Marines Observe 181st Birthday At Big Party

Commission Slate Includes 3 Public Hearings Tonight

Members of the Board of Sanford City Commissioners will be burning the midnight oil tonight as they are faced with a 13-item agenda which includes three public hearings as well as several lengthy discussions.

Hearings will be conducted on the zoning of an alley south of 19th St. from east of Hickory west to French Ave.; the vacating of a utility easement in the Grove Manor subdivision; and the rezoning of an area around the First Christian church.

A. L. Wilson, appointed to the Board of Sanford City Commissioners early this year to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of former city commissioner Jack Watzung, will be reelected as a member of the Board following his election for the unexpired term.

A report is expected to be heard this evening on the financing of the Capital Improvement Program.

Commissioners will be asked tonight to authorize the creating of a position of Assistant Director of Finance and to appoint an acting mayor and acting City Manager for the three days Nov. 15-17.

John Schirard, president of the Seminole Chiefs Club will appear before the Board of Sanford City Commissioners to ask that the stadium tax be eliminated on high school athletic contests played in the Sanford Memorial Baseball Stadium.

The Garden Club has also requested an opportunity to appear before the Board of Sanford City Commissioners relative to having a portion of the Sanford Civic Center be set aside for the exclusive use of the club.

The Sanford Naval Air Station has requested a coordination of operations in time of disasters involving naval equipment or personnel. This will be discussed at tonight's meeting of the Board.

Other items appearing on the agenda will be discussions concerning the Legislative Traffic Safety Committee's hearing, the authorization for payment of \$2,216.33 to the Seminole County Board of Education, and the approval of publicly appropriated for the Mayfair Inn's \$15,000 P.G.A. Open.

U. N. Police Force To Enter Egypt

1st Group To Arrive This Week

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold announced today agreement had been reached with Egypt for the entry of the U. N. police force immediately. He said the first group would arrive there early this week.

Hammarskjold said he himself would leave by plane for Cairo tomorrow to be on hand for detailed discussions with the Egyptian government. He said he expected to reach the Egyptian capital Thursday and return to New York by Sunday.

He gave the following statement to a special news conference:

"Agreement on the arrival in Egypt of the United Nations force has been reached between the secretary-general and the Egyptian government. The first groups of the United Nations force will go to Egypt early this week.

"It is the intention of the secretary-general to visit Cairo at the very first stage of the operation for discussions of details with the Egyptian government. He will also inspect the staging area for the United Nations force in Italy."

The first units of the U. N. force already are at a staging area at Capofichino Airport, near Naples, Italy. Some of the troops may leave for Egypt as early as tomorrow, Hammarskjold said.

The secretary general said he wanted to visit the staging area as well as Egypt. The commander of the U. N. force, Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, will meet him in Italy for consultations and then Burns will fly to New York for talks here.

Hammarskjold said the purpose of his own visit to the Egyptian staging area was "to see that no unnecessary losses" are left. He said he had no intention to confer with military leaders of the invading British, French and Israeli forces.

"That is staff work," he said. The secretary general also expressed a willingness to go to Hungary after his Cairo visit, if it appeared such a trip would be useful. He announced he was establishing two groups to deal with the Hungarian problem: One to investigate the Soviet interference in Hungarian affairs and the other to observe the situation on the scene.

The first group will be headed by Dr. Alberto Lerias of Colombia, former secretary general of the Organization of American States. The observation group will be headed by Chief Justice Oscar Gunderson of Norway.

Hammarskjold, asked about the possibility of a personal visit by him, said he might go if the observations have definite conclusions on the need for consultations.

"It may be done outside of Hungary," he said, "maybe inside Hungary."

Developments on Hungarian and Middle East problems dominated the opening of the regular full session of the U. N. General Assembly scheduled for 3 p. m. EST this afternoon.

Mrs. Evans is the Seminole County Jailor and day radio operator, on duty during the daytime hours.

Records show that Ted Lee Howard, who gave his age as 24, was arrested by Florida Highway Patrol Trooper T. Mark Mack and charged with reckless driving and no drivers license. This happened on Nov. 3.

On Nov. 7, Ted Lee Howard appeared before Judge Ernest Housholder to plead guilty to charges against him and was sentenced to 45 days in the Seminole County Jail on each charge.

The 1953 Mercury Howard was driving was placed outside of the County Jail for safekeeping and until the prisoner completed his time.

