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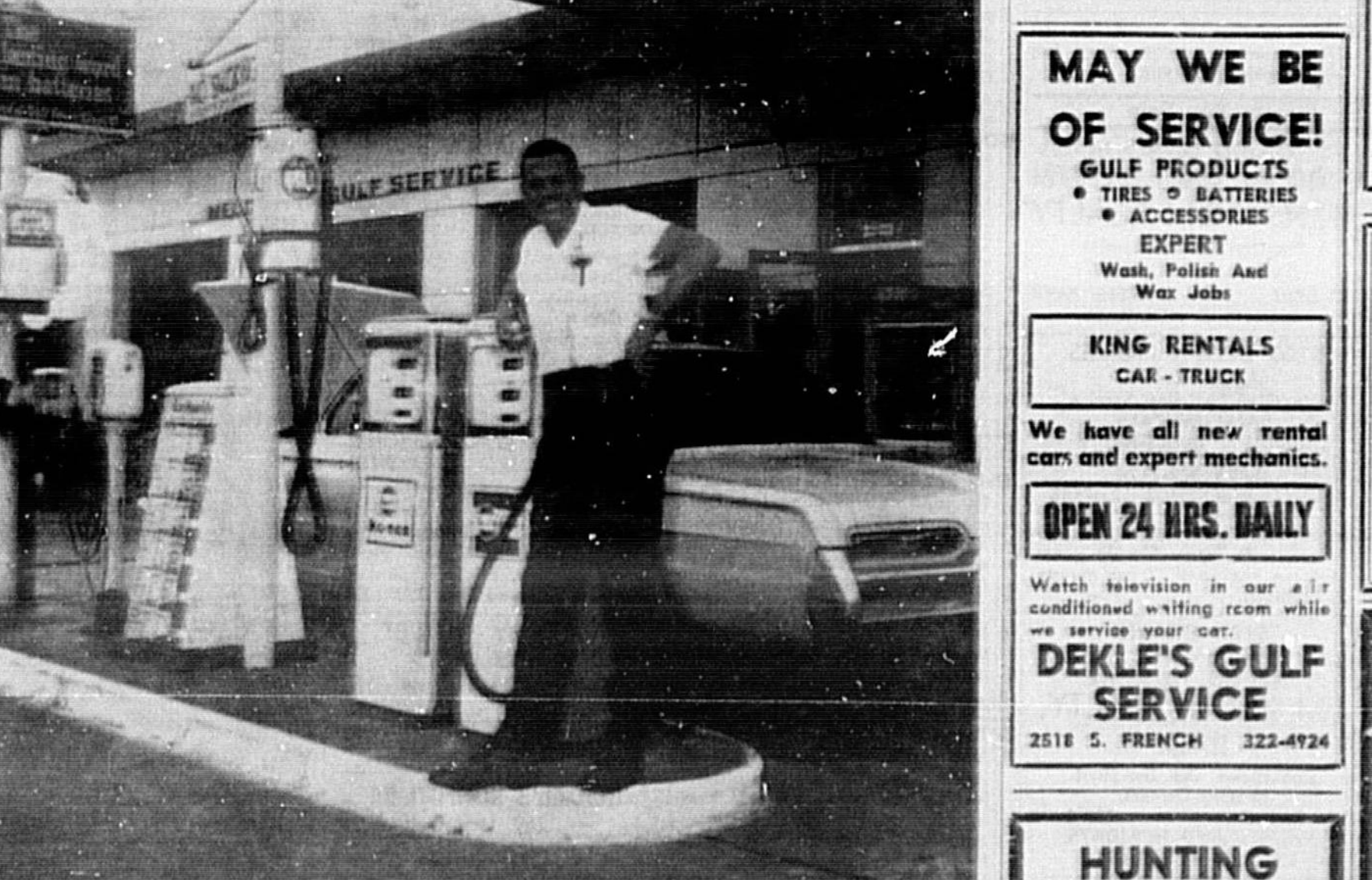

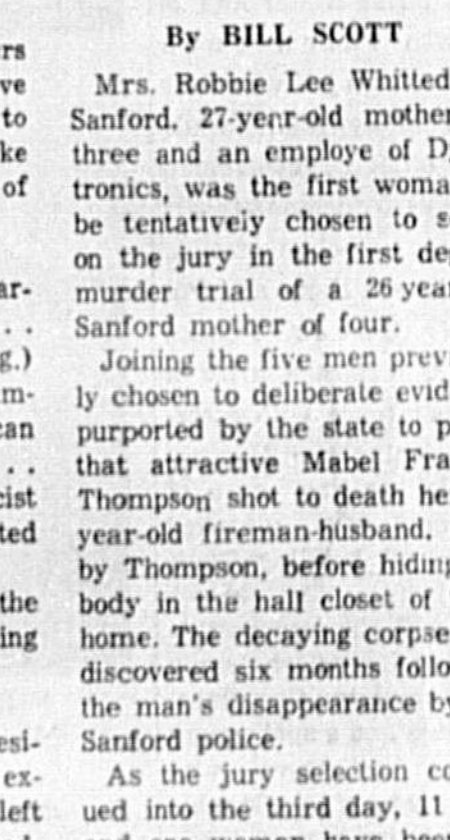

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Heaviest Shelling For 51 Bases, Towns

VC Launch Heavy Rocket Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong made their heaviest rocket and mortar attacks in 4 1/2 months Tuesday night, shelling 51 allied bases and towns, the U.S. Command reported today.

The allied commands also reported that their troops and U.S. aircraft killed at least 127 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong in half a dozen clashes along the Cambodian and Laotian borders.

About two thirds of the rocket and mortar attacks were in the 3rd Corps area from Saigon 100 miles north to the Cambodian border. About 25 of the attacks caused casualties or damage.

The U.S. Command said two American soldiers were killed and 21 wounded in the shelling. Light damage was reported, including shrapnel hits on some helicopters. Field reports said 16 South Vietnamese soldiers and 15 civilians were wounded. American targets included the Viet Nam at Long Binh and the Bien Hoa Air Base, both about 15 miles northeast of Saigon; the headquarters of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division 36 miles north of Saigon; and two brigade headquarters.

Field reports also said one helicopter crewman was killed and eight American ground troops and another helicopter crewman wounded in the battle. The U.S. Command agreed that one helicopter crewman was killed and another wounded but said: "There were no U.S. casualties in the ground action."

