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Man arrested on pornography charges

Seminole County Sheriff's Office arrested a Maitland man for multiple counts related to child pornography.
John Morosky, 35, was arrested and charged Monday with seven counts of possession of obscene materials/photographs of sexual performance by a child, and seven counts of computer pornography.

The case against Morosky began a little more than a year ago after deputies learned that a teenage girl accused Morosky of molesting her in 1999, when she was 13 years old.

Criminal investigators with the Child Protective Team looked into the matter and arrested Morosky in February 2002, on a charge of Sexual Battery. Morosky bonded out of jail and is awaiting trial on that charge.

During that investigation, deputies seized Morosky's girlfriend's computer, after she complained of finding child pornography on it. Investigators analyzed the computer and determined that the girlfriend's suspicions were correct.

On Jan. 31, Morosky's lawyer was contacted about the alleged child pornography found on the computer, and arrangements were made for Morosky's surrender at the Seminole County Jail. Morosky was served with the warrant Monday, was booked, and then later posted \$6,000 bond.

In an unrelated case, deputies arrested a 39-year-old fugitive from Michigan wanted for sexual assault of a victim under the age of 13.

Thomas Eldron Fuller was arrested Monday, after a team of deputies from the career criminal unit followed, and pulled over Fuller in the 5200 block of Red Bug Lake Road.

Fuller had been living in Seminole County for the past several months in a neighborhood in Winter Springs. He lists his occupation as a construction worker. He is being held in the Seminole County Jail under no bond.

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Montisano named CEO of zoo

SANFORD — Ken Fowle, president of the Central Florida Zoological Society, recently announced the selection of Joe Montisano to the position of chief executive officer of the Central Florida Zoological Park. Montisano joined the team on January 13.

Montisano has served as executive director and CEO of the 600-acre Wildlife Safari and Safari Game Search Foundation in Winston, Ore., from 1999 through 2002. There, he administered a \$2.5 million budget and helped transform southern Oregon's largest tourist attraction into a first

class facility. Prior to that, he worked for eight years with Busch Entertainment Corporation at SeaWorld in Cleveland, Ohio.

Montisano received his bachelor of science degree in business marketing from the University of Akron. He has founded and served as chairman of the board for several non-profit companies and is involved with various civic organizations.

As CEO, Montisano will be responsible

for managing the day-to-day operations of Sanford's nationally accredited zoo, which serves approximately a quarter million visitors annually and includes a \$24 million budget.

"Joe brings a variety of experiences and a vast knowledge of the corporate and non-profit world to the zoo," Fowle said. "He has a successful track record of developing revenue sources, providing exceptional guest experiences, and furthering the goals

of wildlife conservation programs." Wayne Weinberg, head of the Search Committee, added, "Joe's passion for wildlife and his ability to motivate and empower people make him a natural fit for the Central Florida Zoo."

Montisano said he is anxious to begin work.

"I am extremely excited to be joining Central Florida's premier community asset at this exciting time in the zoo's history," Montisano said. "From its humble beginnings at the fire station in Sanford in the 1920s to the new zoo of the future, this trans-

Nobel Prize winner plans Florida visit for PeaceJam

Jody Williams was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1997 for her international efforts in banning landmines. In April, she will visit Central Florida to inspire a new generation of peacemakers.

Williams' trip to Central Florida is part of Florida's 2003 PeaceJam Youth Conference, a two-day event at Rollins College beginning on April 12. More than 200 area youth are expected to work shoulder-to-shoulder with the Nobel Peace laureate to harness their peacemaking and community healing skills.

"This is a once in a lifetime experience for children selected to participate in the conference," said Betty Spencer. "We know that if we don't reach out to our kids early, violence could become part of their lives. This program helps youth find ways to stop the violence and help their community."

Spencer, along with Michele Hickey, is the co-founder of Avant-Garde Missions Inc., a non-profit organization created to bring the PeaceJam program to Central Florida. The group's mission is to promote sustainable equal access, non-violence and peace through innovative educational programs and building community support.

Spencer and Hickey began their work with PeaceJam more than a year ago. Both worked for Safehouse of Seminole and wanted to continue their community work after leaving the organization.

"We struggled with what we wanted to do," Spencer said. "We wanted to do something for the community, we just didn't know what."

The answer came after Hickey read an article about a PeaceJam conference held in Denver, Colo. She contacted the event's organizers to learn more about the program, and eventually the pair decided to bring the concept to Central Florida.

