Young scholars named

The McKnight Achievers Society will induct 72 young scholars from Seminole County into their society for academically talented students.

The induction ceremony, which will take place Saturday at St. Mark A.M.E. Church in Orlando, will include 278 students from Seminole, Orange, Osceola and Polk counties.

The McKnight Achievers Society, a part of the McKnight Center for Excellence, is a program offered through the University of Central Florida and financed through a grant from the Florida Endowment Fund for Higher Education. There

are 10 such centers throughout the state.

Minority students in public, private and parochial schools who maintain A and B averages are eligible for nomination in the group. The students are recognized as exemplary by their teachers and the administrators at their school.

Students from kindergarten through 12th grade are eligible for the program.

"This ceremony is a way of publically recognizing these students," Cecelia Rivers, director of the McKnight Center for Excellence, said Thursday.

"It's just our way of saying that we are proud of their accomplishments and hard work," she said.

The society has inducted nearly 1,000 students

since its inception in 1985.

"And even that number does not adequately reflect the amount and quality of the academic talent found among the minority population in Central Florida," Rivers said.

She noted that the search is continuing at all local schools to provide the membership to all the students who are eligible.

During tomorrow's candlelight ceremony, students will receive t-shirts, pins, certificates and sports jackets with the society's insignia.

During monthly meetings, members of the McKnight Society "practice how to become tomorrow's leaders," Rivers said. Topics at the

Lake Mary storm water fee stopped

LAKE MARY — The city's proposed Stormwater Utility Ordinance was stopped last night. The Lake Mary City Commission defeated the proposal on first reading with a 3 to 2 vote.

Mayor Randy Morris and Commissioners Paul Tremel and David Meador voted against it.

The Ordinance would have charged each home owner \$3 per month, with a higher amount for commercial buildings, based on the amount of stormwater runoff. The money would be used to finance major stormwater drainage programs throughout the city.

"The ordinance that would have charged \$3 a month is a dead issue now," Morris said today. "The majority of the Commission agreed that we cannot enact a charge like that without first establishing a policy and defining our priorities."

During last night's meeting, Commissioner Meador commented, "Why collect the \$3 per household when eventually it won't be adequate for what we need to do." He added, "I have a hard time asking \$3 for something that won't get us anywhere."

Meador complained, "As I see this, only 5 percent of the money we would obtain from this Stormwater

Tortoises could delay sports complex

LAKE MARY — Gopher turtles could be the first to use Lake Mary's proposed new major sports complex. The City however, will spend up to \$18,000 to prevent it.

During last night's Lake Mary City Commission meeting, Parks and Recreation Director John Holland obtained Commission ap-

proval to spend up to \$18,000, to have the tortoises removed from the 36 acres of land to be developed into the sports complex.

Commissioner Paul Tremel moved to approve the money. In seconding the motion, Commissioner David Meador observed, "I see we have no choice in this. It's either move the gopher tortoises or lose the State grant money for the park development."

The park area, between Rantoul

Lane and the the Timacuan Subdivision, is planned to have four softball and baseball fields as well as volleyball courts, soccer fields, and numerous other sports activity areas.

The next step will require the City to apply to the State for an official permit to relocate the tortoises. "Depending on how long all of this takes," Holland explained, "It could delay the start of construction on the sports complex."

The actual start of construction at the park has not been determined, with construction bids have already been opened by the City.

"We've determined there are 113 active burrows and 16 inactive burrows on the property," He explained. "We don't know exactly how many of the Gopher turtles may be there, but we have counted 70 to 80 so far."

Poor may get more free food

SANFORD — Seminole County is seeking to expand free food distributions to needy residents.

County officials say they have received favorable responses from Publix and Winn-Dixie grocery stores indicating an interest to donate food for the program.

Officials report area farmers have also told them they would allow the needy to harvest limited amounts of food from their fields.

Dr. Jorge Deju, director of the county Health and Human Services Department, said the effort to increase the amount of free food availability began in 1991 after the South Seminole Christian Sharing Center dropped plans to offer a federal free food program. The program had been dropped by the Salvation Army in 1990.

He said a committee of social service officials will try to determine what additional food is needed now that they have determined what additional food is available.