Some 25 American B2B bombers flew heavy raids during the night against a North Vietnamese building reported near the Bien Hoa Special Forces camp, 24 miles north of Saigon. The U.S. Command said enemy soldiers were killed but later reduced this to 27.

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Nursing Homes Quit Medicare

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hundreds of the nation's nursing homes have quit the Medicare program. Many others will in the program refuse to accept new Medicare patients.

Not so, say nursing home administrators. Their disaffection results, they contend, from retroactive denial of benefits, staggering paperwork and low rates.

"The national trend of nursing homes to drop out of Medicare is the net loss was only 50—from 4,900 certified extended care facilities July 1, to 4,850 Jan. 1," said a Social Security Administration spokesman said, "there's no trend. The number of homes in the program goes up and down."

Although 235 homes quit the program in six months, this official said, others signed up so the net loss was only 50—from 4,900 certified extended care facilities July 1, to 4,850 Jan. 1.

Government officials trace the industry's discontent to a crackdown on misuse and over-use of Medicare's benefits. Some of the nation's largest nursing homes have withdrawn since extended care provisions of the federal health care program began three years ago in the last six months alone. Social Security Administration figures show, 235 extended care facilities have dropped Medicare voluntarily. Some of this impact is canceled, however, by enrollment

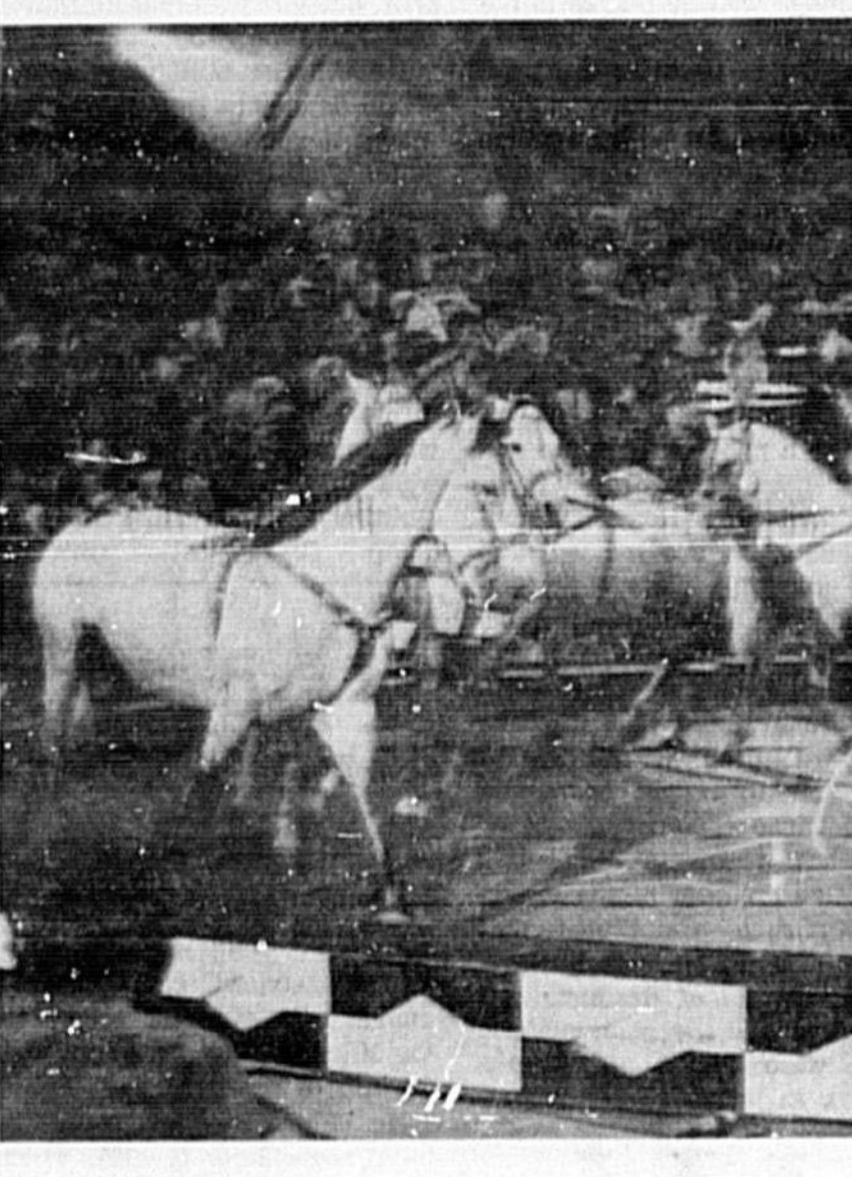
Gas Workers Take Training

A group of servicemen from various natural gas utilities in the state received certification of completion from the Florida Gas Service Training Center at the Sanford Airport, recently opened to train servicemen in more efficient installation and maintenance of gas appliances.

The first class through the Service Training Center was a basic, two week session of apprentice servicemen of these with less than 18 months experience. The basic course is a balanced curriculum of both theory and lab applications on installation, maintenance and safety of gas appliances. Two of the ten days are devoted exclusively to safety procedures; gas codes, venting, turn-off, turn-off, installation and service.

Located in a 7,500 sq. ft. facility at the Sanford Airport, the Florida Gas Service Training Center is the first school of its type in Florida. It is in cooperation with the Florida Natural Gas Association, the statewide natural gas consortium; the Florida Gas Transmission Company, the Texas-to-Florida pipeline subsidiary of Florida Gas Company.

According to Joseph T. Furrer, Service Training Center Supervisor, advanced level courses on gas appliances will also be offered, the first to be on gas air conditioning. He is a former U. S. Army master sergeant who spent most of his career in training and instructional capacities including adviser to the South Korean Army and the Free China Army on Formosa. He served as a field technical representative for Avila Air Conditioning Company prior to joining Florida Gas. Assistant Furrer is Dan Hughes, formerly operations superintendent at the Orlando Division, Florida Gas Company. Those completing the initial course are from: Lake Apopka National Gas District, Winter Garden; City of Leesburg; National Gas Division, City of Ft. Pierce; Miami Division, Florida Gas Company, Jacksonville Division, Florida Gas Company; Orlando Division, Florida Gas Company; St. Petersburg Division, Florida Gas Company; Plant City Gas Company; City of Starke; City of Clearwater; and a service representative from Seaside-Orlando.