PeaceJam is an international education program built around Nobel Peace laureates who work personally with youth to pass on the spirit, skills and wisdom they embody. The organization's goal is to motivate the younger generation to help transform their communities, themselves and the

A Nation Mourns



Columbia's 28th mission ends in tragedy and shock

Shortly after 9 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 1, the Space Shuttle Columbia disintegrated over Central Texas, killing all seven crew members aboard. STS-107/Columbia was 16 minutes from touchdown at Kennedy Space Center on Florida's east coast.

NASA officials continue to investigate the causes for Columbia's break up as it traveled more than 12,000 miles per hour some 40 miles above Earth's surface. Early indications from the space agency point to insulation that ripped away from the shuttle's exterior fuel tank and struck the underbelly of the left wing on take-off Jan. 16.

The crew included commander Rick Husband, pilot William McCool, mission specialist David M. Brown, mission specialist Laurel B. Clark, mission specialist Kalpana Chawla, payload commander Michael P. Anderson, and payload specialist Ilan Ramon, the first Israeli in space.

The 16-day mission was one of the longest in the shuttle program's history. The purpose of the mission was scientific research, and more than 40 experiments were conducted during Columbia's time in space. The payload included the SPACE-HUB-Research Double Module, and was the first flight for the facility designed to conduct scientific studies. Among the research were studies on human physiology and fire suppression.

Columbia was the oldest vehicle in the shuttle fleet. STS 107 was the 28th flight for Columbia, which became the first shuttle in orbit when it launched April 12, 1981. Columbia was named after a small sailing vessel that operated out of Boston in 1792 and explored the mouth of the Columbia River. One of the first ships of the U.S. Navy to circumnavigate the globe was named Columbia. The command module for the Apollo 11 lunar mission was also named Columbia.

Seminole High School's Faine projected to go in first round of NFL draft

Four years ago, Jeff Faine left Seminole High School for the tradition-rich college football program of Notre Dame.

Now with a successful collegiate career as center for the Fighting Irish under his belt, he'll return home in April for one of the biggest days of his life: the NFL Draft.

"I'll be back home in Lake Mary, at my house with my parents," said the 6-foot-3-inch, 298-pound

Faine. "I'm hoping to go in the first round but my biggest goal is to be the first center taken in the draft."

Faine started in football, weightlifting and track field at Seminole. On the gridiron he earned Class 5A all-state honors as a junior and senior, when he graduated out 91 percent as a blocker, with 77 pancake blocks in his senior year. That same year he also won a state championship for weightlifting in the clean and jerk.

"He's as fine an athlete as I've ever been associated with," said Mickey Yasko, weightlifting coach

at Seminole and close friend of Faine. "His work ethic is unbelievably good. We're the better for it as a school having had him here."

After graduating from high school he moved on to Notre Dame. He did not see any action as a freshman, but earned a starting spot as a sophomore. He's started

every game since.

His first three years in the program came at a time when the once great program was floundering. Under head coach Bob Davie the Irish went 5-7 in Faine's freshman year, improved to 9-3 his sophomore year, but slipped to 5-6 his junior season.

Notre Dame fired Davie last year, inserted Tyrone Willingham and immediately got results. The team started 2002 8-0 before falling back to 10-3, but still succeeded in restoring the pride of college football's most time honored team.

"I thought that it was good to get Notre Dame back in the right direction under Coach Willingham," Faine said. "The biggest thing that he changed, he made a big impact on the discipline side of the game."

During his four years at Notre Dame, Faine said his improvement as a player is the result of better mental preparation.

"I'm the same type of player," Faine said. "The focus that I have off the field to achieve things on

Traveling Criminal Teams May Be In Central Florida

Seminole County Sheriff's investigators are looking into the possibility that traveling criminal burglary teams may be in Central Florida.

On Jan. 30 in the Sweetwater Oaks area, near Longwood, a home burglary occurred that fits the mode of operation for these burglary teams.

A female suspect entered a home while the victim was outside gardening. Entry was made through an open garage door. The suspect took jewelry. It's believed a male, driving a rental car, was part of the team by acting as the female's accomplice, providing transportation in and out of the neighborhood. The crime happened around 11 a.m.

A neighbor describes the woman as walking into the house, through the garage, without hesitation. The neighbor thought the suspect actually knew the victims, or was a friend of the family, based upon her actions. She's described as a white female, in her late 20s, 5'3", 110 pounds with short, dark, wavy hair. She was wearing a light color, oversized top.

