

Cheers For 'Disney World'

The announcement recently of plans surrounding the \$600 million Disney World to be constructed in Central Florida has already been heralded as one of the greatest in our modern history.

Although deceased the magnificent personality of Walt Disney was brought to life again, as the world's once leading showman presented the plan in a film broadcast by state television stations.

"Disney World" will be constructed over a 10 year projected time table on a 27,000 acre tract south of Orlando.

Besides an amusement park, which is scheduled to be opened to the public in three years, an "Experimental Prototype Community of Tomorrow" will be featured on the 48 square mile tract.

The city, nicknamed "EPCOT," will cover 50 acres and feature surrounding complex areas including: high density apartments, and recreation centers, schools, churches, a residential area and, in the distance from the recreational community, an industrial complex.

City planners and architects have termed "Disneyland" in California as the best constructed and planned city in America.

Central Florida should be indeed proud to have been selected as the site for the massive new "Disney World."

Floridians should commend the initial activities by former governor Haydon Burns, which encouraged the selection of our state.

The immediate follow-up by Governor Claude Kirk should not go without mention.

There is little doubt that the establishment of "Disney World" in our state will be of great assistance to the tourist industry of Sanford and Seminole County.

Few people will venture this close to the "future mighty port" without taking the opportunity for a visit to our area.

Sited to be a \$6.6 billion plum to Florida, "Disney World" should place Florida in the best fiscal condition ever obtained during our 402 year history.

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviets and the Chinese Communists each took about 17 years to digest their revolutions, and then they had convulsions. For another 19 years, the Soviets were in Doctor Stalin's sickbed.

The Chinese may recover sooner because of the difference in age between Stalin and Doctor Mao Tse-tung at the time of the convulsions. Mao is an old man. Therein lies, perhaps, the West's best hope for the future.

The murder of a party friend in 1934-17 years after the Bolshevik revolution—gave Stalin the take-off point for wiping out any possible opposition in the bloody purges of the 1930's.

He was 55 when the purges began and he remained in total control another 19 years until his death in 1953, although his energy and ambitions were distracted and much consumed by World War II.

If there had been no war, the U.S.S.R. might have been different now, and the world also. Certainly if Stalin had lasted

longer, the Soviets would have been slower turning toward more moderation.

He had one policy: Progress for the U.S.S.R. And it made progress, industrially and scientifically. But the people paid the price in lives, sacrifices and suppression.

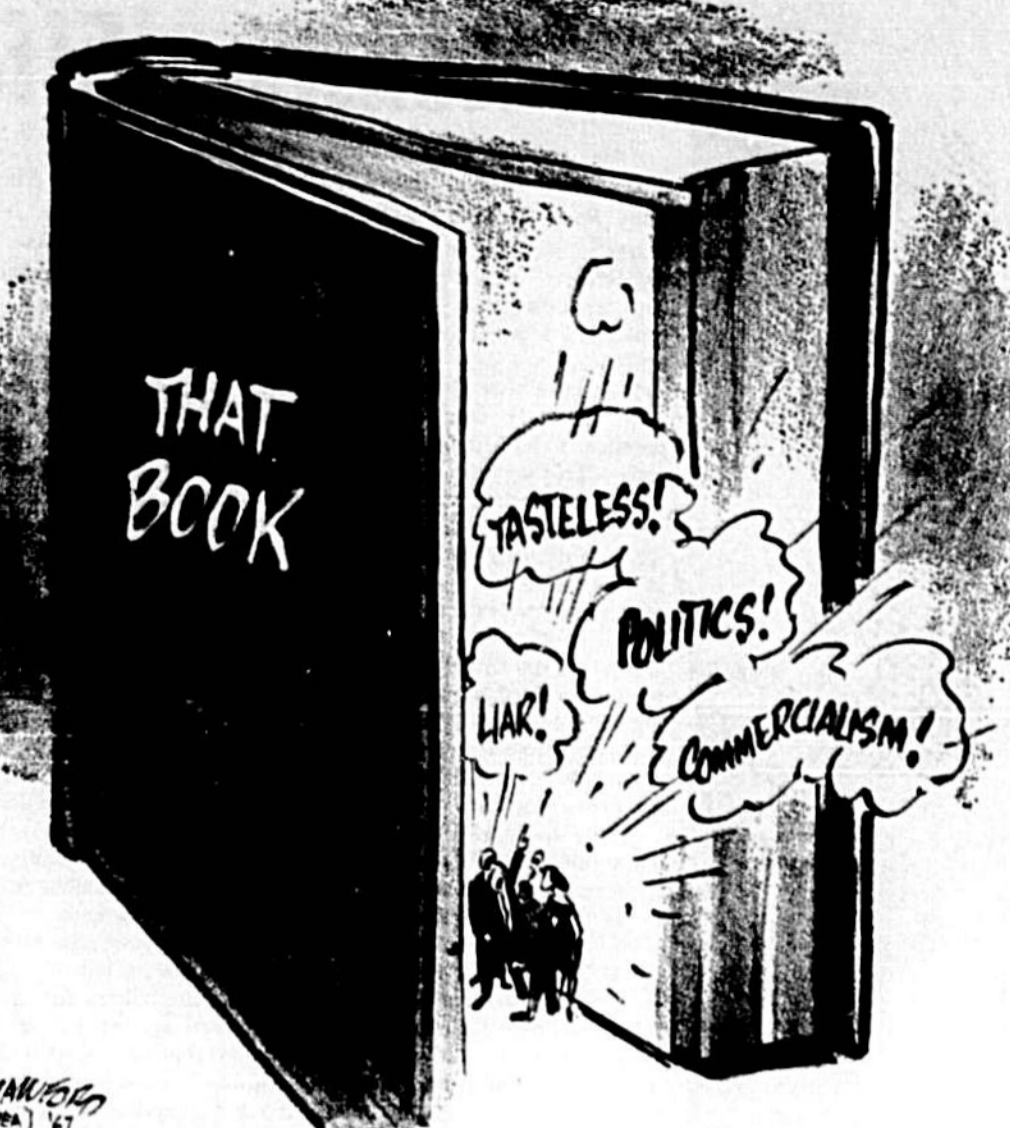
In 1966, Mao, 17 years after his Red Chinese took over mainland China, began his rampage against some of his old associates and the new bureaucracy. Revisionists, he called them, which is another word for reactionaries.