Negroes Liberate Leader

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A black strike leader and 24 Negroes who threatened to spring him from jail won their freedom Tuesday night while helmeted officers confronted more than 100 demonstrators outside the city police station.

Mayor Richard Kane and Police Chief Oscar Fulson agreed to the release after a two-hour conference with attorneys representing the Negroes who were in the first wave of demonstrators who marched against the jail building Tuesday night.

Released with the demonstrators was Isaac Brown, chairman of the Community Coordinating Committee and a spokesman for garbage collectors who struck 3 days in Daytona Beach's contract collection agency three weeks ago.

Brown had been arrested earlier Tuesday on a disorderly conduct charge after an officer tried to serve a peace warrant on him, authorities said.

The demonstrators arrested Tuesday night were charged with unlawful assembly and disorderly conduct.

"They were just going to come in here and take him. We couldn't have that," Chief Fulson said.

Off-duty police, Volusia County officers and Highway Patrolmen were pressed into service around the jail when the demonstration began assembling. They were issued nightsticks and crash helmets.

Deputy Constable Bill Leonard said he was attempting to serve a peace warrant issued at the request of an employee of Waste Control of Daytona Beach, the refuse collection agency.

Escambia Bay Pollution Standards Unveiled

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — Tough standards specifying exact quantities of pollutants that can be dumped into Escambia Bay will be unveiled at a federal-state pollution conference starting here Tuesday.

The standards are proposed in a report prepared by the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration southeast region at Atlanta.

John R. Thomas, regional director for the FWPCA, has bargained the standards until the conference opens, but it was learned that they are both tough and specific.

The standards call for virtual elimination of all nutrient-laden discharges from three industries — Escambia Chemical Co., Monsanto and American Cyanamid and municipal sewage plants that pour millions of gallons of water daily into the bay.

"Our report gets back to the number of pounds that the cities and industries can dump into the bay," Thomas said. "In other words, they can throw only so much of this stuff into the bay."

Excessive nutrients overfertilize the bay, causing vast algae blooms that subsequently die and rob the waters of life-supporting oxygen in the process, known as eutrophication.

Most of more than 20 major fish kills in 1969 in Escambia Bay, once one of the Panhandle's most productive estuaries, were attributed by various sources to eutrophication.

Vince Patton, director of the Florida Department of Air and Water Pollution Control, has seen the standards and agrees that they pack the power it will take to enforce a bay cleanup.

"I've said several times we are going to have to quit discharging wastes into our estuaries," Patton said.

His agency has set a Jan. 1, 1973, deadline for completion of acceptable waste treatment systems, and the federal report says facilities must be completed by then.

Where To Go? Sergeant Awaits Court Action

MIAMI (AP) — For 17 months, Sgt. Warren Burton sat home waiting for the Army to tell him where to go next. This week it did — straight to a deserter's stockade at Ft. Stewart, Ga.

Admittedly scared, the slight, intense young sergeant says it's a terrible mix-up and claims he tried to convince the military to check his records and reassign him after his September 1968 leave was up.

"But you know how the Army is about being slow," he said. Burton said he returned from duty in Germany in August of 1968.

"On Sept. 17, 1968, I went to Oakland, Calif., for processing for Vietnam. But they told me to return home and await further orders after they found out my brother Jack was over there," he said.

A month later, the sergeant called Oakland and was told to sit tight and wait. The same thing happened two months later.

"They still didn't know anything about it," he said. "They would get in contact with me." Burton said. "The more I wait, the harder it got. I couldn't make any money. I was afraid to go to work. Somebody would sure think I was AWOL, then."

During that time Burton lived with his wife and daughter at his parents' Pompano Beach home near Miami. The soldier said he continually made calls to the Pentagon and the Oakland Army base, but said he got no results.

Last December his parents received a letter from the Army classifying Burton as a deserter. Twelve hours later he stood before Army officers at Homestead Air Force Base, explaining his case.

Since then the sergeant has been at the base located 29 miles south of Miami, while Army officers assemble his records.

Burton says he has no record of his calls to the Pentagon and Oakland because he made them collect. He said he kept no copies of his correspondence with Army officials.

Seventh-Day Adventists Denied Special Permit

A request by the Florida Conference Association of Seventh Day Adventists for a special exception permitting building of a chapel on Bear Lake Road was denied Monday night at a meeting of the Seminole County Board of Adjustment.

A representative of the group stated that the chapel would seat 100 people, and have ample parking for 100 cars. A petition was presented bearing 90 signatures opposing the exception, with the contention that the chapel would be within a half mile radius of the major church of this denomination. A spokesman also remarked that there were five churches within 1/4 mile of Bear Lake. County zoning director Robert Brown told the board that the chapel would have to meet the requirements for off street parking. The request was then denied for insufficient parking area.

A request was entered by E. S. Burnett for a special exception for a trailer park south of Oviedo. Only point of contention by the board upon this request was an access road to a cemetery. The board was approved that there was a 14-foot county road giving access. A stipulation was made that there be a buffer strip planned providing a six-foot access area, and that streets meet the trailer park requirements. Before granting the exception, the board also stipulated that the developer submit plans prior to construction to Brown and the board.

A request by Earl Letter to construct a private landing strip for a private plane on property near Longwood-Markham Road was tabled one month. Marion Matinken, Lake Monroe resident, adamantly voiced his objection to a request from James Dyson and A. H. Gaede for a mobile home park in the area. The park would be situated on the property formerly owned by L. B. Mann nursery, just off SR 15. Matinken stated that drainage problems were plaguing the residents of this area, and the park would only compound the problem. Attorney for the developer, William Hutchinson, told the board that the park would encompass 2 1/2 acres and would consist of 134 units on lots 40 by 90 feet. Hutchinson continued that the site would be compatible with its surroundings with its proximity to the interchange and an industrial site. Hutchinson further continued that the homes were mobile and not expensive. Another resident of the area, Mrs. Betty Lively, also registered an objection, stating that sewerage would be diverted on to her adjacent property. Matinken stated that his objection was the drainage, and Hutchinson reminded him that the county engineer would not approve the development unless it complied with drainage regulations. Hutchinson stated, "no one is trying to compound problems in the Lake Monroe district."

