Washington Post were snooping around Aramony's record, the United Way of America board gave him a "resounding voic of confidence."

At that point the board had already hired its own investigators to check the allegations. That investigation wasn't finished, but a source said even then, "The report was source said even then. "The report was replete with information that would lead you to not give a vote of confidence for Aramony. had the executive committee absorbed it. The report had everything that would later emerge in news reports "and much more," the source added.

United Way had hired Washington attorney Berl Bernhard to do the independent investigation, and Bernhard hired reputable Washington investigator Terry Lenzner and his firm, Investigative Group Inc.

When the board gave its vote of confidence, several local United Way affiliates acreamed that the investigation must have been a whitewash. Later, after Aramony resigned, Bernhard told the nationwide United Way organization that the board had not based its vote on the investigative report.

We have a memo dated Feb. 5 from a United Way public relations person to the chief officers that refers to the investigation and says the vote was "based on the information now available." Bernhard made a synopsis of it for board chairman John Akers and others in the top United Way hierarchy before the vote, but Bernhard wouldn't tell us the tone of that synopsis, so it's unclear whether it reflected the negative tone of the investigation at that point.

As a further twist, we have learned that Bernhard's law firm may not have been the most "independent" source United Way could have picked to do the outside investigation. The firm has done "limited work" for United Way before, and the former United Way counsel had previously worked at

A spokesman for Akers said that the law firm now has "its marching orders" for the investigation and "we will get to the bottom of everything." But some local affiliates attll feel they are getting the runaround from United Way of America.

The "perception of stonewalling" hurt the local chapters, said one Washington, D.C., chapter official. That chapter is withholding Its \$720,000 dues to United Way of America. "We don't have answers yet, and until we get them, that (expletive) trade association doesn't get their dues."

With the approval of the expenditure, Holland will be con-tracting with Dr. Storm Richards to handle the relocating. "Mr. Richards said he would

charge the City \$150 for each tortoise, to move them out of here." Holland mid. "With the number he believes we may have, we expect the total amount will go up to approximately \$18,000."

The money would be taken from the Parks and Recreation Department budget. "This means we'll probably have to cut some expenses at the park somewhere down the line." Holland said, "but we'll get to that after we resolve this problem."

Holland explained, "Seminole County has granted approval for

Richards to transfer the tortoises from the park area to the Seminole County Landfill area." He explained that the State requires any such relocation to be at a level of two tortoises per acre of land for relocation.

#### Cop says beating warranted

#### By LINDA DEUTSCH Associated Press Writer

SIMI VALLEY, Cald. - A police sergeant accused of assaulting Rodney King told jurors the beating may have looked brutal but was "a managed and controlled use of

"I take responsibility for all the actions. I directed the use of force," Sgt. Stacey Koon said Thursday during crossexamination. "It followed the policies of the Los Angeles Police Department and the training.

Koon, 41, acknowledged that people outamiliar with police work may consider the videotaped beating brutal.

"h was done to control an aggressive, combative suspect and sometimes police work is brutal. It's a fact of life," Koon

Koon and three other white officers are charged with brutalizing King, who is black, after a high-speed chase on March 3, 1991. King was hit with batons, kicked and shocked with a stungun.

The beating was videotaped by a bystander and broadcast na-Honwide, sparking outrage,

Koon portrayed Ring as a threatening aggressor, a imiscular man who "gave out a bear-like yell? when struck with a stun gun and groaned 'like a wounded animal."

He said he immediately sized up Ring as an ex-convlct, and said be appeared to be on the drug PCP. Tests later showed no sign of the drug.

Asked about Officer Laurence Powell, accused of landing the most blows. Koon said. formed the optition that Officer Powell was exasperated and was in tear for his life.

He said he's sure Powell did not hit King in the head.

