



## New Tax Bill Agreed Upon By Conference

Senate Utilities Quiz  
Reveals Hopson As  
Receiving Immense  
Profit In 3 Years

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Final agreement between House and Senate conference committees on a bill increasing taxes on large income went today with the revelation that the utility executive, Howard C. Hopson and family, dug profits of \$3,000,000 from 1929 to 1933.

Hammering bills through the passage of the rate cut every half hour, Congress sat for 10 hours yesterday to adopt this measure.

Conferees, who have held long negotiations, agreed to drop

any increase in rates.

Hibbing The Red Flag

**Hibbing The Red Flag**

Forgetting a provision in the Federal Constitution which guarantees freedom of speech and freedom of the press, and in spite of the combined protests of practically all the newspapers in Alabama as well as the American Federation of Labor, the Legislature in the state has passed what it calls an "Anti-Sedition Law," and the governor, though opposing it, allowed it to become a law.

This law provides for imprisonment of anyone who, in the government of the United States, or any of its subdivisions, or of two or more persons who associate for the purpose of discussing "the overthrow or subversion" of the government, or of anyone who organizes or helps to organize any group or society whose purpose is the "overthrow or subversion" of the government, or of anyone who publishes, edits or circulates anything which suggests the "overthrow or subversion" of the government.

It would be possible for the police to use power to put out any in the country with principal cities.

It is in this way that they might be. No matter what might be said against the office holder if it were in the nature of a libelous statement, it could be construed as an attempt at the "overthrow or subversion" of the government.

In an effort to test the constitutionality of this new law, a courageous editor, Julian Hall, of the *Batum Leader*, recently advocated the immediate overthrow of the government, and many people were shocked.

Hereafter Brought

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The thoughts of Will Rogers, though he is no longer with us, were recalled yesterday from the pages of a book by his old friend the late Charles M. Russell, Montana cowboy artist.

Rogers died several years ago, but he was about to complete the book "Trails Plowed Under," a collection of his writings and drawings. He was illustrating it with his own sketches.

He was writing the introduction to the book when he died, so he was able to complete it.

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