Hutchinson continued that the percolation aspect would not be bothered as much by the trailer park as it would be by a subdivision. Brown stated that this was a low density area development, and trailers would not add to the drainage problems. The request was approved by the board subject to compliance with the necessary rules and regulations and approval of the county engineer.

The controversial request by Direct Oil Corporation for a setback variance for a service station canopy on SR 436 and Hattaway Drive was approved. Residents of the area had complained that there would be an additional traffic hazard from the station at this intersection, and would cause congestion to the Altamonte Elementary School. County engineer William Bush told the Board of Seminole County Commissioners at a recent meeting that he could find no traffic hazard from construction of the station, and that the canopy would not create a visual hazard. The variance approved was for a 12 foot set back of the canopy with a 15 foot support.

Another minor controversy erupted when a request was made by a representative of Phillips Petroleum Company located on the southwest corner of SR 436 and Highway 37-02 for a 30 foot sign. He said that the present sign was not easily visible. Mrs. Helen Keyser, owner of an adjacent Emco station told the board that granting of the request would open a veritable Pandora's box to other stations each wanting higher signs. Mrs. Keyser asked "why don't we make all the signs the same size?" Brown answered, "we would if we could control the town of Longwood." In spite of the fact that board member, Donald Jackson, stated that the current 30 foot sign was visible to him while driving in the vicinity, the variance was approved for the 30 foot sign.