"There is more food available than we originally thought," said Deju. "There has been a concern for some time, but what the actual need is, that's hard to determine."

Food is available for the needy under several different programs. Under the state Women, Infants and Children program administered by the health department, food vouchers for mothers and infants are distributed to about 3,800 families monthly.

Food stamps are distributed to about 8,400 families in the county monthly.

In addition, the South Seminole Christian Sharing Center, Catholic Social Services, Salvation Army and Jewish Family Services all distribute food to needy families.

McLain running for commission

SANFORD — Local Insurance executive Daryl McLain began his campaign for the District 5 Seminole County commission seat Thursday with battle weapons ablaze against incumbent Jennifer Kelley.

"The incumbent has severe credibility problems and will have extreme difficulty in November if she were to face Democratic Party opposition," said McLain. "The incumbent's history in public office is one checkered with either poor judgments or the appearance of impropriety."

McLain said he referred to Kelley's 1990 conviction for campaign finance violations and her votes that favored the mother of her ex-husband,

 Thursday, McLain opened his

campaign account and formally began his bid for the Republican primary September 1. McLain said he will serve as both manager and treasurer of his campaign. He said he has targeted a contribution goal of \$35,000. He said he does not plan to contribute heavily to his campaign.

The District 5 race already includes Kelley, who is completing her first four-year term, and county critic Art Davis, who lost to Kelley in 1988. The Republican primary victor will face Democratic opposition in November. Environmentalist Fred Hardin of west Sanford has announced his candidacy as a Democrat.

McLain, 43, is making his second bid for elected office. In 1990, McLain lost by a 47-53 margin to Jeanne Morris for the

District 5 school board race. McLain had become involved with school issues through his public opposition in 1990 to the proposed \$520 million school bond.

He serves on the Republican Executive Committee and attended the 1988 Republican National Convention as a delegate of the Young Republicans. McLain has also served on the Seminole County Solid Waste Committee.

McLain has owned a Sanford insurance business for 12 years. Previously, he ran a construction company and worked as a counselor for troubled youth.

McLain is nearly a life-long resident of Seminole County. McLain is married to Barbara McLain. They have two children.

Knowing better

The picture of Asian-Americans as the "model minority" who have largely overcome discrimination seems as misleading as most other stereotypes. Many Asians have achieved great success in this country. But increasingly, Asian-Americans, both those who have been in this country many generations as well as new immigrants, are facing higher levels of racial violence and prejudice.

According to a two-year study by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, anti-Asian bias exists at all social and economic levels and in virtually all walks of life.

Well-educated Asian-American engineers complained to commissioners about finding themselves pigeonholed as good technicians only, lacking the "communication skills" necessary for top management positions. New immigrants say English-only work rules are used to deny them jobs or promotions. And Asians from all socioeconomic levels express concern about the growing tendency to blame Japan for all of America's economic problems and by the hostility growing from that.

The evidence of bigotry cited by the commission is widespread and alarming: the murder of Southeast Asian immigrant children in a Stockton, Calif., schoolyard; the boycott of Korean grocery stores by blacks in New York; discriminatory admission policies at some of the nation's most prestigious universities, among many other incidents.

The report focused particular attention on politicians, calling on them to refrain from Japan-bashing and other forms of race-baiting in upcoming election campaigns. But only a few days after the report was issued, Sen. Ernest Hollings told South Carolina factory workers to "draw a mushroom cloud and put underneath it 'Made in America by lazy, illiterate Americans and tested in Japan.'" Hollings later said it was only a joke, but added: "I'm glad I said it." That's disgraceful.

As the commission report reminds us, the tensions are not new. Anti-Asian sentiment in this country has a long and shameful history.

But by now we should know better. Do we?

A revolting predicament

Remember when a man was considered a hero if he captured some dirt-bag who attacked a woman? Those were the days when actor John Wayne portrayed a guy with a tough-as-leather exterior but a deep, noble sense of justice and the guts to rescue a lady in distress.

Later, his film roles came under attack for being simplistic and, what's worse, lacking sensitivity to the socioeconomic-environmental reasons that "force" people into criminal acts.