This is what he called the Soviets, to explain his break with them.

If he wins, with his primitive concepts of organizing a nation, he will set China back but that cannot last long. He is 73.

There is a difference between Mao and Stalin seldom mentioned. While Stalin shot his foes and rivals, reports from China do not tell of executions as the U.S.S.R. might have done. When Mao fades or dies, those closest

"It is most unfair to have taken away the farm and the animals from this poor man, who has done nothing else all his life than to get up at three o'clock in the morning to milk the cows and who has been working since he was born. Now he has nothing left . . . with a sick wife and four small children."

"Recently, my wife contracted tuberculosis. She had been fooling me, telling me she was eating, while all the time she was giving her meager rations to our children, while she was starving."

"Two years ago, I lost a two-year-old baby daughter due to gastroenteritis. Nothing could be done to save her, for lack of medicines and medical knowledge."

"Just now, my youngest child, 1 1/2 years old, is very sick. No one knows what she has. I have no right to stay here and see my family die. I must save them. Please claim me!"

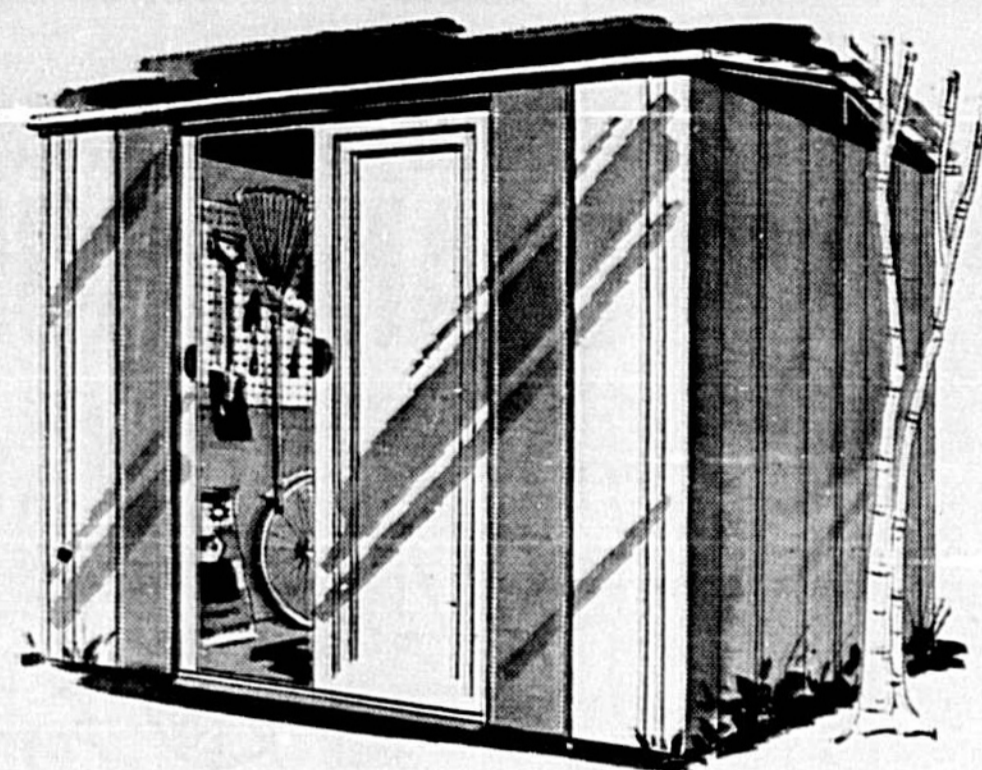

Alaska King Crab Adds Mealtime Elegance

SOUFFLE
Melt over low heat:
1 cup butter or margarine
Blend in:
1/2 cup flour
Pour in all at once:
1 cup cold milk
Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Remove from heat.
Beat in, one at a time:
4 egg yolks
Add:
1 cup Alaska King Crab meat (frozen or canned) cut into small pieces or chunks
Season with:
onion juice
chopped parsley
Cool mixture.
Beat until stiff but not dry.
4 egg whites to which have been added 1 tsp. salt
Fold crab mixture carefully into egg whites.
Pour into a preheated 1 1/2 quart casserole (greased on bottom only).
With a teaspoon, circle mixture about 1/2-inch deep approximately 1/2 inch from sides.
Bake:
225 degree oven 50 to 60 minutes until puffy and delicately browned, and a knife inserted halfway between center and outside comes out clean.
If soufflé must stand, leave in oven with lowest heat possible. (Serves 4-6).

Blend chocolate and honey; cool to lukewarm. Sift flour, cream, add soda and salt and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly and add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add chocolate-honey mixture and vanilla. Blend. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Add flour, alternately with water, 2 small amounts at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Bake in two greased 8 inch layer pans in 350 degree oven 30 to 35 minutes. Spread with fluffy Honey Frosting. Sprinkle sides of cake with candy hearts.