The male accomplice was described as driving a brand new Mustang convertible and wearing gloves. The Mustang was a rental car, based on tag information.

Traveling criminal teams, made up of Polish nationals, were recently reported as operating in the Tampa area. The criminal teams usually consist of one woman, or two women, on foot and a man in a vehicle. The female(s) will break into

homes through back doors, or simply walk in through open front doors or garages. When challenged by neighbors or property owners, they will use the excuse that they are searching for a lost dog, that they are lost, etc. They will then flee the area. They usually target higher income neighborhoods.

Residents who see suspicious activity in their neighborhoods are asked to call local law enforcement immediately.

Got Junk? Call these guys to give you a hand

At the back of a thrift store, two men pick up a rotten refrigerator, which was dropped off in the middle of the night. They slowly lift and turn the garbage to find a way place it on top of the other materials already in the bed of the truck.

The men work for the city or a trash removal company. They work for 1-800-GOT-JUNK?

The business picks up anything the city trash haulers and organizations like the Salvation Army won't take. The company opened its doors in Florida recently and has had a successful start.

"We opened doors in the beginning of January and we've already got jobs," said Kyle Repp, Orlando franchise owner. "I am very surprised and very pleased because I didn't think business would start off this rapidly."

The business began 12 years ago when a college student, and now president of the company, Brian Scudamore, went home on breaks, bought an old truck and started removing objects from the neighborhood. He remained busy and bought more trucks to help business. He stayed so busy that he quit school and worked full time. That hard work paid off because the 1-800-GOT-JUNK? has franchises in most major metro areas.

Repp sees a serious potential for growth in the area, especially since this franchise is the first in Florida. He is mainly focused in Seminole County and looking into the Oviedo, Tuskawilla, Longwood, and Lake Mary markets. They also extend into the Orlando area like Winter Park and as far west as Apopka.

The company will pick up anything two people can lift and isn't hazardous. The haulers will go wherever the item is located — including into a person's home — and remove it. They even clean up after themselves.

"We'll go into the house where the piece is located," said Repp. "With truck people you have to drag it to the curb and make an appointment. We pick up pretty much anything."

The way Repp gets notified of his jobs is through the national website. People who require the company's services call the national call center and a representative will talk to them about what needs to be removed. If the representative feels the company shouldn't pick up the item, they are referred to another place that can assist them. The jobs are then placed into the system and

wait for the franchises to download the next day's work.

The company does not just throw away whatever it picks up from the houses. Much of what is removed will either be recycled or given to charity.

"The very first job I pulled out an old refrigerator and dryer and other stuff from a home that was to be sold," said Repp. "Instead of taking the appliances to the dump, I gave them to a thrift store in Longwood. If it's usable I'll give them to thrift stores and if its recyclable I can take to scrap yards."

The scenario works in reverse as well. Thrift stores that have used Repp's services will call him to remove items that can't be sold. Sam Deputy, who manages the Thrift Store for the Sharing Center, calls 1-800-GOT JUNK? when he can't sell certain items.

"Usually our donations are good, but most of the time when it's dropped off late at night the people don't want to be seen or are too embarrassed to put it in front of their house and we have to get rid of it," said Deputy.

Repp has two targets for the business; residential and commercial. The core of the business remains residential home owners and they can call the number and they'll come to their house. The company prides itself with having on time service, up-front rates, clean shiny trucks, and friendly uniformed drivers.

The commercial side of the business works with real estate agents trying to get houses ready for sale. Property managers who rent houses also use

the business because renters will leave things behind.

Before working for the company, Repp was the director of World Wide Customer Service, which has offices throughout the world. He lost his job during that company's downsizing and became interested in GOT-JUNK?.

"I was looking for an opportunity to build something for myself because I had been building for others," said Repp. "I began looking at JUNK and the more I looked into it, the more the business plan looked viable. It is a bunch of young people, who are very energetic and the plan was well-thought out, it looked better and better. Maybe the downsizing was a blessing in disguise. They had opening in Florida and since I am originally from Sanford, I was able to come home."

Since the economy has had a slow recovery since the recession, Repp was not the only person looking for a job. Mike Hurley, the navigator and loader for the local franchise, was also in search of a job.

"I was looking for a job and it was in the paper," said Hurley. "I called it just before Christmas and he got in touch with me right after and we started work on January 2."

