Polio Virus Is Invisible Killer Of Which Science Knows Little

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The question of which polio treatment is best is a tough one—but so are the questions surrounding the mysterious polio bug itself.

It has never been seen, even by the most powerful microscopes. There is only indirect evidence to germs could fit on the head of a pin.

The risk of a severe polio attack lessens sharply after a child passes age 10. Beyond age of 20 there is only about one case in every 100,000 population.

It is virtually certain that the disease is transmitted by "human contact." But it is still unknown whether the contact is always direct.

It is not entirely settled as to how the virus enters the body, although the strongest evidence points to the mouth and nose.

No vaccine has yet proved sufficiently satisfactory warrant more than limited research use as a possible preventive.

So-called "convalescent serum" from the blood of persons who have recovered from polio has been used, but results are inconclusive.

There are at least three different "strains" of the virus, one of them bearing the fancy name, "Brunsbide." And within recent years a virus called caxsackie has been discovered which causes symptoms identical with mild polio.

Up until a few years ago it was impossible to "grow" any of the true polio viruses in test tubes. And only certain kinds of laboratory animals can be infected with human polio bugs.

Vaccines have been produced which are apparently effective in preventing polio in mice and monkeys. But, as one scientist puts it, "many workers feel that the

THE WORLD TODAY

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The Korean war, which started a year ago today and caught us flat-footedly unprepared, has had four main results:

1. This country won't soon again be caught quite so helplessly flat-footed for we have begun to arm and prepare in a big way.

2. By going into Korea, which showed our willingness to fight to stop Communism, this country undoubtedly upset the Communists' timetable of conquest in Asia and elsewhere.

3. The Western Allies have been welded closer by the realization that Communism, unless prepared for by the world, it stopped, would chew up the unspurred them all into re-arming.

4. This country revealed itself to the world as badly split and confused on how far to stop Communism and what to do next.

We had developed the kind of Magninot Line thinking which had led to disaster for the French. Our Magninot was a atom bomb.

At the time of the Korean outbreak together in the Atlantic break, the Western Allies were fact which then was hardly more than a noble promise.

Because it takes a lot of time to set up the machinery for turning out arms, this country and its Allies are far from fully equipped. In a few months, though, the weapons should start moving from the factories.

History may show Russia lost the long cold war with the West by choosing to make a minor test in Korea—which has given the Allies 12 months to get ready—instead of sweeping across Europe while it still was pitifully unready.

But this country has not gone through the Korean experience without great pain: the loss of American lives and one of the most searing spiritual convulsions in the nation's history.

In the Russian purge of the mid-1930's the old Bolsheviks startled the world by getting up in open court, searching their souls, castigating themselves, revealing their thoughts.

One of the men freed himself, got behind the wheel and sped into Garden City. The spokesman said it was not clear who first did the driving out of the base.

Air Force guards let the ambulance pass through the gates, since they recognized the vehicle and its siren and gong were in operation.

There was no indication whether the patients were violent or that their confinement was merely a precautionary measure.

**HOLLYWOOD, June 25—(AP)—**Here's something else the American occupation has brought to Japan: more kissing on the screen.

This report comes from Shirley Yamaguchi, one of Japan's top movie stars. She came here some months ago on a highly-publicized mission to learn how to kiss in films. It seems that there was no kissing in Japanese films prior to the occupation.

"But the G. I.'s taught us how," she declared. "Now we are putting kisses into our movies. It has not been easy for us, because we traditionally do not show our emotions."

"That is why foreigners think that our films are dull. The actors do very little but talk. You see, even when a Japanese is very angry or very sad, he never shows it. And he would never think of kissing in public."

Despite the American influence, kissing is still not done in public, she said. But there has been more of it in the films, particularly since her research on the subject in Hollywood. "Can you think of a better reason for a trip," she grinned, ducking behind a fan she wagged in her hand.

She added that the technical aspects of camera angles on kiss scenes had the Japanese baffled, but they have overcome the problems. The Japanese public seems to approve the addition of kissing sequences, she said.

Miss Yamaguchi is here to appear in "East is East," in which she plays a Japanese girl who marries a G. I. The soldier, played by Don Taylor, brings her to his California home and intolerance runs rampant. She'll have some kissing scenes with Taylor in this one.

"So far all I've had to do is peck, as I believe you call it," she reported. "Later I'll get what you call it—a smooch. You have so many names for kissing in America that I can't keep them straight." She darted behind the fan again.

This is the first American film for the Oriental star. She has discovered Hollywood methods are much different from Japanese movie making. In Japan, where she has appeared in 30 films, the average picture takes two months to shoot. Only the epic
