The days of courage and gallantry are not dead yet. We may think sometimes as we see signs of moral and physical decay about us that the present generation of young men is strangely lacking in something which made their forefathers robust pioneers...

The United States Army Recruiting News this month tells the story of a number of particularly thrilling acts of heroism among soldiers awarded medals of honor who we are sure would give pause to even Hitler's most aggressive Storm Troopers...

Captain Lynch, a passenger on a balloon flight was thrown from the basket, burned, bruised and shocked, when the balloon exploded, but the other members of the flight were trapped in the basket...

Captain McGuire who had been piloting a plane with two passengers was pinned in the wreckage when it crashed. One of the passengers was thrown free and managed to extricate Captain McGuire who was dazed and badly cut...

Corporal Jerome and two friends were sailing on a lake when a sudden storm overturned their little boat about a mile from shore. Unable to swim the two friends clung to the side of the boat...

Private William Stewart heard a call for help from a lake near Black Brook, N. Y. He rushed to the scene and found an enlisted man, apparently exhausted trying to rescue another man already unconscious...

The 'silk stocking bandit' who conducted a campaign of armed robbery and burglary here this winter, was given twenty-five years in state prison by Judge Ben C. Willard in Criminal Court...

The court, doubtless having in mind the ease with which the state parole board has been turning criminals loose, so sentenced the youth that in all probability he will remain for the full commitment of the court...

The youth of the convict appeals to sentiment, to thoughts of mercy. Yet who would question the observation of the court that 'unless I did my duty in this case, it would probably be only a question of time before someone killed him or he killed someone else?'

The victims of this youthful desperado can best understand what the judge was driving at. The rest of us will recognize that the needs of social justice must be met.

No Chance For Peace In Our Time Is Seen By Professor At Harvard

By FRANK CAREY. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Apr. 11.—(AP)—Prof. Philip H. Sorokin, head of Harvard's Department of Sociology, said today that the greatest stability of either form, the greatest peace is enjoyed. Charts of wars and revolutions through the ages show that great upheavals occurred between the reigns of ancient Rome and the dawn of Christianity and between the religious era of the middle ages and the 'senate' period which Sorokin says has dominated the western world ever since.

For example, they show that for the western world the most peaceful centuries were the medieval centuries from the eighth to the twelfth, whereas the 19th century, marking the beginning of transition to the new form of culture, was torn by revolution. In that respect, Sorokin said the 20th century was second only to the 19th which, he says, is 'the bloodiest and the most revolutionary'.

That doubtful honor for the 20th stems, he said, from the fact that the 'senate' culture which has brought such great technological advances and given man a control over nature is now disintegrating—with a roar greater than in all history.

## Official Fascist Circles Withhold Comment Upon Action

ROME, Apr. 12.—(AP)—Stefani, Italian news agency, said today that President Roosevelt's announcement opening the Red Sea to United States ships was based on "one of his original as well as arbitrary interpretations of international law" evolving from the theory that Egypt is neutral.

Official circles withheld comment. In Berlin, authorized German sources described President Roosevelt's proclamation opening the Red Sea route to the Suez to United States merchant ships as the "first open intervention in European affairs and a violation of the Monroe Doctrine."

President Roosevelt yesterday created a new agency to combat runaway prices, rising rents, hoarding, profiteering, and other evils which under maintenance of dollar defense spending.

The agency, to be known as the Office of Price Administration and Civilian Control, will be headed by Mr. Lester B. Henderson, director of the War Relocation Authority.

It was not the first time Henderson has cracked down on industry since defense spending began. The New Deal economist pointed no more when he called lumber manufacturers here and demanded that they cut reckless prices. His unit has established maximum prices for machinery, aluminum scrap, zinc, iron and steel scrap and soft coal.

In announcing creation of the new agency, the President told his press conference the move was designed to continue and emphasize protection of the consumer during the current emergency. He said Henderson would retain his HRC post.

## Legislation To Boost Farmers' Income Urged

### Growers Called On To Seek Support For Measure To Raise Parity Payments

WASHINGTON, Apr. 12.—(AP)—Senator Bankhead (D-Ala.) urged farmers today to call on their senators and representatives to support legislation designed to boost farm income.