The fear that Repp has now is being called to active duty from the Army reservists. He was in the Gulf War and says that he has no problem serving his country, but it would be bad for business.

For now though, he is focusing on getting his jobs and becoming the largest junk removal company in Orlando by the end of 2003.

TEAM sees plans acquisition of at least two companies in 2003

TEAM Information Services, Inc., an information technology and computer consulting company based in Lake Mary, plans to acquire at least two technical service companies this year.

TEAM Founder and Chief Executive Officer Matt Moore, said neither of the acquisition firms is organized to serve TEAM clients — that process will get underway as soon as negotiations come to a close.

Moore reported that TEAM grew internally by more than 10 percent in 2002.

"That's very strong in the technology industry, which anticipated growth of only about three percent for the year. The last quarter was the best," Moore said, "with revenues increased by more than 15 percent."

The TEAM family of companies include Vereon Technology, Inc. of Jacksonville and Dragon

Development, Inc., which serves defense firms in the Washington, D.C. area. Vereon has since consolidated into TEAM and Moore said he anticipates growth of more than 100 percent at Dragon, based in Maryland.

"There is no significant funding available now for high tech research and development work that is related to our nation's defense needs," Moore explained.

between life or death for the persons requiring assistance. The numbers must be large enough to be seen from the roadway in all types of weather and lighting conditions. Their color must contrast sharply with their background. Put them directly on or immediately by the front door. If the structure is set too far back from the road, place the number at the entrance to the driveway. Make them large enough to be read from a moving vehicle. Individual apartment or condo doors should be

clearly numbered or lettered as well. It is a wise investment that could save your life.

PUBLIC SERVANT IN RHODE ISLAND

DEAR PUBLIC SERVANT: You have written an important letter, and I'm pleased to pass along your message. Address numbers should be posted on both sides of one's mailbox, or near a porch light so they're clearly visible at night. Do not allow hanging plants, overgrown shrubs or partially opened doors to obscure them. Once 9-1-1 is called, if at all possible, station someone at the

door or in the yard to guide the police, firefighters or emergency medical personnel in. It's also a good idea to give the 9-1-1 operator a brief description of the house.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 20-something new mother, as are most of my friends. On New Year's Eve, my husband and I invited all our friends who have small children over to ring in the new year together. The idea was that the children (all 20 months and younger) could play and fall asleep, while the adults sat back and enjoyed themselves. The nursery was packed with

The next day, I received a phone call from my cousin, who attended the party. He's a police officer. DEAR HEARTSICK: By notifying your guests about the unfortunate incident, you have already done the responsible thing. You have prevented it from happening again.

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

The PeaceJam program was launched in February 1996 by co-founders Dawn Engle and Ivan Suvanjiuff, who conceived the idea for the organization after talking with some gang members from his neighborhood in North Denver. Suvanjiuff discovered that the gun-toting youth not only knew who the Archbishop Desmond Tutu was, they appreciated his nonviolent efforts toward social change. He found the connection between the disaffected youth and the notion of putting them together with Nobel Peace laureates as new role models for positive change.

Through contacts Engle made while working in Washington, D.C., the pair was able to present their idea to the Dalai Lama, who suggested the duo bring in other Nobel Peace laureates on the youth-oriented project. Today, more than 11 laureates, including the Dalai Lama, Tutu, Betty Williams and Aung San Suu Kyi, serve as members of the PeaceJam Foundation. It is the only organization in the world that has a large number of Nobel Peace laureates working together in such a close and continuous way.

As a result of Avant-Garde's continued correspondence with the international program, the first Central Florida PeaceJam Youth Conference was held at Rollins College last April. Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Rigoberta Menchú Tum led a group of about 70 children in a one-day discussion about influencing the world around them.

"It was amazing to see a Nobel Peace Prize laureate treating the children like adults," Spencer said. "You could see the joy they had because somebody of importance was listening to them."

Following the conference, Avant-Garde was given the status of temporary affiliate for the program. Each PeaceJam regional affiliate — there are only eight in the United States — begins to carry out the PeaceJam Program in their region with the designation "temporary affiliate." Once the regional, non-profit, affiliate has demonstrated its ability to carry out various duties, which includes organizing and hosting a conference, the group becomes a permanent affiliate.

"It's an exciting process," Spencer said. "Our goal, after becoming an affiliate, is to expand into Seminole County and implement the program's curriculum into the school."