A recent site of such thinking is San Francisco. A jury there awarded \$24,595 to a mugger injured by a cab-driver who saw him attacking a female Japanese tourist, then chased and pinned the mugger against a wall with his taxi.

Now serving a 10-year sentence for the robbery, the convict sued, claiming he deserved damages for injury to his leg because the cabbie used "excessive force" during the capture. The jurors agreed.

Irate over this transparent "the criminal is the victim" case, citizens raised \$25,000 within six days after a radio station called for donations to pay the taxi driver's fine. But his cab company employer said it would pay that, so the citizens' donations will go to a victims' rights fund.

Now John Wayne would have liked that.

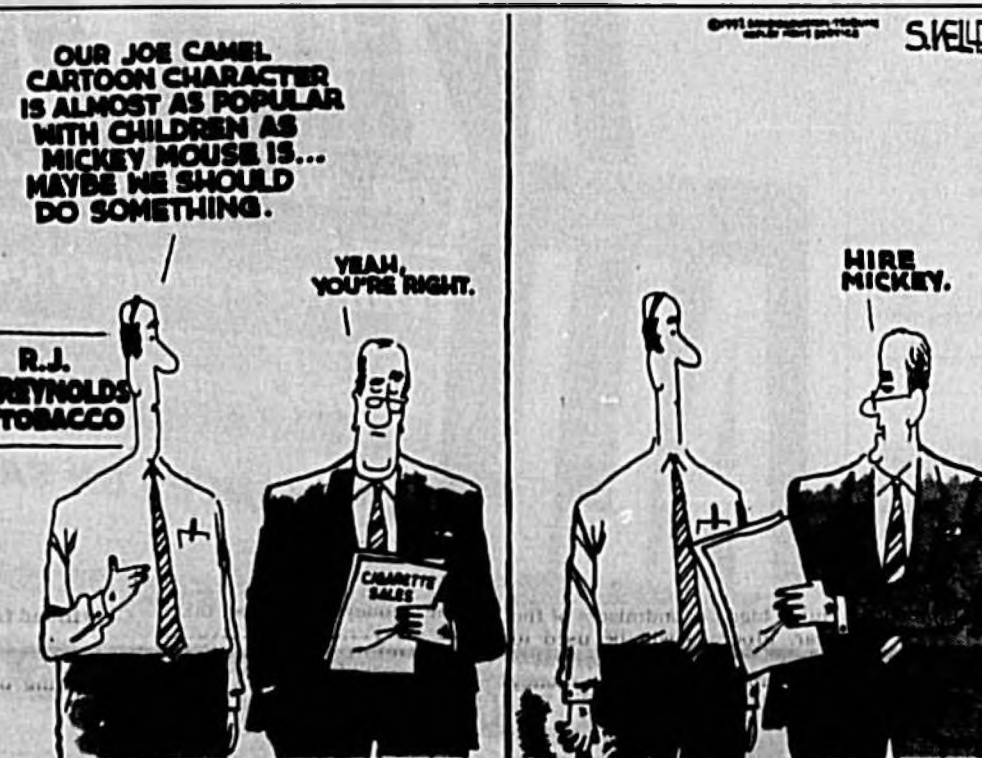
This ain't no surprise. Most black folks come out of the South. My momma was born in Louisiana before her momma took her to Springfield, Mass., and then to Harlem where I live now.

United Way tiff is still not over

WASHINGTON — Knee-deep in a scandal over the way it does business, United Way of America has moved fast to do damage control. But not nearly as fast as United Way officials would have you think. The emphasis throughout the scandal has been less on cleaning up the mess and more on protecting outgoing United Way President William Aramony. Now the agency is sitting on a report that sources describe as damning to Aramony's operation.

In early February, we reported on the high living and insider arrangements for Aramony and top officials of United Way of America, the "headquarters" of the nationwide charity organization. Since then, the local United Way affiliates who raise the money and spread it around among the needy have worked hard to distance themselves from the headquarters. Some are even withholding the dues they pay to United Way of America.

Aramony resigned under pressure on Feb. 25. But sources told our associate Alicia Mundy that high-ranking United Way officials had information about Aramony nearly a month earlier that was "anything but positive." On Feb. 3, after learning that reporters from Regardie's magazine and The Washington Post were snooping around Aramony's record, the United Way of America board gave him a "resounding vote of confidence."

