





Foreign Loans

In this democracy of ours where anyone can hold any opinion he wants on any subject under the sun and talk about it until kingdom comes, you can find just about any solution for the Greco-Turkish problem you may be looking for. But on one phase of it there seems to be fairly general agreement: it is okey to give the Greeks the money provided it doesn't cost us anything in "blood, sweat and

And that is just the trouble with a too generous distribution of American dollars throughout the world. It might pay some of us at this time to refresh our memories a little as to what happened after the first World War with respect to American foreign leans and their ultimate effect upon our national economy. And on the theory that history repeats itself, we might give some thought to the ultimate consequences of present loans.

During the first World War the American government under the leadership of President Wilson refinanced the loans of J. P. Morgan & Co. to Great Britain and made additional loans to the Allies which together by the war's end amounted to seven billion dollars. After the Armistice further loans for relief and reconstruction were made by our government in the amount of over three billion dollars By the time an agreement was reached on a settlement accumulated interest had run the debt up to 111/2 billion

Then, the government stopped lending money, but is did not stop American financial interests, and American private investors, from making loans abroad. And so up to 1928 billions of additional dollars were invested in the securities of foreign nations, mostly in Europe, many in such insecure areas as Greece, Rumania, and the Near East. By the time these private investors had run out of money, foreigners owed this country another 11 billion dollars, or over 22 billion dollars altogether,

The effect of these huge loans on our national economy was tremendous. Although the money was borrowed by foreign nations and foreign interests, very little of it ever left this country. Most of it was spent right here in this country. What did leave our country was our national resources. Billions of dollars worth of cotton, wheat and other food products were shipped abroad, as well as vast quantities of manufactured articles, automobiles, machinery and what have you, And as a result, production reached litherto undreamed of heights, farmers converted idle nores into new farms, new businesses were started and factories sprang up all over the country,

Then, in 1928 when we quit making loans; the for eigners quit buying. It never occurred to them to start paying. Finland, to be sure, made a noble effort to do the right thing. One or two other countries made small pay ments, but by in large, they laughed it off, called us Uncle Shylock, and told us to go fry. Out of the 22 billion dollars lent, we have never collected enough to pay the interest and it is unlikely that we ever will.

Now what happened when we quit selling to foreign countries for the money we were lending them? All those who are old enough to read will remember the bottom dropped out of the price of wheat and cotton, banks went busted by the thousands, the insurance companies took over the farms, businesses failed, the workers lost their jobs, there were bread lines and soup kitchens, and finally the WPA, the CCC, the PWA and all the other evils which the era of the alphabetical agencies ushered in.





In addition to being tender and crisp, this new lettuce has a tasty nut-like flavor. The plants are vigorous, well-formed and resistant to hot weather. The leaves are shaped in an entirely new pattern, as illustrated in the accompanying Garden-Graph. It is ready for the table in about 40 days after seeding.

The leaves of Bronze Beauty bear some resemblance to the now popular Oak Leaf lettuce, which last year won an award of merit from the Massachusetts Horlicultural Society. The latter is also outstanding for its tenderness and its resistance to heat.

that it thrives best in cool weathr. It should be planted early in the season for spring maturity or in August for autumn use. If planted too late in the spring, forcing maturity in the hot menths of midsumer, Bibb lettuce months of midsumer, Bibb lettuce is quick to produce seed stems.

Leaf lettuce, it should be remembered, has more vitamins than head lettuce, since all its leaves are green, and being open are exposed to the sun's rays. It is especially easy to grow and it can be used before the heading varieties are ready.

Among the standard leaf lettuce varieties Black-Seeded Simpson is still a great favorite. It grows quickly, is early and of fine quality. Grand Rapids is another favorite variety, It has futed and curied leaves.