Before April's PeaceJam conference, the students selected for the program will begin studying William's accomplishments and lifetime work with their chosen teachers. After working two full days with the Nobel Peace laureate, the youth will return to their communities and continue the year-long educational program. According to Spencer, students who have participated in past PeaceJam conferences have succeeded in creating teen centers, diversity programs, AIDS prevention projects and conflict resolution workshops.

"Violence prevention has to begin when we are young," Spencer said. "PeaceJam helps develop skills that will help them survive and to make their communities violence free."

Avant-Garde still needs teachers to participate in the PeaceJam conference. A training session has been scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 22, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. There are currently 10 spaces left to fill before the conference, and teachers interested in participating in the program should call 407-695-4469 before Feb. 15.

During the training session, teachers will be given Williams' curriculum and the tools needed for the year-long program.

Following the training, the teachers will select the students who will participate in the upcoming conference.

Former NBA star Dee Brown speaks to youth at The Grove

Dee Brown doesn't play basketball anymore, but that doesn't mean he can't still reach his fans.

Last week the retired Orlando Magic guard spoke to some 14- and 18-year old boys from The Grove Counseling Center's G.U.Y.S. and G.O.A.L.S. programs.

Clients of these programs are court-ordered to one of The Grove facilities from all over the state to recover from substance abuse related problems. They stay for eight months, getting an opportunity to get their GED, participate in family counseling and improve their overall attitude and behavior.

"We have a community advisory board that arranged to have him contacted and come in," Jill Kohlbecker, PR Coordinator for The Grove said.

Brown, a former NBA all-star with the Boston Celtics, tried to inspire the youths with tales from his rise from a bad neighborhood and troubled home in Jacksonville to professional basketball player.

"I got into trouble, I paid my dues, but I set goals for myself and I was able to overcome those obstacles," Brown said.

He also communicated to the young men about how he used basketball to obtain a college scholarship and education, having no other financial means to afford tuition. He advised them not to give up and that if they want something bad enough, in school, sports, the arts, etc. they can achieve their goals if they have faith in themselves.

"Somebody has given you a chance to change your life and maybe you can change someone else's life," Brown said.

Once he finished speaking to the group, Brown spoke with some on an individual basis, signed autographs for the boys and even played a pick-up game of basketball with them.

"They are all good boys who have made bad choices," said The Grove's vice president of juvenile justice Victoria Bonelli, "and we rely on members of the community like Dee Brown to come out and share with them their own experiences and let them know there is something bigger out there."

On Feb. 18 he'll go to Indianapolis to participate in the NFL Scouting Combine, an event that brings most draft eligible players together for teams to run them through a battery of tests and evaluate their talent.

All three Florida pro teams, including the newly crowned World Champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers, have needs along the

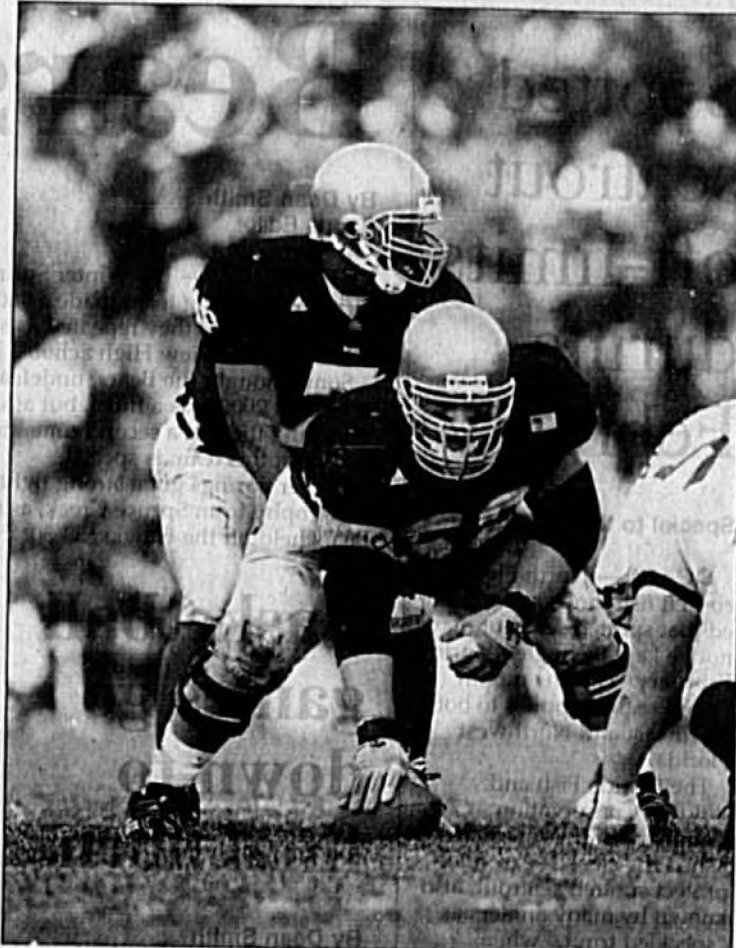
offensive line. Thus the possibility exists that Faine could end up playing in his home state. And depending on which team takes him, he could find himself in a starting position right away.

