# Skylab's Trio Returns To Earth

Departure Delayed By Repair Attempt

AP) - Skylab's astronauts came home from man's longest space voyage today, splashing down in the Pacific Ocean after almost being held over in orbit to try to repair a faulty

system in their space station. Charles Conrad Jr., Dr. Joseph P. Kerwin and Paul J. Weitz ended their 28-day journey when their Apollo ferry ship parachuted into the water.

The main recovery ship, the aircraft carrier Ticonderoga, was in the prime

recovery area about 830 miles southwest of San Diego, Calif., ready to hoist the astronauts aboard for a series of vital medical tests to determine how well they withstood their record exposure to space weightlessness.

Earlier, Mission Control considered holding Conrad, Kerwin and Weitz in orbit longer to troubleshoot a refrigeration problem.

But controllers decided there was nothing the astronauts could do and gave them the green light to start the

homeward voyage. They had separated their Apollo ferry ship from the 118-foot-long

After an hour-long fly-around inspection of the house-size lab, they plan the first of three engine firings that will send them toward a fiery dash through the atmosphere from 275 miles

Splashdown was set for 9:50 a.m. EDT in the Pacific Ocean 830 miles southwest of San Diego, Calif.

### Condominium Backers Run Into Opposition

Herald Staff Writer

Fireworks flashed Thursday night between backers of a proposed 240-unit condominium complex, and residents of an adjoining residential area and the Sanford city planner during a planning and zoning commission meeting.

The proposed condominium, which backers want to build on 20 acres of groves near the Mayfair Golf and County Country Club, is opposed by City Planner Gerald Dake and several residents from Greenbriar and Loc Arbor. Dake and some commission members think that the

density will be too high for the area considered a prime water recharge area, and the residents argue that too much traffic and congestion will be generated. The sellers of the property, Sanford attorney Mack

Cleveland Jr., and Harry Tooke, of Daytona Beach, are represented by Seminole County Commissioner Mike Haltaway, who is a licensed real estate salesman. Hattaway, present at the meeting, did not speak to the commission, but told the Herald today that if the deal did not

go through, "I will lose money because I've spent time on the Gary Martin of GMC Builders and Developers Inc., Orlando, took preliminary plans for the complex back to the drawing boards after the commission tabled action for the

second time this month on a request to rezone the recently annexed groves to 12-unit-an-acre multi-family. Z-P members told Martin they need more time to study the water recharge area covering approximately 10,000 acres west of Sanford south of SR-46.

"It would be unfair for us to make a decision at this time," member Robert Karns said. "We have yet to set a "You've got to come up with something more feasible

that you can live with," Vice-Chairman Phil Logan advised Logan warned that the property could be rezoned multifamily by city commissioners but the zoning and planning commission won't give site plan approval to the project as

now proposed, which could delay or kill the project. Dake said preliminary studies indicate the property should be preserved as water recharge area "at all costs." "The only way we know to do this is by density. Density

is directly related to water runoff," Dake said. "We're not against the project as such, but against the

high density," he continued. Martin told board members the developers realize percolation of ground runoff water is very important but density is needed to support economic feasibility of the complex and the rezoning must be accomplished for the purchase of the property by unidentified investors.

Board members suggested the plans be changed from one-and two-story buildings to three or more stories to keep the density but decrease ground cover and Martin said this wouldn't be compatible with the retiree concept of the complex of two and three bedroom units adjacent to the golf course to sell in the \$45,000 per unit range.

Sanford dentist G.W. Edwards presented petitions of 42 county residents adjacent to the grove property opposing the project that "would be in their back yards and allegedly increase traffic congestion on Country Club Road." Edwards said he plans to build a home adjacent to the grove.

American motorists may soon have the same line running through their addled brains, thanks to Uncle Sam and the auto industry. How well the cars of the future run could be an open question at this point, but there is little doubt that they are going to do lots of beeping and

There's a buzzer if you leave the key in the ignition. A nerve-chilling siren goes off if you forget to fasten the seatbelt. Now the Environmental Protection Agency has ruled that 1975 cars must have a warning device that sounds or flashes when the car's exhaust pollution gear goes haywire. Thanks to EPA's and Congress' commitment to catalytic emission control, that probably will be fairly often.

The ultimate, we suspect, will be some day when someone attaches a warning signal to the driver himself. It will light up when he has been thoroughly disintegrated by all the warning signals.—Wall Street Journal

In the late '60s, for example, 70 to 80 per cent of graduating students had jobs. By 1972, less than half of the students were finding jobs after graduation. And the 1973 picture, while slightly rosier, still held out little hope that a college degree would ever again automatically mean a job for its holder.