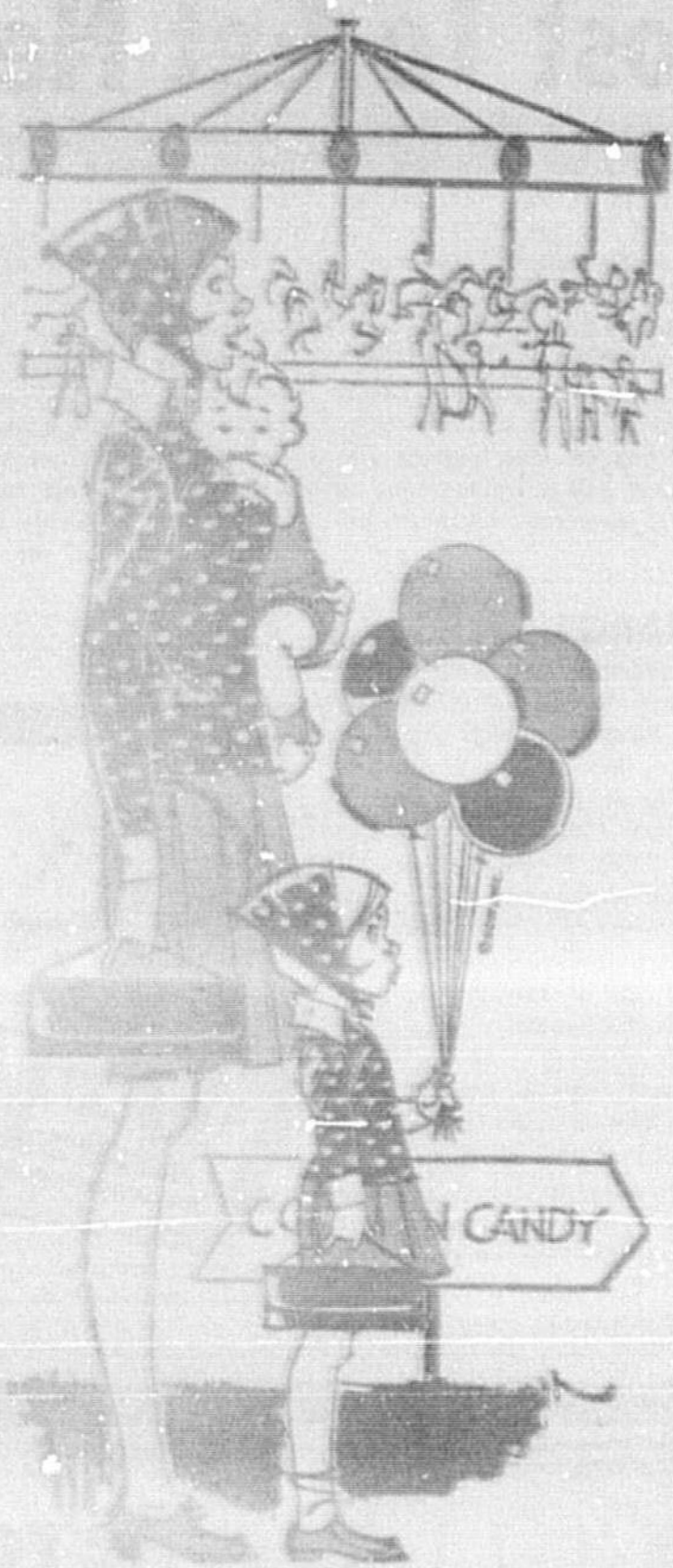

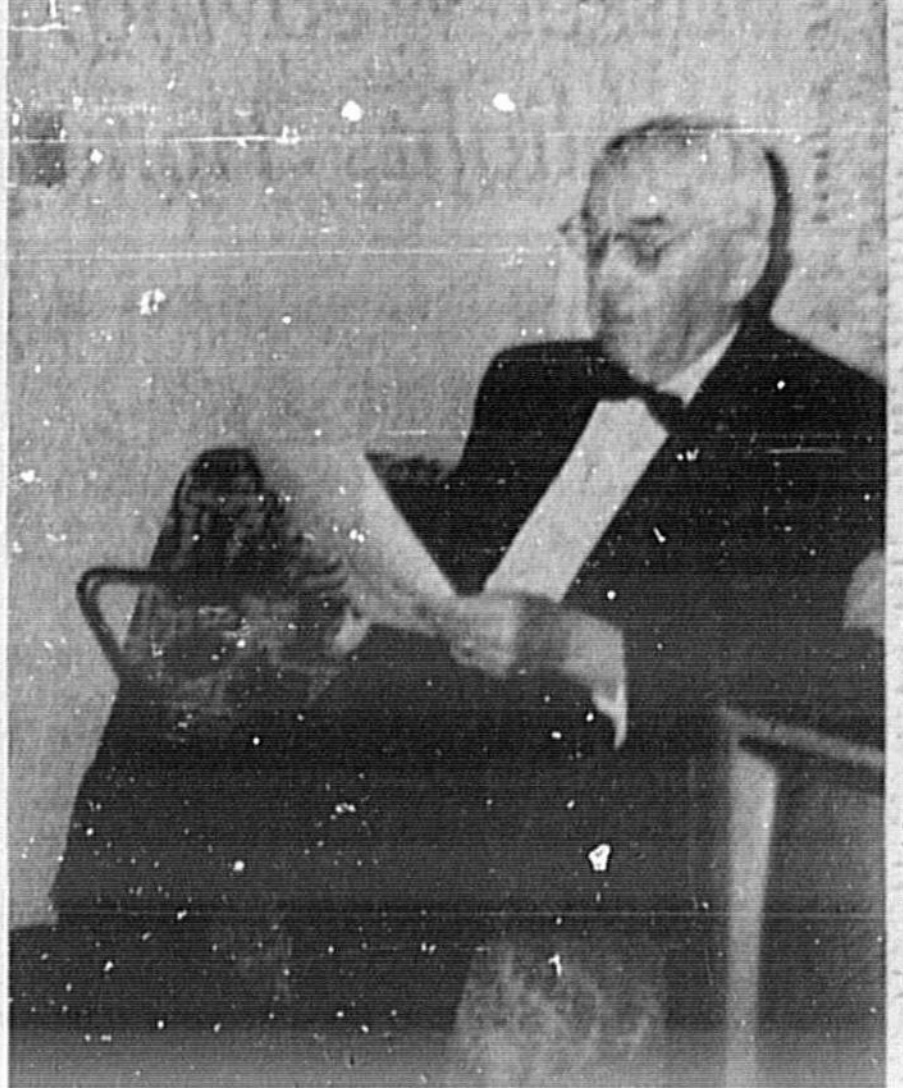
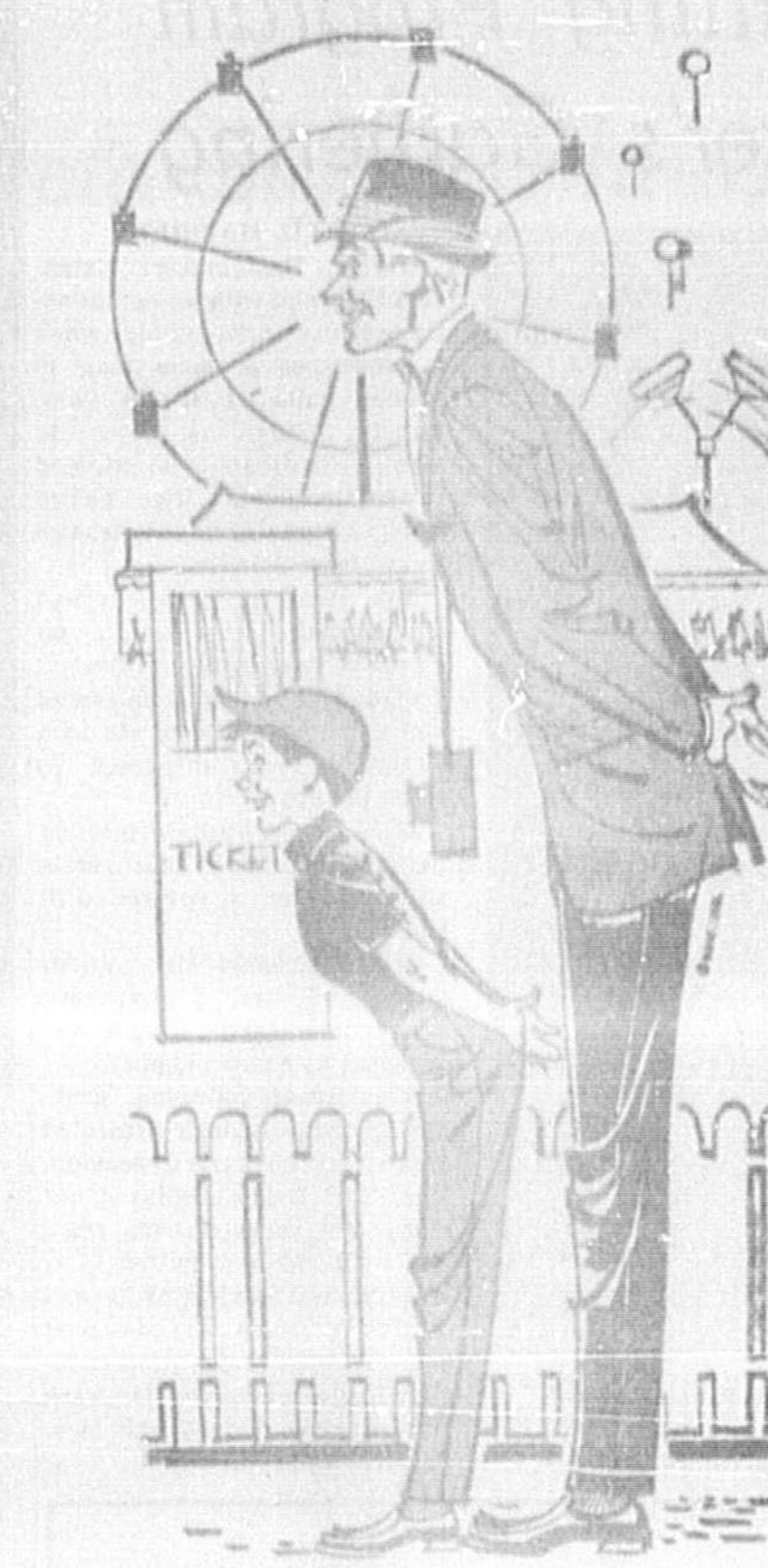

Deltona Trying To Get New Postal Facilities

By MILDRED HANEY

Herbert Packman, Deltona resident, received a letter from Senator Edward J. Gurney in response to an appeal for a new post office in Deltona. Originaling from the office of Ed Wade, Koonjian, Liaison Specialist, Executive Assistant to the Postmaster General, Post Office Department, the letter advised that due to the Bureau of the Judge's curtailment of Federal construction spending, which was put into effect in early September of last year, all department and agencies of government must determine criteria to determine what projects must go forward and still stay within the twenty-five percent allowed. While it was recognized that Deltona needed additional postal facilities because of the strong growth in that area and approval for new construction was granted, it must be weighed against the needs in all areas of the country.