FLUFFY HONEY FROSTING
2 egg whites
dash of salt
1 cup honey
Beat egg whites with and until stiff enough to hold up in peaks, but not dry. Pour honey in fine stream over egg whites, beating constantly about 10 to 15 minutes, or until frosting thickens. To store or heat, stir in 2 1/2 minutes at high speed with electric mixer. Makes about 4 1/2 cups frosting.

GERMAN CHOCOLATE CREAM CHEESE BROWNIES
1 pkg. (4 oz) German Chocolate (Sweet)
5 tbsp. butter
1 1/2 cups cream cheese
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup plus 1 tsp. unsifted flour
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts
1 tsp. almond extract
Sift chocolate and 1/2 tsp. butter over very low heat, stirring constantly. Cool. Cream remaining butter with the cream cheese until softened. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Stir in 1 egg, 1/2 tsp. flour and 1/2 tsp. vanilla until blended. Beat remaining eggs until fluffy and light in color. Gradually add remaining 1/2 cup sugar, beating until thickened. Fold in baking powder, salt and remaining 1/2 cup flour. Blend in cooled chocolate mixture. Stir in nuts, almond extract and remaining 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Measure 1 cup chocolate batter and set aside. Spread remaining chocolate batter in a greased pan. Pour cream cheese mixture over the top. Drop measured chocolate batter from tablespoon onto the cream cheese mixture, swirl the mixture together with a spatula just to marble. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 25 to 40 minutes. Cool. Cut in bars or squares. Cover and store in the refrigerator. Makes 20 brownies.

PEACH PUDDING CAKE
1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup milk
2 tbsp. melted shortening or oil
1 can (1 lb. 14 oz) cling peach slices drained
1 tsp. sugar
Whipped cream, if desired
Sift together flour, 1/2 cup sugar, baking powder, salt and nutmeg into mixing bowl. Blend together egg, milk and shortening or oil. Add liquid all at once to flour mixture, stirring until smooth. Turn into greased baking pan. Arrange peach slices over batter. Sprinkle 1 tsp. sugar over batter and peaches. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 30 to 35 minutes, or until golden brown. Serve warm or cool with whipped cream.