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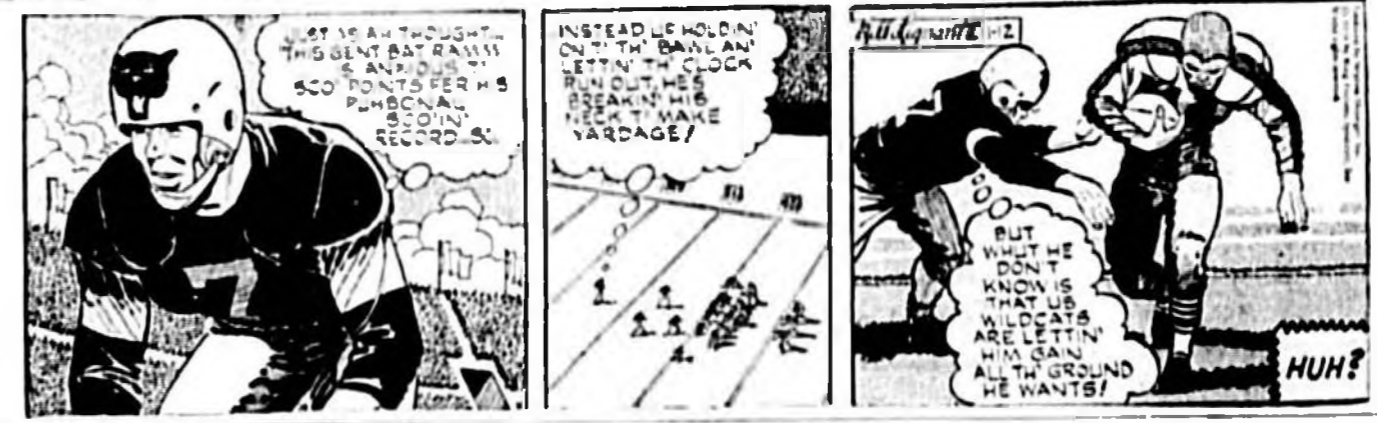

Greyhounds Lose Tilt to Mighty Umatilla 20-7

The Lyman Greyhounds, unless in varsity competition this season, gave out with tremendous effort Friday night in Longwood as they lost to mighty Umatilla 20-7.

The Sandcrabs amassed 342 yards on the ground against the injury-riddled Seminoles, and were forced to kick only once.

Umatilla's victory was attributed to Ted Kemp, who scored in the first and second stanzas from 10 and 11 yards out, respectively.

Stevens sparked the second-half Greyhounds, and rambed for their lone score from 15 yards out, capping a 65 yard drive.

Seabreeze emptied the bench on the return kick, and the Seminoles marches to a quick score. 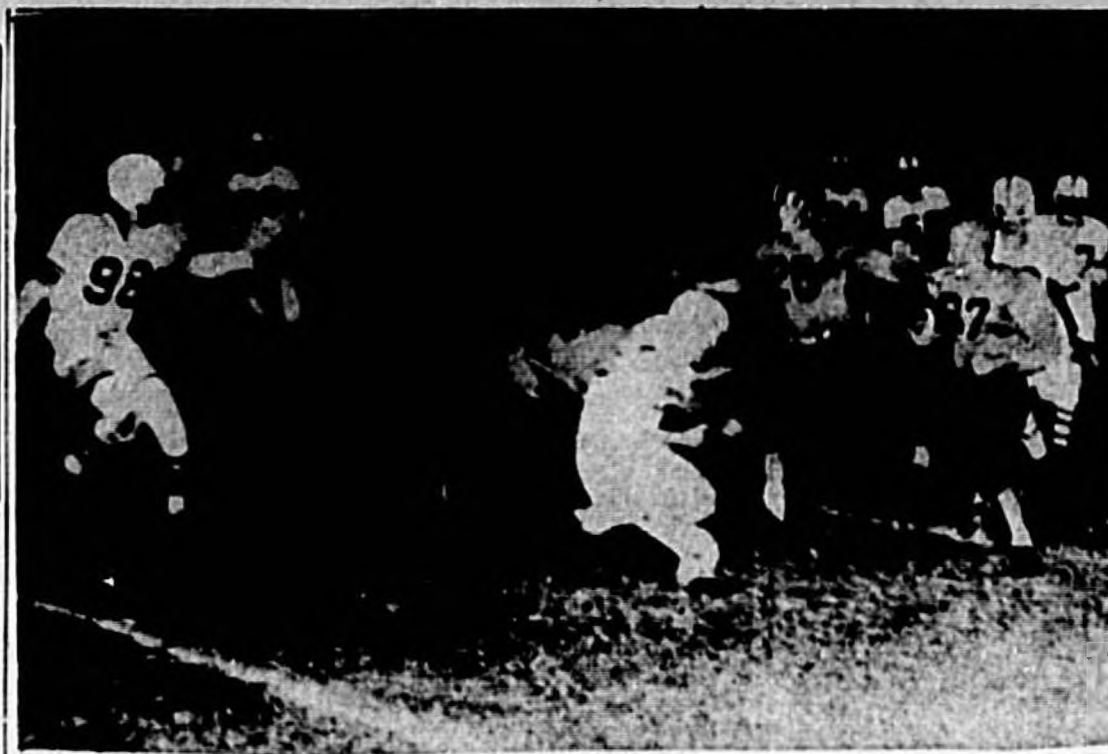
From there the Sandcrabs made the score in three plays. Dunlop ran for 14 yards. Hittell for four and then Dunlop made the tally from two yards out.