Koon, 41, is charged along with officers Powell, 29. Theodore Briseno.39 and

Timothy Wind, 34. Deputy District Attorney Alan Yochelson slinwed Koon segments of the valeotape in slow motion, highlighting scenes in which a fallen King was beaten by baton-wielding officers. Koon said they were trying to get the

suspect to lie prone.
"What position is Mr. King in now?" usked Yochelson as he froze a frame on the screen.

"He's lying on the ground." Roon said.

"Is he in the position you wanted?

No. 'Close enough?' No

At one point, Yochelson noted that Ring appeared to be in a tetal position as he was beaten. Koon said he didn't see it that way. "I would describe it as coming up on his knees."

Under questioning by his lawyer, Darryl Monnger, Koon, a 16 year veteran of the police force, suggested that the beating would have ended more guickly if officers had used a chokehold.

"Why did you hesitate to use the chakehold?" asked Mounger, Because in Los Angeles the chokehold is associated with

deaths of blacks," Koon said. The Police Commission allows the chokehold only to cases where police are threatened

enough to fire their weapons. Koon said he was thinking about using the chokehold when King hirally gave up.

"He yelled, "Please stop," and raised his hands in a compliance. mode." Koon said. "I ordered my officers to back off, I felt be was submitting to my authori-15







PHILADELPHIA - Carole Orzel is trapped in a body that grows normal bone in abnormal places, encasing her in a skeletal shell.

Bone started to grow in the muscles of her neck when she was 2. Now 32, she's almost completely immobilized and spends her days perched on a motorized wheelchair.

Ms. Orzel has a rare disorder called fibrodysplasia ossificans progressiva, known as FOP.

The disease affects only about 100 people in the United States, and even among doctors FOP has been little known and even less understood. Many FOP patients were

misdiagnosed as children and subjected to treatment that did more harm than good. A Georgia girl, now 10, had her right arm and shoulder amputated before doctors realized she didn't have cancer. There is reason for hope. Two

Philadelphia doctors, who in 1989 began the first collaborative FOP research, are starting to study possible treatments based on genetic clues uncovered in the past three years. A treatment couldn't come

soon enough for Lisa and Pat Gillooly of Albuquerque, N.M., whose 3-year-old daughter, Sara, has FOP. They brought her to Philadelphia recently to be examined by Dr. Frederick Kaplan and Dr. Michael Zasloff.

Pointy lumps of bone poke out the skin along Sara's spine. The lumps don't show underneath a sweatshirt, and she looks perfectly healthy as she plays catch with her father while the grownups talk, but she can't bend over to tie her shoes.

"If we don't do anything, her hips will be affected by the time she's 10," said Zasloff, chief of the division of molecular biology and human genetics at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

Surgery is out of the question. Any attempt to remove the bone stimulates even more laine to grow, according to Kaplan, chief of the division of metabolic bone disease at The Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania

While realizing the importance of their research for people who suffer from FOP, about 2,500 worldwide, the doctors say it has much broader implications for medical science

unraveling clues to a whole spectrum of bone disorders. ranging from malformation of the limbs in newborns, to later degenerative diseases like arthritis and osteoporosis," Kaplan said.

"We know there's a genetic switch, so the question becomes. what is the switch that falls to turn off ... that allows a whole set of bone to form?

'If we can use the clues from FOP to find that switch, we will have found a very potent tool that can be used to turn on bone formation in other conditions," he said.

The first indication of FOP is malformed big toes, the last bones to develop in a fetus. The abnormal bone growth usually begins in childhood and is heralded by painful swellings in muscles and connective tissues along the spine and limbs. These awellings, which often resemble tumors, mature into normal bone. The bone grows in ribbons, crowding out muscles and bridging joints.

People with FOP may have a normal life span, but typically do not, Kaplan said. They are most threatened by pneumonia or other respiratory problems, due to restricted movement of the chest cavity, and by starvation due to fusion of the law.