At that point the board had already hired its own investigators to check the allegations. That investigation wasn't finished, but a source said even then, "The report was replete with information that would lead you to not give a vote of confidence for Aramony, had the executive committee absorbed it." The report had everything that would later emerge in news reports "and much more," the source added.

United Way had hired Washington attorney Berl Bernhard to do the independent investigation, and Bernhard hired reputable Washington investigator Terry Lenzner and his firm, Investigative Group Inc.

When the board gave its vote of confidence, several local United Way affiliates screamed that the investigation must have been a whitewash. Later, after Aramony resigned, Bernhard told the nationwide United Way organization that the board had not based its vote on the investigative report.

We have a memo dated Feb. 5 from a United Way public relations person to the chief officers that refers to the investigation and says the vote was "based on the information now available." Bernhard made a synopsis of it for board chairman John Akers and others in the top United Way hierarchy before the vote, but Bernhard wouldn't tell us the tone of that synopsis, so it's unclear whether it reflected the negative tone of the investigation at that point.

As a further twist, we have learned that Bernhard's law firm may not have been the most "independent" source United Way could have picked to do the outside investigation. The firm has done "limited work" for United Way before, and the former United Way counsel had previously worked at the firm.

A spokesman for Akers said that the law firm now has "its marching orders" for the investigation and "we will get to the bottom of everything." But some local affiliates still feel they are getting the runaround from United Way of America.

The "perception of stonewalling" hurt the local chapters, said one Washington, D.C., chapter official. That chapter is withholding its \$720,000 dues to United Way of America. "We don't have answers yet, and until we get them, that [expensive] trade association doesn't get their dues."

U.S. weighs bombing Iraq again

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon's spokesman said Thursday that "all options" remain open for a military strike against Iraq, but emphasized that U.N. inspection teams should be the ones to destroy Baghdad's weapons of mass destruction.

"We retain significant military capability in the region, but we hope that Iraq will recognize that its only choice is to comply with the U.N. resolutions," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams told reporters.

"We hope this can be solved by diplomatic means," he added.

Tsongas quits; Brown pressured to quit

HARTFORD, Conn. — Democrat Jerry Brown is facing increasing pressure to quit his long-shot quest for the White House as Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton reaps the windfall from rival Paul Tsongas' abrupt withdrawal.

Clinton, his lock on the Democratic nomination all but assured, cut short a Connecticut campaign swing to return to Arkansas today to plot strategy with aides after expressing "incredible respect and appreciation" for Tsongas.

Pressure from Democratic establishment leaders on Brown to abandon his quest in the name of party unity clearly was building.

Convicted murderer executed

ATMORE, Ala. — A man smiled and prayed before he was electrocuted early today for hitting two men to kill his pregnant wife.

Larry Gene Heath, 40, who found religion in prison and was called the Apostle of Death Row, prayed and asked the

woman's family for forgiveness.

Prosecutors said Heath, secretly engaged to another woman, got his 21-year-old wife Rebecca, who was nine months pregnant, to co-sign a \$2,000 home improvement loan. He used the loan to pay for her murder. She was abducted from their home in Phenix City, Ala., shot in the head and left in her car in Troup County, Ga. Her unborn son also died. The men hired by Heath were convicted and sentenced to life in prison.

'Cheers' Gang to Return for 11th Season

BURBANK, Calif. — The gang at "Cheers" will be back for another round this fall. NBC renewed an 11th season for the Emmy-winning barroom comedy.

"Cheers" is NBC's highest-rated series and the No. 4-rated series on television this season, trailing CBS' "60 Minutes," ABC's "Roseanne" and CBS' "Murphy Brown."

Only "Bonanza" ranked as high in its 10th season.

Cop says beating warranted

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. — A police sergeant accused of assaulting Rodney King told jurors the beating may have looked brutal but was "a managed and controlled use of force."

"I take responsibility for all the actions I directed the use of force," Sgt. Stacey Koon said Thursday during cross-examination. "It followed the policies of the Los Angeles Police Department and the training."