U. N. Observers Enter Canal Zone To Watch Over Cease-Fire

Police Unit Departure Postponed

LONDON (AP)—A 12-man team of U.N. observers moved into the Suez Canal zone, no-man's-land today in watch over the cease-fire between French-British and Egyptian forces.

But the departure of the first U.N. police units for Egypt was postponed. U.N. spokesmen said the reason was "flight times and schedules." At the same time, however, a major dispute over Egypt's terms for admission to the police force appeared to be developing.

Egypt consented to receive the U.N. observers several days ago. Her agreement to the police force was announced only yesterday by U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

The 12-man observer team, including Norwegians, Swedes, Danes and Australians, landed at Port Said in the British-French occupied sector of the canal zone from a landing ship which had picked them up at Haifa. They had been part of the U.N. corps of truce observers in Palestine.

The postponement of the police unit until tomorrow at least was announced by U.N. spokesmen at Capodichino, Italy, where the 180-man vanguard of the international army is waiting.

A spokesman for the Swiss Airline, which is to transport the troops to Cairo, said the Swiss pilots wanted to make a daylight reconnaissance of Cairo's International Airport before attempting landings. A U.N. spokesman explained that it would have been a race today to land the first troops in Cairo before 6 p.m. when the airport is closed for the night for military security reasons.

Swiss representatives said some of the airline's own ground crews may also be taken to Cairo to facilitate operations.

Young fully armed soldiers of Norway, Denmark and Columbia, the advance units of a force that may eventually total 10,000 men, had been expected to enter Egypt today to take up their duties of enforcing Middle East peace and (Continued on Page 8)

Garden Club Seeks To Build Room Onto Civic Center

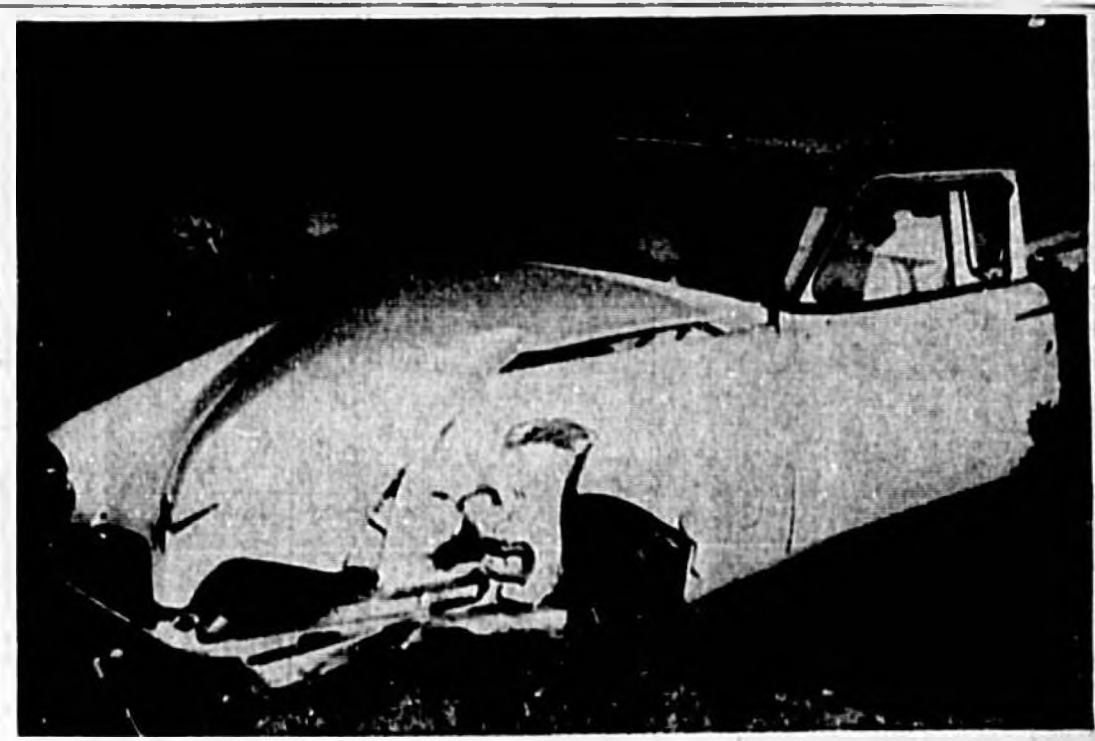
Attorney William C. Hutchison told the Board "Basically, this is a public building, built on public property, and with public funds. Unquestionable, the city can accept a contribution from the Garden Club for a room that would be named after or dedicated to the Garden Club. However, it could not give you exclusive use of the room."