Statistics indicate, in fact, that less than two out of 10 jobs available in the 1970s will need a degree holder to fill them.

"A lot of people are saying that vocational training is the answer," said Laker. "Frankly I do believe that college students would be better off to learn a skill, as well as get a degree. It's good insurance.

"It's going to be hard to get jobs in the field you studied in for the next few years." Some degree fields are still a good bet for the

student thinking about his future. There's a demand for engineering students, for example,

But physics majors face a dismal job outlook through the '80s, and teachers aren't much better off (even though students are still clamoring to get into teacher schools) "What I'm looking forward to," said Laker,

"is a significant drop-off in college enrollments. A lot of people, when they find out that four years of work isn't going to lead to a job, will decide to go right to work to find one, rather than wasting their time.

"Enrollments have already drastically dropped off in some areas. Many colleges are going out and beating the bushes for students. Many of the private schools are especially concerned about the drop in enrollments, and have raised their tuition to make up the difference. But that only aggravates the problem.'

More and more students, said Laker, are realizing that they'll be facing a tough job market after graduation. As a result they're taking more vocational courses at junior colleges.

Some high school districts have also set up vocational training centers in order to give their graduates a salable skill Laker emphasized, however, that with a

little foresight-and a lot of hard work-a college

degree is still worthwhile. "There's always room for a kid at the top of his class," said Laker. "These guys (in the top 10 per cent) will get offers no matter what the market is.

### Farming Comeback

### Expenses Spurring U.S. Output

WASHINGTON - The United States began as a farming nation and became an industrial giant Today it is still an industrial giant, but becoming more of

a farming nation again. Under the impetus of worldwide food shortages and rising prices, U.S. agriculture production is expanding and nearing records in many areas

It is already by far the single largest industry or form of economic activity in the nation. Farm-related employment totals an estimated 16.5 million persons or about one-fifth the total U.S. labor force. Farming also generated more than 16 per cent of the total gross national product.

Perhaps most spectacular of all is the rapid rise in U.S. farm exports at a time when the over-all U.S. trade of balance has skidded into the red.

In 1969, agricultural exports totaled \$5.7 billion. This fiscal year, ending June 30, U.S. farm exports are expected to reach \$11.1 billion.

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz points out this is as much a result of steady growth as it is of the spectacular sales of grain to both Communist China and the Soviet Union

Even without the China and Soviet purchases, U.S. farm exports this fiscal year would have topped an estimated \$9

billion-a healthy \$3.3 billion increase since 1969. The U.S. Department of Agriculture furthermore is forecasting that farm exports will continue to grow at a rate of about 5 per cent or some \$550 million a year at current prices. This total could be much larger, too, if present tariff discriminations against U.S. farm exports in Europe could

Much of the expanded production expected this year will come from 40 million acres released by the government for full production. The acres were part of a national total of 61.5 million acres idled under various feed grain, cotton and other

One result now anticipated is a record 1973 winter wheat harvest of 1,315,672,000 bushels, based on June 1 field reports. This is an 11 per cent increase over 1972. Continued strong foreign demand for part of this crop,

plus a bumper feed grain crop of about 215 to 218 million tons. Neither the Agriculture nor Commerce departments like to predicts foreign demand for U.S. grain. It is hazardous enough to attempt such forecasts domestically. But over-all exports of U.S. farm products are respon-

sible for about one-fifth of net farm income.

Not A Ha-Ha Guy

### He Has Filed 60,000 Dirty Jokes

NICE, France (AP) - There's something distinctly unfunny abut a

man who has filed away over 60,000 dirty jokes. Gershon Legman admits it himself: for someone who doesn't mind being called the world's greatest authority on erotic humor, he's not a very ha-ha guy.

Legman has an archivist's heart that makes his telling of a filthy story turn into something like an ornithologist's sighting report.

"I heard this one first in central Tennessee..." be'll say, and then fill in an historical-psychological analysis of the story before absent-

He began research in 1938 for the first volume of a book, "The Rationale of the Dirty Joke.

Until he stopped to spend more time on folk songs and limericks, Legman, of Scranton, Pa., went around talking to people about anything long enough until he could lay his standard question on them: "What is the dirtiest joke you've ever heard?" The answer was normally fed into the Legman filing

system with scholarly rigor. Legman, though an American, has lived in the south of France for about 25 years with much of time going into his great compilation, which has been published in about 10 lan-

American dirty stories often have racial or homosexual themes. The Germans and Dutch are scatological, he says, and the basic French motifs deal with adultery and impotence. Whatever the subject, he says, British jokes are essentially aggressive and full of one-upmanship.