Koon, 41, acknowledged that people unfamiliar with police work may consider the videotaped beating brutal.

"It was done to control an aggressive, combative suspect and sometimes police work is brutal. It's a fact of life," Koon said.

Koon and three other white officers are charged with brutalizing King, who is black, after a high-speed chase on March 3, 1991. King was hit with batons, kicked and shocked with a stun gun.

The beating was videotaped by a bystander and broadcast nationwide, sparking outrage.

Koon portrayed King as a threatening aggressor, a muscular man who "gave out a bear-like yell" when struck with a stun gun and groaned "like a wounded animal."

He said he immediately sized up King as an ex-convict, and said he appeared to be on the drug PCP. Tests later showed no sign of the drug.

Asked about Officer Laurence Powell, accused of landing the most blows, Koon said, "I formed the opinion that Officer Powell was exasperated and was in fear for his life."

He said he's sure Powell did not hit King in the head.

Koon, 41, is charged along with officers Powell, 29, Theodore Briseno, 39 and Timothy Wind, 31.

Deputy District Attorney Alan Yochelson showed Koon segments of the videotape in slow motion, highlighting scenes in which a fallen King was beaten by baton-wielding officers. Koon said they were trying to get the suspect to lie prone.

"What position is Mr. King in now?" asked Yochelson as he froze a frame on the screen.

"He's lying on the ground," Koon said.

"Is he in the position you wanted?"

"No."

"Close enough?"

"No."

At one point, Yochelson noted that King appeared to be in a fetal position as he was beaten. Koon said he didn't see it that way. "I would describe it as coming up on his knees."

Under questioning by his lawyer, Darryl Moiner, Koon, a 16-year veteran of the police force, suggested that the beating would have ended more quickly if officers had used a chokehold.

"Why did you hesitate to use the chokehold?" asked Moiner.

"Because in Los Angeles the chokehold is associated with deaths of blacks," Koon said.

The Police Commission allows the chokehold only in cases where police are threatened enough to fire their weapons.

Koon said he was thinking about using the chokehold when King finally gave up.

"He yelled, 'Please stop,' and raised his hands in a compliance mode," Koon said. "I ordered my officers to back off. I felt he was submitting to my authority."