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Spotted seatrout off-limits during February

OCALA — North Florida coastal fishermen are reminded that spotted seatrout may not be kept by anglers during February. The one month closed season applies to both Northeast and Northwest Florida.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) established the closed season to protect spotted seatrout, also known by many anglers as "speckled trout," when they're the most vulnerable during cold weather, usually as they're congregated up creeks, sloughs and rivers.

For the purposes of the marine rule the FWC defines Northeast Florida as all state waters and adjacent federal waters north from the Flagler-Volusia County line to the Florida-Georgia line, and in Northwest Florida as state waters and adjacent federal waters extending from the Fred Howard Parkway in Pinellas County north along the Gulf Coast to the Florida-Alabama border.

During the open season for spotted seatrout in Northeast and Northwest Florida, anglers are allowed to keep a total of five fish per person per day that measure from 15-20 inches, with one fish measuring over 20 inches. In the state's South Region, the bag limit is four fish per person per day that measure 15-20 inches, with one fish over 20 inches. The South Region spotted seatrout closure is during November and December.

BOWLIN NAMED NORTHEAST REGION OFFICER OF THE YEAR

Officer Randy Bowlin is the kind of law enforcement officer others strive to be. His outstanding character, dedication to duty, and ability to instill confidence in all who work with him, last week earned him the title of Officer of the Year for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Northeast Region. Bowlin will now compete with officers from the FWC's four other regions for the honor of being named FWC Law Enforcement Officer of the Year for the entire state.

Bowlin has been an officer for six years and is stationed in St. Johns County, part of the agency's 14-county Northeast region which extends from Nassau County south to Indian River County and west to Marion County. "Officer Bowlin's performance demonstrates an extraordinary work ethic and reflects his pursuit of excellence in all facets of his profession," said Lt. Bill Head, Bowlin's supervisor. "He is an active instructor and recruit counselor in our training academy, and his enforcement activities are second to none."

Last year Bowlin worked a joint enforcement detail with the National Marine Fisheries Service which resulted in three arrests for violations of the Endangered Species Act. Lake Mary catching products to play key roles for UCF, Stetson

ORLANDO — For the past four years, UCF's baseball team never had to worry about its catcher. Not with Jeremy Frost around. The Oviedo High School product spent his four-year collegiate career providing quality play behind the plate, hitting .290 with 32 home runs and 157 RBI over that span.

But now Frost has moved on to the next level, plucked by the Milwaukee Brewers in the 10th round of last year's Major League Baseball Draft. With that the Golden Knights, two-time defending Atlantic Sun Champions heavily reliant on their pitching, must turn to two Lake Mary freshmen to fill the void at this pivotal position. Drew Butera of Bishop Moore High School and

Ryan Bono of Lake Mary High School will take turns attempting to fill Frost's shoes this season.

"I don't think it's fair to put a lot of pressure on them but they are talented freshman and they have good instincts," said head coach Jay Bergman, former Seminole Community College coach. "We know that they're going to make some mistakes early but they're going to be freshman mistakes that you normally make. And by midseason they won't be making those mistakes."

Butera, a right-handed hitter, comes in with an impressive pedigree. His father, Sal Butera, played in the Major Leagues with the Toronto Blue Jays, Minnesota Twins, Cincinnati Reds and Montreal Expos. Those same Blue Jays decided to draft Drew in the 48th round last spring. See College, Page 9

was named the 3A Player of the Year, but he decided to go college instead. The Blue Jays are not alone in recognizing his talent, though.

Baseball America tabbed him the A-Sun Freshman of the Year in their preview edition.