Legman's theory on why people tell dirty jokes is that they are an outlet for hostility and anxiety. "The teller is often forcing his

jokes on his audience, and passing his fears on to them. When you "Golf, tennis, sailing, hiking, canoeing - how about laugh, he's reassured. Tell me your favorite story and I'll tell you somesending ME to this camp, too?" thing about your sex life."

### RAY CROMLEY Price freeze? It won't do a thing

President Nixon's price freeze is unlikely to work. But neither probably would any other price control plan. The problem is that inflation today is what the technicians call demand-pull, meaning it's a sellers' market. Demand is far greater than supply. Too many of us are overspending.

The opinion among economists this reporter has reason to trust on the basis of their past predictions is that nothing the government can do will stop this kind of inflation. Certainly not price controls nor 1,000 regulations. There will be black markets, the fuzzing of prices, shifts in price definitions by

The consumer will pay more directly or indirectly. He will get less service with what he buys. He will get less of a roduct one way or another. This present inflation is entirely different from cost-push

types, where wages and such force prices up. Here, the only

effective attack would be to slap hard at demand. But there is no practical way known of cutting down on demand at Will the administration and Congress cut back heavily on government spending? That's highly unlikely. Will consumers stop buying? Certainly not by decree. Probably only when they see a slowdown coming and begin worrying about

To make matters worse, there is a worldwide shortage of crucial foods - grains and meats, for example. There are scarcities too of basic metals such as copper, zinc and lead. Neither the Nixon administration nor Congress has any appreciable control over these problems. The rationing of gasoline would have little effect on the overall cost-of-living

All in all, the only thing possible with a demand-pull inflation, my particular economist friends say, is to ride it out. Anything else merely puts off the day of reckoning. If predictions are correct and the U.S. economy is in for a slowdown the last three months of this year or early in 1974 (or if a slowdown comes earlier by chance) then prices will begin to ease, or at least the pressure on prices will let up and governmental action could become effective.

This, my technical friends say, is our only only hope,



# Berrigan Case

In a sort of now-it-can-be-told story, five social scientists have revealed how they conducted a pretrial survey which is credited with helping defense lawyers win a mistrial in the celebrated trial of antiwar priest Phillip Berrigan on charges that he and seven others conspired to kidnap presidential

adviser Henry Kissinger and blow up heating ducts in Wash-

The trial ended in April, 1972, when a Harrisburg, Pa jury rejected by a 10-2 vote the government's conspiracy allegations, writing an end to a two-month-long case in which the Justice Department presented 64 witnesses and spent \$2

By means of personal and telephone interviews, the team of sociologists sought to establish a profile of local residents which would indicate the kinds of jurors most likely to vote for acquittal. They stipulated, however, that if any of those interviewed were called as jurors they would not provide defense lawyers with specific information about that person.

Anticipating charges that their behavior was improper, the sociologists emphasize that they sought basically to help the defense overcome the handicap imposed by the Justice Department's move to bring its indictment in Harrisburg - a community that has three Republicans for every two Democrats, several military installations and war-related industries and an active Ku Klux Klan.

The researchers in fact found that 80 per cent of the residents polled trusted their government, a figure far higher than the national average of 40 to 45 per cent. They reported to the defense on the day of jury selection that "at least four out of five persons who would qualify as jurors would be opposed to the defendants." They therefore stressed to defense counsel the importance

of questioning the jury panel for as long as possible, getting unfavorable people rejected for "cause" and holding out for "the statistically rare but desirable people sketched by our

ook more than five minutes to question a prospective juror and "seemed to think one juror was almost as good as another from the government's point of view." The decision by Federal District Judge R. Dixon Herman to sequester the jury to protect it from harassment from demonstrators and friends of the defendants - a move the defense had opposed — was also of great consequence.

For whatever reasons, the social scientists write in Psychology Today magazine, "bad" defense jurors seemed more likely than "good" ones to opt out of jury service by stating the escape formula, "I have formed an opinion." The prospect of sequestration for four to five months upped the ante for prospective jurors who, as one of them said, "wanted to

The value of the pretrial survey - which cost a mere \$450 - is shown not only by the votes for acquittal but by the fact that it came despite the later-revealed dislike of the jurors for chief defense attorney Ramsey Clark and their sympathy for the outnumbered prosecution attorneys. The moral, if there is any: All's fair in love and war and, the law's elaborate safeguards notwithstanding, in jury trials





### **POLLY'S POINTERS** Whitening Pointers

For Dingy Crocheting By POLLY CRAMER

DEAR POLLY - I am answering Bernice who wants to whiten the finished part of a crocheted tablecloth and then complete it. I had a bedspread that took 20 years to make, which I soaked overnight in a strong solution of a popular brand powdered bleach. Now it is white and beautiful and the material is unharmed. - MARTHA