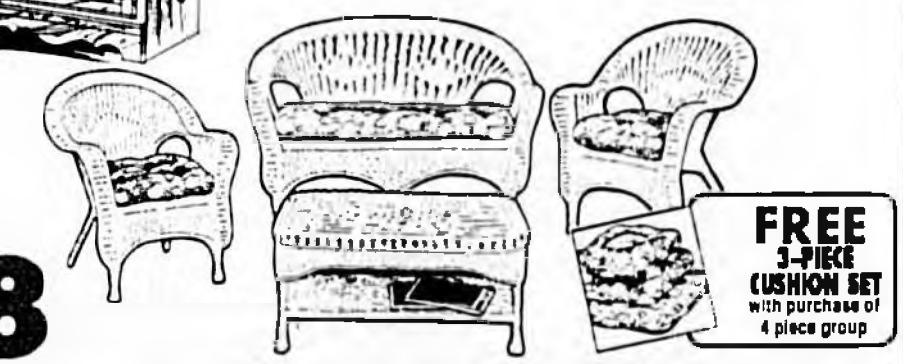

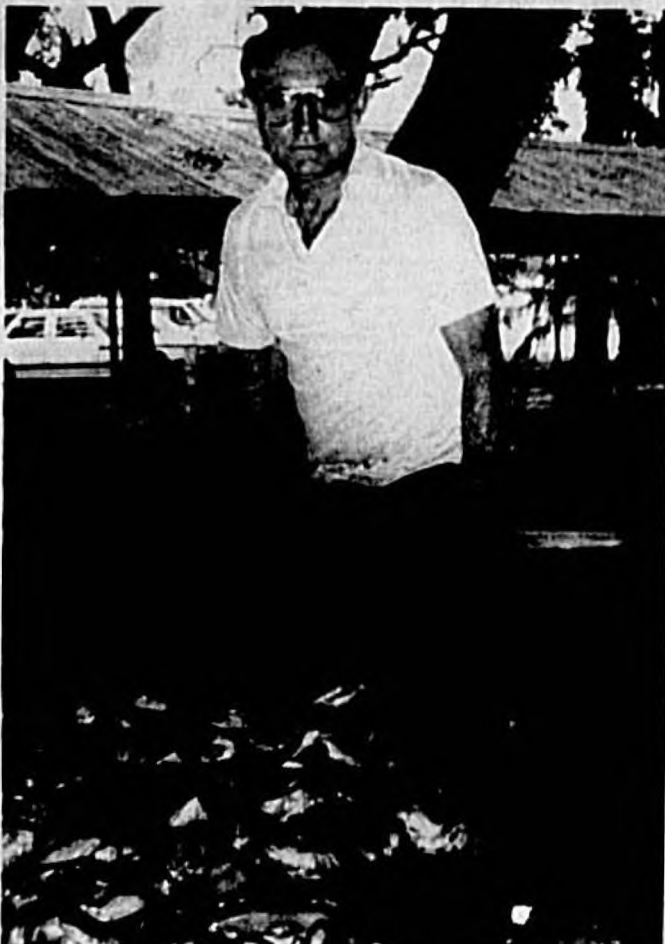

High blood pressure can weaken heart

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed as having essential hypertension since the age of 45. When checking my pressure at home, it's fine, yet when I visit my doctor, it rises substantially. Because of this, I've been on diuretics, beta blockers, vasodilators and calcium channel blockers. Does left ventricular hypertrophy warrant such treatment?

DEAR READER: When the heart beats, it forces blood into the circulation against a resistance that we call blood pressure. The higher the resistance, the harder the work of the heart. Thus, blood pressure directly affects the heart muscle.

In the presence of chronically elevated blood pressure, the cardiac muscle tries to compensate for the increased resistance by enlarging and growing, much as any muscle will swell in response to added work. In untreated hypertensive patients, the heart muscle can become quite large and bulky. Known as left ventricular hypertrophy, this condition is not serious in its earliest stages.

However, as time passes, the enlarged heart muscle becomes less able to adapt to the high blood pressure. This is extremely dangerous because it is the beginning of cardiac decompensation: The heart begins to fail.

Therefore, the answer to your question is an emphatic "yes." In fact, since you have developed left ventricular hypertrophy, it's a safe bet your blood pressure is not satisfactorily controlled. If it were, you wouldn't be showing signs of heart enlargement. You must, without fail, work closely with your doctor in finding ways to reduce your blood pressure.

Fortunately, there are many modern drugs that effectively lower blood pressure; several types have been prescribed for you. Apparently, they have not

been effective. I recommend that your doctor try a new class of medication, called ACE inhibitors, drugs which selectively block the enzyme langiotensin converting enzyme) that causes hypertension. ACE inhibitors lower blood pressure, reduce

WIN AT BRIDGE

By Phillip Alder

Top declarers have an uncanny sense of how the cards are distributed. One promising junior player with this innate ability is Geoff Hampson of Canada, who helped his country finish second in last year's NEC World Junior Championship.

Hampson backed his judgment to the hilt on today's deal. North took a practical shot in bidding three no-trump. He hoped that his hand would be worth seven tricks: six diamonds and the club ace.

West led his fourth-highest spade. If Hampson had known the spades were breaking 4-4, he would have won the first trick and immediately attacked diamonds, making his contract easy. But declarer couldn't see the spade two, so he ducked East's spade 10 at trick one and his spade queen at trick two. Now East defended well, switching to the heart four.

Hampson finessed the 10; West won with the king and went back to spades.

As the defenders had collected a heart trick, declarer couldn't afford to concede a diamond trick. Instead, Hampson cashed the diamond ace and led a diamond to dummy's king. This trick put pressure on East. He couldn't afford to discard a heart without giving South three tricks in the suit. Then the club finessé would bring home the contract. Similarly, East couldn't release a club, so he threw his last spade.

Backing his judgment, Hampson led a club to the nine. When it held, he played a club to dummy's ace and a heart to his jack, cashed the heart ace and exited with his last heart. East won and at trick 12 had to lead a club from his Q-10 into declarer's K-J.
