Atomic Group Head Is Called World's Most Powerful Man

NEW YORK—The chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, was today called "the most powerful man in the world" during Senate debates over confirmation of his appointment.


Dr. Oppenheimer, 41, is a physicist who led the atomic bomb project during the war. He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences and the National Institute of Arts and Letters.

His appointment as head of the Atomic Energy Commission is a landmark in the history of atomic energy. The commission will be responsible for the development and control of atomic energy for peaceful purposes.

Dr. Oppenheimer's appointment is subject to Senate confirmation. The Senate will vote on his appointment today.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee today approved legislation to carry out President Truman's program of financial and limited military aid to Greece and Turkey.

The committee head, Senator Charles McNary, accused Russia for its inability to act on the situation in Greece. He said that Russia was blocking the United Nations from acting on the matter.

The legislation provides for \$100 million in financial aid and \$100 million in military aid to Greece and Turkey. It also provides for the purchase of surplus military equipment.