DEAR POLLY - and Bernice - My mother crocheted a lace tablecloth for me and she under-estimated the amount of thread needed. She had to use two different dye lots. Following the directions on packages of color remover, I used it, then washed it in hot water with detergent and put it in the dryer on the delicate fabric cycle. It is all one color and is used every day. I have since used this color remover on many things, but one must be careful to follow the direc-

DEAR GIRLS - If Bernice does not want to use bleach on the finished and yellowed part of her crocheted tablecloth she could hang it, dripping wet, outdoors in the direct light and let the sun whiten it. Do this before more thread is bought so the new will match the old. When bleaching, always follow directions and rinse thoroughly. The thread usually used for such crocheting is tough cotton and should take to careful bleaching with no worries. - POLLY Polly's Problem

DEAR POLLY - My problems concern electric blankets. When in use, should a light coverlet be put over them to hold in the heat? What is the proper and safe way to launder these blankets in an electric washer and should they be put in the dryer or hung outdoors? If not soiled, would putting them through the fluff cycle of the dryer briefly be satisfactory before storing for the summer? The instructions say to fold these blankets as it could break the wires but they come folded in large square boxes. How does one fold or roll such blankets for storage without folding? I will certainly appreciate some suggestions on the above. -

DEAR POLLY - My Pet Peeve is with those manufacturers who paint the wooden handles on kitchen utensils. Often the paint looks like plastic but it cracks and peels in the dishpan and may even fall into food being prepared. - MRS.





Johnny Miller pulled a real shocker when he captured the U.S. Open Golf Championship last week at Oakmont Country Club outside Pittsburgh, Pa. but the fellows who had, in our opinion, much to do with the outcome of as well as the scores were Dave Hill and Gary Player.

Hill's outburst upon his withdraw at Lakmont was intentional and most direct. He flat predicted the greens would be hard and fast come Sunday's final round. Hill said the constant rolling of the greens daily would make them extra

Upon the conclusion of the opening round the United States Golf Association ordered the greens watered which prevented the greens from being rolled excessively. Rain later in the week also prevented excessive amounts of rolling and left the putting surfaces extra soft.

Player's "part" was totally unintentional. It came after his opening round 67 when the South African told interviewers they would come to appreciate his super round come Sunday. The inference here was that the course would toughen as the tourney progressed. It didn't. In fact, it became "easier" with record efforts coming on consecutive days, winding up with Miller's 63.

### Miller Battles Height

This year's U.S. Open gold champion has been battling height problems during his 26 years and that fight has included both ends of the measuring stick.

When Miller was a sophomore in high school Miller was only five feet, two inches tall. And he was worried that he would be too small to become a really great golfer. Suddenly he shot up and now the problem is reversed. "I should stop growing any day now," Miller told in-

terviewers in the press tent following his record breaking eight-under-par 63 at the Oakmont Country Club. One sports caster in Pittsburgh came up with the idea that perhaps Miller should start smoking, since smoking is supposed to stunt ones growth. But Miller is of Morman faith and has few, if any, bad habits.

### Psyche Non-Existent

While there are some who feel many young golfers are affected by pressure during the bigger tournaments the new Open champ and Lanny Wadkins are not among them. Wadkins does not feel the Open is really that tough and prior to the start of this year's tourney predicted some young players (including Miller, Jerry Heard and Lanny Wadkins

would make a run at the title. And Wadkins it turns out was some sort of a prophet what with Miller winning the tourney and Heard among the Leaders after three rounds.

Miller is another who feels the Open offers no great pressure. In fact, as far as he is concerned the Open is geared to his game more so than most tournaments. As Miller said "everybody chokes as much as I do."

### Walking 'Over' Turnpike

The recent Open brought many thrills to the visiting golf fans but one "thrill" had nothing to do with golf. It seems seven of the 18 holes at the Oakmont Country Club are on one side of the Pennsylvania Turnpike while the other 11 are to the west. 

The \$115,000 Medal of Honor Firecracker 400 will feature an all-star line-up on the 2.5-mile Daytona tri-oval. Preceding the Firecracker 400 will be the Paul Revere 250, a Camel GT Challenge race, set for 12 midnight,

United States Automobile Club (USAC) ace A. J. Foyt will be trying to match the late Fireball Robert's record in the 15th annual Firecracker. The three-time Indianapolis 500 winner will be driving the Banjo Mathews-prepared Purolator Chevrolet. Roberts is the only three-time winner of the midsummer event, taking the checkered flag in 1959, 1962 and