Attorneys Expense Up

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Legislature paid out nearly \$30,000 to attorneys for legal services rendered to government organization and to fight Gov. Claude Kirk in one court suit, a special report said Monday.

The report on expenses for legal services had been requested by Kirk in a letter to Tom Wade, director of fiscal affairs for the Legislature.

Wade said that during 1968-69, the Legislature paid \$25,885 for legal services rendered to government organization committees in the House and Senate. Cost for three House attorneys was \$19,883 and for one attorney in the Senate \$6,000. Wade told Kirk in a written reply.

Wade said the Legislature paid \$1,418 to Tallahassee attorney Joseph Jacobs and Ocala attorney William O'Neill for their services in the court battle against Kirk over the House Transportation Committee's investigation of the Governor's Club.

The probe has been turned over to the House Elections Committee. Three suits involving this committee are now pending and no lawyer costs are yet available, Wade said.

Packman's reaction upon receipt of the letter from Senator Gurney was that he was both pleased and disappointed. He was pleased that the site will be selected in the near future. Disappointed that while ever-ready to cooperate with the Post Office Department in Washington, recognition of the need of a post office in Deltona and the approval in the 75 cent group and actual construction is held up.

Packman stated that Senator Gurney and Congressman Bill Chappell have backed this project 100 per cent and he asks that continued help. He feels that it won't be long before our needs overcome the holdup now placed on the construction of the Post Office in Deltona.