Though Bono doesn't have nearly as much fanfare, don't discount him. He garnered all-state, all-conference and all-county honors in both his junior and senior seasons at Lake Mary, finishing his prep career with a .395 batting average. He played two years of basketball there, proving his athleticism, and his left-handed bat should definitely earn him considerable playing time at UCF.

"It's going to be fun," Butera said. "I think we have a good pitching staff, from the seniors all the way to freshman. It's great leadership and I hope me and Ryan can take it to the next level and elevate our team."

"I'm excited about coming here, I came here so I'd have a chance to start this year and have an impact as a freshman," Bono said. "Hopefully I can contribute. Cause I think me and (Butera) will do a great job."

Both players will likely also see time at third base, the other unstable position on the Golden Knight's squad. Though seniors Nathan Kragt and Bishop Moore product Rich Wallace figure to see most of the action there, expect to Bono's twin brother Kyle to fit into the equation as well. Like his brother he too was an All-State, All-Conference and All-County star as a prep the past two years. His biggest contributions will likely come as a reliever after going 8-1 with a 1.74 ERA at Lake Mary last season.

Both Ryan and Kyle were also standouts for the Sanford American Legion Post 53 team that won the State Tournament the past two seasons and just missed advancing to the World Series each year.

"I hope to get a good amount of innings to pitch and even eventually play some at third," Kyle Bono said. "I'm doing whatever I can just to help the team, whatever they need to be done."

They join a consistently successful program favored by the media to once again claim the conference title, though Stetson and Florida Atlantic appear strong as well. The Golden Knights replace three-quarters of their infield, so they'll rely on their three star outfielders to produce offensively. Sophomores Clay Timpner and Dee Brown have spots on the preseason All-Conference team after getting named to both the All-American and All-Conference freshman teams last year. Brown even got picked first team All-Conference and as the A-Sun Freshman of the Year. And diminutive sparkplug David Mann, a second team All-Conference selection after hitting a team-leading .410 as a sophomore in 2002, will again fill the leadoff spot.

"He (Mann) is the key to our whole offense," Bergman said. "When David Mann is on, we go. He just catalyzes everything, he gets us started. He has patience at the plate, he can steal base, he gets key hits. He's everything you ask for out of a leadoff hitter."

The Golden Knights don't possess a big-time power hitter; Frost led them with eight home runs last season. So they'll try to score runs through situational hitting and then lean on a solid core of pitching. Senior right-handers Von David Stertzbach (7-0, 1.81), Mark Michael (7-4, 3.93) and Lincoln Minks (7-6, 3.74) will make up the weekend starting rotation, with sophomore right-hander Taylor Cobb also in the mix after a strong showing in summer league play. Sophomore right-hander Matt Fox, the new starting shortstop, will double as the closer.

"When you look at our teams over the years, we've been pitching oriented teams," Bergman said. "We're not going to change. We still think that's the best thing. Our philosophy is you have to win with pitching and defense. It's what we emphasize."

The schedule will allow the Golden Knight time to gel, as they play 12 of their first 14 games at Jay Bergman Field, where they went 23-6 last season. Overall expectations are still high for UCF, who rank 26th in Collegiate Baseball's preseason poll, 35th on Baseball Weekly's, and 40th on Baseball America's.

"I just want to win," Brown said. "We got all the way to regionals last year and didn't win, I just want to win this year. We just want to make it far as we can make it as a team."

UCF begins its season with home games on both Saturday and Sunday, February 8-9, against Florida International. The Saturday game will be the first of 17 games to be aired on the radio on AM-740 The Team beginning at 12:45 p.m. Local fans who want more information should log onto the UCF website at www.UCFathletics.com and look for the baseball link.

The baseball isn't the only team at UCF coming off a strong season. The softball team looks to repeat its success from its inaugural season, when it went 46-19. It has already gotten its season underway and sports a 2-2 record.

Centerfielder Jania Shinhoster and shortstop Stephanie Best return after sensational freshman seasons that made them All-Conference honorees. They'll get help in the lineup from former Seminole Community College standout Rachelle Schmidt, the right fielder.

"Every practice (Schmidt) just works so hard to improve her hitting, improve her outfield play," said head coach Renee Luers-Gillispe, an Oviedo resident. "She's making the big plays and she's making the big hits for us too."

Luers-Gillispe fields a short-handed team, with just 13 players on the roster. They will depend heavily on Dottie Cupp, the captain, lone senior and star pitcher, who won all-conference honors by going 26-6 with a 1.11 ERA in 2002.