Mrs. Ganas, on a question from a board member, stated that the Garden Club would in no way be interfered with by noise from children in the recreation activities planned for the Sanford Civic Center. "We would use the room, not for general meetings but for an office in which to keep records, hold board meetings, and sometimes a civic meeting."

Commissioner John Krider said, as a proposed sketch was presented for perusal, "It would be quite an improvement to the Civic Center."

Mayor F. D. Scott remarked, "How are you going to allow the Garden Club to own a portion of a public building?"

Mrs. A. W. Epps Sr., a member and officer of the Garden Club, told the Board of Commissioners "We have of our own free will practically landscaped all of our public buildings. We teach children in your schools horticulture (Continued on Page 8)

Dime Tax On Stadium Tickets To Be Removed

A policy for the use of the Sanford Memorial Baseball Stadium was adopted by the Board of Sanford City Commissioners last night following a lengthy discussion in which all members of the board took part.

John Schirral, president of the Seminole Chiefs Club started the discussion when he appeared before the board to request that the dime stadium tax be removed from the rate of tickets to all Seminole High School football games.

Commissioner John Krider, immediately at the conclusion of Schirral's remarks stated that "We are not consistent in what we are doing. One group comes along and they are allowed to use the stadium—others are not. I thought that recreation areas are created to be used."

Krider then proposed, as amendments to a motion made by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham, that "We waive the 10c tax on all non-profit affairs, then lower the cost for the use of the stadium at night to \$50 with no policemen furnished."

He also incorporated in his suggestions that "Daytime non-profit affairs be free."

Commissioner Krider said "What it prohibits by putting a large charge on its use, hurts more than it helps. I also suggest that use of the stadium for profit will be on our present rate."

Mayor F. D. Scott objected to the move when he said "The way I see it, this is a county expense. I don't see why you gentlemen would want to raise the taxes on everybody for football, baseball or whatnot."

John Kailer, Sanford Jeweler and former commissioner, told the board, "This has been a very aggressive commission. I approve of the suggestion. Just (Continued on Page 8)

Light Discussed To Direct Visitors To Business Area

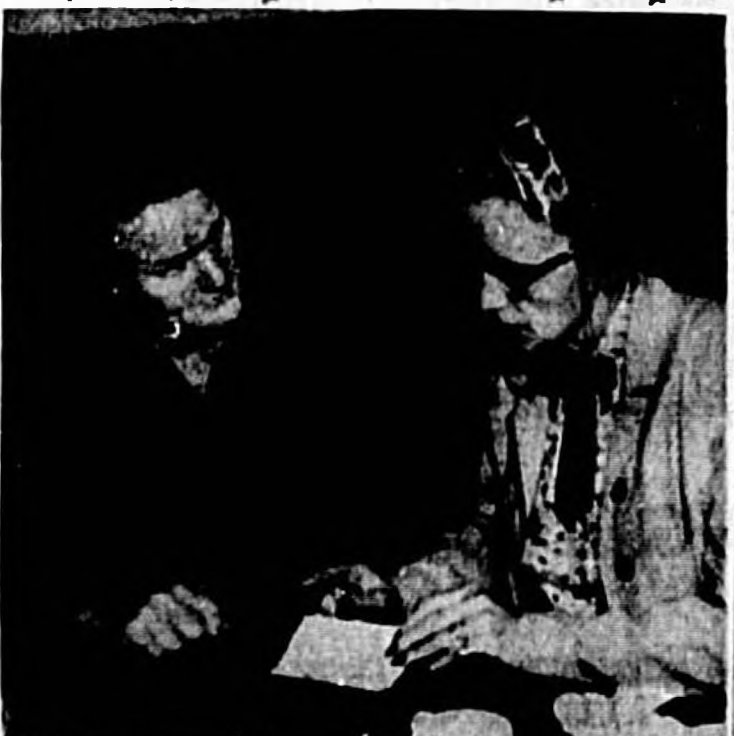