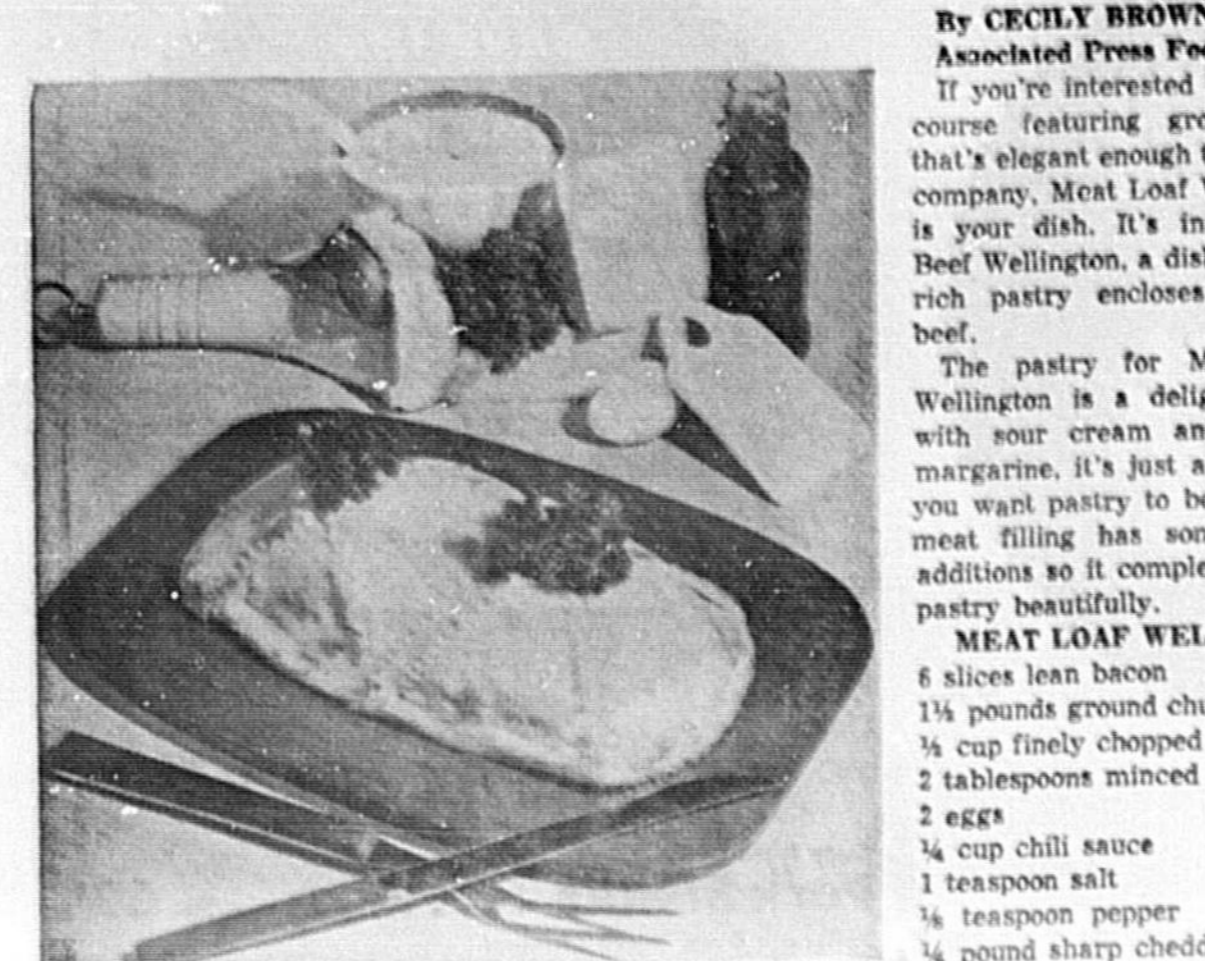

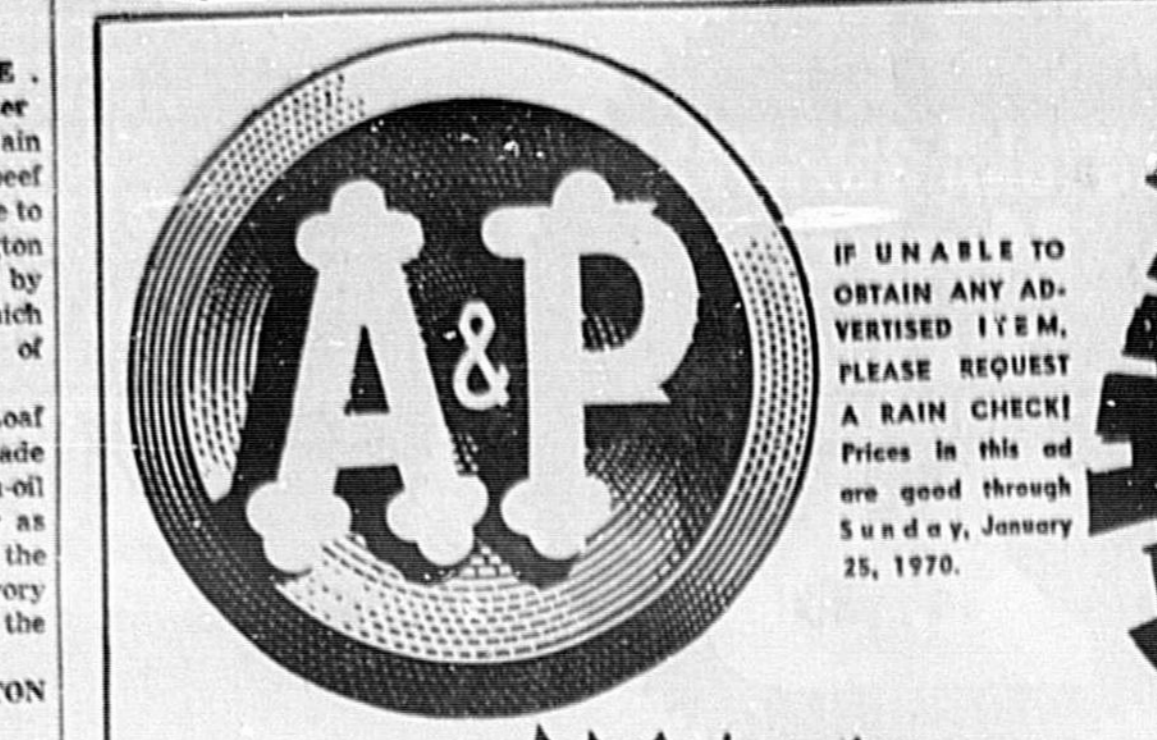

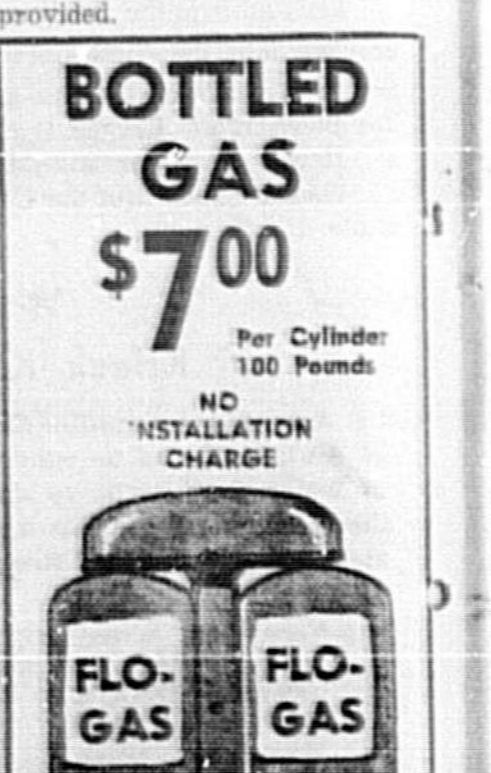

CHOCOLATE CREAM CAKE
Sponge cake baked in 10-inch angel-foot pan
3 containers (each 8 ounces)
heavy cream
2 large eggs
3 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
1/4 cup instant chocolate beverage mix
1/4 cup canned chocolate syrup
Cut cake in three horizontal layers. In a large bowl, beat cream until it holds soft peaks. In a small bowl, without washing beater, beat eggs enough to combine yolks and whites. Add sugar, chocolate mix and chocolate syrup and beat vigorously to blend; add a large spoonful of the whipped cream and beat to blend. Add chocolate mixture to whipped cream and beat gently—just enough to blend and stiffen. Use chocolate cream filling to fill and frost cake.

PEAR-APRICOT MARMALADE
1 cup very finely cut unpeeled orange (1 very large or 3 small oranges)
1 1/2 cups water
Prepared Pears, see recipe below
1 can (1 pound, 13 ounces) unpeeled apricot halves, drained and halved
5 cups sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
Cook orange pulp and peel in the water until peel is very soft. Do not drain. Combine with remaining ingredients. Cook rapidly, stirring often, until there is very little free liquid. (Marmalade will thicken somewhat after cooking so don't overcook.) Quickly pour hot marmalade into about one-eighth-inch of top of sterilized pint or half-pint wide-mouth preserving jars. Wipe off any spills on threads or top of jars. Put dome lids (rinsed in hot water) on jars; screw bands tight. Makes about three pints.

PREPARED PEARS
Peel, core and halve one and a half to two pounds pears. Cut into half inch wide lengthwise slices. Cut slices crosswise into two or three pieces. Measure four cups, shaking cup to settle pieces.

ROWENA KLEY'S BAMBOO CHICKEN
1 broiler fryer (3 1/2 to 3 pounds), cut up
1 cup orange juice
2 tablespoons honey
4 tablespoons American-type soy sauce
1 clove garlic, peeled and halved
Remove rack from broiler pan or very shallow roasting pan; line with foil. Arrange chicken in pan, skin side down. Broil on a low rack, 10 to 12 inches from high heat, until browned—20 to 30 minutes. (If it is not possible to position chicken far from heat, lower heat so chicken browns in given time.) Turn chicken skin side up; continue to broil until browned and tender—20 to 30 minutes.
Meanwhile, in an eight-inch skillet turn the orange juice, honey, soy sauce and garlic. Bring to a boil. Let bubble gently until reduced to a glaze (to about one-third cup)—20 minutes; remove garlic. Using tongs, dip broiled chicken pieces, one at a time, in glaze; turn to coat both sides; glaze will adhere; spoon any small amount of extra glaze over chicken. Serve at once. Makes four servings.
Note: Have butcher cut chicken so there are two wings, two pieces of breast meat, two legs, two second joints and two to four pieces of bonny back.
When you are making poultry for apple pie, try adding some grated cheddar cheese to the dough.