To give the team a better chance of making the NCAA postseason, the Golden Knights have increased their strength of schedule. The University of Florida, Florida State and University of South Florida have all been added, as well as a trip to San Diego for the Campbell/Carter Tournament.

"We really do focus on not looking at last year," Luers-Gillispe said. "What we want to do is realize that this is a new season. We just play each game at a time and we try to establish a goal of what we feel is realistic and yet can help us take those steps to get some RPI ratings and be able to have a chance of being successful in non-conference."

Stetson's baseball program will also have a pair of players from Lake Mary in Jose Rosado and Chris Westervelt.

Rosado is a junior infielder from Lake Mary High School, while Westervelt grew up in Lake Mary, but really blossomed after moving to Arkansas in 1997.

Westervelt, a junior catcher, is one of the top Major League prospects in the country after an incredible sophomore campaign in which he batted .467 in Atlantic Sun Conference games and .667 with six runs scored and three RBI in the NCAA Regional Tournament. He started all 61 games for the Hatters last season and ranked among the A-Sun leaders in nine offensive categories, including first in hits (95), home runs (18) tie for first, which also tied the Stetson school record), slugging percentage (.703), and total bases (166). He also ranked second in batting (.403) and runs scored (67), was fourth in on-base percentage (.482), tied for fifth in doubles (17), and seventh in walks (33).

Among his post season honors were: the Atlantic Sun Player of the Year; TPX / Collegiate Baseball second-team All-America; Baseball America third-team All-America; a first-team Verizon Academic All-American (the first student-athlete in A-Sun history to earn All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season); first-team all-Atlantic Region; and first-team all-conference.

This past summer he played in the prestigious Valley League in Virginia and was voted one of the top two prospects in all of summer baseball.

Westervelt began his playing career in the Longwood Babe Ruth League and was a member of the Prep All-Star Team (13 year olds) that was coached by the World Series Championship by his father, Andy, who was an All-American at Eckerd College. His grandfather, Dick, is the radio voice for Stetson and a former SID for the college.

After playing on the Lake Mary freshman team, his family moved to Batesville, Arkansas where he had an outstanding prep career.

He was a three-time first-team 4A All-State selection, a three-time USA Today Honorable Mention All-America, was first sophomore in state history to win the Arkansas Player of the Year award in 1998, and in three seasons batted .563 with 45 doubles, 30 home runs and 160 RBI. He also excelled in the classroom as evidenced by his 4.65 grade-point average.

Stetson begins its season with a three-game homestand on Melching Field at Conrad Park in DeLand against Florida A&M (Friday, Feb. 7, 7 p.m.), Oklahoma State (Saturday, Feb. 8, 7 p.m.) and South Florida (Sunday, Feb. 9, 3 p.m.). For more information log onto www.Stetson.edu.

The Stetson softball program will also have a local flair with Oviedo's Alison Parker and SCC grad Blake Hoorelbeke on the squad.

Parker, a junior, began her career as a track standout at the University of Florida before transferring back to Stetson. 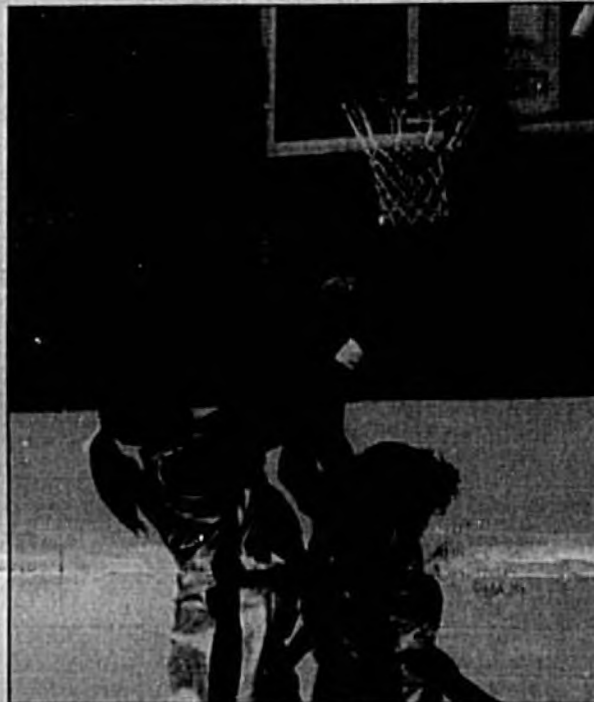