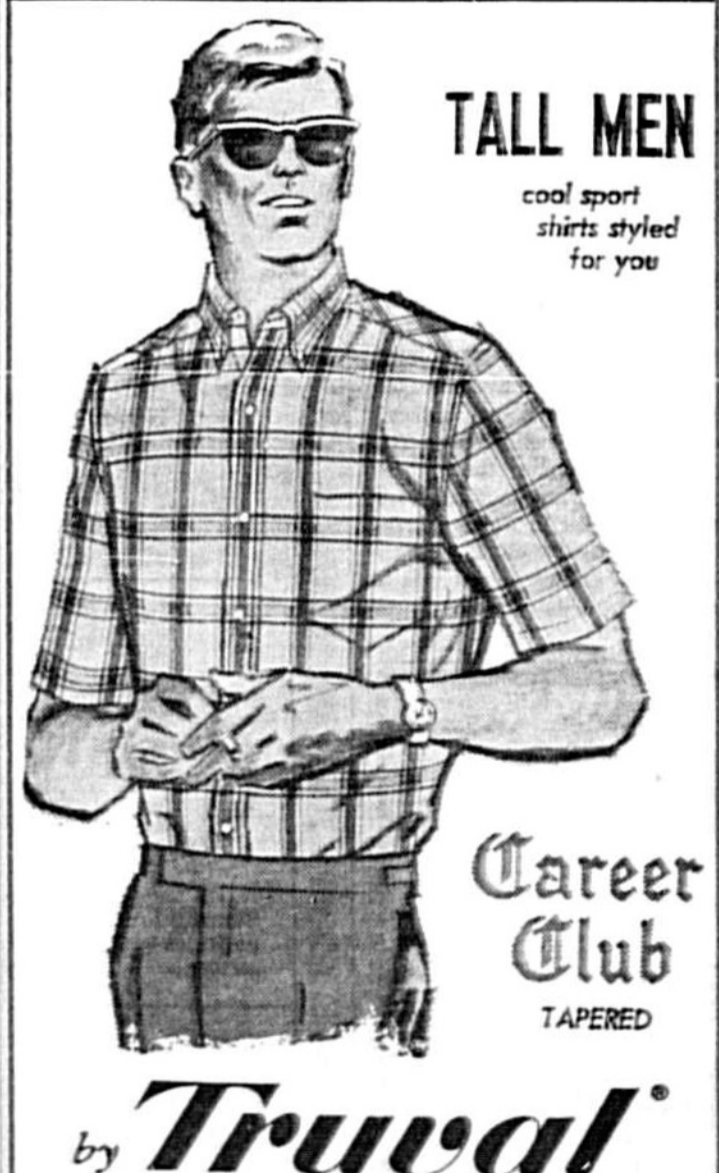

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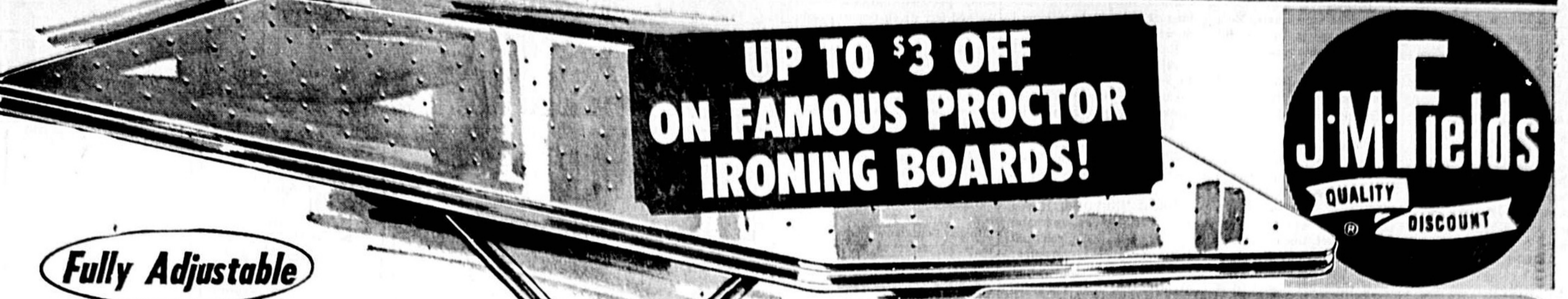

Canal Contract Okayed