The Alabamian asserted that "strong and active influences" are opposing bills to increase the appropriations for parity payments and to establish a floor under the prices of basic commodities.

He said there was no prospect of an increase in cotton and wheat prices because of the heavy surpluses of both these crops.

Walter P. Reuther, director of the General Motors department of the C. I. O. United Automobile Workers said yesterday the international union had asked an- tion locals for authority to take a strike vote of its 175,000 members in 76 General Motors plants in the nation.

Reuther said the strike action, if and when taken, would not include workers in defense industries.

"This is the first time on any large scale that defense workers would not go on strike," Reuther said.

Reuther declared the General Motors Corporation during five weeks of negotiations "has repeatedly attempted to force deadlocks on questions of union recognition in order to evade negotiations on other points."

In a letter to William S. Knudsen and Sidney Hillman, chiefs of the Office of Production Management in Washington, Reuther said the union was demanding that the powers of an umpire previously appointed to handle grievances be broadened.

Reuther notified the corporation, he told the OPM officials, that the deadline for strike action would be Apr. 20, "which is the end of the 60-day period provided in the U. A. W. C. I. O. General Motors agreement."

The U. A. W. C. I. O. official expressed a desire to "co-operate with the OPM in making the necessary arrangements for continuing production of all defense work in the event the corporation should make it necessary for the union to strike in order to secure its just demands."

## Major Struggle Appears In Making In Balkan Conflict; Italian, Nazis Push Ahead

### Enemy Resistance Is Crushed In Steady Advance Of Powerful Axis Divisions

ROME, Apr. 12.—(AP)—Italian troops have joined forces with the Germans at Lake Ohrid in southwestern Yugoslavia and are pushing all enemy resistance in a steady advance, Stefani, official Italian news agency, reported today.

The march of the powerful Axis armies is proceeding on all fronts, the agency said.

It was also officially announced here that one of the British generals captured in North Africa by Axis forces in May, Gordon Stewart, World War veteran who commanded British troops in central Norway a year ago.

In Budapest, the Hungarian general staff announced its troops had broken through the fortified Yugoslav line in the triangle between the Danube and the Tisa Rivers in northern Yugoslavia and that the Hungarian march was continuing south.

The break is about 25 miles from Belgrade, the Yugoslav capital.

In Bern, Switzerland, a German radio broadcast was heard which said Premier General Simovic had left Yugoslavia on a "mission" which presumably was taking him to Moscow.

The broadcast added that King Peter is now in Greece, en route to London.

It was recalled that only Thursday the Red Star, organ of the Soviet army, said the Soviet-Yugoslav friendship pact is "all the more valuable under the circumstances because the Soviet Union always fulfills its international pledges."

The broadcast indicated, however, that Russia planned to follow this with material aid to Yugoslavia.

## Germans Thrust Toward Both Flanks Of Greek And British Defense Lines

### Yugoslavia Cut Off From Greece

### England's Forces In Africa Make Contact With Enemies

A great struggle in the battle for Greece appeared in the making today—or perhaps already underway—as German troops thrust toward both flanks of the Greco-British defense line across the Hellenic peninsula.

Nazi panzer units knifing southward from Thessaly, Yugoslavians established contact with Greek lines in the Phlorina sector on the western flank of the line.

Other Nazi troops previously had encountered British patrols near Giannitsa, north of the line's eastern anchor.

Yugoslavia meanwhile was cut off entirely from Greece as German units driving westward joined with Italian forces from Albania. Berlin took the view that the posture of the Axis armies sealed the fate of the Yugoslav divisions still fighting in central Serbia.

In the air war, the Luftwaffe again blasted the British coastal regions.

On the African front, the British said their troops had made contact with Italo-German units moving toward Tobruk in Libya, while the victorious troops of the East African campaign were said to be pouring through Egypt to get in line for a battle with the German and Italian forces.

The thrust was carried out in cooperation with a second German offensive coming down on the coast near the Tiber.