Recipe For Jelly Apples

 DEAR CECILY: My daughter, who is at school in Westchester, Wash., requests a recipe of yours for Jelly Apples. I recall saving it, but now I can't find it anywhere. Won't you please give us the recipe again?
 NAVY MAN
 DEAR NAVY MAN: You wrote me just in time. A delightful cookbook, written for young people, has just appeared. It's "Cook-In" by Kathleen Dunning Fisher and it contains an outstanding recipe for Jelly Apples. The author teaches home economics in high school and so she knows what young people want to cook and can cook successfully.

KATHLEEN DUNNING FISHER'S JELLY APPLES
 6 wooden lollipop or craft sticks
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 1/3rd cup light corn syrup
 1/3rd cup water
 1 1/2 teaspoons white vinegar
 1/2 teaspoon red food coloring
 Wash and dry apples; remove stems and insert lollipop sticks about half inch into stems ends.
 In a heavy two-quart saucepan, stir together the sugar, corn syrup, water and vinegar. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved; over medium heat bring to a boil. Continue cooking over medium heat, without stirring, until temperature reaches 200 degrees on a candy thermometer or until a small amount of the mixture dropped into very cold water separates into threads that, when removed from the water feel hard and are brittle. Remove from heat. Stir in red food coloring just until blended.
 Coat apples quickly, one by one. To do so, hold an apple by its wooden stick, tip pan and slide apple into syrup twirling to coat evenly. Withdraw apple quickly from syrup and while twirling, let excess syrup drip into pan. Place on greased cookie sheet, with stick upright, to harden.

Generally speaking, you are required to give notice within a "reasonable time" after you have an accident. Still, the law does grant you some leeway if there is a good excuse for delay.
 Obviously, you have a good excuse if you simply were not aware that an accident happened at all. Likewise, in the case above, the court decided the motorist's excuse was good enough. As one judge put it:
 "Not every trivial accident should be reported. An accident that an ordinarily prudent person would consider as inconsequential, not the basis of any claim, the insured was not bound to report."
 Nevertheless, if there is reason to fear a claim (even an unfair claim), then it is indeed up to you to tell your insurance company about it.
 For example, a motorist who knocked down a pedestrian was held not justified in failing to report the accident, since he knew the victim had been taken to a hospital. His excuse, that a policeman had told him it was "nothing serious," was held not good enough.

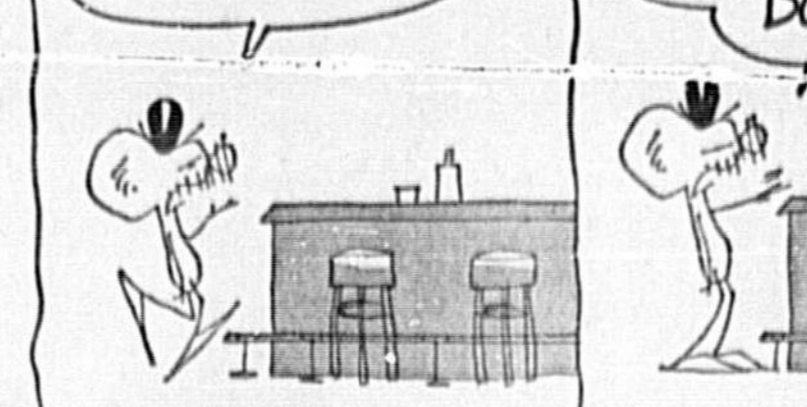

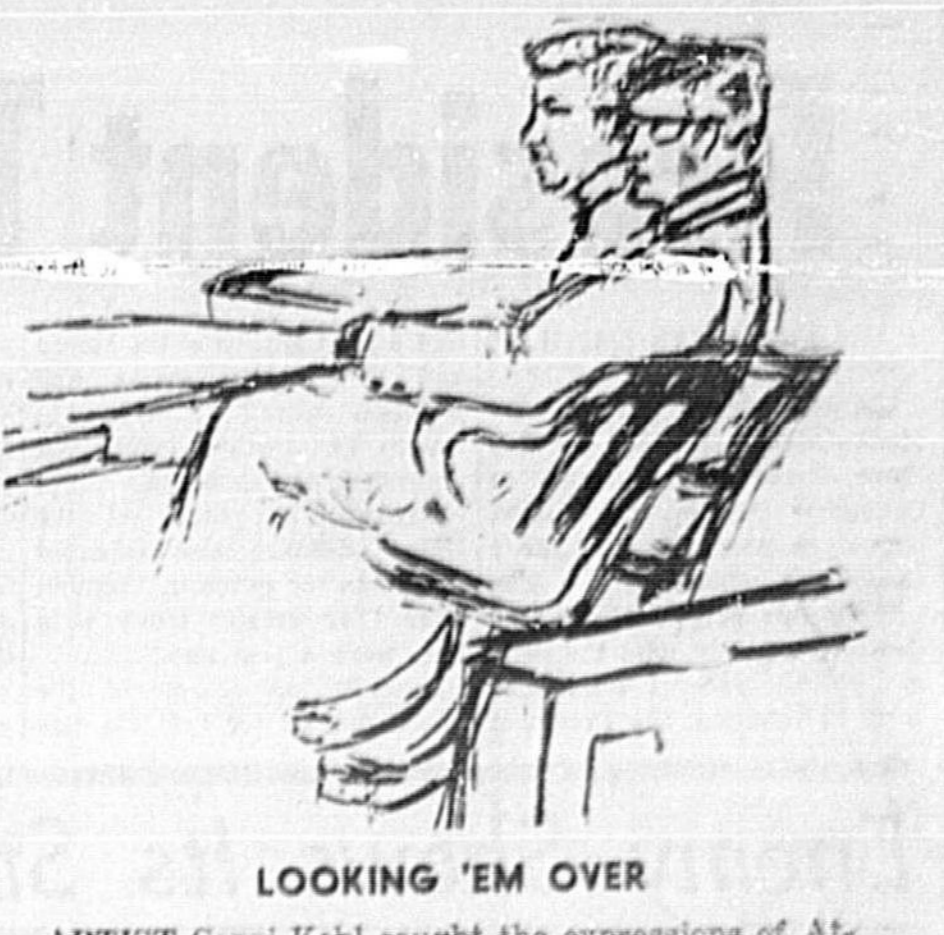