"This is not a sickness," Kaplan said. "This is a disorder that leads to a terrible handi-

cap."
Ms. Orzel fights hard to overcome her handicap. Even though she can't raise her hands much off her thighs, she insists on doing things for herself. She manipulates arm-length sticks with various clamps on the ends to lift a fork to her mouth, put on eye makeup and paint land-

"If you think I'm going to sit in here and twiddle my thumbs for the rest of my life you're crazy." she said. "I have a lot to do."

Ever since her mother died about 10 years ago. Ms. Orzel has lived in a nursing home for people who use wheelchairs. Every morning she buzzes down the halls delivering mail. a rdical science.

"FOP holds the promise of little income.

Until recently, most adults with FOP had never met another person with the disorder. They describe the feeling of isolation as like living on a descried island.

Jeannie Peeper, 33, of Casaciberry. Fla., decided to do something about it. She asked Zaaloff, who was then at the National Institutes of Health, for a list of people with FOP. And she started writing them.

What developed was a quarterly newsletter and the International FOP Association, incorporated in 1988 with Ma. Peeper as president.

The association disseminates

information to people with FOP, identifies new patients, raises money for research and serves as a link between the patients and the medical community.
Until Sara's parents found Ms.

Peeper in November, they were unaware of the FOP research project in Philadelphia and had little hope for their daughter's future.

'It was the first indication we had that anyone lived past their 20s," Pat Gillooly said.

You look at (Sara) now and know that in 10 years she could be in a wheelchair, but there's a lot worse things to have," Lisa Gillooly said.

Carol Kurplel of Peachtree City, Ga., whose daughter Ashley had her shoulder and arm amputated at age 3, remembers a similar feeling of relief after getting in touch with Ms. Peeper.

"We didn't know if she was going to live into her teen-age life," Ms. Kurpiel said. "We were teaching her that we're all not here forever. We thought she was going to be ill. We didn't know what to expect.

But then we met Jeannie, and hey, life can still go on, even If you're in a wheelchair.'

Nancy and Andy Sando of Pekoakey, Mich., both have FOP and use wheelchairs, but that didn't stop them from getting married or working. They met in 1988 when she was writing letters to help Ms. Peeper set up the IFOPA. 'I think you strive harder

when you have a lot of obstacles to overcome," said Mrs. Sando, 32. "You want to accomplish something in your life."

Jessica Scully, 30, works in the University of Cincinnati finance department and has a 24-year-old daughter, who did not inherit FOP. Ms. Scully, who has been using a wheelchair since she was a teen-ager, is glad her child was a girl.

#### Doubts about Earhart don't shake retirees

By BILL KACZOR **Associated Press Writer** 

PENSACOLA - Two multary retirees are not budging from their theory on Amelia Earhart's disappearance 55 years ago in the face of criticism from doubters.

"We're not backing down at all." Tom Gannon have what we consider overwhelming evidence, more so than anyone close even came close to."

The theory of Gannon and Tom Willi, both from nearby Fort Walton Beach, that Ms. Earhart landed on Gardner Island, now known as Nikumaroro, in the Pacific Ocean received a strong endorsement Monday from Richard Oilleaple of The International Group for Historic Aircraft Recovery.

At a Washington, D.C. news conference Gillespie said items he recovered from the Pacific atoil proved that Willi and Gannon were correct. Gillespie claimed parts of a shoe and the top of medicine pottle were Ms. Earhart's and a piece of metal was from her plane.

Since then, however, other Earhart enthusiasta have stepped forward to dispute the theory.

Willi, a retired Navy pilot and navigation school owner, and Gannon, a former Air Force and airline navigator, used their knowledge of flying and navigation and records on weather conditions, fuel and radio transmissions to plot a probable course to Gardner.

The uninhabited stoll is about 350 miles south of Howland Island, the intended destination of Ms. Earhart and her navigator, Fred Noonan, on a 2,561-mile hop from New Guinea.

Among those who dispute the theory is Vincent Loomis, also an Air Force retiree, from Pensacola. He wrote a book and produced a documentary in 1985, both titled "Amelia Earhart: The Final
